Speaking on the occasion, Union Minister Dr. Pe Myint expressed thanks to prominent members of the Myanmar movie community for putting their energy into evaluating the movies and selecting award winning movies, experts and actors from 83 movies produced in 2018.

The Myanmar Academy Awards presentation began in 2013, taking on more significance year after year, he said.

The Minister also said that this year brought development to Myanmar's movie industry, with significant changes seen on screen. He also recalled the complaints about the quality of Myanmar movies heard last year, adding that good movies were accepted by the people and achieved success, being released one after another in 2018.

Regarding the improved movies, he acknowledged that competition among movie productions, and greater prospects for producing good movies, were brought about by increasing investments in movie productions.

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“We heard that income from good movies had broken records. On the other hand, the fact that a good movie can achieve commercial success has become significant” said Union Minister Dr. Pe Myint.

Regarding the progress seen in the nation’s cinemas, he said that the cinema industry had seen an increase in investments, indicating that cinema was seen as an opportunity for investors.

The small number of available cinemas, however, has been a large problem in past years, and was difficult to solve during those years. But the number of cinemas was increasing in Myanmar due to an increase in investments in the sector each year.

Meanwhile, the number of movies which were screened at the nation’s cinemas increased from 33 in 2016 to 83 in 2018, while the number of cinemas had reached 146. Also, some 20 cinemas were expected to be opened in the next two to three years.

While recounting the past glory of the Myanmar’s movie world, Union Minister Dr. Pe Myint said about 20 Myanmar movies were exported around 1930 to foreign countries including Japan, Thailand and India.

After the Second World War, Myanmar movies reached to foreign countries including China

The studios were abandoned after they were damaged by the Cyclonic Storm Nargis.

The Union Minister invited the movie community to use the film studios and to use the Film Promotion Centre for paper reading, discussion and movie training. He also expressed the ministry’s readiness to help the movie community and to remove obstacles for outdoor shooting in Myanmar, saying that the recent shooting in downtown Yangon by the Shaw Brothers Film company could be seen as fruits of coordination to overcome challenges for shooting in the downtown sections of Yangon.

Afterwards Myanmar Motion Picture Organisation Chairman U Zin Wine explained about works conducted for the progress and development of Myanmar motion pictures. Following this, announcements and presentation of awards were made. State Counsellor Daw Aung San Suu Kyi presented the lifetime achievement award to five time academy award winner Sithu Daw Myint Myint Khin.

respective duties to allow the casting of the advance vote. The Yangon Region municipal elections will be conducted in 33 townships within the municipal area of Yangon Region. There will be six constituencies with 272 candidates competing in the elections, it is learnt.— MNA

Telecom operators directed to sell only two SIM cards to one person

MINISTRY of Transport and Communications has directed the telecom operators to sell only two SIM cards to one person as from 1st April, according to the ministry.

The ministry announced its directive recently.

Four operators MPT, Telenor, Ooredoo and MyTel are providing telecom services in Myanmar. “As from 1st April, a person can buy only two SIM cards and needs to show identity card,” said U Soe Thein, Permanent Secretary of the ministry, said yesterday.

He also advised the people not to buy SIM cards at roadside shops as they are not registered with their names.

“People should utilize the telecom service after regis-

tering SIM cards under their names at legally opened shops,” said U Soe Thein.

The move is aimed at providing security to mobile financial services and the people, according to the ministry.

In Myanmar, unregistered SIM cards are available at illegal shops. “It is found that a person is using more than two SIM cards. Most are not registered. This situation is not helpful for mobile monetary services. Besides, this situation is not helpful for personal security and for the State as well,” said U Soe Thein.

The Permanent Secretary has also advised the people to tell the operators concerned to suspend their SIM cards in case their registered SIM cards are

being used by others.

“The registered user is the most responsible person for possible problems caused by their SIM cards,” he said.

Current situation has shown that SIM cards should reach to those who have not yet got national citizenship scrutiny cards and people in rural areas. “Those who have not yet got national citizenship scrutiny cards can buy SIM cards by showing other identity cards such as driving license cards, students cards. Foreigners can use their passports to buy SIM cards at shops,” said U Soe Thein. The ministry would announce a separate director to take measures against the illegal shops selling unregistered SIM cards.— MNA

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Prices of mung beans stable in domestic market

THE price of mung beans was stable this week in the Yangon market, as well as wholesale centres in other regions and states, according to the Agriculture and Market Information Agency (AMIA).

Traders sold a ton of mung bean for K677,000 in Bayintnaung Wholesale Centre, whereas wholesale prices of mung bean remained unchanged in both Monywa and Nay Pyi Taw, with merchants selling the crop at K23,000 per basket. During the period, the price of a basket of mung bean was sold for K23,000 in the wholesale market in Pyay, a decrease in prices by K1,000 per basket.

Merchants expect that prices

of mung bean are not likely to rise again in the local market next week, urging growers to sell their crop when prices are high in the market, and encouraged merchants to monitor the market, rather than just buying and selling. The prices of mung bean decreased in the domestic market last week due to low foreign demand. Mung bean is a marketable export product which is harvested seasonally. Domestic traders tend to make deals during the low season and stock them in their warehouses. At present, mung beans have been exported to India, Pakistan, Dubai, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh.— Myanmar Digital News ■ (Translated by Khaing Thanda Lwin)

Myanmar Institute of Directors seeks to sharpen skills of directors

THE Myanmar Institute of Directors (MioD) will conduct courses that seek to improve the administrative skills of directors from public companies, said U Aung Naing Oo, Secretary of the Myanmar Investment Commission.

“The formation of MioD is aimed at improving the skills and law-abiding practices of directors from public companies, enabling them to follow rules and regulations and understand the duties associated with a director. We established the MioD in cooperation with the government, the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry (UMFCCI) and the International Finance Corpora-

tion (IFC) under the World Bank Group,” he added. “On 1 April, the MioD will open a three-day certificate course for directors. We will continue offering encouragement to company directors from public companies, on an alternative basis. In addition, those from private companies can attend the course. We will operate the courses continuously. Experts from Singapore and Myanmar will conduct the courses,” he continued.

In addition, the Myanmar Investment Commission is drafting a manual on corporate administrative codes to be followed by all companies, in cooperation with the Securities and Exchange Commission of Myanmar. ■ (Translated by Khaing Thanda Lwin)

Mineral exports decline almost 56% since October

Mineral exports between Myanmar and foreign traders totalled US\$416 million in the current 2018-2019 Fiscal Year, down notably by \$578 million, or over 55.7 per cent, from the corresponding period last 2017-2018 FY, according to the Ministry of Commerce.

At this time last FY, mineral exports were \$1.039 billion, with \$560 million in the public sector and \$479 million reported by the private sector.

Between 1 October and 15 March in this FY, public exporters sold minerals valued at \$32.016 million, declining by

nearly \$528 million from the corresponding period last FY.

Also during the five and a half months of this FY, the private sector’s export of the same reached \$429 million, a decrease in value by over \$50 million against last FY.

Other products which saw a downward trend in export growth in the current FY covered forest-based products and other miscellaneous items. When compared with the corresponding period last FY, the current export value of forest products declined by nearly \$6.5 million, while the export of miscellaneous prod-

ucts this FY dropped by \$202 million.

During the 2018 mini-budget period (April and September), the country’s exports of mineral products were \$1.034 billion.

As per the ministry’s yearly trade report, the value of mineral exports were \$897 million in the 2011-2012FY, \$399 million in the 2012-2013FY, \$1.339 billion in the 2013-2014FY, \$1.498 billion in the 2014-2015FY, \$968 million in the 2015-2016FY, and \$1.010 billion in the 2016-2017FY.—Khine Khant ■

External trade exceeds \$15 bln, with over \$700 mln in deficit

MYANMAR’S foreign trade totalled US\$15.5 billion between October and mid-March this Fiscal Year 2018-2019, up by over \$185 million compared with the same period in the last 2017-2018 Fiscal Year, the Ministry of Commerce reported this Friday.

During five and a half months, Myanmar sold almost \$7.4 billion worth of domestic products to international buyers, and bought \$8.1 billion worth of goods, resulting in a trade deficit of over \$700 million, which decreased by over \$1.2 billion, as against the corresponding period

last FY, when Myanmar recorded a trade deficit of \$1.979 billion.

When compared with last FY, the current import value declined by \$511 million from both border and non-border trade, whereas the current export valued went up by nearly \$700 million.

Myanmar conducts foreign trade mainly through by sea. During the period, the country’s maritime trade amounted to \$11 billion, whereas its external border trade stood at \$4.465 billion. When compared with this time last year, the country’s non-bor-

der trade went down by over \$100 million while its border trade increased by over \$293 million.

Normally, the country exports seven main groups of commodities—agricultural commodities, forest, marine and animal products, minerals, manufactured products and other miscellaneous items. It usually imports four major categories of commodities—capital goods, intermediate products, consumer goods and CMP raw materials.—Shwe Khine ■

Myanmar rejects EU's Draft Resolution on situation of human rights in Myanmar at Human Rights Council

THE draft resolution on "Situation of Human Rights in Myanmar" tabled by the European Union (EU) was considered for action on 22 March 2019 at the 40th Regular Session of the United Nations Human Rights Council in Geneva.

Myanmar categorically rejected the draft resolution.

In the statement delivered as a concerned country before taking action on the draft resolution, Permanent Representative of Myanmar U Kyaw Moe Tun highlighted the following main reasons why the resolution is not accepted by Myanmar :-

1. First, the EU's justification for the draft resolution is mainly based on the one-sided narratives, highly politicized and seriously flawed reports of the FFM and the Special Rapporteur that Myanmar has categorically objected.
2. Second, the draft resolution clearly demonstrates its intent to garner international pressure against Myanmar by passing one resolution after resolution and heaping mechanism over mechanism on our country. It contains a number of paragraphs, based on sweeping allegations, aiming to impose unprecedented discriminatory scrutiny on Myanmar by abusing various UN mechanisms under the name

of human rights. Today, Myanmar is under the scrutiny of multiple UN mechanisms.

3. Third, the tone and tenor of the draft resolution demonstrates a total disregard for the dignity, sovereignty, and territorial integrity of a sovereign UN member state. It is seen a "classic example" of double standards and, selective and discriminatory application of human rights norms on a developing country in democratic transition.
4. Fourth, although the draft resolution is labelled "Situation of human rights in Myanmar", a large number of paragraphs narrowly focus, with negative perspective, on the rights of a particular group in Rakhine. Myanmar will never allow any attempt that can have negative impact for the social cohesion and unity among different ethnic and religious communities in the country.
5. Fifth, the EU's draft resolution sows the seeds of mistrust and further polarization not only among different communities in the country in particular in Rakhine but also between Myanmar and the international community. It is imbued with retributive



and punitive undertone rather than seeking solution, understanding and reconciliation.

6. Sixth, the draft resolution deliberately ignored the threat of terrorism which is the real cause of present humanitarian situation. This calls for a great concern with regard to the true intention and sincerity of the cosponsors.
7. Seventh, as a principle, Myanmar is against country-specific resolutions.

The Permanent Representative said, "Myanmar categorically rejects the draft resolution L.19", due to these reasons and stressed, "Myanmar shall not be bound by this unfair resolution."

The Permanent Representative stated that although some paragraphs, contained in the draft resolution, acknowledged

and welcomed a few parts from many positive developments in Myanmar, the aforementioned factually-flawed, intrusive, politically driven sovereignty-infringing paragraphs had far surpassed them.

He stressed, "The adoption of yet another ill-intentioned, selectively targeted and politically motivated resolution will not help Myanmar".

"If there is genuine will, there is room for the EU and other cosponsors to play a more constructive role in assisting Myanmar's democratic transition", he added.

In his statement, U Kyaw Moe Tun also emphasized the importance of constructive approach and genuine cooperation for the promotion and protection of human rights. He reiterated the firm commitment by the government and people of Myanmar to continue working towards achieving the goal of building a

democratic federal union.

The Permanent Representative also stated that Myanmar "is resolute to find a sustainable solution to the issue in Rakhine State" and welcomed the "constructive cooperation with sincere intention" from the international community.

He concluded by expressing Myanmar Government's sincere gratitude to the delegations standing firm on their principled position in supporting Myanmar and requested the member states of the Council to vote against the draft resolution.

The Chinese Representative, exercising its right as a member of the Council, called for a vote by stating that the draft resolution will further complicate the situation on the ground rather than solving problems; positive progress including economic development and peace process of Myanmar should be much recognized; the concerned country, Myanmar rejected the draft resolution; and the international community should respect Myanmar's sovereignty.

The draft resolution was put to a vote at the 47-member Human Rights Council, and adopted with a vote of 3 against, 7 abstentions and 37 in favour.

China, Cuba and the Philippines voted against the resolution in support of Myanmar. The other 7 countries - Angola, Cameroon, Democratic Republic of the Congo, India, Japan, Nepal and Senegal - did not support the EU's resolution and abstained in the voting according to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.—MNA

Tatmadaw column ambushed by AA group near Yaygaungchaung Village

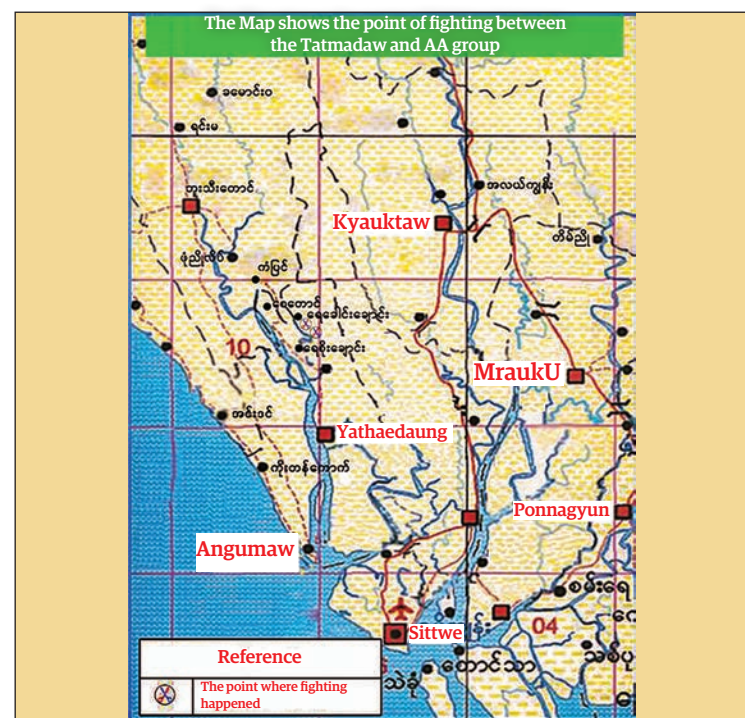
A Tatmadaw column conducting security operation near Yaygaungchaung Village, Yathedaung Township, Rakhine State was ambushed by an AA group with small and heavy arms on 22 March. In the ensuing firefight, the Tatmadaw suffered some casualties and 3 remains of AA personnel were captured by the Tatmadaw.

On the morning of 22 March at around 6:30 a.m. about 30 AA personnel opened fire on the Tatmadaw column with small and heavy arms from about 400 me-

ter southeast of Yaygaungchaung Village. Later in the afternoon at about 4:30 p.m. about 50 AA personnel opened fire on the Tatmadaw column from about 800 meters southeast of Yaygaungchaung Village. The firefights resulted in Tatmadaw suffering some casualties and 3 remains of AA personnel dressed in sports wears were found in the vicinity of the area from where the AA group had opened fire and Tatmadaw columns were continuing the security operation, it is learnt.

Groups of AA Personnel have

been taking cover in wards and villages and have been shooting and planting landmines against Tatmadaw security columns. As unnecessary civilian casualties could be caused, people in towns, wards and villages of Rakhine State are urged not to accept any AA personnel and are requested to report to relevant administrative organisations of the presence of AA personnel in towns, wards and villages, according to news released by Tatmadaw Commander-in-Chief Office. — MNA (Translated by Zaw Min)



Involvement of people is greatest strength during democratic transition

MYANMAR is undergoing a transition towards democracy, making a commitment to establish a democratic federal Union. A transition is, very simply, the process of going from one point to another. The distance that must be covered, and the nature of the terrain that must be travelled, defines the scope and complexity of the challenges that have to be faced and overcome.

We believe that our people have the capacity to meet the challenges we are facing in our transition to democracy, and to carry the transition to a successful conclusion

Without flowing along the transformational path, our country will not develop. Reform is something that must be done. Only when all the citizens take part in the transition will they obtain new opportunities. If not, they will lose these opportunities. Transition consists of administrative, legislative and judicial sectors. Administrative sector transitions need to include an administrative system that supports the rule of law. We believe that our people have the capacity to meet the challenges we are facing in our transition to democracy, and to carry the transition to a successful conclusion, which will be the starting point of a new, and better era for our nation.

It's Time: How the South-East Asia Region can spearhead the global push to End TB

EACH of the WHO South-East Asia Region's Member States have played a critical role in the global push to End TB by or before 2030. In 2017, for example, health ministers from across the Region issued a Call for Action, highlighting the measures needed to rout the disease. That was built on the following year by a Statement of Action, which pledged intensified efforts to achieve that outcome, even as domestic funding reached unprecedented levels. In the same year, at the UN General Assembly, Member States vigorously canvassed for a Political Declaration on the Fight Against Tuberculosis, which was subsequently endorsed. And in key forums within the Region and beyond, Member States continue to advocate with the passion and force required to chart path-breaking change.

The WHO South-East Asia Region was pivotal to putting TB on the global policy agenda. With leadership comes responsibility

Region-wide commitment, resolve and action is to be commended. It is also vitally important. The South-East Asia Region is the world's most TB-affected region, with the life-threatening disease having serious social, political and economic impact. Not only does

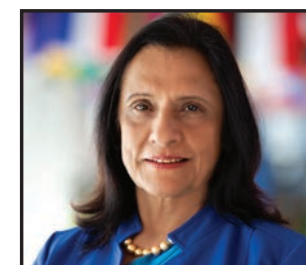
the Region account for 44% of the 10 million people globally that fell ill with TB in 2017; it also makes up more than 50% of the 1.27 million TB deaths which, when TB-HIV mortality is accounted for, is estimated to be 1.6 million annually. Significantly, TB remains the Region's leading cause of death and lost productive years in the crucial 15-49-year-old age group, impacting the prospects of individuals, families, communities and countries. The Region is also home to a growing number of drug-resistant cases of the disease, threatening the control of TB generally, as well as health security specifically.

In recognizing and commending Member States' leadership at the global level, it is nevertheless imperative they implement in full, and without delay, the UN's Political Declaration, leveraging its impact to maximum effect. That means ensuring that by 2022, 18 million TB patients are diagnosed and effectively treated (including 1.5 million children), more than 500 000 patients with drug-resistant TB are successfully treated, and preventive treatment is provided to around 12 million people at risk of developing the disease. Though this is a considerable challenge, achieving these outcomes is both possible and necessary. To that end, intensifying active case-finding, especially among high-risk groups, is essential. In 2017, for example, around 1.5 million TB cases either failed to be notified or received treatment of uncertain quality. That is of deep concern. As modelling shows, intensified case-finding can dramatically reduce case incidence while also ensuring all patients receive quality treatment. In pursuing this core strategy, Member States should develop a joint roadmap on how they can harness novel

diagnostics (alongside community engagement) to find missing cases, as well as how people-centered treatment can be provided to all.

Covering all groups at risk of developing TB with preventive treatment should also be prioritized. This is especially important given the need to treat latent TB with new drugs that are more effective in preventing latent cases becoming active. Importantly, all plans should be aligned with WHO guidelines, which also recommend treating childhood, adolescent and adult contacts of TB cases, alongside other at-risk groups such as people living with HIV or those who are immunocompromised. If adequately implemented, the Region can reach many more than the 12 million targeted for treatment.

Third, all partners should support the supply of first-line drugs via south-south cooperation, pre-

cisely as India has offered to do. At present, several of the Region's countries are producing drugs and diagnostics, while others are testing new technologies that show great promise. This should be taken advantage of, with Member States leveraging the opportunity to make substantial savings that can be used on priority interventions or in the event of unforeseen circumstances, including outbreaks. Royalty-free technology transfers will meanwhile improve access to diagnostics and the efficacy of outreach, facilitating significant Region-wide progress.

Fourth and finally, community engagement, including capacity building, must be a core priority of all countries, whether low- or high-prevalence. Rather than pas-

sively implementing policies that come from above, affected communities should be part of the policy development process, with community recommendations reflected on paper and in on-the-ground initiatives. As part of that, they should also be empowered as advocates able to monitor the quality of services and support outreach efforts. This will help ensure all people receive the life-saving care required.

WHO will continue to provide technical and operational support to these and other pursuits as part of the Region's Flagship Priority of accelerating efforts towards ending TB. As high-level backing at the international level advances, and Member State funding mechanisms are streamlined (as they must be), the possibility of charting dramatic progress will be enhanced. That is an outcome we should all work towards. Indeed, now is the time to reflect on the momentum already developed and embrace the responsibility leadership entails. Now is the time to show that we – the WHO South-East Asia Region – can spearhead the push to end TB once and for all.

Southeast Asia Video Festival for Children (SEAVFC) is the festival cum competition for and by children. The heart of the festival is a competition on short

videos that are created by TV professionals whose works have been aired on television, amateurs who are above 18 years old, whose works have not been aired and have not been entered in any international video festival, and children and youth who belong to three age categories: 12 years old below, 13-15 years old, and 16-18 years old. The participants of the festival are professionals in the television industry, educators, and film and video enthusiasts,

including students, children and the youth, from the ten countries of Southeast Asia: Brunei, Cambodia, Indonesia, Lao PDR, Malaysia, Myanmar, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, and Vietnam.

The purposes of SEAVFC are; to develop, promote, foster and encourage cooperation, closer ties and mutual friendship among the ten countries of Southeast Asia; promote a child-friendly television; promote child-friendly

new media materials; to synergize efforts in the region toward child-safe media and to become an avenue for regional broadcasters, TV producers, writers, and like-minded professionals and individuals to generate more content for the Southeast Asian child, and make these available widely; to have a better knowledge and appreciation of each other's cultures, practices and traditions, which will lead to the development of mutual respect for one another and the attainment of peace and international understanding; to help engage the TV producers, and the would-be TV content producers, especially students and indigenous peoples in hands-on workshops and information sessions; to help create media space for children and the youth; to provide a venue for fruitful program exchanges among the participants in the television industry; and to honour and recognize the best video works by and for children, in the Southeast Asia region.

With the theme: “Pride in

Self, Family & Traditions”, the 1st SEAVFC video festival was held in Manila, the Philippines from 27th to 29th November 2017. Myanmar joined the festival and Director Kyaw Hninsi won professional level (Fiction) with the title “May the Fragrance of Thanakha Last Forever”, which is public education to protect vulnerable children in Myanmar.

With the theme: “Everyday Heroes”, the 2nd SEAVFC video festival was held from 22nd to 24th of November 2018. MRTV conducted workshop for the children and totaling (45) students attended the workshop and (31) entered the competitions. For the national level, 11 finalists were selected and 4 were selected for regional level. At the festival, Su Lin Lae (Grade-V, Basic Education High School No.1 Dagon) won the prize with 5-minute video “Heroes in My Life” which reflects how grandparents nurture their granddaughter on the values, traditions and customs of Myanmar families.

UNDP organized a workshop entitled “Accountable governance and Economic Enterprises” which was held in collaboration with Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) and Ayeyawady Region Government, at the City Hall, Patheingyi Town, Ayeyawady Region, yesterday morning.

At the workshop, Ayeyawady Region Chief Minister U Hla Moe Aung and Anti-Corruption Commission Chairman U Aung Kyi delivered opening speeches, and Regional ministers, members of commission and external experts, together with a total of six local businessmen, then took part in the workshop in the form of a roundtable discussion.

In his remarks delivered at the workshop, Ayeyawady Region Chief Minister U Hla Moe Aung said that he extended his congratulation on making the endeavours of disseminating knowledge to the people. As for the Regional government, cooperation would be made to the emergence of a corruption free zone, and the purpose of holding the workshop was to raise awareness about anti-corruption while aiming to reduce corruption. Such kind of workshop is very important for the children to be on the right track with close supervision of jurors like U Myint Thein Pe, Academy U Nyein Min, U Han Myint and Daw Thitagu Zeya with the collaboration of senior producers from MRTV and Myanmar Media Development Centre (MMDC). This year, there will be prizes for the winners so also special arrangements to distribute Special Jury Award, Kids Choice Award and Heart Award. Each country has to submit only one entry per category, totaling 10 competition categories: six for Professionals, one for Amateur and three for Children and the Youth.

There are (6) categories for Professionals based on target audience such as (Non-Fiction) for audience under seven years old, (Non-Fiction) for audience 8-12 years old, (Non-Fiction) for audience under 13-17 years old, (Fiction) for audience under seven years old, (Fiction) for audience 8-12 years old and (Fiction) for audience 13-17 years old. For the category of Amateurs, the video maker need not specify any particular target audience and his work can be a fiction or non-fiction material. There are (3) categories for Children and the Youth which are based on the age of entrants. For the Children and Youth age group, the video makers are allowed to seek professional assistance in editing and post-production matters. However, an entrant must be responsible for at least 75% of the total production, from conceptualization, script and storyboarding, videography and direction. It is very important because they have to explain the process if and when the entry enters the finals.

For regional level competition, the final submission date will be end of October. Thus, the final submission date for national level competition will be early October as the jurors need time for screening and editing the finalists. In early November, the jurors will sit for the online judging to the selected finalists from other ASEAN member states in order to get ready for the festival and award distribution in the end of November.

MRTV receives positive response from young people and we expect more entries for children categories. Moreover, we would like to invite more professionals and amateurs especially young and talented animation movie artists to join in the festival. In future, Myanmar National Committee of SEAVFC will be hosting such kind of festival during the ASEAN Chairmanship, while planning to hold awareness workshop back to back with Youth Development Forum with the collaboration of Ministry of Education.

Trump drops new N. Korea sanctions because he 'likes' Kim: W. House

WASHINGTON (United States)—President Donald Trump on Friday abruptly announced the cancellation of sanctions imposed by his own Treasury Department to tighten international pressure on North Korea.

"It was announced today by the US Treasury that additional large scale Sanctions would be added to those already existing Sanctions on North Korea. I have today ordered the withdrawal of those additional Sanctions!" Trump said in a tweet. He appeared to be referring to measures unveiled Thursday that targeted two Chinese companies accused of helping North Korea to evade tight international sanctions meant to pressure Pyongyang into ending its nuclear weapons program.

But *The Washington Post* reported, citing Trump administration officials, that the president's tweet referenced future sanctions that had not been announced and were scheduled for "the coming days." The Thursday sanctions were the first new sign of pressure since talks between Trump and North Korean leader Kim Jong Un broke down in Hanoi less than a month ago.

However, Trump, who has previously spoken of "love" for the totalitarian leader, appears to retain hope that his strong personal relationship will bear fruit. "President Trump likes Chairman Kim and he doesn't think these sanctions will be necessary," the president's spokeswoman, Sarah Sanders, said.

Adam Schiff, a Dem-

ocrat who heads the intelligence committee in the House of Representatives, blasted Trump for cancelling sanctions "imposed only yesterday and cham-

pioned by his own national security advisor, because he 'loves' Kim."

"Foolish naivete is dangerous enough. Gross incompetence and disarray

in the White House make it even worse," Schiff tweeted. On Thursday, Trump national security advisor John Bolton had tweeted that the sanctions were

meant to put an end to "illicit shipping practices" by North Korea.

"Everyone should take notice and review their own activities to ensure they are not involved in North Korea's sanctions evasion," he said. China complained, saying that it did enforce all UN resolutions and opposed "any country imposing unilateral sanctions and taking long-arm jurisdiction against any Chinese entity according to their own domestic laws."

This was Trump's second major, unexpected foreign policy announcement by Twitter in two days.

On Thursday, he sent a tweet reversing decades of US policy and pledged to recognize Israeli sovereignty over the hotly contested Golan Heights border area with Syria.—AFP ■

China factory blast death toll jumps to 64, man rescued after 40 hours

BEIJING (China)—The death toll in a chemical plant explosion in China rose to 64 Saturday but rescuers found a survivor among more than two dozen still missing in the debris of one of the country's worst industrial accidents in recent years. Thursday's explosion in the eastern city of Yancheng injured hundreds and flattened an industrial park.

The local fire brigade pulled a man in his 40s from the rubble of the destroyed chemical plant around dawn on Saturday, according to a statement on the city government's official Weibo account.

He was taken to hospital for treatment, the statement said, without giving further detail of his status or injuries. Rescuers are looking for 28 people who are still missing, state broadcaster CCTV reported, citing Yancheng mayor Cao Lubao.

"The identities of the dead and the missing are being confirmed through interviews with family

members, home visits and DNA tests," Cao told CCTV.

The explosion toppled several buildings in the industrial park and caused a huge fire that raged

through the night, while rescuers scrambled to find survivors in the plant's wreckage. More than 600 people have received medical treatment following the blast, according to the city government.

Among them, 34 are critically injured and 60 are seriously injured, according to CCTV, which also said 28 people were still missing.

Hundreds of rescuers were dispatched to the scene, local authorities said, and some 4,000 people have been evacuated from the blast site. Local

authorities investigating the cause of the accident said an unspecified number of people were taken into police custody on Friday.

The facility involved in the explosion belonged to Tianjiayi Chemical, a firm with 195 employees established in 2007 that mainly produces raw chemical materials including anisole, a highly flammable compound.—AFP ■

Plastic microparticles threaten unique Galapagos fauna

GALAPAGOS (Ecuador)— Armed only with gloves and large sacks, park rangers and volunteers are battling the scourge of plastic waste blighting the idyllic Galapagos Islands and their unique creatures. Tons of plastic waste wash up on the shores of the Galapagos islands where microparticles end up in the stomachs of species found only in the Pacific archipelago 1,000 kilometers (600 miles) west of mainland Ecuador.

Those microparticles, often from waste discarded in big cities from other countries and even continents, are perhaps one of the greatest threats to the iguanas, tortoises, birds and fish of the Galapagos.

The tiny plastic pieces become part of the food chain “that we may later feed on,” biologist Jennifer Suarez, a marine ecosystems expert with the Galapagos National Parks (PNG), told AFP. Sun rays and the ocean’s saltwater break down bottles, bags, lids, containers and fishing nets. Yet while those objects may appear solid to the naked eye, when battered against rocks or by the force of waves, microparticles splinter off, which are subsequently ingested by animals.

Every year, and despite the punishing heat and sun, expeditionary groups arrive at Galapagos beaches to survey the damage caused by man.

Sex toys, shoes, lighters, pens and tin cans are amongst the waste found in areas used by animals, including some in danger of extinction. In uninhabited zones such as Punta Albebarle, in the far north of Isabela Island, where AFP joined a team of cleaners, waste from far and wide was discovered. “More than 90 per cent of the waste gathered doesn’t come from Galapagos activities, but rather from South America, Central America and even a great deal of waste with Asian branding,” said PNG director Jorge Carrion. With a population of around 25,000, the archipelago, a UNESCO World Heritage site, has tightened its rules regarding plastics use in recent years.

‘Chinese brands’

Most of the plastic waste washing up on the Galapagos shores are bottles of Peruvian, Colombian

or Panamanian products, and containers with Chinese branding. That waste “probably comes from the fishing fleets from Asia just outside the Galapagos’ exclusive economic area,” said Carrion, speaking from the PNG dock in Puerto Ayora, the capital of Santa Cruz Island. Since 1996, local fishermen have been cleaning the remotest islands and for the last three years, they’ve been keeping a register. “This lets us identify the origin of waste on unpopulated coasts,” said Suarez. “Over the last two years of monitoring, we’ve noticed that the largest number of brands are Peruvian and Chinese.” While currently there is no such legislation, the hope is that this register can be used in the future to make compensation claims against those responsible for environmental harm.

Already in 2019, eight tons of waste has been col-

lected, compared to 24 in the whole of 2018 and just under 6.5 tons the year before. Park rangers also keep a register, but theirs is of the animals affected by the waste, such as the cormorant that builds its nests using used diapers and plastic bags, or the body of a booby found buried in a pile of rubbish.

‘Appeal to consciences’

Another shocking discovery is plastic bags that have been bitten by sea turtles that mistake them for jellyfish, an important part of their diet. “We have indiscriminately thrown so much waste into the sea that it has turned up at coasts where there are no people, but already there is garbage,” Sharlyn Zuniga told AFP. The 24-year-old clean-up volunteer said she came across pristine beaches with fine white sand, but spoilt by rubbish. —AFP ■

NASA publishes images of the meteor no one saw

WASHINGTON (United States)—NASA on Friday published satellite photos of a powerful meteor which appeared just above the Bering Sea on December 18 but went unnoticed until months later. The explosion unleashed around 173 kilotons of energy, more than 10 times that of the atomic bomb blast over Hiroshima in World War II.

Images captured minutes after the fireball disintegrated in the atmosphere show the shadow of the meteor's trail cast on top of clouds, elongated by the sun's low position.

The super-heated air turns the clouds to an orange tint in

the meteor's wake.

The photographs were taken by two NASA instruments on board the Terra satellite.

A still image was taken at 2350 GMT, while five of the of nine cameras on the Multi-angle Imaging SpectroRadiometer (MISR) instrument took another sequence of photos at 2355, which NASA collated into a GIF that shows the orange trail

NASA estimates that the meteor occurred at 23:48 GMT.

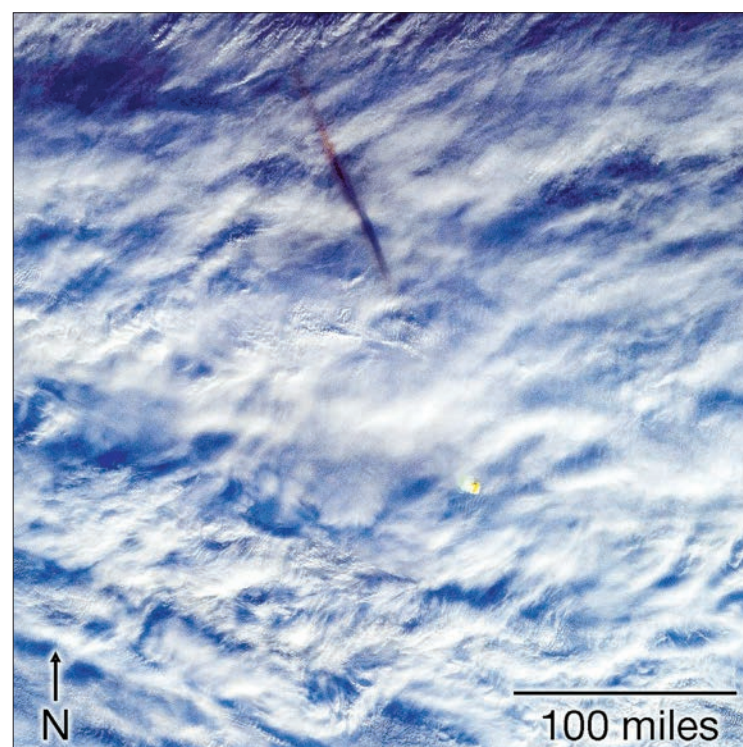
Meteors are rocks from outer space that become incandescent upon entering earth's atmosphere as a result of friction. They are also known as shooting

stars. Pieces which survive intact and hit the ground are known as meteorites.

It was the most powerful explosion in the atmosphere since the fireball that burst over the Russian town of Chelyabinsk in 2013. That was 440 kilotons, and left 1,500 people injured, mostly from glass flying out of smashed windows.

This time around, the blast occurred over waters, hundreds of kilometers off the Russian coast.

The first photo of the event was taken by a Japanese weather satellite and published only this week. —AFP

Russian space agency to produce no less than 8 Angara carrier rockets a year after 2023

MOSCOW—The production of heavy Angara-A5 carrier rockets should reach at least eight launchers from 2023, Head of Russia's State Space Corporation Roscosmos Dmitry Rogozin said in an interview with Rossiya-24 TV Channel on Friday. "We are launching the production process in Omsk and the experimental factory in Moscow in order to start the serial production of at least eight such

heavy rockets a year in 2023," the Roscosmos chief said, adding that the launches would be carried out from the Vostochny Cosmodrome in the Russian Far East. Roscosmos is currently making active preparations for the start of the Angara's trials, Rogozin said. "At the end of this year, we will repeat the trials of the heavy Angara-A5 rocket," the head of the Russian space agency said.

The Angara is a family of next-generation Russian space rockets. It consists of light, medium and heavy carry rockets with a lifting capacity of up to 37.5 tonnes. The production program envisages the manufacture of up to 44 universal rocket modules that will be assembled under their modular design either into the light Angara or heavy Angara rocket. —Tass ■

Chinese scientists convert plant waste into jet fuel

WASHINGTON—Chinese scientists designed a process that could convert plant scraps from agriculture and timber harvesting into quality jet fuel, which may help reduce carbon dioxide emissions from airplanes and rockets. The study published on Thursday in the journal *Joule* showed that a cheap, renewable and abundant polymer in the plant's cell walls can produce high-density aviation fuel.

"Our biofuel is important for mitigating CO2

emissions because it is derived from biomass and it has higher density compared with conventional aviation fuels," said the paper's co-author Li Ning, a research scientist at the Dalian Institute of Chemical Physics of Chinese Academy of Sciences.

The utilization of high-density aviation fuel can significantly increase the range and payload of aircraft without changing the volume of oil in the tank, according to the study. —Xinhua ■

Two astronauts complete 6.5-hour spacewalk, swapping batteries

WASHINGTON—Two flight engineers of the United States space agency NASA completed the first spacewalk of this year out of the International Space Station (ISS) on Friday to upgrade the space lab's power system. Nick Hague and Anne McClain wrapped up their spacewalk at 2:40 p.m. American Eastern Time, lasting about six hours and 39 minutes, according to NASA.

The two astronauts replaced nickel-hydrogen batteries with three newer, more powerful lithium-ion batteries for the power channel on one pair of the station's solar arrays.

They installed adapter plates and then hooked up electrical connections on the starboard truss, showed NASA's live broadcast online. The batteries were transported to the station in Sep-

tember 2018 aboard the Japanese H-II Transfer Vehicle.

The batteries store power generated by the station's solar arrays to provide power to the station when the station is not in the sunlight, as it orbits the Earth during orbital night, according to NASA.

They also worked to remove debris from outside of the station. McClain and another female flight engineer Christina Koch are scheduled to venture outside next Friday to work on a second set of battery replacements on a different power channel. It will be the first only-women spacewalk in history. Additional batteries will be replaced as part of this power upgrade over the next couple of years as new batteries are delivered to station, according to NASA. —Xinhua ■

Experts discuss AI-education integration

BEIJING—Chinese scientists and education experts have gathered to discuss the in-depth integration of artificial intelligence (AI) and education as well as innovative development in this regard at a symposium.

Representatives and scholars from the Ministry of Education (MOE), Chinese Academy of Engineering (CAE), Chinese Academy of Sciences and several Chinese universities attended the symposium, according to the MOE website.

The symposium is part of a research program on intelligent education strategy, jointly initiated by the MOE and the CAE last year.

The work on intelligent education should be put into the big picture of education modernization to achieve better development in this regard, said Vice Education Minister Zhong Denghua.

He also called for greater support from the government and relevant institutions to encourage more scientists and scholars to take part in intelligent education development. —Xinhua ■

Myanmar beat Viet Nam 3-2 in international women football friendly

THE Myanmar national women's football team beat the Viet Nam women's football team 3-2 in yesterday's international friendly match at Mandalay Thiri Stadium in Mandalay.

Viet Nam dominated from the very beginning of the first half with accurate passing, and they scored two consecutive goals at 15 and 18 minutes.

Both teams played well, displaying their best efforts and showing their dribbling skills from the start.

Myanmar's equaliser came at the 24 minute mark, as Ye Ye Oo scored with a header, with support from Khin Moe Wai.

The score at the end of the first half was 2-1.

In the second half, Myanmar

changed their tactic by using the power play, plus Myanmar played much better.

At the 75 minute mark, Myanmar scored with Win Theingi Tun kicking the long ball over the Viet Nam keeper.

Southgate lauds England hat-trick hero Sterling's coming of age

LONDON (United Kingdom)—England manager Gareth Southgate hailed Raheem Sterling's coming of age on the international stage after hitting his first hat-trick for the Three Lions in a 5-0 demolition of the Czech Republic on Friday.

The burgeoning talent at Southgate's disposal was on show as 18-year-old's Jadon Sancho and Callum Hudson-Odoi also played their part in a perfect start to England's Euro 2020 qualifying campaign.

Sterling, 24, was often criticised as he scored just two goals in his first 45 caps. But the Manchester City winger now has five in his last three England games after also scoring twice in a famous 3-2 Nations

League win in Spain in November.

“I thought he was devastating tonight,” said Southgate.

“I'm delighted for him to get the reaction that he did from the crowd here. We can't hide from the fact that he's had difficult moments with England and he's turned that full circle,” said Southgate.

“I also think the goals in Spain were an important moment for him; you could see the release that had brought.

“His finishes there and tonight were finishes that he was just taking on without thinking too much. At times, you could almost see the thought process in the past, but he's hungry for

those goals.”

England carry momentum

Harry Kane was also on target from the penalty spot and Tomas Kalas's calamitous own goal rounded off the scoring as England carried on their momentum from a run to the World Cup semi-finals and qualification for the last four of the Nations League.

The final of Euro 2020 will be played at Wembley and England have high hopes of being more than just hosts, especially with Sancho and Hudson-Odoi to add to an already talented front line boasting Sterling, Kane and Marcus Rashford.

Southgate admitted even more improvement is to come as his side ran out comprehensive winners despite a lacklustre start.

But one move of genuine quality opened the floodgates on 23 minutes. Kane showed his ability is not restricted to finding the net with a wonderful pass inside Filip Novak to free Sancho, who squared for Sterling to tap home on the stretch.

Another burst of inspiration from Sterling helped double England's lead in first-half stoppage time. He wriggled around four Czech defenders before a combination of Pavel Kaderabek and Tomas Kalas hauled him down.

Kane maintained his flawless record from the spot for

England and scored his 21st international goal, firing his powerful penalty past Jiri Pavlenka despite the Czech stopper getting a hand to it.

England went through the gears after the hour mark and Sancho should have scored his first international goal after more good work from Sterling and Kane, but could not force the ball past a desperate challenge from Novak.

Sterling soon showed Sancho how it is done with a fine curling finish into the top corner.

However, England's hat-trick hero had luck on his side for his third goal as a huge deflection left Pavlenka in the Czech goal flummoxed.

That was Sterling's final act as he made way for Hudson-Odoi, to make his international debut, while Declan Rice was also handed his England debut after switching allegiances from the Republic of Ireland.

And Southgate believes Sterling's experience of the highs and lows of being and England protégé makes him the perfect role model for the likes of Sancho, Hudson-Odoi and Rice.

“I've put him into the leadership group that we have. I think he's showing those signs, I think he's a role model for the younger players coming in,” added Southgate.—AFP ■

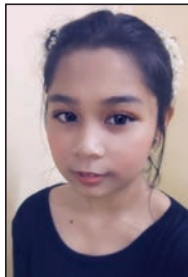

I set sailed my boat of life to my heart's content for years and my time was killed non-beneficially.

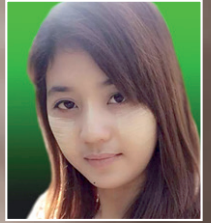

Scenic landscapes: Kalaw to Inle Trek

If you have plans to travel to Upper Myanmar and enjoy scenic landscapes with a bit of excitement, the Kalaw to Inle Lake trek is certainly a not-to-be-missed. With the wet season slowly approaching, it is best to take advantage of the current March cool to enjoy the countryside of Myanmar.

Getting to Kalaw

There are several ways to get to Kalaw. There are several buses that goes from Yangon or Mandalay and a few departing from Bagan. The ride takes around 8-9 hours and costs less than \$20 one way. There is also the option of flying into Heho airport with a following car-ride will take you to the beautiful town at 1,320 above sea level. The flight usually costs around \$180 round trip during off-season. For locals, prices are much cheaper with MMK 15,000 for a one-way bus ticket and around MMK 120,000 for roundtrip flights. The bus and flight tickets can be arranged easily at local supermarkets and travel agents.

The Trek

The trail connects Kalaw to Inle and one can pick either direction. It is also one of the very few treks where foreigners can enjoy the trails without permission. It is highly recommended to go through an existing tour companies which can be found in downtown Kalaw or a simple search on Facebook. The packages usually range from one night, two days to two night, three days with the nights spending in local village homestay. The journeys costs anywhere between MMK 35,000 to MMK 150,000 per person depending on the size of the group and length of the trek and include everything from pick up from the hotel to meals during the trek (not including extra drinks and water). For reference, it is around MMK 35,000 - 40,000 per person to do the one-night, two-day Kalaw to Inle route. The price includes all the meals (drinks are separate) and the boat ride to Inle.

It is recommended to do the one night two days trek if you're new to this level of physical activity and/or you're tight on time. But if you are up for the challenge and have a lot of time in Myanmar to see other attractions, the two-night three-day trek is perfect to enjoy scenic upper Myanmar while getting a first-hand experience of local life in the countryside. Sam's Family Trekking is suggested as it provides wonderful services and speaks great English with friendly guides

The one-night, two-day trek starts early in the morning at 8 am. The group meets at the tour place where they are introduced to their guide or two if the group is bigger depending on your tour service operator. For the one night two days package, there is usually a one-hour ride before the start of the trek. The first part of the trek takes you through your first village lined up with bamboo huts and brick houses with the harvest outside certain ones waiting to dry. Kids run around the streets



chasing each other with their faces painted golden with thanaka- a yellow paste grinded from the barks of the thanaka tree. The chili drying creates a canvas of flaming red reflecting its fiery glory in the sun. A tea break follows before lunch towards the end of the village with local snacks served as an elderly lady demonstrates the art of traditional weaving. Depending on your group and guide, the guide will either eat with you or with the host family. The group then continues through landscapes, wild avocado trees and fields tended by local people before arriving at the lunch spot.

The lunch spread is the perfect fusion of east and west. There are fresh fruits and vegetables with some traditional dish (fried vermicelli or rice) and homemade guacamole (if you go in season). The journey then continues through other scattered villages, rice fields and wild sunflower farms. After a slightly steep climb to a village up, the group can enjoy the sunset view from the top of the mountain. Later, the guide will direct the group to the homestay (or a local monastery) where dinner is served. Dinner is also a fusion with either Shan noodles or rice with stir-fry vegetables. Occasionally, depending on the host and the guide's preference, there may be French fries. The sleeping arrangement is pretty basic and sometimes, the whole group gets put in the room. The bathroom is a squat-type toilet and is usually an out-house. Make sure you bring your power banks as there is very little electricity to charge everybody's phone's and power banks. Most of the village run on solar which is great for environmental sustainability.

The next day starts pretty early with breakfast served around 7:30 and the group ready to go around 8:00 am. The breakfast is simple with instant coffee and French toast or Burmese pancakes. The trail follows the pattern of the previous hikes up and down mountains (this time less steep), weaving through scattered villages and passing lots and lots more fields. Whether you're taking a two day or three-day trek, you'll have lunch before taking the boat to Inle. After lunch, you board a longboat through a stilted village with hydroponic tomato farms and commuting villagers. Don't forget to wave at other tourist boats that pass by as well! The boat ride takes around an hour with a stop at a blacksmith shop before reaching the final destination of Inle. Then it's time to relax at your hotel in Inle and reminisce about the beautiful landscapes of Shan State OR plan your next trip to Bagan or Maymyo.
