Internal conflicts erupted in Myanmar for many years after the gaining of independence due to misunderstandings among ethnic nationals; and they had to suffer the brunt of internal conflict more so in the states where they live. As the bad result of these conflicts, State building and development works could not be done with full momentum and as a result, not only did we lag behind neighboring countries in political, economic, social and many areas, our dignity and prestige became tarnished in the international arena.

The Union Government has been working to achieve equitable development in the whole Union. In the Kayah State also, it has been working in many sectors such as transportation, education, health, human resources, electric supply, development of SMEs – small and medium enterprises, and eco-tourism. We built the Pha Saung bridge to cross the Thanlwin river, a border trading post was opened in Mae Sae township, and designated it as a sister town of Maehongsong in Thailand; we are also inviting foreign and domestic investments into this region.

Kayah State not only has the Lawpita hydro-electric power station which is important for national development, it has the Thanlwin river, Baluchaung, and Ngwe Saung dam. Furthermore it has many rivers, streams, waterfalls, mountain streams, and caves; also because it is blessed with such beautiful forests, mountains and scenic beauty, it is a state where eco-tourism enterprises can thrive.

In the past because of internal conflicts, the development of Kayah State has not been strong due to the fact that many difficulties were encountered in building infrastructure and administration.

Now armed conflicts have all but gone. Thus if all the ethnic armed groups, participated, and cooperated in the Union peace process fully, Kayah State would be able to enjoy the fruits of peace quickly and to the full extent.

At this time when freedom and openness prevails, the natural beauty of Kayah State with its forests and mountains has become a more popular and significant destination to local and foreign tourists alike for resting, relaxation and tourism. There are good potentials for increased investments, trade, commerce and tourism to come in from the border

trading posts in the east from Thailand. For these good potentials to develop with high momentum, it is necessary to envisage how all of you wish Kayah State to develop, how all of you wish to see it, in the coming 20 years. All Kayah ethnic nationals including all ethnic armed organizations should think about this very seriously. Thus I wish to urge all of you to build peace as quickly as possible.

Union Minister U Kyaw Tint Swe opens Chindwin Bridge (Homalin)

THE opening ceremony of the Chindwin Bridge (Homalin) constructed by the Ministry of Construction, Department of Bridges on Tamu-Aungzeya-Kaktha-Homalin road in Sagaing Region, Homalin Township was held at the bridge yesterday morning. Union Minister U Kyaw Tint Swe from the Office of the State Counsellor attended the ceremony and opened the bridge.

In his opening remarks Union Minister U Kyaw Tint Swe said it was an auspicious day for Sagaing Region because the Chindwin Bridge (Homalin) on Tamu-Aungzeya-Kaktha-Homalin road was opened and that he equally happy together with the local people.

He said the Union Government that was elected by the people was now two years and about 10 months old. During this period it had strived towards equal and

balanced development of all regions in the whole of the Republic of Union of Myanmar including far-off and remote places. The Union Government and state/region governments had coordinated for the proportionate development of all states and regions. As basic infrastructures of road, bridge and electricity are developed, the social, economic, education and health levels of peoples living in the states and regions will be raised. In his Myanmar New Year greeting speech the President included plans for development of electricity and road transport in basic infrastructure development. In his speech at the opening ceremony of Shwe Taung Yan (Ma KyeeChaung) Bridge last October he spoke of the government's plan to complete more than 400 bridges during the remaining term.

Seven strategies in the aim three of Pillar Two Prosperity and Partnership include the work process of “constructing priority basic infrastructure to support sustainable development and various businesses.”

Sagaing Region is wide in

area and in the upper Chindwin region, due to difficult road transport throughout the ages, it has been lagging behind and Khamti region had little development. The livelihood conditions of ethnic nationals in the region were not developed as much as it should and remains lagging behind. Therefore priority was given towards development of road transportation. Where required bridges were constructed to over-

come natural obstacles and roads were upgraded to all-weather roads. In addition to development of the waterway along Chindwin River, road networks were constructed to travel with ease to the middle part of Myanmar. Only when bridges and roads are good can the people travel with ease developing socio-economic situation as well as achieving more friendly relationships.

37 Naga traditional dance troupes to participate in Naga New Year Festival in Leshi

MOST travellers visiting the Naga region have shown a keen interest in the Naga ethnic people's traditional wrestling during the festival.

There are six ethnic groups of Naga people living in Leshi Township of the Naga Self-Administered Zone, Sagaing Region. The groups have different traditional dances and sports.

One of their traditional sports is wrestling, which involves two teams with an odd number of competitors. The two teams are called the catching team and the protecting team. The match is overseen by a chief judge with

the assistance of two line judges. When there is a dispute, the decision of the chief judge is final.

“Traditional wrestling is usually organized only at the time of the festival. The Naga ethnic groups train brave youth from their community for wrestling. What counts is the unity and the use of the right techniques,” said U Ra Pop, the vice chairman of the Naga ethnic cultural committee. Local and foreign travellers visiting the Naga Self-Administered Zone are keen on watching traditional wrestling, he said.— Win Oo (Zayar Taing) (Translated by Hay Mar)

The Chindwin Bridge (Homalin) on Tamu-Aungzeya-Kaktha-Homalin road has a total length of 2,762 ft. and is a steel reinforced concrete bridge. Due to the opening of this bridge, India border can be reached via Homalin and will benefit ethnic nationals of Khamti region in upper Sagaing Region.

He said the Union Government had started all sector development and reform works in its first year period in accord with the slogan of “time for change” and focused mainly on creating jobs, improving road transport and making electricity available. In its second year period in accord with the slogan “together with the people” the State’s affairs were conducted together with the people. In the third year period as per the slogan “collective strength” the collective existence and collective works were being conducted with collective strength.

Therefore, the ethnic nationals and local people in Sagaing Region are required to continue their cooperation. When transitioning from an old system to a new system and from an old age to a new age, difficulties and challenges will be encountered. Naga Self-Administered Zone in upstream areas of the Chindwin River would get another route to Moreh, India, for trading passing through the bridge, said the Chief Minister.

Meanwhile, a 330-mile long road which is important for the Naga SAZ and upper areas of Sagaing passing through Thakkeyyin, Phaungpyin and Homalin are being upgraded by the Sagaing Region Government, said the Chief Minister.

Afterwards, Deputy Minister for Construction U Kyaw Lin briefed about the construction of the bridge and a local resident expressed thanks for the construction of the bridge.

Afterwards, Union Minister U Kyaw Tint Swe, Sagaing Region Chief Minister Dr. Myint Naing, Speaker of Sagaing Region Hluttaw U Than, Deputy Minister U

Kyaw Lin, Sagaing Region minister U Than Nyunt Win, Sagaing Region Minister for Shan Ethnic Affairs Daw Nan Hmwe Hmwe Khin, Pyithu Hluttaw Representative U Myo Nyunt and Amyotha Hluttaw Representative U Nyi Nyi Htwe formally opened the bridge.

Next, Union Minister U Kyaw Tint Swe, Chief Minister Dr. Myint Naing, and Speaker U Than unveiled the stone inscription of the bridge and sprinkled scented water over it.

The bridge linking Homalin and the areas in the west bank of the Chindwin River and the iron concrete bridge is 2762.6 ft long flanked by two pedestrian roads.

Following the opening ceremony of the bridge, Union Minister U Kyaw Tint Swe, Chief Minister Dr. Myint Naing and departmental officials flew to

Leshe to participate the Naga New Year Festival.

The Union minister and entourage attended a charity food donation ceremony to mark the New Year of Nagas in Leshe.

Afterwards, they visited the traditional houses of the Naga tribes in Leshe.

The panelists at the discussions are Dr. Kyaw Kyaw Khaung, Rector of East Yangon University, Dr. Maung Maung Naing, Rector of Yadanabon University, Dr. Moe Pwint, Rector, University of Computer Studies in Mandalay (UCSM), Dr. Aung Win, Rector (Duty) of University of Technology in Mandalay (Yatanapon Cyber City), U Aung Myat Soe, Principal of Taungoo Education College.

Coordinator: Why the university students are needed to have pleasant campuses.

Dr. Maung Maung Naing: In Myanmar, we have (174) universities, degree colleges and colleges, and we also have (134) universities, degree colleges and colleges under the Higher Education Department of the Ministry of Education.

The students who passed the Matriculation Examination are poised to attend the universities, and that it is very much essential for the students to have cool and pleasant campuses in their pursuit of higher learning for the good of the country.

Coordinator: What should be done for that purpose?

Dr. Kyaw Kyaw Khaung: For those students who are in pursuit for higher education must have pleasant campuses. The 21st century calls for quality education with guarantee of knowledge with lifelong learning skills, and that the universities are the resource venues.

The ingredients for a proper campus include students identifying with it along with unity and cooperation between faculty members and students.



The campuses have two main functions such as that of subject wise teaching and that of extra activities (or) co-curriculum activities. Moderator: What should be added to make the university nice and pleasant with honor?

Dr. Maung Maung Naing: We need a master plan that mapped out the projects such as that of the site of library, that of the convocation hall, that of the education zones, that of staff housing, and that of market, all earmarked with main utility and status in the plan for the budget proposal. When the budget is approved from the ministry, implementation is to be carried out in accordance with the allocation.

Moderator: Please explain on the view of Dr. Kyaw Kyaw Khaung.

Dr. Kyaw Kyaw Khaung: On yearly basis, the faculty members and the students worked together for the pleasant campus with the

participation of student unions and social associations, mainly in uplifting the image of the university with the greening tasks in the whole environment.

In connection with the hostels, other relevant requirements should be included that of the water and electricity supply, that of personal amenities, that of mini marts for shopping personal items, that of health care units, and that of sport facilities.

These facilities are available at the East Yangon University; however, many universities across the country are lacked in such offerings, and therefore, we need to submit yearly budget in acquiring the indoor sports facilities, the music clubs, and recreation centers in making the campuses beautiful, cool and nice.

This meeting establishes trust beyond expectation

TO resume the halted official discussions and to continue the implementation of peace process, a group led by Peace Commission (PC) secretary U Khin Zaw Oo went to Thailand, Chang Mai and conducted informal talks with KNU and RCSS that had signed NCA (Nationwide Cease-fire Agreement) and KNPP that hadn't signed the NCA.

PC secretary and party met with KNU on 13 January, with RCSS on the morning of 14 January and with KNPP on the afternoon of 14 January.

In the informal talks with KNU, RCSS and KNPP the government representatives were PC secretary U Khin Zaw Oo, member U Aung Soe, Ministry of State Counsellor's Office Director General U Zaw Htay, Union Peace Dialogue Joint Committee (UPDJC) Secretariat member U Hla Maung Shwe and technical supporter U Kyaw Lin Oo.

Following is an interview conducted with UPDJC Secretariat member U Hla Maung Shwe in Chang Mai.

Q: Let us know the status of the two days meeting with KNU and RCSS that had signed the NCA, and KNPP that hadn't signed the NCA.

A: We arrived to Chang Mai on the 12th. On the 13th we discussed with KNU representative group and on the 14th we discussed with RCSS and KNPP. It is an informal meeting. The main thing is discuss the necessary to restart the halted official discussions as soon as possible. We came here in November. Compared to that time, this time there is more progress with both KNU and RCSS. We were able to

respond to some of their discussions and some will be discussed later. We invited RCSS to come to Nay Pyi Taw for a meeting before the end of this month. RCSS accepted this. RCSS will revert back with the meeting date.

We also told KNU to discuss about participating in official meetings and invited them to come to a meeting in Yangon before the end of this month. They accepted this in principal and will discuss about the date. Therefore there is progress with this two groups.

Q: In the informal meeting with KNU in October, it was said that there'll be a meeting in end November or December. Did you meet?

A: At that time both KNU and us were busy and there was only an informal meeting with KNU representative Saya Tu Tu Lay in December. In the present meeting we were able to establish trust beyond our expectation. We are able to discuss more. We are happy about this.

Q: What is the status of the informal meeting with KNPP that hadn't signed the NCA.

A: KNPP had a state level

ceasefire in 2012 March. Next step is to get a union level agreement. After that there weren't huge conflicts but there were some armed engagements. There isn't any difficulty between KNPP and us on signing the NCA. The only thing is some regional difficulties and some matters that our side had to resolve. KNPP said it had an intention to sign the NCA. They stated this again. The only thing remaining is to sign it. We need to agree and negotiate some remaining points. Therefore, this informal meeting is deemed as successful.

Another thing is the decision made at this meeting to hold at least two peace congresses this year. To achieve more progress arrangements are made to conduct preparation meetings before the end of this month. We'll discuss this with groups that signed NCA.

Q: What are the difficulties that caused KNU and RCSS to halt official discussions?

A: This was included in their announcement. We are able to discuss point by point on their announcement. We were able to explain that in some points it is

not as they thought. For some points we need to coordinate. In some points, we could not commit to agree by ourselves. There are some points that need to be discussed with other groups. We are able to discuss this.

Q: KNU and RCSS are the firmest among those who had signed the NCA so what sort of results will there be on the peace process?

A: NCA was brought along by armed ethnic organizations and if we are to follow the process we need to obtain political agreement. Those agreements will be implemented as Union Accord. As this is according to the NCA guideline, we'll continue along this way. The difficulty between us is having different definition. As mentioned earlier, we will continue to build trust.

Q: What is the plan of the government on peace process during 2019?

A: 2019 is not the government's plan. We need to discuss. We'll strive toward holding two congresses in 2019. This was also discussed already. We'll need to establish trust here too.

Authorities asked to check illegal production, sale of low-quality edible oil

THE authorities have been asked to take legal action against manufacturers and traders of low-quality and harmful edible oil in the local market, said a responsible person from the Myanmar Edible Oil Millers Association (MEOMA). The MEOMA will insist on inspections of oil mills by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), so they can get FDA certificates as soon as possible. Only then can the association meet its target of getting FDA certification for all 150 oil

mills by 2020, he added.

"To check the illegal production of edible oil and its sale in the market, the FDA must pay heed to our suggestions as far as possible," said U Khin Soe, the chairman of the MEOMA at the 23rd regular meeting held on 12 January at the Republic of the Union Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry (UMFCCI). The meeting was attended by Vice President U Myint Swe and entrepreneurs.

"The agricultural sector is facing scarcity of crop seeds,

which is making seasonal cultivation difficult. There is also the added difficulty of getting quality seeds on time. Therefore, we need to form a committee comprising local farmers and MEOMA to establish a partnership," said U Khin Soe. "There are also challenges regarding prices — there is a gap between the price of imported oil and locally produced oil. What happens is that the price of imported oil is lower than that of locally manufactured oil," said Yangon Region Chief Minister U Phy

Min Thein, on the reason why imported oil is replacing locally made oil in the market. He attributed the price difference to higher production costs faced by local manufacturers.

"If we continue to depend on harmful, imported edible oil of low quality, consumers will suffer in the long run. We're ready to take legal action. We want local manufacturers to produce edible oil of good quality at an affordable price," said U Phy Min Thein.

Objections raised on overseas fishing operations beyond maritime boundary in EEZ

WITH a view to conserve fisheries resources, the Myanmar Sea Fishing Entrepreneurs Association and academicians have objected to a proposal for permitting overseas fishing boats to operate beyond the Myanmar maritime boundary in the Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ).

A meeting was held on 8 January to discuss the proposal for allowing overseas fishing boats to operate beyond the EEZ maritime boundary under the supervision of national companies. At the meeting, the permanent secretary of the Agriculture, Livestock

and Irrigation Ministry said he will submit the objections raised by fishing entrepreneurs against the proposal to the Union Minister.

“We have object to the proposal because it is not right. Ten years ago, overseas fishing boats were permitted to fish in the EEZ area. In 2014, the then government revoked their fishing rights as we were against overseas fishing to conserve the fisheries resources. The government had enacted a law under which overseas fishing boats were not allowed to operate beyond the Myanmar maritime boundary in the EEZ. Now,

overseas fishing boats have asked the government for permission to fish in the EEZ. If they are permitted to do so, they will come to fish beyond the Myanmar maritime boundary. Some overseas fishing boats are using improper catching systems. This is the reason why we are objecting to the proposal,” said U Maung Maung Soe, the chairman of the Myanmar Sea Fishing Entrepreneurs Association.

The fisheries resources in the area beyond the maritime boundary in the EEZ are not abundant. The proposed area is also unsuitable for large fishing boats, it is learnt.

“Academicians from the fisheries field are objecting to the proposal because, from their point of view, this is not the right time as Myanmar is facing scarcity of fisheries resources. None of the ASEAN member countries permit fishing beyond their maritime boundary. If the companies are permitted to operate, they will have to build storage facilities on our side of the boundary.

They usually don't build any storage facilities because they take the catch back to their own countries,” said U Maung Maung Soe.

The Attorney-General's office has also been asked to give its opinion on the issue to the concerned ministries.

The meeting on 8 January was attended by officials from the ministries of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation, Planning

and Finance, Home Affairs, Defence, Transport and Communications, and Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation, and the Office of the Attorney-General, related companies, the Myanmar Fisheries Federation, the Myanmar Overseas Fishing Entrepreneurs Association, and the region and State fisheries associations.

Indonesia recovers second black box from Lion Air crash

JAKARTA (Indonesia) — The cockpit voice recorder from an Indonesian Lion Air jet that crashed in October has been recovered, officials said on Monday, a discovery that could be critical to explaining why a brand new plane fell out of the sky just after take-off.

The Boeing 737 MAX vanished from radar about 13 minutes after departing Jakarta, slamming into the Java Sea moments after pilots had asked to return to the capital and killing all 189 people onboard.

The bright orange voice recorder was discovered early Monday about 10 metres from a flight data recorder that was pinpoint-

ed back in November, authorities said.

"But it's broken into two pieces so hopefully it's still useful" to investigators, Haryo Satmiko, deputy head of Indonesia's National Transportation Safety Committee (NTSC), told AFP. More human remains were also found near the voice recorder, he added, without giving details.

"This will really help the investigation process... and could give some more answers on the cause" of the crash, said Jakarta-based aviation analyst Dudi Sudibyo.

The plane's previously discovered flight data recorder supplied informa-

tion about the speed, altitude and direction of the plane before it plunged into the sea on 29 October. A preliminary crash report from Indonesia's transport safety agency suggested that pilots of Flight 610 struggled to control the plane's anti-stalling system just before the accident.

It also found that the Lion Air jet should have been grounded over a recurrent technical problem before its fatal journey, as it criticised the budget carrier's poor safety culture.

But it did not pinpoint a definitive cause of the crash and a final report is not likely to come before later this year.—AFP ■

Healthy baby born to mom who recovers from Ebola in DRC

KINSHASA, —The Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC)'s Ministry of Health Thursday tweeted a photo of a four-day-old baby whose mother was found to have been infected with the Ebola virus in December and recovered from it.

In her smiling mother's arms in the posted picture, "Baby Sylvana" was born on Sunday at an Ebola treatment center in the city of Beni, one of the hardest-hit areas by Ebola virus in DRC.

Baby Sylvana is

healthy and does not have Ebola, the health ministry said, adding that the baby is the first in this outbreak born to a mother who recovered from the virus.

The DRC's Health Ministry declared a new outbreak of Ebola virus in North Kivu province in August 2018, which is the 10th outbreak of this deadly infectious disease in the country since 1976.

As of the end of 2018, figures from the DRC Ministry of Health put the number of Ebola cas-

es at 593, including 545 confirmed cases, and the death toll has reached 360.

According to the World Health Organization, Ebola is introduced into the human population through close contact with bodily fluids of infected animals and people.

The Ebola virus causes a range of symptoms including fever, vomiting, diarrhea, general discomfort or malaise and in many cases internal and external bleeding.—AFP ■

Gas leak stopped on ROK ship in Bohai Sea

JINAN — Authorities in east China's Shandong Province said a gas leak had been stopped on a Republic of Korea (ROK) liquefied petroleum gas carrier Monday morning.

The city government of Dongying said the ROK ship reported a gas leak

about 25 kilometres off Dongying Port at 10:30 am on Saturday.

The incident prompted the government to send experts to the ship to find a solution and set up an emergency rescue team. Nearby sea, port and residential areas have also

been placed under monitoring. Sinopec Shengli Oilfield, which operates an oilfield in Dongying, said it had mobilized vessels be vigilant when in proximity of the ROK ship, and drove away over 100 ships for safety concerns.

World's oceans are heating up at a quickening pace: study

TAMPA (United States) — The world's oceans are heating up at an accelerating pace as global warming threatens a diverse range of marine life and a major food supply for the planet, researchers said on Thursday.

The findings in the US journal Science, led by the Chinese Academy of Sciences, debunk previous reports that suggested a so-called pause in global warming in recent years.

The latest technology shows no such hiatus ever existed, raising new concerns about the pace of climate change and its effect on the planet's main buffer — the oceans.

“Ocean heating is a very important indicator of climate change, and we have robust evidence that it is warming more rapidly

than we thought,” said co-author Zeke Hausfather, a graduate student in the Energy and Resources Group at the University

of California, Berkeley.

About 93 per cent of excess heat — trapped around the Earth by greenhouse gases that

come from the burning of fossil fuels — accumulates in the world's oceans.

The latest report relied on four studies,

published between 2014 and 2017, that gave more precise estimates of past trends in ocean heat, allowing scientists to update past research and hone predictions for the future.

A key factor in the more accurate numbers is an ocean monitoring fleet called Argo, which includes nearly 4,000 floating robots that “drift throughout the world's oceans, every few days diving to a depth of 2,000 metres (yards) and measuring the ocean's temperature, pH, salinity and other bits of information as they rise back up,” said the report.

Argo “has provided consistent and widespread data on ocean heat content since the mid-2000s,” it said.

The new analysis shows warming in the oceans is on pace with

measurements of rising air temperature.

And if nothing is done to reduce greenhouse gases, “models predict that the temperature of the top 2,000 metres of the world's oceans will rise 0.78 degrees Celsius by the end of the century,” it said.

The thermal expansion — water swelling as it warms — would raise sea level 12 inches (30 centimetres), above any sea level rise from melting glaciers and ice sheets.

“While 2018 will be the fourth warmest year on record on the surface, it will most certainly be the warmest year on record in the oceans, as was 2017 and 2016 before that,” Hausfather said.

“The global warming signal is a lot easier to detect if it is changing in the oceans than on the surface.”—AFP ■

Popular kabuki actor Ichikawa Ebizo to become 13th holder of Danjuro

TOKYO — Popular kabuki actor Ichikawa Ebizo, 41, will become Ichikawa Danjuro XIII in May 2020, Shochiku Co, producer of Kabuki performances and operator of Tokyo's famed Kabukiza theater, said on Monday.

Danjuro is a stage name established in the latter part of the 17th century and taken on by kabuki actors of the Ichikawa family. It is considered the most prestigious of the kabuki stage names.

Name-succession celebrations, including a series of performances at Kabukiza that runs for three months, are being planned. The celebration period will coincide with the 2020 Tokyo Olympic Games. Ebizo's father, Ichikawa

Danjuro XII, died in 2013.

His 5-year-old son Kangen Horikoshi will become Ichikawa Shinnosuke VIII on the same occasion.

Ebizo first took the stage at age 5 and became Ichikawa Shinnosuke VII in 1985. In 2004, he became Ichikawa Ebizo XI.

In 2017, Ebizo lost his wife, Mao Kobayashi, a TV personality who drew wide attention as she began keeping a record of her battle with breast cancer on her blog. Kobayashi was named in the 2016 edition of the BBC's 100 Women list of inspirational and influential female figures after she broke her silence about her struggle with cancer on her blog. —Kyodo News

Cuarón's 'Roma' a top winner at the Critics' Choice Awards

SANTA MONICA (United States) —Hollywood's award season was in full swing late Sunday, with Alfonso Cuarón's "Roma" — an ode to the director's childhood in 1970s Mexico City — the big winner at the Critics' Choice Awards.

"Roma" won trophies for best picture, best foreign-language film, and for both director and cinematography for Cuarón.

"This bunch of Mexicans are not as bad as sometimes they are portrayed," said Cuarón said, a

reference to President Donald Trump's hardline rhetoric on immigration.

Shot in black and white, and filmed in Spanish and the indigenous Mixtec language, "Roma" is a semi-autobiographical chronicle of a year in the life of Cuarón's family and his childhood nanny.

"Roma" — the title a reference to a posh Mexico City neighbourhood — earlier won two Golden Globes and is a leading contender for an Oscar at the

Academy Awards ceremony in February.

Christian Bale, who portrayed former US vice president Dick Cheney in "Vice," won awards in the Best Actor and Best Actor in a Comedy categories, while Glenn Close ("The Wife") and Lady Gaga ("A Star is Born") jointly won in the Best Actress category.

Mahershala Ali ("Green Book") walked away with a Best Supporting Actor win, while Regina King ("If Beale Street Could Talk") won for Best Supporting Actress. Offbeat 18th century royal romp "The Favourite" won the award for Best Acting Ensemble, while its star Olivia Colman won the Best Actress in a Comedy award. "Spider-Man: Into the Spider-Verse" won the Best Animated Feature award, beating out stiff competition from Pixar-Disney's "The Incredibles 2," Disney's "Ralph Breaks the Internet," and director Wes Anderson's quirky "Isle of Dogs."

Tom Cruise vehicle "Mission: Impossible — Fallout" won the Best Action Movie award, beating Marvel-Disney box office blockbusters "Black Panther" and "Avengers: Infinity Wars."

The multi-nominated "Black Panther" however won awards for Best Visual Effects, Best Costume Design and Best Production Design. "Crazy Rich Asians" won in the Best Comedy category, beating out "The Favourite" and "The Death of Stalin," among others.—AFP ■

Steve Trevor is tonally different in 'Wonder Woman 1984': Chris Pine

LOS ANGELES — Actor Chris Pine says his character Steve Trevor is "tonally" different in "Wonder Woman 1984" as "tables have turned" for him.

Director Patty Jenkins, who helmed Warner Bros blockbuster "Wonder Woman" fronted by Gal Gadot, is back for the sequel and so is Pine.

Last year, Jenkins made a startling revelation that the actor will reprise his role of Trevor, an American pilot and the love interest of Diana Prince/Wonder Woman. The character had sacrificed himself at the end of the 2017 film.

The filmmaker had also shared Pine's still from the film which features him dressed in an '80s avatar, along with the extras rocking yesteryear's look.

Talking about his return in the sequel, Pine told Variety, "This one is a little different for me tonally. The tables are turned, and I'm more of the deer in the headlights."

The actor also said that he got emotional while filming in Washington DC for the movie.

"I cried in front of the Supreme Court. I was like, man, for all that we f**ked up, we're still at it. We're still trying. So I was super energised and pro-America," he added.

Cosmic radiation possible cause of Spektr-R failure - source

MOSCOW — The Spektr-R space radio telescope's transmission device failure may have been caused by cosmic radiation accumulated in the spacecraft's electronics during the past eight years, a source in the Russian space industry informed TASS on Monday.

"The specialists cite the influence of the radiation dosage accumulated during the flight period in the satellite's electronic component base as a possible cause for the failure of the Spektr-R receiving and transmitting device," the agency's source informed.

On 11 January, the Gazeta.ru internet portal reported problems with the Spektr-R spacecraft, citing the Radioastron project head and corresponding member of the Russian Academy of Sciences Yuri Kovalev. Nikolai Kardashev, a member of the Russian Academy of Sciences and director of the AstroSpace Centre (the Radio-

astron project contractor), told TASS that the satellite's control has malfunctioned, although the spacecraft still emits a signal.

The Spektr-R was launched in 2011 and the warranty period of its active operation expired back in 2014.

Before this year, the radio

telescope continued tackling targeted tasks, Roscosmos said.

Roscosmos told TASS earlier that Sunday's attempt to regain control of the old Spektr-R satellite had failed. More attempts will be made on Monday.—Tass ■

Smoking, drinking linked to different brain areas

BEIJING — A recent international study found that different brain areas are associated with smoking and drinking which may shed light on the prevention and treatment of alcohol and nicotine abuse.

Researchers from China's Fudan University, the University of Warwick in the UK, and other research institutions analyzed brain functional magnetic resonance images from two brain scan databases from the United States and Europe.

They reported on the latest issue of journal *eLife* that the medial orbitofrontal cortex, a brain area associated with rewards, has higher functional connectivity in drinkers. It suggests that drinkers are attracted to alcohol for the experience of pleasure caused by the reward system in the brain.

Meanwhile, smokers had low functional brain connectivity in general, especially in the lateral orbitofrontal cortex, a brain region linked to impulsive behav-

our. It suggests that smokers need the stimulating effect of nicotine to increase their overall brain connectivity.

The study also found that the changes in functional brain connectivity were detectable even when participants smoked only a few cigarettes or drank a small amount of alcohol every day.

Feng Jianfeng, a corresponding author of the study and director of the Institute of Science and Technology for Brain-Inspired Intelligence, Fudan University, said the study could have important public health implications as both drinking and smoking affect a large part of the global population.

According to the World Health Organization, over 1.1 billion people smoke tobacco in the world, and more than 7 million people die each year due to the use of tobacco. Around 2.3 billion people worldwide are current drinkers, and excessive drinking killed more than 3 million people in 2016.—Xinhua ■

Algeria's ancient pyramid tombs still shrouded in mystery

TIARET (Algeria) — Dating back centuries, Algeria's pyramid tombs are unique relics of an ancient era but a dearth of research has left the Jeddars shrouded in mystery.

The 13 monuments, whose square stone bases are topped with angular mounds, are perched on a pair of hills near the city of Tiaret, some 250 kilometres (155 miles) southwest of the capital Algiers.

Constructed between the fourth and seventh centuries, the tombs are believed by some scholars to have been built as final resting places for Berber royalty — although nobody knows who truly laid within.

But Algerian authorities and archaeologists are now pushing to get the Jeddars listed as a UNESCO World Heritage site, in the hope of assuring their preservation and study.

Gaining such status is a lengthy process and the culture ministry said Algeria's application to the UN body "will be filed during the first quarter of 2020".

Experts from the National Centre for Prehistoric, Anthropological and Historical Research have for more than a year been preparing their case for the Jed-

dars. The goal is to "preserve this heritage, which is of immeasurable value and an ancestral legacy", said Mustapha Dorbane, a professor at Algiers 2 University's Archaeology Institute.

When the Jeddars were built, Berber kings ruled the area in small fiefdoms whose history is poorly known and of which few traces were left.

It was a period of great unrest for the former Roman province of Numidia, as Rome's western empire collapsed, Vandal and Byzantine troops invaded, and Arab forces stormed across North Africa. For centuries these far-flung monuments sat largely ignored, delivered to the ravages of time and looters.

'Wonders'

But more recently a group of around 20 archaeology students and their teachers has been working at the monuments.

Moving slowly, they noted vandalized spots and used water and brushes to gently clean stone-engraved symbols before measuring them.

A meticulous task, each entry may take upwards of two hours.

Algerian archaeologist Rachid Mahouz, who has spent five

years on a doctoral thesis about the tombs, deplores the lack of research devoted to the country's "wonders".

"The French archives on the Jeddars are not available and the objects and bones found during the colonial era were taken to France," said Mahouz, who was born and raised nearby.

Archaeology was not taught at Algerian universities until the early 1980s, and until now, no speciality on funerary monuments is

offered. The research team has been working on Jeddar A, which sits on Mount Lakhdar along with monuments B and C.

The remaining Jeddars are on a hilltop some six kilometres away, Mount Arouri, and are known by the letters D through M.


Each contains at least one room, with the largest mound giving way to a labyrinth of 20 compartments, including funerary chambers. Some rooms are equipped with benches, areas

researchers believe may have been used for worship.

Inside the tombs, traditional Christian symbols as well as hunting scenes and animal figures are carved above the doors.

Traces of inscriptions believed to be Latin mark the walls, but time has rendered them unreadable.

Among the layers of history, researchers say they have also found Greek letters — although others dispute this.—AFP ■

Fernando Torres renews contract with J-League's Sagan Tosu

TOKYO — Former Spain striker Fernando Torres has renewed his contract with J-League first-division side Sagan Tosu, the club announced on Sunday.

Torres, who scored 38 goals in 110 matches for Spain's national team, joined unheralded Sagan last July in a shock move that made headlines around the world.

The 34-year-old former Liverpool and Atletico Madrid star played 19 league and cup games for Sagan last season, scoring four goals, with two assists.

"I am looking forward to the new season. Everyone is working hard to be at our strongest," Torres said in a statement through the club. Sagan, who were promoted to J1 for the first time in 2012, finished 14th last year after fighting a relegation battle until the end of the season.

The club, located on Japan's southwestern main island of Kyushu, last month named Spaniard Lluís Carreras, a former teammate of Torres at Atletico, as its manager for next season. —Kyodo News ■

Solskjaer hails De Gea as United dig deep to beat Spurs

LONDON (United Kingdom) — Ole Gunnar Solskjaer said David de Gea was making a case to be considered Manchester United's greatest-ever goalkeeper after he produced a masterclass on Sunday to protect his side's 1-0 lead against Tottenham.

The match at Wembley pitted two of the bookmakers' favourites to permanently replace Jose Mourinho against one another but it was the interim United boss who came out on top against Mauricio Pochettino.

Marcus Rashford scored the only goal in the 44th minute of a thrilling encounter and Paul Pogba impressed but the performance of the Spanish goalkeeper will live long in the memory.

He made 11 saves — the most he has made in a top-flight league match without conceding a goal — leaving Spurs players holding their heads in disbelief on multiple occasions.

Solskjaer hailed De Gea as "the best goalkeeper in the world" but also praised his team's defensive resilience and team spirit.

"We've had some great 'keepers at this club and I think he's challenging both Edwin (van der Sar) and Peter (Schmeichel) for the number one spot historically, he said.

"The win here was massive,

the team spirit was massive, the belief and the joy in the dressing room absolutely fantastic," added the Norwegian, who has equalled Matt Busby's record of winning his first five league games in charge of United.

United were eight points behind Arsenal when Solskjaer became their caretaker manager on 19 December but are now level on points with the fifth-placed Gunners as they hunt down a Champions League qualification spot.

But the result is a devastating blow for Tottenham, who again came up short when the pressure was on and remain nine points adrift of Premier League leaders Liverpool.

Pochettino praised his side despite their defeat.

"Tottenham did everything to win the game," he said. "Maybe we dominated and we created a lot of chances. It was an amazing second half, I am so pleased.

"Sometimes you win a game and you are disappointed, like when we won 3-0 at Old Trafford. They were better than us that day. Today the result should be different and I am happy."

Earlier, Tottenham settled quickly into their fluid passing game, enjoying the bulk of possession and went close to open-

ing the scoring through Harry Winks before Jesse Lingard fired over from close range for the visitors.

United, with Lingard, Anthony Martial and Rashford racing forward at every opportunity, looked dangerous on the break.

Spurs striker Harry Kane had a close-range effort correctly ruled out for offside just after the half hour. Moussa Sissoko pulled up sharply shortly before the break and although he returned to the pitch he was unable to continue, being replaced by Erik Lamela.

Moments later United were ahead. Lingard cut out a careless cross-field ball from Kieran Trippier and nudged the ball to Pogba, who had time to look up and measure a raking cross-field pass to Rashford, sprinting down the right.

Rashford still had plenty to do but kept his nerve to fire right-footed past Lloris and into the far corner — Lloris got fingertips to the ball but was unable to keep it out.

Tottenham came out of the blocks smartly after the restart and Kane looked certain to level from close range but De Gea saved brilliantly with his left foot before pulling off a fine save to deny an Alli headed effort. —AFP ■

'Another galaxy': Messi's 400 La Liga goals is 'monstrous'


BARCELONA (Spain) — Lionel Messi's total of 400 La Liga goals is "monstrous", according to Barcelona coach Ernesto Valverde, who described his Argentine superstar as belonging to "another galaxy".

Messi hit his quadruple century in the 53rd minute of Barca's win over Eibar on Sunday to extend his record as the division's all-time top scorer.

He collected the ball off Luis Suarez and drove it into the bottom corner at the Camp Nou to reach the historic landmark after 435 matches. Barca went on to win the game 3-0, with Suarez twice on target. "It's monstrous," said Valverde, after the match. "It's easy to say but you have to

score them one after the other, it's a long-term job. "Messi is an extraordinary player because he is not only a scorer. It's everything that he creates around him too.

He added: "His numbers are stratospheric, incredible. He is from another galaxy." Messi has finished top scorer in La Liga five times. He has 17 goals already this season. It is 14 years since Messi scored his first La Liga goal and the 31-year-old Argentine has gone on to build an enormous lead at the top of the league's all-time scoring chart. Cristiano Ronaldo remains the second highest scorer with 311 goals in 292 games while Spain's Telmo Zarra is third with 251 goals in 278 games. —AFP ■
