Fourth-day meeting of Second Pyithu Hluttaw's 11th regular session held

THE second Pyithu Hluttaw's 11th regular session held its fourth-day meeting at the Pyithu Hluttaw meeting hall yesterday, where asterisk-marked questions were answered, a motion tabled and a reported read and submitted.

Asterisk-marked question session

In the asterisk-marked question session, Dr. Than Aung Soe of Minhla constituency raised the question of how many numbers of pharmacy degree holders and of whether the plan is being implemented for creation jobs for them, status of vacancies in government and private sectors. Union Minister for Health and Sports Dr. Myint Htwe replied that pharmacy degree holders were employed as government employees in Department of Human Resources for Health, Department of Medical Service, Department of Medical Research, Myanmar Pharmaceutical Factory and in Yangon General Hospital.

In the private sector, they were employed in production and quality control and quality assurance sections of pharmaceutical factories. In addition to local private companies, foreign pharmaceutical companies employ them as medical sales persons.

They are also employed in pharmaceutical products related jobs of private hospitals. Many were also employed in pharmaceutical imported companies.

B Pharm graduates were also employed as medical expert-2 (medicine) and chief medicine inspector in Food and Drug Administration. After serving five years and depending upon vacancy, they were promoted to executive officers explained the Union Minister. The asterisk-marked question session then continued with Daw Khin Saw Wai of Yathedaung constituency asking if there is a plan to employ in a timely manner vacant positions in the Yathedaung Township, Moe Se Kyun Ku Taung station hospital. Union Minister for Health and Sports Dr. Myint Htwe answered that a neighbourhood hospital doctor will be employed in 2019

April. At the moment one out of two senior nurses had been employed and one out of four nurses was employed. One more nurse was employed on 21 January. One daily-wager was also employed. The Union Minister remarked on understanding the requirement in the difficult region of Rakhine State and will consider employing more in the forthcoming budget.

Next U Ne Lin Aung of Mindat constituency asked if there is a plan to construct a standard 16-bed hospital in Mindat Township, Makuiimnu town and Union Minister for Health and Sports Dr. Myint Htwe said 5.8 acre of land in a new ward of Makuiimnu Ward had been earmarked a project land. At the moment the department is conducting field measurement and once necessary land orders were obtained fund will be allocated in the 2019-2020 Budget.

The support of the State head, Hluttaw representative and General Administration Department is required to obtain the land order said the Union Minister.

The Union Minister added further that at the moment Makuiimnu town is using water mainly from spring water and the site where the hospital is planned to be constructed is about 5 miles away from the spring water source. Therefore at the moment the hospital cannot be constructed where there is no water. If the land and water is obtained with the support of Hluttaw representatives, General Administration Department and Chin State government, budget will be allocated in the forthcoming year said the Union Minister.

Similarly questions raised by U Maung Myint of Mingin constituency, U Steven of Kengtung constituency, U Ohn Lwin of Nyaungdon constituency and U Khin Maung Thi of Loilem constituency were answered by Union Minister for Health and Sports Dr. Myint Htwe.

Motion for Union Government to promote sports sector with fund

After the asterisk marked question session, Dr. U Sein Mya Aye of Dala constituency tabled a motion urging the Union Government to promote sports sector

by allocating fund so that new generation youth grow up healthy and alert while people of working age are physically and mentally developed and free from drugs and other bad influences. He provided detailed explanation about the reason for tabling the motion and the motion was supported by U Kyaw Soe Win of Kawhmu constituency. After obtaining the decision of the Hluttaw, Pyithu Hluttaw Speaker announced the Hluttaw's agreement to accept and discuss the motion. Pyithu Hluttaw Speaker announced further for Hluttaw representatives who want to discuss the motion to register their names.

Reading of 2017 Land Confiscation Bill report

Next Pyithu Hluttaw Speaker U T Khun Myat informed the Hluttaw about the receipt of 2017 Land Confiscation Bill approved and sent with amendments by Amyotha Hluttaw and Bill Committee member Daw Mar Mar Khaing read the committee's report on the bill. Pyithu Hluttaw Speaker then announced for Hluttaw representatives who want to submit an amendment motion to register their names. MSME businesses had learnt first-hand that people from all levels come to visit these exhibitions enabling the MSMEs to hear the voices and feedback of the people, make timely improvements, advertise products and services and expand markets.

Another arrangement by MSMEDWC was granting permission to award winning products of MSME businesses in the MSME Product Exhibitions & Competitions to use MSME Logo recognized by MSMEDWC. In February 2019, the MSME Logo competition would be held where the best logo would be selected. By granting permission to award

winning MSME businesses to use this logo, consumers would have more trust and confidence in the award winning products and would support market expansion of these products.

By holding exhibitions and competitions of regional products all over the country, the quality

of the MSME products would be raised and there would be more import substitutions; contacts would be made between the local production sector and the trading sector; MSMEs would be transformed from traditional family business to world standard products and services providers with innovation and entrepreneurship; know the requirement of the consumers, expand markets and participate in the Global Value Chain.

According to the 2014 census, Taninthayi Region has a population of more than 1.4 million on a land area of 43,328 square kilometer. On the north there is Mon State. Thailand is on the east and south while on the west there is Andaman Sea. It had many opportunities for economic development. On the Myeik archipelago, white and old gold natural and cultured pearl could be produced. Elephant Foot Yam, Kan Zaw herbal oil, rubber and palm oil plantations, bird nest or swiftlet nest, aqua culture and fishery works were abundant in Taninthayi Region. In addition to this, Maungmagan Beach, pagodas like Dawei Ko Myo Shin, Taninthayi mountain range, the sea and the archipelago could attract local and international visitors and the expanding travel business would surely develop the economy of the region.

The Dawei Special Economic Zone project was a project that would support the development of the region. Basic infrastructure works during the preliminary stage include construction of a two-lane road, urban housing and jetty, electricity distribution and communications works and would create a lot of job

opportunities for the local people. Emphasis must be placed towards enabling the entry of skilled workers into these new jobs and worksites. Prospective businesses in the region were to be systematically established and expanded. Getting rid of pests urgent and pressing need for Myanmar farmers

CURRENTLY in some areas of the Regions and States of the country, various pests such as that of Fall Armyworm (FAW) and Rice Swarming Caterpillar (RSC) (*Spodoptera Mauritica*) (SM) have infected the winter crop of corn and maize in the fields of Myanmar at an alarming degree and situation. Despite timely pest controls and protection have been carried out, some acres incurred damage and loss, but some winter crop of corn could have been saved.

The Plant Protection Division of the Myanma Agricultural Service (Department of Agriculture under Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation) has conducted a seminar on 5 January 2019 on the infection of pests namely Fall Armyworm (FAW) and Rice Swarming Caterpillar (RSC) (SM) with the collaboration of CABI (The Centre for Agriculture and Bioscience International) and Exeter University (The University of Exeter is a public research university in Exeter, Devon, South West England, United Kingdom) providing information on the infection of pests in some Regions and States of the country.

Locusts, armyworm, fruit flies, banana diseases, cassava diseases and wheat rusts are among the most destructive trans-boundary plant pests and diseases. Plant pests and diseases spread in three principal ways: trade or other human-migrated movement, environmental forces – weather and windborne, it is learnt.

Mostly in Shan State, Sagaing Region and Nay Pyi Taw Area, and some areas of Chin State and Kachin State are found to have the risk and possibility of infection of RSC.

Infection of Rice Swarming Caterpillar (RSC)

The early estimation has projected that of the high risk areas are in Shan State, Rakhine State, Chin State, Kayah State, Nay Pyi Taw Area, Sagaing Region, that of the medium risk areas are in Yangon Region and Tanintharyi Region, and that of the low risk areas are in Mandalay Region,



Magway Region, Bago Region, Ayeyawaddy Region, Mon State, Kayin State and Kachin State.

Currently, Myingyan Township in Myingyan District of Mandalay Region, Tatkon Township of Nay Pyi Taw Area, Kyaing Tong Township of Shan (East) State, Nyaungdone Township, Danuphyu Township, Zalun Township, Hinthada Township of Ayeyawaddy Region have experienced the infection of Rice Swarming Caterpillar (RSC) in the fields of corn and maize, according to the information released from the Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation.

"In these areas, the Fall Armyworm (FAW) and Rice Swarming Caterpillar (RSC) have infected since second week of January, and that due to the pests infection, the early and young age crops of corn and maize have been damaged, however, the matured corn crops are saved from damaged," said farmer U Myint Zaw.

"Currently, about (2000) acres of crops have been infected with the pests. When the pests infected the areas in Zalun Township, the necessary plans for plant protection and pests control are being carried out by the Myanma Agriculture Service.

Some months back, the Union Minister for Agriculture, and the Chief Minister of the Region made field trips and delivered awareness talks," he continued.

Therefore, getting rid of pests has become an urgent and pressing requirement for farmers in Myanmar, and stakeholders must consider it a priority.

"Moreover, various spray methods of pesticides and the plant protection techniques were disseminated, and it has achieved some benefits. In the past years, the infection of RSC could be controlled by spraying with the insecticides. However, this year the infection of Fall Armyworm (FAW) and Rice Swarming Caterpillar (RSC) are very hard to kill and to get rid of as they do not die through the spraying. The female moths produced eggs into insects that eat away the plants from the base, and the worst scenario is that the germs are easy to multiply, making us helpless to get rid of the pests," farmer U

Myint Zaw explained about the devastating pests.

Fall Armyworm larva vary from light tan to black with three light yellow stripes down the back. There is a wider dark stripe and a wavy yellow-red blotched stripe on each side. Larvae have four pairs of fleshy abdominal pro-legs in addition to the pair at the end of the body. Fall armyworm resembles both armyworm and corn earworm, but fall armyworm has a white inverted "Y" mark on the front of the dark head. The corn earworm has an orange-brown head, while the armyworm has a brown head with dark honeycombed markings. Fall armyworm has four dark spots arranged in a square on top of the eighth abdominal segment.

Fast spreading

The current winter corn and maize crops areas is estimated at (150,000) acres in December, and that in Myingyan Township it is infected with Fall Armyworm (FAW) and Rice Swarming Caterpillar (RSC), and in a few weeks time it spread to other Regions and States.

Currently, the pests have infected (100,000) acres in Ayeyawaddy Region, and they are destroying all the unripe crops as well as matured crops. The pest control tasks are required the whole year round. Such infection

of pests had occurred in India and in Bangladesh in 2016.

The responsible persons of the areas and the agricultural professionals are providing necessary assistance in the prevention, protection and control of pests in their field trips.

In the infected areas by the Rice Swarming Caterpillar (RSC), pesticides spraying tasks through the unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV) have been carried out. In the uninfected areas, early plant protection measures are being undertaken, according to the Myanma Agriculture Service.

At this time of winter corn and maize season, the Fall Armyworm (FAW) and Rice Swarming Caterpillar (RSC) grew heavily and spread very fast, and destroyed the plants, incurring grave loss to the farmers.

The local farmers and cultivators are required to constantly check their plots whether it is likely to have the pests, and seek assistance from the local authorities and the officials in the regions and states in fighting against the pests, citing to the advice given by Deputy Director-General U Hla Myint Aung.

Feature of Rice Swarming Caterpillar (RSC)

Spodoptera Mauritica (SM), the lawn armyworm or paddy swarming caterpillar, is a moth of the family Noctuidae. The spe-

cies was first described by Jean Baptiste Boisduval in 1833. Able to eat many types of food, it is a major pest throughout the world

The wingspan is about 40 mm. It is dark grey brown with a rusty tinge on its body. The pests could eat up (80) varieties of various crops including rice, ground nuts, vegetables and yellow colored crops, according to agronomists. The pests destroyed the corn crops very easily and the germs grew very fast and spread rapidly.

The farmers could get rid of the pests in many ways such as that of spraying strong pesticides, that of picking up by hands and clearing away, that of lighting up trap fire near the plants, that of clearing the weeds, that of turning upside down the earth in the plant areas, that of clearing away the eggs and maggots, that of sending Mantis that have enormous appetites, eating various aphids, leafhoppers, mosquitoes, caterpillars and other soft-bodied insects when young, that of spraying strong pesticides in the morning and in the evening, according to Agricultural Officer U Saw Win.

Timely protection

The farmers are now cultivating winter corn and maize, and that Fall Armyworm (FAW) and Rice Swarming Caterpillar (RSC) are giving troubles to the farmers, and that the cultivators could seek assistance and help from the officials of the Myanma Agriculture Service, and that early prevention and protection could be carried out so that safe and secure condition is being assured.

Beginning fourth week of December 2018, total of (142,120) acres in Ayeyawaddy Region is recorded as sown acreage, where (136,013) acres in (15) townships of Patheingyi, Hinthada, Maubin and Myaungmya districts had experienced of pests infection of Fall Armyworm (FAW) and Rice Swarming Caterpillar (RSC).

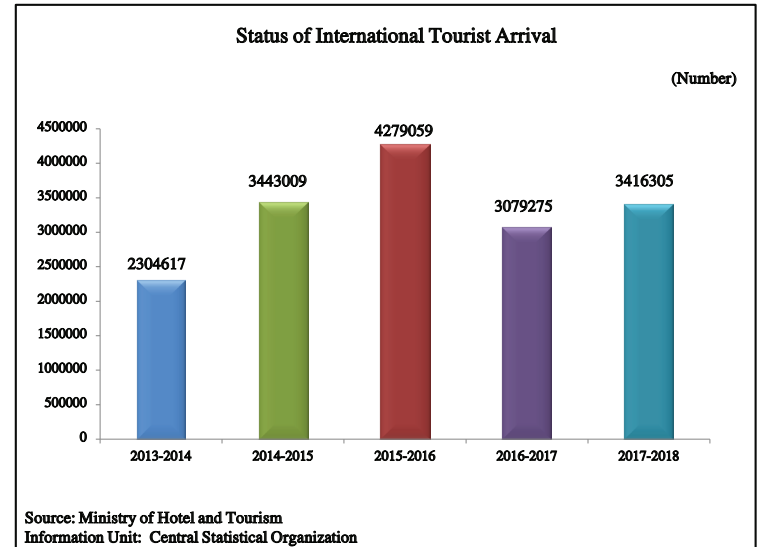
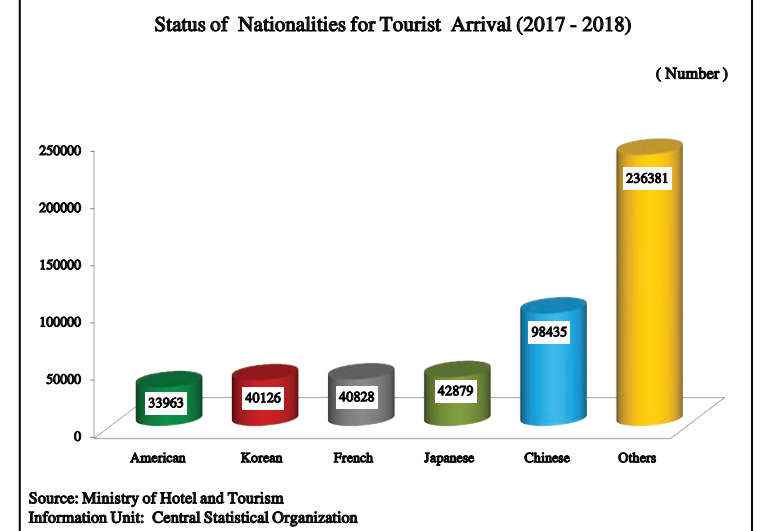
According to the Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation, there is possible risk of economic loss on (39,572) acres, and that (6,559) acres have been so far damaged. Therefore, getting rid of pests has become an urgent and pressing requirement for farmers in Myanmar, and stakeholders must consider it a priority.

New chili pepper, tamarind enter Yangon market

NEW chili pepper started entering the Yangon region market in the middle of January, said merchants.

New chili pepper from Hinthada and Myanaung, cultivated with seeds from India, was selling at a wholesale price of K4,300 per viss when it entered the Yangon region market. But the price fell to K3,900-4,000 per viss on 23 January. The prices

of Shan and Kyauk Ye long chili peppers also declined to around K4,000 from K4,600 per viss. The price of Indian chili pepper also fell to K4,300 from K4,600 per viss.

Chili pepper is grown in the delta regions after the harvesting of the monsoon paddy. Therefore, new chili pepper is expected to enter the market at the end of March, said mer-

chants. In 2018, the price of new chili pepper from the delta regions declined to a record K2,200 per viss in the wholesale market.

The price has increased to about K3,800 per viss. Tamarind started entering the Yangon region market at the end of December. On 23 January, the prices of tamarind fell by K150-K200 per viss.

"Although new tamarind

has been entering the market, traders wishing to store the crop for a year usually buy it in March," said a local tamarind seller.

Although the prices of tamarind increased to about K3,500 per viss in 2017, they fell to K1,500 per viss in 2018, according to merchants.—Maung Say Aung ■

Four-year-old girl drowns in boat accident in Inle Lake

A four-year-old girl reportedly fell overboard into Inle Lake after the motorized boat her family was travelling in collided with another boat on Thursday. Her body was found at a depth of six feet near the accident site.

The girl was travelling with her parents and two-month-old sister from north to south on the lake. Their boat was being driven by Wa Toke, also known

as Aung Thet Phyto, 19, from Ywarma village. The driver of the second boat has been identified as Zaw Oo, 26. The accident took place at 5.30 p.m. on 24 January. The girl's body was fished out and taken to Nyaungshwe Hospital.

The Nyaungshwe Police have initiated action against the two boat drivers under the existing laws.—Translated by La Woon ■

Weapons, drugs seized in Tachilek

ACTING on a tip, officials with the police and the anti-drug squad searched a car and seized weapons and drugs from it in Tachilek Township of Shan State (West) on 24 January. Two men have been charged in the case. They have been identified as Sai Lone Than, 33, and Kyaw Kyaw Win, 46. The authorities found Sai Lone Than carrying a gas gun and 17 drug tablets, while they found Kyaw Kyaw Win carrying a pistol made in Australia and of the Glock

Ges.m.b.H brand with 12 bullets.

In a separate case, authorities stopped and searched a motorcycle, driven by Maung Ba, 48, en route from Aungpinle village to Tachilek around 10.55 p.m. the same day, and seized 1.2 grams of heroin. In connection with the case, the authorities arrested a 25-year-old man for selling drugs at Wankaung market. The Tachilek Police have filed a case against the two men.—Sai Yaung Khan ■

DaNa Facility, Snacks Mandalay to jointly invest \$3.1 mln in spices market

THE DaNa Facility, a UK Government Department for International Development (DFID) funded programme, and Snacks Mandalay, a food processing company, yesterday announced a joint investment of \$3.1 million in an innovative new project, Three Star Chili, focused on increasing the number of spice farmers in the Mandalay Region involved in their supply chains.

The programme will engage 4,000 poor farmers into high value crop supply chains and providing training to increase incomes.

The investment supports direct purchasing of spices from farmers at the spot-market price in Yangon, 16% - 23% higher than the price farmers traditionally get from traders. Snacks Mandalay will then process and sell the spices through organic and conventional channels in domestic and foreign markets.

Through improving the processing of spices to international standards, Snacks Mandalay will sell products in premium markets for higher market prices. This is a win for poor farmers

and a win for Snacks Mandalay.

Speaking at the launch event the Head of DFID Myanmar, Dr Gail Marzetti, said "we see that it has significant potential to increase the incomes of farmers, transform the production and quality of spices in Myanmar, and help the market become more efficient and inclusive."

Also speaking in Mandalay Dr. Pyae Phyto Aye, Managing Director of Snacks Mandalay said: "Sustainability is a goal for everyone involved in the whole value chain of our busi-

ness. Through this project, we will provide a stable market and more income for Myanmar farmers and create job opportunities for women labourers through farming."

The project is specifically targeting spices farmers who are amongst poorest with incomes of less than K 170,000 per family - equivalent to the international \$1.90 poverty line. The typical net earnings of these farmers is about K 90,000 per person per month, with women earning around 30% less than men.—GNLM ■

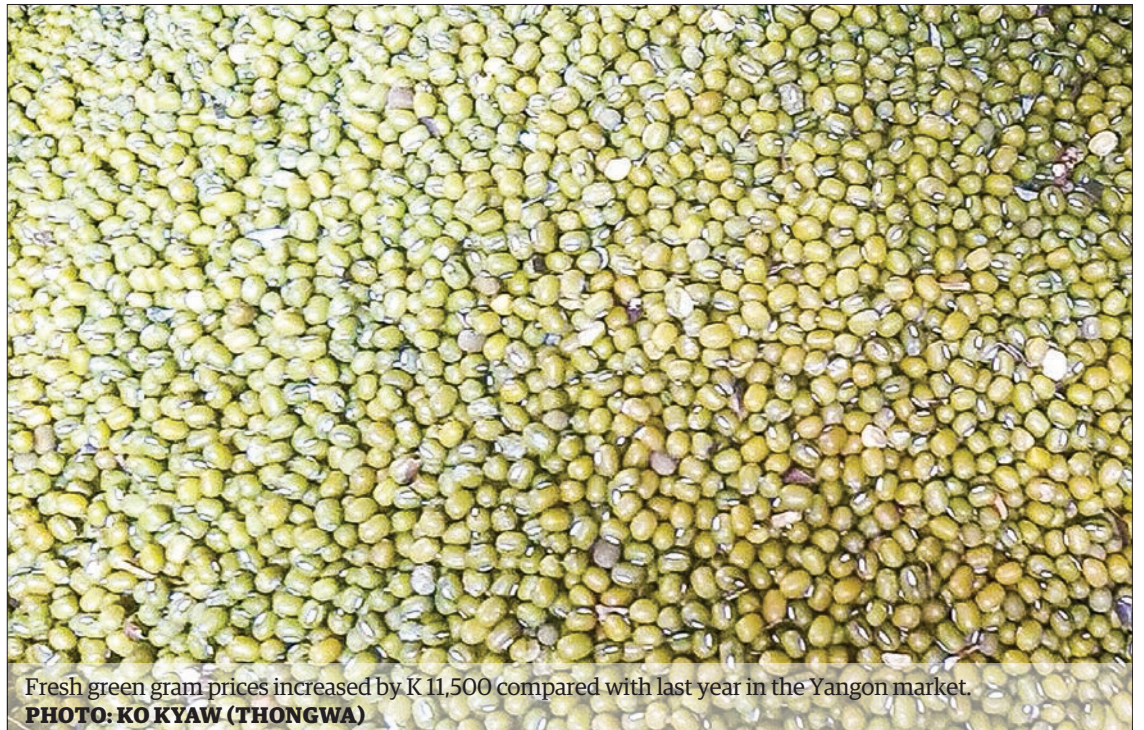
Freshly harvested green gram fetches high price in Yangon market

NEWLY harvested green gram has begun entering the market in the Thongwa Township of Yangon Region, with growers selling it at a high price, according to wholesalers.

Wholesalers said the price of green gram was K44,500 per basket on 25 January. Each basket contains 20 viss (72 pounds) of green gram. The price has increased by K11,500 compared with last year, when a basket of green gram was fetching K33,000. The price of green gram is usually volatile at the beginning of the harvest period. The price is expected to change, depending on the production.

In Thongwa Township, growers are mainly cultivating monsoon paddy and marketable

varieties of green gram. Green gram can be harvested two and a half months after planting. Normally, local growers start planting green gram in the second week of November. Growers estimate that almost all green gram plantations will be ready for harvest in mid-February. U Tin Myint Aung, the head of the Thongwa Township Agriculture Department, said depending on the climate, quality of soil, seeds, fertilizers and other inputs, an acre of green gram can produce over 20 baskets of the crop. For the 2018-2019 Financial Year, the acreage of winter green gram in the township stands at 129,984 acres, he added.—Ko Kyaw (Thongwa) (Translated by Khaing Thanda Lwin)

Myanmar International Furniture Expo 2019 to be held at Tatmadaw Hall

THE Myanmar International Furniture Expo 2019 will be jointly held by the Myanmar Rattan and Bamboo Entrepreneurs Association and the Wood-based Furniture Association from 14 to 17 February at the Tatmadaw Exhibition Hall. The objectives behind the expo include improving Myanmar's furniture industry, shifting to value-added production, creating jobs, alleviating poverty, improving import-substitution businesses, encouraging value-added producers, holding international furniture expos, and upgrading technology by linking with international producers.

"The two associations have a number of producers and exporters. The event will help them connect with local and foreign buyers," said U Kyaw Thu, the chair of the Myanmar Rattan and Bamboo Entrepreneurs Association. Sixty companies will showcase their products at more than 160 booths during the four-day expo. At present, Myanmar exports furniture made

of bamboo, rattan, and wood to markets in the US, the Republic of Korea, Japan, New Zealand, Australia, and the EU. The exports of bamboo, rattan, and wood furniture fetch over US\$20 million per year, according to the Myanmar Rattan and Bamboo Entrepreneurs Association. "The income from bamboo, rattan, and wood exports has reached \$20 million. But, earnings should have increased. In the last 30 to 40 years, Myanmar has exported teak logs and raw materials as the country was affected by the poor infrastructure. There are over 700 rattan and bamboo companies in Viet Nam. But Myanmar has 30 to 40 value-added rattan and bamboo enterprises. We need to make efforts to increase the number of value-added producers and help them grow their business," said U Kyaw Thu. The Myanmar International Furniture Expo is a biannual event organized by the two associations. This will be the tenth expo for value-added furniture products made of bamboo, rattan, and wood. ■ (Translated by Ei Myat Mon)

Trade deficit shrinks to \$1 bln as imports fall

A decline in imports in the first quarter of the current fiscal year helped narrow the trade deficit to US\$1 billion from \$1.4 billion recorded in the corresponding period of the previous financial year, according to data from the Ministry of Commerce.

Between 1 October and 11 January, Myanmar's external trade increased to \$9.15 billion from \$8.97 billion registered in the same period of 2017-2018 FY. Exports increased by \$284 million to reach \$4 billion, while imports fell by \$100 million to touch \$5

billion. Myanmar exports agricultural products, animal products, minerals, forest products, finished industrial goods, and imports capital goods, intermediate goods, CMP raw materials, and consumer goods.

The country relies more on the agriculture and manufacturing sectors for exports. While export earnings from the CMP (cut, make, and pack) garment businesses are rising, the country's reliance on natural resources such as natural gas and jade is lessening.

The government is trying to reduce the trade deficit by screening luxury import items and boosting exports.

Myanmar's trade deficit stood at \$91.9 million in the 2012-2013FY, \$2.5 billion in the 2013-2014FY, \$4.9 billion in the 2014-2015 FY, \$5.4 billion in the 2015-2016FY, and \$1.3 billion in last six-month mini-budget period, according to statistics released by the Central Statistical Organization (CSO).—Mon Mon ■ (Translated by Ei Myat Mon)

Myanmar-Japan Nov trade declines nearly 4%

MYANMAR'S trade with Japan in November; the second month of fiscal year 2018-2019, totalled US\$146 million, a decline of \$5.9 million, or 3.9 per cent, from the same month in the previous fiscal, the Ministry of Commerce reported. The total bilateral trade figure for November includes \$103 million in exports and \$42 million in imports. Compared with November 2017, the import value decreased by half, but exports increased by almost \$37.8 million. Normally, Myanmar's imports exceed its exports in bilateral trade with Japan, conduct-

ed by sea. Myanmar's exports to Japan cover garments, marine products, rice, sesame, rubber, and other agricultural products. Its imports from the East Asian country include machines, electronic devices, fertilizers, chemical products, medicines, and automobiles. In October, the first month of the 2018-19 FY, Myanmar's total trade with Japan was registered at \$152.197 million, with exports of \$65.54 million and imports worth \$86.6 million.

During the mini-budget period (April-September) in 2018, the country's total trade with Ja-

pan reached nearly \$1.095 billion, increasing by \$170 million from \$925 million recorded in the corresponding period of the previous year. The Myanmar Investment Commission permitted two Japanese enterprises to bring in foreign direct investments of \$5.526 million in the first two months of the current fiscal year, according to the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration. Japan's investments in Myanmar in the mini-budget period totalled \$134.6 million.—Khine Khant ■

Onion prices fall back in Yangon market

ONION prices are falling in the Yangon market this harvest season due to the low demand, said local wholesalers.

At present, the market has seen a massive inflow of freshly harvested onions, but the demand

for the kitchen crop is not strong, said merchants.

Depending on their size and freshness, onions were fetching between K200-1,150 per viss (3.6 pounds) on 23 January in the Yangon wholesale market, which saw

an inflow of 180,000 tons of the crop from onion-producing areas, including Myingyan and Seikpyu townships. In the Pakokku market, onion prices have declined to K500 per viss, while a viss of onions is selling for about K450 in the

Yenangyoung market. This fiscal year saw a decline in exports of onions via sea, but the crop is being exported to neighboring countries through the border gates. There has been no demand from Viet Nam and Malaysia in

the current FY. Local merchants said onion prices are expected to upswing in the market after the middle of this year, when onions grown in the cold season usually enter the market and demand for the crop is strong.—Maung Say Aung ■ (Translated by Khaing Thanda Lwin)

Trade with India in November up over 39%

BILATERAL trade between Myanmar and India topped US\$147 million in November, the second month of 2018-2019 fiscal year, with exports worth \$72.8 million and imports valued at \$74.5 million, according to the Ministry of Commerce.

Compared with the same month in the previous FY, Myanmar-India trade has increased by \$41.6 million, or 39 per cent. In November 2017, bilateral trade between the countries was valued at \$105.7 million, with exports worth \$25.6 million and imports totalling \$80 million.

Myanmar conducts trade with India via both the sea and border routes. The two countries trade goods mainly through the Tamu and Reed border checkpoints.

In October, the first month of the 2018-19FY, bilateral trade totalled \$153.365 million.

Myanmar exports areca nuts, ginger, saffron, turmeric, bay leaves, fishery and forest products, and human hair to India. Its imports medicines, oil cakes, electronic products, motorbikes, cotton yarn, non-alloy steel and construction materials.

According to the ministry, trade with India reached its peak of \$1.9 billion in the 2016-2017FY. The figure dropped to \$1.47 billion in the 2017-2018FY.

During the 2018 mini-budget period (April and September), bilateral trade exceeded \$800 million, with \$292 million in exports and \$508 million in imports.

According to DICA, Indian investment in Myanmar during the mini-budget period was \$19.9 million. The country has seen no new investments from India in the current FY.—Swe Nyein

Myanmar's imports decline \$155 million in current fiscal

THE value of Myanmar's imports in the 2018-2019 fiscal year has exceeded US\$5.4 billion, a drop of nearly \$155 million from the corresponding period of the previous financial year, the Ministry of Commerce reported on Friday. Between 1 October and

18 January, Myanmar imported capital goods worth nearly \$1.8 billion, intermediate goods worth \$1.9 billion, consumer goods worth over \$1 billion, and CMP products worth \$673 million.

Apart from CMP products, imports of remain-

ing goods declined in the current FY. Compared with the same period in the previous FY, imports of capital goods declined by \$127 million, intermediate goods by \$79 million, and consumer products by \$83 million. During the period, the private sector import-

ed goods amounting to \$5 billion, a decline of \$197 million from the previous FY. In comparison, public sector imports rose by \$42.5 million from the previous fiscal year.—Shwe Khine ■

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Underground in Jerusalem, a rare look at an ancient tomb

JERUSALEM — Flashlight beams pierce the darkness and reveal an archaeological gem in underground Jerusalem few have had the chance to glimpse in recent years.

The elaborate, 2,000-year-old tomb's stone shelves once held sarcophagi, and its steps are hewn from rock connecting its chambers.

It serves as a remarkable example of a Roman-era tomb — considered among the largest in the region — but it remains closed for now and largely forgotten in a corner of east Jerusalem.

Talks are ongoing between France, which owns the site known as the Tomb of the Kings, and Israel to reopen it, and AFP was recently given an exclusive tour. “We are talking about probably the most important, fascinating and large monument in Jerusalem outside the Old City,” said Yuval Baruch, Jerusalem regional archaeologist for the Israel Antiquities Authority.

The tomb has been closed since 2010 due to renovations costing around a million euros (\$1.1 million). But its unique status, Jewish veneration of the burial site and its location in the disputed city have added to complications in reopening it. Archae-

ological sites in east Jerusalem are often freighted with religious significance and questions linked to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

The Tomb of the Kings is no exception, though with international involvement since France owns it. Israel occupied mainly Palestinian east Jerusalem in the 1967 Six-Day War and later annexed it in a move never recognised by the international community. It sees the entire city as its capital, while the Palestinians view the eastern sector as the capital of their future state.

France wants guarantees

Groups of ultra-Orthodox Jews have gathered at the tomb's gate to press for its reopening so that they can pray there. They describe it as a holy burial site of ancient ancestors.

“All we ask is to enter, make a prayer and leave,” said Natanel Snir, who was part of a group of around 12 ultra-Orthodox Jews who briefly gathered outside the gate Thursday. There has also been a challenge at Israel's rabbinical court — which rules on matters related to Jewish law and holy sites — over access to the tomb and France's ownership.

A concert at the site organised with a Palestinian group

around a decade ago also led to criticism. The court case has been abandoned for now at the request of Israel's foreign ministry, but there are discussions about whether to resume it, said Rachel Shakargy of the Israeli rabbinical courts.

Before reopening the site, France wants guarantees it will not face legal challenges and is asking for commitments on how visits will be managed.

French officials declined to comment, while Israel's foreign

ministry said negotiations are continuing, without elaborating.

Both states are concerned it could become more of a religious than archaeological site after its reopening. In the meantime, an iron gate leading to ancient steps, ritual baths and the expansive tomb further below remains locked.

Queen's tomb?

Both the history of the site and how France came to own it are complex. An excavation in the

1860s, when the Ottoman Empire ruled the region, is thought to be the first modern archaeological dig in the Holy Land, said Jean-Baptiste Humbert, a French archaeologist who has carried out excavations at the tomb.

Felicien de Saulcy of France took on the project in 1863 and sought to confirm it was the tomb of biblical figures King David and Solomon, giving rise to the site's name. That theory has been ruled out, but the name has endured.

Several sarcophagi were found inside and are now in the Louvre museum in Paris, including one with an Aramaic inscription.

According to the most commonly accepted theory, it refers to Queen Helena of Adiabene, in today's Iraqi Kurdistan, and she may have built the tomb for her dynasty. She is thought to have converted to Judaism and her remains may well have been buried there. Whether or not that is the case, the site is also believed to have been reused over the years.

After de Saulcy's excavation, the tomb was purchased by the Pereire brothers, a Jewish banking family in Paris that would later hand the property over to France.— AFP ■

Remains found of explorer who put Australia on the map

SYDNEY (Australia) — The remains of the first British explorer to circumnavigate the Australian continent and popularise the country's name have been found near a busy London railway station.

Archaeologists sifting through a vast burial ground near Euston station said Friday they had found a coffin plate identifying the last resting place of Royal Navy captain Matthew Flinders.

Flinders was buried on 23rd July 1814, but not before publishing “A Voyage to Terra Australis,” which described his circumnavigation of Australia in 1802-1803 that proved it was a continent.

“Flinders put Australia on the map due to his tenacity and expertise as a navigator and explorer,” said Helen Wass, an archaeologist overseeing the dig for the HS2 high speed rail project.

With an estimated 40,000 remains at the site, archaeologists were not sure they were going to find Flinders, whose resting place had been subject to much speculation.

“We were very lucky” said Wass, he “had a breastplate made of lead meaning it would not have corroded.”

“We'll now be able to study his skeleton to see whether life at sea left its mark and what more we can learn about him.”

Flinders is a hero for many Australians of European origin, with stations, streets, squares and towns across the country named after him.

The discovery of his remains comes on the eve of “Australia Day” a controversial national holiday which falls on the date of the arrival of the British First Fleet to Australia.

Many Australians view the Fleet and men like Flinders as harbingers of the decimation of ancient Aboriginal societies and cultures. There is added controversy over the role of an aboriginal Australian aide to Flinders named Bungaree, who has been largely eclipsed by his British captain, but who historians now believe played a crucial role in success of the voyages.— AFP ■

India launches Kalamsat, Microsat-R satellites

NEW DELHI — The Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) has successfully launched Polar Satellite Launch Vehicle (PSLV) C44 carrying Kalamsat and Microsat-R, officials said Friday.

The satellites were launched from Satish Dhawan Space Centre (SDSC) in Sriharikota, off the Bay of Bengal coast located in the southern Indian state of Andhra Pradesh at 11:37 p.m. (local time) on Thursday. “India's Polar Satellite Launch Vehicle (PSLV-C44) successfully injected Microsat-R and Kalamsat-V2 satellites into their designated orbits,” a statement issued by ISRO said. Television images show the rocket blasted off from the launch pad, emitting a bright orange flame from its tail and moving upwards in the sky. Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi congratulated the space scientists for another successful launch of PSLV.—Xinhua

Koreans urge 'Monster' Kim to choose Watford over Beijing

ABU DHABI (United Arab Emirates)—South Korea defender Kim Min-jae's goal-scoring exploits at the Asian Cup have not gone unnoticed overseas, but team-mates are urging him to follow Son Heung-min to England rather than go to China.

The 22-year-old centre-back, nicknamed "Monster", has burnished his reputation as one of the region's hottest prospects, scoring twice and proving formidable at the back as South Korea reached the quarter-finals.

Baek Sung-kwon, general manager of his current club Jeonbuk Motors, confirmed a bid from Premier League club Watford which is reported to be around \$8 million.

Beijing Guoan, who finished the 2018 Chinese Super League season in fourth, are also in the hunt but so far, Kim is keeping his cards close to his chest.

"Until now, I want to focus only on the Asian Cup," he said on Thursday.

"I just want to talk about getting good results and so, at the moment, I haven't got anything to say about (a transfer).

"I just want to focus on helping the team not concede any goals."

Kim is already an established international, but missed the 2018 World Cup through injury.

A move to Tottenham Hotspur in the Premier League proved the making of Kim's celebrated team-mate Son, while Ki Sung-

yueng and ex-Manchester United star Park Ji-sung have also prospered in England.

And while Kim may be staying silent, his Chinese-based team-mates at the Asian Cup have been happy to give their advice—and they are urging him to take the plunge in England.

"If Min-jae has big ambitions then it will be better for him to play on a bigger stage," said his central defence partner Kim Young-gwon, who has won two Asian Champions League titles and six Chinese championships with China's Guangzhou Evergrande.

"Of course, China is good but I think it would be better for him to play on the bigger stage that is Europe."

Kwon Kyung-won, who also plays in the Chinese Super League for Tianjin, gave similar advice.

"I thought that he was going to China but then I heard good news and I hope he can make the better choice," said Kwon.

The players were repeating the sentiment expressed on social media back in Korea as fans urged Kim, whose nickname stems from his powerful physique, to choose England.

Since moving to Tottenham Hotspur in 2015, Son has turned into a global star, becoming the highest scoring Asian player in Premier League history and also shining in the Champions League.

However, the Chinese Super League is also attractive to Asian players because of its high wages and proximity to home. —AFP ■

Rahm seizes early lead at Farmers, Woods opens with 70

LOS ANGELES (United States)—Jon Rahm had two eagles on his front nine in a sizzling 10-under 62 Thursday to grab a one-shot lead at the Farmers Insurance Open where Tiger Woods is making his 2019 debut. Spain's Rahm, whose first win on the US PGA Tour came at this event two years ago, is one stroke ahead of world number one Justin Rose and American Doug Ghim, who both shot nine-under 63s.

"There's a lot of happiness going on in this area for me, so I just feel I'm going to play good

when I tee up," Rahm said.

Fourteen time major winner Woods birdied his last hole of the day to post a 70 and is eight shots back of Rahm at the Torrey Pines Golf Course in La Jolla, California. Taiwan's C.T. Pan is fourth after shooting a 64 and Jordan Spieth is alone in fifth with a seven-under 65. The 24-year-old Rahm came into the event as one of the hottest players on the tour and his start reflected that as he eagled both par-fives on his front nine, including the opening hole. —AFP ■
