He said Inle Lake is facing environmental concerns caused by excessive use of fertilizers and pesticides, increased population, rising use of firewood, rapid growth in agriculture and tourism and climate change.

The good practice guidelines are part of the action plan for the elimination of forced labour signed between the ILO and the Myanmar Government.

Attending the meeting were Union Minister for Labour, Immigration and Population U Thein

Swe, HLWG members comprising of permanent secretaries, directors-general and officials from government ministries, ILO's Liaison Officer Mr. Rory Mungoven, and other officials.

In his speech delivered at the meeting, the Union Minister first mentioned that the meeting they were at now was to approve of the curriculum and schedule for the training of trainers (ToT) and other training courses, to finalize discussions on the Good Practice Guidelines for Preventing Forced Labour, and to discuss implementation of a national complaint mechanism for elimination of forced labour.

The good practice guidelines were sent by the ILO as a follow-up to the 23 May HLWG meeting which focused on a compilation of Do's and Don'ts and training course schedules, said the Union Minister.

He said increasing the capacity of technical working group members and providing ToT courses to government officials and Tatmadaw officers will spread the elimination of forced labour through all levels of management, in addition to conducting seminars and trainings in the states and regions as part of priority 3 of the action plan.

The Union Minister said

Organic market opens end of Oct in YGN

AN organic market will be opened in the compound of the Agriculture Department (Yangon Region) facing Yangon Technological University (Gyo Gone) on 31 October.

The market will sell organic fruits, vegetables and other organic products will be put on sale at a single location, according to the Yangon Region Agriculture Department.

The organic market will

be opened in cooperation with Agriculture Department and Myanmar Organic Farming and Production Association every Wednesday from 8 am to 12 noon.

"The organic market is opened so that local people and consumers can consume healthy organic vegetables. Myanmar has yet to issue certificates recognizing organic products so those who want to

sell their organic products in the market can sell with FDA recommendation certificate," said an official from the Yangon Region Agriculture Department.

At the moment, the sellers do not need to pay rental fees for a space in the market but they may need to pay fees later to cover the cost of setting up and removal of sales point.

At the market, organic

foods from organic zones including Agriculture Department's organic fruits will be displayed in more than 10 shops. Dragon fruits from Sagaing Region and Shan State will also be put on sale at the organic markets, according to the Yangon Region Agriculture Department.

For now, organic products are sold at Myay Pa Dey Thar Kyun and Kandawgyi every week.—Zwe ■

MNA receives EASA Part 145 certificate

MYANMAR National Airlines (MNA) received EASA (European Aviation Safety Agency) Part 145 Maintenance Organization Approval Certificate and a ceremony was hosted onboard the Princess Pantwar cruise ship at Health Jetty, Yangon on 28 October.

EASA Part 145 is a European standard approval of organizations performing maintenance on aircraft and aircraft components.

MNA was permitted to establish an EASA recognized large aircraft maintenance workshop in 2015 for purchasing six ATR 72-600 aircrafts from ATR Company. After three years of operating the maintenance workshop, MNA received the international standard maintenance certificate.

U Win Khant, Perma-

nent Secretary of Ministry of Transport and Communications, said, "MNA has been in existence for over 70 years and is the national flag carrier of Myanmar. Today, we are proud of our airline because we received a recognized international standard maintenance certificate. We hope to maintain this achievement."

At the ceremony, U Min Lwin, Director-General of the Civil Aviation Department handed over EASA Part 145 Maintenance Organization EASA 145-0801 certificate to Chief Captain U Than Tun, CEO of MNA.

In the past, these airplanes were maintained only with certificates of Myanmar Civil Aviation Department. There are now about 20 ATR airplanes in Myanmar including the seven owned by MNA.

Maintenance of these planes are being conducted by Myanmar engineers, thus saving foreign currency.

Myanmar National Airlines was established on 15 September 1948 as Union of Burma Airways (UBA). After a period in isolation, along with much of Myanmar's industry, the airline has now been reborn as Myan-

mar National Airlines.

At present, MNA flies to 28 domestic airports and international destinations including Singapore, Bangkok, Hong Kong, Chiang Mai and Bodh Gaya. MNA also plans to extend its service to cities in China such as Chengdu and Wuhan later this year.—Myint Maung Soe ■

TTCL meets with government officials to set up 388 MW LNG plant

TTCL Public Company Limited, a joint venture between Japan and Thailand, is in talks with the Union Government to establish a Liquefied Natural Gas plant capable of generating 388 megawatts.

As part of this project, a combined-cycle power plant will be constructed on 8.16 acres of the compound of Ahlon power plant. An LNG terminal will be constructed on 15 acres near Yangon River in southern Dala Township, said U Htet Aung Mon, general manager of TTCL

Public Company Limited.

A gas pipeline connecting to the LNG plant and 230 KV new transmission line projects will also be carried out.

The LNG gas pipeline network is planned to start from LNG terminal, pass through Twantay canal, and Seikkyi Kanaungto port and then cross the Yangon River to Ahlon plant. The pipeline will be 24.4 km long.

LNG will be imported from foreign countries. Natural gas will be transported in LNG form through LNG terminal, said U Htet Aung Mon. The project will supply power to

the national grid.

Funding for this project is allocated over US\$350 million. About 440,000 tons of LNG will be consumed per year. Upon receiving investment approval, the company expects to join hands with the government for 25 to 30 years.

To implement this project, TTCL submitted a proposal to the Ministry of Electricity and Energy in July 2017 and shortly thereafter, the two parties conducted a series of discussions.

The Ministry granted Notice to Proceed (NTP) to the company in January 2018. The

company still needs to put forward reports and reviews to the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation and the Ministry of Electricity and Energy after carrying out a feasibility study.

Reports must then be proceeded to the business committee and only after a cabinet discussion will the project be given approval, said U Ye Lwin, Hluttaw representative from Ahlon Township constituency. The feasibility study to implement the project is currently underway. The three townships—Ahlon, Dagon

Seikkan and Lanmadaw- were combined to hold the first public discussion for Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) and Social Impact Assessment (SIA) activities on 29 October. More public consultations and hearings will be conducted in Seikkyi Khanaungto, Thanlyin and Dala townships. EIA/SIA final report will be put forward to the government through the related ministry. Upon approval, the construction is slated to begin mid-2019. The project aims to generate power term within 28 months from the starting date. ■

EU delegations meet with worker representatives for possible impact of EU's GSP withdrawal

EUROPEAN Union mission and worker representatives negotiated possible impacts caused if EU suspends the Generalised Scheme of Preferences to Myanmar, at the EU office yesterday.

At the meeting, trade unions showed strong opposition against consideration of trade sanctions on the country.

“Disagreement letter to EU’s consideration of GSP withdrawal has been released and sent to them”, said the president of the Confederation of Trade Unions in Myanmar.

“It is not a constructive approach regarding trade sanctions to deal with EU’s allegation that Myanmar is accused of blatant violation of human rights and workers’ rights,” he maintained.

“If EU suspends GSP, our GDP will decrease. It will also harm the foreign investments and employment market. Therefore, EU will be responsible for negative impact”, said U Maung Maung.

“EU has been participating in Myanmar’s transition. The GSP withdrawal can affect its participation,” said U Naw Aung, Vice-Chair of Myanmar Indus-

tries Craft and Services Trade Unions Federation.

“EU needs to judge whether its GPS withdrawal is a good option to deal with disputes over Rakhine, Shan and Kachin States,” said U Naw Aung.

At present, EU delegations arrived in Myanmar and they are discussing with Civil Society Organizations including trade unions. Myanmar reinstated EU’s Generalised Scheme of Preferences from 19 July 2013. EU Commissioner for Trade mentioned on 5 October concerning sending of EU’s mission to Myanmar in order to consider trade sanctions. ■

Bilateral trade with Thailand worth \$2.39 billion in five months

THE value of trade between Myanmar and neighbouring country Thailand reached US\$2.39 billion from April to August of the past mini-budget period, comprising export worth \$1.23 billion and import valued \$1.15 billion, according to data released by the Ministry of Commerce.

Thailand tops on regional trade line-up with the largest trade value. Myanmar’s main export items are fishery products such as crab, fish and shrimp, as well as onions, sesame, dry tea leaves, coconut and turmeric, while consumer goods,

cosmetic machinery, food products, and agricultural equipment and trucks are imported into the country from Thailand.

Bilateral trade was registered at \$5 billion in the 2017-2018 FY, \$4.28 billion in the 2016-2017 FY, \$4.86 billion in the 2015-16

FY, \$5.7 billion in the 2014-2015 FY, \$5.6 billion in the 2013-2014 FY, \$4.68 billion in the 2012-2013 FY and \$4.5 billion in the 2011-2012 FY.

There are 77 existing Thailand-listed enterprises in Myanmar, with capitals estimated at \$3.96 billion. – GNLM ■

lay operated on October 2. This new route will meet the needs of business travelers, family visits and general tourism between Yangon and Guangzhou.

9 Air utilizes brand-new Boeing 737-800 aircraft, designed to accommodate 189 passengers. The low-fare price starts at US\$ 82 without tax to Yangon and US\$ 75 without tax to Guangzhou.

Presently, 9 Air has 16 Boeing 737-800, serving over 40 domestic routes in total. Additionally, the

fleet size of 9Air is expected to reach 20 aircraft by the end of 2018 and 80 aircraft by 2025.

After the launch of the Guangzhou-Mandalay, Guangzhou-Yangon routes in the second half of 2018, 9Air will start several other international routes including Guangzhou-Kalibo (Philippines), Guangzhou-Bangkok (Thailand), Guangzhou-Da Nang (Viet Nam) and Guangzhou to popular cities in Japan. — GNLM ■

Chinese State Councilor meets Philippine foreign, finance secretaries for closer cooperation

DAVAO (the Philippines) — Chinese State Councilor and Foreign Minister Wang Yi met with his Philippine counterpart Teodoro Locsin and Finance Secretary Carlos Dominguez in Davao City on Monday.

In the meeting with Locsin, Wang said that under the guidance of the leaders of the two countries, China-Philippines relations have maintained the momentum for development in

the past two years, which is in the interests of the two peoples.

China is willing to develop all-round cooperation and manage differences properly with the Philippines for a more stable, peaceful South China Sea, Wang said.

The Chinese side is also willing to closely work with the Philippine side to promote and deepen pragmatic cooperation in security, development, culture

and maritime affairs, so as to explore new broad prospect for China-Philippine relations, the Chinese State Councilor said.

For his part, Locsin said that his country is content with the ever-improving bilateral relations and the ever-strengthening bilateral cooperation with China.

The Philippine side is willing to continue to properly manage differences, push forward pragmatic maritime cooperation, and

actively participate in the Belt and Road Initiative, he said.

In a meeting between the Philippine economic management team led by Finance Secretary Dominguez and Wang, they discussed updates on the status of the economic cooperation agreement. Wang said the development of China-Philippine relations has provided favorable political guarantees for economic and trade cooperation. The

bilateral economic cooperation can expand to new areas, including projects of the Belt and Road Initiative, so as to benefit the two countries and their people. The Philippines is welcome to participate in the China International Import Expo (CIIE) which is slated to be held from Nov. 5 to 10 in Shanghai, and is willing to create better conditions to expand the Philippine exports to China, Wang noted.—Xinhua ■

Syrian opposition draws up 'road map' for constitution

ROME—The Syrian opposition on Monday presented a “road map” to peace, including steps to be taken ahead of an election and guidelines for a plan to write the country’s post-war constitution.

The document, drawn up by representatives of the opposition invited to Rome by the Catholic Sant’Egidio community, will be presented to key players in the conflict – from Russia to Turkey and the EU – over the next few weeks.

The leaders of Turkey, Russia, France and Germany on Saturday called for a political solution to the devastating seven-year civil war and a lasting ceasefire in the last major rebel-held bastion of Idlib.

Their statement called for a committee to be established to draft Syria’s post-war constitution before the end of the year, “paving the way for free and fair elections” in the war-torn

country.

A rival UN plan for a committee to write the constitution ran aground last week, with UN special envoy Staffan de Mistura saying Damascus rejected the UN having a role in the selection process.

The “road map”, presented Monday by the High Negotiations Committee (HNC), the main opposition force, as well as several minor groups, details the shape a new government and parliament could take.

It calls for the make-up of the committee to “reflect the composition of the country” and says all “arrangements/rules/law aiming at dissolving/obstructing/impeding the political activities of the opposition” must be scrapped.

The commission, within a nine-month timeframe, should not only prepare the constitution but also draft party and electoral law.—AFP ■

PM Modi discusses bilateral, regional and global issues with Japanese leaders

TOKYO—Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Monday met Japanese Foreign Minister Taro Kono and held productive, focused discussion on bilateral, regional and global issues.

Modi arrived in Japan on Saturday to attend the 13th India-Japan annual two-day summit which will seek to review the progress in ties and deepen strategic dimension of the bilateral relationship.

“Strengthening the strategic orientation of our relationship. Foreign Minister of Japan Taro Kono called on PM @narendramodi. Held productive and focused discussion on bilateral, regional and global issues,” Ministry of External Affairs spokesperson Raveesh Kumar tweeted.

Woman bomber wounds 9 in first Tunisia suicide attack since 2015

TUNIS, (Tunisia) —A woman suicide bomber blew herself up near police vehicles on a busy street in the centre of the Tunisian capital on Monday after a three-year break in such attacks, injuring at least nine people, the interior ministry said.

Ministry spokesman Sofiene Zaag told AFP that all but one of the casualties were police, after a strong explosion rocked the up-market Avenue Habib Bourguiba in Tunis.

Ambulances arrived swiftly at the scene, which was cordoned off by security forces. Shops lowered their shutters and cafes emptied as panic gripped passersby.

An AFP photographer saw the bomber’s body, apparently mostly intact, lying on the ground under one of the neatly-trimmed box trees that line the avenue.

The interior ministry, in a statement, identified the assailant as a 30-year-old woman with no known extremist affiliations, and there was no immediate claim of responsibility.

Shortly before the blast, a small group of demonstrators had held a protest in the avenue against the killing near Tunis last week of a teenager by a customs agent.

The attack was the first in

the Tunisian capital since November 24, 2015 when a suicide bombing killed 12 security agents on a bus for presidential guards. That attack was claimed by the so-called Islamic State jihadist group.

The Islamist party Ennahdha, the second largest party in parliament, condemned Monday’s “cowardly attack” and urged all Tunisians “to unite in confronting terrorism”, while reiterating its full support for “mili-

tary institutions and the police”.

- Islamic State attacks -

Since the 2011 uprising that toppled dictator Zine El Abidine Ben Ali, jihadist attacks in Tunisia have killed dozens of members of the security forces and foreign tourists.

In June 2015, 38 people were killed in a shooting rampage at the coastal resort of Sousse which targeted tourists, while an attack in March that year on the Na-

tional Bardo Museum in Tunis left 22 people dead, most of them tourists.

The terror attacks claimed by the Islamic State jihadist group decimated Tunisia’s crucial tourism sector, which made up seven percent of gross domestic product.

The country has been under a state of emergency since the November 2015 attack on the bus.

The state of emergency was extended earlier this month until

November 6, amid a tense political climate ahead of legislative and presidential elections planned for next year.

In March 2016, dozens of jihadists who infiltrated from neighbouring Libya assaulted security posts in the southern region of Ben Guerdane in what Tunisian authorities said was an aborted attempt to declare an “emirate”.

The attack, which went unclaimed, left 20 dead among security forces and civilians.

Calm over the past two years has led to a rebound in the tourism industry, with more than six million foreign travellers visiting Tunisia in the first nine months of 2018, according to government data.

Arrivals rose 16.9 percent to 6.3 million in the nine months to the end of September, surpassing the number for the whole of 2014.

Tourism revenues in the first nine months of 2018 totalled just over 1 billion euros (\$1.2 billion), a rise of 27.6 percent year-on-year.

Tourism Minister Selma El-loumi Rekik told AFP in May that she expected total arrivals to exceed eight million in 2018, higher than the seven million recorded in 2010, a benchmark year for Tunisian tourism.—AFP ■

Taking positive stance key to solving confiscated farmland issue

THE majority of the farmers in Myanmar are engaging in agriculture and small scale livestock breeding on small plots of lands. As the matter of land use and stability of land use rights of small plot holders and landless farmers is a priority work, 14 main work processes were earmarked to be established in the agriculture policy and agriculture development strategy.

The national land use council was formed in order to implement the aims, guidelines and basic principles of the national land use policy and to implement laws related to it.

The Union Government is stepping up efforts for solving the confiscated farmland issue considering that it is also related to keeping a good image for the country.

Land management in Myanmar faces limitations and challenges including land disputes after settling by the government.

To overcome the challenges and to implement the aims of national land use policy, laws related to land management are being reviewed.

Development of the agricultural sector is important for the development of our country because the majority of the country's population relies upon it. Technology and investment required for the development of the agricultural sector has been provided by the Union Government in the best possible ways.

To strengthen the agricultural sector, for the farmers to benefit from the work they have done, for the farmers and their future generations to use the land that they have managed and work on, the 2012 farmland law and 2012 vacant, fallow and virgin land management law have been amended accordingly.

The incumbent Union Government released a total of 63,417 acres of confiscated farmlands and 13,091 acres were returned to the farmers while 50,326 acres were returned to relevant ministries, states/regions. Assessments are being carried out to return the remaining confiscated lands to farmers as soon as possible.

President U Win Myint said during his trip to Ayeyawady Region on 28 October that action would be taken against any personnel or officials who caused hindrances to the work of the relevant committees in assessing, reviewing and returning confiscated lands to the farmers and permitting them to work on these lands.

Meanwhile, he urged authorities to determine compensation and reparations fairly as well as to reflect on the situation on the ground.

We would like to call on all stakeholders including farmers in this matter to take a positive stance towards compromise for the land confiscation issue and to accept a win-win situation for all.

Fairness and equality are essential ingredients for a successful society and an essential principle of democracy.

The Role of University of Yangon in the NIHED for Transforming Higher Education in Myanmar

THE year 2020 will be the centennial milestone of the University of Yangon (UY) and it is poised to re-establish itself as Myanmar's Flagship University by restructuring into faculty system. The reforms will include enhancing university management, developing effective QA Framework, upgrading the Universities Research Center and channeling the Center with partner Universities both local and international in order to achieve qualified research papers for publication. Since political transition took place in Myanmar in 2011, the UY is in the process of revitalization efforts and has been participating in higher education development programmes. Among these programmes, UY involvement in the National Institute for Higher Education Development (NIHED), which is one of the drivers of higher education reform, is a remarkable one.

Firstly, let me explain about the NIHED. To strengthen and support the management of universities in Myanmar, the NIHED pilot programme was introduced in November 2017 in line with National Education Policy Commission (NEPC). The NIHED aims to provide in-service professional development training and to undertake research on the issues of management and governance in the higher education sector. As a first activity of the pilot programme, the British Council and Irrawaddy Policy Exchange (IPE) organized series of workshop on "Transforming Higher Education in Myanmar" in collaboration with the Ministry of Education. The aim of this programme is to implement a group institutional project and to enhance a personal leadership-learning portfolio. Senior management team of eleven universities participated in this programme.

These universities are University of Yangon, Yangon Technological University, Medical University 1, Institute of Economics, Sitwwe University, Myit Kyi Na University, Taunggyi University, Mandalay University, Mandalay Technological University, Yezin Agricultural University and Yangon Institute of Education. Under this programme, the first work-

shop on "Strategic leadership and management" was held from 21st-23rd November 2017 at Pin Long Hall, UY with the aim to enhance the leadership style and administrative skills. The attendees were the senior trainees such as Rectors, Pro-rectors, Professors, senior academics and senior administrative officers from eleven Universities of Myanmar. International experts from Institute of Education, University College of London (UCL), moderated the workshop sessions.

Besides participating in workshops and designing the project to be completely implemented in October, the UY, together with other 11 Universities take part in Live Webinar on 'Learning Technologies in Higher Education'. The Live Webinar is lived by Institute of Education, UCL, to all eleven universities as a network communication and engagement. It has taken place on the 20th and 26th April, 21st August 2018. This is a great opportunity for UY to participate in the Webinar as an online meeting held via the Internet and communicate with UCL, to listen the lectures and to give feed back of our own institutional project.

The second workshop was held from 19th to 22nd February 2018. It was held with two sessions namely "Strategic leadership and management" and "Leading and managing research". The UY participated in developing leadership and management competence, coaching and mentoring, role of research for universities, role of

ethics in research. The workshop ended with the preparation of upcoming National Education Conference to be held in June 2018. The third workshop was held from 25th to 27th 2018. It was held with two sessions namely "Leading and managing teaching quality" and "Leading and managing curriculum design". The fourth workshop was held from 15th to 17th October, followed by National Education Conference from 19th to 20th October 2018 at Diamond Jubilee Hall. All eleven universities gave presentations on the outcomes of their institutional projects.

As each participating University is required to design a project, the UY designed a project on "Developing Training on Research Management". The aim of choosing this topic is to draft research strategy for the University, to provide systematic, ongoing research support for UY staff and students to build their own research capacity and attract research grants. It also aims to achieve a significant increase in the number of domestic and international research grants and domestic and international research publications. The process of designing the project has been spearheaded by the University of Yangon Research team and builds on the experience of a number of previous efforts. The NIHED trainers of UY have spearheaded the methodology of designing the project. The meeting headed by the Rector with Heads of all Departments was held at Council Chamber of UY to find out the

strength and challenges in managing research. Moreover, in order to improve the research management skills for the Processors and Associate professors who are the key in transforming the University autonomy, the NIHED trainers of UY conducted a workshop on "Training on Research Management" on 5th October, 2018 at the Science Hall, UY. Forty staffs, two from each twenty Departments participated the workshop. The workshop was held with three sessions and the first session highlighted "Understanding the role of Adult Learners". The second session explained about "Leadership Style" and the third session focused on "Research Management". The workshop ended with findings from their experience in doing and managing research. The challenges in managing research can be explored based on the discussion at the meeting of Heads of Department as well as the findings from the workshop. These challenges are such as limited funding for research, limited knowledge on research procedure, lack of time and inspiration, weak in research methodology and no definite ethics review committee. In order to overcome these challenges, the action plan for research management of UY is planned to be implemented not later than 2020 as follows:-

- University will form University Research Ethics Committee and develop Ethical Research Policies to ensure that ethical standards are upheld.
- The University will develop a list of priority themes and research clusters at UY, which are in line with government priorities, in consultation with the community and professional fields.
- The most active and productive researchers at UY will form research groups based on priority themes to coordinate and conduct research.
- The Centers for University Research (CUR) will coordinate and publicize research activities undertaken by UY faculty and students and liaise with domestic and international partners in building research capacity, will attract external research funding and promoting collaborative research projects, will act as a link to industry and coordinator of internships and other tools of experiential learning for students and faculty; to develop effective policies and practices to support and reward international, peer-reviewed publications of academic staff; to introduce research mentoring schemes between senior and junior academic staff, and improve mentoring of students, including through international co-operation.

Let me highlight how the senior trainers from UY benefit by participating the NIHED pilot programme. The programme includes four workshops, two nation-

al education conferences, Webinar lectures and institution-based project. Four workshops namely (1) Strategic leadership and management (2) leading and managing research, (3) leading and managing teaching quality (4) leading and managing curriculum design are beneficial for eleven participating universities in the process of transforming higher education. The workshops provide different models in leadership style such as assimilating, converging, accommodating styles and the role of coaching, facilitating, and mentoring in managing the University. In the area of research, it is useful for the participants to learn how to balance teaching and research priorities, what are the elements of good research proposal and how the role of ethics is important in doing research. The workshops also contribute to design and review curriculum for research-based teaching. Two national education conferences, which were held in June 2018 and October 2018, also help us to understand the clear role of National Education Policy Commission, National Accreditation and Quality Assurance Committee, Rectors Committee and National Curriculum Committee in transforming higher education. The participants also have opportunity to learn the importance of equity in higher education from the international perspectives. The two conferences not only provide us to discuss the challenges faced by many universities but also aid to prepare for the challenges and reforms when autonomy will be granted in the future. The most interesting programme of the NIHED is the institutional-based project. Each participating university is required to complete a project to make a significant improvement in a priority area for itself. As UY is planned to become a research-oriented and research-based teaching University, it is expected that a project on "Developing Training on Research Management" will contribute in drafting a clear research strategy that will fulfill the needs of UY research management in transforming higher education.

Turkey shells US-backed Kurdish militia positions in Syria: state media

ISTANBUL (Turkey) — Turkey's military on Sunday fired artillery shells at a Kurdish militia in Syria that is backed by the United States but deemed a terrorist group by Ankara, the state-run Anadolu news agency reported.

The shelling targeted YPG positions on the eastern bank of the Euphrates River in northern Syria, Anadolu said.

Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan has repeatedly threatened to launch a new offensive in Syria east of the Euphrates, and on Friday said he was giving the YPG a "final warning".

Anadolu reported that the strikes, which hit a hill near the Zur Maghar village across the Euphrates from the city of Jarablus in the Aleppo province, were in response to fire from the area.

The shelling comes a day after Erdogan hosted a summit in Istanbul on the Syrian conflict with the leaders of Russia, France and Germany.

The YPG, which holds swathes of northern and north-eastern Syria, forms the backbone of the Syrian Democratic Forces (SDF), the Kurdish-Arab alliance that has received extensive American support in the

fight against the Islamic State group in the war-torn country.

However Ankara is bitterly opposed to the YPG, regarding it as an extension of the Kurdistan Workers' Party (PKK), which has waged a deadly insurgency in Turkey since 1984. The PKK is designated as a terror group by Turkey and its Western allies.

Washington's support of the YPG remains a major point of contention between the US and Turkey, and a large-scale offen-

sive east of the Euphrates could aggravate already tense relations between the NATO allies.

Turkey has also repeatedly threatened an attack on the YPG-controlled Syrian city of Manbij, where US troops are deployed.

To ease tensions, Washington and Ankara agreed to have troops conduct coordinated patrols around the city, and such a patrol went ahead on Sunday, Turkish armed forces said.

Earlier this year, Turkey launched operation "Olive Branch" in Syria west of the Euphrates, successfully ousting YPG forces from their enclave in Afrin.

Ankara has long opposed the YPG controlling a continuous stretch of territory on its border up to Iraq, fearing the creation of an autonomous region or even independent entity that could embolden Turkey's own Kurds. —AFP ■

Boko Haram jihadists attack military base in NE Nigeria

ABUJA (Nigeria) — Boko Haram jihadists launched a large assault on a military base in Nigeria's remote northeast region and killed one soldier, defence officials said on Sunday.

The attack on 145 Battalion in Gashigar, Borno State, began on Saturday and continued into early Sunday morning, said Nigerian air force spokesman Ibikunle Daramola.

"BHTs (Boko Haram terrorists) in 13 gun trucks...advanced towards the camp from two different directions," Daramola said in a statement.

Nigerian troops supported by helicopters "forced the Boko Haram terrorists to retreat from the camp," Daramola said.

"One soldier was killed in action while four others were wounded," said the Nigerian army in a statement posted on its official Twitter account.

The army repelled an assault on Gashigar in September by jihadists in trucks mounted with anti-aircraft guns.

There have been at least nine military base attacks since July, mostly in the northern part of Borno state, near the shores of Lake Chad.

Boko Haram has in recent months intensified attacks on military bases in Borno and nearby Yobe state, undermining repeated claims by the military that they have the upper hand.

Scores of soldiers have been killed, injured or missing in attacks but the military has repeatedly denied or played down losses to the jihadists.

More than 27,000 people have been killed in northeast Nigeria since the Boko Haram insurgency began in 2009, while nearly two million others remain homeless.—AFP ■

Israel minister makes history at UAE judo tourney

JERUSALEM — An Israeli minister attending a judo tournament in the UAE said on Sunday she hoped to hear her national anthem played at the event, in another milestone towards rapprochement with the Arab world.

Culture and Sports Minister Miri Regev's presence in the United Arab Emirates capital Abu Dhabi marked the first time a minister from Israel attended a sports event in the Gulf, Israeli

officials said. It is also the first time an Israeli delegation participates there under its national flag, after the International Judo Federation warned UAE organisers they would cancel the competition unless all athletes were allowed to participate on an equal footing.

Last year, tournament organisers in Abu Dhabi banned the flag and national anthem of Israel, which has no diplomatic relations with Gulf states.

"I'm very proud to be here in Abu Dhabi representing Israel along with the judo team and our flag," Regev wrote on her Facebook page.

"I hope we win a gold medal and experience the thrilling moment of playing Hatikvah in the Abu Dhabi arena," she said, referring to Israel's national anthem.

Three Israeli judokas won bronze medals on Saturday, the first day of the Abu Dhabi Grand

Slam, with Regev given the honour of awarding the medals for one of the categories. Regev's trip to the UAE, which began on Thursday, coincided with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's visit to neighbouring Oman, the first for an Israeli leader since 1996. On the same day, an Israeli gymnastics delegation was in Qatar for the beginning of the world championships being held in Doha.—AFP ■

IS repels US-backed forces from east Syria holdout: monitor

BEIRUT (Lebanon) — The Islamic State group has ousted a US-backed coalition of Kurdish and Arab forces from its holdout in eastern Syria, killing dozens of fighters, a monitoring group said on Sunday.

A Syrian Democratic Forces commander, asking not to be named, confirmed the SDF retreat from the Hajin pocket near

the Iraqi border seven weeks into an offensive.

The SDF, who are backed by air strikes of the US-led coalition, launched its campaign to retake the IS holdout on 10 September.

But they have faced a fierce fightback from the jihadists, including under the cover of sandstorms, the Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights

says. "In counterattacks since Friday to Sunday dawn, IS has taken back all positions to which the SDF had advanced inside the Hajin pocket," the monitoring group's chief Rami Abdel Rahman said.

The Observatory reported 72 SDF fighters killed, as IS took advantage of the storm that hampered coalition air cover and dis-

patched suicide bombers as part of their fightback.

The SDF commander told AFP that his forces had faced a "strong dust storm" and lacked local knowledge of the terrain.

Unlike IS, "our forces don't know the area and can't move around in conditions of zero visibility," he said. "Military reinforcements and heavy weapons have

been sent to the front and some units will be replaced by more experienced ones," the commander said. "We will launch a new military campaign as soon as those reinforcements have arrived," he said. More than 300 SDF fighters and around 500 IS jihadists have been killed in the past seven weeks of fighting, the Observatory says.—AFP ■

Britain faces pre-Brexit budget battle

LONDON, (United Kingdom) — Britain's finance minister will try to navigate a political minefield on Monday when he unveils a budget that could be scuppered by the final terms of Brexit next year.

Philip Hammond's appearance in parliament was moved forward a month to give lawmakers a chance to consider it quickly and then focus on legislation needed to get Britain safely out of the European Union in March.

London and Brussels remain locked in negotiations and it is still uncertain whether Prime Minister Theresa May can get an eventual deal with the EU backed by lawmakers.

The spending plan that emerges from Hammond's red briefcase will be studied warily by May's ruling coalition partners from Northern Ireland's Democratic Unionist Party.

The small group is a king-maker that could yet sink both the draft agreement with Brussels and May's government in

protest over the emerging outlines of a Brexit deal.

This level of uncertainty forced Hammond to admit on Sunday that "frankly, we'd need to have a new budget that sets out a different strategy" should negotiations fail to salvage an agreement between all sides.

He also pledged to keep "fiscal buffers" in place to handle any scenario.

But Hammond argues that a workable solution is both possible and likely to bring a "Brexit dividend" that gives a boost to lagging economic growth.

"Of course we can never

know until we have actually done the deal, but everything tells me that it is very much in the interest not only of the UK but also of the EU," he told the BBC on Sunday.

"Everything I hear tells me that the 27 member states want a deal done with the UK." —AFP ■

Poison gas: World War I's weapon of terror

PARIS (France) — On 22 April, 1915, a greenish fog drifted over the battlefield north of Ypres in Belgium, choking to death some 5,000 French soldiers and heralding a new type of terror on the Western Front.

World War I saw the first widespread combat use of modern chemical weapons, starting with the 168 tons of chlorine released by the Germans over the trenches near Ypres.

Officers hoped the vomiting, suffocation and burns caused by poison gases would force troops to abandon positions in what quickly became a standoff between German and allied forces.

They also had a deep psychological impact, forcing soldiers to keep masks at the ready for fear of falling victim to a silent killer.

"Gas masks and their grotesque appearance became the ultimate symbol of a man turned into a mechanised, dehumanised phantom by modern warfare," said Doran Cart, a curator at the National World War I Museum in Kansas City, Missouri.

"That had a huge impact on civilians," he added.

The Germans' use of chlo-

rine prompted a chemical arms race in which scientists and military leaders worked hand-in-hand to develop more lethal weapons.

French researchers soon developed phosgene, with a more subtle "mouldy hay" odour that was harder to detect and the ability to cause suffocation hours after being inhaled.

It was quickly copied by the Germans as both sides sought agents which would seep into trenches and bunkers.

'Fighting for breath'

But the most infamous — and deadliest — was mustard gas, in reality an oily vapour first used by the Germans in July 1917, again near Ypres.

Known as the "King of Battle Gases", it acted by contact instead of having to be inhaled, getting through clothing to cause severe burns.

"It didn't always kill but the burns impaired people for a long period of time and required a very long nursing," said Edward Spiers, a professor of strategic studies at Leeds University in Britain.

"It slowed everything down. People had to try to de-

contaminate whole areas" before attempting to get through it, said Spiers, author of "A History of Chemical and Biological Weapons".

Overall an estimated 90,000 people were killed by gas attacks and a further 1.2 million injured, sometimes when the poisonous clouds released by artillery shells drifted back into an attacker's lines.

But despite the relatively small number of deaths compared with the 9.7 million soldiers killed in total during the war, the fear and suffering caused by chemical arms became symbols of a harrowing new era in modern warfare.

"I wish those people who talk about going on with this war whatever it costs could see the soldiers suffering from mustard gas poisoning," the British nurse Vera Brittain wrote in her memoir "Testament of Youth".

"Great mustard-coloured blisters, blind eyes, all sticky and stuck together, always fighting for breath, with voices a mere whisper, saying that their throats are closing and they know they will choke", she wrote.

'Psychological scar'

After the war ended officials quickly pushed to outlaw chemical weapons in war, signing the Geneva protocol in 1925, which nonetheless failed to set up a system for monitoring or punishing their use.

"The use of such weapons left a psychological scar in ways that conventional weapons did not," Spiers said.

"In most societies that used them the use of chemical warfare was vilified, but it was never quite removed from the world's arsenal," Spiers added.

As soon as 1926, French and Spanish forces would employ them against Moroccan rebels in the Rif Mountains.

"It truly is, and this hasn't changed since World War I, a terror weapon. It creates terror," Cart said.

But even though they are still used today — Syrian President Bashar al-Assad has been accused of repeatedly gassing rebels and civilians in his war-torn country — only in the first World War were poison gases used on a large scale in combat.

"What's occurring today is not primarily military but used against civilians," Cart said. — AFP ■

Merkel's party suffers heavy losses in key regional election: exit poll

FRANKFURT AM MAIN — German Chancellor Angela Merkel's Christian Democratic Union (CDU) party suffered heavy losses in Sunday's regional election in Hesse state, according to an exit poll.

The CDU remained the largest party, but lost around 10 percentage points to score 28 per cent of the vote, public broadcaster ARD reported, while junior federal government partners the Social Democrats (SPD) shed almost 11 points to land on just 20 per cent. — AFP ■

Eiffel Tower to go dark for Pittsburgh victims

PARIS (France) — The Eiffel Tower will go dark at midnight on Sunday "to honour victims of the anti-Semitic attack" in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, Paris Mayor Anne Hidalgo said on Twitter.

"I express my support for the Jewish community and all of Pittsburgh's inhabitants," she added.

The rampage on Saturday took the lives of 11 people at the Tree of Life synagogue in Pittsburgh's predominantly Jewish Squirrel Hill neighbourhood.

Robert Bowers, 46, has been charged in the shooting.

The lights on the iconic Paris landmark, one of the world's best-known and most-visited monuments, has been switched off several times in the past following terror attacks around the world. — AFP ■

Thai owner of Leicester City was killed in helicopter crash: club

LONDON (United Kingdom) — Leicester City's Thai boss Vichai Srivaddhanaprabha was killed along with four other people when his helicopter crashed shortly after take-off just outside the team's stadium, the club confirmed on Sunday.

"It is with the deepest regret and a collective broken heart that we confirm our chairman, Vichai Srivaddhanaprabha, was among those to have tragically lost their lives on Saturday evening when a helicopter carrying him and four other people crashed outside King Power Stadium," the club said in a statement. — AFP ■

Indonesian Lion Air plane crashes into sea with 189 passengers, crew

JAKARTA, (Indonesia) — A brand new Indonesian Lion Air plane carrying 189 passengers and crew crashed into the sea Monday, officials said, moments after it had asked to be allowed to return to Jakarta. The Boeing-737 MAX, which went into service just months ago, vanished from radar 13 minutes after taking off from the Indonesian capital, plunging into the Java Sea. Video footage apparently filmed at the scene of the crash showed a slick of fuel on the surface of the water.

Disaster agency spokesman Sutopo Purwo Nugroho tweeted pictures of debris, including what appeared to be an emergency slide and various parts of a smashed mobile phone. Authorities were still searching for the remains of the plane, which lost contact with air traffic control around 6.30 am (2330 GMT), en route to Pangkal Pinang city, a jumping off point for beach-and-sun seeking tourists on nearby Belitung island. “The plane crashed into water about 30 to 40 metres deep,” Search and Rescue Agency spokesman Yusuf Latif told AFP. Images filmed at Pangkal Pinang’s main airport showed families of passengers crying,

talking frantically on their mobiles phone and hugging each other. Some were heard saying “Ya Allah” or “Oh God”.

Indonesia’s National Transportation Safety Committee (NTSC) said there were 178 adult passengers, one child, two infants, two pilots and six cabin crew on board flight JT 610.

The transport ministry had initially said there was a total of 188 people on board. The finance ministry said around 20 of its employees were on the plane. It was not immediately clear if any foreigners were on the downed plane, which Lion said was a new, airworthy plane that had only gone into service in August. The pilot and co-pilot had more than 11,000 hours of flying time between them, it added. “Lion Air is very concerned about this incident and will work with relevant agencies and all parties,” said spokesman Danang Mandala Prihantoro. The Flightradar website tracked the plane and showed it looping south on take-off and then heading north before the flight path ended abruptly over the Java Sea, not far from the coast.—AFP ■

Bangladesh opposition leader handed new jail term as supporters cry foul

DHAKA (Bangladesh) — Bangladesh’s imprisoned opposition leader Khaleda Zia was handed another seven years in prison Monday on corruption charges her supporters say are politically motivated to prevent her running in a general election.

Zia, arch-rival of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, is already behind bars after being handed a five-year term in February on separate embezzlement charges.

That verdict triggered clashes between police and thousands of loyalists from the main opposition Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP), which Zia still leads from prison.

There was a small demonstration outside BNP headquarters Monday in the capital Dhaka, but the opposition vowed nationwide marches on Tuesday to protest against the verdict.

In Zia’s latest trial, Judge Mohammad Akhtaruzzaman found the 73-year-old guilty of abuse of power and embezzling 31.5 million taka (\$375,000) destined for a charitable fund.

The verdict was handed down in a temporary courtroom inside Dhaka Central Jail where Zia — who has been hospitalised for poor health — is the only inmate.

Her lawyers, who were also absent during the verdict, have consistently described the fast-track trial as “political vengeance” by Hasina, who has been accused of stifling her opponents.

“The people will never accept this judgement,” BNP sec-

retary general Fakhru Islam Alamgir told reporters.

The latest conviction is expected to further impede Zia’s chances of challenging her erstwhile ally Hasina in polls slated for December.

Zia boycotted the 2014 general election which saw Hasina returned to power.

The BNP had been hoping a higher court would overturn Zia’s earlier sentence, setting her free and paving the way for the veteran opposition leader to run against Hasina.

But the latest verdict throws up more hurdles for the opposition, which says 4,000 of its supporters have been arrested since September in a pre-election crackdown.

“This judgement is to keep her out of the election,” said Alamgir.

Family feud

Prosecutor Khurshid A. Khan said the latest charges against Zia dated back to 2005, during her second term as prime minister of the Muslim-majority democracy of 160 million.

“We finally got justice, despite some delay,” he told AFP.

Zia entered politics in the mid-1980s after her husband, a former military dictator, was assassinated in an abortive coup.

She faces dozens of separate charges related to violence and corruption that her lawyers insist are baseless.

Zia says the charges are designed to keep her family out of politics.—AFP ■

Thailand’s biggest party elects leaders as it gears up for election

BANGKOK, (Thailand) — The party of Thailand’s former premier — who was toppled by the military — chose its leaders on Sunday and said it is “confident of success” ahead of a much-anticipated election promised for February.

Pheu Thai, which backed ousted premier Yingluck Shinawatra, voted in stalwart Viroj Pao-in as party leader; members said in a briefing to the media.

Viroj has “worked hard during the party’s difficult times”, said Pheu Thai stal-

wart Sudarat Keyuraphan, who was made head of the strategic committee.

The junta, which seized power and toppled Yingluck’s administration in a coup in 2014, has postponed elections multiple times since taking over but has insisted the vote will now go ahead in February.

Parties are still under a partial political ban, which bars them from campaigning or holding rallies. It remains to be seen whether Pheu Thai can capitalise on previous suc-

cesses at the ballot without the star power of Yingluck and her older brother Thaksin, who was himself pushed out in a military takeover in 2006.

The siblings live in self-exile to avoid what they say are politically motivated court charges.

The wealthy and powerful Shinawatra clan has won every election since 2001 through populist platforms and welfare schemes that have angered Bangkok’s military-aligned elite. But large sections of so-

ciety have grown weary of military rule and endemic inequality while protests have bubbled up in recent months calling for a return to democracy. “People vote for us not because of the

party’s name or how we look like but... (but) because we can fix their problems,” Sudarat said. “So we are confident about the success in the upcoming elections.” —AFP ■

Budapest's underwater wonderland draws divers from far and wide

BUDAPEST (Hungary) — Not every diver's dream is to watch shimmering shoals of fish swim through coral reefs in dazzlingly blue seas.

For Laura Tuominen, the ultimate diving experience is not to be found in the Red Sea or the Caribbean, but in a labyrinth of spectacular underwater caves beneath the pavements of Budapest.

The Hungarian capital is already famous worldwide for its steaming hot spas and thermal baths.

But the underwater Janos Molnar cave system, named after the Hungarian pharmacist who discovered it in the 19th century, has become a hot tip for diving aficionados.

Around seven kilometres (4.4 miles) in length and previously open only to scientific expeditions, the cave became accessible to the public — that is, qualified divers — when a diving centre was opened here in 2015. “We are under Budapest! It's amazing!” shouts Tuominen, a 39-year-old Finnish anaesthesiologist and passionate amateur diver, as she jumps into the warm waters from a platform mounted in the narrow space at the bottom of the entrance tunnel.

She is one of a group of hobby divers and speleologists, wearing dry suits and carrying double cylinders of compressed gas on their backs, who then descend into the gloomy

waters, the light from their torches gradually fading out of view.

The group is accompanied by a diving centre staff member who directs them with the help of “guideline” cords through the maze of narrow passageways and cavernous cathedral-like chambers.

'Very rare' urban setting

“It's the only underwater cave in Budapest open to divers. Speleology is a niche market. It doesn't have mass appeal. And our urban location makes us special. It's very, very rare,” says Attila Hosszu, who has run the centre since it opened. The advantage of being underneath a city is that “you don't have to haul your equipment up a mountain or down a deep valley to get here,” Hosszu adds.

The entrance to the centre is a discreet metal door near one of Budapest's main boulevards and just a block away from the Danube river that separates the city's two halves, Buda and Pest.

According to the diving centre's website, the cave was formed many millennia ago, when the geological fault line on which Budapest is situated cracked. The ascending thermal water ate into the rock to create caves close to the surface. “You can see amazing stalactites and stalagmites in Mexico. But you have to travel for days

to get there. Here, you just walk in and dive, it's very exciting,” says 38-year-old Russian Irina Litvinenko after getting off the tram on her way to the centre.

Outside on the streets, the autumn wind is blustery. But inside the centre, the air is still warm and humid, making the divers sweat as they get their equipment ready.

Explorations from the 1950s began to reveal the full extent of submerged canyons, halls and passageways. But until the diving centre opened three years ago, only scientists were permitted entry to explore or collect samples for laboratory examinations.

'Silence is precious'

Zoltan Bauer, who has been guiding groups through the cave since 2015, says visitors come mostly for the stunning underwater landscapes.

“There are only a few creatures in the cave,” the 29-year-old says, referring mainly to tiny crustaceans. “But what I really like is the shape of it, how it looks, its beautiful formations.”

Litvinenko, a Cyprus-based finance worker, is similarly entranced.

“Usually, cave diving is about going in and out of a tunnel. But this is like a Swiss cheese, you go down one hole and come back through another,” she enthuses. “For me, it's super-relaxing. In this technological world, silence is

precious.”

The water's balmy temperature of 20-27 degrees Celsius (68-80 degrees Fahrenheit) year round is another draw, says Marton Illes, a 37-year-old IT developer from Budapest, who lives nearby.

“This is my 15th dive here, but I'm just scratching the surface. There's so much to see down there, so many passages,” says the part-time diving instructor.

To preserve the cave's unique ecosystem, the daily number of divers is limited to 30. It costs 60 to 140 euros (\$68 to \$159) depending on the depth of the dive — maximum 90 metres (300 feet). The depth also determines the time limit, currently 150 minutes, but no-limit dives may be coming soon. Geologists, chemists, biologists, and maintenance engineers repairing safety ropes rub shoulders with tourists in the tunnel before a dive.—AFP ■

EU air quality slowly improving but still deadly: report

BRUSSELS (Belgium) — Air pollution is slowly easing in EU countries but still causes nearly half a million early deaths each year, the European Environment Agency (EEA) said in its annual report published on Monday.

Although pollution levels dropped slightly in 2015, they remain far higher than standards set by both the European Union and the World Health Organization, the report said.

The findings come just weeks after an EU watchdog said most member states fail to meet the bloc's air quality targets, warning that the toll on health in eastern European countries was even worse than in China and India.

The EEA said on Monday that exposure to fine pollution particles known as PM2.5 was responsible for around 391,000 premature deaths in the 28-nation bloc in 2015.

The report also found that 76,000 early deaths were linked to nitrogen dioxide and some 16,400 to ground-level ozone in

EU countries in the same year.

Fine pollution particles have been linked to respiratory illnesses and heart problems, with PM2.5, the smallest, posing the greatest health risks as they can penetrate deep into the lungs.

The EEA said a wider assessment included in the report found that early deaths each year due to PM 2.5 have been cut “by about half a million” since 1990.

It said this reduction was due to European air quality policies and local measures “which have led, for example, to cleaner cars, industry and energy production”.

“Air pollution is an invisible killer and we have to intensify efforts to address its causes,” said Hans Bruyninckx, the agency's executive director. The mayors of Paris and Brussels recently called for Europe to hold an annual car-free day in a bid to ease air pollution, having held a vehicle-free day in their own cities in September.—AFP ■

In the fast lane: Female motortaxi drivers on the rise in Bangkok

BANGKOK (Thailand) — Hair pulled back tightly as she lounges on her red scooter, Ar is a rare sight among the male-dominated ranks of Bangkok's motortaxi riders plying their trade on the Thai capital's treacherous roads.

A veteran of seven years who works in the bustling On Nut district, Ar is among the thousands of women drawn to the work as gender roles in Thailand evolve, attracted by the flexible hours, decent wages, and a sense of autonomy.

She welcomes the changes as offering a chance for women to gain more independence.

"I am glad there are more opportunities for women to become 'motorsai'," she said, referring to the road warriors whose distinctive orange jackets line the streets of Bangkok.

"A new generation of women now have to be tough and brave."

Although no official figures are available, observers say more women are choosing to brave the risky traffic-logged roads and discrimination for the flexible work schedule, which allows them ownership over their lives.

Chaloem Changtongmadun, president of Thailand's Motorcycle Taxi Association, said that working as a motorsai offered women a level of freedom not available in offices, shops or factories.

"Women don't find the work convenient when they become pregnant, take maternity leave or visit their hometown," he told AFP.

"They feel a closer connection with their families than when they worked in companies."

He believes that women today make up roughly 30 per cent

of Bangkok's 98,000 registered drivers although others say the numbers are probably lower.

In many parts of the Thai workforce gender expectations are still at play, with women typically filling service industry jobs and clerical positions.

"Thailand still has very blatant gender discrimination," said Kyoko Kusakabe, a professor at Bangkok's Asian Institute of Technology where she studies women's employment in the informal economy.

That is in spite of women shouldering many of the family responsibilities, especially in times of crisis, Kusakabe said.

Women are more likely to take up low-paid work in the informal economy while men "stay unemployed to look for a better job", she explained.

'Now things have changed'

Chaloem also attributes the increase in recent years to the struggling economy, which has been under pressure since a military junta took over in 2014.

Thailand's ever-shifting political landscape — where courts and coups have undercut civilian rule since 2006 — has hampered growth in what has been dubbed a "lost decade".

"Many people lost their jobs or couldn't make enough money to take care of themselves and their family," Chaloem told AFP.

Thailand also has one of the highest numbers of road deaths in the world, and Bangkok's motortaxi drivers embrace a life on the edge to provide a transport lifeline, weaving skillfully between long lines of cars.

As the industry has become more regulated, the drivers are

now less vulnerable to abuse from shadowy mafias demanding monthly payments.

Mototaxi queues — known as "wins" — also function in a more democratic fashion, like holding elections of leaders and allowing members of a queue to vote on certain decisions.

However, most of the women still require the support of a male relative in order to join a line, where there is usually a lot of competition.

Waiting for her turn on a shady Bangkok street in the Ari neighbourhood, Paveena — who goes by the nickname Yaya — says she could only secure her position because her brother vouched for her.

"My brother asked the win owner if I could borrow one of their (orange vests) so I could make more money," 36-year-old Yaya told AFP, explaining the second job was needed to support her family after the death of her mother four years ago.

Today, she earns about 1,200 baht (US\$37) for a full day's work — a relatively high income compared to Thailand's daily minimum wage of 330 baht.

Being able to make her own schedule also gave her the freedom to juggle her other job of selling school stationery.

Yaya said leaving a life of routine to buzz through the streets even helped her deal with her grief.

"Driving helped me get through the loss of my mother because I didn't have to think so much... I just drove," Yaya said.

Buayloy Suphasorn, 53, started 17 years ago and is considered a pioneer as one of the first female drivers on her win. —AFP ■

Rock star reception as Harry and Meghan start last leg of Pacific tour

WELLINGTON (New Zealand) — Prince Harry and Meghan arrived in Wellington on Sunday to a traditional Maori welcome, an official reception disrupted by a fire alarm and a rock star reception during a public walkabout.

The Duke and Duchess of Sussex are on the last leg of a 16-day, four-nation tour which was timed to coincide with the 2018 Invictus Games in Sydney.

They flew in from Sydney on a Royal New Zealand Air Force flight carrying the Kiwi team who took part in the Games, an Olympic style sporting event for wounded soldiers that Prince Harry helped found.

The royals held hands as they left the aircraft where they were greeted by Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern and mingled with the Invictus athletes before heading to a reception at the residence of the Governor-General of New Zealand Patsy Reddy.

The visibly pregnant duchess, with her hair in a bun, was wearing a black dress by ASOS Maternity and a calf-length brown chequered coat by Karen Walker, having changed during the three-hour flight from the burgundy dress she wore when boarding in Sydney.

They were welcomed to Government House with a traditional haka and performed a hongi greeting with indigenous Maori elders, in which they pressed noses together.

After visiting a newly unveiled UK War Memorial and laying a wreath at the tomb of the unknown soldier the royals received an excited reception as they went on a walkabout among thousands of fans, many scream-

ing and with some draped in Union Jack flags and others wearing an array of tiaras.

There were tears and applause as the royal couple were showered with gifts, including a New Zealand 'Buzzy Bee' toy, which Harry held aloft to the delight of the crowd.

"I can't believe this has happened, I can't believe that I met the royals," said Victoria O'Brien, still sobbing several minutes after the royal couple had moved past her.

The royals then returned to Government House for meetings with Ardern and the leader of the opposition Simon Bridges, ahead of a reception hosted by the Governor-General marking the 125th anniversary of women's suffrage.

Just before Bridges was to meet the prince a fire alarm went off, forcing the evacuation of the building and leaving dozens of women who were invited to the reception standing outside in the cold in their evening outfits, many holding drinks.

A Government House representative later said it was a false alarm caused by a vegetable steamer in the kitchen.

Harry and Meghan's itinerary over the following three days includes a hike and barbecue in the Abel Tasman National Park at the top of the South Island, a reception with Ardern at Auckland War Memorial Museum and a visit to the popular North Island tourist resort of Rotorua.

The couple will then head back to Auckland before flying out on Thursday to end a marathon tour which also took in Fiji and Tonga. —AFP ■

Chinese researchers develop new technique for low-cost solar cells

LANZHOU — Chinese researchers have developed a new photovoltaic technique that could improve the efficiency of solar cells and reduce their cost.

The new technique uses high-efficiency hole-and-electron-selective layers for both polarities on silicon substrate, which could improve the efficiency of solar cells to 15.1 per

cent, said Peng Shanglong, head of a research team at Lanzhou University in northwest China's Gansu Province.

He added that the new technique would allow the potential model of solar cells to avoid high-temperature processes, which makes it low-cost and efficient.

“Because of high equipment

costs and complex techniques, traditional solar cells have long been limited in use on a large scale,” Peng said. “It's of practical value to develop a new model of solar cells.”

The findings have been published on *Nano Energy*, a major journal covering the science and engineering of nanomaterials and nanodevices. —Xinhua ■

Zika virus detected in second Indian state

NEW DELHI, (India) — India's Zika outbreak is spreading, with officials saying on Sunday that the mosquito-borne virus has been detected in the western state of Gujarat after nearly 150 cases were reported this year in neighbouring Rajasthan.

Health authorities in Gujarat said a woman tested positive for Zika and was treated at a state hospital in the capital Ahmedabad, the first confirmed case outside Rajasthan this year.

“Only one case has been found so far. We are taking all precautions,” Gujarat Commissioner of Health, Jayanti Ravi, told AFP on Sunday. The state health de-

partment has rallied hundreds of doctors and medical personnel to perform emergency screenings for Zika, including more than 250 pregnant women with fevers.

Gujarat, which borders Rajasthan to the south, has been fumigating public areas in an effort to kill the mosquitos that carry the diseases.

Health authorities in Rajasthan have detected 147 cases of Zika since September, officials say. Almost 440,000 people were under surveillance in Rajasthan's capital Jaipur last month.

The *Aedes aegypti* mosquito, which carries Zika and other viruses like dengue fever, is widely

prevalent in India.

The country of 1.25 billion reported its first Zika cases in January 2017 in Gujarat but the latest case is the first in the state this year. Since Zika erupted on a large scale in 2015, more than 1.5 million people in more than 70 countries have been infected, with most in South America.


In rare cases, if pregnant women contract the virus their babies can develop brain defects.

Zika was also detected in the southern Indian state of Tamil Nadu in July 2017. The World Health Organization has said no vaccine is likely to be available until 2020.—AFP ■

Japan launches rocket carrying greenhouse gas observation satellite

TANEGASHIMA (Japan) — An H-2A rocket carrying an Ibuki-2 greenhouse gas observation satellite was launched on Monday from the Tanegashima Space Centre in southwestern Japan, successfully putting the satellite into its planned orbit.

The satellite, launched by the Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency and Mitsubishi Heavy Industries Ltd, is more precise than its predecessor that was put up in 2009 and will orbit the earth at an altitude of 600 kilometres to collect data on carbon dioxide and methane gas.

The data will contribute to global efforts to tackle climate change based on the Paris Agreement, which aims to keep temperature rises this century well below 2 C above preindustrial levels.

The Ibuki-2 will also monitor air pollution by measuring the amount of PM 2.5, or particles 2.5 microns in diameter or smaller.

The rocket also carried the United Arab Emirates' Khalifa-Sat earth observation satellite and another small satellite developed by Japanese universities.—Kyodo News ■

Diabetes drug may help prevent blindness: study

SAN FRANCISCO — Researchers from China's Taiwan Province have found that a common drug used to treat type 2 diabetes may have an effect of lowering the possibility of developing a disease leading to blindness, the American Academy of Ophthalmology (AAO) said on Sunday.

The San Francisco-based

academy said the research, disclosed at AAO 2018, its 122nd Annual Meeting being held in Chicago from 27 to 30 October, showed the diabetes patients who took the medication of metformin have a significant lower rate of developing age-related macular degeneration (AMD), one of the leading causes of blindness in Americans aged

50 or above.

The researchers studied the statistics of the health insurance research database in Taiwan from a period spanning from 2001 and 2013 and found that 45,524 type 2 diabetes patients who took metformin have better chances to avoid suffering AMD that affects about 2.1 million people in the United States.

The study suggests that metformin, which controls the blood glucose level in type 2 diabetes patients, can suppress inflammation and oxidative stress, the two major factors that play a key role in the development of both diabetes and AMD.

“Our study is the first to reveal the protective effect of metformin on the development

of AMD,” said lead investigator Yu-Yen Chen.

The AAO is the world's largest association of eye physicians and surgeons, with a global community of 32,000 medical doctors, which is committed to advocating the protection of sight and empowering lives by promoting eye care and health for the public.—Xinhua ■

Elina Svitolina wins WTA Finals in Singapore



SINGAPORE — An unwavering Elina Svitolina claimed the biggest title of her career with

a gritty comeback victory against Sloane Stephens at the season-ending WTA Finals in Singapore.

The Ukrainian once again dug deep to triumph 3-6, 6-2, 6-2 in two hours and 23 minutes on Sunday. She is the first player to go through the WTA Finals undefeated since

Serena Williams in 2013.

Svitolina has been in brilliant, ag-

gressive form in Singapore, beating defending champion Caroline Wozniacki, Czech players Petra Kvitova and Karolina Pliskova at the group stage, and Kiki Bertens in the semi-finals.

Having started slowly in the semi-finals, it was Stephens who made the running early and she broke Svitolina to love in the second game. It was a matchup of similar styles between the athletic counterpunchers and lengthy rallies punctuated the contest.

Svitolina looked sluggish after playing the two longest matches in the tournament against Wozniacki and Bertens in the semi-finals.

She saved three break points in the sixth game but was unable to convert two chances of her own in Stephens' next service game.

Stephens' blistering forehand dictated, as she ran away

with the first set.

A more aggressive Svitolina went for her shots and clawed back into the contest. Even though she still struggled on serve, Svitolina attacked on return and broke twice to wear down a suddenly passive Stephens. Svitolina fittingly forced a decider in a tournament which has had a record-setting amount of three-set matches.

The 24-year-old's momentum continued as she produced an astounding run down winner to break Stephens in the second game. But Stephens wouldn't roll over as she attacked Svitolina's serve and broke in the fifth game.

The twists continued as Svitolina hit back immediately and stormed home as a wayward backhand from Stephens sparked jubilation from the number six seed. — AFP ■
