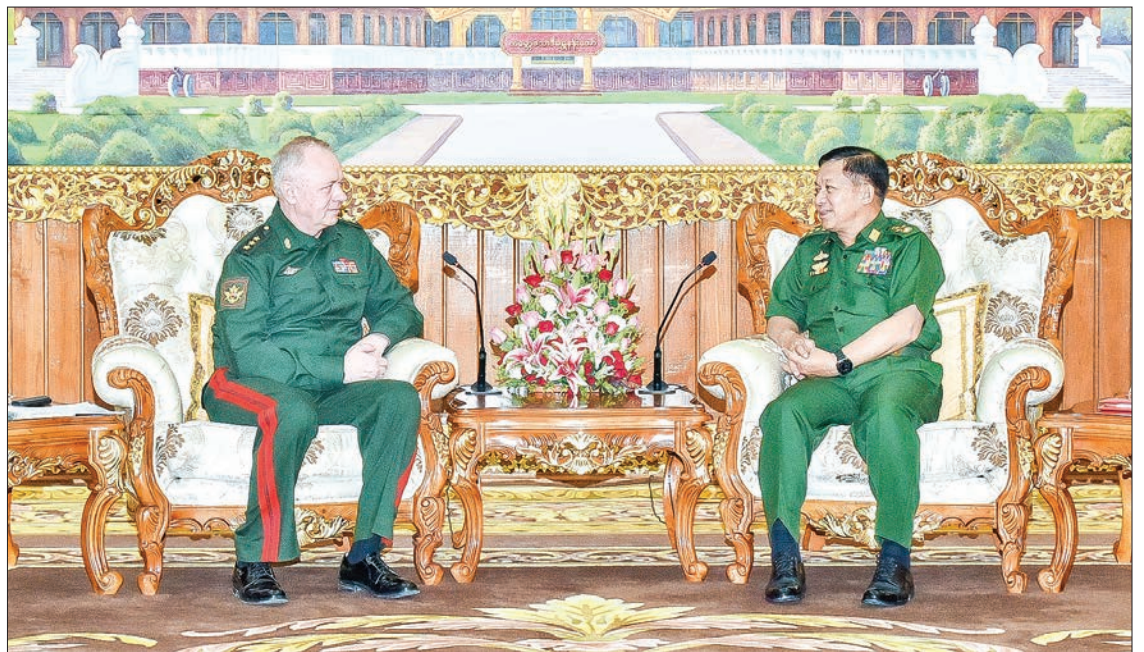
## Senior General Min Aung Hlaing receives Russian Deputy Defence Minister

## Farmers compensated for rice fields destroyed by floods in Paung

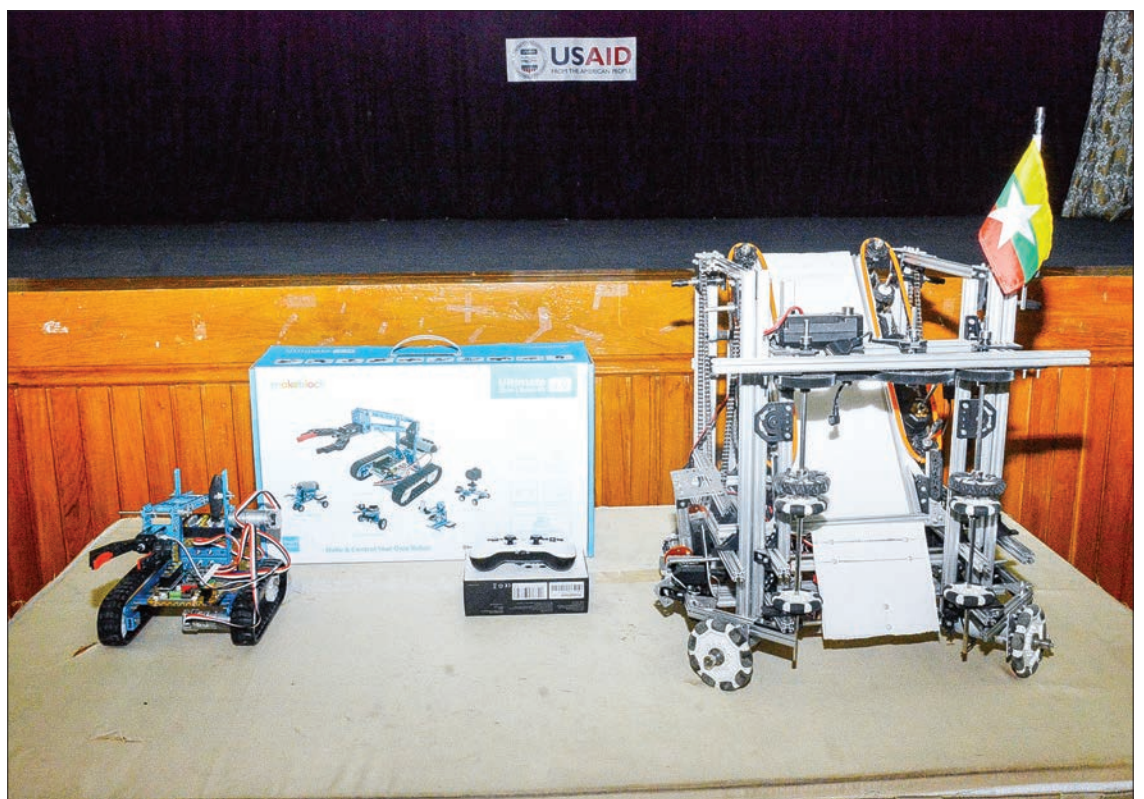

## Myanmar Robo League 2019 invites talented university students

THE organizer of the Myanmar's first-ever robotic competition titled "Myanmar Robo League 2019" is inviting talented students from technological universities and computer studies universities across the country, said an organizer at a news conference yesterday.

Supporting by the Rectors Committee, the competition will be organized by a tech start-up entity namely Makerspace, and the Robo League 2019 will be held at the Arts Hall of University of Yangon in June.

The competition is aimed to promote technology plus mathematics skills and engineering expertise of university students and invited them to participate

in the competition in Yangon. The outstanding students will enable their way to compete in the First Global Robotics Challenge in Dubai, United Arab Emirates, said Makerspace's Manager Ko Htoo Wai Htet.

Altogether five students plus one trainer from each university will be allowed for the competition. Age limit for contestants who will take up in the competition is under 19 year old for students and age limit for the trainer is over 19 year old.

Interested students and trainers can submit their applications on the website link [www.bit.ly/mmroboleague](http://www.bit.ly/mmroboleague). The submitters need to fill their facts along with student identification

cards and their photos by 12 April.

After their submission, they must take screening test within the period of 90 minutes for their qualifying into the competition.

The selected students from different universities will be announced on the Facebook page of the Myanmar Makerspace.

### Upgrading circular railway service to ease traffic

The project was considered to ease people's travel by railway, reducing running time, increases the numbers of travellers using circular train and to reduce traffic congestion in Yangon. — MNA ■

**Offshore fixed pilot station opened, can handle over 600 ships**

The offshore fixed pilot station, located 20 nautical miles from Yangon, has been installed at an estimated cost of US\$ 20.9 million.

AN offshore fixed pilot station, located 20 nautical miles from Yangon, was opened yesterday.

The opening and handing over ceremony was held at the Sule Shangri-La Hotel in Yangon on 30 March. The ceremony was attended by the Union Minister for Transport and Communications and deputy ministers, the Chinese Ambassador to Myanmar, Yangon Regional government ministers, officials from related departments, the general manager and staff of the Myanmar Port Authority, and the vice chairman and officials from

the China Harbour Engineering Co. Ltd.

U Thant Sin Maung, the Union Minister for Transport and Communications, delivered the opening speech. He said, among other things, that the newly constructed offshore fixed pilot station is included in the national level buildings, which can contribute to the nation's development. Additionally, he said he is proud of the country's construction of the offshore fixed pilot station, which meets international standards.

Chinese Ambassador to

Myanmar Hong Liang, and Myanma Port Authority Managing Director Ni Aung, along with China Harbour Engineering Co. Ltd vice-chairman Pan Qingjian, also made speeches.

"The successful opening of the offshore fixed pilot station will enable 18 to 40 pilots to be assigned day and night, instead of 11 pilots on boats. At the same time, the station can handle the incoming and outgoing traffic of over 600 boats per month," said Captain U Nyunt Win.

The offshore fixed pilot station was built to enable pilots

to steer international and local vessels. Previously, MPA kept one pilot vessels stationed in the sea to serve as pilot stations.

The offshore fixed pilot station was begun in 2017 and completed in February, 2019. The offshore station includes a three-storey building, a jetty to moor a GRT 1500- sized ship, a generator, water treatment system, navigation equipment, radar and three pilot boats. The estimated cost of the project is US\$ 20.9 million.—Myint Maung Soe

A man was arrested and charged with killing a male hornbill in Ngaphe, Mangway Region on 28 March.

U Win Maung, 37, a truck driver, killed the male hornbill while it slept in a tree outside the Forest Department in Ngape, Magway. Officials said he killed the bird by firing a slingshot.

An official of the Forest Department opened a file against U Win Maung at the Padan area

police station for killing the endangered species.

The killing of the male hornbill happened some five months after local forest officials and members of the public took action to release nine hornbills in the Goatgyi Forest Reserve in the township.

The hornbills had been seized from smugglers.—Zeyatu (Magway)

ILLEGAL timber was seized on Wednesday by authorities in Daik U Township, Bago region.

A team made up of local police and the Forest Department searched a vehicle on Daik U – Oak Chit Kone road, Bago region. That vehicle was en route to Daik-U and driven by Daw Khin Mar Win, 50, from Phado

Town, along with passenger Ma Chaw Su, 29, from Nyaunglebin.

# Some urge government intervention to fix ceiling prices for commodities

GOVERNMENT intervention is needed to fix ceiling prices for certain agricultural products because they are sold at exorbitant prices, regardless of whether agricultural production costs are high or not, according to consumers.

However, traders and merchants are opposed to this, saying that this is a time when a market economy is being pursued, and it is the market that adjusts prices, depending upon the principle of supply and demand. They argue that according to economists, the market automatically adjusts prices and government intervention is not needed.

Nevertheless, when there arises market failures, it is usual that governments intervene, argue those who advocate for the protection of consumers. What is happening now is that some staple foods are being sold at exorbitant prices, irrespective of production costs. The worst scenario can be seen in the rice and onion markets.

On the other hand, farmers and growers are also making demands on authorities to fix a

floor price at which traders must buy their produce. In this regard, the Myanmar Rice Federation (MRF) has responded to this demand by issuing an announcement that the floor price of paddy is to be fixed at K 500,000 per 100 baskets (one basket weighs 46 lb) for the 2019 paddy harvesting period. This is the first time the MRF has intervened to protect farmers. As a consequence, the prices of rice and the broken rice declined in the local market in 2019.

It is true that the MRF will also fix the floor price for 2019. However, it could not fix the floor price for rice until 28 March, 2019. Therefore, rice-related NGOs have urged rice merchants to purchase rice at the 2018 floor price.

Meanwhile, onion merchants have requested authorities to fix the floor price of onions, because the price onion traders pay is now at a record low of K 350 per viss in the region. When new onions enter the market, the price of onions decline in Yangon and border areas. Some 120,000 viss of onion are arriving at Yangon markets every day. As

there is an abundant supply, the price of onions is some K 350 per viss. March 25 witnessed 390,000 viss of onions entering Yangon market, while 1 million viss per week are arriving via the Muse border gates.

Some merchants are purchasing onions at a record low price during the onion growing season. Then, they store the onions to sell at record high prices in the market. Therefore, the MRF has

been requested to fix the floor price for onions to protect growers against losses, as well as to not allow selling the products at exorbitant prices.—Maung Say Aung

## Border trade between Myanmar, Bangladesh decline

BORDER trade value between Myanmar and Bangladesh, as of 15 March, reached US\$ 16.12 million, which showed a decrease of \$ 1.9 million, compared with the same period last year, according to statistics provided by the Ministry of Commerce.

Border trade between the two countries is conducted through the Sittway and Maung-taw cross-border camps. From 1st October to 15th March, trade through the Maungtaw gate

reached \$ 13.12 million, while trade from the Sittway border point was valued \$ 4 million. Commodities are delivered principally through by sea. During normal times, 90 per cent of border trade is made by the Myanmar side, which exports fisheries products including dried fish as well as other goods to the South Asian nations, which exports kitchen wares and clothing items to Myanmar. Marketable items at the Myanmar-Bangladesh

cross-borders cover bamboos, ginger, peanuts, saltwater prawns and fish, dried plums, garlic, rice, mung beans, blankets, candy, plum jams, footwear, frozen foods, chemicals, leather, jute products, tobacco, plastics, wood, knitwear, beverages and human hair. The total border trade of Myanmar with her four neighboring countries reached \$ 4.46 billion in the 2018-2019 fiscal year.—Zwe

# Global stocks rally on trade deal optimism as pound falls again

NEW YORK (United States) — Global stocks rallied Friday on optimism over US-China trade talks, while the pound fell further as Britain veered closer to a potential “no deal” Brexit. Bourses rose in the US and in major European and Asian centers, concluding the first quarter with a flourish.

Friday’s session was bolstered by upbeat comments from Trump administration officials following the latest round of trade negotiations in Beijing. US and Chinese negotiators are working to find a binding agreement to address President Donald Trump’s complaints about years of unfair treatment of US companies by China, which would allow a rollback of the tariffs hitting businesses in both countries.

The White House reported “progress” in what it termed “candid and constructive discussions,” saying that the next round of talks will be held in the US capital on 3 April. Chinese state broadcaster CCTV said the latest round yielded “new progress,” without elaborating. The broad-based S&P 500 ended at 2,834.40, up 0.7 per cent for the

session and 13.1 per cent for the quarter, its best in almost a decade. The first-quarter rally has been fed by optimism over the US-China trade talks and by the Federal Reserve’s dovish shift on monetary policy. In a closely-watched premiere on public markets, ride-hailing company Lyft finished at \$78.29, up 8.7 per cent from its initial public offering

price after the IPO raised \$2.3 billion.

## ‘What happens next?’

Meanwhile, the pound slid further after British MPs rejected Prime Minister Theresa May’s EU divorce deal for a third time, opening the way for a long delay to Brexit -- or a chaotic “no deal” withdrawal in two weeks.

Lawmakers in parliament’s lower House of Commons defied May’s plea to end a political deadlock over Brexit, defeating her withdrawal agreement by 344 votes to 286. “We thought it was going to be a lot closer,” Joshua Mahony told AFP on the IG trading floor in London. “Everyone is now starting to wonder exactly what happens next.”—AFP ■

## White House wants Fed to cut rates: advisor

WASHINGTON (United States) —White House economic advisor Larry Kudlow on Friday urged the Federal Reserve to cut interest rates to protect the US economy. Kudlow told CNBC that it was necessary to reduce rates as a “protective measure,” after earlier being quoted by Axios as saying the Fed should “immediately” cut rates by half a percentage point. “We just don’t want that threat” of higher rates, the aide said, adding that this reflects President Donald Trump’s view.

“There is no inflation out there, so I think the Fed’s actions were probably overdone,” he said, referring to its decision to raise rates four times in 2018, with the last and most controversial increase coming in December. Trump also took aim at the Fed’s rate hikes on Friday.

“Had the Fed not mistakenly raised interest rates, especially since there is very little inflation, and had they not done the ridiculously timed quantitative tightening, the 3.0% GDP, & Stock Market, would have both been much higher & World Markets would be in a better place!” the president tweeted. Speaking about the slowdown in the global economy that could threaten US growth, Kudlow referred to the “eurozone, virtually in a recession. China, very, very very soft as we negotiate our trade. Troubles in Latin America.” “We don’t want to threaten this great recovery,” he said.

“We are, as everyone else in the world, aware of some of these external threats from around the world,” he said, adding that Trump also wants the Fed to stop cutting its Treasury bill portfolio.

The advocacy of a sharp rate cut echoes the position of Stephen Moore, a conservative economist whom Trump has tapped to join the Fed.

Most economists and institutions—with the exception of the White House—predict a slump in US growth both this year and in 2020. The Fed recently reduced its growth projection to 2.1 per cent for 2019 and 1.9 per cent for next year, but the Trump administration says the economy will grow by 3.2 per cent this year.

The Fed’s Monetary Committee left rates unchanged last week and gave up its plans for increases to the cost of credit for this year. —AFP ■

# Spain’s public deficit meets EU limit for first time in over a decade

MADRID (Spain)—Spain’s budget deficit fell below the European Union’s limit of 3.0 per cent of economic output last year for the first time in over a decade,

the government said Friday.

The deficit contracted to 2.63 per cent of gross domestic product in 2018 from 3.03 per cent in the previous year, Finance Min-

ister Maria Jesus Montero told a news conference.

This is the first time since 2007 when Spain posted a budget surplus equal to 1.92 per cent

of its economic output that the country has respected the EU’s budget limit. “The deficit has been reduced without putting at risk economic growth and without leaving anyone behind,” Montero said. “The Spanish economy maintains its strength and even picked up steam in the second half of 2018,” she added, saying this had boosted state coffers.

The eurozone’s fourth-largest economy expanded by 2.6 per cent last year, after growing 3.0 per cent in 2017, final figures released Friday by national statistics institute INE showed.

The figures give Montero’s minority Socialist government a potential boost ahead of a snap general election on 28 April.

Spain suffered a prolonged period of economic decline when a decade-long property bubble burst in 2008, throwing millions of people out of work and pushing the country to the brink of a bail out. —AFP ■

# Caracas and other major Venezuelan cities hit by new blackout

CARACAS (Venezuelan)—A new blackout hit Caracas and other major Venezuelan cities on Friday, the third major electricity outage in the crisis-plagued country this month.

The blackout began around 7:10 pm (2310 GMT), leaving the capital as well as cities including Maracaibo, Valencia, Maracay and San Cristobal without electricity, according to users on social media networks. It is the third time since 7 March that a major power outage has hit Venezuela—worsening the already-dire economic and living conditions in a country that is witnessing a major political showdown between President Nicolas Maduro and opposition chief Juan Guaido.

Maduro has blamed the previous outages on sabotage, but experts have said that infrastructure crumbling from years of neglect is a more likely culprit than outside interference.

Earlier on Friday, the Red Cross said it would begin impartially distributing aid in Venezuela in two weeks, brushing aside the threat of political interference amid the Maduro-Guaido power struggle.

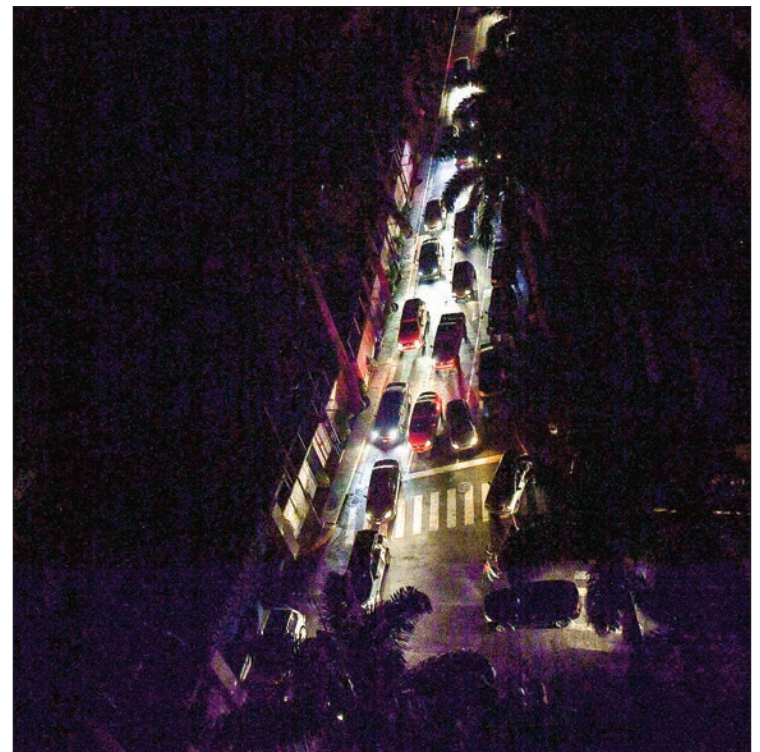
Malnutrition and disease are on the rise as living conditions plummet in the oil-producing Latin American nation, which is spiraling ever deeper into economic chaos during a protracted political crisis. “We estimate that in a period of approximately 15 days we will be ready to offer help,” said Francesco Rocca, head of the International Federation of the Red Cross and Red Crescent. The United States—which considers Guaido interim president along with some 50 other countries—welcomed the announcement as a “real opportunity.” Rocca told reporters in Caracas the organization would begin distributing aid mid-April,

including tons of mostly US food and medical supplies that Maduro has to date refused to allow into the country—leaving it stockpiled for weeks on the borders with Colombia and Brazil.

The Red Cross—aiming to reach 650,000 people initially—would act according to its principles of “impartiality, neutrality and independence,” he said, “without accepting interference from anyone.”

## ‘Victory over sanctions’

Meanwhile, in a boost to Maduro, a Chinese plane loaded with 65 tons of medical aid landed in Caracas on Friday. His government celebrated it as a victory over US sanctions, which the socialist leader blames for the economic crisis. Though unpopular, Maduro has the upper hand at home, thanks to loyalty from his military chiefs and, since last weekend, the presence

of 100 Russian troops. The Russian deployment to Venezuela has drawn fire from Washington, but Caracas’ defense minister said Friday that “no one should be alarmed” by their presence.

“We are overcoming the purported siege, the blockade, which has been undertaken by President Trump and the diabolical puppet from here in Venezuela,” said vice-president Tareck El

Aissami, referring to Guaido. El Aissami, on the tarmac to meet the Chinese plane, said the medical supplies were the “first cargo of several that start from this moment.” It includes analgesics, surgical equipment and medicine for diseases such as diabetes. China’s ambassador Li Baorong said the delivery was part of previous “cooperation agreements” with Venezuela.—AFP ■

## US seeks drawdown of UN peacekeeping force in Mali

UNITED NATIONS (United States)—Declaring that peace efforts in Mali had faltered, the United States on Friday called on the UN Security Council to consider a possible major drawdown of the peacekeeping mission in the West African country. The council is scheduled to decide in June whether to renew the mandate of the 14,000-strong force known as MINUSMA that was established in 2013 after the jihadist takeover of northern Mali was beaten back.

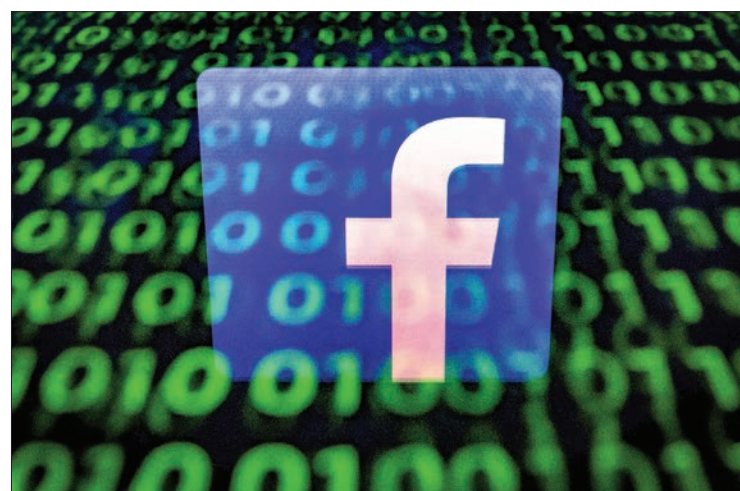
“Despite some progress in the last several months and after only modest progress in prior years, it’s time to evaluate whether a peacekeeping mission in such an environment is the appropriate or effective solution to the problem set in northern Mali,” said David Hale, the US under secretary of state for political affairs. The United States asked UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres to provide options for a “significant adaptation” of MINUSMA before negotiations begin on extending the mission in June.—AFP

# Facebook to tighten live stream access after mosque attacks

SAN FRANCISCO (United States)—Facebook on Friday said it is tightening live video streaming rules in response to the service being used to broadcast deadly attacks on mosques in New Zealand. The Christchurch attacks—carried out by a self-avowed white supremacist who opened fire on worshippers at two mosques—claimed 50 lives.

Many people have “rightly questioned how online platforms such as Facebook were used to circulate horrific videos of the attack,” chief operating officer Sheryl Sandberg said in an online post. “In the wake of the terrorist attack, we are taking three steps: strengthening the rules for using Facebook Live, taking further steps to address hate on our platforms, and supporting the New Zealand community,” she added. Facebook is looking into barring people who have previously violated the social network’s community standards from livestreaming on its platform, according to Sandberg.

The social network is also investing in improving software to

quickly identify edited versions of violent video or images to prevent them from being shared or re-posted. “While the original New Zealand attack video was shared Live, we know that this video spread mainly through people re-sharing it and re-editing it to make it harder for our systems to block it,” Sandberg said. “People with bad intentions will always try to get around our security measures.” Facebook identified more than 900 different videos showing portions of the streamed violence.

## Hateful nationalism

The social network is using artificial intelligence tools to identify and remove hate groups in Australia and New Zealand, according to Sandberg. Those groups will be banned from Facebook services, she said. Facebook this week announced it would ban praise or support for white nationalism and white separatism as part of a stepped-up crackdown on hate speech. The ban will be enforced starting next week on the leading online social

network and its image-centric messaging service Instagram.

“It’s clear that these concepts are deeply linked to organized hate groups and have no place on our services,” the social network said in a statement. Facebook policies already banned posts endorsing white supremacy as part of its prohibition against spewing hate at people based on characteristics such as race, ethnicity or religion. The ban had not applied to some postings because it was reasoned they were expressions of broader concepts of nationalism or political independence, according to the social network.

Facebook said that conversations with academics and “members of civil society” in recent months led it to view white nationalism and separatism as linked to organized hate groups. People who enter search terms associated with white supremacy will get results referring them to resources such as Life After Hate, which focus on helping people turn their backs on such groups, according to Facebook.—AFP ■

# Pope visits Morocco to boost dialogue, meet migrants

RABAT (Morocco)—Pope Francis arrives in Morocco on Saturday for a visit which will see him meet Muslim leaders and migrants ahead of a mass with the country's minority Catholic community. The spiritual leader of the world's 1.3 billion Catholics was invited by King Mohammed VI as part of the "development of interreligious dialogue", according to Moroccan authorities.

Improving relations with other religions has been a priority for the Argentine pontiff, whose papacy has been marred by a wave of child sex abuse allegations against clergy. The Moroccan capital Rabat has stepped up security ahead of his arrival.

Buildings have been repainted, streets decorated and lawns manicured ahead of the first papal visit to Morocco since John Paul II in 1985. Francis is due to be welcomed at the airport by the king and presented with dates and almond milk. Then the pontiff will step into his Popemobile and the monarch into a limousine.

They will drive to a welcome ceremony at a mosque and a mausoleum, attended by 25,000 and beamed onto giant screens, before the king hosts Francis at the royal palace. The monarch

is known as the "commander of the faithful" in Morocco, where 99 per cent of the population is Muslim. Francis will also visit an institute where around 1,300 students are studying to become imams and preachers, teaching "moderate Islam" and backed by the king. "It's a very significant event, the first time that a pope is welcomed to an institute for the training of imams," said Vatican spokesman Alessandro

Gisotti.

During the visit, Francis is due to hear from two students — one African and one European — as well as a statement by Morocco's Ministry of Islamic Affairs. A concert drawing inspiration from Islam, Christianity and Judaism is also on the agenda.

## Meeting migrants

Last month Francis visited the United Arab Emirates, where

he met with Sheikh Ahmed al-Tayeb, the imam of Cairo's Al-Azhar, Sunni Islam's prestigious seat of learning. The two signed a document on "human fraternity for world peace", which among other things called for "freedom of belief" and "full citizenship" rights for minorities.

Francis will not hesitate to refer to the text, which from now on he will give to all heads of state, Gisotti said. — AFP ■

## UN food agency launches appeal for Mozambique relief funds

PARIS (France)—The UN Food and Agricultural Organization on Friday launched an appeal for \$19 million in short-term aid for farmers, fishers and other food producers in cyclone-hit Mozambique, one of the world's poorest countries.

The three groups in three Southern African countries hit by Tropical Cyclone Idai - Mozambique, Malawi and Zimbabwe - "are under severe threat," an FAO statement said.

As flood waters recede, "keeping animals alive, rehabilitating damaged land and rebooting food production will be critical," it added, given that 80 per cent of the population in Mozambique depends on agriculture.

The cyclone devastated the provinces of Manica and Sofala, which normally account for one-quarter of the nation's cereal production.

The FAO estimates that \$19 million (almost 17 million euros) would provide three months' support for local populations.

Before Cyclone Idai hit, 1.8 million people already lacked access to secure food supplies, the statement said.

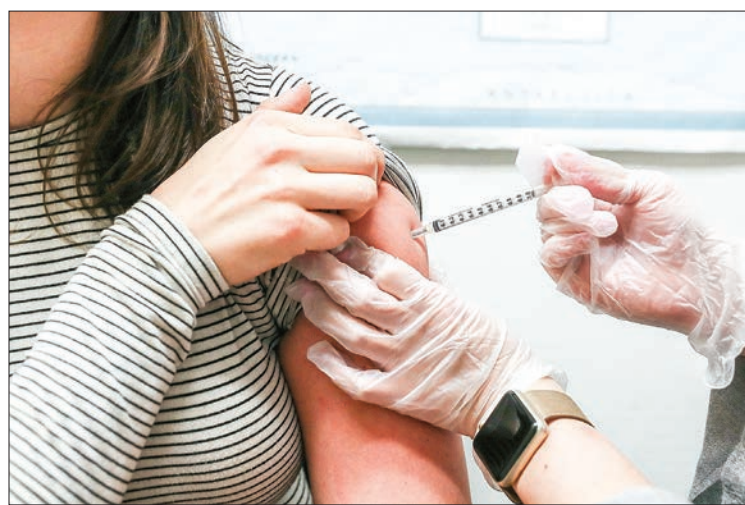
"We will procure and distribute seeds as a matter of urgency so that farmers can plant for the secondary agricultural season, which is starting now, in April," it quoted local representative Olman Serrano as saying.

Fishers and ports also need aid, in particular Beira, the country's main fishing port and import facility.

The FAO estimates that more than 600,000 people were affected by the cyclone, which killed around 450 people and triggered waves of cholera and diarrhoea.

The World Food Programme said satellite images showed the creation of an inland sea that measures 125 kilometres long and 25 kilometres wide (78 x 16 miles), larger than the European nation of Luxembourg. — AFP ■

## Hundreds vaccinated after measles emergency in New York

NEW YORK (United States)—A New York county which declared a state of emergency over a measles outbreak is on the "right path" after administering hundreds of vaccinations in two days, the chief of the US district said on Friday.

Under the emergency, Rockland County banned non-vaccinated minors from public places in a bid to prevent the once-eliminated disease from spreading.

Planned for 30 days from midnight Wednesday, the emergency comes during a US surge in measles cases, linked to an anti-vaccination movement. "We have already seen over 500 (new vaccinations) in the last couple of days," Rockland County Executive Ed Day said on CNBC TV. "People simply understand now that we are serious about this," added Day, whose district is 25 miles (40 kilometers) north

of downtown New York.

"We believe we are on a right path now to get at least a 93 per cent immunization rate with the first shot," close to the level considered necessary to end the outbreak. Although measles was declared officially eliminated from the United States in 2000, outbreaks have occurred in five states this year, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The outbreaks are linked to travelers who brought the illness back from other countries, and the majority of people who got measles were unvaccinated, the CDC said. The World Health Organization has warned that the growing anti-vaccine movement in richer nations constitutes a top-10 global health threat. The phenomenon has adherents in several Western nations, including Britain and France, but is particularly high profile in the US. Between 1 January and 21 March, there were 314 cases of measles in the United States, the CDC said.

Rockland County, with a pop-

ulation of more than 300,000, had registered 157 cases as of Friday.

Despite major vaccination campaigns since the outbreak began in October, around 27 per cent of minors aged one to 18 in the county remained unvaccinated, Day said earlier in the week.

The worst affected neighborhoods are those with a high ultra-Orthodox Jewish population, where many oppose vaccines on religious grounds. Many vaccines are theoretically mandatory for children to attend school in the United States. But 47 out of 50 states allow exemptions on religious, moral, or personal grounds.

Washington state, in the country's northwest, in January declared a state of emergency over an outbreak of measles, an airborne infection causing fever, coughing and rashes that can be deadly in rare cases. Day on Friday called for a tightening of the school vaccination legislation and said a draft law to that effect was being discussed at the state level. — AFP ■

# Taliban kill nine police in checkpoint assault

GHAZNI (Afghanistan)—Nine Afghan policemen were killed when Taliban fighters stormed their checkpoints and launched a follow-up ambush in the eastern Afghanistan city of Ghazni, officials said Saturday.

The assault began early Friday when the Taliban attacked two adjacent checkpoints, Ghazni police spokesman Ahmad Khan Seerat told AFP. The Taliban then ambushed a group of police rushing to the scene, killing the head of the local police, Seerat added. In all, nine officers were killed and six were wounded, he said. The toll was confirmed by Arif Noori, spokesman for the Ghazni governor. In August, Taliban fighters briefly held the city of Ghazni before they were pushed out by US air strikes and Afghan forces. Friday's attack highlights the ongoing fragility of Afghanistan's security and the risks faced by local security forces as they man vulnerable checkpoints. President Ashraf Ghani in January

said 45,000 security forces have been killed since he took office in September 2014.

On its Twitter account, the Taliban claimed to have killed 12 "soldiers," though the group frequently exaggerates numbers.

Meanwhile in Zabul in southern Afghanistan late Friday, Gul Islam Seyal, spokesman for the local governor, told AFP that four police were killed and two wounded after a "Taliban infiltrator" opened fire at a checkpoint.

The attacks come as the United States seeks to broker a peace accord with the Taliban and the Kabul government, more than 17 years since the US-led invasion that ousted the Islamist fighters.—AFP ■

## Five killed in factory explosion in eastern China

BEIJING (China)—Five workers were killed and three injured in a factory explosion caused by a gas leak in eastern China, local authorities said Saturday. The blast happened Friday night at a perlite workshop in Shandong province, city officials said in a statement. All five victims were night shift workers inside the Qingzhou city factory during the explosion. Three others outside the workshop suffered mild injuries and are still in hospital under

observation. "The cause of the accident was initially found to be a liquefied natural gas leak, and the specific cause is under further investigation," the statement said. A company official from the Yongli Perlite Plant has also been detained by local authorities, it added. Perlite is a form of volcanic glass that it mined and processed, often used in horticulture, insulation and plastics production.

The incident came barely a week after one of China's worst

recent industrial accidents, in which an explosion at a chemical plant killed 78 people and injured hundreds. The powerful explosion in the eastern city of Yancheng toppled several buildings in the industrial park, blew out windows of nearby homes and even dented metal garage doors. It prompted the State Council, China's cabinet, to order a nationwide inspection of chemical firms.

Deadly industrial accidents are common in China, where safety

regulations are often poorly enforced. In November, a gas leak at a plant in the northern Chinese city of Zhangjiakou, which will host the 2022 Winter Olympics, killed 24 people and injured 21 others. Leaked chloroethylene came in contact with a fire source causing the explosion, authorities said in a February report that revealed the Chinese chemical firm responsible for the accident had concealed information and misled investigators.—AFP ■

## Bangladesh tower inferno death toll rises to 25

DHAKA (Bangladesh)—The death toll from a terrifying blaze that ripped through a Bangladesh tower rose on Friday to 25, as authorities vowed tough action to improve lax safety standards.

The latest deadly blaze to hit

Bangladesh's congested capital Dhaka tore through the 22-storey FR Tower on Thursday, leaving some of the hundreds trapped inside screaming for help as horrified onlookers massed outside. Some of those stuck inside made it to

safety by sliding down cables on the side of the building, but others took their chances and jumped in a bid to escape the smoke and heat. Six people leaped to their deaths.

Firefighters backed by military specialists—some in helicopters—tackled the flames, lowering ropes to help people escape, while rescuers on long ladders smashed through windows. But fire fighters were hampered by not having ladder cranes big enough to reach the top floors, officials said. The fire was later extinguished and on Friday fire fighters completed the process of combing through the gutted and blackened floors of the building.

The fire department initially put the death toll at 19 but police said Friday that six more had per-

ished. Another was in a critical state in hospital. There was no immediate indication if others are missing, but more than 70 people were treated in hospital in the wake of the blaze.

### 'No fire exit'

Fire disasters regularly hit Bangladesh's major cities where safety standards are notoriously lax. Last month at least 70 people were killed in Dhaka apartment buildings where chemicals that were being illegally stored exploded—unleashing a blaze that took more than 12 hours to control. Following Thursday's fire, in the upmarket Banani commercial district, authorities have ordered a probe into safety measures at the building.—AFP ■

### Cambodia to lease Turkish power ship amid electricity shortage

PHNOM PENH (Cambodia)—Cambodian Prime Minister Hun Sen said Friday that Turkey has agreed to lease a power ship to help his country address its chronic electricity shortages.

The ship, with a power generation capacity of about 200 megawatts, is expected to arrive in early May and will be leased for three years.

Cambodia is currently facing an electricity shortage of about 400 MW, stemming from a lack of rainwater to power the country's nine hydropower stations amid surging demand.

To cover the remainder of the deficit, the kingdom is also seeking to import more power from neighboring countries Thailand, Laos and Viet Nam.

Cambodia's dry season runs from November through April.—Kyodo News ■

### 2 Japanese teens drown in lake on Australia's Fraser Island

SYDNEY—Queensland police announced on Saturday two Japanese teenagers died after drowning in a lake on a popular tourist island north of Brisbane, Australia.

Police said the bodies of the two 16-year-old boys were found in the waters of Lake McKenzie, a picturesque freshwater lake on Fraser Island, on Saturday morning after they were reported missing from a tour group just after 5 p.m. local time on Friday.—Kyodo News ■

### British lawmakers reject EU withdrawal deal for 3<sup>rd</sup> time

LONDON—Britain's House of Commons on Friday rejected the government's Brexit withdrawal agreement for a third time.

On the day Britain had been initially due to leave the 28-member European Union, the agreement was voted down despite Prime Minister Theresa May's efforts to win over parliamentarians by vowing to step down if the deal were approved.—Kyodo News ■

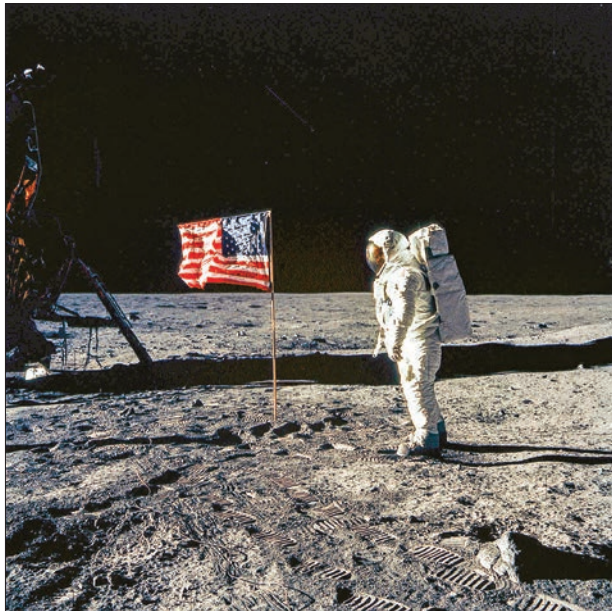
# US boots on the Moon in 2024? It won't be easy

WASHINGTON (United States)—For the past 15 years, America has sought to put its astronauts back on the Moon, but NASA did not think it could be done before 2028.

On Tuesday, the government of President Donald Trump set a new deadline: 2024. But that timeframe is anything but ironclad, and would force the US space agency to upend its usual work practices and take serious risks. Just a few weeks ago, NASA chief Jim Bridenstine said the United States was not in any space race.

But he was forced to change his tune when Vice President Mike Pence said NASA needed to put astronauts back on the Moon in 2024 “by any means necessary.” “Make no mistake about it, we are in a space race today,” Pence said. Bridenstine now says the acceleration of the calendar is “aggressive” but doable.

Industry experts and officials also believe it's possible, but with a list of caveats: more money is needed, fewer tests, more help from the private sector—and some even want a change at the top of NASA. “I assume that all means that we would need more funding in order to accomplish those goals,” one lawmaker asked. “Yes,” said Bridenstine.

## More money, more problems

The idea of allocating more money to NASA has some on Capitol Hill gritting their teeth. The space agency has already spent \$23 billion developing its new heavy-lift rocket (the Space Launch System, which is being built by aerospace giant Boeing), the Orion capsule (built by Lockheed Martin) and ground installations. Congress has granted it \$4 billion for 2019. Orion is nearly ready but the SLS is the real bottleneck: it will be more powerful than the rockets used on the original Apollo missions to the Moon, but it is years behind schedule. At a NASA facility in New Orleans, the first

stage of the SLS prototype, expected to take flight next year, is still being assembled. But its four engines have not yet been delivered. That first stage is then meant to be transported via barge to St Louis for testing, before being sent to Florida for final assembly. As for the planned June 2020 test flight, Bridenstine said: “I don't think that's in the cards.” Some of the engine testing could be cancelled to gain a few months.

But that would fly in the face of the long-standing conservative work culture at NASA, which is still scarred by the Challenger and Columbia space shuttle disasters in 1986 and 2003. “Do you want to kill astronauts? Because this

is how you kill astronauts,” said Holly Griffith, a vehicle systems engineer working on the Orion capsule in Houston. “There's no reason to accelerate going to the Moon by four years,” Griffith told AFP. “It's ridiculous.”

## Help!

The reality of Pence's announcement is that 2024 is politically significant: it would be the final year in Trump's eventual second term at the White House. “The administration has been frustrated for some time on the lack of progress on the mandate to return to the Moon,” Greg Autry, the vice president for space development at the independent National Space Society, told AFP. “It's clear the president wants it to happen during his second term, presuming he's re-elected,” added Autry, who was a member of Trump's presidential transition team. So why has a return to the Moon taken so long—after all, Neil Armstrong made his legendary “giant leap for mankind” 50 years ago. Autry says NASA wants to be “100,000 percent sure this will be safe.” He says a “culture change” is needed, along with the naming of new top brass at the space agency who are “more like the president” and come from the private sector.—AFP ■

# Stranded baby elephants rescued by Thai rangers

BANGKOK (Thailand)—Six baby elephants separated from their parents and trapped in a muddy pit for days have been rescued by park rangers in rural Thailand, officials said on Saturday.

Patrolling rangers chanced upon the struggling herd in a national park east of Bangkok on Wednesday afternoon, park superintendent Prawatsart Chanthep told AFP. Once the rangers realised the

calves, aged between one and four years old, could not climb out of the dirty watering hole, some left the forest to bring back digging tools while others stayed overnight to keep watch over the frightened creatures. “Our team arrived with hoes (on Thursday morning)... and we began to dig around the rim (of the mud pit) to make it less steep,” he said.

After three hours of digging to build a makeshift ramp, the mud-covered babies managed to stumble out of the pit one-by-one as the rangers cheered them on. “Go, go, follow each other!”

the rangers yelled in a video recorded by the national parks department. “Go, children, go!” Prawatsart said the rangers had observed a herd of 30 adult elephants nearby and believed the young calves must have been separated from them. “We believe they were stuck there for at least two days because after they got out their legs were weak,” he said. Wild elephants are Thailand's national animal and live in the wild in parts of the country but their numbers have dwindled to about 2,700 from a peak of over 100,000 in 1850.—AFP ■

# 'Pyitawthit' housing project that helps to foster Yangon urban development

**Y**ANGON region has seen new housing projects under its urban development plan, including the renovation of old fragile state-owned property. One of them will be 'Pyitawthit' housing project located in Ward 3 of Pazundaung-Township, in Yangon.

While the old buildings in Yangon city have deteriorated threatened the safety of residents, the state-owned 'Pyitawthit' housing project is believed to boost the city's image.

'Pyitawthit' real estate in Pazundaung Township was first established in 1956, and it has been over 60 years now. Temporary shelters have been arranged to accommodate 142 families from housing, while construction works are underway.

The original six buildings on the land area of 4.348 acres will be substituted with a 12-storey building that includes an underground car parking area. The residential families will also be relocated after the construction works are finalized. In addition, plans have been made to construct five more apartment buildings in this project in coming May.

'Pyitawthit' is one of the housing projects developed by Department of Urban and-Housing Development. The project is implemented by M.K.T Construction Company and supervised by Yangon

Tenders are being invited for this project beginning 14 March 2019 for construction of Phase-2 that will include shopping mall, condos, luxury apartments and office towers and is scheduled to finalize in 2022-2023 fiscal year.

The tender winner will become sub-developer for this Phase-2, and receive master plan, boundry map, EOI, form

and regulations of this project.

The first phase of this project was initiated on 30 December 2018, and the whole project is expected to complete in 2023.

In his remark on initiating Pyitawthit Housing Project, Yangon Region Chief Minister U Phyo Min Thein said, "The project is aimed to promote social standard of our people, and it will lead to development of the county."

Under this development

plan, some state-owned real estates of Gyogone from Insein-township, Yankin, U Wisara, Zawana and Pyitawthit are under reconstruction.

These housings become gradually old and fragile, while bringing about devastating effects on the public and tarnishing the image of Yangon urban development. Meanwhile, the city is developing some housing projects in Hlaingtharyar Township and Dagon MyothitSeikkan Township.

The prices of apartments in these projects are fixed in reasonable rates, and sold at installment.

It has been estimated that Yangon city will require over 300,000 apartments for civil service staff, company employees and squatters. To address this issue, Yangon Region government is seeking possible land and potential investments, while Japan has pledged Myanmar to loan K150 billion for this plan.

This loan will be taken out

by Construction and Housing Development of Ministry of Construction, and Yangon Region government is finding appropriate land plots, to help reduce land value up to zero in decreasing prices of apartments as much as possible.

These efforts are intended to promote social standard of Yangon residents, and the new housing project 'Pyitawthit' will appear soon to foster Yangon urban development plan.

# The 3<sup>rd</sup> pilot project was conducted at the Thingangyun Sanpyazay bus stops

As part of “Project for Improving of Public Bus Service in Yangon” by JICA, the 3<sup>rd</sup> pilot project on traffic management at major bottleneck bus stop is conducted to ensure the smooth and safety movement by traffic and pedestrians. The pilot project will be conducted on 26<sup>th</sup>-31<sup>st</sup> March at Sanpyazay bus stops on both Thanthumar road and Lay Duang Kan road in cooperation with YRTA, YCDC, Traffic Police and bus operators.

At Sanpyazay bus stop, 16 bus routes operate and more than 350 bus vehicles stop at peak hours. Due to the lack of traffic management, serious congestion can be seen and safety of the pedestrians are not secured.

As pilot project activity, three main activities (provision of facility, setting bus stop operation rules and restriction) will be conducted aiming to tackle the traffic congestion and to enhance the convenience and safety of bus users.

During pilot project, designated bus stops

will be provided by routes and allow to board/alight passengers only at bus stops. Waiting passengers at bus stops, overtaking one bus to another and taxi or other vehicles using the bus lane will be restricted. Aforementioned bus stop operation rules shall be kept during and after the Pilot Project by instruction of YRTA.

Similar activities have been implementing at Sule bus stops and remarkable outcomes have achieved with the participation of bus operators, drivers and passengers. Through these pilot project activities, bus operation, behavior of bus users and drivers and enhancement of bus user perception is expected to improve.

The project has 5 components of output and activities as; 1) Institutional Development of YRTA/YBS, 2) Bus Transport Planning, 3) Traffic Engineering and Infrastructure, 4) Capacity Improvement of YBS Operators with QOS and 5) ICT Application. This Pilot Project is one of the activity of output 3. The project has been implemented until March 2019.—GNLM ■

## Myanmar suffers 3-2 loss to China at Viet Nam invitational tourney

MYANMAR U-19 team suffered a narrow loss to China U-19 team, losing 3-2 in the third place match at the invitational football tournament in Viet Nam yesterday.

Both teams fielded their key players and performed all out from the beginning of the match.

The China team scored the opening goal at the 9 minute mark, as Myanmar's defenders lost their concentration and China's strikers created their opportunities at the goal.

The opening goal was scored by China's Leng Jixuan.

But three minutes later, in a penalty shoot, team Myanmar scored an equaliser by youth star La Min Htwe, which the keeper was unable to block.

By using a power play and accurate passing, team Myanmar scored the leading goal at the 37 minute-mark through the efforts of Myanmar's Aung Ko Ko and his pass, which confused China's defenders.

But the China team equalized with a goal by Ma Fuyu at the 45 minute mark, and the score at the end of the first half was 2-2.

In the second half, with

changing tactics, China created more opportunities.

When a Myanmar player left the match after receiving a red card due to rough play, Myanmar played with 10 players.

With fewer players, Myanmar could not withstand the attacks, and China scored the winning goal at the 70 minute mark.

The winning goal was scored by Ma Fuyu of China.

There were no goals seen in the later minutes and Myanmar missed placing in the third place slot due to its loss to China.—

## Myanmar to compete in U-16 invitational football tourney in China

The Myanmar U-16 team is made up of 23 players, including keeper Htet Arkar Win, defender Htoo Myat Khant, midfielder Khaung Khant and striker Thiha Aung.

Team Myanmar will be managed by head coach Koga Takuma.—Lynn Thit (Tgi) ■

## Timberwolves edge Warriors in controversial overtime finish

LOS ANGELES (United States) — Karl-Anthony Towns drained a free throw with five-tenths of a second remaining to seal a 131-130 overtime victory over Golden State Friday that left the defending NBA champion Warriors fuming over the officiating and their own miscues.

Towns went to the line after Warriors star Kevin Durant was whistled for a fifth foul on an inbounds play.

Durant was called for holding Towns near the basket, even though the pass appeared out of reach of both players.

Towns made the first of two free throws and missed the sec-

ond as time expired.

The defeat left the Warriors neck-and-neck atop the Western Conference with the Denver Nuggets, who beat the Oklahoma City Thunder 115-105 to improve to 51-24.

The final foul on Durant was just one of the calls that irked the Warriors.

Seconds earlier, Golden State inbounded the ball to Durant who put up a three pointer that dropped through the net as a foul was called.

But officials waived off the basket saying the foul had occurred before Durant got the shot off.—AFP ■

## Federer ready for Isner shoot-out for Miami crown

MIAMI (United States) — Roger Federer is gearing up for a Miami Open final shootout with John Isner on Sunday after blowing away young-gun Denis Shapovalov in straight sets.

Federer produced a 6-2, 6-4 masterclass at Hard Rock Stadium to leave up-and-coming star Shapovalov, who grew up idolizing the Swiss, chasing shadows during a difficult first set.

The Swiss was superb in dismantling the 19 year-old's game, but knows with huge serving Isner lying in wait in what will be the former world number one's 50th ATP Masters final, the key will be to defuse the reigning Mi-

ami Open champion's monster service game. Isner used it to great effect in his 7-6 (7/3), 7-6 (7/4) win over Shapovalov's friend and compatriot Felix Auger-Aliassime earlier in the day, smashing down 21 aces. He'll be looking for more of the same against 20 time Grand Slam champion Federer.

"Playing a big server like John is like being in a penalty shootout in soccer, but I enjoy it," said number four seed Federer who coped brilliantly with Kevin Anderson's dangerous serve in the quarter-finals, winning the first set to love.

"Sometimes you go with momentum. Sometimes you go

with feel. Sometimes you guess maybe a little bit and sometimes you see it. It's a combination of all sort of things.

"You just hope that the stars align, that you pick the right side, that he picks the wrong side, that maybe he misses a serve, that you can put him in uncomfortable situations time and time again, and at the end somehow you find a way." Federer had no such challenge from Shapovalov, playing his fifth ATP Tour semi-final. Even though the Swiss was standing in his way of a first final, the 19 year-old stressed beforehand that it was a "dream" to take on Federer.—AFP ■

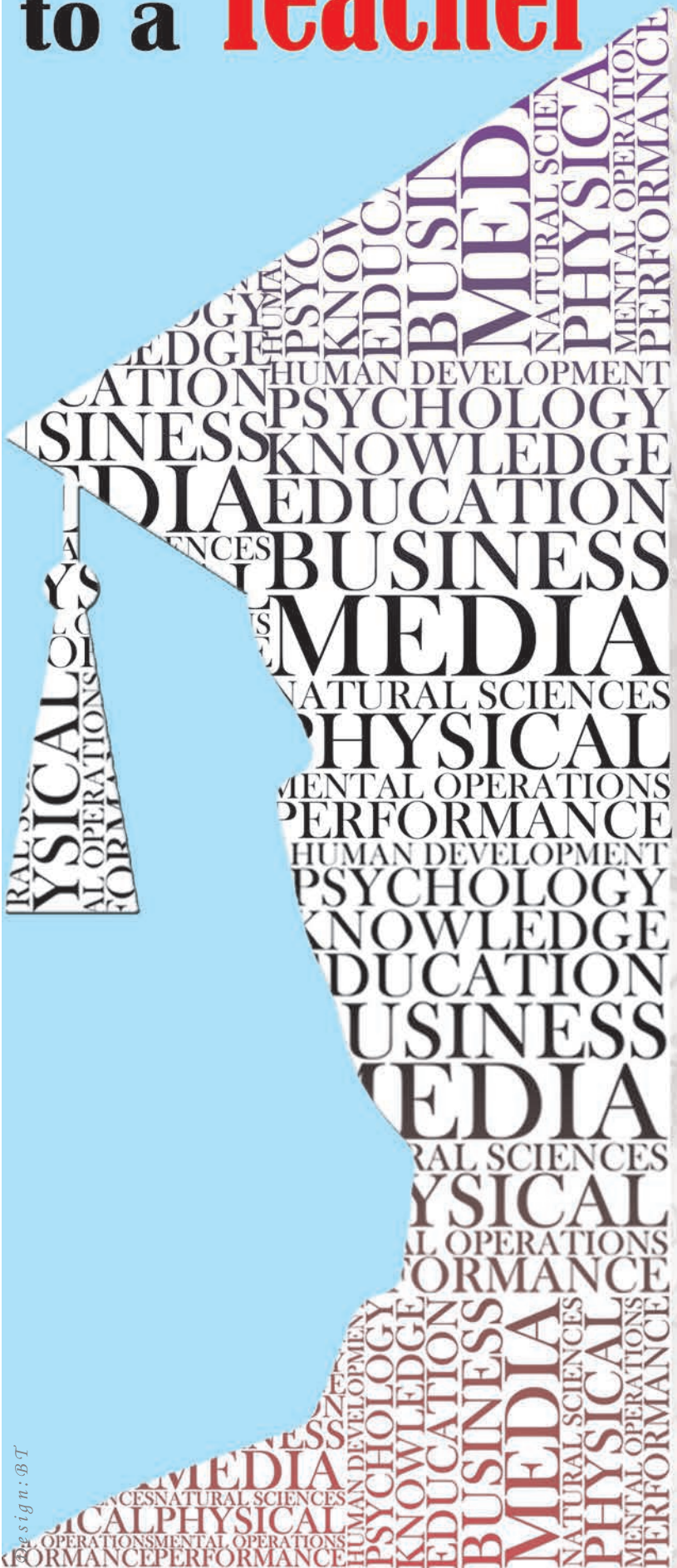
**P**SYCHOLOGY is the study of people's behavior, performance, and mental operations. In addition, it refers to the application of the knowledge, which can be used to understand events, treat mental health issues, and improve education, employment, and relationships. There are sub-areas of psychology, including: Sports, Education, Business, Media, Physical conditions and Human development. It also involves other areas of study, including humanities, natural sciences, and the social sciences. Psychology studies people—who and what they are. It looks into why they act and think the way they do and how someone can improve himself or herself.

Therefore, everything a person does is connected to the subject. It can be said that psychology is a must for all people to study. Education is one of the most important components of human society. Teachers, parents and students, who are all crucial in education, are human beings. Therefore, they should all have the knowledge of psychology. Among them, it is teachers who spend most of time with students and also mold students into good or bad ones in education. Therefore, Psychology is one of the basic needs to become a teacher. Psychology specialized in education area is termed as educational psychology.

In the institutes of education and education colleges throughout the world, Educational Psychology is prescribed as a compulsory subject for all prospective teachers to study like Educational Theory and Methodology. As our teacher, Professor Dr Tin Maung Win always said, Educational Theory focuses on what to teach, Methodology focuses on how to teach and Educational Psychology emphasizes when to teach. When a work is done, it is important to be able to it exactly at the right time. Otherwise, what we do and how we do it may be good, but it will never be effective. Similarly, it is more important to teach students at the right time, when they can absorb what is taught, than what is taught and how it is taught. Teacher is like a philosopher who guides his student. He is responsible to be aware about growth and development of the students. Only when he understands well his students' growth and development, he can correctly choose what to teach at the right time. In addition, Educational Psychology studies various factors which have impacts upon students, which may include home environment, social groupings, peer groups, his or her emotional sentiments, and mental hygiene etc. In this way, a teacher can realize why teaching-learning process fails if he or she finds it fail. As a result, he or she will be able to fix his teaching-learning process well in time.

Educational Psychology helps a teacher to know that how learning takes place and enables him or her

## Bullock carts travelling to pagoda festivals, part of the cultural heritage of Myanmar

**C**ARAVANS of bullock carts traveling towards the Mann Shwe Settaw Pagoda Festival, then leaving the pagoda after the festival, are still seen every March. The centuries-old traditional trip by villagers to visit the pagoda has attracted photographers for decades. This tradition can also be seen at the pagoda festivals in Bagan, as well as at pagodas in central Myanmar, especially after the harvest season.

In the time of kings, the number of bullock carts reached over 70, according to records. The preparation period to visit the pagoda was a busy time for villagers after the harvest.

Each family decorated the bullock carts and bulls. They stored feed for their cows and brought cooking utensils and items for making camp at the pagodas, as the trip lasted from six to seven days. The trips were also a time for villagers to enjoy boasting about their decorated carts.

Villagers camped near the pagoda and enjoyed performances at traditional theatres, as well as shopping at night during the festival.

The Shwe Settaw pagoda festival remains one of the most famous pagoda festivals in Myanmar, lasting more than two months and ending in April. March is the crowded season for the festival and the best time for students to rest after examinations.

Another festival which witnesses camps of bullock carts is the Ananda Pagoda Festival in Bagan, which falls in December or January during the winter season.

The festival is one of the most significant pagoda festivals in Myanmar and lasts more than two months. Visitors can enjoy the traditional lifestyle of the locals of Bagan during this festival.

Another camp where bullock carts can be seen is in April at the Shwemawdaw Pagoda festival in Bago, about 50 miles from Yangon.

Travelling in bullock carts to pagoda festivals

is one of the intangible cultural heritages of Myanmar, and is still seen in some areas thanks to villagers who have preserved the traditional culture of our older generations.

Myanmar has cultural heritages in various fields. Several million year-old primate and fossil remains have been discovered in Myanmar. According to archeological evidence, Myanmar also witnessed the stone, bronze and iron ages.

In its early history, there were ancient Pyu, Mon and Rakhine cities where civilization flourished. The first kingdom in Myanmar was established in Bagan, followed by

the Inwa, Taungoo, Nyaungyan and Konbaung dynasties.

Throughout those eras, there were many arts and architectural creations created by those people, who remain as cultural heritages. Similarly, there were religious beliefs, traditions and festivals of ethnic nationals throughout Myanmar who remain as intangible cultural heritages.

These tangible and intangible heritages are a matter of pride and honor for the country and the people.

The nation's cultural heritage preservation law was enacted on 28 February, 2019 to protect both the tangible and intangible cultural heritages of the country.

Only then, would the work of protecting and maintaining national cultural heritages progress and develop.

If our cultural heritages are not preserved and recognized, they will be adopted, transformed or taken away by other countries.

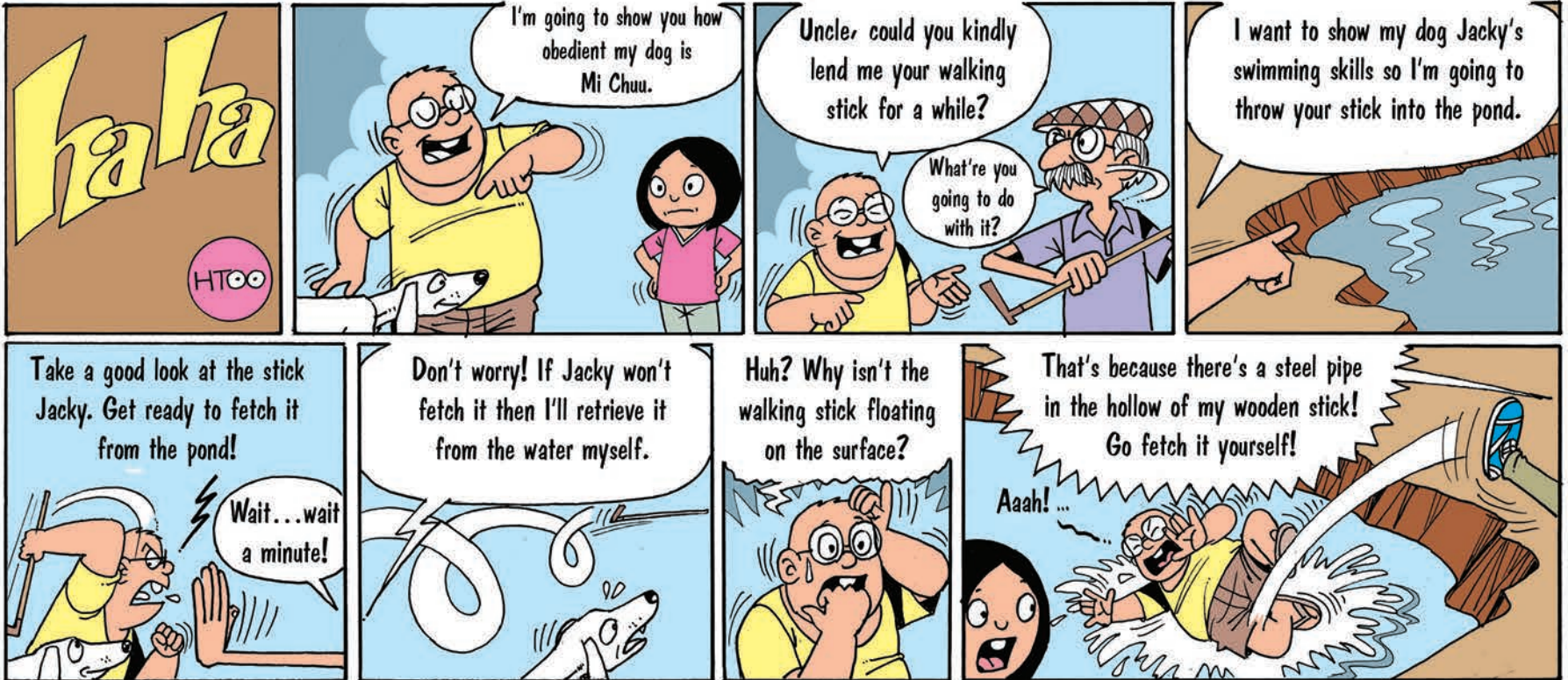
In fact, the preservation of intangible cultural heritages requires coordination with local people and understanding the essential role of communities in safeguarding cultural heritages.



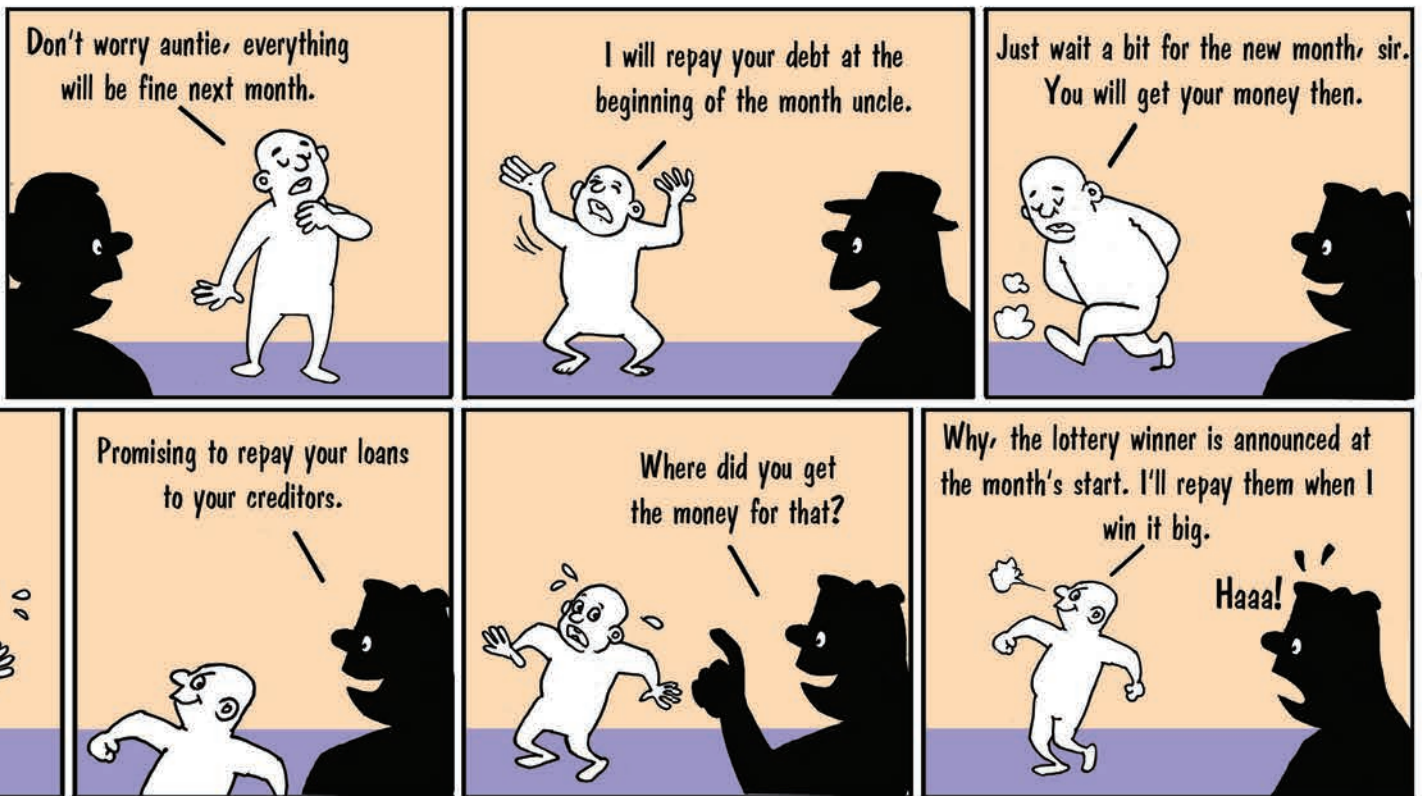

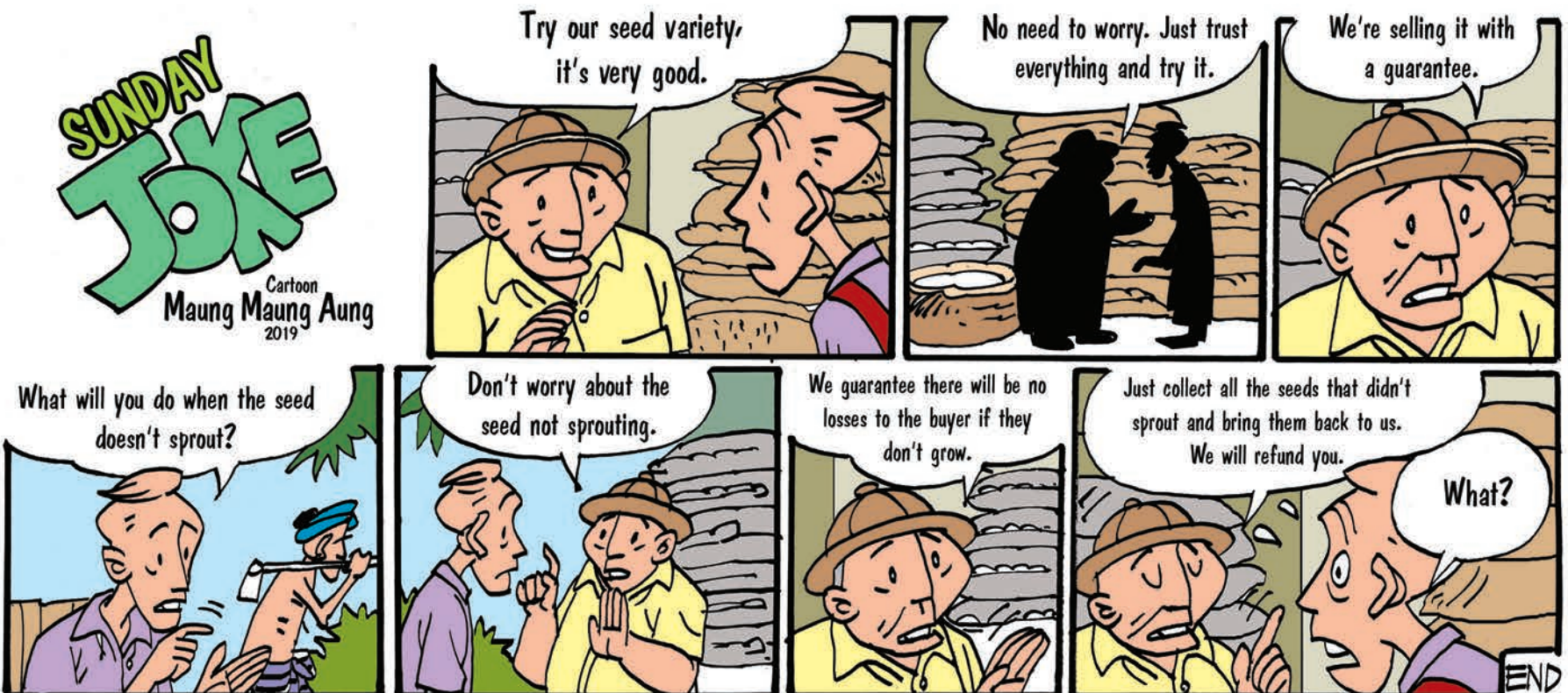

## Exclusive Interview with EU Ambassador H.E. Mr. Kristian Schmidt

---

**Q : Excellency, we've learnt the launching of "Education Budget Support Programme of the European Union to Myanmar". It is a great honour and absolutely delightful for our people. Please tell us about the aims and objectives of this programme?**

**Ambassador Schmidt:** This is the opening of a new chapter in our partnership with Myanmar. We have been supporting the peace process and democratic transition, but with this new support for education, we are really investing in the future of the youth in Myanmar. It is not a classic project. We are going to support Myanmar through its own government systems, directly supporting the Ministry of Education. This is not just a sign of EU solidarity, it is also a sign of full EU support and confidence in the policy-making of Myanmar government. It is a big day for us.

**Q : Excellency, we've learnt that this is the 1<sup>st</sup> EU support for such kind of education budget support programme of 221 million Euros. It is a very big support and very significant. Please tell us about the budget allocation plans.**

**Ambassador Schmidt:** The needs of Myanmar's education sector are long-term and the government is implementing a five to ten-year plan. Therefore, if we want to be serious partners we must also make a long-term commitment. We do not know how the politics will develop in the next two to three years, but for the next five years, the EU will be supporting Myanmar's education system.

We recognize the enormous needs that Myanmar is facing to catch up. In the years under the military government, education was not a priority. It is a new set of skills that Myanmar needs to quickly catch up in order to compete in the global economy. We have realized this is something that must happen now.

This is not something that we as outsiders are imposing, but there is determination within the government to reform the education sector. We are willing to put our support directly into the Ministry of Education budget instead of funding parallel projects. By working this way with the government, we are going to strengthen the systems of Myanmar's Ministry of Education down to the States, the Regions and townships. That is the significance of budget support; it really is a sign of trust that Myanmar can handle this.

**Q : It's very significant. We've learnt that the EU will support direct financial transfer to the Ministry of Education, also technical assistance. Please elaborate about technical assistance with the im-**

**plementation partners?**

**Ambassador Schmidt:** The entire package is 221 million Euros, which is roughly 380 billion Myanmar Kyats over five years. It is a lot of money. The majority of the funding will go directly to the Ministry of Education budget to implement its National Education Strategic Plan. There will be additional technical assistance through the Asian Development Bank for training secondary education teachers, improving vocational education and training, and for capacity-building so that the government systems will be strengthened. We will also support the capacity to spend the money in a safe and accountable manner: the World Bank will support public financial management, strengthening the systems so that we know that the money will be well spent. Technical assistance will also be available for the Parliament, through International-IDEA. That is why it is a unique package rather than just a support that stands alone.

**Q : There is also a plan for investment in improving quality education in ethnic areas. Could you explain about this plan?**

**Ambassador Schmidt:** Myanmar is in a process of nation-building and peace. There is nothing more important than changing the mindsets of the next generation so that they see the benefits of peace for education and development. I think we would be making a mistake if we didn't also try to ensure that the way we distribute our support is equal and gives improved quality education to people all over Myanmar.

We feel very comfortable in working with both the Government and ethnic parties because it is in accordance with the government's policy. The government's education strategy recognizes the need to support and promote ethnic languages and cultures, and the role of the Shan, the Kachin, and other administrations in offering education.

For a Federal Union to function, students need to have the choice to move around. The ambition should therefore be for the systems to speak together and to eventually merge into a federal system. We are very careful to ensure that while supporting the central government and its capacity, we also make sure that equality is ensured, with the level of education in the ethnic areas simultaneously increased.

**Q : It's a kind of way for contributing our peace process?**

**Ambassador Schmidt:** Yes, it must be. I have met many Myanmar friends, interlocutors and Ministers

who have told me that peace is about mindsets, as well. If you have had 70 years of a war, the risk is that in schools you are taught that the problem lies in others. You get text books where you have your history but you don't have the history of your competitors or the other ethnic groups. If that continues, of course you're looking at another 70 years of war.

When I meet young people, I see they want peace and opportunities, not just in their own state but in the country as a whole. They want, now that Myanmar is open to the world, to travel the world. Of course, Europe is also extending scholarships so that the students from Myanmar can benefit from opportunities to study in the region and Europe. Yes, it is also a peace project. Education is a brilliant vehicle for making people understand each other and live together.

**Q : Education is vital for human resource development, poverty alleviation and the peace process. We also learnt that there is a technical and vocational education training, so is this all part of the educational programmes?**

**Ambassador Schmidt:** When Myanmar started opening up and receiving support from the outside, a lot of Myanmar's development partners focused on primary education, which is very important. Primary education is the basis. But very few addressed secondary education and vocational training. What we have seen from the figures is that many students are dropping out.

Then there's the question of quality. According to the Ministry of Education, education is largely focusing on skills that are not relevant for the labour market. After generations of low-quality education, many young people do not have the skills for getting a job today. You cannot send these people back through primary education and start over again. Vocational training is a way to catch that generation and immediately give these people skills and opportunities to enter the labour market.

In my very first meeting with the State Counsellor after I arrived here a year and a half ago I asked her 'How can Europe help?', and her first reply was 'Education'. I then asked "What kind of education?" and she said vocational training. It satisfies me greatly that this is exactly what we are going to do. To catch up with that generation that needs support now.

**Q : This EU support project is very huge and I assume there will be a lot of meetings and discussions so how are you going to make this big deal happen?**

Ambassador Schmidt: It is a significant amount and I think Myanmar will catch up in ten years if we can make this work efficiently. Ten years from now, Myanmar will not be needing EU's support for this. But this new civilian government is not yet able to raise sufficient revenues from taxes. Myanmar has one of the lowest tax percentages in the world. Only 11 per cent of national wealth is being collected in taxes. Of course, this is because a lot of revenue from natural resources are going into illicit trade. Whether it's jade or timber, it's not being collected where it should be collected to fund education, social services, hospitals, all these things. This is where the authorities will also have to invest to make sure that those revenues are collected so that Myanmar in 10 years from now will not need external support and will have a system to fund its own education services.

But this country capacities need a boost right now, and over the next five years we hope to help with that boost. I'm sure the country will continue to grow and become independent of our support.

Q : Could you tell us what are the conditions to strengthen those commitments?

Ambassador Schmidt: The disbursements are made against meeting specific targets that Myanmar has set itself in its sector policy for education. Of course, it is not a blank cheque.

For instance, when the new textbooks the ministry has planned are delivered, we pay the next installment. When we see that teachers are being trained as planned we can make the next disbursement. It is a form of cooperation that rewards results. I also want to emphasize that this is not the European Union paying for everything. One of the important conditions is that Myanmar's own commitment is demonstrated by increasing the education budget. The government

has increased the allocation to education by 22 per cent from one year to the other. 22 per cent increase is a lot, but of course starting from a very low base. We will only be supporting if we see the government itself is putting more money into education. These are some of the steps that will show that the reforms that the government has decided are advancing.

Q : We would also like to know the depth of changes and pace of reforms you have noticed during your term in Myanmar.

Ambassador Schmidt: Imagine somebody who has to run 400 meters full speed around the stadium. They are running very fast, winning the race, and as they arrive they are asked to run another one. I think this is what Myanmar has gone through in the past 5-10 years. Very fast-paced reforms. It is normal that you reach a level where you say (sighs), 'Now we have to absorb the reforms.' It is the next generation and there needs to be a change in the mindset. The young people have to come in with their new openness to transparency, rule of law and fighting corruption.

Yes, the international community has noted that the pace of the reforms has stagnated somewhat. And also, on certain areas such as media freedom and certainly the crisis in Rakhine State, the country has taken a step back. As your friends, we speak up when we see that, not because we want you to lose hope but because we want you to keep going. Don't lose sight of the ambition you set when you voted in 2015, of peace and democracy for everyone.

Yes, sometimes you lose your breath and you have to regain your strength to continue onto the next round. Our engagement with Myanmar is longer because we know that this transition is an ambition you have set as a country and that it will take more than just a couple of years to reach your objectives. — GNLM
