Statues of six heroes unveiled to mark 74th Armed Forces Day

STATUES of six soldiers who won the Aung San Thuriya medal, Myanmar's highest award for gallantry and bravery in the face of the enemy, were inaugurated yesterday in Nay Pyi Taw to mark the 74th Armed Forces Day.

The Commander-in-Chief of Defence Services, Senior General Min Aung Hlaing, unveiled the statues, which are being displayed for the public at the Memorial to Fallen Heroes in Nay Pyi Taw.

Speaking at the ceremony, Senior General Min Aung Hlaing said the statues were erected to

honor six heroes in the Tatmadaw history who sacrificed their lives in the struggle for independence and to protect Myanmar's independence.

"The statues have been placed at the Memorial to Fallen Heroes so that future generations

can remember the heroes forever, and to cultivate the national spirit and the spirit of patriotism and sacrifice for the country and the people," said the Senior General.

He urged for the sustainable development of human resources

with national spirit so they can make the supreme sacrifice for the future State, in accordance with the four oaths of the Tatmadaw. Retired senior military officers from the Army, Navy and Air Force unveiled the six statues in the presence of the Senior Gen-

eral and attendees.

Afterwards, Senior General Min Aung Hlaing and retired senior officers laid wreaths at the Monument of the Memorial to Fallen Heroes and saluted those who sacrificed their lives for the country and the people.

The statues have been carved from marble. Each statue is two feet high and has been placed on top of a four-foot high stand, according to the Office of the Commander-in-Chief of Defence Services.—MNA ■

Opening ceremony of Social Security-May May clinic held in Nay Pyi Taw

AN opening ceremony of Social Security-May May clinic was held at Thingaha Hotel, Nay Pyi Taw yesterday morning. The clinic was a joint venture between Ministry of Labour, Immigration and Population and May May Hospital with an aim to increase the provision of outpatient health care service.

At the ceremony Union Minister U Thein Swe said Myanmar aim to establish an equal and fair society that reinforces social protection through drawing up a social protection strategic plan and implementing it by cooperating with relevant ministries.

Social Security Board is the only organisation in Myanmar that was providing health care insurance system to the workers with the cash input from employers and employees according to 2012 Social Security Law. It was drawing up and implementing work programs that enable the workers to obtain more health care services which in turn support the economic development of the people.

Social Security-May May clinic was opened as a pilot project to provide health care service to health insured workers working in Nay Pyi Taw said the Union Minister.

Next Nay Pyi Taw Council Chairman Dr. Myo Aung said Nay Pyi Taw Council had 824 works sites with 28,050 workers who had social security health insurance and health care service was provided through 3 Social Security Board clinics. In order to provide better health care service, Social Security Board had signed an agreement with May May Hospital to provide outpatient health care service and this move was warmly welcomed said the Nay Pyi Taw Council Chairman.

Afterwards Dr. Kyaw Khaing from May May Hospital explained about the reason for

opening the clinic and words of thanks were given by U Than Htut on behalf of employers and Daw Win Thida on behalf of the employees. This was followed by presenting of commemorative gifts to Union Minister, Nay Pyi Taw Council Chairman and Social Security Board Director General and taking of commemorative group photo.

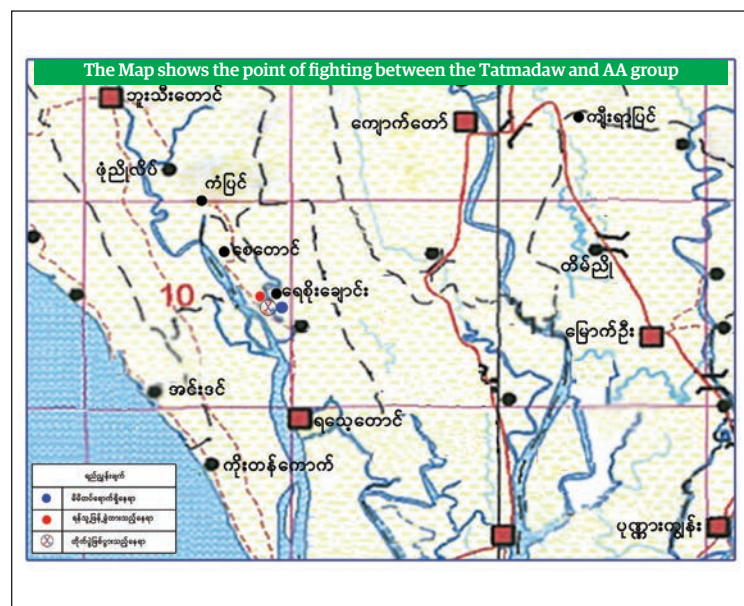
The second part of the opening ceremony of Social Security-May May clinic in Thabayayon Ward was then held at May May Hospital where the Union Minister, Nay Pyi Taw Council Chairman, Pyithu Hlutaw representative, person in

charge of May May Hospital, representatives of employers and employees cut the ceremonial ribbon to open the clinic and inspected the clinic.

In order to provide wide ranging and effective health care services for entitled workers Social Security Board was signing agreement with private hospitals, clinics and health care service companies to provide outpatient health care service under Provider Purchaser Split, Capitation payment system, per visit payment and fee for service under a pilot practice it is learnt.

AA group attacks Tatmadaw columns in Yathedaung, Maungtau



TATMADAW columns conducting security operations near Yaysoe Chaung Village in Yathedaung Township, and Kyiyapyin Village in Kyauktaw Township were attacked by AA group with small and heavy arms on 25 and 26 March.

The fighting caused some casualties among the security forces and the troops also found some bodies of AA personnel, and seized 3 arms and related materials.

On the morning of 25 March a Tatmadaw column reaches the eastern bank of Nga San Baw creek southwest of Yaysoe

Chaung Village where about 10 AA personnel positioned inside the mangrove forest on the opposite bank opened fire. After ten minutes of clash, the AA group withdrawn toward the west and the Tatmadaw column continued the security operation.

Yesterday morning a Tatmadaw column conducting road security work near Kyiyapyin Village Kyauktaw Township came under attack twice by about 150 AA personnel with small and heavy arms. The attacks resulted in some casualties among Tatmadaw person-

nel and some remains of AA personnel, 3 assorted arms and related materials were captured by the Tatmadaw.

The Tatmadaw column was continuing security operations in the nearby area. AA group was attacking towns, wards, villages and mining roads and were also attacking the Tatmadaw columns containing them. Tatmadaw columns were increasing the road security and region stability works, according to news released by Tatmadaw Commander-in-Chief Office. — MNA ■

A DISCUSSION on draft National Strategic Plan for Youth Policy was held at Mingala Thiri Hotel, Nay Pyi Taw yesterday morning.

At the event Union Minister for Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement Dr. Win Myat Aye said the ministry was striving toward developing fully qualified human resources, individual existence and development from birth to old-age for all. Work processes were implemented to obtain these full rights of individual existence and development. - In order to prevent and eradicate the dangers of narcotic drugs and psychotropic drugs, the Office of the President has formed the **Drug Activity Special Complaint Department** on 26 June 2018 to systematically accept and respond to reports on drug abuses and other related cases from the general public.

Yazagyo dam drying up as supply from Nerinjara River falls

THE Yazagyo Dam in Kalay, Sagaing Region, is drying up as the volume of water fed into it by the Nerinjara River has decreased this summer.

The volume of water fed into the dam by the river has decreased from over 60,000 cubic feet per second in the rainy season to 70 cubic feet this summer.

“The Nerinjara River is not feeding as much water into the dam as it did in the past. The river originates in Chin Hill. But, it is not feeding the dam as much water as it should due to deforestation,” said Ko Win from the Nature Lovers Organization, Kalay.

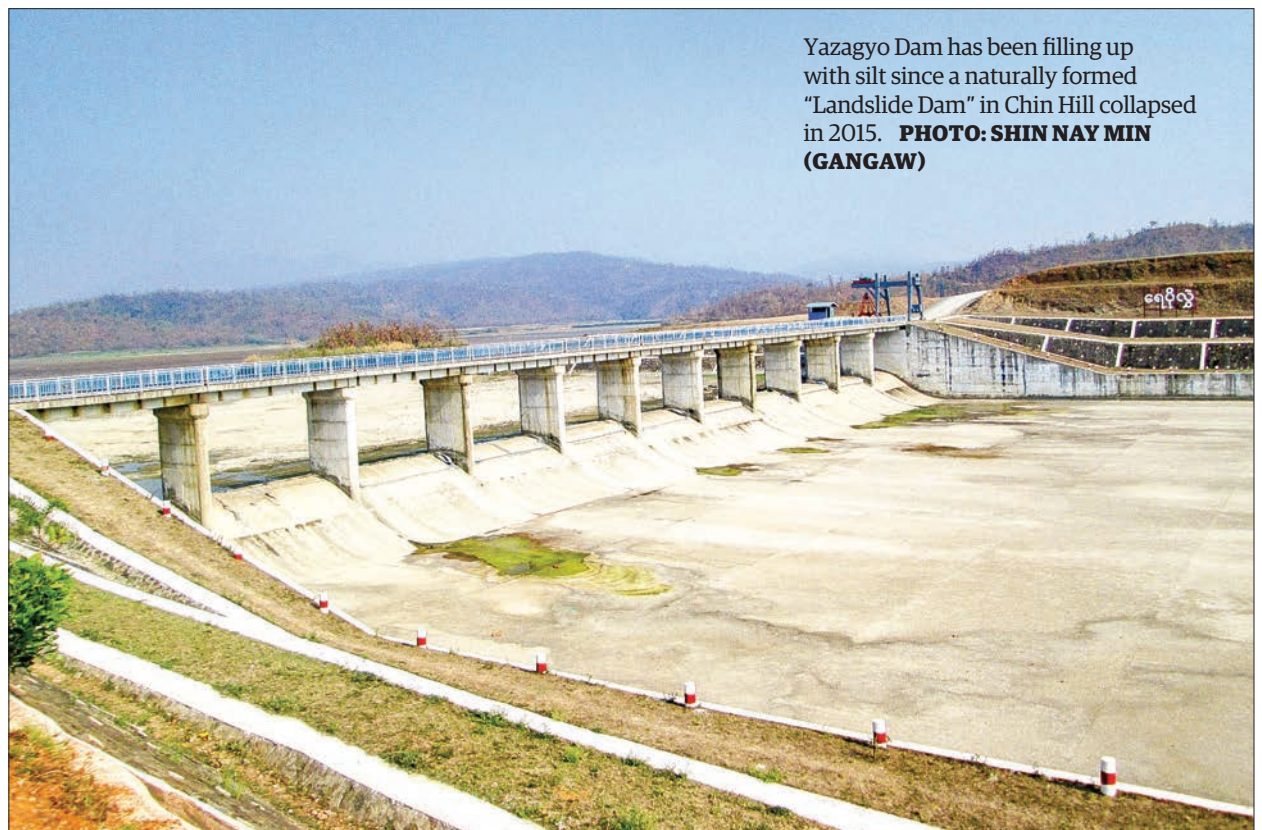
“The two turbines at the dam can generate electricity in the rainy season,” said U Myo Tun, an engineer at the dam.

“Now, we are removing silt and wood blocking the watercourse towards the turbines,” he said.

The Yazagyo Dam has been filling up with silt and logs ever since a naturally formed landslide dam in Chin Hill collapsed in 2015.

To save the dam, officials are working with international experts to dredge the silt and remove the logs from the dam.—Shin Nay Min (Gangaw)

Hailing Anniversary of Myanmar Tatmadaw Day

Marcopolo's high impression of Myanmar Tatmadaw of Bagan Period

THE writer wishes to hail and honour Myanmar Tatmadaw Day by a series of articles on high impressions of foreign visitors to Myanmar in the successive periods of Myanmar history. The present article is on Marcopolo's high impression of Myanmar Tatmadaw of Bagan Period.

Marcopolo was an Italian adventurer-traveller hailed from Venice. With his father and uncle he travelled from Venice to China by sea and land. He was only a young lad. When they reached the Country of Chinese Emperor Kublai Khan of Mongolian dynasty at Beijing they were well received by His Imperial Majesty. Because of their bravery, fighting skill and loyalty, the Chinese Emperor gave them warm welcome and positions. Young Marcopolo was adopted by the Emperor who sent him on many important missions. In 1277 when he waged war on Bagan in the reign of King Narathihapate [1255- 87 A.D] Marcopolo accompanied Tartar equestrian armies and Maha Yanan Buddhist monks. At that battle which took place at Ngasaung Gyan near Bhamo, young Marcopolo eye-witnessed Myanmar Tatmadaw and undaunted morale and spirit. After the demise of his fostered Emperor Kublai Khan, he and his father and uncle returned home with many rich awards bestowed upon them by the Great Khan.

Young Marcopolo was imprisoned as a result of his involvement in local wars between the then city states. In the prison at Genoa, he dictated the account of his life and adventures while serving the Great Khan to an inmate in the prison. Later that account was translated into many languages. "The adventures of Marcopolo" became a literary and historical masterpiece of world renown. The present articles is the summary of Marcopolo's high esteem of Myanmar Tatmadaw of Bagan Period.

"The Battle of Ngasaung Gyan"

It happened that in the year 1277 the Great Khan sent an army into the countries of Vochang [Yun-Chang] and Karazan,

for their protection and defense against any attack that foreigners might attempt to make. When the King of Mien who was powerful in the number of his subjects, in extent of territory, and in wealth, heard that an army of Tartars had arrived at Vochang, he took the decision of advancing immediately to attack it in order that by its destruction the Great Khan should be prevented from "again attempting to station a force upon the borders of his dominions". "For this purpose, he assembled a very large army, including a multitude of elephants [an animal in which country abounds], upon whose backs were placed battlements or castles of wood, capable of containing twelve or sixteen

thousands, besides the elephants armed as has been described. He did not however betray any sign of apprehension, but descending into the plain of Vochang, took a position in which his flank was covered by thick wood of large trees. With, in case of a furious charge by the elephants, his troops could retire. From there, in security, they could annoy the enemy with their arrows".

"Upon the King of Mien's learning that the Tartars had descended into the plain he immediately put his army in motions took up his ground at the distance of about a mile from the enemy and made a disposition of his force, placing the elephants in the front, and the cavalry, and infantry in their rear, but leaving between

them a considerable intervals. "Then giving orders for sounding a prodigy us" he advanced boldly with "his army towards that of the Tartars which remained firm, making no movement but suffering them to approach to the entrenchments. They then rushed out with great spirit and utmost eagerness to engage the enemy but it was soon found that the Tartars' houres, unused to the sight of such huge animals, with their castles, were terrified and wheeling about, endeavored to fly nor could their riders restrain them, whilst the King of Mien, with the whole of his forces was every moment gaining ground.

"As soon as the prudent commander perceived this unexpected disorder, he instantly ordered his men to dismount and their horses to be taken into the woods where they were fastened to the trees. When dismounted, the men without loss of time, advanced on following the line of elephants and commenced a discharge of arrows whilst, on the other side,

But their arrows did not have the same effect as those of the Tartars whose bows were drawn by stronger arms". "So continuous were the discharges of the latter all their weapons being directed

against the elephants, that these were no longer governable but without, guidance or control, ran about in all directions, until at length, they rushed into a part of the wood not occupied by the Tartars".

From the closeness of the branches of large trees they broke with loud crasher, the battlements of castles that were upon their backs causing the destruction of those who sat upon them. Upon seeing the rout of the elephants the Tartars acquired fresh courage and with perfect order and regularity, they mounted their horses, and joined their severed divisions. When bloody and dreadful combat was renewed". "On the part of the King of Mien's troops, there was no want of courage and he himself was amongst the ranks of his troops asking them to stand firm and not to be alarmed by the accident that had befallen the elephants but the Tartars by their great skill in archery were too powerful and did then much more injury from their not being provided with such arm our as was worn by the Tartars. The arrows, having been expounded on both sides, the men grasped their swords and maces and violently encountered one another. So great was the charges of arms and such shootings and shrieks that the noise seemed to reach the sky".

"The King of Mien, acting as became a valiant chief was present wherever the greatest danger appeared, encouraging his soldiers and be cheating them to maintain their ground with courage". "The losses in this battle which lasted from the morning till noon, were severely felt on both sides, but the Tartars were the flying victorious. In his eye witness account of the battle of Nga Saung Gyan, Marcopolo highly estimated the strength and the spirit of Myanmar Tatmadaw of Bagan and undaunted courage of the King of Mien against the in vacating hordes of greand Khan's equestrian Tartar archers".

Marcopolo remarked that Myanmar elephants, horses and foot soldiers were armoured, they would have withstood the arrows of the Tartars and would have reaped the victory at Nga Saung Gyan.

Third Kadu ethnic cultural festival held in Bamauk Township

THE third Kadu ethnic festival kicked off at 9 a.m. on 25 March at Settaw Village, Bamauk Township, Sagaing Region.

The festival aims to promote Kadu culture, language, customs, and unity, and showcase their cultural heritage to rekindle the Kadu people's interest in their own culture, said Sayadaw U Kiddisara.

The Kachin, Kanan, Red Shan and Kadu ethnic people from the Bamauk, Pinlebu, Indaw, Mogaung, and Myitkyina townships are participating in the festival.

The first Kadu ethnic cultural festival was held in Pinlebu Township in 2017, and the second festival was organized in Indaw township. The three-day festival is held from 25 to 27 March every year.

"The Kadu people have lived with poor levels of education for centuries. But now, the socio-economic conditions of the Kadu people is improving. We need more assistance to promote education, health, and deal with other regional concerns. We hope that the government will focus on our regional development, and can give the necessary attention and care to our concerns," said Ma Sandar Win, a Kudu

woman from Khopyin Village, Bamauk Township.

"By celebrating this festival, the Kadu people can maintain their culture and cultivate a strong belief in their ethic. And, the festival will encourage our Kadu people to preserve our cultural heritage. The main concern is that we don't have our own literature, so we are working on it now. The beliefs, customs, and arts of the society play a main role for ethnic people," said Ma Sandar Win.

"In 2020, a census will be undertaken. People from Indaw Township have more difficulty than others in obtaining national registration cards. We hope all our Kadu people will participate in the activity," said the Sayadaw, who is a member of the Kadu Ethnic Festival Implementation Committee.

Most Kadu nationals follow Buddhism. There are 98 Kadu villages in Myanmar, of which

38 are in Bamauk, 16 in Pinlebu, 34 in Indaw, 5 in Katha, and 5 in Mogaung. The population of Kadu people in Myanmar is estimated to be 1,80,000, according to the Kadu people.

The Kadu people mostly depend on farming for a living, and they are also involved in salt production on a manageable scale, and gold and lacquerware business in Pinlebu and Bamauk. — Maung Chit Linn

World Health Ambassador mission provides free treatment at Myeik hospital

A team from World Health Ambassador-USA provided free treatment to patients with cardiac, gynecology, skin, teeth, and oral problems and those requiring general surgery between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. from 25 to 26 March at the Myeik General Hospital, Taninthayi Region.

The team of specialists led by WHA founder, Dr. Thien Do, a cardiologist, provided free treatment to 355 of the 603 registered patients, including 131 cardiac patients, 82 patients with skin problems, 40 patients requiring surgery, and 82 requiring dental care on 25 March. The team included specialists and health staff from the Myeik General Hospital.

"Myanmar people have little knowledge when it comes to health. So, people should go for medical check-ups every year or every two years. This can minimize the health risk and cost," said Dr. Huy Phan, an obstetrician and gynecologist with WHA.

"This was WHA's second visit to Myanmar. In 2014, they provided free services in upper Myanmar, including Nay Pyi Taw and Mandalay. This time, they covered Mawlamyine, Dawei, and Myeik regions. They gave free services at the Dawei General Hospital, and conducted medical inspections in villages,"

said Daw Win Myat Thu, a member of WHA.

"This was WHA's first time in Myeik and Dawei. They often volunteer in Thailand, France, and Japan. They have also handed over patients to doctors with the Myeik General Hospital for further treatment," said Dr. Yu Yu Wai, the head of the Myeik General

Hospital. Patients who had registered for cardiac, gynecology, and skin problems and surgery received treatment on 25 and 26 March, and dental treatment was provided only on 25 March, according to the Myeik General Hospital. — Khine Htoo

ASSOCIATION of Natural Rubber Producing Countries (ANRPC) workshop was held yesterday in Dawei with the aim of developing the natural rubber industry. The workshop focused on supply-demand and modelling of natural rubber.

Ayeyawady Region endorses 5 investment projects; to create over 300 jobs

THE Ayeyawady Region Investment Committee has endorsed five projects with a capital of US\$1.27 million during a recent meeting. The projects are expected to create over 370 jobs for local residents.

The enterprises endorsed by the Investment Committee will develop a bus terminal; construct, develop, sell, and lease affordable resort housing; manufacture and market value-added rice; start a rice nursery and cultivation service using rice transplanters; and manufacture home textiles on a cut-make-pack basis.

The Ayeyawady Region Investment Committee has endorsed 28 businesses so far. The businesses are engaged in manufacturing of garments on a cut-make-pack basis; development, sale, and lease of shopping malls, residential buildings, cinemas and shophouses; production and distribution of rice husk pallet; operating a Green Land hotel and resort; cultivation and distribution of banana via contract farming; production and export of soft-shell crab; operating a transport service for sight-seeing; development

of housing projects; electricity generation from rice husk; and, manufacturing and export of coir pith blocks.

To ease the verification of investment projects, the region and state investment committees have been given the authority, under the Myanmar Investment Law, to grant permissions to local and foreign proposals, where the initial investment does not exceed K6 billion, or \$5 million. — GNLM

Myanmar primarily drawing investment from ASEAN, East Asian countries: MIC

MYANMAR is attracting foreign direct investment mainly from ASEAN and East Asian countries, said U Aung Naing Oo, Secretary of Myanmar Investment Commission.

“We are inviting investment from ASEAN’s external partner East Asian countries — Japan, South Korea, China, Hong Kong, and China (Taipei). Myanmar is targeting FDI from East Asian countries, including India,” said U Aung Naing Oo.

The manufacturing sector absorbs the largest share of investments in Myanmar, with FDI mostly flowing into cut-make-pack garment businesses, food processing businesses, electronic enterprises, and footwear businesses, according to the MIC.

“In addition, luggage manufacturing businesses are likely to

pull investment into the country. Those businesses can benefit from the Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) of the US,” said U Aung Naing Oo.

Singapore currently tops the list of countries investing in Myanmar, followed by China and then Thailand. Hong Kong is Myanmar’s fourth largest investor.

The MIC is holding investment forums in the regions and states to spur investments. Between 1 October, 2018 and 15 March, 2019 in the current fiscal year, 129 foreign enterprises with an estimated capital of over \$1.94 billion were permitted to invest in the country. In the corresponding period of the previous FY, only 80 investment projects were approved by Myanmar.

The MIC is targeting to attract \$5.8 billion in FDI in the 2018-2019 financial year.

Dollar trades in lower 110 yen in Tokyo amid higher stocks

TOKYO — The US dollar stalled mostly at just above the 110 yen line Tuesday in Tokyo, ahead of the release of key economic data in the United States, while Japanese stocks recovered from heavy losses the previous day.

At 5 pm, the dollar

fetched 110.19-20 yen compared with 109.92-110.02 yen in New York and 110.05-06 yen in Tokyo at 5 pm Monday. It moved between 109.98 yen and 110.24 yen during the day, changing hands most frequently at 110.09 yen. The euro was quoted at \$1.1312-1313 and 124.65-69

yen against \$1.1308-1318 and 124.38-48 yen in New York and \$1.1307-1309 and 124.44-48 yen in Tokyo late Monday afternoon.

The dollar was supported in early trading hours in Tokyo by the benchmark Nikkei stock average's rebound from its sharpest fall since late

December, as well as rises in US long-term interest rates.

But demand for the dollar was short-lived as fears for a global economic slowdown persisted amid uncertainty over US-China trade negotiations and Britain's planned departure from the European

Union, dealers said.

Takuya Kanda, senior researcher at the Gaitame.com Research Institute, said expectations that the US Federal Reserve may cut interest rates later this year are putting downward pressure on the dollar.

"Solid economic data

is seen to be the only factor that may stop US long-term interest rates from falling further, so the center of attention for a near-term trading cue is now on US consumer confidence and housing-related data to be released later in the day," Kanda said.—Kyodo News ■

European Parliament approves controversial EU copyright reform

STRASBOURG — The European Parliament on Tuesday approved a controversial EU copyright overhaul that hands more power to news publishers and record companies against internet giants like Google and Facebook.

Despite an intense debate in parliament and furious lobbying ahead of the vote, MEPs meeting in Strasbourg ended

up passing the draft law with 348 votes in favour, 274 against, and 36 abstentions.

European lawmakers were sharply divided on the copyright issue, with both sides subjected to some of the most intense lobbying the EU has ever seen from tech giants, media firms, content creators and online freedom activists.—AFP ■

2018 spike in energy demand spells climate trouble: IEA

PARIS — A 2.3 per cent jump in global energy demand last year outstripped the expansion of renewables and helped drive record-high greenhouse gas emissions, the International Energy Agency (IEA) said Tuesday.

Fossil fuels satisfied nearly 70 percent of that growth for the second year running, with natural gas accounting for 45 per cent of the rise in energy con-

sumption, according to the Agency's Global Energy & CO₂ Status Report.

Double-digit growth in solar and wind power generation — 31 per cent for solar — was still not fast enough to meet soaring electricity demand that also pushed up the use of coal, the most carbon-intensive of fuels. "We have seen an extraordinary increase in global energy demand in 2018, growing

at its fastest pace this decade," said IEA Executive Director Fatih Birol. "But despite major growth in renewables, global emissions are still rising, demonstrating once again that more urgent action is needed on all fronts" to tackle climate change, he added. Energy-related global CO₂ emissions rose 1.7 per cent to a record 33 billion tonnes last year compared to 2017, which likewise saw unprec-

edented levels of carbon pollution. CO₂ emissions in 2018 from coal used to generate power surpassed 10 billion tonnes for the first time, Birol said. That energy mostly came from coal-fired plants a dozen years old on average — not even a quarter of their typical lifespan. This raises the question of whether their continued use — much less the construction of new ones — is compatible with

the 2015 Paris climate treaty, which calls for capping global warming at "well below" two degrees Celsius (3.6 degrees Fahrenheit), and at 1.5° C if possible.

'Fuel' of the future

"Whilst not impossible, if we do not address the emissions of coal power plants in Asia, to comply with our climate goals will be extremely challenging," Birol told AFP. The planet

is currently on track to heat up by about 4° C. Global coal consumption in 2018 rose only in Asia, especially China, India, Indonesia, Vietnam, the Philippines and Malaysia, the report found.

Another discouraging trend given efforts to tame global warming was a slowdown last year in energy efficiency gains to 1.3 per cent, only half the average improvement rate for the 2014-2017 period.—AFP ■

Evacuation order for Fukushima plant town to be lifted on 10 April

FUKUSHIMA — A mandatory evacuation order for residents of a Japanese town that hosts the crippled Fukushima Daiichi nuclear power plant will be lifted for the first time in eight years, though partially, on 10 April, government officials said Tuesday.

The town of Okuma, which had all of its roughly 10,000 residents evacuate after the deadly 2011 earthquake and tsunami that triggered one of the world's worst nuclear disasters, agreed to the date proposed by the government. "We have determined the radiation level in the environment has fallen

sufficiently as a result of decontamination work," said Yoshihiko Isozaki, the head of the government's nuclear emergency response headquarters.

"We took into account the town's wish to lift the

order as soon as possible," Isozaki said at a press conference following a meeting with Okuma Mayor Toshitsuna Watanabe at a temporary town office in Aizuwakamatsu, Fukushima Prefecture.—Kyodo News

First launched in 1991 by Mahathir during his first term, the biennial program has grown into a major arms and technology showcase, drawing hundreds of companies from dozens of countries.

The highlights for this year are two aerobatic teams from Indonesia and Russia and they will showcase their skill at aerial maneuvers as part of the event, a staple part of the event.

Additionally, some 50 fighter jets and other aircraft from the participating countries will perform aerial displays at the Langkawi International Airport.

Also present are 43 warships and maritime assets including 16 vessels from several participating nations.

Major defense companies present this year include Rafale International of France and Boeing from the United States. — Xinhua ■

World first technology could lead to more efficient satellite launches: expert

SYDNEY — The world-first technology set to be developed in Australia could lead to more efficient satellite launches, a combustion engine expert from the University of Sydney's School of Aerospace, Mechanical and Mechatronic Engineering said on Monday.

Part of a global industry research project led by Australian defense technology company DefendTex, the project includes researchers from Germany's Bundeswehr University in Munich, the University of South Australia, RMIT, the Defence Science and Technology Group and Innosync

Pty. "Since the project kicked off we have worked with our collaborators to develop new computational methods to investigate supersonic combustion, which is a process known as detonation," Associate Professor at the University of Sydney Matthew Cleary explained.

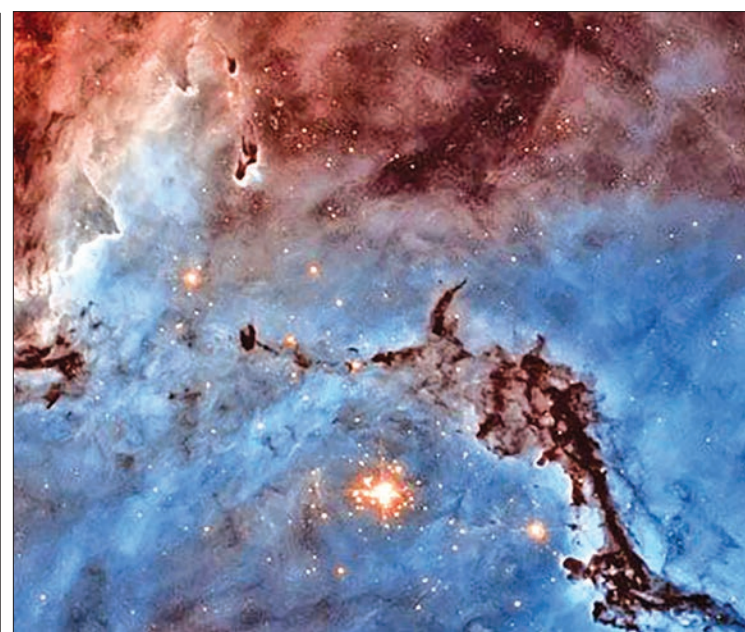
"Our preliminary findings from simulations of a model rotating detonation engine have led to some interesting findings about the stability of detonations in an annular channel, in particular with regard to the importance of designing the combustor geom-

etry such that the detonation is stable and rocket thrust can be sustained continuously.

"This information is being fed to our collaborators who are now starting work on ground testing an engine."

Different from conventional rockets which carry both oxygen and fuel onboard, a detonation engine is able to "collect" oxygen during its take-off and ascent.

"What's exciting about rotating detonation engines is the potential to operate them in a so-called 'air breathing' mode," Cleary said. — Xinhua ■

Hubble Space Telescope captures formation of giant storm on Neptune

WASHINGTON — The Hubble Space Telescope has for the first time captured how a giant storm on Neptune took shape, giving scientists insights to the inner workings of the poorly-understood ice giant planets.

The study published on Monday in the journal *Geophysical Research Letters* showed that one of Neptune's Great Dark Spots or giant storms originated much deeper in the planet's atmosphere than previously thought.

The American planetary scientists were analyzing Hubble images of a smaller dark spot that appeared in 2015 when they discovered small, bright white clouds in the region where the 2018 Great Dark Spot would later appear.

The high-altitude clouds are made up of methane ice crystals, showing bright white color. Scientists reckoned that the methane clouds accompanied the dark storms by hovering above them just like lenticular clouds capping tall mountains on Earth.

Computer models of Neptune's atmosphere showed that the deeper the storm, the brighter its companion clouds.

In another study published on Monday in the *Astronomical Journal*, the scientists said new storms would crop up on Nep-

tune every four to six years and each may last up to six years, but two-year lifespans are more likely.

"We have never directly measured winds within Neptune's dark vortices, but we estimate the wind speeds are in the ballpark of 100 meters per second, quite similar to wind speeds within Jupiter's Great Red Spot," said Michael Wong, a planetary scientist at the University of California, Berkeley.

They also found that the Neptunian winds slowly drifted across latitudes. That is unlike Great Red Spot on the Jupiter which kept almost still in latitude for at least 350 years.

The new findings have implications for studying exoplanets of similar size and composition.

"If you study the exoplanets and you want to understand how they work, you really need to understand our planets first," said Amy Simon, a planetary scientist at NASA's Goddard Space Flight Centre. A total of six storm systems have been spotted since scientists first set their sights on Neptune. NASA's spacecraft Voyager 2 identified two storms in 1989. Since Hubble launched in 1990, it has viewed four more of these storms. — Xinhua ■

India opposition urges delay to Modi biopic as election looms

NEW DELHI — India's main opposition Congress party has petitioned election officials to delay the release of a flattering new biopic about Prime Minister Narendra Modi until after upcoming elections.

Critics have said the film, due for release on April 5, is blatant propaganda and an attempt to woo voters before they start going to the polls six days later in India's almost six-week election.

Congress, which hopes to unseat Modi in the vote, said on Monday that putting out the movie, "PM Narendra Modi", would break election laws and that it should not hit cinemas until after voting ends on May 19.

"This is no artistic venture. It is a political venture and that is what we have told the Election Commission and should not be allowed," senior Congress figure and former minister Kapil Sibal told reporters.

The movie relates the Hindu right-wing leader's journey from his childhood days selling tea at a

railway station to becoming chief minister of his home state Gujarat and leading his Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) to a thumping victory against Congress in 2014 elections. Under Indian election rules now in effect, the publication of any content deemed as campaign material — including

advertisements, films and even social media — requires the election commission's prior approval.

Another election silence law bans all campaign material, even if approved by the commission, 48 hours from the opening of polls.

The commission said they have asked the makers of the

Modi film to respond to the Congress's claims.

Its Bollywood producers would have to show that the film is an artistic rather than a political work. The movie has been embroiled in another controversy within the Bollywood industry, with two top lyricists publicly

denying penning songs for the soundtrack after their names were mentioned in the film poster.

The makers released a two-minute trailer last week of the film saying it is "based on true story", with Bollywood actor Vivek Oberoi playing Modi through various stages of his life.

The trailer depicts Modi as a child selling tea and his transformation to a young stick-wielding member of Hindu supremacist organisation Rashtriya Swayam-sevak Sangh.

It also covers his days as a Hindu "sage" in the Himalayas, and later as a nationalistic politician issuing warnings to India's arch-rival Pakistan.

The trailer also shows Modi lamenting over the deadly riots that erupted in Gujarat when he was chief minister in 2002.

Critics and victims' families have accused Modi of doing little or nothing to stop days of rioting that left more than 1,000 people dead, a majority of them Muslims.— AFP ■

Japan deploys missile units on southwest islands amid China's rise

TOKYO — Japan deployed ground force units including missile squads Tuesday in two southwestern islands between the East China Sea and the western Pacific where Chinese naval vessels are actively sailing.

About 550 Ground Self-Defence Force members were stationed on Amami-Oshima Island in Kagoshima Prefecture, nearly 400 kilometers south of the southwestern main island of Kyushu. Some of them were assigned to the land-to-air and land-to-ship missile units, the Defense Ministry said.

The other was a 380-member security unit on Miyako Island in Okinawa Prefecture, around 300

km southwest of the main island of the prefecture. The number of its members will increase to 700 to 800 to introduce another missile unit in 2020 or later, the ministry said.

"Japan's defense front line is now the southwestern region, so we'll beef up our capability and deterrence in that area," Defense Minister Takeshi Iwaya told a press conference, adding that the new units can also "deal with disasters quickly."

The ministry is also preparing to deploy missile and security units with some 500 to 600 GSDF members on Okinawa's Ishigaki Island, about 100 km southwest of Miyako Island.

The moves come as Japan is aiming to fill what the ministry describes as a defense "vacuum" in the area. Previously, its forces were only stationed on Okinawa's main land and the country's westernmost island of Yonaguni, where a 160-member GSDF garrison was set up in 2016.

Miyako, Ishigaki and Yonaguni islands are near the Tokyo-controlled Senkaku Islands in the East China Sea, which Beijing claims, calling them Diaoyu. Chinese ships have repeatedly entered Japanese waters around the islands, keeping tensions high. Also Tuesday, the GSDF increased the number of its Amphibious Rapid Deployment Brigade by 300 to about 2,400 in a bid to reinforce the ability to defend remote islands in southwestern Japan.

Dubbed the Japanese "Marines," the brigade was launched as the country's first full-fledged amphibious force in March last year, based in Kyushu's Nagasaki Prefecture. Under the latest Medium Term Defense Program that covers a five-year period from 1 April, Japan is planning on strengthening its defense system at the far-flung islands in the southwest.—Kyodo News ■

US envoy for North Korea visits Beijing

BEIJING — The US special envoy for North Korea is visiting Beijing to coordinate policies with China, officials said Tuesday, a month after the failure of a denuclearisation summit.

Stephen Biegun, Washington's North Korea envoy, is here to "continue US-China coordination on policies related to North Korea", a US embassy spokesman told AFP, declining to share more details.

Chinese foreign ministry spokesman Geng Shuang said at a regular briefing that Beijing "has always maintained close communication and coordination with the relevant parties on the general affairs of the Korean Peninsula."

Biegun's visit to the Chinese capital overlaps with the arrival of a high-ranking North Korean, who was greeted by Chinese government officials and Pyongyang's envoy to Beijing on Tuesday, reported South Korea's Yonhap news agency.

Yonhap, citing diplomatic sources, said the visiting official is believed to be Ri Su Yong, vice chairman of the North's ruling Workers' Party, who was making a stopover in Beijing en route to Laos. Geng said he had no infor-

mation about Ri's reported stopover. It was not clear whether the visits by the US and North Korean officials were related.

Biegun's trip comes after US President Donald Trump abruptly cut short the February 27-28 summit in Vietnam with North Korean leader Kim Jong Un amid fundamental differences between the two sides over dismantling Pyongyang's nuclear weapons programme.

The summit, the leaders' second in under a year, broke up without even a joint statement, and each sought to blame the other's intransigence for the deadlock. Both sides pledged to continue talking, but no new meetings have been scheduled.

In mid-March, Biegun said Washington's goal was the complete denuclearisation of North Korea by the end of Trump's first term, and that it would not settle for incremental disarmament.

"We will not lift these sanctions until NK (North Korea) completes the process of denuclearisation," he said. But on Friday Trump abruptly announced the cancellation of new sanctions on North Korea imposed by the US treasury.—AFP ■

Premier League managers can exploit VAR: analyst

LONDON — Canny Premier League managers should be seeking to “manipulate” VAR technology to their advantage when it is introduced next season, according to analyst Rory Campbell.

VAR (the video assistant referee system) was largely deemed a success at last year’s World Cup in Russia and is being used in many domestic leagues including Spain, Italy and Germany.

But England-based players have had a slow introduction to

VAR, which has been used in the Champions League knockout phase and some FA Cup games this season but will be rolled out in the Premier League in the 2019/20 season. Campbell, who has worked with West Ham in the area of technical analysis, said managers should take the time to find out how the technology will impact the game and how they can stay on top of changes.

“If I were a manager I would be putting in huge resources as to how we are actually going to

manipulate VAR -- how we can understand how to use it to our benefit,” Campbell said at last week’s Betting on Football conference in London.

Campbell, owner of consultancy firm C&N Sporting Risk, said managers could learn a lot if they get to sit down with referees before the new season starts.

“The clubs presumably will be at the briefing for referees,” said Campbell. “That would be the most important meeting for every EPL (English Premier League) manager to understand — how each individual referee might handle VAR or be told how to handle it. “VAR is bigger than anything they are doing at the moment.

“There is so much they can do to give themselves an edge over their rivals and manipulate a game. It sounds a bad word but there is a rule set and enough flexibility within them to exploit it.” Warren Llambias, managing director of RedZone.bet, a bookmaker specialising in American sports such as NFL, baseball and basketball, agrees with Campbell.

However, he concedes even after two decades of video assistance in the NFL, howlers can be made and says it can take teams four weeks at the start of a new season to get used to the tweaking of the system.—AFP ■

Mick Schumacher to test Ferrari F1 car in Bahrain

PARIS—Mick Schumacher, son of seven-time world champion Michael, will make his Formula 1 test debut with Ferrari in Bahrain on April 2, the Italian team announced on Tuesday.

Schumacher will then take the wheel of Alfa Romeo’s vehicle the next day.

“I am really looking forward to what I’m sure will be a great experience,” said Schumacher.

The 20-year-old will also make his Formula Two debut this weekend in Bahrain after being crowned Formula Three champion last year with Prema, an Italian team allied with the Ferrari Drivers Academy with whom he joined in January.

“I am consciously putting all thoughts of the test to one side, because I am also very much looking forward to competing in my first F2 race,” he added.

Michael Schumacher has not been seen in public since suffering head injuries during an accident on 29 December, 2013 while skiing with Mick and his condition is a secret closely guarded by his family. The 50-year-old left a huge legacy at Ferrari, winning five of his seven F1 world championships the Italian team.

His son was selected for testing alongside Briton Callum Iott, who will also test for Alfa Romeo in Spain on 14-15 May.

“Mick and Callum are driv-

ers on the way up,” Ferrari team boss Mattia Binotto said.

“I believe that driving in an official setting such as the tests in Bahrain and Barcelona can be very useful at this stage of their careers.”—AFP ■

Sterling calls for stadium ban as racist abuse overshadows five-star England

LONDON — Raheem Sterling believes UEFA should punish alleged racist chanting aimed at England players in Monday’s 5-1 win over Montenegro in Podgorica with a stadium closure.

Manchester City’s Sterling celebrated the visitors’ fifth goal by cupping his ears towards the home fans on a night when another impressive performance to start Euro 2020 qualifying by the Three Lions was overshadowed.

“I just want to show them you need more than that to upset us and stop us,” Sterling told Sky Sports.

“It’s 2019 now, I keep saying it. It’s a shame to see this going on and we can only bring awareness to the situation.

“It’s now time for the people in charge to put a real stamp on it because you can fine someone, but what is that going to do?”

“You’ve got to make it a bit harder, punish fans that can’t come to games. Do something that’s going to make them think twice. If their team can’t play with fans, it’s going to be difficult.”

Sterling also tweeted a photo of his celebration with the message: “Best way to silence the haters (and yeah I mean racists).”

England manager Gareth Southgate said he heard racist chants aimed at Danny Rose and promised to report the issue to UEFA.

“There is no doubt in my mind it happened. We will make sure that is reported to UEFA because it’s not acceptable,” said Southgate. “We’ve got to make sure we support our players.”

England among Euro favourites

On the field, the World Cup semi-finalists showed why they are among the favourites to be European champions next year.

Southgate’s trust in youth was again rewarded as 18-year-old Callum Hudson-Odoi, who is yet to start a Premier League game for Chelsea, shone on his full international debut, while Declan Rice, 20, was also handed his first England start.

“Fabulous performance,” said Southgate on Hudson-Odoi. “With young players it is always up to them. You can see the talent, his application has been excellent. He’s got to continue that.”

England are not used to falling behind these days, but showed a resilience to bounce back after Marko Vesovic turned inside Michael Keane and curled past Jordan Pickford on 17 minutes.

Keane made amends for his earlier error with a commanding header from Ross Barkley’s free-kick on the half hour mark to settle England’s nerves.

Nine minutes later, Barkley applied the finishing touch after Hudson-Odoi’s positive run into the box and shot which his club teammate turned in from close range.

Further goals from Barkley, Harry Kane and Sterling rounded off an excellent start to qualifying for England after a 5-0 thrashing of Czech Republic on Friday. Sterling scored a hat-trick against the Czechs at Wembley, but also played provider here as his cut-back broke perfectly for Barkley to coolly side-foot home. —AFP ■
