World Children's Day observed at Pyidaungsu Hluttaw in Nay Pyi Taw

WORLD Children's Day was observed at the theatre building of the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday. Speaking at the ceremony to mark the day, the Speaker of Pyidaungsu and Pyithu Hluttaws, U T Khun Myat, expressed hope that the government and other agencies will find ways to cooperate with each other to ensure a better life for children in Myanmar.

As part of Children's Day celebrations last year, a discussion was held for children and youths at the Mandalay Region's Hluttaw, where they were asked to voice their concerns. The Speaker called on the members

of parliament, the UNICEF, and the Ministry of Social Welfare, Relief, and Resettlement to take note of the concerns raised at the meeting and collaborate to find solutions.

"To promote the basic principles of the agreement on promoting the rights of children, the Hluttaws and the UNICEF have cooperated in several areas over the last two years. These include legislation, budget scrutiny, ensuring checks and balances on the executive sector, and representing the people," he said.



Investment and Foreign Economic Relations Ministry approved

THE Second Pyidaungsu Hluttaw tenth regular session held its third day meeting in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday where the establishment of the new Ministry of Investment and Foreign Economic Relations proposed by the President was approved.

Prior to the Hluttaw approving the establishment of the new ministry, Union Attorney-General U Tun Tun Oo explained about it and said the Union Government consider this matter from all angles and proposed it for the benefit of the people.

The new ministry will be formed with Foreign Economic Relations Department (FERD) and Directorate of Investment and Company Administration (DICA) of Ministry of Planning and Finance and at the moment will not require additional staff, building, cars, budget etc.

Without creating additional burden for the State, this newly formed ministry will effectively coordinate between related ministries and organisations on local and international investments, development works implemented for various sectors with international development loans and aids.

Ministry of Investment and Foreign Economic Relations is formed to fulfill the requirement of the State and the people according to international, regional and the country's geo-economic situation, increasing local and foreign businesses and investments, improving the investment image of the country, quickly creating opportunities for entrepreneurs, all round regional economic cooperation in ASEAN, Greater Mekong Sub-region and BIMSTEC etc. and cooperating in socio-economic development programs with

United Nations and international organisations, explained the Union Attorney-General.

As there was no one disagreeing to the forming of the new ministry when the opinion of the Hluttaw was obtained, Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Speaker announced the Hluttaw's agreement on expanding and establishing Ministry of Investment and Foreign Economic Relations.

Suggestion, discussion and support of Euro 70 million AFD Loan

Afterwards U Khin Cho of Hlaingbwe constituency, U Thein Tan of Hlegu constituency and U Htay Win Aung @ U Pyone Cho of

Dawbon constituency suggested and discussed the matter of Euro 70 million loan from the French Development Agency (AFD or Agence Francaise de Developpement) to conduct project works in Yangon Region while U Nay Kyaw of Dagon Myothit (East) constituency, Dr. Saw Naing of South Okkalapa constituency, Dr. Khin Maung Maung of Dagon Myothit (North) constituency, Daw Yin Min Hlaing of Gangaw constituency, U Myint Lwin of Twantay constituency and U Ye Lwin of Ahlon constituency discussed and suggested in support of the matter.

Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Speaker then announced that in response to the discussions and suggestions made by the Hluttaw representatives, members of the union level organisations will discuss and explain.


Next, Pyidaungsu Hluttaw representatives and members of U-Report held roundtable discussions on education, violence against children, and peace.

At the basic education schools, a toilet is provided for every 50 students. According to 2018-19 education figures, 65.4 percentage of basic education school had toilet, 83.22 percentages of the schools had sufficient drinking water supply and 85.21 percentages of the schools had sufficient water for use.

Thant Sin Myitta Foundation provides health education on water, sanitation and hygiene and School WASH (School Water and Sanitation and Hygiene Promotion) in cooperation with the Ministry of Education and Ministry of Health and Sports.

The theme for World Toilet Day-2018 was "When nature calls, take action" it is learnt. — MNA

New glass melting furnace opens in Kyaukse, authorities eye ASEAN market

A NEW glass melting furnace at No.36 Heavy Industry (Kyaukse) was inaugurated on 19 November. With the factory beginning operations, the authorities expect to amp up production of glass soon with a view to export it to Viet Nam and other ASEAN countries.

Within 20 days of operation of the furnace, the factory manufactured 2,000 tons of 12-inch-wide glass and distributed it in the local market. The authorities have entered into discussions to export glass from the factory to Viet Nam soon. They are also planning to export the glass to ASEAN countries.

The inauguration ceremony was attended by the Union Minister for Industry, U Khin Maung Cho, the Deputy Minister for Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation, Dr. Ye Myint Swe, Mandalay Region's Minister for Agriculture, Livestock, and Irrigation, Dr. Soe Than, International Glass

Co. Ltd.'s Managing Director U Zaw Win, and officials from the Industry Ministry.

At the function on Monday, officials detailed the factory's background, the objective for building the furnace, and future plans. No.36 Heavy Industry (Kyaukse) opened in 2013 and manufactures glasses used in buildings and for security. With

construction of the new glass melting furnace now complete, the factory's output is expected to increase from 100 tons of glass per day to 250 tons. The factory is now equipped to produce 12-inch-wide glass instead of 8-inch-wide glass. It will also manufacture tempered glass, windscreens, and building glasses.

After the opening ceremony,

the Union Minister and officials inspected construction work on waste heat recovery and cement plants from the control room at No.33 Heavy Industry. While speaking to officials, the Union Minister laid stress on environmental conservation and corporate social responsibility (CSR).—MNA ■

Agencies, breeders gear up to prevent African Swine Fever outbreak

WITH the African Swine Fever spreading to bordering Yunnan, government agencies and breeders are gearing up to prevent an outbreak in Myanmar. While ASF poses no threat to humans, it can disrupt the swine industry, according to the Myanmar Livestock Federation.

The current ASF outbreak has been seen in China's north east provinces, central provinces and eastern provinces, including the Yunnan Province, which borders Myanmar.

"Outbreaks of swine flu (blue-ear pig disease) in Myanmar in the last eight years harmed pig breeders. The swine disease spread from Mandalay to Mawlamyine. It was highly contagious within three months. The present ASF outbreak has spread to the Yunnan Province. People from Myanmar are trading with the Yunnan Province and so, this flu may spread to the country," said U Hlaing Myint Oo, a pig breeder. The ASF is a highly contagious viral disease which affects domestic and wild pigs. The virus spreads among

pigs easily through direct contact or through contact with contaminated objects. According to the Livestock Breeding and Veterinary Department (LBVD) under the Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock, and Irrigation, there is no treatment or vaccine to combat the virus, "We are taking precautionary measures as currently there are no vaccines to combat the virus. The ASF spreads slowly just like the blue-ear disease. As an ASF outbreak can lead to production and economic losses, we do not want the virus to spread here. It will be hard to prevent any viral infection due to lack of vaccines. If there is an outbreak, we will have to follow the government's guidelines," said U Hlaing Myint Oo.

The government is conducting a crackdown on illegal importation of pig and pork products at the Sino-Myanmar checkpoints, said the LBVD. Agencies are also working on raising awareness about ASF, by distributing pamphlets and putting up notices about illegal trade, it said.

"While ASF does not spread to humans, an outbreak can harm pig production and the

swine industry. Therefore, biosecurity of pig farms is essential to prevent the spread of infections within the farms. People need to avoid buying infected pig meat, frozen meat, and products.

If they notice any suspicious activity, people must immediately inform their nearest LBVD and the Myanmar Livestock Federation. They must also cooperate with the related departments and organizations carrying out preventive measures and conducting research on the disease," said the LBVD.

An educative talk on 'African Swine Fever: How to Stay One Step Ahead' was held last Thursday inside the hall of the Myanmar Livestock Federation. The lecture was organized in collaboration with the Myanmar Pig Farmers and Processors Association, and AG Today.

At the event, the LBVD detailed its preventive measures to battle any incidence of ASF. The department is also drafting an emergency response management project to control any possible outbreak. ■

Tractor-trailer catches fire on Hpa-an-Myawady road

A tractor-trailer, carrying granite, caught fire while travelling on the Hpa-an-Myawady road in Hpa-an Township, Kayin State, on 17 November.

According to the police, the Myint Shwe, 47, from Yedashe Township, Bago, was driving the 22-wheel tractor-trailer when the brake overheated, resulting in fire.

The accident occurred between mileposts 24 and 25 on the Hpa-an-Myawady road. Mint Shwe was accompanied by track conductor Thaw Ko Ko, 23, from Gyobingauk Town, Bago Region.

While neither of them was injured, property worth Ks1,200,000 was damaged in the blaze.

The fire was put out by a fire engine and firemen. The police have charged the driver under Section 285 of the Penal Code.—Min Thu (Hpa-an) ■

SME Dept to team up with MWEA to empower rural women

THE SME Development Department will soon be working with the Myanmar Women Entrepreneurs Association to help rural women turn into entrepreneurs and raise their standard of living.

“Women who are illiterate or semi-literate believe they cannot become successful entrepreneurs. We will work to change that mindset. We plan to empower women living in rural areas by giving them entrepreneurial training. We want to encourage them to participate in politics and business,” said Daw Aye Aye Win, the director-general of the SME Development Department. She was speaking at the Myanmar Women Entrepreneurs Conference which was held at the Inya Lake Hotel yesterday.

“The SME Development Department will be joining hands with the MWEA to conduct programs to empower women in the long run,” she said. The two agencies will soon sign a Memorandum of Understanding and work out a cooperation mechanism.

“Under the ASEAN strategic action plan for SME de-

velopment, Myanmar has been tasked to promote entrepreneurship and develop human capital. The government is working to develop entrepreneurship through capacity-building programs across the country. These programs include activities to empower women socially and economically, and promote women's education,” said Daw Aye Aye Win.

The SME Development Department is sending women entrepreneurs to Malaysia, Japan, and the Republic of Korea. It will arrange to send more women entrepreneurs to European countries over time, she said.

The MWEA has been providing loans to women for home or agricultural businesses in rural areas. So far, it has covered over 3,200 rural women in 36 vil-

lages in the Ayeyawady Region and Thanlyin and Mingaladon townships in Yangon Region, lending over Ks150 million.

The agency lends support to women, and educates them about financial management and marketing. The MWEA's education programs have covered 10,000 girls, said Daw Hnin Wai, secretary general of the MWEA.

“Both men and women en-

trepreneurs experience similar challenges in terms of capital, technology, and market share. However, women opt to run businesses while continuing to perform household chores and other domestic responsibilities. Therefore, support from their partners is critical to the success of women entrepreneurs,” said Daw Sandar Tun, the joint secretary of the MWEA.

The MWEA has branches in Mandalay, Taunggyi, Bago, Pyay, Patheingyi, and Kyaiklat. There are plans to set up more branches affiliated with the MWEA and organize more programs to empower women.

The Women's Entrepreneurship Day (WED) is observed on 19 November every year. It is celebrated by 144 countries and around 100 colleges. The Myanmar Women Entrepreneurs Conference was inaugurated to mark the WED this year. At the conference, leading businesspersons and staff from the SME Development Department held panel discussions on 'women and SMEs', 'women and branding', and 'women's entrepreneurship movement'.

Exports to the Netherlands top US\$200 million in mini-budget period

MYANMAR'S exports to the Netherlands reached US\$212.98 million in the last mini-budget period (from April to September), surpassing imports, which were valued at \$16.9 million, according to figures released by the Ministry of Commerce.

The value of trade between Myanmar and the Netherlands reached \$229.9 million in the last mini-budget period prior to the 2018-2019 Fiscal Year.

Myanmar exports agro products such as oilseeds and vege-

table oil, and apparel, parasols (traditional Patheingyi umbrellas), and fishery products to the Netherlands. It imports dairy products, consumer goods, and raw industrial materials.

Bilateral trade between the countries stood at \$211.57 million in the 2017-2018 FY, \$141 million in the 2016-2017 FY, \$61 million in the 2015-2016 FY, \$42 million in the 2014-2015 FY, \$26 million in the 2013-2014 FY, \$9 million in the 2012-2013 FY, and \$23 million in the 2011-2012 FY.

The Netherlands is listed among Myanmar's top ten investor countries. At present, there are 18 enterprises from the Netherlands operating in the country with an approved capital of \$1.2 billion, according to statistics provided by the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration. Multinational corporations headquartered in the Netherlands—Shell, Unilever, and Phillips—are also doing business in Myanmar.—GNLM (Translated by Ei Myat Mon)

Myanmar's maritime trade increases by \$283 million

MYANMAR'S maritime trade has topped nearly US\$2.7 billion in the 2018-2019 Fiscal Year, an increase of \$283 million compared with the same period last year, according to figures released by the Ministry of Commerce on Friday.

Exports accounted for \$940.6 million of the country's total trade via shipping between 1 October and 9 November this year, while imports reached over \$1.7 billion.

During the same period in the last 2017-2018 FY, the total value of maritime trade was almost \$2.4 billion, with exports totalling \$775 million and imports reaching \$1.6 billion.

The country's maritime trade exceeded \$11.7 billion during the mini-budget period between April and September this year, an increase of over \$2 billion compared with the same period last year.

Over the first 40 days of

this FY, the value of total external trade has reached about \$3.5 billion, with border trade amounting to \$823 million.

Around 80 per cent of the country's total trade is conducted by sea. Myanmar mainly exports agricultural products, livestock, fishery products, forest products, minerals, and manufactured goods. The country usually imports capital goods, consumer goods, and intermediate products.

According to the Commerce Ministry's yearly statistical report, the country's maritime trade totalled \$25.019 billion in the last 2017-2018 FY. External trade by sea stood at \$21.43 billion in the 2016-2017 FY, \$20.56 billion in the 2015-2016 FY, \$22.37 billion in the 2014-2015 FY, \$20.37 billion in the 2013-2014 FY, and \$14.67 billion in the 2012-2013 FY.—Swe Nyein (Translated by Khaing Thanda Lwin)

Trade at Hteekhee border gate registers a rise, up \$161mn

THE value of trade through the Myanmar-Thailand border gate, Hteekhee, rose by US\$161 million in the first month of the current 2018-2019 Fiscal Year from the same period last year, according to data released by the Commerce Ministry.

Between 1 October and 9 No-

vember, Myanmar's exports to Thailand through the Hteekhee gate totalled \$160 million, while imports exceeded \$1 million. Hteekhee gate saw less than one million worth of trade in the similar period of last FY. Myanmar exports coal, tin, fish and squid, coconut, and bamboo shoots to

Thailand and imports diesel oil, mixed liquefied petroleum gas, machines, and spare parts. The gate opened in 2013 to allow trade between Myanmar and Thailand. Trade at the gate is conducted in US dollars, Thailand Baht and Myanmar Kyat.—GNLM

UNION Minister for Transport and Communications U Thant Sin Maung accompanied by Chin State Chief Minister Salai Lian Luai arrived at Falam Airport construction project office on 17 November where Department of Civil Aviation Director U Kyaw Soe explained about the project in detail covering the aim of the project; site selection; restrictions related to air traffic; design based on International Air Transport Association terms and condition on safe landings of aircrafts; construction works including retaining walls, apron, runway, terminal, control tower; connecting electrical cables for lighting; water drains; project cost and project processes.

In response to the expla-

nation, the Union Minister and the Chief Minister remarked on completing the construction on schedule and up to set standards; to conduct works without worksite incidents and accidents; resubmit a more modern design for the terminal building among others and resubmit the budget requirement.

Next the Union Minister and the Chief Minister inspected the airport construction project works.

Falam Airport is situated in the middle of Chin State and towns such as Falam, Haka, Thantlang and Tiddim can reach all airports in states and regions via this airport named Surbung. Once this airport is completed it will become the air Gateway of

Chin State and will enable visitors to reach Chin State in a short travel time.

The project was started in 2013 and construction began in 2015. Falam Airport is situated on Surbung mountain range 8.5 miles northwest of Falam Town and is at an altitude of 6,000 ft. above sea level. The airport runway is 6,000 ft long and 100 ft wide and is a Flexible Pavement type runway.

The permitted load of the runway is 50,000 pounds and the airport is constructed with a budget of Ks 28 billion. It is now over 40 percent completed and the first phase will be completed in 2021 when planes can start landing it is learnt. —MNA ■


President's Office continues announcement of illegal drug arrests, seizures acting on tip-offs

PARTIALITY, prejudice, and bias are some elements of corruption. Making unreasonable decisions in favour of someone leads to partiality, while opposing someone because you are intimidated or lack a full understanding, or the desire to understand, leads to prejudice.

In time, you will hunger for bribes, oppress people who differ slightly from you, become afraid of pressures and threats from authority, and make judgements while being unable to see the truth.

The people of Myanmar have seen a wide range of injustice and unfairness due to corruption in many sectors, including politics, business, and judicial administration. To put it a bit more accurately, the people have experienced the corrupt actions of successive authorities and faced the consequences of those actions for more than half a century.

The dictators of the past talked ceaselessly of benefiting the country and the people, but only they and their families, relatives, and associates grew rich while the rest of the nation sank incessantly deeper into poverty.

place it was assumed in everything people did, akin to a legal requirement.

This holds true even today as ordinary officials own wealth unimaginable to the general public. It's an open secret that while these corrupt individual's wealth may not be exactly measurable, it exceeds the public's expectations.

The dichotomy lies in Myanmar being ranked among the least developed countries with high levels of poverty, yet hosting people who could enter the list of the richest people in the world. We need not conduct a survey on whether the people who achieved such wealth free from corruption are the majority or minority. Nor do we need to specially investigate how they attained this level of prosperity.

Do you know? Which is the most tobacco consuming region in the world?

Although every country has tobacco chewers, 89 percent of them live in Southeast Asia.

Which countries consume betel quid most?

Betel quid chewing is an age-old tradition in Pakistan, India, Nepal, Sri Lanka, Bangladesh, Myanmar, Thailand, Laos Cambodia, Vietnam, Malaysia, Chinese Taiwan, southern China, Indonesia, Philippines and Pacific Island countries. Some countries are seeing drop in the number of betel quid chewers among youths, especially in the cities, while others facing an increase in their population. The biggest betel quid chewers are in Palau (a Pacific Island country), Bangladesh and Myanmar.

Do you know the Myanmar's betel consumption rate?

According to 2009 national statistics, 29.7 percent of adults chew betel quid in Myanmar where 51.4 percent of men are betel quid chewers. As for women, the percentage is 16.1. Sadly, the consumption rate increased to 43.2 percent of all adults in 2014. In gender-wise, 62.2 percent of men is betel quid chewers while the percentage of their female counterparts is 24.1.

What are Health hazards of tobacco an ingredient of betel quid

Normally, a roll of cigarette has 0.5 gram to 1.0 gram of tobacco or 10 milligrams of nicotine. The amount of tobacco contained in a betel quid depends on the varied choice of taste of the chewer. It is



possible that more nicotine enters into the blood of a betel quid chewer than a smoker. It is believed that a small amount of nicotine can make a person fresh and alert, while larger amount may stabilize the mind and reduce anxiety. Moreover this chemical agent can give a pleasant feeling. So, some people are addicted to nicotine. Addiction to nicotine is the same as the cocaine or heroin addiction. Nicotine can increase the pulse rate from 10 to 20 in a minute and increase blood pressure from 6 mmHg to 10 mmHg.

It also increases cholesterol in the blood, and worsens the heart problem. Nicotine is related to abortion, and other adverse effects such as pre- and postna-

tal growth and increases the risk of fetal mortality, morbidity, cognitive development, and behavior of children and adolescents. Tobacco-specific Nitrosamines, a chemical agent contained in tobacco can cause several types of

amount of Nitrosamines is from 170 to 500 times higher than Sweden in Sudan, an African country, where tobacco is treated under Compost Pile Fermentation method. More Nitrosamines volume means greater cancer risk.

cancers including mouth and oral cancers. Cancer risk due to tobacco use depends on the amount of Nitrosamines it contains. But no tobacco is risk free. Even in a country like Sweden where tobacco is processed to make it germ free, the containment of Nitrosamines in one gram of tobacco is from 601 to 585 nano-grams. The amount of Nitrosamines is three times higher than Sweden in the US where tobacco is processed under Factory Fermentation System, and the

Many studies have shown a convincing link between betel nut use and cancer of the mouth and esophagus. Another study reports that betel nut users are at a higher risk for oral sub-mucous fibrosis. This incurable condition can cause stiffness in the mouth and eventually the loss of jaw movement.

Regular chewing of betel nut can also cause gum irritation and tooth decay. Teeth may become permanently stained deep red or even black.

ard betel quid consumption can cause?

According to the statistics collected in 2014, out of 100 male adults 43.2 in Myanmar chew betel quid. Latest census indicates that the country's adult population is 33.7 million. So the country has 14.5 million betel quid chewer adults.

Actual number can be higher. According to a research, 85 percent of chewers prefer tobacco-added quid. Moreover, signs of oral cancer development can be found in 8.5 percent of the chewers. Similarly, a research jointly conducted by Japanese experts and Myanmar Dental Association in Mawlamyine and Hpa-an in 2015-2016 showed that 7.6 percent of chewers has signs of oral cancer development. If not properly treated in the early stage they can be turned into dreadful cancer disease.

These figures show the extent of cancer problem in Myanmar.



Do you think betel quid without tobacco is safe?

Arecoline that contains in betel nut or areca nut is a chemical agent like the Nitrosamines that can be addicted. A wrong belief is that Arecoline can give greater concentration, activeness and pleasure. In fact, betel nut worsens bronchitis and heart problems, accelerates pulse, and causes diabetes and low birth weight. Moreover, Areca Nut-Specific Nitrosamine is related to various types of cancers including the development of mouth cancer (oral squamous cell carcinoma) and its precursors such as leukoplakia and submucous fibrosis. Papua New Guinea where the young and old have the habit of chewing betel nut without tobacco has a high oral cancer rate.

To what degree of health haz-

Cancer development rate of tobacco-added betel quid chewers is 29 times higher than the non-chewers and the tobacco-free chewers six times higher. Over 250,000 people die of tobacco consumption in the world annually before suffering from chronic illness. As chewers are likely to die early or suffering from chronic disease without earning money, they will become an economic burden for the family.

The nation has more cancer patients than the numbers that treatment centres and hospital wards can accommodate and cure for them. If the betel quid chewing rate increase continues at the current rate, health problem will be a big burden for the country in the future. So we all should make collective efforts to discourage and reduce the betel quid chewing habit.

SUMMARY OF OBSERVATIONS RECORDED AT 09:30 hrs MST: During the past (24) hours, rain or thundershowers have been scattered in Taninthayi Region and Mon State, isolated in Yangon Region, Kachin, Eastern Shan and Kayin states. Weather has been partly cloudy in Upper Sagaing, Bago and Ayeyawady regions, Southern Shan and Kayah states and generally fair in the remaining regions and states. Night temperatures were (4°C) below November average temperature in Northern Shan State, (2°C) below November average temperatures in Lower Sagaing and Yangon regions, Rakhine State, (2°C) above November average temperature in Kayin State, (3°C) above November average temperature in Mon State and about November average temperatures in the remaining regions and states. The significant night temperatures were (2°C) in Haka, (8°C) each in Hsipaw, Heho, Tiddim and Ramthlo and (9°C) each in Nawngkhio, Loilin, Matupi and Mogok. The noteworthy amounts of rainfall recorded were Kyeikmayaw (1.69) inches, Yay (0.75) inch, Dawei (0.27) inch and Yangon (Kaba-Aye) (0.16) inch.

BAY INFERENCE: According to the observations at (18:30) hrs MST today, the low pressure area over South Bay of Bengal and adjoining Equatorial Indian Ocean still persists. It may further intensify into a depression during next (24) hours. Weather is partly cloudy to cloudy over the Andaman Sea and South Bay and generally fair elsewhere in the Bay of Bengal.

FORECAST VALID UNTIL AFTERNOON OF 20 November 2018: Rain or thundershowers will be scattered in Taninthayi Region, Kayin and Mon states and isolated in Kachin State. Degree of certainty is (80%). Taunggyi hot air balloon festival crowded with people


TAUNGGYI hot air balloon festival in Taunggyi, Shan State, which launched on 14 November, continued yesterday with releasing about 34

Cambodian PM says no China naval base being built

PHNOM PENH (Cambodia) — Cambodia will not allow foreign military bases on its soil, strongman premier Hun Sen said on Monday, swatting away US concerns about a possible Chinese naval site near hotly contested seas. China has lavished billions of dollars in soft loans, infrastructure and investment on the poor Southeast Asian kingdom, gifting Prime Minister Hun Sen a fast growing economy that he wields as justification for his 33-year authoritarian rule.

In exchange Cambodia has been staunch China ally.

It has seeded disunity among the 10-member ASEAN bloc of Southeast Asian nations over a diplomatic pushback to Beijing's aggression in the strategically pivotal South China Sea.

Rumours a Chinese naval base is under construction off Cambodia's southwest coast have been swirling. The area under scrutiny is in the Gulf of Thailand but gives ready access to the South China Sea.

But in comments during a cabinet meeting, broadcast on Facebook live, Hun Sen denied military bases of any kind have - or will be - built on Cambodian territory.

"I have received a letter from Mike Pence, US Vice President, regarding

concerns that there will be a China naval base in Cambodia," he said.

"The Constitution of Cambodia bans the presence of foreign troops or military bases in its territory... whether naval forces, infantry forces or air forces."

The US, once the region's undisputed military power, is acutely aware of the strategic and trading importance of the South China Sea and insists it remains international waters.

US, Australian and British warships have increasingly conducted "freedom of navigation" operations through the sea to press that point,

infuriating Beijing. Hun Sen dismissed reports of a Chinese base as "information that only tries to manipulate the truth."

"I will reply to the letter from US Vice-president Mike Pence to make him understand clearly about the issue."

Chinese bankrolled casinos, developments and dams have mushroomed in recent years, fanning growth but incubating resentment among some Cambodians who fear the country is increasingly in the pocket of the regional superpower.

Several joint military exercises have also taken place while in June Beijing promised \$100 million

to modernise Cambodia's military.

Chinese Premier Li Keqiang last week sought to soothe anxieties, backing a rule book on behaviour in contested waters to be finished in three years. "We are not and we will not seek hegemony or expansion. That is something that we will never do," he added, ahead of a summit of Southeast Asian leaders in Singapore.

Critics have countered that China has deliberately spent years negotiating the rulebook with Southeast Asian neighbours to buy time to build up its military bases.

Former provincial legislator expelled from CPC, office

BEIJING — Wang Tie, a former senior legislator in central China's Henan Province, has been expelled from the Communist Party of China (CPC) and dismissed from public office over serious violations of discipline and law, according to a statement by the top anti-graft body on Monday.

The CPC Central

Commission for Discipline Inspection and the National Supervisory Commission conducted an investigation into Wang, former deputy Party secretary of the Standing Committee of Henan Provincial People's Congress and vice head of the Standing Committee of Henan Provincial People's Congress.

The probe found that

Wang conducted vote buying and canvassing in elections, a serious violation of the Party's political code of conduct and rules.

Other offenses included refusing to report personal matters to authorities, taking advantage of his posts to assist relatives in business, and accepting money and gifts.

"As a senior official

of the CPC, Wang lost his commitment to Party principles and sought personal benefits through his positions. The case should be dealt with seriously," the statement said. Since that Wang turned himself in, gave back his illicit gains and showed sincere remorse, the CCDI proposed a lenient punishment.

Dutch government to challenge court's greenhouse gas ruling

THE HAGUE, (Netherlands) — The Dutch government on Friday said it would go to the Supreme Court over an appeals court ruling that it must slash greenhouse gases by at least 25 per cent by 2020.

The government had appealed a landmark 2015 ruling that it should make the national reductions. But the Hague appeals court last month ruled against the government, upholding the earlier court victory by environmental

rights group Urgenda.

“Up until now the state has done too little to prevent dangerous climate change, and is not doing enough to make up lost ground,” head judge Marie-Anne Tan-de-Sonnville had said last month.

“There is a real threat of danger against which measures must be taken.”

The economic affairs and climate ministry said on Friday that it would now ask the Supreme Court to

rule on a question of principle, namely whether the courts could make rulings on “the political choices of the government”.

It added, however, that the legal proceedings would have no effect on its commitment to reduce emissions and that it would continue to work towards the target.

Urgenda brought the case against the government in April 2015 on behalf of some 900 Dutch citizens.—AFP ■

Diesel driving bans ‘self-destructive’, says German minister

BERLIN (Germany) — Efforts by courts to impose diesel driving bans are “self-destructive” and put German prosperity at risk, the transport minister warned on Friday, as tempers flared in the battle against urban air pollution.

Speaking a day after a court in Essen became the first to order that sections of a major western highway be closed to older diesel vehicles, Andreas Scheuer lashed out at the “disproportionate” ruling.

“Judgements like these endanger the mobility of hundreds of thousands of citizens. Nobody understands this self-destructive debate,” Scheuer told Bild daily, adding that such bans “were unheard of in the rest of the world”.

The latest ruling follows a string of similar de-

isions ordering cities like Berlin, Cologne, Frankfurt and Stuttgart to bar the most polluting diesels from certain areas, alarming drivers nationwide.

A transport ministry spokesman said the debate had become “highly emotional” in the car-loving nation where the auto industry is a pillar of economic growth and employs some 800,000 people.

“Closing motorways deprives our country of mobility,” the spokesman told reporters.

“Mobility is the foundation of our prosperity, of our growth, of employment. That’s what we mean by self-destructive.”

The government in Berlin has found itself under mounting pressure to take action against the looming bans, which have

been spurred by the car industry’s “dieselgate” emissions cheating scandal.

The scam, first exposed at Volkswagen in 2015, for years allowed cars to spew far more harmful nitrogen dioxide (NO₂) than legally allowed, significantly contributing to German cities’ chronic air pollution. Scrambling to ward off the bans, the government has sought to get German carmakers Volkswagen, Daimler and BMW to pay for hardware retrofits to clean up engines but the powerful car titans have only made limited concessions so far.

On Thursday, the cabinet moved to change legislation to prevent driving bans in some cities.

In measures still to be approved by parliament,

Berlin says cities where pollution levels are between 40 and 50 micrograms should be exempt

from any bans, sparking outrage from environmentalists who accuse the government of circumventing EU law.—AFP ■

LOS ANGELES (United States) — Again confirming the magic touch of JK Rowling, "Fantastic Beasts: The Crimes of Grindelwald" took in an estimated \$62.2 million this weekend to lead North American box offices, industry tracker Exhibitor Relations reported on Sunday.

This second Harry Potter prequel came in slightly behind the first "Fantastic Beasts" movie, which earned \$74.4 million in its opening three-day weekend, but it has already scored an impressive \$253.2 million overseas. Warner Bros plans three more "Beasts" movies.

Written by Rowling and directed by David Yates, "Grindelwald" stars Eddie Redmayne as Newt Scamander as he works with Albus Dumbledore (Jude Law) to take down the evil Gellert Grindelwald, played with typical panache by Johnny Depp.

In a rare weekend when neither horror nor superhero

movies dominated, second place went to family-friendly "The Grinch" from Universal, which tallied \$38.2 million.

The ever-popular Dr Seuss tale has Benedict Cumberbatch voicing the ill-tempered green title character, with support from Rashida Jones, Kenan Thompson and Angela Lansbury.

In third spot, with \$15.7 million in ticket sales, was Fox's "Bohemian Rhapsody," the foot-stomping biopic about Freddie Mercury and rock group Queen. Rami Malek has drawn strong reviews for his portrayal of the British singer/songwriter.

Fourth went to new Paramount release "Instant Family," starring Mark Wahlberg and Rose Byrne as a married couple who take in three foster

kids over the holidays. It earned \$14.7 million and has drawn an "A" rating from audiences polled by CinemaScore.

In fifth was Fox's "Widows," at \$12.3 million. Directed by Steve McQueen of "12 Years a Slave" fame, it stars Viola Davis, Michelle Rodriguez and Elizabeth Debicki as a group of women who try to pull off a heist after their husbands are killed in a botched robbery.

China's youth embrace street dance amid hip-hop crackdown

BEIJING (China) — In China, where children are often saddled with a packed schedule of extracurricular activities before they even enter grade school, some parents are making room for a surprising pursuit: hip-hop dance classes.

Inside a dance studio in central Beijing, a group of kids bopped up and down to an American hip-hop beat as they mimicked their teacher, a young woman in a dark blue beret and loose clothing.

Some practised in earnest — bending their arms just so — while others giggled, treating the class more like play.

"I want my son to be more extroverted. Kids these days lack spunk," explained Liu Li, whose son, a shy four-year-old with a large dimpled smile, just started taking dance classes at the studio, FunkAsista, this year.

It is not uncommon for children as young as three to take English lessons, piano classes and other more traditional af-

ter-school activities in China, where the pressure to compete with other students can be all-consuming.

But Liu wanted something different for her son, who often struggles to feel comfortable in group settings.

"I want to encourage him to be more lively and carefree," the 36-year-old told AFP.

Though China's nascent street dance scene took root as early as the 2000s — thanks in part to Korean boy band H O

T- it wasn't until recently that the style exploded into mainstream culture.

Underground street dancers were thrust into the limelight after a few TV competitions featuring celebrity judges, such as "Street Dance of China", blew up.

Young parents like Liu view the contemporary dance style as a cure for introversion while others see it as a hip form of exercise or even an alternative way of living that embraces self-expression at the expense of traditional social norms.

"All parents want their daughters to be well-behaved and find a stable job, then find a good husband, get married, and have kids," said Ya Xin, a 25-year-old dancer.

Ya moved to Beijing in May to pursue dance full-time, renouncing her 9-to-5 gig at a government bureau in Hebei province. Her parents were not pleased.

"They didn't agree, but I am willing to push back," she said. "They are not paying for my living expenses, so doing what I want isn't their burden." —AFP ■

Lancang-Mekong tourist cities forum to be held in Sanya

SANYA — A tourism cooperation forum featuring tourist cities in countries along the Lancang-Mekong River will be held in Sanya, south China's Hainan Province, local authorities announced on Saturday.

Delegations from 26 tourist cities in China, Cambodia, Laos, Myanmar, Thailand and Vietnam will participate in the forum, scheduled for Nov. 22-25, according to the city's government.

Li Wujun, vice secretary-general of the Sanya city government, said the forum will promote cooperation on investment, trade, finance and education, and improve the capabilities of high-end tourism services among these cities.

The forum will also focus on discussing the opening of new air routes, cruise routes and creating more tourism products, said Ye Kaizhong, deputy head of the city commission of tourism development. — Xinhua ■

From compass to BeiDou: Chinese wisdom helps navigate Belt & Road

XICHANG — When the Chinese invented the compass, humanity steered into uncharted waters. Now China is navigating the world in the new era of global exchange with a new option — its fledgling BeiDou Navigation Satellite System (BDS).

With the launch of two new BDS-3 satellites on Monday, China will complete the basic navigation system and start to provide services for countries participating in the Belt and Road initiative by the end of this year.

“This is a key step for BDS developing from a domestic Chinese system to a regional and then a global navigation system,” said Yang Changfeng, chief designer of the BeiDou system.

China plans to launch another 11 BDS-3 satellites in the coming two years. By the end of 2020, the BeiDou system, named after the Chinese term for the Big Dipper constellation, will become global, and provide high-precision, reliable positioning, navigation and timing services anywhere in the world.

“China develops BDS through a unique technological approach, contributing Chinese

wisdom to the theory and construction of international satellite navigation systems,” said Xie Jun, deputy chief designer of the BeiDou system.

In 2018, altogether 18 BDS satellites were sent into space from the Xichang Satellite Launch Center in southwest China’s Sichuan Province.

“This year has seen the most intensive launch of the BDS satellites. We improved our work efficiency by reforming the management process. The number of satellite staff at the launch center has been reduced by nearly half, and the testing time before launch has been shortened by nearly a third,” said Chi Jun, head of the BDS-3 satellite team from the China Academy of Space Technology (CAST).

Chi has been in the valley of the launch center for more than six months. But he has never seen a BDS satellite launch, as he has to monitor data on a computer each time. In the CAST production base in Beijing, several BDS satellites are being manufactured at the same time.

“We try to improve intelligent manufacturing capability,

and cut down production times. Construction of the BDS-3 system has accelerated,” Chi said.

Wang Jingang, deputy chief designer of the BDS-3 satellites, has participated in the development of BDS-1, BDS-2 and BDS-3 systems. “It’s a rare chance to devote my intelligence to a symbolic national project.”

Experience of failure has left a deep impression on him. A BDS-2 satellite failed in orbit in 2009. To identify the fault, the whole team of the satellite developers stayed in their office building for more than a month, working till midnight every day.

“It was an unforgettable experience, and if the fault were not found, we would be punished by failure again,” Wang said.

Eventually, they found the cause of the breakdown and the solution. Since then, all Chinese satellites have avoided similar problems.

“When friends or relatives learn that I am working on the development of the BDS satellites, they often show me the BDS signals on their mobile phones. People still mainly depend on navigation by GPS, supplemented by

BDS. I hope that in a few years, people can be navigated mainly by BDS,” Wang said.

China decided to build its own satellite navigation system in 1994, and the BDS-1 system was completed in 2000. Although its service area was limited and its accuracy was not high, China had created its own navigation system with only two satellites.

Then it took China eight years to construct the BDS-2 system with over a dozen satellites, which began to service the Asia-Pacific region in 2012.

China started to build the BDS-3 system in 2009 with greatly improved technologies. Communication, data transmission and

ranging among satellites can be achieved through inter-satellite links. The design life of the BDS-3 satellites has been extended from BDS-2’s eight years to more than 10 years.

The system’s signals and positioning accuracy have improved significantly. The BDS-3 satellites are equipped with high-precision rubidium and hydrogen atomic clocks independently developed by China. These are only a second off time every 3 million years.

The positioning accuracy of the BDS-3 system has been improved to 2.5 metres to 5 metres, up to twice as high as the BDS-2 system, according to Yang Changfeng.—Xinhua ■

SoftBank unveils cleaning robot for offices, restaurants

TOKYO — SoftBank Group Corp’s robotics arm unveiled on Monday a cleaning robot equipped with artificial intelligence, planning to start a rental service for offices


and restaurants possibly next March.

The robotic vacuum cleaner named Whiz, weighing around 32 kilograms and 65 centimeters tall,

can memorize a cleaning route and can automatically clean five times the area than that of home-use disk-shaped vacuum robots, according to SoftBank Robotics Corp. The robot can run continuously for three hours per charge and clean about 1,500 square meters. It will be available for rent for 25,000 yen (\$220) a month and the company will start accepting applications for contracts in February.

Kenichi Yoshida of the company said the robot was developed partly due to an increased labor shortage in the cleaning industry as Japan struggles with a rapidly aging population and low birth rate. The AI technology has been provided by US-based Brain Corp., a startup under SoftBank’s Vision Fund, with other parts made by a Chinese company.

The robot creates and memorizes the map data of the cleaning area after a human teaches the course by pushing the handle of the machine, enabling it to automatically clean the route from the next time. It also has sensors to detect and avoid obstacles.—Kyodo News ■

Blind Australians get bionic vision to partially restore sight

SYDNEY — Four blind Australians have had their vision partially restored through the implantation of bionic eyes, the company responsible for the technology announced on Monday.

Bionic Vision Technologies ran a trial for patients who had lost vision due to Retinitis Pigmentosa, making them able to sense light and dark but unable to see a hand waving in front of them.

Now the company said patients can perceive the world around them in “pixelated grayscale”, meaning they are able to navigate without the need for a guide dog, cane or other assistance.

Lead researcher Associate Professor Penny Allen told local media that the technology could have a dramatic effect on the lives of the one-in-4000 Australians who suffer from the currently incurable genetic condition.

“We’ve been very happy with

how they’re progressing and they’re really happy; and that is the best thing of all,” Allen said.

The system works by capturing images through a camera attached to a pair of glasses, and then feeding the information via an external processing unit, to the patient’s scalp, and then to the implanted device in the patient’s eyes.

Following the success of initial tests in a laboratory setting, researchers hoped that subjects would be able to take the devices home and start applying them to their everyday lives.

“We are working with them to identify things they want to do at home, normal tasks we all do,” Allen said.

“One patient is sorting washing, colours from whites, and one patient wishes to be able to navigate independently to some things in the backyard, like the lemon tree.”—AFP ■

Russian Klimov claims first ever World Cup win in season opener

WISLA (Poland) — Russian Evgeniy Klimov claimed his maiden World Cup victory on the opening day of the ski jumping campaign in Wisla on Sunday as home favourite Kamil Stoch could only manage fourth.

The 24-year-old Klimov, who finished 65th in last season's standings, soared out to 131.5 metres on his second jump to beat German Stephan Leyhe by 6.7 points.

Japan's Ryoyu Kobayashi completed a surprise podium, backing up the form he showed in taking two top-10

finishes from the Pyeongchang Olympics earlier this year.

Reigning World Cup and Four Hills champion Stoch was 8.1 points behind Klimov, missing out on the podium by just 0.3 points as he made a solid start to his title defence.

Southgate hails 'resilient' England's win over Croatia

LONDON (United Kingdom) — England manager Gareth Southgate praised his side's resilience after they scored two goals in the final 12 minutes to beat World Cup semi-final conquerors Croatia 2-1 at Wembley on Sunday and book their place in the last four of the Nations League.

England were facing the prospect of relegation to the second-tier of European football when Andrej Kramaric gave Croatia the lead against the run of play near the hour mark.

But in a mirror image of their World Cup defeat in Moscow in July, substitute Jesse Lingard equalised before England captain Harry Kane poked home the winner with just five minutes left to give Southgate's young team the perfect end to an encouraging year.

"I'm very proud first and foremost," Southgate told Sky

Sports. "I thought we dictated a lot of the game and had good chances in the first half.

"Then we let quite a soft goal in and it's a real test of resilience and patience. We rode our luck with their counter-attacks with one cleared off the line.

"I'm proud of how we've done all year. I've not heard Wembley like that for a long time."

'Game-changers'

England also impressed with the way they went at their opponents in front of the passionate Wembley crowd, creating a host of opportunities against a team that came close to winning the World Cup in Russia.

"It felt as if we could open them up and make good chances," Southgate explained. "The players are starting to believe in the system. We have some players so comfortable building

from the back.

"The depth in the squad since the summer has grown with the young players.

Whoever comes in during this competition have all delivered.

"We knew if we had to accelerate, we had game-changers on the bench. In the last five minutes we were mature enough to see things through."

Kane's late winner, a fine finish from Ben Chilwell's teasing low free-kick with five minutes left, was his first since winning the Golden Boot in the summer's World Cup.

"We were disappointed not to take our chances but against big sides you have to stay

calm," said the Tottenham forward.

"We said after the World Cup we want to keep progressing and get better — and the way to do that is by beating top teams. We finished the year strong. We'll enjoy this one."—AFP ■
