State Counsellor stresses diversity, rule of law

Daw Aung San Suu Kyi addresses 2nd Anniversary, 2nd Hluttaw

A ceremony in commemoration of the Second Anniversary of the Second Hluttaw was held yesterday in Nay Pyi Taw, where the State Counsellor Daw Aung San Suu Kyi pointed out the importance of trust in the Hluttaw, which she described as an “essential institution” for democracy.

At the event held in dining hall of the Nay Pyi Taw Hluttaw compound, the State Counsellor said she had confidence that the Hluttaw representatives would enact laws for the betterment of the people.

“Since we entered the Hluttaw after the 2012 by-election, we learnt and studied the value, difficulties, challenges, depth and subtleness of enacting laws. We gain invaluable lessons from this opportunity. That is why I expect all Hluttaw representatives to know the value of the Hluttaw and each representative. People are relying on the Hluttaw as an institution that will enact laws for the good of the people.

“I have put much emphasis on rule of law. A country’s development, strength and power depend much upon peace and stability. Peace and stability is sustainable only when there is rule of law. Rule of law is a good sign for us. It should be laws that are fair. In fact laws are made by people. Laws made by people could not be always be correct,

Pyithu Hluttaw discusses sports infrastructure, healthcare

THE 10th-day meeting of the seventh regular session of the second Pyithu Hluttaw was held in the Pyithu Hluttaw meeting hall, Nay Pyi Taw, yesterday morning.

At the meeting, Dr. Salai Rianville of Falam constituency raised a question on the plan to upgrade the Falam Centenary football field into a standard football field. Union Minister for Health and Sports Dr. Myint Htwe said Falam Town had the Centenary and Hran Thio football fields. The Centenary football field was upgraded in the 2015-2016 fiscal year (FY) with Ks60 million, and a stadium is being built in the 2017-2018 FY with Ks27 million. To upgrade the Centenary football field into a standard football field, the ministry will require an estimated Ks250 million to build a 500-foot-long rock-lined retaining wall and Ks120 million

to build a 400-metre five-track racing strip around the football field, the total requirement being Ks370 million. Therefore, there is no plan to upgrade the football field further, replied the Union Minister.

Responding to a question by U Min Thein of Taungdwingyi constituency on the plan to increase the number of doctors of psychology in district-level hospitals in Myanmar, Dr. Myint Htwe said that of the 74 districts in the country, some 34 townships have more than 200-bed hospitals that had in its setup a specialist doctor of psychology, while 24 townships had appointed a doctor of psychology. Under the department of health, there are 51 hospitals, of which, 39 had appointed a doctor of psychology, which is 76.5 per cent of the hospitals.

The remaining 40 districts only have 100, 50 or 25 beds and did not have a doctor of psychol-

ogy in their organisation's setup. Doctors of psychology were not appointed full-time even in hospitals where the organisation's setup included such a position, and thus, it would not be possible to appoint doctors of psychology in all district-level hospitals, replied the Union Minister.

Questions raised by U Sai Maung Pwint of Tangyan constituency, U Myo Nyunt of Homalin constituency, U Than Aung of Ngaputaw constituency and Daw Khin Saw Wai of Yathedaung constituency were also answered by Dr. Myint Htwe.

Next, a motion urging the government to improve the rural community health standards and healthcare coverage to include all nationals by forming regional doctors and township health personnel into a mobile medical team and conducting field visits to villages was tabled by Dr U Aung Khin of Pyin Oo

Lwin constituency. The motion was supported by U Hla Tun Aung of Mahlaing constituency.

Pyithu Hluttaw Speaker U Win Myint then requested the Hluttaw representatives who wanted to discuss the motion to enrol their names.

With regards to the bill to repeal the municipal law, returned without amendment by the Amyotha Hluttaw, the Py-

ithu Hluttaw speaker said both the Hluttaws had agreed on the bill, and Pyidaungsu Hluttaw was notified to confirm it. The Pyithu Hluttaw speaker announced that the matter would be followed up according to the Pyithu Hluttaw's rules.

The 11th-day meeting of the seventh regular session of the second Pyithu Hluttaw is scheduled for 2 February. ■

Amyotha Hluttaw discusses construction of bridges

THE Minthan-Maunghlaw Bridge connecting Taninthayi, Myeik and Kyunsu townships is on a road classified as Class (A) priority level (1) and will be given priority to be implemented before the 2020-2021 fiscal year (FY), explained Ministry of Construction Deputy Minister U Kyaw Lin.

He was responding to a question raised by U Zaw Hein of Taninthayi constituency (7) on the plan to build the Minthan-Maunghlaw Bridge connecting Taninthayi, Myeik and Kyunsu townships during the 10th-day meeting of the seventh regular session of the second Amyotha Hluttaw yesterday.

The deputy minister added that the road on which Minthan-Maunghlaw Bridge will be built is managed by the Rural Road Development Department, and the 1,800-foot-long bridge will be built to connect Minthan Village in Myeik Township with Maunghlaw Village in Kyunsu Township. The Taungpale-Shan-taung-Minthan road in Myeik Township is on the Myeik-Taninthayi-Kawthoung union road said the Union Minister.

On the Kyunsu Township side, it will connect to Yataung-Minkote-Pyin-win-Gyotaung-Wayitkayin-Wayitmyanmar-Lethit west road and Maunghlaw-Zaykami-Nyaung-bi-Anyin-Peya road via Maunghlaw Village and will benefit some 30,000 people, noted the Deputy Minister. Next, Ministry of Construction Deputy Minister U Kyaw Lin replied to a question raised by U Soe Thain of Kayah State constituency (9) on the plan to build a Ponnagyun-Pauktaw river-crossing bridge for the development of northern Rakhine State, stating that the Kissapa Nadi (Kaladan) Bridge is not like the river-crossing bridges on Ayeyawady, Chindwin, Thanlwin and Sittaung rivers, as it is

near a river mouth where there is high tide, and double-decker vessels from inland water transport pass through the Sittway-Ponnagyun-MraukU-Kyauktaw route daily. The height of the bridge needs to be above 100 metres, but the machinery being used in the construction of bridges in Myanmar are incapable of constructing such a bridge, so, the country will require higher-capability machinery. Therefore, it will be costlier, and there will be limited funds to construct it, he said.

The main entry roads to Rakhine State, Minbu-An-Sittway road and Ngathaingchaung-Gwa road are being upgraded as a priority in the current five-year project period, and foreign aid will be pursued to construct the Kissapa

Nadi (Kaladan) Bridge, while the bridge will be constructed as soon as foreign funds are available for it, replied the Deputy Minister.

Responding to a question posed by U Tin Aung Tun of Magway Region constituency (5) on the action taken against persons responsible for the collapse of the approach road to the newly built Yaypuyochaung Bridge in Minbu Township after the work done and quality control group had reviewed and accepted the work, U Kyaw Lin said the repair work was being conducted by his ministry, and instructions had been sent to take necessary action against the company and persons responsible for constructing the Yaypuyochaung Bridge.

Questions raised by Dr. U

Kywe Kywe of Mandalay Region constituency (6), Dr. Khun Win Thaug of Kachin State constituency (11) and Daw Than Than Aye of Magway Region constituency (7) were also fielded by Deputy Minister U Kyaw Lin.

Next, Amyotha Hluttaw Speaker Mahn Win Khaing Than informed the Hluttaw about the bill on the registration of deeds being approved and returned with amendments by the Pyithu Hluttaw. He requested the Hluttaw representatives who wanted to discuss the bill to enrol their names. U Min Oo of Bago constituency (6) then tabled a motion of condolences for the demise of Daw Shila Nan Taung @ M Nan Taung of Kachin State constituency (2), which was agreed on by the Hluttaw, and Hluttaw Speaker Mah Win Khaing Than announced the approval of the motion.

The Hluttaw also agreed on providing social assistance with a daily allowance by the Hluttaw whenever a Hluttaw representative passes away, and the Hluttaw speaker announced the approval of the Hluttaw on this matter.

The 11th-day meeting of the seventh regular session of the second Amyotha Hluttaw will be held on 2 February. ■

State Counsellor attends Mon National Day event

STATE Counsellor Daw Aung San Suu Kyi attended a dinner to mark the 71st Mon National Day at the Myanmar International Convention Centre II (MICC-II) in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday, at which she expressed her happiness over last week's pledge by the New Mon State Party to sign the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement.

Speaking at the ceremony, Daw Aung San Suu Kyi said the move would strengthen the Union spirit of the country.

"We all take great pride in the recent agreement with the Mon ethnic armed group to sign the ceasefire agreement for their participation in the peace process, and I believe that Mon ethnic people are also taking pride in it. This is the first step,

and we must strive to reach our goal of eternal peace," she said.

Bail denied for Reuters reporters

YANGON Northern District Court rejected yesterday the bail request of two Reuters Journalists accused of violating Official Secrets Act, even though their defence lawyer said information in documents at the centre of the case was publicly available.

Lawyer Than Zaw Aung said a police witness had accepted during court proceedings that details in documents found in the possession of the reporters when they were arrested had already been published in newspaper reports.

Wa Lone, 31, and Kyaw Soe Oo, 27, were detained on 12 December after they had been invited to meet police officers over dinner in Yangon. They have told relatives they were arrested almost immediately after being handed some documents at a restaurant by two officers they had not met before.

Police Major Min Thant, who

said he led the team of arresting officers, yesterday submitted what he said were secret documents seized from the two reporters to the district court in Yangon.

Police have previously said the documents contained information on the disposition and operations of security forces in Rakhine's Maungdaw District.

In response, defence attorney Than Zaw Aung submitted copies of several newspaper articles that he said showed the information in the documents was already in the public domain.

"After August 25, the government explained to the media and diplomats about what happened in Maungdaw," Than Zaw Aung said.

He said afterwards that Major Min Thant had acknowledged that when cross-examined.

"The witness admitted that the content of the documents they obtained from them is the

information that the public already knew. He said the contents are same," Than Zaw Aung told Reuters.

At the end of the day's proceedings, the court rejected the defence's application for bail. Reading from the Official Secrets Act, Judge Ye Lwin said the alleged offence was "non-bailable", without elaborating further.

Deputy District Judge Daw Su Sandar Win, in her capacity as information officer, confirmed to reporters that the court rejected the bail request.

The next hearing for the case will be to be on next Tuesday. Out of 25 witnesses, two have so far been presented. The remaining witnesses will testify in court in subsequent hearings, she added.

Relatives of the two reporters were distraught after the decision was announced.

"I cleaned my house with the hope that he might get bail, just

in case," Pan Ei Mon, Wa Lone's wife, said, sobbing. "I knew that he wouldn't get bail but still I cannot handle this."

Kyaw Soe Oo's wife, Chit Su Win, held on to her husband in tears, kissing him as he was being taken back to prison.

In the morning, the two journalists had been smiling and appeared in good spirits as they were brought handcuffed to the court from Insein Prison in Yangon. Wa Lone gave the "thumbs up" sign and Kyaw Soe Oo hugged his young daughter.

The courtroom was packed with reporters and diplomats from the US, British, Canadian, Norwegian, Swedish, French and Danish embassies as well as United Nations and European Union officials.

Under cross-examination, police witness Min Thant also said he had updated the paperwork recording Kyaw Soe Oo's

arrest and search to show he was detained outside the restaurant where the reporters say they had a meal with police officers.

Kyaw Soe Oo had refused to sign a form stating he was arrested at an intersection in northern Yangon where police say they had a checkpoint, the officer said.

The two journalists said afterwards that Min Thant was not among the officers who arrested them.

"We have never seen that police officer before," Wa Lone told reporters outside the courtroom. "We were arrested by plainclothes police."

In his testimony, Min Thant said he led the team that arrested the reporters and that he was in uniform at the time.

The court hearing is to determine whether Wa Lone and Kyaw Soe Oo will face charges under the Official Secrets Act.—GNLM/Reuters contributed to this report

PATIENTS who suffered coronary artery disease were operated on by international cardiologists under the arrangement of the sustainable medical cooperation programme at the Zabuthiri Specialist Hospital this morning.

During the operations,

cardiologists such as Dr. Kinzo Ueda from Rakuwakai Marutamachi Hospital, Dr. Kanji Inoue from Kyoto University, Dr. Thet Hein, Dr. Aung Aung from the Zabuthiri Specialist Hospital and a group led by Dr. Than Htay from the JMMHG, procedures

included a coronary angiogram, a percutaneous coronary intervention operation and the treatment of a cardiovascular support device (Stent).

A member of the Nay Pyi Taw Development Committee U Aye Myint and officials

observed the patients and the cardiologists during the operations. It is the seventh time the team of international specialists performed medical procedures for the patients who suffer coronary artery disease. —Myanmar Digital News ■

Stone Village Resort in Momauk draws travellers

STONE Village Resort in Momauk has proven to be a popular destination for travellers this year. The resort is located one mile away from Stone Village, Momauk Township, Bhamo District, Kachin State.

Stone Village is very close to the Momauk forest reserve, where the Hu Kaung company has cultivated some 70 acres of padauk, yamanay and pyinkatoteak while some 100 acres are fallow and virgin land.

"We are planning to cultivate teak, jackfruit and other shady trees on the 100-acre fallow and virgin land," said U Thein Htay, in-charge at Stone Village Resort.

Waste burning plant to be constructed

THE Yangon City Development Committee (YCDC) is planning to construct a waste-burning plant after completing the Yangon-Dala bridge project, according to a report in the Myawady Daily.

"Upon completion of the Yangon-Dala bridge project, we have planned to construct a waste-burning plant. We will construct the waste-burning plant using advanced technology, as tons of waste are generated from Dala and Yangon. However, to construct the plant we need land. Currently, we are burning the garbage," said U Maung Maung Soe, Yangon City mayor.

"We are also using a 2,749-acre plot of land in Kyan Sit Thar Ward, Dala Township, to bury the waste. We dispose some 24 tons of waste per day in this area," he added. Earlier, the YCDC decided to bury the waste in an area outside town. However, now, the YCDC is moving the waste-disposal area because people have started living on the outskirts of the town.—GNLM ■

British tourists visit Myanmar on motorbikes

MYANMAR'S unique natural scenes, eco-tourism sites and archaeological sites, as well as its culture-based tourism, through which tourists can observe the traditions and cultural mores of its ethnic people, have brought in increasing numbers of foreign tourists.

Tourists are visiting Myanmar by air, sea and road. More-

over, they also visit Myanmar through the border gates on their vehicles, motorbikes and bicycles. A British tour group of 12 motorcyclists entered Myanmar through the Myawady border gate on 13 January. They visited Myanmar through an arrangement with the Expeditions Myanmar Travel & Tours Co., Ltd. and under the supervision

of the Ministry of Hotels and Tourism.

The tourists took the Myawady-Hpa-an-Kyaikto-Nyaung Shwe-Mandalay-Bagan-An-Ngapali-Gwa-Yangon-Myawady road trip. They then proceeded to Mae Sot Town, Thailand, via the Myawady border gate on 26 January.—Myanmar News Agency ■

Pigeon pea production drops in Sagaing Region this year

AS a result of unseasonal rainfall, the yield of pigeon peas (red grams) has dropped this year compared with last year.

An acre produced some 15 to 20 baskets last year. A bag of pure pigeon peas fetches only some Ks36,000 in ChaungU and Myinmu townships in the Sagaing Region.

The price of pigeon peas plunged to a 10-year low of some Ks306,000 per ton on 25 October 2017, and then, it bounced back to above Ks400,000 per ton on 29 January 2018.

The growers want the government to purchase the pigeon peas, as the prevailing market price cannot cover even the cultivation costs.

The government can control the price of pigeon peas

by purchasing them with the allocated fund of Ks15 billion, when the price of a ton of pigeon peas drops below Ks300,000, which is less than the cultivation cost, according to the Commerce Ministry

Following India's restriction on pea imports, the prices of domestic pulses plummeted, as Myanmar's pulses market is heavily reliant on the Indian market.

When the news of potential purchase by India came out in December 2017, the prices rose again. Pigeon pea exports earned the country US\$159 million in the 2015-2016 FY. With the demand from India declining, only \$91 million was generated as income from pigeon pea exports in the current FY.—Ko Khant ■

Singapore made largest investment in Myanmar this fiscal year

SINGAPORE made an investment of US\$1.72 billion in 31 projects, as of the end of December, in the current fiscal year (FY), followed by China, with estimated investments worth more than \$1.29 billion in 50 enterprises.

Singapore made the largest investments in the real estate sector. Some European countries also invested in Myanmar through Singapore.

The Myanmar Investment

Commission (MIC) has granted approvals to 176 projects with foreign capital of \$4.78 billion this FY.

Foreign direct investments were pumped into manufacturing, agriculture, livestock and fisheries, and power, as well as transport and communication, hotel and tourism, real estate, industrial estate and other service sectors.

According to statistics pro-

vided by the MIC, Hong Kong, South Korea, the Netherlands and Thailand, as well as Bangladesh, Brunei Darussalam, France and Germany, in addition to India, Indonesia, Japan, Macau, Malaysia, the United Arab Emirates, the United Kingdom, the United States, Viet Nam, Marshall Island, Norway, Qatar and Taiwan, among others, invested in Myanmar.—Ko Htet ■

Myanmar exports 150,000 sheep, goats to China

MYANMAR has exported some 150,000 sheep and goats to China from April 2017 to January 2018, according to the Ministry of Commerce.

Earlier, the Myanmar government prohibited the export of Myanmar sheep and goats because of a decline in reproduction. However, smugglers are still exporting the animals illegally.

To receive tax, the government has permitted the export of the animals from 2016, according to the Myanmar Trade Promotion Organisation.

“The reproduction rate among goats is only 1.5 per

cent per year. Therefore, we prohibited the export of Myanmar's animals.

This fiscal year, we have already exported 150,000 sheep and goats to China, the main importer of such animals,” said U Myo Thu, Director of Myanmar Trade Promotion Organisation.

The 150,000 sheep and goats were exported by 19 licensed companies. “To increase the export of these animals, we are planning to include the export of sheep and goats in the national export strategy,” the ministry of Commerce stated.—Zwe ■

Mandalay City to host 2nd Mandalay-Japan Festival & Business Partner Fair 2018

MABA-Alumni Business Association of Upper Myanmar will organize the 2nd Mandalay-Japan Festival & Business Partner Fair 2018 at Mingalar Mandalay Business Promotion Area in Mandalay on 12 February.

The event will include entertainment programs such as Myanmar and Japan cultural shows and Japanese food fair. The occasion is intended to

strengthen amity and cooperation between Japan and Myanmar.

“The purpose of the fair is to cement bilateral collaboration, economic connectivity, technical cooperation and friendship between the two countries,” said U Nyan Aung, Vice Chairman of the MABA. The businessmen in Mandalay will have a chance to meet with

Japanese counterparts to talk about water treatment, motorcar repair, motorcar spare parts import, recycle industry and horticulture.

The event is expected to be attended by the Nobeoka mayor and Japanese entrepreneurs. A press conference on the fair was held by the officials from MABA this evening.—Myanmar Digital news ■

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VP U Myint Swe wants Myanmar to ease rules for doing business

VICE President U Myint Swe has urged the ministries and private sectors to make laws and policies that can guarantee the development of the private sector, as it plays an important role in creating job opportunities and increasing the income of the country.

He made the statement during the 14th meeting between the government and businessmen at the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry (UMFCCI) in Yangon yesterday.

The government has per-

mitted foreign investments worth more than US\$5 billion and local investments worth Ks3.279 trillion (including \$1 billion) in the country up to mid-January of the 2017-2018 fiscal year.

The foreign trade sector saw an increase of more than \$3.8 billion compared with the same period last year, with the private sector's involvement in the foreign trade being 83 per cent.

Rice exports have increased due to the efforts made by private rice enterprises, said U Myint Swe.

The vice president has also

urged the concerned ministries to set priorities when they work to relax the rules indicated in the ease of doing business report.

He also praised the role of women in the economic sector, as women made up 49 per cent of

the entrepreneurs in the country.

He also urged the participants in the meeting to openly discuss the challenges they are facing. Following the opening address of the Vice President, Union Minister for Commerce

Dr. Than Myint, Yangon Region Chief Minister U Phyo Min Thein and Deputy Minister for Commerce U Aung Htoo discussed the arrangements to ease the rules for doing business. —Myanmar News Agency ■

Gov't wants private-sector participation to improve ease of doing business rank

TO improve the country's ease of doing business rank, Vice President U Myint Swe has noted that public recognition and participation by businessmen are needed to execute governmental reforms, in line with the efforts made by the concerned officials.

He made the statement during the 14th regular meeting with businessmen at the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry (UMFCCI) yesterday.

"Not just our country, the neighbouring countries and other countries are also trying to climb the ranks. We must keep up with them," said the Vice President.

Additionally, U Aung Htoo, Deputy Minister of the Commerce Ministry and the leader of the movement for improving the ease of doing business ranking, has encouraged the participation of the private sector in this effort.

Those who are liable to answer the tricky questions put forth by the World Bank need to understand the government's reform processes, said U Aung Htoo.

"Those working for law firms and accountancy firms usually respond to the ques-

tions. They require extensive expertise in most aspects. If they lack knowledge about the government's reform processes and performances, they will not be able to answer anything. If so, the country's score will not go up," he added.

The concerned ministries should anticipate the questions to carry out the reforms. They need to inform the public of the questions through the media, he continued.

The World Bank determines the country's ease of doing business rank based on 11 indicators. They are starting a business, dealing with construction per-

mits, getting electricity, registering property, getting credit, protecting minority investors, paying taxes, trading across the border, enforcing a contract, resolving insolvency and labour management. These have been incorporated into the country's existing indicators for 2018. Each indicator has two to 38 pages of associated questions.

While starting a business, questions related to the working process, cost, government's reform process, and smooth or rough reform, among others, are included. They also ask whether the company registration system can cover the whole country and

whether online data access and online registrations are available.

"The ease of doing business index is positively related to foreign investments in developing countries. Myanmar is inviting foreign investments, and more foreign investors will eye Myanmar if this rank goes up," said the Vice President.

U Zaw Min Win, President of UMFCCI, said it was keeping the government reform process data and wanted the related ministries to share data on the changing processes with them. The UMFCCI can then disseminate the information to those who will answer the questions.

U Aung Kyi Soe, Secretary General of UMFCCI, said that although both the government and private sectors still require some modifications to the processes, it was a progressive action that the senior officials and other concerned officials had discussed the difficulties with the businessmen.

Currently, the country is ranked 172 out of 190 countries in the ease of doing business index. It sits in the last spot compared with countries in the ASEAN region. The government is trying to achieve a rank of 99 in 2020, aiming to rise by 24 spots per year on average. ■

Rents rise in Yangon townships

The rents paid by expatriate workers in the central townships of Yangon have risen from early January, according to a report in Myawady Daily yesterday.

Latha, Pabedan, Kyauktada, Pazuntaung, Botahtoung and Mingla Taungnyunt are the central townships in Yangon. The rents in these townships are twice those in other places. Most expatriates in Yangon are from Thailand, China and Japan.

Foreigners generally prefer the basement and the first floor (ground floor) to run their businesses and make long-term rental contracts.

They spend Ks1 to Ks4 million per month on apartments and condominium apartments.

The sellers outdo the buyers in the Yangon real property market. Local residents prefer to take apartments at a rent of Ks150,000 or under Ks200,000.

The rent for apartments on Pyay Road and in Mayan-gon Township is exorbitantly high, because these areas are popular with foreigners.—GNLM ■

'Big 6' countries of WHO South-East Asia Region meet to close measles' immunity gap, accelerate elimination efforts

NEW DELHI—With nearly 4.8 million children in WHO South-East Asia Region missing measles vaccination every year, the 'big six' countries of the Region today shared their immunization challenges and lessons learnt for accelerating efforts to eliminate measles and control rubella by the year 2020.

"Eliminating measles would avert half a million deaths, while controlling rubella and Congenital Rubella Syndrome would promote health of pregnant woman and the infants they give life to," said Dr Poonam Khetrapal Singh, Regional Director for WHO South-East Asia.

Two of the Region's countries – Bhutan and Maldives – eliminated measles in 2017 while the others are carrying out largescale immunisation drives to achieve the same.

Nearly 500 million children in the Region are planned to be reached with measles and rubella containing vaccines through routine immunisation and supplementary immunisation campaigns in the next two years. Sharing challenges and lessons learnt from various recent achievements and initiatives will help member countries address their unique problems to close the immunity gap against measles, rubella and CRS, she said.

In recent years, WHO South-East Asia Region has made unprecedented progress against vaccine preventable diseases. The Region was certified polio-free in 2014 while maternal and neonatal tetanus was eliminated as a public health problem in 2016.

Last year India and Indonesia targeted 70 million and 35 million children respectively in supplementary measles immunization campaigns. Both have further strengthened routine immunization systems. Bangladesh has implemented an urban immunization strategy, with support of networks of volunteers to broaden immunisation coverage. Myanmar has protected around 14 million children against Japanese encephalitis. Nepal has pioneered an incentive scheme to recognize and celebrate villages and districts that are fully immunized. Thailand has demonstrated to the world the impact surveillance can have via its unique 'data for action' model.

Further accelerated and focussed efforts are needed. Nearly 38 million children are born in the Region every year. Of them approximately 87% receive the first dose of measles-containing vaccine. Though this is a marked improvement from previous years, it still means around 4.8 million children are deprived of the most basic protection against measles each year.

With majority of the missed children being accounted for by the 'big six' countries, immunisation programme managers of Bangladesh, India, Indonesia, Myanmar, Nepal and Thailand, along with partners WHO, UNICEF, GAVI, Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and CDC, are deliberating challenges, experiences and lessons learnt in immunization in the Region that can be harnessed to eliminate measles and control rubella / CRS.

"This dynamism and positive exchange is at the very core of south-south and triangular cooperation," said Dr Khetrapal Singh, who announced measles elimination and rubella / CRS control as one of her flagship programme at the start of her tenure in 2014.

Since then all member countries in South-East Asia region have introduced two doses of measles-containing vaccines in their childhood immunisation programme. Five of them have achieved 95% coverage with both doses.

Measles elimination and rubella / CRS control strategies include ensuring over 95% coverage with two doses of measles and rubella containing vaccine in each district through routine and/or supplementary immunization activities, and developing and sustaining sensitive measles surveillance supported by an accredited measles laboratory network.

Eliminating measles and controlling rubella would also mean extending the benefits of vaccine to all people everywhere, including communities in hard-to-reach or remote areas, the underserved or the neglected or marginalized; and advancing universal health coverage.—WHO ■

UNION Minister for Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement Dr. Win Myat Aye attended and addressed the opening ceremony of Earthquake Response Simulation Exercise of the National Disaster Management Committee and its Working Committee at the Hilton Hotel in Nay Pyi Taw, yesterday morning.

During the ceremony, Dr. Win Myat Aye said, "Myanmar is an earthquake-prone country due to its geographical location and weather conditions. If we do not ready ourselves to handle an earthquake, it may cause damage and casualties. Efforts are being made to disseminate knowledge on earthquake hazards among the people.

"Media play a vital role in executing this plan, such as through television series, stories and episodes," he added.

"Drills are being conducted to make ourselves effective (in a disaster), and today's simulation exercise is important for ensuring an immediate emergency response, which includes creating a precise and strong system," he stated.

"The readiness for action process, administrative management and prevention of earthquake hazards are as important as tackling the aftermath of an earthquake," he added.

He said all these processes were related to protecting human life and property, and if the country suffered a disaster, effective connections and organisation would play a vital role.

"I would like to urge all participants to be aware of the situation. Effective response is needed for the implementation

process, and this must be discussed," he noted.

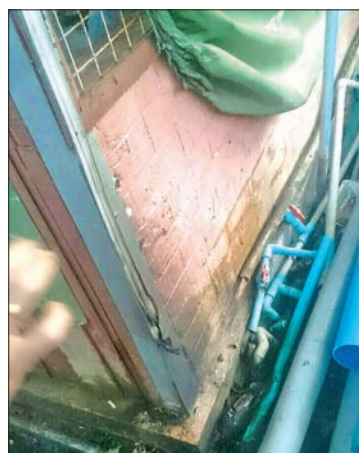
Molotov cocktail thrown into compound of State Counsellor's residence in Yangon

Public requested to report to Yangon Region Police Force with information

A man reportedly threw a Molotov cocktail (a crude incendiary device) into the compound of State Counsellor Daw Aung San Suu Kyi's residence yesterday morning at around 6:30 a.m.

This was reported by an eyewitness to the police post at the entrance to the State Counsellor's residence in No. 54/56 University Avenue Road, Golden Valley Ward (1), Bahan Township, Yangon.

The eyewitness was driving past the Kokkine traffic light along the University Avenue Road towards Kamayut Township when the incident occurred. According to the statement of this eyewitness, the man thought to have thrown the Molotov cocktail was also seen at the bus stop near the South Korean Embassy. Three men showed up at the bus stop: While two men stayed in place, the third threw the Molotov cocktail, the eyewitness re-

ported. The eyewitness handed over a photograph of the suspect to the police on duty at the entrance to the compound of the State Counsellor's residence.

U Than Tun, 62, who was in the compound heard a small explosion and went to investigate. He found a small fire burning. He doused the fire with water, but the area still smelled of ker-

osene. On searching the compound, he found a bottle that appeared to be filled with kerosene had been thrown into the compound.

Except for part of a tarpaulin sheet that was slightly burnt by the fire, no other damage was reported. The incident is under investigation.

A picture of the suspect was

shown on Yangon Police Facebook and was described as about 40 years old, short black hair, about 5 ft. 5 inches tall, brown skin and fat bodied man wearing a pink T-shirt and a sarong with blue squares.

Licence of taxis not registered as city taxis to be revoked

The Yangon Region Transport Authority (YRTA) will take action against taxis failing to register as city taxis from this month, according to a report in City News yesterday.

"We have urged taxi owners to register their vehicles as city taxis through the state-owned press media. Unregistered taxis will face a penalty later," said an official from YRTA.

Registration was open until yesterday. This action aims to ensure public security. Surprise checks will be carried out from this month, and there is a plan in place to confiscate the licences of unregistered taxis.

More than 70,000 taxis are running on Yangon roads, besides several non-Yangon licensed taxis, of which some 40,000 taxis have been registered as city taxis.—GNLM ■

Romanian president says will stand up for courts' independence

BRUSSELS — Romania's President Klaus Iohannis told the European Union on Wednesday he would fight for the independence of his country's courts, which he and Brussels say is threatened by draft laws prepared by the Social Democrat-led government.

The EU's executive Commission said the laws, if approved, would ensure Romania remained outside the bloc's Schengen zone of free travel, though it said it had no plans to initiate a punitive procedure against Bucharest over that.

The EU is concerned that Bucharest's judicial overhaul will reverse any progress Romania has achieved in fighting high-level graft in one of Europe's most corrupt countries. Romania's judicial system remains under special EU monitoring.

"I am very much preoccupied by the legislative procedure regarding the changing of the laws of justice," Iohannis told a joint news conference with Commission chief Jean-Claude Juncker.

"The independence of the Romanian justice is something I will fight for," added Iohannis,

a centrist and outspoken critic of the ruling leftist coalition in Bucharest.

Under the draft laws, approved by parliament last month, offences involving an abuse of public office that causes financial damage of less than 200,000 euros (\$249,000) would no longer

carry a penalty.

Romania's constitutional tribunal has sent some of the draft laws back to parliament for reworking, and Iohannis, whose signature is required for them to take effect, said he was determined that they fully meet EU standards.

"I am worried and I made it clear that I do have concerns," the EU's Juncker said.

The Commission has previously said Romania and its southern neighbour Bulgaria should be allowed to join the Schengen zone of passport-free travel, but many EU states re-

main opposed due to the concerns over corruption and lack of transparency.

Joining Schengen is a key objective for Bucharest, but Juncker cautioned: "If the Romanian legislation was to remain as was foreseen by the parliament, then... the accession of Romania to Schengen would be looked at in completely different terms."

However, Juncker said he had "no intention whatsoever" to launch punitive action against Romania under the EU's Article 7 over the rule of law concerns.

The Commission has invoked Article 7 against Poland over Warsaw's overhaul of the judiciary, though Hungary would be expected to block any attempt to suspend its Polish ally's voting rights in the European Council in consequence.

The EU's ability to rein in member states which pass laws that undermine core democratic principles is a key challenge facing the bloc, amid a growing divergence between its wealthy, liberal western states and newer, more conservatively-minded eastern members.—Reuters ■

EU proposes joint studies to speed acceptance of new medicine

BRUSSELS — The European Commission proposed on Wednesday joint clinical assessments to determine whether approved new drugs and medical devices offer value for money and should be prescribed for patients within national healthcare systems. The joint action, set to take more than three years to enter into force, would replace a largely national approach to health technology assessment (HTA) that duplicates work, limits transparency and impedes market access for innovation.

The Commission's plans aim to make better use of available resources, to have a consistent methodology and to improve business predictability in a healthcare sector accounting for some 10 percent of the EU's economic output.

Monique Goyens, director general of European consumer organization BEUC, welcomed the plans. She said too many new drugs or devices did not make a real difference compared to

those already on the market, wasting taxpayers' money. "The Commission is right to encourage member states to work together so that only health technologies with an added value get the go-ahead," she said in a statement. HTA is used by most European countries. Agencies such as Britain's National Institute for Health and Care Excellence (NICE), France's Haute Autorité de Santé (HAS) and Germany's Institute for Quality and Efficiency in Health Care (IQWiG) effectively act as gatekeepers to big markets. Their role can be frustrating for drug companies that have already had their medicines cleared as safe and effective by the European Medicines Agency, but then need to submit different evidence to different agencies in different countries to get their products reimbursed.

This has led to growing calls for some degree of harmonization, although there has been voluntary cooperation for years, with an EU-wide network set

up in 2013. The Commission is proposing joint work on clinical assessments, scientific consultations with business, identification of emerging health technologies and voluntary cooperation on, for example, surgical procedures.

A group of representatives from national authorities would be responsible for overseeing joint work. National HTA authorities will still be responsible for determining pricing and reimbursement, albeit using the joint assessments. The rules will apply some three years after approval by the European Parliament and EU members. There will then be a further three-year transition period for EU countries to adapt.

The Commission said it envisaged 10-15 assessments could start in the first year, rising to 65 towards the end of the transition period. The changes will therefore happen after Britain has exited the European Union and will have to be factored into the next EU budget covering the period after 2020.—Reuters ■

Prince William, Kate kick off Nordic visit with bandy shootout

STOCKHOLM — Britain's Prince William and his wife Kate, who is expecting the couple's third child in April, started a four-day visit to Sweden and Norway on Tuesday, hitting the ice in a Stockholm park to try out the sport of bandy.

Bandy, played mainly in the Nordic region and Russia, is similar to ice hockey but played with a small ball instead of a puck and with larger pitches and goals. After a brief tutorial, William scored two goals in a three-shot shootout to Kate's one.

As well as meetings with the royal families of Sweden and Norway and political leaders in the Nordic countries, the royal couple's agenda also includes briefings about the military forces in the region.

William - second-in-line to

the throne - served in Britain's armed forces from 2006 until 2013, and worked as a search and rescue helicopter pilot before he started last year to focus full-time on his royal duties.

Also on the agenda is a visit to the Karolinska Institute where they will be learning about how Sweden is tackling mental health issues among young people.

Kate, William and his brother Harry have made campaigning about mental health a priority, with the brothers speaking about how the death of their mother Diana, Princess of Wales, in a 1997 car crash had left them with deep emotional scars.

Britain's monarchy has ridden a wave of public support in recent years due to the popularity of William, Kate and Harry.—Reuters ■

Xi meets May, calling for better China-Britain ties in new era

BEIJING—Chinese President Xi Jinping met with visiting British Prime Minister Theresa May Thursday, calling on both countries to forge an enhanced version of the “Golden Era” bilateral ties.

During their meeting at the Diaoyutai State Guesthouse, Xi said peace, development and win-win cooperation have become the mainstream of the times.

The two countries need to conform to the trend of the times, respond to the needs of their respective development stage and bilateral cooperation, and add new meaning into the bilateral ties so as to forge an enhanced version of the “Golden Era,” Xi told May.

China and Britain agreed to embrace a “Golden Era” for bilateral relations during Xi’s

visit to Britain in October 2015.

Xi said that China is willing to work with Britain to promote the healthy and steady development of bilateral ties in a new era.

He made four proposals for the future development of bilateral ties.

Firstly, the two countries should consider and design the future development of bilateral ties

from a strategic height and in a comprehensive way.

Secondly, both sides should work together to promote bilateral economic and trade cooperation.

Thirdly, China and Britain should enhance exchange and cooperation within multilateral institutions such as the United Nations, G20 and the World Trade Organization to address global challenges.

Fourthly, the two countries should reinforce people-to-people and cultural exchanges.

This is May’s first official visit to China since she took office in 2016.

She kicked off her three-day visit to China in the central city of Wuhan on Wednesday morning and held a China-Britain annual meeting between heads of government with Chinese Premier Li Keqiang in Beijing Wednesday afternoon.

The two countries signed a dozen of deals in areas including trade, finance, health care and smart cities on Wednesday. —Xinhua ■

Turkish airstrikes kill 49 Kurdish militants in northern Iraq – army

ISTANBUL — Turkish warplanes struck 19 Kurdistan Workers Party (PKK) targets in northern Iraq on Monday, killing 49 militants, Turkey’s armed forces said on Thursday.

Two airstrikes were carried out in the Asos/Qandil, Zap, Avasin/Basyan and Hakurk regions on Monday, the army said in a written statement.

The Turkish military destroyed shelters, hideouts and weapon positions of the militant group, which was believed to be preparing an attack on Turkish border posts, it said. The PKK, which has been waging an insurgency in southeast Turkey since the 1980s, is designated a terrorist group by Turkey, the United States and the European Union. More than 40,000 people have been killed in the conflict.—Reuters ■

Train carrying US Republican lawmakers hits truck in Virginia, one dead

CROZET — A passenger train carrying Republican members of the US Congress to a retreat in West Virginia slammed into a garbage truck on Wednesday at a rural Virginia road crossing, killing one person on the truck, authorities said.

No major injuries were reported among the lawmakers or staff on the train, the US Department of Transportation said. There was one serious injury among those on the truck, in addition to the fatality. Amtrak, the US passenger rail service that operated the chartered train, said two crew members and three passengers were hospitalized with minor injuries after the crash. One, Representative Jason Lewis, was examined for a possible concussion.

“I’m fine compared to, tragically, the truck driv-



ers, and thankful for the prompt action of our doctors and first responders. My thoughts are with the family of the driver who passed away,” Lewis told Reuters. The train was taking lawmakers to the annual retreat in White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia, just west of the Virginia state line. Amtrak said the collision occurred at 11:20 a.m. in Crozet, a tiny town between the college town of Charlottesville, Virginia, and White Sulphur Springs. Lewis later left the hospital and travelled to the retreat, where he intended to participate as much as he was able, a spokeswoman said.—Reuters ■

BEIJING — China and Britain on Wednesday signed a dozen of deals on areas including trade, finance, health care and smart city, pledging to further promote the Golden-Era strategic partnership.

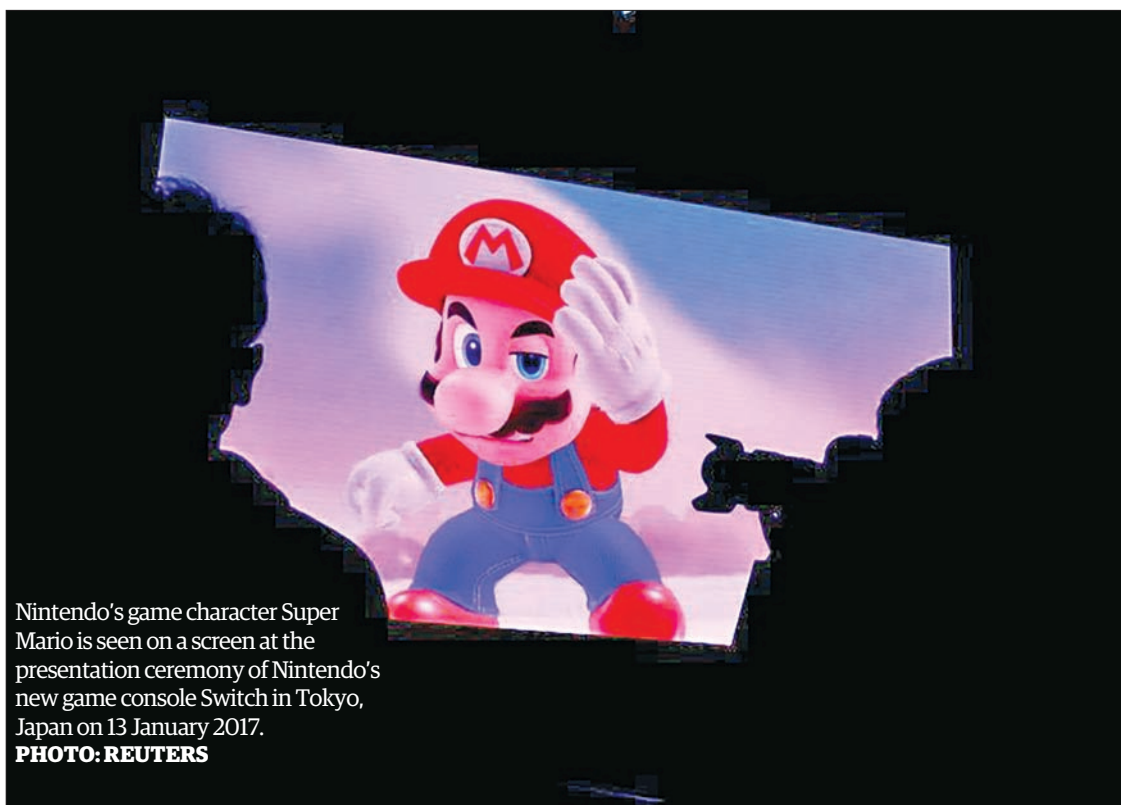

sal Pictures, President Tatsumi Kimishima said at a meeting with analysts on Thursday. The launch date has not been decided.

It is part of Nintendo's efforts to diversify revenue sources as the firm's earnings are heavily reliant on the gaming console

business. On Wednesday, the company reported its biggest third-quarter operating profit in eight years, driven by smashing demand for its new Switch games console, and said it expected annual earnings to outstrip its previous estimate.— Reuters ■

No malice behind open letter on 'Padmaavat': Swara

MUMBAI — Actor Swara Bhasker says she wrote an open letter criticising "Padmaavat" because she wanted to raise some questions about the film on a public platform. Bhasker's letter, which criticises director Sanjay Leela Bhansali for apparent glorification of the practice of Jauhar (mass sati), has sparked a controversy online. Responding to the

criticism, the actor said, "Everyone has the right to critique and express their opinion. Like me, others also have the right to express their thoughts. I made a point, I said what I felt.

an event here last evening.

"If you see me there, you'll know," she teased.

The actor said she is excited for Markle to tie the knot and bring change in the world as a member of the royal family.

"I don't think anybody else would be able to do it the way she will. She's just right for it.

She's an icon, truly, that girls can look up to, that women can look up to. She's normal, she's sweet, she's nice, she thinks about the world, wants to change it and this was even before any of this happened," Priyanka told the magazine.

"So I do think Meghan being a part of the royal family is a big step in the direction of so many things; of women, of feminism, of diversity, of race, of the monarchy versus everyone else. It's a beautiful step in the right direction," she added.

Markle and Harry are scheduled to wed on May 19. —PTI ■

'Glee' actor Mark Salling, 35, dies before child pornography sentencing

LOS ANGELES — Mark Salling, an actor who played a supporting role in the TV show "Glee," has died at age 35, his attorney said on Tuesday, weeks before his March sentencing on child pornography charges.

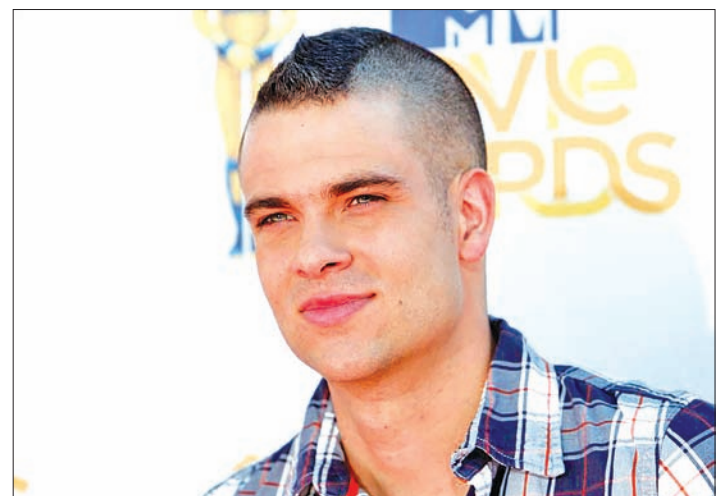
Salling's attorney, Michael Proctor, confirmed the death but would not comment on a report on celebrity website TMZ that said law enforcement sources

called it an apparent suicide in Los Angeles. Proctor also did not immediately provide the cause of death. "I can confirm that Mark Salling passed away early this morning," Proctor said in a statement.

Police and the Los Angeles County coroner's office confirmed that a body had been found in Los Angeles but would not immediately identify it. Salling was

arrested in 2015 after he showed child pornography on his computer to a girlfriend and she reported it to police, according to the U.S. Department of Justice.

Salling pleaded guilty on Dec. 18 to a federal charge of possessing child pornography, admitting he had downloaded 25,000 sexual images of children onto his computer from the Internet.—Reuters ■
