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Eleventh regular session of Second Pyithu Hluttaw holds 21st meeting

A 21st meeting of the eleventh regular session of Second Pyithu Hluttaw was held yesterday morning at Pyithu Hluttaw building in Nay Pyi Taw where questions raised were answered, decision on a bill made and a motion discussed and approved.

Question and answer session

In the question and answer session, Daw Cho Cho of Ottwin constituency asked for arrangements made by Union Election Commission on having an accurate voters' list and whether there is a plan in order to known transparently voters about it. Union Election Commission member U Myint Naing replied. 2019-2022 strategic plan with 11 chapters was draw up and distributed it to election sub-commissions, CSOs and political parties. The plan contains details about voters' list preparation and 2019 was designated as voters' list preparation year. The plan on voters' list preparation was also distributed to all levels of election sub-commissions while trainings were also conducted.

Once the voters' list is com-

pleted around end 2019, it will be put on a CD and distributed relevant political parties. If there were application to amend the voters' list, assessment will be made and amendments will be made if necessary. The voters' list will be announced and put up on notice boards twice in 2020 and voters in each constituency can then check the list and submit applications for amendments where necessary. Hluttaw candidates will also be provided with the voters' list so that they too can check the constituents in their respective constituency. This arrangement will ensure that voters' list will be accurate and the whole process is transparent explained the Union Elec-

tion Commission member.

U Khin Maung Yi of Hinthada constituency then asked if there is a plan to construct a Hinthada-Letpadan Ayeyawady River Bridge to connect Ayeyawady Region and Bago Region.

Deputy Minister for Construction U Kyaw Linn replied that due to budget constraint the ministry is able to construct only one priority major bridge at a time and at the moment it is constructing 7,456 ft. long Thayet-Aunglan Ayeyawady River Bridge. Once the construction of this bridge is completed there is a plan to construct two bridges over the Ayeyawady River and those bridges are Ayeyawady Bridge (Hinthada) and

Ayeyawady Bridge (Katha-Palwe Shwe). One will be selected and constructed as a priority bridge said the Deputy Minister.

Preventing illegal paddy export through border

U Tun Tun Oo of Mandalay Region constituency 2 asked if there was a plan to prevent illegal rice export through border lines. Regarding this query, Deputy Minister for Commerce U Aung Htoo replied that in preventing illegal rice trading, it was found that illegal rice exporters conducted their business as if they had carried the rice only in local areas. Arrangements were being made for the Department of Customs in order to prevent the illegal rice trading and transfer other relevant departments of agriculture while making the coordination with other relevant ministries, region and state governments to

make approval of carrying local rice.

As for the region and state governments, special teams have been formed to curb illegal rice trading while setting up prohibited items notice at the bus terminals, harbours and security checkpoints in Bhamo, Momauk and Lwejel areas, which become the main routes for exporting agricultural products to China from the Kachin State.

The letters giving information have been sent to commodity wholesale centers for rice, pulses, grain, sesame and other farming machines, as an effort to prohibit and take legal action against it.

Regarding the query, Union Minister for Education Dr. Myo Thein Gyi replied that the allotment of fund would have to spend under the authorized funds in 2019-2020 FY, which aimed at building a two-storey RC school with 140x30 feet instead of build-

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She said it was crucial to find out what were the individual duties of each citizen. The main duty of each and every citizen was towards the nation. It was necessary to work to strengthen the nation and bring prosperity, peace and success. The State Counsellor said it was necessary to first fulfil the duties to the nation before duties towards the states or regions could be fulfilled. She said this top-down approach to fulfilling our duties applies from the sub-national level to the township/village level and then to our social circles.

“Right now, we can’t call our country prosperous but there have been noticeable improvements. These developments may or may not have a uniform effect on all the states and regions. But our objective is for national development to bring equal benefit to everyone. We don’t want one place to be prospering while another place is struggling in poverty,” said the State Counsellor.

The State Counsellor said a nation’s main resource was the skills and capabilities of its people. The people must have the required skills to bring prosperity to the country so that it can travel along the correct path towards its objectives.

The State Counsellor said she saw many ethnic people when her plane landed in Khamti. She said it was Khamti’s pride and the pride of the entire Union to have diverse ethnic races living together peacefully.

“There are many different ethnic races in Myanmar with diverse ideologies but this

in their future as they move forward peacefully. There are still a lot of development tasks left for the people. We cannot resolve this while holding on to grudges and dissatisfactions. Everyone needs to cooperate in resolving this in-

The State Counsellor asked of civil servants working in regions facing difficulties to take pride in serving the nation and to work for the people with kind-

ness in their hearts.

The State Counsellor said, “I want to deeply request our civil servants to not only perform their assigned duties but to also place full kindness on their work for the general public. There needs to be mutual respect between the civil servants and the public. Civil servants must respect the public and the public must respect civil servants. Most of the public have in their minds the civil servants as authoritative and oppressive. I want civil servants to reflect on this. Why are you seen in this way and what can you change to stop people thinking of you like this? On the other hand, the people must also understand the nature of civil servant’s duties.”

The State Counsellor said the our country's civil servants had less opportunities, lower salaries and income than those from developed countries but the combined efforts were not for any one person's wealth, it was for the prosperity of the entire nation. She asked of the civil servants to think of their work as bringing prosperity to the nation and similarly asked the public to support the civil servants in correctly performing their duties.

"Our country's education and healthcare are not at a satisfactory level yet nor unravelling in a way we want them to be. But we are still trying. I have noticed a lot of questions on healthcare and some of them should be answered by the regional government. These questions will be followed up by the Regional Chief Minister and regional ministers," said the State Counsellor.

Following the State Counsellor's speech, the local residents submitted various topics for her consideration including reacquiring confiscated lands and receiving compensation lands for losses incurred. The people of Khamti also requested the Union Government to support promotion of the Naga people's traditions and culture, prioritizing local people in staff appointments, working for people who suffered losses when lands were confiscated to live on remaining land.

State Counsellor holds open talks with locals

They also asked the State Counsellor to address the subject of giving permission to transport timber between Homalin and Khamti, providing education, healthcare and socio-economic development to Nansibon village and ensuring the rule of law, appointing the required teaching staff, supporting subjects in ethnic languages, permitting teachers of ethnic literature to attend trainings, distributing electricity to Khamti, and requesting jade mining companies in Nansibon district to set up signboards informing the public regarding the time period of their mining permits. The Union Ministers, Regional Chief Minister and regional ministers gave explanations about what actions would be taken to address these matters.

The State Counsellor said the concerned authorities must know and understand how to systematically give back con-

In her speech, the State Counsellor said people living in remote areas usually have the same requirements. She said roads and transportation were

which were responded by the Union Ministers and Regional Chief Minister. The State Counsellor also replied to their submissions. She said the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw had approved of returning confiscated lands to original owners in a decision made in 2013. She said this only applied to lands confiscated after 1988. She said the delays in returning farmlands were either due to confiscators unwilling to relinquish ownership, lengthy bureaucratic procedures, or disagreements in rightful ownership but assured the residents that Vice President U Henry Van Thio was heading all processes related to this.

The State Counsellor said budget had been allotted for supplying sufficient drinking water to Lahe Township. She said unused lands from the confiscated lands would be used for expanding the town. She said officials would begin applying for funding in 2019-2020 FY for upgrading the Lahe-Yanlone road to be accessible all year round. She said this upgrade was necessary to establish a Naga trade zone. She said the regional government would assist in setting up a museum for Naga traditions. She said they would appoint local residents to education posts based on their regional language expertise. She then took a documentary photo with everyone in attendance.

Next, the State Counsellor handed over K20 million for regional development, food and other items to the local residents, and they gifted her souvenirs in return.

To Homalin Tsp

The State Counsellor then travelled by special flight to Homalin Township from Kham-

ti. There, she met with local residents in the township's sports stadium.

At the meeting, the State Counsellor said the Union Government had been prioritizing development for remote regions since taking up office, including Homalin Township. She said people were given rights and responsibilities together. She said the Union Government was working through difficulties to ensure uniform development across the entire country. She said there had been noticeable development in education and healthcare but it was not at a satisfactory level yet. The most valuable resource for the nation was its people and the beauty of the country was enhanced from its diverse ethnic races living together, said the State Counsellor.

Homalin residents submit reports, requests

Local residents then voiced their requirements and requests. They requested lesser restrictions on small and medium enterprises to reduce the cost of drafting IEE/EMP (Initial Environmental Examination/Environmental Management Plan). They requested listening to the people's difficulty related to using mercury in searching for gold. They asked for implementing hydropower to address the high electricity bill in Homalin, constructing a bridge over Chindwin River and roads through Homalin Ward, building an embankment in Homalin port, to fix the silted up creek in Tapataung village, returning confiscated lands, paving a concrete land between Naungpoaung and Nhamtaw, explaining how tax was levied from stalls in Homalin market, to inspect the gold-finding operations in Chaunggyi Creek, upgrading the Homalin-Bamauk road, acquiring silt sediment islands, and inspecting the damaging effects of goldmining on farmlands.

The Regional Chief Minister and officials responded to the submissions from the local residents and the State Counsellor gave suggestions as necessary. She requested the local residents to have trust in the regional government and instructed the government officials to foster better and close relations with the local people to win their trust. —MNA

World Water Day 2019 commemorated in Nay Pyi Taw

NAY PYI TAW commemorated World Water Day 2019 at its Myanmar International Convention Centre II yesterday where Vice President U Henry Van Thio, Chairperson of National Water Resources Committee (NWRC), delivered a speech.

History of NWRC

In his speech, the Vice President first summarized the history of the NWRC, which was formed in 2013 and organized annual celebrations for World Water Day starting from 2014. He said the committee aimed to raise the value people place on water, increase research and technology related to it, and promote connections between affiliated organizations.

Message of 2019 World Water Day

The theme for World Water Day 2019 was 'Leaving no one behind'. Today, 1 billion people were still living without safe water; struggling to survive and thrive, so as to improve their health, education and livelihoods. 2.3 billion people live without proper flushing systems, which affected their health in the long-term.

The whole world was facing

water-related difficulties due to environmental damages and climate change. The effects of floods, droughts, typhoons and other natural disasters have affected people's access to safe water for drinking, irrigation, livestock rearing. This in turn affected people's livelihoods and the sustainable development of many nations, said the Vice President. He said Myanmar was facing the same set of water-related challenges as other developing countries.

Myanmar, a water-rich nation

The Vice President said Myanmar had abundant water resources, holding 16 per cent of water resources among the ten ASEAN countries and 12 per cent of all Asia. However, with diversity in rainfall, increase in population and population density, the rise of industrial zones and economic zones and other changes to social systems means there would be a rapid increase in demands for water supply and new challenges for providing adequate water to every person, said the Vice President.

He said there were still areas where the basic need for safe water was not fulfilled and un-

proper dumping of wastewater and chemicals into rivers and streams were still causing water pollution. He said systematic water management processes need to be implemented to solve these issues and develop the water resource sector. He said this was one of the reasons behind forming the NWRC in 2013, which was reformed to accommodate ministry reforms in 2016.

Cooperation with related ministries, int'l orgs

The Vice President said the NWRC was continually partnering with relevant ministries, partner countries, and international organizations to conduct observation programs and projects. Regional cooperation included partnering with ASEAN, the Mekong River Commission, and the Lancang-Mekong Cooperation. He said relevant ministries and city development committees were constructing more infrastructure for storing more water. They were conducting programs to reduce wasting water and to increase conservation.

The Vice President said ministries and stakeholders were actively working together to implement preventive measures against natural disasters. He said the National Disaster Management Committee monitored the activity of cyclone formations, floods, and ocean waves to issue warnings, conduct search and rescue, construct weather resistant buildings, organize education programs for relevant people, and negotiate between departmental organizations to provide capacity building programs.

Water Action Decade

The Vice President high-

lighted that water was a precious resource central to many of the people's daily tasks and national processes. As such, in order to accelerate efforts towards meeting water-related challenges, the United Nations General Assembly declared 2018-2028 as the International Decade for Action "Water for Sustainable Development", also known as the Water Action Decade.

The Vice President requested partner countries, local and foreign NGOs to continue their cooperation with the Union Government and relevant ministries to develop the water resource sector. He said managing the country's water resources was an intrinsic part of developing all of our countries and required everyone's participation in implementing the UN's Sustainable Development Goals to keep the endeavour ongoing.

Event continues second half

Following the Vice President's speech, a documentary on NWRC's activities was shown, after which the Vice President took a commemorative photo with all the attendees, and then looked around the commemorative booths for World Water Day 2019.

Union Minister U Thant

Sin Maung, who is also NWRC's Vice Chairman, then continued the second part of the event programme.

Dr. Shwe Hlwan, Patron of Water Mothers Organization (WMO), also delivered a speech related to the theme for this year's World Water Day and then joined a discussion on the subject led by Professor Dr. Khin Ni Ni Thein together with U Tun Lwin Oo, U Hla Maung Thein and Daw Thin Nwe Soe. After this, separate focus groups engaged in various discussions on the topic of water.

Matriculation exams begin

MATRICULATION exams began across Myanmar yesterday, with a total of 851,570 students sitting for the exams. The number of exam centres totalled 1,886, with 21 based overseas and 1,865 within the country.

Of the total students, 94 are taking the exam at hospitals, 24 are visually impaired,

15 are hearing impaired, 132 have physical disabilities, 181 are in prison, and 140 are from Myawady, Kayin State.

Instructors from Social Welfare Schools are using sign language to help hearing impaired students understand the questions.—MNA

Curbing illegal wildlife trade is a must

MYANMAR is home to more than 300 endangered species, with tigers, elephants, pangolins, and golden deer topping the list. Wildlife trafficking has become one of the most profitable criminal activities globally, and its impact on biodiversity, efforts for sustainable development, and poverty eradication has been devastating.

Illegal wildlife trade has completely changed the biodiversity, fauna, and flora of Myanmar. The number of valuable species in the country is witnessing a rapid decline. If this downward trend continues unchecked, some of our iconic national treasures — elephants, tigers, bears, pangolins, and birds — will become extinct.

The authorities recently destroyed 219 pieces of ivory, 527 fragments of tiger and leopard bones, 800 horns belonging to different animals, 134.72 kg of pangolin scales, 5.5 kg of turtle shells and dried elephant trunks, valued at K1,700 million or US\$1.1 million, for the second time, at the opening ceremony of Myanmar's first-ever elephant museum in Yangon on 3 March.

In the first such public event in October last year, ivory and parts of endangered animals, with an estimated value of \$1.3 million, were incinerated in Nay Pyi Taw.

Myanmar has developed policies, laws, rules, and regulations to ensure the protection and sustainability of the country's rich biodiversity, wildlife, habitats, and ecosystems.

Both events sent the message that illegal trade of animal parts as well as bush meat is not acceptable, and we will step up efforts to fight poaching and illegal wildlife trade.

While raising awareness on the role of law enforcement in curbing illegal trade of fauna and flora, we must act against illegal traders and poachers, and promote international cooperation on the subject.

Myanmar has developed policies, laws, rules, and regulations to ensure the protection and sustainability of the country's rich biodiversity, wildlife, habitats, and ecosystems. To monitor and combat poaching and illegal wildlife trade, the role of the public is key. Public support is especially important in wildlife protection and conservation efforts.



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INTEGRATING TRADITIONAL MEDICINE INTO PRIMARY HEALTH CARE OF MYANMAR

THE Union Government has been seriously encouraging Traditional Medicine (TM), considering it a traditional heritage and a profession which can provide full health care to the people together with modern western medical science to ensure sustainable development and systematic progress, and in the right way. Besides, The Union Government, on its parts, has been working to raise the standard of Myanmar traditional medicine and provide better health care to people through use of traditional medicine practices. We will also give strong support and upgrade our traditional medicine field. Here the role of research is very important if we really want to promote safe use of traditional medicines by the population. (Ref: Inaugural speech delivered by the Union Minister for Health and Sports, H.E Dr Myint Htwe to professionals and staff members of MOHS on 1st April 2016)

Traditional Medicine (TM) and Herbal Medicine (HM) are widely used in countries of South

East Asia Region (SEA). Herbal medicine forms a substantial part of TM. According to definition of World Health Organization, HM includes herbs, herbal materials, herbal preparation and finished herbal products that contains as active ingredients, parts of plants, other plant materials. There is increasing demands for medical plants both in the developing and developed countries.^[1]

Primary Health care is defined as an essential care based on practical, scientifically sound and socially acceptable methods and technology made universally accessible to individuals and families in the community through their full participation and at a cost that community and country can afford to maintain at every

stage of their development in the spirit of self-reliance and self-determination.^[2] The identification of locally available and commonly used medicinal plants and herbs would have to be effected and a list compiled. The use of medicinal plants and traditional medicine could make people become more self-reliance. Across the world, TM is either the mainstay of health care delivery or serves as a complement to it. In some countries, TM or non-conventional medicine may be termed complementary medicine (CM). TM & CM is an important and often underestimated part of health care. TM&CM is found in almost every country in the world and demand for its services is increasing. TM of proven quality, safety and efficacy contrib-

utes to the goal of ensuring that all people have access to care. Many countries now recognize the need to develop a cohesive and integrative approach to health care that allows governments, health care practitioners and most importantly, those who use health care services, to access TM&CM in a safe, respectful, cost-efficient and effective manner.^[3]

Every country in the world possesses their own conventional medical practices depending on their topography and culture. Similarly, the practice of traditional medicine in Myanmar dates back thousands of years, and still stands as an ancestral medical practice. Myanmar traditional medical practice means any form of medical treatment that belongs to any

one of the four methods; Desana Method, Bhesijja method, Nakhatta Method and Vijjadhara Method. Desana Method is a form of medical practice to examine and remedy the negative effect anatomy and physiology have on health on account of action, mind, weather and food in such a way as is mentioned in the great discourse the Lord Buddha preached. Bhesijja Method is a form of medical practice based on Ayurveda medical practice to examine and remedy the malfunction in the body which is composed of three dosas, seven elements and twelve malas resulting from time, one's self and one's past deeds. Nakkhatta Method is based on calculations of zodiac of stars, planets and time of birth and age. These calculations are

linked to prescribe dietary practices. Vijjadhara Method is a form of medical practice that is concerned with the making of nine properties each of analogy and physiology as a medicament by means of special techniques and with the use of the parittas preached by the Lord Buddha as well.^[4]

Primary Health care includes health promotion, illness prevention, health maintenance & home support, community rehabilitation, pre-hospital emergency medical services, co-ordination and referral to other areas of health care.

The Department of Traditional Medicine, under Myanmar Ministry of Health and Sports, is taking harmonious measures for such tasks as health care, herbal plantation, production of traditional medicine and research so that both rural and urban people will be able to receive medical care with traditional medicine.

BAY INFERENCE: Weather is generally fair over the Central Bay and partly cloudy over the Andaman Sea and elsewhere in the Bay of Bengal.

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Mandalay takes steps for safety of passenger vessels

AN awareness talk on safety of vessels, their systematic operation, and regulatory compliance was held at the meeting hall of the Department of Marine Administration in Mandalay on Monday. It was organized by the Mandalay Region's Marine Administration Department and the Mandalay Maritime Police.

At the event, officials covered the Inland Vessel Law, Myanmar Coastal and Inland Water Transport Service License Law, and rules and regulations for sailors and passengers.

"Last year, one passenger was lost during a vessel collision on the Bagan-Nyaung U route. Four cases of non-compliance with rules were reported, wherein unskilled sailors were used, no life jackets were found on board, and vessels were found carrying more passengers than their capacity. To ensure the safety of passengers, ferries must have life-jackets and fire extinguishers. Additionally, sailors must not be allowed on duty if they are under the influence of alcohol. Passengers must also avoid climbing on the roofs of ferries," said U Thant Sin Myo, the head of the Mandalay Re-

gion's Marine Administration Department.

Before ferries depart from their jetties, the department checks the licences of sailors, safety operations of the vessels, compliance with safety management code for passengers, in accordance with the prescribed rules and policies. Moreover, the Maritime police also conducts surprise checks on vessels. There were 34 instances where

vessels were found violating the rules, as of October, 2018.

"We prioritize the safety of passengers and so, awareness campaigns are carried out. If we find vessels are not complying with rules, the related department meets with their vessel association and asks them to strictly adhere to the rules. The move is not aimed to hurt water transport businesses," said Police Lt-Col Aung Zaw Myint of

Mandalay Maritime Police.

Between 2014 and 2017, Mandalay Region's DMA office issued licences to 37 vessel associations for operating 115 vessels. All shareholders in the water transport industry have been advised to abide by the rules and regulations and people can contact the Department of Marine Administration for queries, said officials. —Khaing Set Wai

Illegal wildlife trade threatens biodiversity in Greater Mekong

ILLEGAL wildlife trade is threatening biodiversity in Greater Mekong, which has emerged as a huge market for unlawful trafficking and sale of animal parts, according to a research sponsored by the European Union.

According to the report, 'Larger than Tiger', there are 795 endangered species around the Greater Mekong region, of which 123 are facing extinction because of indiscriminate hunting and trade. With China and Viet Nam turning into the largest markets for wildlife products globally, countries in the Greater Mekong region also stand as

huge markets for illegal trade in wildlife parts.

An EU delegation in Myanmar, in collaboration with the Wildlife Conservation Society (WCS), presented the main findings of the report to commemorate the World Wildlife Day on 3 March.

At the ceremony, Mr. Kristian Schmidt, the EU Ambassador to Myanmar, said: "We are determined to conserve wildlife across the Greater Mekong countries, including Myanmar. The report has to be adopted which works with all parties, the government, civil society organ-

izations, and the private sector, and goes beyond the national boundaries of Myanmar because these issues are regional, and I would even say, global. In addition, one of Myanmar's largest neighbors represents 70 per cent of global demand for wildlife products."

According to the latest Red list issued by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN), there are more than 331 endangered species in Myanmar. They include some bird species, apes, bulls, Asian elephants, Eld's deer, freshwater turtles, pangolins (Manis),

and tigers.

Illegal wildlife trade covers over 1,000 specials of animals and trees, which are used to make traditional medicines, exotic food, clothes, and other personal products.

Part of the European Union Biodiversity for Life initiative, 'Larger Than Tigers' is the product of two years of intensive, collaborative research, involving 28 authors, and conducted in consultation with 382 experts from over 150 organizations across more than 25 Asian countries.—GNLM

UK says Brexit talks at 'critical point'

BRUSSELS (Belgium)—Britain's Brexit negotiators returned to Brussels on Tuesday vowing to "get a deal over the line" as they seek European Union support to break the deadlock in London as this month's divorce deadline looms.

UK attorney general Geoffrey Cox and Brexit minister Stephen Barclay began talks with EU chief negotiator Michel Barnier, an EU official told AFP amid conciliatory signals from both sides. Barnier

said Saturday the European Union was ready to give further guarantees to help the Brexit deal it struck with Prime Minister Theresa May in November get through the British parliament. Barnier also suggested European leaders would be amenable to a short "technical" delay in Britain's departure from the bloc scheduled for 29 March, to give parliament time to formally ratify a final accord. "We are determined to get a deal over the line

and deliver on Brexit," Barclay tweeted as he and Cox, the government's top lawyer, departed for Brussels. Barnier's small overture to Britain has raised some hopes that both sides can find a solution, including to the so-called "backstop" plan for the Irish border, a major sticking point for pro-Brexit MPs.

The two sides are at a "critical point" in these negotiations, a spokeswoman for May said on Tuesday. Cox's presence is seen as

central to the meeting, as he will ultimately offer a legal opinion on the Brexit deal and the Irish backstop that could determine

whether key lawmakers will approve the withdrawal agreement. The EU sees the backstop as an insurance policy to keep open the

border between EU member Ireland and British Northern Ireland—and to preserve the island's peace process.—AFP ■

Sun Outage might interrupt TV, Radio transmission from 6 to 17 March

A sun outage occurs when the apparent path of the Sun across the sky it directly behind the line of sight between an earth station and a satellite.

All satellites can be affected by sun outages.

A sun outage is a natural phenomenon and occurs every year. Sun outages usually occur one time in March, one time each in late September and early October.

The time for sun outage and signal interruption can vary depending on a satellite, size of TVRO receiver and location.

TV Channel and Radio programs of the MRTV which uses Thaicom-6 can be affected by the sun outages from 6 to 17 March for three minutes to 15 minutes, according to the Myanma Radio and Television.—MNA

Japan ranks lowest among G20 in 2018 women parliamentarians ratio

GENEVA—Japan ranked the lowest among members of the Group of 20 major economies in a 2018 global ranking on representation of women in parliament, coming 165th among 193 countries, an annual report by an international organization showed on Tuesday. Japan fell seven places from a year earlier despite Prime Minister Shinzo Abe's policy of pushing for women's empowerment, with many female politicians having pointed to difficulties in balancing political activities and family.

Japan's ratio of female lawmakers in its lower house, at just 10.2 per cent, compares with a world average of 24.3 per cent, up 13 percentage points from 1995, according to the Geneva-based Inter-Parliamentary Union, which compared the share of women in lower or single chambers in 2018. Japan was the only member of the Group of Seven major industrialized countries that ranked lower than 100th, it said.

By country, Rwanda topped the list with women occupying 61.3 per cent of seats. Latin American countries rose in the rankings, with Cuba and Mexico coming second and third, respectively. By region, the Americas continued to be at the top, with the proportion of women in parliament surpassing 30 per cent for the first time, backed by advances in Latin American countries such as Grenada and Costa Rica, which ranked fourth and sixth, respectively. The Americas were followed by Europe at 28.5 per cent, Sub-Saharan Africa at 23.7 per cent, and Asia at 19.6 per cent. More than 130 countries have introduced a quota policy guaranteeing women a certain level of representation, the report said, adding evidence from elections held in 2018 demonstrates well-designed quotas can pave the way to greater gender parity.—Kyodo News ■

WWF orders probe into allegations of abuse by rangers

GENEVA (Switzerland) — Conservation group WWF has said it will commission an independent investigation into a media report alleging it backs anti-poaching units responsible for murder, torture and other serious rights abuses.

According to an in-depth BuzzFeed investigation into anti-poaching practices across six countries, which was published on Monday, the World Wide Fund for Nature funds “vicious paramilitary forces” who have killed and tortured people in national parks in Asia and Africa.

Such anti-poaching units have shot and murdered dozens of people, attacked indigenous villagers with machetes and beaten

them unconscious as well as carrying out other violations, including sexual assaults. BuzzFeed said WWF equipped and worked with such guards, and accused the conservation group’s staff of turning a blind eye to abuses carried out during their crackdown on poaching. In a statement released on Monday, WWF said it took such allegations “seriously” and would commission “an independent review to look into the cases raised in the story”.

“We have asked BuzzFeed to share all evidence it has obtained to support these claims, to help inform and strengthen this review,” it said.

WWF stressed it had stringent policies in place

“to ensure both we and our partners are safeguarding the rights and well-being of indigenous people and local communities” in the places where it was working.

“Any breach of these policies is unacceptable to us and, should the review uncover any, we are committed to taking swift action,” it said. It is not the first time the charity has faced allegations that its work has fostered rights abuses.

In September 2017, British rights group Survival International alleged that WWF-funded “ecoguards” had systematically abused the hunter-gatherer Baka people and other rainforest tribes in Cameroon. —AFP ■

North Korea food production lowest in over a decade: UN

SEOUL (South Korea)— North Korea recorded its worst harvest for more than a decade last year, the United Nations said Wednesday, as natural disasters combined with its lack of arable land and

inefficient agriculture to hit production.

Last year’s harvest was just 4.95 million tonnes, the United Nations said in its Needs and Priorities assessment for 2019, down by 500,000 tonnes.

It was “the lowest production in more than a decade”, the UN’s Resident Coordinator in the North Tapan Mishra said in a statement. “This has resulted in a significant food gap.”—AFP ■

Bezos, Gates and Buffett still top the world's ultra rich: Forbes

NEW YORK (United States) — Jeff Bezos remains the world's richest person, ahead of Bill Gates and Warren Buffett, according to the latest Forbes list of the ultra wealthy, while far behind President Donald Trump jumped 51 spots in the ranking.

While things are largely stable up on top of the list, Facebook founder Mark Zuckerberg dropped three spots and former New York mayor Michael Bloomberg rose by two.

According to the list an-

nounced on Tuesday by Forbes, the riches of Bezos, 55, have swelled by \$19 billion in one year and he is now worth \$131 billion.

Bezos, who holds 16 per cent of Amazon and whose wealth now makes him a target of the left wing of the US Democratic Party, has widened the money gap between himself and Gates, the philanthropist and co-founder of Microsoft.

Gates, 63, has seen his wealth grow to \$96.5 billion, up from 90 billion last year, said Forbes.

Third place is held by Buffett, 88 and long considered an investment guru, although he did get stung in late February by a deep plunge in shares of US processed food maker Kraft Heinz, in which he had a large stake.

Buffett's fortune slipped by \$1.5 billion to \$82.5 billion, the magazine estimated.

It is more or less after this trio that things start to get shaken up on the Forbes list.

The CEO of French luxury good company LVMH, Bernard

Arnault, held on to fourth place. But Zuckerberg lost \$9 billion in net worth and slipped from fifth to eighth.

Ahead of Zuckerberg now are Mexican tycoon Carlos Slim, Zara and Inditex founder Amancio Ortega of Spain, and Oracle co-founder Larry Ellison.

Bloomberg rose from 11th to ninth place as his fortune increased to \$55.5 billion, from \$50 billion, said Forbes.

Americans still dominate the list with 14 of the top 20 billionaires from the US.

Non-Americans among the top 20 include India's Mukesh Ambani, chairman of Reliance Industries, in 13th place, and China's Ma Huateng, head of the Chinese internet giant Tencent, who rounds out the top 20.

Donald Trump 715th richest

Forbes estimates Trump's wealth at \$3.1 billion, unchanged from last year.

While 994 people from last year's ranking saw their wealth drop — a record, according to Forbes — Trump rose in the Forbes ranking from 766 last year to 715 this year.

Trump's nine New York skyscrapers, including the famous Trump Tower on Fifth Avenue, account for nearly half of his wealth, while his clubs and golf courses are valued at \$550 million. However, one of Trump's Florida golf clubs, the National Doral Miami, took a hit and has been depreciated by \$26 million following a sharp drop in bookings attributed to disagreements with the president's policies, Forbes said.

Trump is not the richest US elected official: that honor goes to JB Pritzker, a Democrat who took office as governor of Illinois in January. Pritzker, heir to the Hyatt hotel fortune, was estimated to be worth \$3.2 billion. —AFP ■

Hello Kitty to make Hollywood debut in Warner Bros film

TOKYO — For the first time in her 45-year history, the world's most beloved feline character Hello Kitty is headed for her Hollywood debut.

Warner Bros Entertainment Inc and Sanrio Co said on Wednesday Hello Kitty will debut in a feature film to be produced by FlynnPictureCo's Beau Flynn. Details on the type of film, such as whether it would be animated or live action, and the expected date of release were not yet disclosed.

"Hello Kitty has long been a symbol of friendship and we hope this film will only serve to grow that circle of friendship around the world," said Shintaro Tsuji, Sanrio founder, president and

CEO. The partnership between Warner and Sanrio was reached after a five-year quest by Flynn and New Line Cinema, the Warner Bros unit that produced the Oscar-winning *The Lord of the Rings* Trilogy, for film rights to the Japanese pop culture icon.

"Hello Kitty and her friends have been part of our shared culture for decades, and we look forward to exploring where her newest adventure will take her," New Line Cinema presidents Richard Brener and Carolyn Blackwood said in a joint statement.

Other popular Sanrio characters included in the deal are Gudetama, a melancholy lazy egg yolk; My Melody, a girl rabbit with

iconic pink or red ear warmers; and Little Twin Stars, a pair of angel-like siblings, among others.

Hello Kitty debuted in 1974 and has attracted generations

of fans worldwide — she can be found on 50,000 different products in 130 countries. The kitty with a red bow on her left ear has starred in Japanese film

and TV anime, and an animated television series made by a US company, but has never hit the global big screen before. —Kyodo News ■

Arata Isozaki of Japan wins Pritzker architecture prize

NEW YORK (United States) — Japanese architect Arata Isozaki has been awarded the Pritzker Prize, considered architecture's highest honour, for a lifetime of work that found global resonance while mining local traditions.

The 87-year-old's over 100 built works range from the Palau Saint Jordi, built in Barcelona for the 1992 Summer Olympics, to the Museum of Contemporary Art in Los Angeles, his first

international commission.

His hometown of Otai, Japan is a showcase of his early work, including a medical hall and annex, and a prefectural library.

"Isozaki is a pioneer in understanding that the need for architecture is both global and local — that those two forces are part of a single challenge," the chair of the jury, US Justice Stephen Breyer, said as the prize was announced on Tuesday.

"For many years, he has been trying to make certain that areas of the world that have long traditions in architecture are not limited to that tradition, but help spread those traditions while simultaneously learning from the rest of the world," he said.

Isozaki is the 46th Pritzker laureate and the eighth Japanese architect to receive the honor. Winners receive a bronze medallion and \$100,000. —AFP ■

Cave of relics found under Mayan ruins of Chichen Itza

MEXICO CITY (Mexico) — Archaeologists have discovered a cave filled with hundreds of artifacts beneath the ruins of the Mayan city of Chichen Itza in Mexico, the lead researcher on the project said on Monday, calling the find "incredible."

The massive cave is a "scientific treasure," Mexican archaeologist Guillermo de Anda told a news conference.

He said it could help scientists better understand the origins, lives and beliefs of the residents of Chichen Itza, a stunning city of stone in the Yucatan peninsula that was founded sometime around 750 AD.

The cave was found about two kilometres (1.2

miles) from the Temple of Kukulcan, the giant stepped pyramid that dominates the centre of Chichen Itza.

It sits about 24 metres (80 feet) underground, and contains multiple chambers connected by narrow passages — often so narrow that researchers had to crawl or drag themselves through them, De Anda said.

His team has explored about 460 metres of the cave so far, and does not know how far it stretches, he added. The relics found include seven incense burners shaped like the Mayan rain god Chaac, which researchers believe were offerings meant to bring rain. De Anda said

locals had actually discovered the cave more than 50 years ago.

But the archaeologist sent to explore the site at the time by the National Institute of Anthropology and History decided for unknown reasons to seal the entrance with stones, and filed only a brief report.

De Anda had seen the report, but did not give it much thought — until he happened upon the entrance to the cave last year while exploring another site nearby.

"What we found there was incredible, and completely untouched," he said.

The residents of Chichen Itza probably considered the cave "the bow-

els of the gods," he added.

His team believes the largest incense burners date from around 700 to 1000 AD.

The indigenous Mayas who inhabit the area today warned his team that a venomous coral snake guarded the site. And researchers

did in fact find just such a specimen, which blocked their access to the cave for four days, De Anda said. — AFP ■

Israel's first spacecraft to moon sends selfie

JERUSALEM (Undefined) — An Israeli spacecraft on its maiden mission to the moon has sent its first selfie back to Earth, mission chiefs said on

Tuesday.

The image showing part of the Beresheet spacecraft with Earth in the background was beamed to mission control

in Yehud, Israel — 37,600 kilometres (23,360 miles) away, the project's lead partners said in a statement.

The partners, NGO SpaceIL and state-owned Israel Aerospace Industries, launched the unmanned Beresheet — Hebrew for Genesis — from Cape Canaveral in Florida on 22 February.

The 585-kilogram (1,290-pound) craft took off atop a Falcon 9 rocket from the private US-based SpaceX company of entrepreneur Elon Musk.

The trip is scheduled to last seven weeks, with the Beresheet due to touch down on 11 April.

So far, only Russia, the United States and China have made the 384,000-kilometre (239,000-mile) journey and landed on the moon.

The Israeli mission comes amid renewed global interest in the moon, 50 years after American astronauts first walked on its surface.

China's Chang'e-4 made the first-ever soft landing on the far side of the moon on 3 January, after a probe sent by Beijing made a lunar landing elsewhere in 2013.

For Israel, the landing itself is the main mission, but the spacecraft also carries a scientific instru-

ment to measure the lunar magnetic field, which will help understanding of the moon's formation.

It also carries a "time capsule" loaded with digital files containing a Bible, children's drawings, Israeli songs, memories of a Holocaust survivor and the blue-and-white Israeli flag.

After China earlier this year, and now Israel, India hopes to become the fifth lunar country in the spring with its Chandrayaan-2 mission. It aims to put a craft with a rover onto the moon's surface to collect data.

Japan plans to send a small lunar lander, called

SLIM, to study a volcanic area around 2020-2021.

As for the Americans, who have not been back to the moon since 1972, a return is now the official policy of NASA, according to guidelines issued by President Donald Trump in 2017. NASA, which has installed equipment on Beresheet to upload its signals from the moon, says it is inviting private sector bids to build and launch the US probes.

The US space agency plans to build a small space station, dubbed Gateway, in the moon's orbit by 2026, and envisages a manned mission to Mars in the following decade. — AFP ■

Liverpool staying positive despite blip, says Klopp

LONDON (United Kingdom)—Jurgen Klopp has vowed that Liverpool will remain positive as they battle for the Premier League title despite a wobble that has enabled Manchester City to seize the initiative. Liverpool's destiny is no longer in their own hands after a goalless draw in Sunday's Merseyside derby allowed Pep Guardiola's City to regain top spot with a one-point advantage. Despite criticism over a lack of creativity, the club have notched five successive clean sheets in all competitions and a Premier League-best 17 shut-outs this season, with just 15 goals conceded in 29 matches.

Liverpool, who have not won the English top-flight since 1990,

have drawn four out of their past six league games, leading to suggestions that may be feeling the nerves.

However, with nine matches left to play, Klopp insists his side are not willing to give up hopes of a successful finale to the campaign. "We are positive—how couldn't we be positive?" he told liverpoolfc.com. "There is a lot to come and a lot of games to play. What brought us here was the stability the boys showed. We are difficult to beat, which is very important in football. And we created, still, in difficult games, which is very important in football.

Dortmund lose 1-0 to Tottenham in UEFA Champions League

BERLIN—Harry Kane's sole goal of the game was enough for Tottenham Hotspur to knock out Borussia Dortmund 1-0 (4-0 on aggregate) at the second leg of the Champions League last 16 on Tuesday.

The "BVB" took the reins from the kick off and staged lively opening period as Paco Alcacer was flagged offside from promising position before Jan Vertonghen's vital challenge inside the box denied Marco Reus from very close range in the 15th minute.

Dortmund continued powerful and set the visitors under pressure as Marco Reus' deflected effort tested Tottenham's goalkeeper Hugo Lloris in the 21st minute.

Tottenham had a good chance to shock the hosts in the 31st minute but Son Heung-Ming's low shot went just wide.

However, it were the hosts

who remained on the front foot and pressed the visitors into the defence, as Lloris had to tip Mario Goetze's shot over the bar

with 34 minutes into the game.

After the restart, Tottenham punished Dortmund's wastefulness with four minutes

played in the second half as Harry Kane finished off Moussa Sissoko's through ball to break the deadlock against the run of the

game.

Dortmund tried to respond and continued offensively minded but it seemed like the Tottenham opener took the wind out of the host's sails. Christian Pulisic and Paco Alcacer came close in the closing period but Tottenham goalkeeper Lloris was once again on guard to save the 1-0 victory on the road. "We knew if we got a chance we had to take it. Moussa put a great ball through and I finished it off. They had a couple of chances in that first half but that's what the Champions League is about," Tottenham's top striker Kane said.

"We created six or seven great chances and we didn't convert them despite a dominating first half. We didn't reward ourselves and that made the difference. We all believed we could pull this off. It's a bitter pill to swallow," Dortmund's midfielder Marius Wolf said.—Xinhua ■
