National Conference on Combating Leprosy held in Nay Pyi Taw

State Counsellor calls for right attitude towards leprosy patients to end discrimination against them

THE National Leprosy Conference was held at the Myanmar International Convention Centre-II in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday, with the motto 'join hands to stop discrimination'. State Counsellor Daw Aung San Suu Kyi gave the opening speech at the conference.

DawAung San SuuKyi said efforts to eradicate discrimination against leprosy patients and their families should be given a top priority in combating the disease in Myanmar.

She stressed the need to step up efforts for dissemination of knowledge on leprosy among the people so that people have the right attitude towards leprosy patients, as the country is seeing discrimination against patients and their families and wrong attitudes have impacted the daily life of patients.

Efforts should be made to integrate leprosy patients and their families into the community by disseminating knowledge about how leprosy spreads, said the State Counsellor.

Having the right attitude towards leprosy patients is very important because discrimination against patients has led to hindrances in new patients coming forward, patients' completing their full course of treatment, and prevention of

infection, she added.

The State Counsellor has called on officials responsible for fighting leprosy to work together with the Ministry of Health and Sports, Ministry of Education, Ministry of Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement to integrate the leprosy patients and their families towards the community and to be treated without discrimination by the public.

She also stressed the need to include the knowledge on leprosy in the civic courses to

help the people have the right attitude to the patients.

In conclusion, the State Counsellor expressed thanks to officials concerned, Sasakawa Foundation, Nippon Foundation and local and foreign organizations for their towards holding the conference.

Pyithu Hluttaw discusses confiscated lands, puts motion for union-level policy on record

Progress of pre-1988 confiscated lands cases

U Aung Soe of Yinmabin constituency raised a question asking the progress of cases of lands confiscated prior to 1988 submitted to regional-level committees for scrutinizing confiscated lands.

Deputy Minister Maj-Gen Aung Thu replied that the Central Committee for Scrutinizing Confiscated Farmlands and Other Lands announced in their 17 July 2018 statement that pre-1988 cases of confiscated lands are to be handled as a separate individual case and were thus relayed to the

Nay Pyi Taw Council-level and regional level committees who in turn will further submit the cases to the union-level committee.

Proposing additional residential buildings in Tangyan Tsp police compound

Tangyan constituency asked whether 5 police residential buildings in Tangyan Township police compound can be rebuilt into RC concrete buildings.

Deputy Minister Maj-Gen Aung Thu replied that three buildings within the Tangyan Township police compound are too old and unsafe for habitation

but there are 33 other rooms fit for occupancy within the compound. He said the number of rooms is suitable for housing the current number of officers and their families but more buildings will be needed if the police force were to be expanded. He said they will submit a budget proposal for constructing 2 additional 4-room 2-storey buildings in the 2019-2020 fiscal year.

Kyauktan Tsp police property not leased to any businesses

Daw Aye Mya Mya Myo of Kyauktan constituency asked how the report on losses of confiscated land in Shwe Pyauk Village-tract in Kyauktan Tsp were handled. The mentioned lands were confiscated for police encampments and used for breeding chickens and storing and maintaining auctioned cars.

Deputy Minister Maj-Gen Aung Thu replied that an area of land from the Security Police Force Subdivision No. 7 compound was previously used for joint-ventures with external businesses but eventually converted to 2 chicken farms in April 2016 and handled solely by the officers stationed there.

During the Q&A session, U Hla Oo of Sagaing Region constituency 4 asked the Union Government if it plans to set up branch offices of the Anti-Corruption Commission in states/regions/self-administered divisions and zones across the country, with the aim of achieving a more effective implementation of the law.

Anti-Corruption Commission Secretary U San Win replied that arrangements were being made to open branch offices in Yangon and Mandalay regions, and submissions to open other sub-commission offices would be made yearly in accordance with the allotment of State Fund.

Daw Khin Swe Lwin of Chin State constituency 9 asked the Union Government if it plans to

construct maternity and child healthcare unit, including a multi-purpose hall, in Kanpetlet Township, Chin State in the 2019-2020 Fiscal Year.

U Soe Moe of Ayeyawady Region constituency 1 asked the Union Government if it plans to construct sub rural healthcare center in Jadelat Village, Bawmi village-tract, Pathein Township, Ayeyawady Region.

Regarding this query, Deputy Minister for Health and

Myanmar moves to implement child labour eradication program

MYANMAR is taking steps to implement its child labour eradication program as part of efforts to secure a better future for the children in the country, which has 1.1 million children below 18 years of age engaged in labour and more than 600,000 children working in vulnerable situations.

At the second meeting of the Myanmar National Committee on Child Labour Eradication, Vice President U Myint Swe said, "Approval for the national-level work program (draft) of the Myanmar Child Labour Eradication Project will be sought in this meeting and the project will be implemented."

The Vice President made the remarks in his capacity as the Chairman of the committee at the meeting held at the Ministry of Labour, Immigration, and Population in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday.

He also urged the members of the committee to discuss the work program against child labour, which is relevant to the situation in Myanmar and can bring about vocational training and educational opportunities,

and help alleviate poverty.

According to the Labour Force Survey 2015, there are over 12 million children below 18 years of age in Myanmar. Of these, over 1.1 million are working as child labourers, while over 600,000 are working in a vulnerable situation.

"To provide protection to our children working in dangerous situations, we need to implement the national-level child labour eradication project," said the Vice President.

The 37-member Myanmar National Committee on Child Labour Eradication, led by the Vice President (1), was formed by Notification No. 23/2018 dated 5 February 2018 from the Office of the President.

Youth of working age make up about 18 per cent, or about 1 billion, of the world's population. They are all facing the adverse effects of differences in the economic, social, technological, and cultural environment in countries within a region and in the society.

Globally, there are about 152 million children aged between 5 and 17 years. Of these, 7.4 per cent live in the Asia-Pacific region, and about 70.9 per cent work in the agricultural sector. About 73 million of these children are working in dangerous places.

About 85 per cent of the world's youth live in developing countries, and 60 per cent are in the Asian region. The youth and children's development sectors are important in determining the future of a country and are valuable resources for a country.

"Youth and children who support the production resources are employed in most developing countries, especially in a developing country like Myanmar. The practice is connected to poverty and many people can be seen using child labour," said the Vice President.

Children and youth who are unable to complete their education enter the workforce at a young age and end up getting exploited in most developing countries. Many take up work because of food insufficiency due to natural disasters from climate

change as well as the existence of poverty and migration due to internal conflicts and socio-economic hardships.

Like other regional ASEAN countries, Myanmar has ratified the International Labour Organisation's Convention 182 on the worst forms of child labour, and has been cooperating with the ILO and the UNICEF on this front.

A tripartite agreement under the Decent Work Country Program between the government, employers, and employees was also signed by the International Labour Organization and the Ministry of Labour, Immigration, and Population.

The program includes child labour issues under the title of job opportunities, labour rights, and social security.

Yesterday's meeting was attended by Union ministers Lt-Gen Kyaw Swe, Lt-Gen Ye Aung, Dr. Than Myint, U Thein Swe, Dr. Win Myat Aye, U Khin Maung Cho, and Nai Thet Lwin, Union Attorney-General U Tun Tun Oo, chief ministers of the regions and states, representatives of the employers, employees, and labour unions.

The participants of the meeting discussed topics included in the work programme, child labour issues, investigations into child labour issues, providing opportunities for vocational training to children who are at risk of becoming child labourers, and rehabilitation.—MNA

'Iron, steel demand growing every year'

DEMAND for iron and steel in Myanmar is rising every year, according to iron and steel entrepreneurs. To deal with the growing import volumes of iron and steel, suppliers and importers are planning to hold a seminar and discuss current challenges.

"The outcome of the meeting will be submitted to the government," said Dr. Kay Thi Lwin, the chair of the Myanmar Iron and Steel Entrepreneurs Association.

"Myanmar's steel industry has not developed to date compared with other countries. The major players in Myanmar's iron and steel industry are the government sector (stateowned enterprises), the private sector (industrial zones), and the Myanmar Economic Corporation (MEC). The products meet international standards, but the low manufacturing volume hasn't been able to satisfy the growing demand, making local consumers rely on imported steel," said U Myint Swe, the managing director of Danieli Myanmar. "To meet the growing demand, Myanmar imported about 2.2 million tons of steel last year. The consumption of iron and steel has grown 12 per cent year on year," he added.

"Demand from the construction industry is rising year on year. Infrastructure building projects and upgradation projects, such as extension of railways, have pushed up demand for steel. The demand for steel has risen by 12 per cent every year," said U Myint Swe.

If iron and steel imports are reduced, the outflow of US dollars will be stemmed. Investments are required to set up semi-finished product manufacturing plants and finished product steel mills. "Local production needs support. It will be good for the private and public sectors if production can substitute imports. More job opportunities will emerge. It will also help reduce the outflow of foreign currency. But there are still many impediments. All the stakeholders, including the whole supply chain, need to tackle this together," said Dr. Kay Thi Lwin.

"At present, Myanmar imposes a 5- to 7-per-cent duty on iron and steel imports. Once the Myingyan Steel Mill resumes production, it can supply 600,000 to 800,000 tons of steel. At that time, the government should hike the import duty to protect local producers. Every country has protectionist measures. Viet Nam imposes an anti-dumping tax on imported steel and Malaysia also does the same. The Philippines also levies 25 to 38 per cent tax on imported steel," U Myint Swe said.

Regarding taxation, the iron and steel entrepreneurs will submit their meeting's report during their regular meeting with Vice President U Myint Swe. "We will closely discuss taxation in the upcoming meeting and then, our report will be forwarded to the regular meeting led by Vice President," said Dr. Kay Thi Lwin.

At present, the private sector produces around 100,000-200,000 tons of iron and steel every year, she added. China is the main supplier of iron and steel to Myanmar's market. Myanmar also imports iron and steel from India and the Republic of Korea.

"As our production is so low that it cannot meet local demand, steel has to be imported from foreign countries. If the government raises the import duty on steel, local producers will enjoy a fair competition in the market, which can also help attract investments," said U Myint Swe. Last November, Danieli Myanmar organized a workshop on the development of the iron and steel industry.

At the workshop, private businesses had discussed raising the quality of steel products to meet international standards. "Quality policy and standard criteria were also discussed as they can affect the country's steel production," said U Myint Swe. Danieli Co. Ltd. provides technical solutions for iron and steel sector development. It entered the Myanmar market in 1981, and has branches in Thailand, China, and

Knowledge sharing workshop on rubber standards, production held in Bago

A knowledge sharing workshop was conducted at the City Hall of Bago town last Tuesday with the aim to boost rubber production and ensure quality. The workshop was jointly organized by the Myanmar Rubber Planters and Producers Association and the International Rubber Research and Development Board.

The Bago Region's Minister for Planning and Finance, U Nyunt Shwe, delivered the opening address at the workshop. U Aung Myint Htoo, the chairman of the Myanmar Rubber Planters and Producers Association, and Datuk Dr. Abdul Aziz S.A Kadir, the general secretary of the International Rubber Research and Development Board also made opening remarks at the workshop.

During the workshop, entitled 'International workshop to increase income of rubber farmers with integrated farming system and Good Agricultural Practices', officials and experts spoke about good agriculture practices and ways to increase profit.

The workshop focused on improving rubber standards and specifications, increase foreign currency inflows into the rubber industry, and the socio-economic situation of rubber farmers.

Mon and Kayin states and Taninthayi and Bago regions are the main producers of rubber in Myanmar. There were over 1.6 million acres of rubber farms in the 2017-2018 fiscal year, about 770,000 acres of which could produce latex. About 250,000 tons of rubber is produced every year in the country, with earnings estimated at US\$200 million. Of over 118,000 acres of farms in Bago Region, 51,000 acres account for 16,000 tons of rubber produced in the Bago Region. Rubber is primarily planted in the Intakaw Rubber Special Farming Zone, the Bago Rubber Farming Zone, and the Shwekyin Rubber Farming Zone in the region. —Tin Soe (Bago) (Translated by Ei Myat Mon)



Some are covered in the Article 11 (a) and some are not relevant with the Article 11 (b) and some portions are not connected with the ground reality. Therefore, when we are incorporating and covering all the aspects, we need to be flexible with more concessions, with the intention to loop in more workers with more coverage of social security system.

Currently, when an establishment employs five or more workers, it has to apply for their social security. In many foreign countries, concessions are being made from five workers to three workers, and then from three workers to one worker, resulting with the status that even one employer and one worker could be covered with the broader social security system.

With the nature of social security system, when the security payments are more, then the funds would grow. It would stand strong to deal with the unexpected mishaps, injuries and fatal cases, and that compensation would be facilitated as necessary covering all eventualities. Therefore, it is necessary to provide more assistances and services to make the system strong.



Migrant workers returning even after camp closure

Although the Kyauklonegyi camp in Ward 4 in Myawady in Kayin State was closed on 1 December, Myanmar migrant workers are still returning from Thailand through the Myawady 999 gate located in Ward 5 in Myawady Town, said officials with the Border Guard Force.

"Most migrant workers are returning to extend their passports so they can go back to Thailand under the MoU system, while some are returning to visit their families. We are assisting them and providing them guidance.

More than 600 migrant workers entered Myanmar through the gate between 1 and 12 December," said Lieutenant Moe Swe with Myawady 999 gate's Border Guard Force.

More than 50 migrant workers entered the country through the Myawady 999 gate from the Thailand-Myanmar border gate, after the Mae Sot Immigration office in Thailand scrutinized them.

"I am happy to work in Thailand. I earn Baht325 per day. I have received OT for Baht60 per hour. Now, I've come back to renew my passport under the MoU system.

I had to pay Baht18,000 to my boss because he contacted the company to get a passport under the MoU system," said Maung Yan Soe Naing, a migrant worker from Thayarwady town, Bago Region. After the Thai government started cracking down on illegal migrants, most of the migrant workers

He said a used iron dealer called U Shwe Pu rented Shwe Min Thamee yard in Addatawta Village on the Thilawa-Padagyi road to store his iron wares but, due to inadequate space, he requested help from Security Police Force Subdivision No. 7 and received permission to store his wares on their compound on 18 May 2018. He said U Shwe Pu was notified that a police guesthouse was going to be constructed in the compound and he vacated his wares to Shwe Min Thamee garden on 15 August 2018. Shwe Min Thamee yard is a 4.03-acre wide confiscated land with garden permit from 7 granted to U Tun Hla Oo, said the deputy minister. He said U Shwe Pu has been notified of storing iron wares on a yard-permitted area without permission by the village land management committee three



102-year-old great-granny becomes 'oldest' skydiver

SYDNEY (Australia)—A 102-year-old great-grandmother is believed to have become the world's oldest skydiver after plunging 14,000 feet (4,300 metres) through the South Australian sky.

Centenarian adrenaline junkie Irene O'Shea said she "felt normal" after a 220 kilometre per hour (140 mph) dive that sent her cheeks flapping wildly.

She completed her first skydive to mark her 100th birthday in 2016, but organisers claimed it was Sunday's successful tandem dive at the age of 102 years and 194 days that earned her a place in the history books.

"It was very clear up there, and the weather was good but it was very cold," said O'Shea,

Peter Jackson plans to restore his early 'naughty' films

LOS ANGELES—Filmmaker Peter Jackson has shared his plans to restore his films that he directed before the "Lord of the Rings" trilogy.

The 57-year-old director whose most recent documentary "They Shall Not Grow Old" featured old footage from the World War I which he had upgraded and colourised with the help of modern tools.

Jackson has now confirmed that he will be giving the same treatment to his four old features —"Bad Taste", "Braindead" (also known as "Dead Alive"), "Meet The Feebles" and the Oscar-nominated "Heavenly Creatures".

"I've decided to go back and do this to my old films the first four I made, which I own but never re-released. I've done some tests on 'Braindead', where we took the 16mm negative and put it through our World War I restoration pipeline and s**t, it looks fantastic!" the director told The Hollywood Reporter.

"Bad Taste", a comedy horror splatter film, was Jackson's second directorial project and it released in 1987. "Meet the Feebles" was a musical black comedy that hit the theatres in 1989.

The 1994 psychological drama "Heavenly Creatures", starring Melanie Lynskey and Kate Winslet, was the most acclaimed work of Jackson before he bagged the worldwide attention with "The Lord of the Rings" trilogy.

Jackson said he is interested in remastering them and releasing them as "a nice little box set the early years! The naughty years!"—PTI

James Bond is a "severe" alcoholic—study

WELLINGTON—The fictional British Secret Service agent James Bond is a "severe" alcoholic, according to a new study by public health researchers in New Zealand.

"Bond has drunk heavily and consistently across six decades ... We classified him as having severe alcohol use disorder," said the study titled "Licence to swill: James Bond's drinking over six decades," which was published on Monday in the *Medical Journal* of Australia.

Experts at the University of Otago in New Zealand analyzed a total of 24 Bond movies

from 1962 to 2015 to study his patterns of alcohol use.

The experts found that Bond was seen sipping on alcohol 109 times over the six decades, with an average of 4.5 times per movie, and his peak binge was in 2008's "Quantum of Solace," where he drank six of his signature Vesper Martinis, equal to 24 units of alcohol which could be fatal.

The British agent met more than half of the criteria for alcohol use disorder as defined by the American Psychiatric Association's DSM-5 criteria classification system for mental disorders.

"Chronic risks for Bond include frequently drinking prior to fights, driving vehicles (including in chases), high stakes gambling, operating complex machinery or devices, contact with dangerous animals, extreme athletic performance, and sex with enemies, sometimes with guns or knives in the bed," the study said.

As Bond "has a severe chronic alcohol problem," the study suggested that he should "consider seeking professional help and find other strategies for managing onthe-job stress."—Xinhua

Disney again makes history with takings above \$7bn for 2018

LOS ANGELES (United States)—Walt Disney Studios is again ending the year on a high note, posting more than \$7 billion in global box office earnings, thanks to hits such as "Black Panther" and "Avengers: Infinity War."

"This is only the second time in history any studio has surpassed the \$7 billion mark, after Disney's own industry-record 2016 global gross of \$7.6 billion," the company said in a statement on Monday.

"The Studios' estimated international box office gross

through 9 December is an estimated \$4.069 billion, marking our second biggest year and the third biggest in industry history," it added. Disney's success comes as the studio is set to release "Mary Poppins Returns" on 19 December, which is expected to top the box office during the holiday season.

"To date, four of the top eight worldwide releases of the year are from The Walt Disney Studios, including the top two global and top three domestic releases," the company said.

"Avengers: Infinity War,"

made by Disney's Marvel subsidiary, led the way, earning \$2 billion alone. It is followed by superhero movie "Black Panther," which earned \$1.35 billion worldwide.


"Incredibles 2," made by Pixar, another Disney subsidiary, earned \$1.24 billion.

Other top box office earners for 2018 are "Ant-Man and The Wasp," "Solo: A Star Wars Story," and "Ralph Breaks the Internet," which has held the number one spot at the North American box office for the third consecutive week.—AFP ■

Vast, zombie-like microbial life lurks beneath seabed

TAMPA (United States)—Scientists have drilled a mile and a half (2.5 kilometres) beneath the seabed and found vast underground forests of "deep life," including microbes that persist for thousands, maybe millions of years, researchers said on Monday. Feeding on nothing but the energy from rocks, and existing in a slow-motion, even zombie-like state, previously unknown forms of life are abundant beneath the Earth despite extreme temperatures and pressure.

About 70 per cent of Earth's bacteria and archaea-single-celled organisms with no nucleus-live underground, according to the latest findings of an international collaboration involving hundreds of experts, known as the Deep Carbon Observatory, were released at the American Geophysical Union meeting in

Similar types of strange, deep life microbes might be found on the subsurface of other planets, like Mars. "Most of deep life is very distinct from life on the surface," said Fumio Inagaki, of the Japan Agency for Marine-Earth Science and Technology. Using the Japanese scientific vessel Chikyu, researchers have drilled far beneath the seabed and removed cores that have given scientists a detailed look at deep life.— AFP ■

Cosmonauts will use special water during long space missions

"Drinking water with new functional properties will hold special place in the system of increasing

MOSCOW—Drinking cosmonauts' resistibility to radiation. Of great interest is light isotope water and water with controlled and optimized mineral composition," the conference's report says.

Special attention must be paid to preventing water preservatives, including silver ions, from getting into the cosmonaut's body. Silver is a heavy metal, and heavy metals increase the harmful effects of ionizing radiation. Also, scientists suggest cosmonauts should sleep in special water-filled bags. "For instance, one might consider the feasibility of using sleeping bags filled with water mixed with gel or polyethylene granules. Water and polyethylene contain light elements, including hydrogen. Both provide effective protection from neutrons, both primary and secondary ones," the report says.-Tass

Russian spacewalkers take sample of mystery hole at space station

MOSCOW (Russia)—Using knives and shears, a pair of Russian spacewalkers on Tuesday cut samples of material around a mysterious hole in a Soyuz spacecraft docked on the International Space Station that a Moscow official suggested could have been deliberate sabotage.Roscosmos space agency said the aim was to discover whether the "small but dangerous" hole had been made on Earth or in space. The two-millimetre cavity on the Soyuz spaceship docked at the ISS caused an air leak detected in August, two months after the craft's last voyage. Until Tuesday, astronauts had only been able to examine the hole from inside the spacecraft. During the seven hour, 45 minute spacewalk, veteran cosmonauts Oleg Kononenko and Sergei Prokopyev struggled, but eventually succeeded, in cutting away the insulation covering the hole and taking out a sample to analyse.—AFP
