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## Vice President U Myint Swe: Government succeeds in reopening Kyin San Kyawt Gate

**V**ICE President U Myint Swe, Chairman of the Private Sector Development Committee (PSDC) and businesspersons held the 23<sup>rd</sup> regular meeting at the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry (UMFCCI) office in Yangon yesterday morning.

The Vice President explained that some losses were incurred by farmers and businessmen who were exporting fruits to People's Republic of China due to the closure of Kyin San Kyawt Gate. The Ministry of Commerce responsible for private sector development led a group of officials to meet with Chinese embassy officials; they also conducted a meeting with relevant ministries to coordinate and resolve the matter. On the following day the Kyin San Kyawt Gate was temporarily re-opened easing damages and losses to a certain extent.

In his address to the meet-

ing the Vice President said PSDC was formed on 24 October 2016 with 20 members to effectively

carry out the tasks of private sector development framework.

Five work committees were formed to coordinate with relevant union ministries and state/region governments in resolving difficulties encountered by the businesses. Starting from 2016 December regular meetings were held with businesses and this was the 23<sup>rd</sup> meeting.

Responses to suggestions and submissions on difficulties

faced by businesses up to the 22<sup>nd</sup> meeting were sent back to relevant businesses through UMFCCI.

In addition to matters that were resolved, there were some that need time to resolve fully. For example, in the 22<sup>nd</sup> meeting, 13 difficulties and suggestions were made. Of those, one was about the matter of notification 1/2018 issued by Central Committee of Consumer Protection

about usage instruction of products to be included in Myanmar language or Myanmar and other languages within six months of the issuance of notification. As businesses had difficulties in meeting the six month deadline the matter was raised with the Ministry of Commerce and the Ministry of Health and Sports for extension of the deadline.

In the event, the Union Minister delivered rice worth K 40 million for one month, mats and blankets worth K 9.9 million for

In this matter, officials from the five work committees arranged for public-private dialogues among private businesses and relevant ministries to resolve the matter and thus a certain period of time would be required said the Vice President.

The trade sector plays an important role in the development of a country's economy. Private and public sectors were cooperating towards increasing annual trade volume and conducted trade in excess of US\$ 18.3 billion during the April to September 2018 six months period. According to figures up to end December of fiscal year 2018-2019, the trade volume

reached US\$ 8.117 billion and this was US\$ 0.449 billion more than the same period last year. Private sector participation in trade was US\$ 7.094 billion or 87 percent and this was an increase. However import was more than export and thus export also needed to be increased to achieve trade balance.

Illegal imports through the border were threatening the existence of small and medium enterprises (SMEs) and PSDC has formed illegal trade control and prevention groups in nine regions and states and during September to December 2018, 266 arrests of an estimated Ks 5.9 billion worth of illegal imports were made. Starting a Business section is an important and vital

in increasing the ranking of Ease of Doing Business and starting from 1 August 2018, an online company registration system was started. As payment of registration fee was also through Online Payment, it was an important accomplishment of the e-government system that the Government was implementing. Looking at the latest situation of establishing and re-registering companies, a total of 32,917 companies were re-registered and 8,514 new companies were established during the period 1 August to end December. One outstanding matter was that from 2017 August to December only 3,758 new companies were formed while during the August-December period of 2018, 8,514 new companies were registered under the new system of Myanmar Companies Online (MyCo) electronic registry system. This was more than double in new registrations and thus showed the ease and smoothness of starting a business.

Investment Forums were held in Kayah State, Mandalay Region and Ayeyawady Region during 2018 to highlight investment opportunities and attract investments. Local and foreign investors were able to meet directly with officials from states and regions and opportunities to raise investment were obtained. Investment Forums have been arranged to be held in Rakhine and Chin State in February and March 2019 respectively.

Associations and entities participating in today's meeting were urged to discuss openly the difficulties they were facing with the relevant Union Ministers, Deputy Ministers and officials who were in attendance, said the Vice President.

Next, PSDC Vice Chairman and Union Minister for Commerce Dr. Than Myint explained

about works conducted for private sector development.

Afterwards Union Minister for Planning and Finance U Soe Win explained about the status of drawing up and implementing Myanmar Sustainable Development Plan (MSDP) and works conducted for development of banking and insurance works.

This was followed by Union Minister for Investment and Foreign Economic Relations U Thaug Tun who explained about the ministry's work on increasing local and foreign investments.

Yangon Region Chief Minister U Phyo Min Thein then explained about works conducted and future works in Yangon Region for private sector development.

Later Improving the Ease of Doing Business Ranking Group leader Deputy Minister for Commerce U Aung Htoo explained about future work processes to increase Ease of Doing Business Ranking.

UMFCCI President U Zaw Min Win also explained about conducting public-private discussions, increasing export sector and status of sector wise works.

Officials from Chin State Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Myanmar Livestock Federation, Myanmar Oil Mill-

ers Association and UMFCCI then discussed about sector wise difficulties faced and made suggestions.

The Vice President, Union Ministers and officials responded to suggestions made and questions raised by the private sector business entrepreneurs.

It is learnt that the following officials also attended the meeting: Vice-Chairman of PSDC and Union Minister for Commerce Dr. Than Myint, Union Minister for Planning and Finance U Soe Win, Union Minister for Investment and Foreign Economic Relations U Thaug Tun, Yangon Region Chief Minister U Phyo Min Thein, Deputy Minister for Commerce U Aung Htoo, Deputy Minister for Education U Win Maw Tun, Deputy Minister for Planning and Finance U Maung Maung Win, Yangon Region minister for development affairs U Maung Maung Soe, UMFCCI President, Vice Presidents and members, Permanent Secretaries, Directors General, officials from Chin State Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Myanmar Livestock Federation and Myanmar Oil Millers Association.

The meeting came to a close after some closing remarks by the Vice President. — MNA ■

## Rakhine State Chief Minister provides aid to displaced people in Ponnagyun Township

RAKHINE State Chief Minister U Nyi Pu, together with officials, met yesterday with displaced people temporarily residing at Ahtet Myat Lay Village in Ponnagyun Township, Rakhine State, and provided them with aid.

During the meeting, Chief Minister U Nyi Pu said the government is striving to fulfill the requirements of local residents who were displaced from their places of origin due to the security situation.

Also, doctors, nurses and medical equipment needed for healthcare will be provided, he said. Afterwards, the Chief Minister and party coordinated the delivery of basic requirements, such as food, health care and drinking water, for the displaced people.

On behalf of the Rakhine State government, Rakhine State Chief Minister and wife, and Rakhine State ministers distributed cash assistance of K 4.2 million along with 200 bottles of drinking water and 82 family kits to 427 dis-

placed people from 88 households in Ahtet Myat Lay Village.

On behalf of the Ministry of Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement, Dr. Ko Ko Naing of the Natural Disaster Management Department, also distributed cash assistance totaling K 3.753 million for a one month supply of rice, K 440,000 for 88 mats, K 416,110 for 176 blankets and K 50,000 to a pregnant woman. — Tin Tun (IPRD) ■

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**Winter birds to be registered at four sites across Myanmar**

WINTER birds (or water birds) migrate to the southern regions of the world, including Myanmar, from November to February. As part of the Asian Waterbird Census Activity, water birds will be registered and the information sent to Wetlands International, said U Thet Zaw Naing, a bird expert from WCS.

A team registered the waterbirds on 6 January at Paleik Lake and Pyu Kan Lake in Mandalay Region. Also, separate teams will register waterbirds in Indawgyi Lake in Kachin State and Mo-yungyi Lake in Bago Region today. "The largest flock among the winter birds are ducks. The northern part of the Earth is colder in the winter season. Food is also scarce there, so they migrate to southern Myanmar and Asian

countries to find food, and also because it's warmer and the days are longer. They don't lay eggs here. They'll do that when they return north," said U Thet Zaw Naing. He noted that officials collect the data annually and send it to the Netherlands-based Wetland International during the first week of May. He said

hobbyists and the Department for Environmental and Wildlife Conservation are registering other migrating animals along the coastal regions.

U Thet Zaw Naing added that in the beginning, only the Forestry Department conducted the registrations, but has since received assistance from NGOs

and enthusiasts.

Myanmar first started conducting registrations in 1987. Currently, the Forestry Department, WCS, Myanmar Birdwatchers Association, international birdwatchers and other organizations help with registrations in the Mandalay Region. (Translated by Zaw Htet Oo) ■

**Authorities destroy expired drugs, food, cosmetics in Mandalay**

MANDALAY Region authorities destroyed expired drugs, cosmetics and foodstuff, worth an estimated K 280 million on Friday morning.

At the ceremony held at Ayeyeiknyein Cemetery in Patheingyi Township, a wide range of drugs, food and cosmetics were incinerated. The destroyed items included expired drugs provided by pharmaceutical companies, unsafe food products and consumer goods seized from the market,

along with illegally imported drugs and cosmetics.

Collaborative efforts have

been made by members of the Mandalay City Development Committee (MCDC) and Man-

dalay Region Food and Drugs Administration to seize more drugs, food and cosmetics that are unfit for consumption.

**Four killed, three injured by truck following brake failure in Muse**

FOUR people were killed and three others injured when a 22-wheel truck collided with a motorbike and a 12-wheel truck in Talon Village, Muse Township, Muse District, Shan State (North), on Friday 11 January, police reported.

The accident occurred at 2.30 p.m. when the 22-wheel truck heading to Lashio from Muse, and being driven by 55-year-old U Khin Soe with two

others on board, lost control between mileposts Nos. 265/6 and 265/7 near Nampaw Bridge and struck two people riding on a motorbike on the same side of the road. The truck only stopped after it struck a 12-wheel truck on the opposite side and overturned. The truck was heavily damaged.

In the 22-wheel truck, the driver and his passenger, Saing Naung Tun Lwin, sustained inju-

ries due to the crash, while Saing Lwin Ko died on the spot due to serious injuries to his head.

The accident also killed the two men on the motorbike and the driver of the 12-wheel truck, while injuring another person in the 12-wheel truck. The injured persons are now receiving medical treatment at Muse General Hospital.

An investigation at the site showed that the accident was

caused by a brake malfunction of the 22-wheel truck. The total loss caused by the accident has been placed at approximately K 15.3 million.

Police have filed a case against the 22-wheel truck driver under Section 279/337/338/304 (a) of the Penal Code, charging him with careless driving.—Van Ro Htan ■

# Mineral exports decrease 24% in Q1

MINERAL exports between Myanmar and overseas trade partners were valued at US\$296 million in fiscal year 2018-2019, down by \$95 million or 24.4 per cent, as against the same period in the last 2017-2018 FY, the Ministry of Commerce reported.

For the same period during the last FY, mineral exports totalled \$392.159 million, with \$303 million by the private sector and \$88.6 million in the public sector.

In the first quarter of this FY, the public sector's exports of minerals amounted to \$0.4 million, a decline of \$88.28 million from the corresponding period last FY. Also during this period, private exporters sold over \$296 million, which was a slight decrease in value by \$7.4 million against last FY.

Other products which saw

a decrease in export growth in the current FY included forest-based products and other miscellaneous products. When

compared with this time last FY, the current export value of forest products declined by \$6.9 million, whereas this year's export of

miscellaneous products dropped by nearly half.

According to data from the Commerce Ministry, the coun-

try earned \$3.7 billion from the export of seven major groups of commodities, such as agricultural, mineral, marine, animal, and forest products, manufactured goods, and other miscellaneous items. During the corresponding period last FY, the country earned \$3.56 billion from the export sector. Within the 2018 mini budget period between April and September, the country's mineral exports were valued at \$1.034 billion. As per the ministry's yearly trade report, the value of mineral exports was pegged at \$897 million in the 2011-2012FY, \$399 million in the 2012-2013FY, \$1.339 billion in the 2013-2014FY, \$1.498 billion in the 2014-2015FY, \$968 million in the 2015-2016FY, and \$1.010 billion in the 2016-2017FY.—Khine Khant ■ (Translated by Khaing Thanda Lwin)

## Rules revoked for collecting charges on foreign currency deposits: Planning & Finance Minister

THE Ministry of Planning and Finance has requested revocation of the collection of 0.03 per cent bank service charges for foreign currency deposits at the two state-owned banks, Myanmar Foreign Trade Bank (MFTB) and Myanmar Investment and Commercial Bank (MICB), said U Soe Win, the Union Minister for Planning and Finance.

He revealed the change at the 23<sup>rd</sup> regular meeting held on 12 January at the Office of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry (UMFCCI). Vice President U Myint Swe and entrepreneurs were present at the meeting.

"Our state-owned banks were not losing money, until

now. We always earned a profit. But those who deposit foreign currencies at our state-owned banks will now have to pay 0.03 per cent whenever they deposit foreign currencies. In fact, it is the banks that pay interest to those who deposit their money at our banks. Now, it is just the opposite, with customers having to pay the money. It does not make sense and it is not fair for customers. There are four banks which are still using the manual accounting system. We have requested the banks not to take any service charges for depositing foreign currencies. We believe that our request is quite good for customers," said U Soe Win, the Union Minister for Planning and Finance. The private banks are instituting reforms in the fi-

ancial sector and the banking sector. In so doing, some banks are trying to meet international standards of conducting transactions. Also, some local private banks have been operating their businesses for 25 years. So local banks become competitive with their foreign counterparts, foreign banks will be permitted to operate in Myanmar beginning next year. "Besides charging for deposits, banks are selling forms. We are worried that there might be some problems in making money by selling forms. As I said, there are no banks that are running at a loss, but we don't want banks to earn money through the selling of forms. Therefore, we have submitted this matter to the government."

"When banks come to invest

in Myanmar through cooperation with private banks, we will let them work under the rules and regulations," said Union Minister U Soe Win. The Digital Economic Development Committee, led by Vice President-2, is giving priority to the financial sector. The e-banking business will be conducted and e-payments will be made across the country to eliminate delays. Moreover, the Ministry of Planning and Finance is taking measures to ensure the use of cyber security to guarantee the safety of e-payment systems. The state-owned banks include the Myanma Economic Bank, Myanma Agricultural Development Bank, Myanma Foreign Trade Bank and Myanma Investment and Commercial Bank.— (Translated by Hay Mar) ■

## Border trade with ITCs reaches nearly K 16 bln in current FY

BORDER trade using the Individual Trading Card (ITC) hit nearly K 16 billion, as of 28 December of 2018-2019 FY, comprised of exports valued at K 3 billion and imports worth K 12.9 billion, according to statistics provided by the Ministry of Commerce. Of Myanmar's border gates, the Myawady and Mawtaung checkpoints experienced the largest amount of trade with ITCs, with estimated values of K 7.9 billion and K 4.6 billion, respectively. The border trade values with ITCs, as of 28 December this FY, were over K 1.6 billion in Tamu, over K 18 million in Muse, K 44 million in Tachilek, over K 3.4 million in Lweje, over K 536 million in Kanpikete, K 727 million in Kawthoung, over K 53.9 million in Reed, and K 279 million in Keng Tung, according to Commerce Ministry statistics. The Trade Department has issued 1,589 cards so far, with 292 cards from 21 Nov 2012 to 31<sup>st</sup> March 2013, 261 cards in 2013-2014 FY, 317 cards in 2014-2015 FY, 146 cards in 2015-2016, 248 cards in 2016-2017 FY, 168 cards in 2017-2018 FY, 92 cards from 1 April 2018 to the 30 Sep 2018 interim period, and 65 cards from 1 Oct 2018 to 28 Dec 2018.—Zwe ■ (Translated by Hay Mar)

## CMP imports up over 26% in current FY

MYANMAR'S CMP imports in the first quarter (Q1) of the 2018-2019 fiscal year stood at nearly US\$559 million, up by \$118 million or 26.7 per cent from the corresponding period in the last 2017-2018 FY, according to data released by the Ministry of Commerce.

In Q1 of the last FY, the country's CMP imports by the private sector was \$441.5 million.

Also, during the week be-

tween 29 December, 2018 and 4 January, 2019, local importers bought CMP products valued at \$31.132 million, which went up by \$11.5 million in comparison with this time last FY, when the import of CMP products totalled \$19.6 million.

Imported by the private sector, CMP is one of the major groups of import products. Myanmar also imports capital goods, intermediate products and con-

sumer goods from international countries. Between 1 October and 4 January this FY, the country imported capital goods worth \$1.5 billion, intermediate goods worth \$1.7 billion, and consumer products valued at \$870 million.

The private sector imports registered a decline this FY. Apart from CMP, private sector imports of capital goods, intermediate goods, and consumer goods decreased by over \$150 million,

matched against this time last FY.

During the current fiscal year, the country has imported goods amounting to \$3.9 billion through the maritime routes, and goods reaching over \$712 million through the border points of entry. The country's total imports decreased by over \$53 million from the same period last year.— Shwe Khine ■

# Meeting to form WCC held in Hlinethaya Township

LABOUR authorities and representatives of employers and employees held a meeting in Hlinethaya Industrial Zone in Yangon yesterday to form the Workers Coordinating Committee-WCC.

At the meeting, Union Minister U Thein Swe said those at the meeting seek to form Workers Coordinating Committees in factories, workshops and work sites, which will become the basic group for peacefully settling disagreements.

The ministry is prioritizing the enacting and amending of labour laws, in addition to creating job opportunities, ensuring that workers have appropriate jobs, as well as safe and healthy work sites, and obtain their rights, in accordance with existing labour laws.

According to the Settlement

# China's Huawei fires employee detained in Poland

BEIJING (China) — Huawei said Saturday it has fired a Chinese employee who was arrested in Poland on espionage allegations, as China's telecom giant distanced itself from the case amid Western concerns that it could act as a proxy for Chinese security services.

This week's detention of Wang Weijing follows the December arrest of Huawei's chief financial officer in Canada and US efforts to blacklist the company internationally over security concerns.

While China's government has vociferously defended Huawei CFO Meng Wanzhou and demanded her release, the firm swiftly sacked Wang, who works at its representative office in Poland. "His alleged actions have no relation to the company," Huawei said in a statement to AFP.

"In accordance with the terms and conditions of Huawei's labour contract, we have made this decision because the incident in question has brought Huawei into disrepute," it said.

"Huawei complies with all applicable laws and regulations in the countries where it operates, and we require every employee to abide by the laws and regulations in the countries where they are based."

A Polish man was also arrested for alleged espionage along with Wang on Tuesday. Both men are suspected of having "worked for Chinese services and to the detriment of Poland," said Pol-

ish special services spokesman Stanislaw Zaryn. He said their apartments and workplaces were searched, adding that the Polish suspect had worked "for several state institutions".

The Chinese foreign ministry said Friday it was "highly concerned" about the case and later said it was seeking to arrange a consular visit for Wang as soon as possible. The Chinese embassy in Poland has also asked Warsaw to "effectively ensure the legitimate rights and interests, and humanitarian and safe treatment of the person involved."

## Western fears

According to the LinkedIn profile of "Stanislaw Wang" — Wang's Polish name, according to Polish media TVP — the detained Huawei employee worked at the Chinese consulate in Gdansk, Poland prior to his tenure at the Chinese tech firm.

At Huawei, Wang worked as a public relations director for more than five years before moving into his current role as sales director in 2017.

He is a graduate of the Beijing University of Foreign Studies.

His case is the latest setback

for Huawei.

Its chief financial officer Meng Wanzhou was arrested in Vancouver on 1 December on request from the United States, which has accused her of fraud related to violations of Iran sanctions. Meng is the daughter of Huawei founder Ren Zhengfei, a former Chinese People's Liberation Army engineer.

Following her arrest two Canadians were detained in China on grounds of endangering national security, in what has largely been seen as retaliation.

Meng's arrest sparked a

surge of patriotism in China with companies encouraging staff to buy Huawei smartphones — and several companies even offering employees subsidies to buy phones from the home-grown company.

## 'No evidence'

Huawei in December said it expects to see a 21 per cent rise in revenue for 2018 despite what it called "unfair treatment" around the world, as several countries banned its telecommunications technology.

Last month, Britain's largest mobile provider BT said that it would remove Huawei equipment from its cellular network after the foreign intelligence service called the company a security risk.

Australia and New Zealand have also enacted similar bans, leaving Canada the only country in the "Five Eyes" intelligence network not to take steps against the Chinese firm.

Last month, a senior EU official warned that the bloc should be "worried" about Huawei and other Chinese firms.

Huawei has rejected Western concerns, saying there was "no evidence" that it poses a threat to the national security of any country.

Huawei's business is thriving in many places. Last year the company said it had signed memorandums of understanding for 5G equipment with 45 operators in Asia, Europe and North America.—AFP ■

## Pompeo 'optimistic' Syria Kurds, Turkey can be protected

ABU DHABI (United Arab Emirates) — Washington's top diplomat said Saturday he was "optimistic" a way could be found to protect Syrian Kurds while allowing Turks to "defend their country from terrorists" despite a US pullout from Syria.

"We are confident we can achieve an outcome that achieves both of those," Secretary of State Mike Pompeo told journalists in Abu Dhabi.

The Gulf emirate is his latest stop in a regional tour aimed at reassuring allies after a shock December announcement by President Donald Trump that US troops would be withdrawn from Syria.

Pompeo's remarks follow tensions between the US and Turkey over the fate of Wash-

ington's Syrian Kurdish allies in the fight against Islamic State jihadists.

Turkey had reacted angrily to suggestions that Trump's plan to withdraw troops was conditional on the safety of the US-backed Kurdish fighters, seen

by the Turkish government as terrorists.

US-led operations against IS in Syria have been spearheaded on the ground by the Kurdish-dominated Syrian Democratic Forces.

Turkey sees the backbone of

that alliance, the Kurdish People's Protection Units (YPG), as a terrorist group linked to the Kurdistan Worker's Party (PKK) which has fought a decades-long insurgency against the Turkish state.

Pompeo said Friday that Washington recognised "the Turkish people's right and (Turkish President Recep Tayyip) Erdogan's right to defend their country from terrorists".

But, he added, "we also know that those are fighting alongside of us for all this time deserve to be protected as well."

Pompeo said he had spoken to Turkey's Foreign Minister Mevlut Cavusoglu.

"Many details (are) still to be worked out but I'm optimistic that we can achieve a good outcome," he said.—AFP ■

## Egypt police kill 6 militants in shootout: ministry

CAIRO (Egypt) — Egyptian police killed six suspected Islamist militants in a shootout early Saturday in the country's south, the interior ministry said.

The clashes broke out during a police raid on a militant hideout in a mountainous area on the edge of the southern province of Sohag, some 460 kilometres (285 miles) south of Cairo, the ministry said in a statement. Police seized weapons and ammunition, it added. The operation is part of "the interior ministry's efforts to confront terrorist organisations aiming to undermine security and stability" in Egypt, it said.—AFP ■

# Creating community-owned plantations in Taninthayi Region, while conserving natural forests

**A**BOUT two miles from the 60-mile village in Taninthayi Region are the wide plains located between the mountain ranges. The village lies near the Ye-Dawei road sixty miles from Dawei in Yebyu Township.

On the plains are nearly 800 acres of community-owned forests, a small number of huts and crop fields including rice, sesame, corn, watermelon and banana fields.

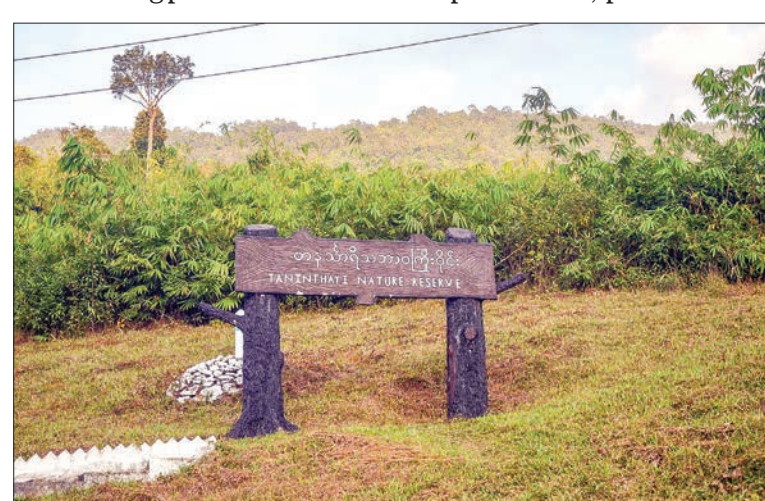
"Villagers collectively established community-owned forest plantations one year ago, and now the trees are thriving," said U Lay Maung, a Mon ethnic and the administrator of the village.

In the past, local people had doubt about the community forest-CF. But thanks to the awareness campaign of the Forest Department, more people are growing trees, according to locals.

"There was mistrust. But trainings and all-inclusive discussions have erased the mistrust and later locals began to realize the benefits they can enjoy for their own labour. So they working with greater enthusiasm. But we haven't reached the satisfactory level yet," said U Lay Maung.

The 60-mile village has 84 households, 227 residents and an 800-acre forest plantation is under the care of 79 households. The village is in Yebyu Township, an agro-oriented area populated mostly by Mons.

Deputy Speaker of Thaninthayi Region Hluttaw U Kyi Soe said: "Ethnic people in the area live in the reserve forests. They are not acknowledged by the Forest Department. So we encourage them to set up legal CFs, apart from building production roads."

Under the national forest master plan, local people will receive 25 per cent of their fuel from trees they grow in their yards, another 25 per cent from the CFs, and the remaining 48.8 per cent from natural forests. So, the plan will result in saving the natural forests a lot.

A CF project was launched in 1995 for the locals to gain benefits without harming the natural environment through their participation in forest preservation. But it was not so successful because of the confines and the weakness of education campaigns. But thanks to an appropriate CF project adopted in 2016, public interest

in forest plantations began to rise, according to Forest Department.

"CF will benefit the posterity. Today, we are enjoying the benefits of trees because of the efforts of our ancestors to conserve them," said Naw Ar Phaw, a 69-year old Kayin elder woman who is a member of the CF in Yebyu Township.

Fifty percent of Myanmar was once covered with forests. The country extracted more forest resources during the past three decades for export and local consumption. Sadly, forest areas significantly dwindled because of legal and illegal logging coupled with firewood and charcoal production. The result of forest depletion is the increase in carbon dioxide in the air, followed by climate change that destroys the natural environment and triggers various kinds of natural disasters.

Those natural disasters have killed people as well as wildlife. So the government and the people became aware of the need to protect the ecosystem and forests.

"Forests can grow and flourish without human beings. They can regenerate. But human beings cannot survive without trees and ecosystem. So forest conservation means protecting

the natural resources and human beings," explained U Kyaw Zeya, director of Taninthayi Region Forest Department.

About 50 years ago, 80 percent of Taninthayi Region was covered by forests. But the 2015 figures indicated that forested land had reduced to 62 percent, according to Forest Department.

"Oil palm cultivation project is the main culprit that destroyed the forested areas of the region. With the aim of turning the region to an oil bowl, over 200,000 acres of forest inside and outside the reserve areas were permitted cut down to clear land for oil palm farms," said U Kyaw Zeya.

Myanmar set up 233,077 areas of community forest plantations during the period between fiscal year 2016-2017 and 2017-2018.

At the 18<sup>th</sup> Energy Globe Award presentation ceremony held in Iran in January 2018, the CF of Yoesone village in Wundwin Township, Meiktila Township, won the Energy Globe National Award, according to the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation.

of carbon dioxide emission they can cut. UN-REDD Programme in cooperation with Forest Department is implementing the REDD+ program covering the task of setting up CFs, extracting timber through less harmful means, and regenerating forests.

According to environmentalists, Myanmar must conserve forests and protect mangrove trees along the coastal areas to reduce carbon dioxide emission.

As for the countries with coastal areas, mangrove forests are the jewels the nature has presented. In fact, various species of trees grow in mangrove forests which serve as a home for fauna

and the source of food for them.

A hectare of mangrove trees can absorb 17 metric tons of carbon per year. So they are much valuable for environmental conservation.

"Mangrove forests can absorb thrice the volume of carbon dioxide their terrestrial cousins can do. So mangrove forests are air cleaning factories of the Earth," said U Kyaw Zeya.

According to FAO report, Myanmar has the seventh largest mangrove forest in the world. Mangrove forest conservation and plantation project will be launched along the coastal areas from 2019 to 2023.

In Taninthayi Region, there are over 300,000 acres of community forest plantations and nearly 600,000 acres of mangrove forests. Measures are being taken to conserve and protect mangrove trees through community-owned plantations.

"The economy of Taninthayi Region depends on fisheries. About half the population of people living in coastal areas earns

their living through fisheries. As the sustainability of aqua resources will ensure the survival of fishery industry, we need to conserve them as they provide food and shelter for many aqua creatures," explained U Kyaw Zeya.

While watching crops grown in the community-owned forest, U Lay Maung, a Mon ethnic, said, "When I first arrived here 16 years ago, the area was lush with flora. Later, the area became void of trees due to forest fires and timber extraction. Then bamboo forests took over their place. But I believe that soon, the area will be lush with trees again."

# Educational reforms: a major step forward

Nowadays, the government has put great emphasis on education. Educational reforms have been extensively discussed by educationists from different levels. Dr. Than Oo, U Ko Lay Win, Dr. Aung Aung Min, Dr. Win Aung and U Hla Tun are prominent educationists who get involved in roundtable discussions on educational reforms, covering a wide range of topics which mainly include education, teaching and learning. Now let us have a look at the historical background of Myanmar education standard in Asia. Myanmar Language has borrowed words from Pali and Sanskrit since the advent of contact with these languages. As Myanmar is considered a major cultural and religious centre of Buddhism, the monastic schools flourished before the British colonial rule. During 1950s, many Asians were believed to have come to the then Rangoon University for further studies.

## Education, teaching and learning

They are interrelated; the government is responsible for educational systems. It must accept a responsibility that teachers play an important role in our society, making us become successful in business or worldly affairs. Only those who genuinely want to teach should become teachers, be it male or female. Usually classrooms are staffed by teachers who had failed in other lines of work and turned to teaching as a last resort. After all, teaching still is not a get-rich-quick profession. For example, a chemical engineer with a bachelor's degree would most likely get a higher starting salary than would a teacher with a bachelor's degree.

## Learning

Careful planning is a vital phase of good learning. The nature of planning is affected by age levels and other factors. The amount of detail in planning is influenced by the experience of the teacher. It can be assumed that a teacher who steps into a classroom unprepared for his task is not likely to engage in good teaching. Systematic studies of learning never cease; learning is a never-ending process and lifelong learning must be pursued by all teachers. In conclusion, the roundtable discussions on educational reforms are timely to replace the old outdated education systems. The advice and valuable suggestions given by prominent educationists should be implemented as quickly as possible. All in all the movement is a major step forward for the development of education sector.

## Education

Education is the process of facilitating learning, or the acquisition of knowledge, skills, values, beliefs and habits. At the same time, educational methods include storytelling, discussion, teaching, training and directed research. Education frequently takes place under the guidance of educators, but learners may also educate themselves.

## Teaching

Teaching is difficult to define; in 1966 the UNESCO/ ILO recommended concerning teaching something like this: "Teaching is a form of public service that requires teachers of expert knowledge and specialized skills, required and maintained through rigorous study; it also calls for a sense of personal and corporal responsibility for the education welfare of the pupils in their charge." The officials from UN organizations confessed that they could not step into a classroom and teach effectively. An attitude of informality between teacher and student is important in both teaching and learning. Such a relationship can only grow out of feeling of mutual respect between the persons concerned. So dealing with students for some time is necessary and in this regard trainings for all teachers are required for specialized skills.

## Good teaching seldom happens accidentally

Even if necessary preparations are made, good teaching cannot be expected to come instantly. In the history of education, the Latin grammar teachers who were masters of their subjects happened to be very poor instructors. They had a great deal of knowledge but were lacking in the skills and techniques that make the difference between an educated person and an effective teacher.

# World stocks end strong week on tepid note

NEW YORK (United States)—Stock markets in Europe and the United States slipped on Friday after several days of gains as investors took a breather in the absence of fresh news on trade talks between Beijing and Washington.

Earlier, Asian markets ended the week mostly on a higher note. Key European markets were as much as half a per cent lower at the close, while Wall Street finished a sleepy session marginally lower.

“US stocks are lower for the first day this week, paring a third-consecutive weekly advance that has come from lingering trade optimism and cooled concerns regarding the Fed making a policy mistake,” said analysts at Charles Schwab.

“Equities are slipping amid likely caution ahead of the ramp up of earnings season that coincided with the Q4 market tumult,” they said.

But analysts also said that the first full trading week of 2019 showed a solid performance after a tumultuous month of December for equities.

“Despite a lackluster end to the week, 2019 has managed to get off to a decent start despite equity markets finishing 2018 very much on the back foot,” said Michael Hewson, chief market analyst at CMC Markets UK.

This week investors have been riding a wave of optimism

on signs that China and the United States could eventually reach a trade deal—but there has been no concrete news yet even though both sides indicated that talks had been productive.

“Traders have yet to hear any further details about the US-China trade talks,” said

CMC Markets UK analyst David Madden, saying in the meantime markets “appear to be taking a breather.”

Sentiment was also boosted this week after Federal Reserve chief Jerome Powell indicated the US central bank would likely slow the pace of interest rate hikes. Fed minutes on Wednes-

day showed policymakers were happy to hold off any more rate hikes as they assessed the state of the economy, backing up dovish comments last week by Powell.

These positive factors have allowed investors to set aside fears over a global economic slowdown that pummeled markets in December, as well as mounting concerns over a prolonged US government shutdown due to a budget dispute between President Donald Trump and congressional Democrats. A key catalyst for markets in the coming period will be fourth-quarter earnings period, which begins in earnest with results from JPMorgan Chase and other large banks.

Among individual companies, General Motors surged 7.1 per cent after forecasting better-than-expected profits for 2018 and 2019 following the job cuts announced in December.

The outlook also predicted solid sales in both the United States and China, despite trade war uncertainty that has raised uncertainty in both markets.—AFP ■

## Nissan executive seen as close to Ghosn steps down

TOKYO—An executive of Nissan Motor Co who was seen as close to Carlos Ghosn, the ousted chairman of the Japanese automaker, has resigned, a company official said on Saturday, as investigations into allegations of financial misconduct against the once high-flying industry titan widen.

Jose Munoz, a native of Spain, held the position of Nissan’s chief performance officer, in charge of overseeing its glob-

al operations. Munoz was particularly responsible for the automaker’s key Chinese market but had recently taken a leave of absence.

Nissan explained Munoz’s leave as due to his need to focus on different tasks. But a Nissan official said at the time that the “current management team was on alert against him as he is loyal (to Ghosn).”

From 2014 to January last year, Munoz served as chairman

of Nissan’s North American operations, after being in charge of sales and marketing in Latin America.

Tokyo prosecutors and Nissan’s internal investigations have been expanding since Ghosn’s ouster as chairman of the automaker at a board meeting on 22 November following his arrest for allegedly understating his remuneration in financial documents submitted to Japanese regulators for five fiscal years through March 2015.

On Friday, Ghosn was charged with two additional counts of financial misdeeds—aggravated breach of trust and violation of the financial instruments law by understating his remuneration for three fiscal years to March 2018.

Nissan has reportedly broadened the scope of its ongoing in-house probe to include decisions made in the past in the United States, Latin America and India.—Kyodo News ■

## Industrial growth falls to 17-month low of 0.5 pc in November

NEW DELHI—Industrial output growth dropped to a 17-month low of 0.5 per cent in November on account of contraction in manufacturing sector, particularly consumer and capital goods. Factory output as measured in terms of the Index of Industrial Production (IIP) had grown by 8.5 per cent in November 2017, as per data released by the Central Statistics Office (CSO) on Friday.

The previous low was in June 2017, when IIP growth contracted by 0.3 per cent. The growth for October 2018 was revised upwards to 8.4 per cent from 8.1 per cent. During the April-November period, industrial output grew 5 per cent as compared to 3.2 per cent in the same period of the previous fiscal.

The manufacturing sector, which constitutes 77.63 per cent of the index, recorded a contraction of 0.4 per cent in November as against a growth of 10.4 per cent a year ago.

The mining sector posted 2.7 per cent growth during the month as against 1.4 per cent in November 2017. Power sector output also grew by 5.1 per cent from 3.9 per cent a year ago.

Capital goods output declined by 3.4 per cent, compared to 3.7 per cent growth a year ago. Consumer durables output also dipped by 0.9 per cent as against a growth of 3.1 per cent a year earlier. Consumer non-durable goods also saw a contraction of 0.6 per cent as compared to 23.7 per cent growth a year ago.

In terms of industries, 10 out of 23 industry groups in the manufacturing sector showed positive growth during November 2018.

As per use-based classification, the growth rates in November 2018 over November 2017 are 3.2 per cent in primary goods, (-) 4.5 per cent in intermediate goods and 5 per cent in infrastructure/construction goods.—PTI ■

# Government shutdown becomes longest in US history

WASHINGTON (United States)—The US government shutdown that has left 800,000 federal employees without salaries as a result of President Donald Trump's row with Democrats over building a Mexico border wall entered a record 22<sup>nd</sup> day on Saturday.

The Democrats' refusal to approve \$5.7 billion demanded by Trump for the wall project has paralyzed Washington, with the president retaliating by refusing to sign off on budgets for swaths of government departments unrelated to the dispute. As a result, workers as diverse as FBI agents, air traffic controllers and museum staff, did not receive paychecks on Friday.

The partial shutdown of the government became the longest on record at midnight Friday (0500 GMT Saturday), when it overtook the 21-day stretch in 1995-1996, under president Bill Clinton. Trump on Friday backed off a series of previous threats to end the deadlock by declaring a national emergency and attempting to secure the funds without congressional approval. "I'm not going to do it so fast," he said at a White House meeting.

Trump described an emergency declaration as the "easy way out" and said Congress had to step up to the responsibility of approving the \$5.7 billion. "If they can't do it... I will declare a national emergency. I have the absolute right," he insisted. Until now, Trump had suggested numerous times that he was getting closer to taking the controversial decision. Only minutes earlier, powerful Re-

publican ally Senator Lindsey Graham tweeted after talks with Trump: "Mr President, Declare a national emergency NOW." It was not clear what made Trump change course. But Trump himself acknowledged in the White House meeting that an attempt to claim emergency powers would likely end up in legal battles going all the way to the Supreme Court. Opponents say that a unilateral move by the president over the sensitive border issue would be constitutional overreach and set a dangerous precedent in similar controversies.

## 'Under siege'

The standoff has turned into a test of political ego, particularly for Trump, who came into office boasting of his deal making powers and making an aggressive border policy

the keystone of his nationalist agenda.

Democrats, meanwhile, seem determined at all costs to prevent a president who relishes campaign rally chants of "build the wall!" from getting a win.

Both Democrats and Republicans agree that the US-Mexican frontier presents major challenges, ranging from the hyper-violent Mexican drug trade to the plight of asylum seekers and poor migrants seeking new lives in the world's richest country. There's also little debate that border walls are needed: about a third of the frontier is already fenced off. But Trump has turned his single-minded push for more walls into a political crusade seen by opponents as a stunt to stoke xenophobia in his right-wing voter base, while wilfully

ignoring the border's complex realities.

For Trump, who visited the Texas border with Mexico on Thursday, the border situation amounts to an invasion by criminals that can only be solved by more walls. "We have a country that's under siege," he told the local officials in the White House.

Some studies show that illegal immigrants generally commit fewer crimes than people born in the United States, although not everyone agrees on this.

More certain is that while narcotics do enter the country across remote sections of the border, most are sneaked through heavily guarded checkpoints in vehicles, the government's own Drug Enforcement Administration said in a 2017 report. —AFP ■

## FBI opened probe into whether Trump working for Russians

WASHINGTON (United States)—The Federal Bureau of Investigation opened an inquiry in 2017 into whether US President Donald Trump was working on behalf of Russia, *The New York Times* reported on Friday. The investigation—a dual counterintelligence and criminal probe—was launched after the president fired FBI director James Comey in May 2017, the *Times* said, citing anonymous sources. The counterintelligence aspect consisted of determining whether Trump was knowingly or unknowingly working for Moscow and whether he was a threat to national security, the newspaper reported. It added the criminal portion related to Trump's firing of Comey. The FBI investigation was soon folded into Robert Mueller's inquiry into Russian interference in the 2016 vote and possible collusion between his campaign and Moscow, it said, adding that it was unclear if the counterintelligence aspect was still being pursued. The *Times* said that the FBI had been suspicious of Trump's ties to Russia during the 2016 campaign.

But it held off on opening an investigation until the president sacked Comey, who refused to swear his allegiance and roll back the nascent Russia investigation, which is now being spearheaded by Mueller. Trump has repeatedly criticized the Mueller investigation as a "witch hunt" and views it as a stain on the legitimacy of his presidency. But while Trump has slammed the probe as baseless, it has issued dozens of indictments and steadily chalked up convictions of some of the president's close associates—including his former personal lawyer; his ex-campaign chief and his former national security advisor.—AFP ■

## Several injured in powerful blast at Paris bakery: police

PARIS (France)—A powerful explosion badly damaged a bakery in central Paris on Saturday, injuring several people and smashing nearby windows after a suspected gas leak, police and AFP journalists said.

A fire broke out after the blast at around 9am (0800 GMT) in the city's 9<sup>th</sup> district, a residential and shopping area.

Images posted on Twitter showed debris covering the street and the lower part of the building blown out and in flames. Parked cars were also damaged in the blast.

An AFP photographer saw at least one person being carried away on a stretcher from the building by firefighters.

Firefighters worked to extinguish the blaze and evacuate some people from the building using ladders while emergency workers treated some of the injured at the scene.—AFP ■

## Japan, France hold security talks to deepen maritime cooperation

BREST (France)—The foreign and defence ministers of Japan and France held talks on Friday at a French naval facility in the country's northwest to deepen their maritime security cooperation amid China's growing military presence in the Indo-Pacific region.

The fifth "two-plus-two" meeting between the two countries took place in the coastal city of Brest, involving Japanese Foreign Minister Taro Kono, Defence Minister Takeshi Iwaya and their French counterparts, Jean-Yves Le Drian and Florence Parly.

With the aim of realizing a free and open Indo-Pacific region based on the freedom of navigation and the rule of law, Japan has been boosting cooperation with France due to it being a maritime nation that deploys troops in its Pacific island territories such as New Caledonia.

In July last year, Kono agreed with Le Drian dur-

ing a meeting in Paris to launch a new bilateral framework in fiscal 2019 to discuss maritime issues and strengthen coordination, in an apparent effort to counter China's rising clout in the Pacific Ocean.

At the Brest meeting, the ministers are expected to have touched on their commitment to the denuclearization of the Korean Peninsula and enforce-

ment of the UN sanctions on North Korea as well as cooperation toward early entry into force of a bilateral accord on sharing defense supplies.

During a Paris trip last July, Kono and Parly signed an acquisition and cross-servicing agreement which enables Japan's Self-Defence Forces and the French armed forces to provide services and

items such as food, water, fuel and ammunition to each other.

Brest hosts one of the biggest French naval ports. The city has a graveyard of five crewmembers of a Japanese merchant vessel which was sunk in 1916 by a German U-boat attack while heading for another French port to ship food during World War I.—Kyodo News ■

## Thai security forces kill two linked to deadly shooting at school

BANGKOK (Thailand)—Two insurgents believed to be tied to a motorcycle drive-by shooting at a school in Thailand's south were shot dead on Saturday, police said, as UNICEF warned of trauma for children near the scene of the lunchtime violence.

Since 2004 clashes between Malay-Muslim rebels and the Buddhist-majority Thai state that annexed the area over 100 years ago have killed nearly 7,000 people, mostly civilians of both faiths. The conflict rarely makes global headlines but is a reality for residents of border provinces where security forces maintain a large footprint, aided by poorly paid defence "volunteers" drawn from local communities. The four men killed in Thursday's shooting were all Muslims and were guarding a school in Pattani province when the attackers struck just before lunchtime with students mere metres away.

Pattani provincial police commander Piyawat Chalerm Sri told AFP on Saturday that two people with alleged ties to the school violence were killed in a shoot-out Saturday morning.

Though he did not give information about their identities or affiliation, he said he was "confident that they are the same group who carried out the attack on Thursday" by driving by on motorbikes. Authorities have also detained one suspect and are questioning five others, while a military source said an eight-year-old had been grazed by a bullet but not seriously injured.

UNICEF Thailand representative Thomas Davin said on Friday that one child at the Bukoh school attack was reportedly injured by debris and some who may have witnessed the attack could face long term psychological trauma. "This attack has undoubtedly put the school children, the teachers and school personnel in harm's way. It has put children at grave risk of injury or death," he said. "Such violence could also affect parents' willingness to send their children to school — potentially to the detriment of many children's learning and future development."

The 15-year insurgency has seen scores of teachers killed, slain for their perceived collaboration with the Thai state, which led to the use of armed guards at schools.—AFP ■

## India's national stock exchange chairman Ashok Chawla resigns

NEW DELHI—Chairman of India's National Stock Exchange (NSE) Ashok Chawla has resigned from his post, hours after the country's premier investigating agency Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) said federal government has granted it sanction to prosecute him in the Aircel-Maxis case, officials said. "Ashok Chawla has resigned as Public Interest Director/Chairman of the Board of Directors of the National Stock Exchange of India Limited (NSE) with immediate effect in light of recent legal developments," a statement issued by NSE said on Friday. The Mumbai-based

NSE is the leading stock exchange of India. Chawla was named, along with other bureaucrats and India's former finance minister P Chidambaram, in the Aircel-Maxis bribery case being probed CBI. The CBI had filed its charge-sheet in July last year but had been waiting for the government's approval to start prosecution against the bureaucrats. Chawla, a former finance secretary, took over as chairman of the exchange in 2016. He had previously served as civil aviation secretary and chairperson of the Competition Commission of India.—Xinhua ■

# Rise of renewables creating 'new world': report

ABOU DHABI (United Arab Emirates)—The rapid growth of renewable energy sources and the demise of fossil fuels are causing major changes in global politics, a special commission said in a report on Friday.

The shift "will alter the global distribution of power, relations between states, the risk of conflict, and the social, economic and environmental drivers of geopolitical instability," said a the commission set up by the International Renewable Energy Agency (IRENA). Solar, wind and other renewables, which currently make up around a fifth of global energy production, are growing faster than any other source, the report said.

Commission chairman and former president of Iceland, Olafur Ragnar, said the shift will likely cause China to eclipse the United States, place oil-dependent Gulf states at risk and help impoverished African nations achieve

energy independence. "It is difficult to predict when, but this change is happening comprehensively and fast," Ragnar told AFP. The report, entitled "A New World", was launched at IRENA's ninth general assembly in Abu Dhabi.

"The shift from fossil fuels to renewables is driven by new technologies and falling costs, increasingly making renewables as competitive as conventional

sources of energy," the report said. The cost of electricity from solar sources has dropped by 75 per cent since 2009 while the price of wind turbines halved over the same period, it said.

IRENA secretary general Adnan Amin said the body's analysis shows that "by 2020, all commercially available renewable technologies will be on par with, or cheaper than, fossil fuels competitors". He said that in 2017, a record 168

gigawatts of electricity were generated from renewable sources—double the previous year. The IRENA commission also warned that countries are heavily dependent on fossil fuel exports would need to adapt to avoid "serious economic consequences". But, it said, renewables will be a powerful vehicle of democratisation because they make it possible to decentralise the energy supply.—AFP ■

## Termites can help reduce impact of drought: study

SYDNEY—A new study by international researchers has revealed for the first time that termites play a significant role in lessening the effects of drought in rainforests, showing once again that even the smallest players can have big effects on ecosystems. Termites are among the most abundant animals in tropical rainforests and are one of the only living organisms able to break down the cellulose in plant material.

"The sheer quantity of termites suggests these insects have important roles to play in rainforest ecosystems, however what that role is has never been understood up until now," study co-leader and University of

Western Australia Associate Professor Theodore Evans explained. To conduct the study, the team removed termites from an area in Malaysian Borneo using baiting techniques, and then compared that patch to one with an unaffected amount of termites during the 2015-16 El Nino drought. They found that the number of termites in the unsuppressed area grew during the droughts, and that throughout that time they created a higher rate of leaf litter decomposition and nutrient heterogeneity, as well as increased soil moisture and seedling survival compared with the non-drought period.—Xinhua ■

## Shizuoka locals hope to entertain foreign tourists with comfort food

SHIZUOKA (Japan)—Shizuoka Prefecture may not be the first place that pops up in people's minds as the country's culinary centre, but the central Japan prefecture has rich local cuisine to offer visitors during the Rugby World Cup.

Shizuoka's cuisine is characterized by fresh seafood, such as bluefin tuna and "sakura ebi," tiny and transparent pink shrimps, due to its location on the Pacific coast. Green tea is another specialty of the prefecture. For visitors with a sweet tooth, baked goods and confectioneries using green tea may be a perfect

choice to satisfy your cravings.

But for those rugby fans celebrating or looking back after a match at Shizuoka Stadium Ecopa, some warm, traditional comfort food may be exactly what they need. "Oden," a simmering broth with tasty ingredients, is one of the most popular dishes in Japan in autumn and winter. But Shizuoka's oden has a unique twist and is different from that sold in convenience store chains or in other parts of the country.

There are two alleys in the city of Shizuoka with stores dedicated to serving Shizuoka-style

oden, in which ingredients are skewered on sticks and simmered in a black broth made of soy sauce and beef sinew.

Takashi Sugiura's store, Odenya Obachan in Aoba Yokochi, one of the alleys, is usually packed with people. He keeps a notebook in which he asks visitors to leave messages and there is praise written in languages such as English, Chinese and Thai. "Not just the taste of the oden, but I think another attraction is sitting at a bar and talking with other visitors," Sugiura said. "I hope more foreign visitors experience this."—Kyodo News ■

## Brianna Hildebrand joins John Cena in comedy 'Playing With Fire'

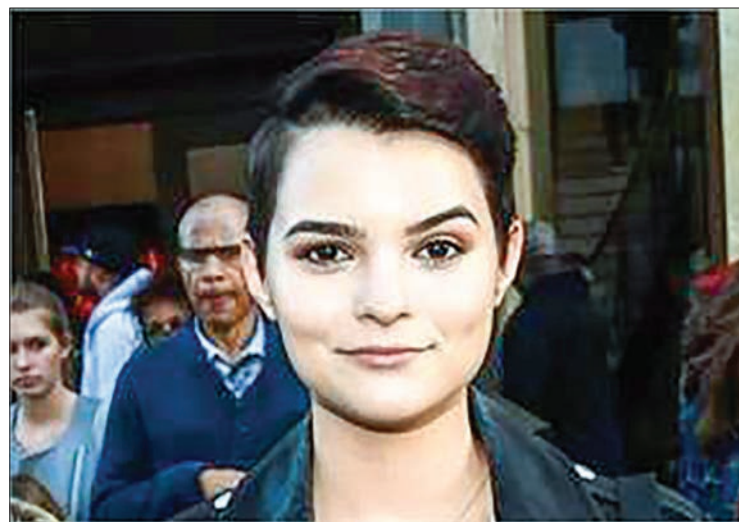

## Cuba to renovate Chinatown for Havana's 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary

HAVANA—Renovating Chinatown is one of the priorities in the programme to celebrate the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the founding of Havana, which will be held in November, local media reported on Friday. In commemoration of the anniversary, authorities organized a general restoration programme, which includes refurbishing the popular area built by Asian workers. The buildings in Chinatown, many of which date back to the founding era and are of great heritage value, show certain signs of deterioration, the daily Juventud Rebelde said.

Buildings to be renovated included the well-known Chinatown sites like the offices of the Chinese newspaper "Kwong Wah Po," laundrettes and traditional pharmacies. The restoration efforts also include the repair of public lighting, sidewalks and parks, street paving and the removal of overhanging electrical cables. According to historical data, the first 206 Chinese citizens arrived in Cuba in 1847 as laborers. During the 20<sup>th</sup> century, a large number of Chinese immigrants arrived in Havana and became an important part of the community. They built the Chinatown to promote their culture and cuisine.—Xinhua ■

## Oscar winning sound mixer Gregg Rudloff dies of possible suicide

LOS ANGELES—Veteran sound mixer Gregg Rudloff, who bagged Oscars for his work on "Mad Max: Fury Road", "The Matrix" and "Glory", has died at the age of 63.

The Los Angeles County Coroner's office is treating his death as a possible suicide.

"It was reported to us possibly as a suicide," a spokeswoman for the coroner's office told Deadline.

"His body was found at his residence in Sherman Oaks on 6 January. A call was made, and during the call it was reported as a possible suicide. We won't know for sure until the autopsy is completed," she added.

Rudloff was an illustrious name in Hollywood with a career spanning 35 years.

He also received Oscar nods for "American Sniper",

"Argo", "Flags of Our Fathers and The Perfect Storm" and bagged a 1986 Emmy for sound mixing on "An Early Frost".

He was a longtime collaborator of director Clint Eastwood; his first job being Eastwood's "Honkytonk Man" in 1982.

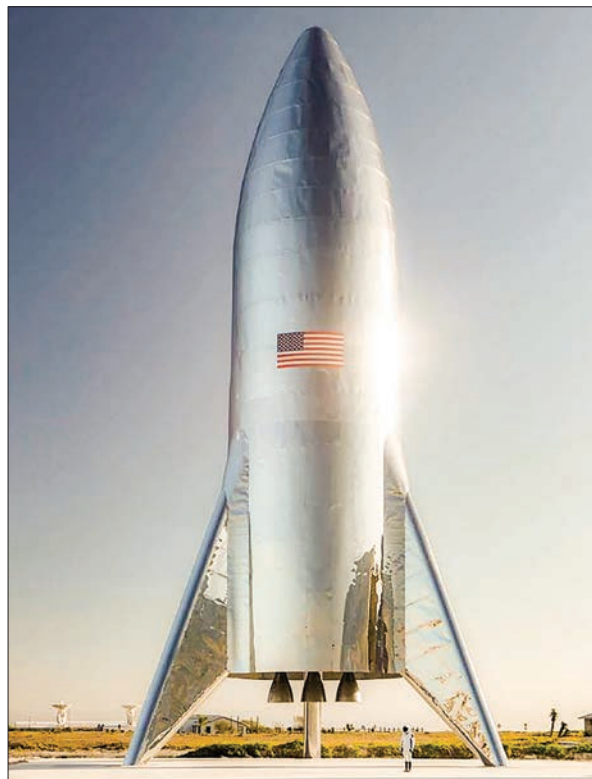

# Elon Musk shows off prototype of Mars-bound rocket, Starship

WASHINGTON (United States)—SpaceX CEO Elon Musk has unveiled the first pictures of a retro-looking, steely rocket called Starship that may one day carry people to the Moon and Mars. Musk posted pictures on Twitter late Thursday of the Starship Hopper prototype, which awaits its first flight test in Texas in the coming weeks.

“Starship test flight rocket just finished assembly at the @SpaceX Texas launch site. This is an actual picture, not a rendering,” he wrote. The prototype built in Boca Chica, along the Gulf Coast of Texas, is nine yards (eight metres) in diameter—like the future rocket will be—but is shorter. Its first test flights—suborbital “hops” reaching several miles (kilometres) in the air before landing back on Earth—could come in March or April. An orbital prototype is expected in June. That version will be paired with a massive rocket booster known as the Super Heavy.

SpaceX has said the duo could one day transport people from city to city on Earth, as well as propel passengers around the Moon, to the lunar surface, and even to Mars and back. SpaceX currently launches regular supply missions to the astronauts living at the International Space Station, using its Falcon 9 rocket and Dragon cargo capsule. The company is working on a new Dragon crew capsule that could start carrying people to the orbiting outpost later this year.—AFP ■

## Chinese researchers use AI to explore diabetes classification

BEIJING—Chinese researchers are using artificial intelligence (AI) to classify different types of diabetes, which may help Chinese patients obtain more precise treatment.

Different types of diabetes require diverse treatment. The current diabetes classification system, which has been used for more than 20 years is based on cause and pathological features, which has limitations in guiding clinical treatment.

Researchers from Peking University People's Hospital are working on a more elaborate classification of diabetes that may support individualized treatment.

They conducted research on diabetes classification based on the data of 2,316 Chinese people newly diagnosed with diabetes and 815 Americans.

Using the AI clustering method, they separate the two groups into four diabetes subtypes based on five variables including age, BMI, blood glucose levels and insulin resistance indexes.

According to Zou Xiantong, one of the researchers, a previous study from Northern Europe has used similar methods to divide diabetes into five subgroups and demonstrated that the subgroups have different clinical manifestations and corresponding treatments. However, all cases involved in the study were from Northern Europe, and it is unknown whether it is applicable to other populations.

“We hope our research may provide data support for more accurate typing and treatment of diabetes in the Chinese population,” Zou said.

The data analysis showed that the main clinical features of the four subtypes were basically consistent in the Chinese and US groups, which also coincided with the subtype characteristics of the Northern Europe research.

The research was published in the journal *The Lancet Diabetes and Endocrinology*.—Xinhua ■

# Lithium-ion based batteries to become cheapest electricity storing option: study

LONDON—Batteries based on lithium-ion will become the cheapest way to store electricity in the near future, according to a study released on Wednesday by the Imperial College London.

The study, conducted by researchers at the college, calculates the cost of different energy storing technologies, in-

cluding large-scale batteries and pumped-storage hydroelectricity.

They predicted that lithium-ion based batteries are becoming the cheapest way of storing energy for most applications, such as making sure energy grids do not suffer large fluctuations and allowing consumers to manage their bills. The research model

shows that at present, the cheapest energy storage mechanism is pumped-storage hydroelectricity. However, as time progresses, pumped-storage hydroelectricity costs do not decrease, whereas lithium-ion battery costs come down, making them the cheapest options for most applications from 2030.

“Our projections show that

lithium-ion technologies will see a rapid decline in costs over the next couple of decades. This is driven mainly by the fact that lithium-ion is manufactured at scale,” said lead researcher Oliver Schmidt, from the Grantham Institute and the Centre for Environmental Policy at Imperial.—Xinhua ■

# Tech to the rescue: New products aim to improve disaster relief

LAS VEGAS (United States)—After catastrophic wildfires in southern California late last year, the Israeli startup Watergen sent in its devices which pull clean water out of the atmosphere for firefighters and relief workers. The machines, which have been deployed in other global disaster areas, were among the technologies on display at the 2019 Consumer Electronics Show to highlight innovations which can be used in various kinds of relief efforts.

“We clean the air because it's much easier to clean air than it is to clean water,” said Yehuda Kaploun, president of Watergen USA, who was demonstrating the device at the annual Las Vegas extravaganza which ends on Friday after showcasing futuristic innovations. Watergen claims its technology—offered in a commercial-size Gen-350 and a consumer version known as Genny—has many applications for emergency

response and helping the many millions who lack potable water. The exhibits showcased a broad array of “tech for good” services which use robotics, drones, artificial intelligence and the like.

## Robotic legs, treacherous terrain

The show's “Resilience Marketplace” included technology

assisting with emergency preparedness and response, and panel discussions at the event also addressed these issues. CES this year also included a conference panel on how technology can help “create more resilient communities” by tackling problems including poverty, health, education, and sustainability.

“Disaster recovery and pub-

lic safety is an area in the drone industry experiencing exponential growth with a multitude of real-world applications,” said Ben Marcus, chairman of AirMap, which allows operators to manage drones for emergency response. “When used for public safety, drones are cheaper, faster, and more effective in keeping people out of harm's way.”

Taiwan-based startup Uupsafety won a CES award for its technology which monitors firefighters with smart wearables that connect to command centers. Japanese automaker Honda showed its prototype autonomous work vehicle which could be used in a variety of situations including search and rescue, firefighting and snow removal. “We've been testing (the vehicle) in real-world scenarios to demonstrate the value and capabilities of this unique machine,” said Honda executive Pete Wendt.—AFP ■

## Sandgren claims first ATP title in Auckland

AUCKLAND (New Zealand)—American Tennys Sandgren was left speechless on Saturday after claiming his first ATP tour title with a comprehensive straight sets win over Britain's Cameron Norrie in the Auckland Classic final.

The 27-year-old Sandgren took just 79 minutes to beat Norrie 6-4, 6-2 to round out a remarkable week of tennis without dropping a set.

"I'm a little lost for words," a relieved Sandgren said when a Norrie service return went over the baseline to end the match.

"A lot of work, a lot of training, a lot of sacrifice goes into even making a final and to get a win, I'm speechless."

In a tournament in which none of the seeded players made it to the final four, Sandgren was playing only his second ATP final—having lost in Houston last year—while it was the first for wildcard entrant Norrie.

Sandgren said his extra ex-

perience counted.

"I left that match thinking I played a really good one but I left something on the table. Mentally, I wasn't as good as I could have been so I didn't want to leave today thinking that I could have been more solid upstairs."

But there was no hiding the nerves for both players with 29 unforced errors from Norrie and 17 from Sandgren, a quarter-finalist in the Australian Open last year.

Norrie was in trouble at the start of match when he dropped his serve in the opening game.

The New Zealand-raised Briton broke back to level at 2-2 then immediately dropped his serve a second time, as Sandgren sealed the set with an ace.

Sandgren had too much power and accuracy for Norrie in the second set, breaking him twice before securing the match.

It was the first time Sandgren had beaten Norrie in their past four encounters.—AFP ■

## Wu magic sparks China to 3-0 Asian Cup win over Philippines

ABU DHABI (United Arab Emirates)—Star striker Wu Lei fired a brilliant double as China beat the Philippines 3-0 on Friday to virtually assure their place in the last 16 of the Asian Cup. Marcello Lippi emerged victorious against old foe Sven-Goran Eriksson in a heavyweight coaching clash despite spirited early resistance from the Filipino 'Street Dogs' in Abu Dhabi.

China, runners-up in 1984 and 2004, improved to six points from two games in Group C after beat-

ing Kyrgyzstan 2-1 in their opening game. They should have led after 32 minutes when Wu Xi headed wastefully wide from point-blank range. But Wu Lei provided the spark five minutes before half-time, turning on the edge of the box and whipping a right-foot shot into the far corner. His second was even better as he swivelled to slam a Hao Junmin free kick past goalkeeper Michael Falkegaard on the volley after 66 minutes to effectively finish the tie. Substitute Yu Dabao added a third with his first touch 10 minutes from

time. Pulverised 8-1 the last time the teams met in 2017, the Philippines gave China more of a game this time, having lost 1-0 to South Korea on their Asian Cup debut earlier this week. Kevin Ingreso forced a fingertip save from China goalkeeper Yan Junling in first-half stoppage time but Eriksson's faded badly after the break. A victory for South Korea over Kyrgyzstan later on Friday would guarantee China's progress as they look to improve on a quarter-final finish in 2015.—AFP ■

## Cancer causing Hledan

**A** WELL-KNOWN modern teashop in Hledan makes a bowl of oil noodles in the way that the steaming hot noodles are sieved into a plastic water bowl with handle, commonly used in bathrooms, in which the concoction is done, afterwards being put into a porcelain plate and, finally, served.

Moreover, Hledan has another popular teashop, only two branches of which are running there in the town. There, when a glass of cold drink is ordered, they use a generous amount of unevenly hewn ice cubes, rather than using purified ice cubes. Also, the bottles of soybean with their rusty metal caps staining their mouths are not worth ordering.

Next, a roadside Monhingha shop, which, however, was known to be in the list of pioneers of the town, asked us to hold our horses as the broth had ran out. A moment later, a trishaw came with many plastic bags, each holding Monhingha broth – boiling hot – all of which was eventually poured down into the large bowl.

In the Hledan market, a wholesaling shop that sells fried vermicelli and fried noodles adds the entire packet of Ajinomoto, the seasoning powder, into a giant frying pan. Those noodles and vermicelli are sold to the other shops retailing various salads, pork on stick, and so on. Each plate of noodle salad, pork salad, and vermicelli salad is given an additional spoonful of seasoning powder when ordered. I am not going to talk about those fritter shops that are stealthily cutting the collected water bottles at the back!

I was wondering how many of such kind of shops there are in Sanchaung, Kyauk-myaung, South Okkala, and so forth that are equally cancer-causing like those of Hledan.

### “Passers-by of the world”

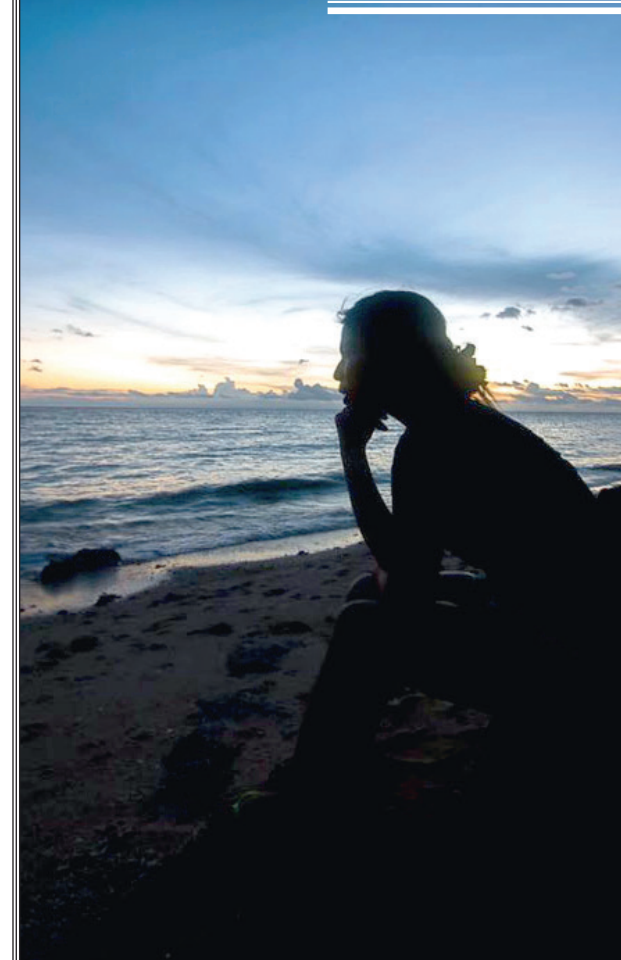
When we're young, we learned with strength

men pay last homage to the departed revered Buddhist abbot by singing dirge around his remains. In other words, the laymen sing funeral song or dirge extolling the virtues of the departed monk. The song consists of the words of praises and honor of the departed monk. In addition, his efforts in propagating Buddhism during his monkhood are described in the song.

The song is played by Myanmar musical instruments or Myanmar orchestra. The traditionally-decorated casket of the departed Buddhist monk is placed in the pandal for the laymen and

slow sad song or a piece of music while the funeral ceremony is in progress.

Depending on the disciples wish and desire, the remains of the departed Buddhist monk are kept in the decorative casket in the traditionally-built pandal for a couple of months or a few months. When the final rite is held, the ritual dirge is also played and performed by the woman professional singers and dancers of Myanmar. People nearby the village or town come to this occasion to watch and listen to the ritual dirge of the funeral ceremony of a revered Buddhist

the pandal.

While playing and singing dirge, the woman singer gently and mournfully rocks the traditionally made decorative-emerald -cradle in which the remains of the revered Buddhist monk are laid. The sad song or dirge and the heart-felt facial lamentation of the performance of the woman singer dressed in Myanmar theatrical costumes touch the captive audience as well as the disciples. Besides, she extols the departed Buddhist monk's dedication to Buddhism, virtues and rectitude. Thus, audience could learn the career and dignity of the passed-away-monk and they pay homage to the remains of the Sayardaw (the abbot).

Actually, it is not easy for singers to sing this kind of funeral song because it has to be sung with emotion, clarity of Pali words (of an oriental language) and singing skill. The woman singers or dancers who specialized and learned this dirge or funeral song for the departed Buddhist monk can sing

**A**S we all know that a great majority of people living in Myanmar believe in Buddhism and practice the way what Buddha had taught us to attain Nirvana —the ultimate goal of Buddhism or the enlightenment. Basically Buddhist monks are the ones who teach laymen Buddhists about how to practice the essence and authenticity of Buddhism besides saying prayer and worship. In Myanmar, Buddhist doctrine is conserved by Buddhist monks indeed.

We, Myanmar Buddhists pay respect to those venerable and virtuous Buddhist monks who dedicate their lives to Buddhism by means of disseminating Buddha literature, teaching and method of Buddha way of meditation to their disciples and laymen. In Myanmar, Buddhist culture is dominating the vast majority of people since Buddhism is considered a major religion in it.

The songs sung by the woman singer or dancer are composed in both Myanmar and Pali languages.

Among the Buddhist countries in the world, Myanmar Buddhists significantly and culturally celebrate the funeral of Buddhist monk with dirge and traditional funeral decoration as a final rite. Across the country, when a certain revered Buddhist monk passes away, the disciple and his followers arrange for the funeral for the departed one in a traditional way. The lay-



his fellow monks to pay final homage. The disciples or laymen in the locality pay homage to his remains and express sad feelings on the demise of the revered Buddhist monk. Significantly, as a ritual dirge, the laymen play and sing in order to show their deep sadness on the departed monk. The woman singer wearing in theatrical costumes sings a

monk or abbot. The songs sung by the woman singer or dancer are composed in both Myanmar and Pali languages. The singer not only sings melancholic songs but also performs the heart-felt facial lamentation in proximity to the remains of the revered Buddhist monk which are placed in the traditionally made decorative-emerald-cradle inside

Aye-Yint- Kyuu -song ( Myanmar term ) and can act or perform systematically and properly indeed. That's why all the Myanmar traditional dancers cannot sing and perform at the funeral of Buddhist monk. Furthermore, it is an interesting and valuable traditional art of performance in Myanmar used for the last funeral rite of revered Sayadaws ( Revered Buddhist Monks ). This sort of ceremony is held in the small towns and in some rural areas whenever the revered Buddhist monk passes away. In the big cities, it can be observed rarely. The local laymen and disciples conduct the funeral and the ritual dirge is played with Myanmar musical instruments and sung by the skilful traditional woman dancer or woman singer. Hopefully, this article can fulfill the knowledge of a part of Buddhist culture with traditional rites for foreigners those who study Myanmar Buddhist Culture and Traditional Rites in Myanmar!

# Tradition of Salt Processing at ancient Pyu Kingdom

**H**ANLIN Old City, situated in WatLat Township, Sagaing Region is one of the three Pyu Old Cities recognized as The World Heritage by The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), which is also an archeological site with many references of Pyu Era.

Archaeologist Taw Sein Kho and his group conducted initial excavations in Hanlin old city in February 1905. Since Mr Charles Durai have also made some excavations in Hanlin 1929 and 1930.

Archaeological students from the Yangon University, on their excursion to Hanlin, got a chance to do excavation in old Pyu city and tradition of making home-made salt products from continental salt flats.

Hanlin, which is not located near any seas, produce table salt by allowing the salt-water, containing solution of Sodium Chloride, from natural springs and wells, pass through salt flats. Producing table salt from salt flats around Hanlin region is known to be a tradition since the existence of Pyu people and still pursuing as a business until today.

Salt flats are taking place from 10000 feet south to north and 3500 feet east to west in Hanlin region. These salt flats are collected in order to produce table salt with methods of drying, evaporating and draining.

Soils from salt field are formed as Kar mound, with straws and mud, to extract salt water. Kar mound is composed of soils accumulated over 2 feet and the insides are shaped like pans while the bottom is attached with beak of bamboo.

After harrowing until the soil is smooth, the salt land is closed in four sides where salty water is filled in through drain after all exit is blocked. Water from salt land gradually dries up from the heat of the sun. This method of drying salt land is called sowing salt land.

When the water is dried, the salt soil is collected by rake and accumulated to harrow and put more salt water to dry under the sun. In this way, salt lands are sowed 4 to 5 times throughout salt season.

Salt can also be produced by boiling salt water in a square-shaped zinc pan with a length of 8 feet, width of 4 feet and dept of 4 feet without line.



In the ancient times, salt is made by a Hanlin's regional clay pots called Labon pots. Professor U Myint Aung once mentioned in his paper that Labon pots are used in salt making in Hanlin region until Myanmar Calendar 1257, according to Sayadaw U Narga's signature.

Generally in the months of Nataw and Pyatho (in December and January), salt spreads are sowed and brine are collected after a month to make salt. Even though salt

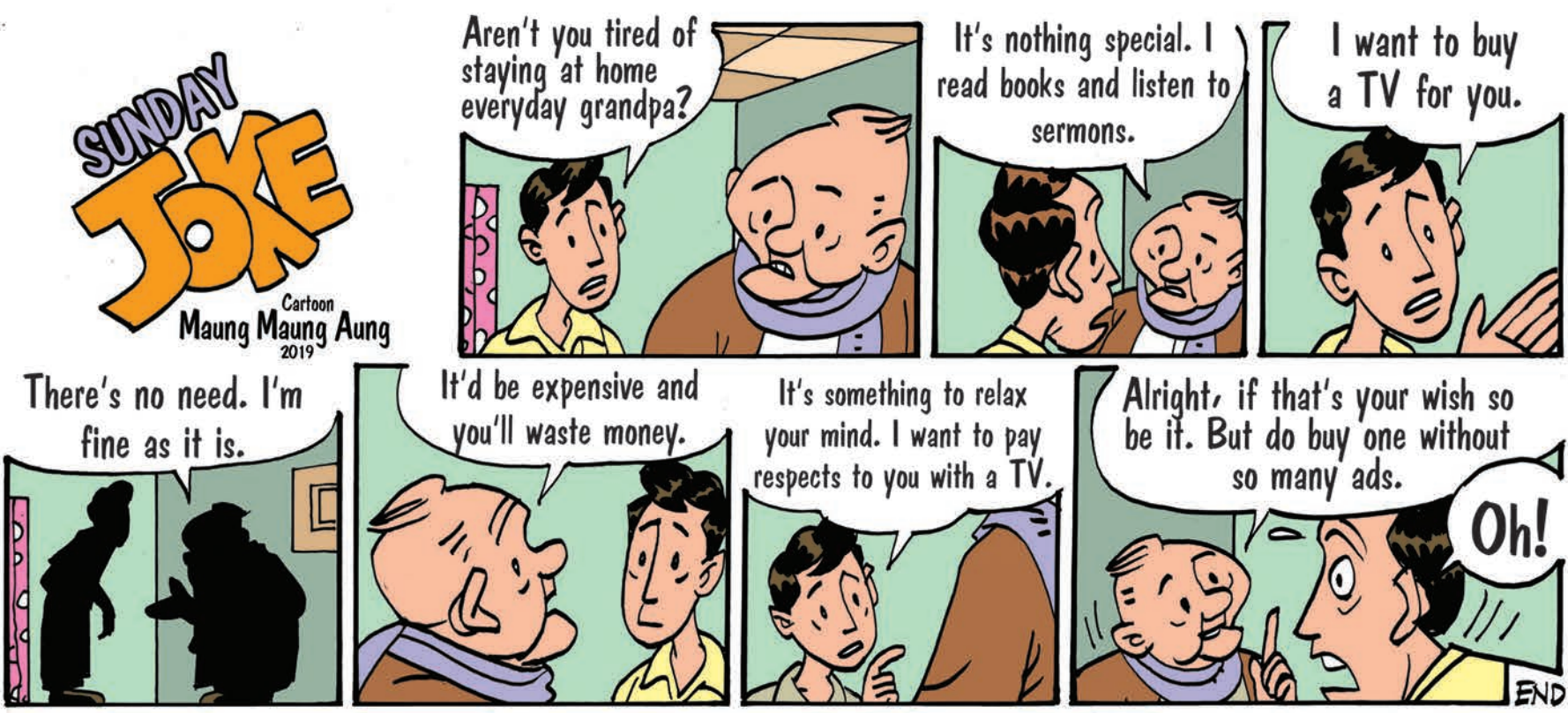
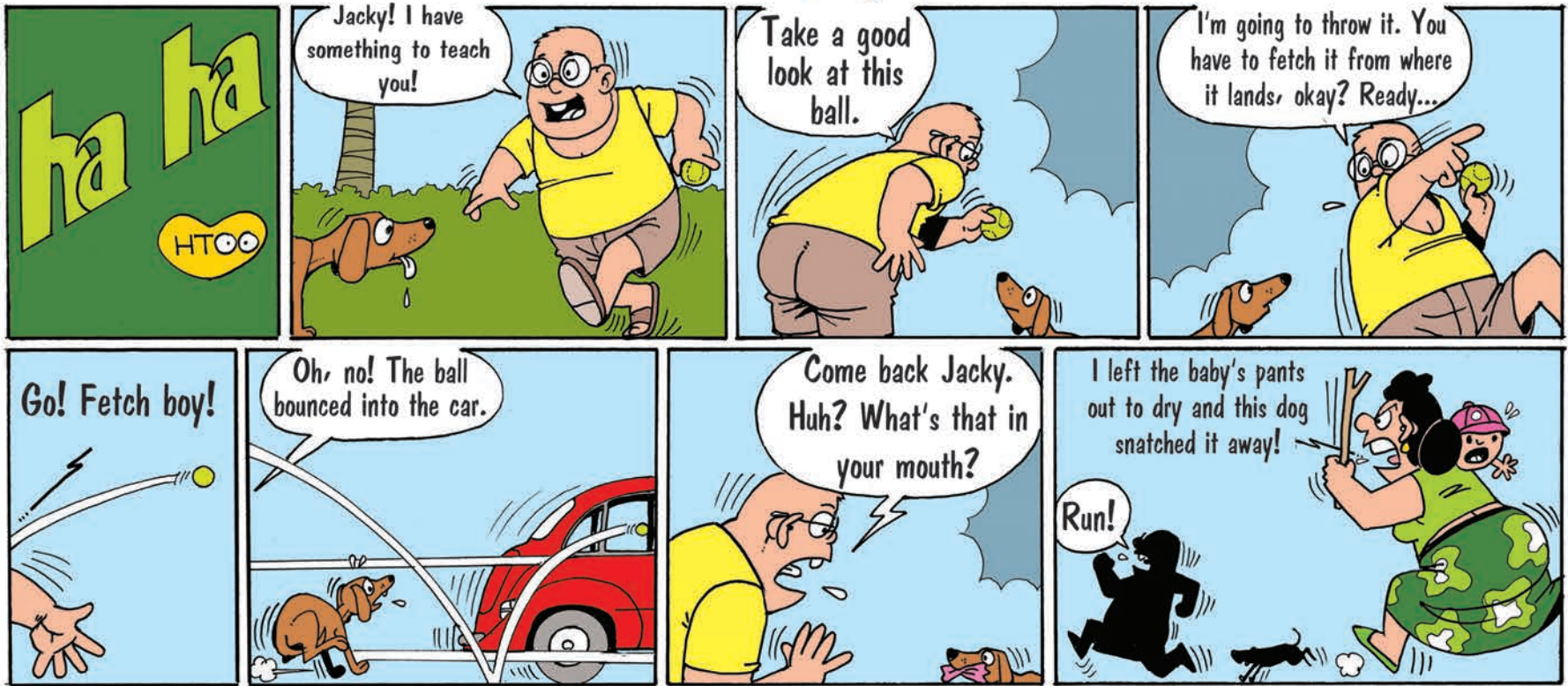


making period is considered to be four months from Pyatho till Tagu, it can extend up to Kason and Nayon depending on the weather.

Locals from Hanlin have been making this continental salt business since many years ago.

In the past, around Hanlin region, Hanlin, Tha Khwa Taw and Lain Pin villages did salt business widely but now due to the escalation of land price, changes of climates and high expenses of production cost, only Tha Kwa Taw village continue to produce the most. Salt filtering, making salt with zinc pans can be observed in Hanlin village tract during salt making period.

Even though solid references for Pyu nationalities making salt is still not found in Hanlin region where Pyu culture is rich, it can still be assumed that Pyu people produced and consumed salt in a particular way.

Professor U Myint Aung denied the fact that Hanlin's salt processing business descended from Mon people, who were from the sea and experienced in salt processing, came to Pyu region and started processing salt. Due to references from excavating Hanlin old city, there have been no evidence that Pyu and Mon people had any relation between 2 and 9 AD. But Professor considered that after Pyu era, Mon and Burmese had relations around Shwe Bo and terms from salt business was adapted and used from then.

In any case, any visitors are able to see Pyu heritage and distinctive continental salt processing culture when visiting Hanlin region and Pyu Cultural site. *Translated by HYME*
