STATE COUNSELLOR Daw Aung San Suu Kyi, the Chairperson of the Central Committee for Development of Border Areas and National Races accompanied by Union Ministers Lt-Gen Kyaw Swe, Lt-Gen Ye Aung, U Min Thu, Dr. Aung Thu and U Ohn Win and officials left Nay

Pyi Taw by special flight and arrived in Mawlamyine, Mon State, yesterday.

The State Counsellor and party were welcomed at the Mawlamyine airport by Mon State Chief Minister Dr. Aye Zan, State Hluttaw Speaker Daw Tin Ei, state ministers, Hluttaw rep-

resentatives, departmental officials and local ethnic nationals.

From there the State Counsellor went to Kyaikthanlan Pagoda in Mawlamyine and paid homage to the Buddha images with flower, water and oil lamps.

After the State Counsellor had inspected the repair and re-

construction works conducted on the platform of the pagoda, Deputy Minister for Construction explained about the damages caused to the pagoda platform due to strong winds and rains on 17 June 2018 inside the pagoda congregation hall. The Deputy Minister provided detailed ex-

planations of works conducted to prevent further damages, ongoing reconstruction and maintenance works. The entire reconstruction and maintenance work was estimated to be about K 2,000 million of which K 871 million donation had been received already. **SEE PAGE-2**

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The State Counsellor remarked that the damages were reviewed in five parts and of these three, concluded that the landslide of the pagoda platform occurred where the platform was extended. The extension works were not done systematically without thoroughly inspecting the strength of the land on which the platform was extended nor the geographical condition.

Maintenance was very important once reconstruction was completed. Maintenance could not be conducted without proper inspection, test and coordination with experts.

Maintenance must be done according to the suggestion of the experts. Much of the country was deteriorating and damaged due to natural disasters and now was the time when the country was facing the severe effect of climate change. The climate had changed and it could not be unchanged. Repair works could not be conducted based on the past climate condition. The way rains fell, the start and end of the monsoon were no longer the same.

As the present work was a merit-making work, the local people would donate and support for sure. The quality of the reconstruction work needed to be systematically inspected. Pagoda trustee must take the lead in ensuring this. If not it would not be effective 100 percent. Conducting reconstruction works again for damages occurring again would

mean unnecessary and wasted expenses. It was also not proper to conduct reconstruction works repeatedly on a historical pagoda. The pagoda trustee must no longer permit unnecessary construction works on the pagoda. The Pagoda trustees would need funds to maintain the pagoda. Having funds to maintain the pagoda regularly would mean less damage and the pagoda would be in a pristine condition. The Ministry of Construction would cooperate and support the best it can in this. Companies that won the tender must also conduct works according to the tender rules. Experts, pagoda trustees and officials from the Ministry of Construction must inspect and ensure this. Works that can be done throughout the rain should be the priority work to be done now and works that require conditions to be dry ought to be conducted only after the monsoon, said the State Counsellor.

Afterwards on behalf of the Union government, the State Counsellor donated K500 million for all round renovation, reconstruction and maintenance of the pagoda to the pagoda trustees.

Following the visit to the pagoda, the State Counsellor met with local people in Mon State, Mawlamyine, state hall.

At the meeting, the State Counsellor said that for a country to truly develop in a stable manner, it was important for both urban and rural areas to develop equally. As our country was a union it would be stable only when

the states and regions develop equally. It can be seen all over the world that instability in a country rose out of unequal development and thus it was important for this to be equal and fair.

Our country was striving towards a democratic federal system. All were required to participate in the establishment and

construction works and the results needed to be maintained too. Development of a country must be done by looking at it from all sides. Basically a country would develop if the people developed. It would be meaningful to measure the development of a country through the attributes and capabilities of the people. If the people

During her travels, she had seen the challenges faced by the country. Problems were quite the same. But it was beneficial to meet face to face directly with the people and have the chance to solve it. Some rich countries of the world were not poverty free. That was why development in the country needed to be equal. As the gaps between rich and poor widened, a country's stability decreased. Therefore, a country needed to develop in a balanced way. But this was not easy. Development was not equal in states and regions. Some developed fast but some were slow. Being a union, when working for development it was necessary to look at the issues from both viewpoints, economic and political. In some regions doing something might not be economically beneficial but to provide social support, it was conducted. Things could not be done solely for economic benefits. The Mon State is where ethnic Mon people mostly live. Ethnic people are found to be living together in unity here. It was virtuous to see them living in unity. It was virtuous to see that despite differences in race, culture, language and religion, all were of the same heart and this was a wonderful image for the country. This was the sort of country we want our country to be. But this could not be achieved only with a will or a desire alone. There must be a will, persistence, moral strength and wisdom. All need to strive together.

Since gaining independence, our country was heading towards a union system. The people were told about this repeatedly. A union was a country established with the collective strength of all. As it was established with the collective strength of all, all need to participate in it together. A country's affairs could not be handled by looking only at what we want to do. Priority must be given towards matters that benefitted the whole country in the long run. If we only look at self-benefit and not for the majority, it would not be beneficial in the long run. It was also not practical to look for the benefit of all only and not for self. It must be balanced.

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Problems submitted were found to be same where we went. Now we found six basic problems. The problem of not having sufficient water was declining but still existed. As this was a basic requirement emphasis was placed towards resolving this. Second was road transportation. Road transportation had great effects on the economy, education and health. Third was electricity. The Union government had been striving towards providing electricity to the whole country. Before the end of this year it was expected that more than 50 percent of the country would have electricity. It was hoped to reach 100 percent in 3 to 4 years and efforts were being made towards that end. For this, money and expertise were needed. After electricity came the education sector. This country was found to prioritize education over health. However, education without health would greatly reduce a person's effort to struggle and live. The final issue was farmland ownership. This was very interesting. Interesting meant we were putting much thought to it. Interest in ownership was not the same as interest in agricultural land. Farmers need to think

deeply about it. If we use our right not for self alone but for all, our country would develop very quickly. There were many conflicts in farmland matters. The Hluttaw decided to resolve these conflicts by returning it to the original owners. People need to note on what basis this decision was based on.

Rule of law was taken as the back bone of a stable country. We agree to return the farmland to the original owners for rule of law, fairness and truth. We thought returning farmlands to original owners would make the agricultural sector develop more. It was a correct thing to return farmlands to their rightful owners for fairness and economic development.

The Union government would conduct the work of returning the farmlands to the original owners as decided by the Hluttaw as quickly as possible. People need to note that there were many difficulties in doing this. People also need to demand their lawful rights correctly and honestly

within the frame of law. Do not do dishonest things as it would affect our whole country.

The most developed countries in the world were the smallest in the world. These countries did not have any natural resources. But their main resources were their people of high capability. We were heading towards this. If the capability of the people was high, we would overcome whatever obstacles there may be. A system was required to have high capability. That was why rule of law was being stressed, said the State Counsellor.

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in western part of Kyaikmaraw Township, construction of a sub-station where power lines were already laid, repairing two bridges on Kyaikparan-Kawbwe road, construction of a bridge over Wegali creek in Mudon Township and repairing a bridge on Sathwe-Nipadaw road in Mudon Township, matters raised by two locals outside the meeting covering a forest department personnel's termination from work and termination of shop permit on Kyaiktiyo (Golden Rock) pagoda and matters raised by five locals inside the meeting covering air pollution in the Mawlamyine Industrial Zone, pollution in Takuwai and Takuwi creeks due to rock mining, silts entering and destroying farmlands, confiscation of 50 acres of farmlands worked on by 21 farmers, farmlands being affected by planting of Malaysia Padauk trees, teaching of ethnic national language in school were responded and answered by Union Minister U Ohn Win, State Chief Minister Dr. Aye Zan and state ministers. The State Counsellor also provided additional explanations.

In her closing speech to the meeting, the State Counsellor accepted the requirement to engage more with the people. However, an entire day would not be enough if everyone was allowed to say whatever they wanted. The matters raised were require-

ments for water, road transportation, electricity, education and farmland. The inclusion of natural resources and environment was also noted. All these would be handled with care. Matters raised in writing would also be responded. Matters raised via letters were being received and it also can be passed on to officials from the Office of the President who came along on this trip. She then thanked the people for their attendance and took a commemorative group photo with ethnic nationals and youths.

Later in the afternoon, the State Counsellor and party went to Mawlamyine General Hospital where patients receiving treatments in outpatient, surgery ward and other wards were cordially greeted and encouraged.

The State Counsellor and party then went on to the Chaungzon Hospital and inspected the wards and x-ray hall, cordially greeted and encouraged patients receiving treatments.

From there the State Coun-

products put on sale.

Afterwards the State Counsellor met with the local people from Chaungzon Township, Ywalut Village.

At the meeting the State

then could their minds develop and they would become children with healthy and strong bodies. This was where the government would have to take up responsibility. Development of the villages was also conducted and the Union government had been striving towards improving the education and health conditions year by year. Local youths in the region were said to be working in Malaysia and Thailand. Job opportunities for the youths in the country need to be created. Only then could they live happily with their families. Matters such as working abroad should not happen even though creating jobs for youths could not be done overnight. However, efforts were being made towards this and the people need to take part together in this, said the State Counsellor.

After her speech, matters raised by the locals covering garbage collection vehicle, library books, counterfeit money, x-ray machine required in a station hospital and electricity were answered by the State Chief Minister and state minister. The State Counsellor also provided additional explanations.

Later, the State Counsellor went to inspect the handicrafts and souvenir shops in the Mudon village, Chaungzon Township and instructed the Mon State Chief Minister to provide support and assistance where necessary.—MNA

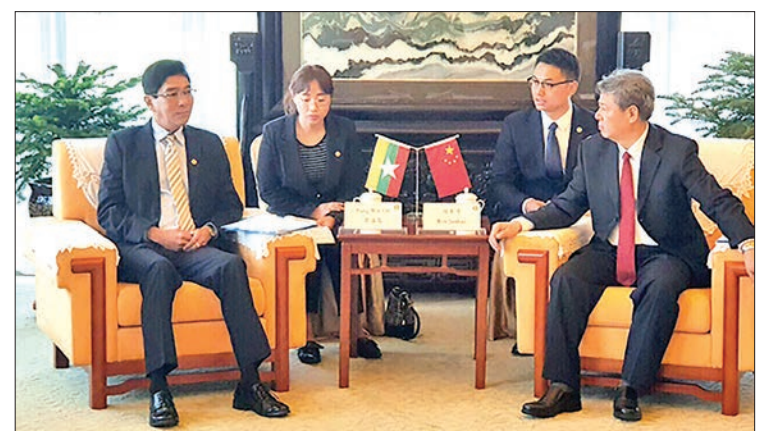


Chief of Myanmar Police Force arrives back home from China

Tatmadaw Commander-in-Chief receives Asia Pacific Division Head from Swiss foreign ministry

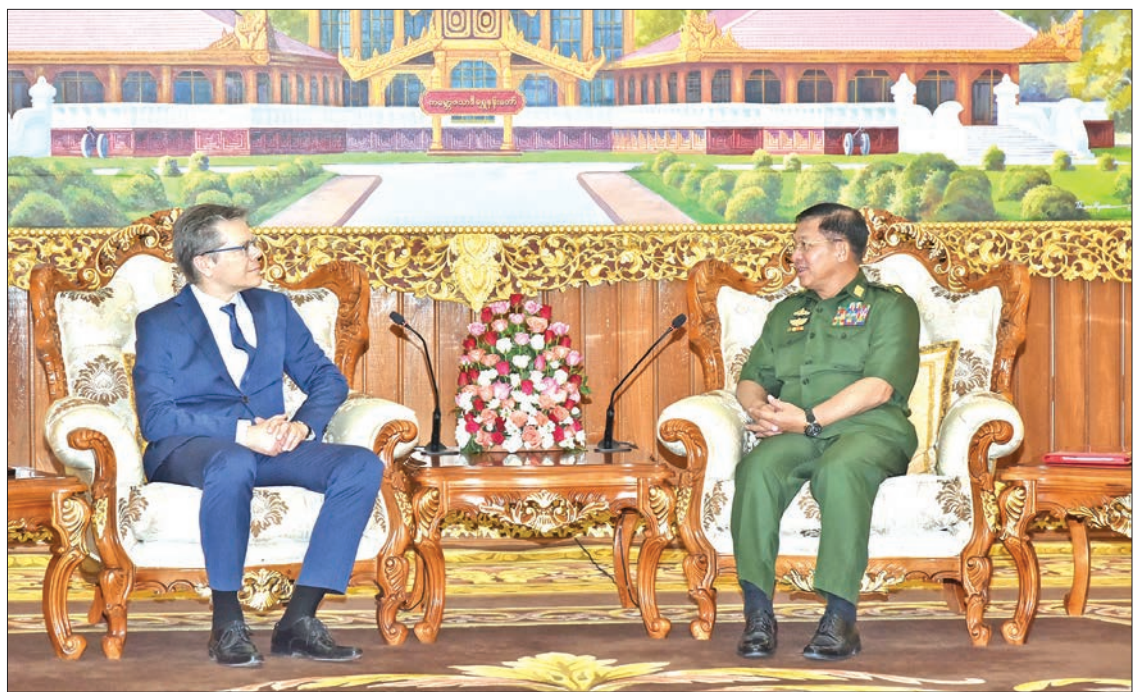

Union Minister U Min Thu meets GAD staff of Mon State

U MIN THU, the Union Minister for the Office of the Union Government, met with staff of the Mon State General Administration Department at the Mon State Government office in Mawlamyine, Mon State, yesterday.

Firstly, the head of the Mon State GAD, U Hla Win Tin, introduced the Union Minister to everyone in attendance and explained about the State GAD's processes and performances. The Union Minister then delivered a speech.

Vision, mission of GAD

In his speech the Union Minister said a workshop was held in Nay Pyi Taw consisting of current and former GAD staff from 26 to 28 February 2019 and the results from that workshop were combined with recommendations from ministry officials and the advisory team to produce the GAD's vision and mission statements.

He said the workshop decided on assigning reforming policies, reforming regulations and managerial components, and establishing regional development and good practices as the three tasks for reform. He said a timeframe must be designed to implement these tasks. He said they are discussing with the advisory team and experts to set a six-month course for reforms with the first three months for selective reforms and the second

three months for comprehensive reforms.

The Union Minister said a manual for all levels of GAD staff and a code of conduct is underway, while a Regulatory Review Unit will be formed to assess the designated specifications. The unit will support the establishment of a people-centred, simple and effective management and service system by lessening or amending regulations and procedures where necessary.

Red tape to be reduced

The One Stop Shops (OSS) were formed in July 2015 in Nay Pyi Taw and the states and regions and provides services from 15 government departments, including the GAD, in 316 offices across the nation, said the Union Minister.

He said the public has consistently complained about the lengthy process of government services that require numerous trips to different departments and wastes valuable time. He urged GAD staff to make the OSS truly solve the difficulties of the people and prevent it from becoming an additional government office that burdens the public. The Union Minister said the OSS needs to be able to explain what services they are providing and the steps necessary for fulfilling a person's needs. He said providing the relevant service immediately if the person has all the necessary documents is the first step towards making the OSS a better system.

He said the second step is to reduce requests for unnecessary information or documents and reform the system to require only the essential documents. He said they are discussing with the advisory team and experts to accomplish this goal.

Enhancing staff skills a priority

The Union Minister said there are plans to upgrade the

skills for of GAD staff and a main part of this is reforming the Institute of Development Administration which was opened in 2003. He said this will involve restructuring the institute's organization, consulting with experts and scholars to revise the curriculum and class lessons, and to link with international institutes.

We are working with the utmost transparency with regard to staff changes and the human resource management system to make it fairer and more equitable, said the Union Minister. He informed GAD staff that they can message any suggestions directly to the ministry's social media page.

He said the Anti-Corruption Commission is also assigning Corruption Prevention Units (CPU) in ministries as a pilot project, in line with directives from the President. He said his ministry will receive a CPU in the near future to combat, prevent, and reduce corruption.

Urging GAD staff to continue hard work

The Union Minister concluded

ed by saying that the General Administration Department is the administrative backbone of the country and thus, needs to initiate exemplary change to establish itself as a public-centred mechanism for administration. He said we need to firmly build our moral character to be free from self-interest and corruption. He urged GAD staff to meet and discuss with the public, gather their suggestions, and stand together with them.

He expressed his wish for the GAD to follow existing laws, rules, regulations, and procedures without burdening the people. He urged GAD staff to improve their daily tasks, become more effective, and reform their tasks and procedures.

Afterwards, GAD staff in attendance submitted requirements to the Union Minister, who gave necessary suggestions and directions and then urged the staff to respect and follow the policies and procedures of the Ministry of the Office of the Union Government. —MNA

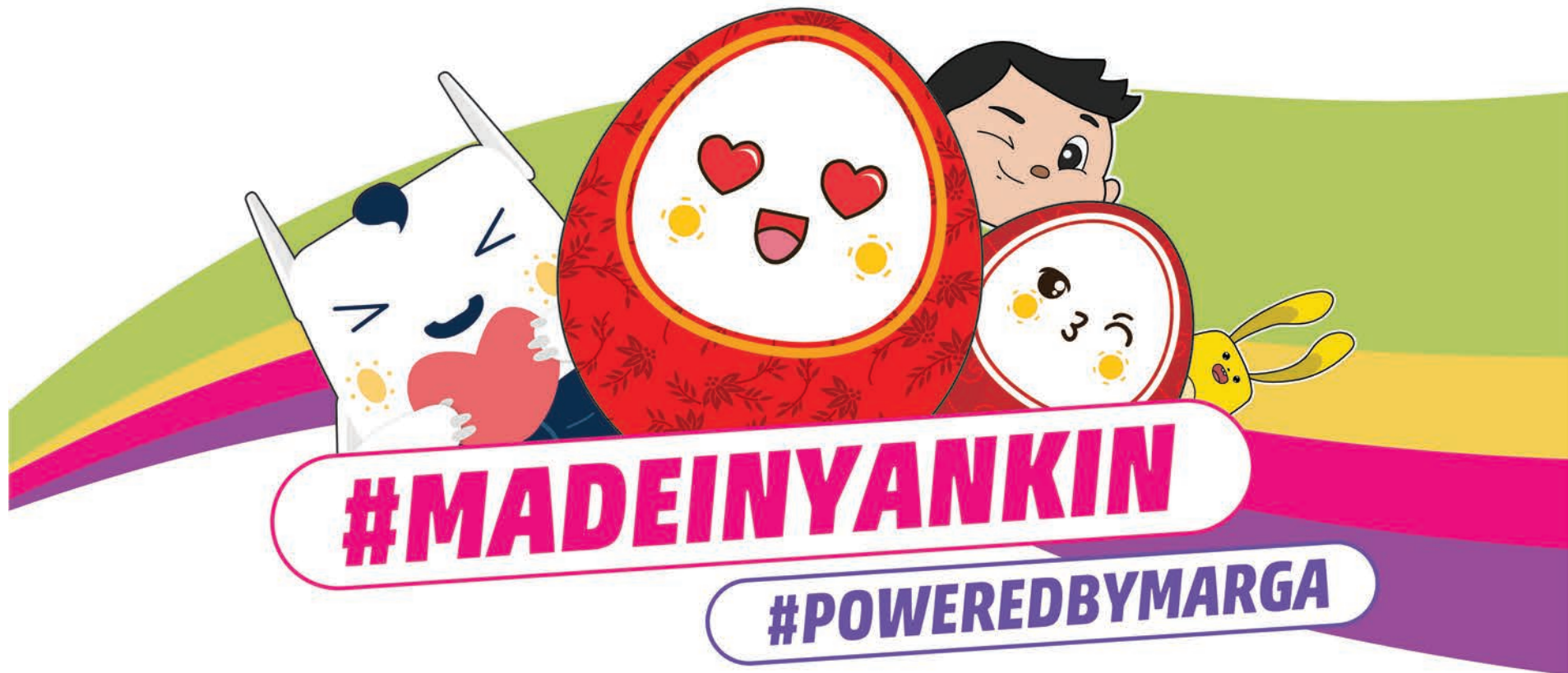

Funds, expertise needed to overcome electricity challenges

GOOD transportation and sufficient power supply are key for attracting foreign and local investment. Roads and infrastructure are important for connecting all our ethnic people and for developing our economy.

Transportation and electricity issues are among the six main problems in our country.

We are striving to provide electricity to the whole country. We are targeting to electrify more than 50 per cent of households before the end of this year.

We hope to reach 100 percent electrification in 3 to 4 years, and we are working towards that end. To achieve that target, we need funds and expertise.

Also, our energy potential is yet to be utilized fully. Notwithstanding our natural gas and renewable energy resources, Myanmar remains one of the world's least electrified countries.

Myanmar relies heavily on hydropower. The Union Government is currently working to diversify into other natural resources found abundantly in the country.

Compared to 30 years ago, the demand for electricity has increased twofold, and is expected to double yet again by 2025. This poses a great challenge for the country.

Meanwhile, the power sector is also facing losses. The electricity production sector reported losses to the tune of K322 billion in the 2016-2017 financial year alone, according to documents published by the Ministry of Electricity and Energy.

The ministry was expecting a loss of over K360 billion in the 2016-2017 FY, but the figure rose to over K422 billion. The MOEE is trying to reduce production costs for electricity as the sector reported a loss of over K600 billion in the 2017-2018 financial year.

The government is trying to expand hydropower plants as they have proven to be more profitable due to lower cost of production. Today, people are using more electricity in their homes, and factories are exceeding their quotas, leading to overloading, and causing difficulties to people. We need to upgrade power sub-stations and transformers to cope with overloading.

We would like to encourage people to think about others who do not yet have access to electricity and consider saving as much energy as possible so it does not go to waste.

POLICIES of the Union Auditor General Office have been laid down for auditing works in line with the law, encouraging innovations, continuing the momentum for reforms, analysing the real situation factually and conducting effective reform processes.

Encapsulating to the motto of "A Way of Checking and Balancing for Enhancement of Public Finance Management", the Union Auditor General Office had been striving toward improving the works, increasing transparency, increasing the trust of the people, obtaining the esteem of the people, increasing the effective usage of public fund and resources for the people and assisting the government with qualified auditors with international auditing standards.

Following was the transcript of an interview conducted with Union Auditor General U Maw Than

on the works of Union Auditor General Office during the third one year period towards fulfilling the requirement of the changing time.

Q: Please explain about the audit works conducted by Union Auditor General Office during the third one year period.

A: In the past only financial auditing and compliance auditing were conducted but during this three year period performance audit was also conducted. As per the Union Auditor General Law audit findings were reported simultaneously to the President and Pyidaungsu Hluttaw. Accordingly fiscal year wise audit reports of the Union Auditor General were submitted for the three years.

The audit reports include auditing the implementation of Union Budget, Union Tax and National Planning laws from the view point of spending expenses in a sensible way, conducting matters in full capacity, benefit to the people as well as government debt, findings on debts, deposits and temporary accounts conducted in relation to the union fund in addition to the audit findings on financial matters.

Q: Explain about audit on Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Regional Development Fund.

A: Systematic development of regional development works were supported by submitting annual reports up to fiscal year 2017-2018. Regional development works conducted with Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Development Fund was audited

starting from fiscal year 2013-2014. During this period President Office assigned an additional duty of auditing the state/region governments and Nay Pyi Taw Council's regional development works conducted with regional development funds. Audit finding report was submitted to the President Office on 17 January 2017. This report includes the status of compliance by state/region governments.

In accordance to the changing time and era projects and works were increasingly conducted with loans and aids from foreign and international organisations. Upon the coordination and request of Union Ministries and according to the Auditor General of the Union Law, in addition to conducting normal audits Union Auditor General Office was auditing the projects

and works conducted with loans and aids from foreign and international organisations and publishing reports.

Q: Let us know about the status of strategic work program that was being conducted.

A: Strategic Work Program (2018-2022) was drawn up to implement the aims of Union Auditor General Office. 2018 and 2019 yearly action plans of Strategic Work Program were being drawn up and implemented.

As per the action plans ISSAI (International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions) based financial audit, performance audit, law & procedure compliance audit were conducted, handbooks drawn up, workshops held and Pilot Audit conducted. To establish IPSAS (International Public Sector Accounting Standards) training materials were prepared, included in courses, expand and develop Internal Audit Division, preparations made to publish Quality Assurance Review, send personnel to foreign scholarships, workshops and courses and conduct multiplier courses, arrangements made to hold internal ICT related courses to implement e-Government system, review and re-assess to submit and prepare reports to Hluttaw in accordance to international practices and procedures. The work program also includes participating in the activities of international organisations such as ASEANSAL (ASEAN Supreme Audit Institutions), ASOSAI (Asian Organization of Supreme Audit Institutions) and INTOSAI (International Organization of Supreme Audit Institutions).

Q: What were the noteworthy activities conducted by Union Auditor General Office?

A: One of the noteworthy activities conducted by Union Auditor General Office was the President meeting with State/Region Auditors led by the Union Auditor General on 4 May 2018. At the meeting the President instructed Union Auditor General Office to prevent wastage of public funds, ensure

owners were properly registered by the relevant authorities, whether internal audits were formed in government departments and organisations and whether these internal audits follow the notices, guidelines and procedures, whether action was taken and reported if there were any cases of wastage and misuse of state funds. Audit duties under these instructions were being conducted with coordination between head office and regions.

Q: Speak about works conducted by Union Auditor General Office toward development of audits.

A: To support the country's economic development, public and private sector audits, Accounts and Audits Festival 2016 was jointly organised by Myanmar Accountancy Council, Myanmar Institute of Certified Public Accountants (MICPA) and Commerce Graduates' Association (Myanmar) at National Theatre, Yangon in 2016. With the aims of developing the country's economy, to smoothen and ease the public-private cooperation works for the momentous development of related works in the commerce area, to raise knowledge and information Myanmar

the Union Budget sanctioned by the government reaches the respective entities and were used effectively and fully, check whether the set targets were reached or not, audit union level organisations, ministerial departments and organisations follow through in financial regulations and procedures, whether projects and works conducted benefits the people or not, whether state, public and cooperative owned assets were properly maintained, whether ownerless properties, properties released by

Commerce Fair 2018 was successfully held in Yangon Convention Center.

Q: What are the plans to raise the auditing capacity?

A: As per the Strategic Plan and according to the motto of "A Way of Checking and Balancing for Enhancement of Public Finance Management", work plans and the staffs' collective strengths will be raised by increasing the auditing capacity and to be in line with international norms. As IT and technologies were playing an important role in implementing

e-Government system Union Auditor General Office was conducting website upgrades, IT Audit, fulfil required IT infrastructures, setup a Knowledge Platform to share information by purchasing and establishing a Mini Data Centre (MDC) under the Public Finance Management (PFM) project, work toward practicing Audit Management System, conduct IT Audit using Audit Software, upgrading from Window Based to Web Based to use Government Accounting System (GAS) not only in Nay Pyi Taw but also in state/region audit offices, conduct work coordination meeting and other meetings through Video Conferencing System.

One of our aims was to follow and practice IPSAS. Coordinating with relevant governmental departments and organisations, forming of committees and opening of courses will be conducted step by step.

Q: Talk about works on complying with the international auditing norms.

A: So as to complying with the international auditing norms a memorandum of understanding (MOU) on cooperation was signed between Union Auditor General Office and Norway Office of the Auditor General as well as cooperating with ADB (Asia Development Bank), World Bank, German development agency GIZ and EU (European Union) toward the emergence of international norms based handbooks and guidelines, to conduct effective audit according to enactments in the Union Auditor General Law and to raise the capacity of staffs.

Action Plan for 2018 and 2019 was drawn up to implement the aims of Union Auditor General Office. As per the Action Plan handbook on ISSAI based norms

followed by international audit offices were drawn up, workshops held, Pilot Audit conducted and attended workshops and meetings conducted by ASEANSAL, ASOSAI and INTOSAL.

Q: How about cooperation with international auditing organisations?

A: As per MOU with Norway Office of the Auditor General and meetings with ADB, World Bank, GIZ and EU workshops on publishing of ISSAI based guidelines on financial audit, compliance audit and performance audit, pre-planning of Pilot Audit for Performance Audit, drawing up Financial Audit Practical Guide and experimenting according to Roll-Out plan were conducted.

Workshops were conducted in cooperation with Joint Public Accounts Committee in the legal portion for independence, mandate and legislation. 31 work processes related to work process draft for governmental departments and organisations to practice according to IPSAS norms in the four portions of conducting preliminary works, works, continuing works on preliminary works and preparing consolidated accounts will be arranged and conducted.

Q: Explain about audit works conducted by Union Auditor General Office and regional audit offices.

A: Union Auditor General Office and regional audit offices in cooperation with international organisations conducted workshops and on job courses to conduct Pilot Audit according to ISSAI, financial audit, compliance audit and performance audit.

Value of trading on YSX lowest in March in Q2

DURING the January-March quarter, the value of shares traded on the Yangon Stock Exchange (YSX) dropped to the lowest level in the month of March with 90,572 shares worth an estimated K396 million traded on the exchange, according to the monthly report of the YSX. Although the volume of trades was higher in March compared with January and February, the value of trades slipped on account of a slight fall in share prices. Stocks of five listed companies were traded on the exchange in March.

In February, 80,179 shares worth K409 million were traded on the exchange, while 89,576 shares worth K526 million were traded in the month of January.

At present, shares of five listed companies — First Myanmar Investment (FMI), Myanmar Thilawa SEZ Holdings (MTSH), Myanmar Citizens Bank (MCB),

First Private Bank (FPB), and TMH Telecom Public Co. Ltd. — are being traded on the YSX.

In March, shares of FMI closed at K8,700, MTSH at K2,850, MCB at K7,100, FPB at K20,500, and TMH at K2,650. “The capital market infrastructure is still lacking. Only 15 per cent of the 36,000 securities accounts are active. Stock trading this year is on the low side. For the stock market to pick up momentum, government support is of vital importance. With the support of the government, more public companies will be encouraged to participate in the stock market and more institutional investors such as financing companies, investment banks, and insurance companies will emerge,” U Thet Htun Oo, the executive senior manager of the YSX had told the Global New Light of Myanmar last year. Last year, the YSX increased the stock

trade matching time from two to four per day. In addition to this, it had organized a promotional event for investors to attract new

investors and encourage existing investors to trade more actively by outlining financial reviews and future prospects of YSX listed

companies. Amid promotion events for investors, trading on YSX is still lackluster.—Htet Myat ■ (Translated by Ei Myat Mon)

ROK firms eye setting up industrial zones in Bago

A delegation of Korean businessmen, led by Mr. Lee Hyung Jin, the vice president of the Republic of Korea-based Taekwang Myanmar Development Co. Ltd, met Bago Region's Chief Minister yesterday to discuss the establishment of industrial zones.

“We have run our business in Myanmar for 10 years. We would like to execute industrial zones and housing projects in Bago Region,” said Mr. Lee Hyung Jin. Afterwards, Bago Region Chief Minister U Win Thein said the region welcomes the investment businesses. The regional government will provide necessary infrastructure such as roads and electric supply, he said. He also

urged the companies to strictly follow the rules and regulations. Since January, 2017, the Bago Region Investment Committee has endorsed three domestic businesses and 13 foreign businesses with a capital of nearly K5 billion and around US\$32.5 million, respectively. The investments are primarily in the manufacturing business. More than 80 foreign businesses being executed in the Bago Region. Myanmar Investment Law allows the region and state Investment Committees to endorse local and foreign proposals with an initial investment not exceeding K6 billion, or \$5 million.—Hein Htet/ Ko Khant ■ (Translated by Ei Myat Mon)

About 2 mln tons of rice pile-up in domestic market due to drop in border exports

A drastic drop in rice exports through the border gates has resulted in a pile-up of about 2 million tons of rice in the domestic market, said U Aung Than Oo, the chair of the Myanmar Rice Federation.

“China has closed all the border trade. The rice stocks have reached about 2 million tons,” said U Aung Than Oo.

Myanmar exports rice to its trade partners through the maritime routes and border gates. China has been clamping down on illegal trade, prompting its dealers to halt trade, resulting in a decline in rice exports through the Myanmar border channels.

“The Chinese market accounts for 46 per cent of Myanmar's rice exports. As China is the largest buyer of Myanmar rice, the market situation is positively related to demand,” said U Aung Than Oo.

From 1 April, 2018 to 31 March, 2019, Myanmar exported more than 2.3 million tons of rice and broken rice. The country shipped 3.68 million tons of rice in the 2017-2018 fiscal year.

“In the last financial year, 3.68 million tons of rice were exported.

In the past year, only 2.3 million tons were exported, which is a decline of over 1 million tons compared with the previous financial year. Rice has piled

up owing to a drop in exports through the border trade channel. Another reason for stocks piling up is EU's tariff on long-grain rice with 90-day yield,” said U Aung Than Oo.

At a meeting with Vice President U Myint Swe and entrepreneurs on 15 March at the UMFCCI, the MRF asked the government to help farmers get a decent price during harvest. They also requested that a G-to-G agreement be reached to help small and medium rice enterprises conduct trade smoothly, the quota for rice and broken rice exports to China be raised, and the MoU be implemented soon. ■ (Translated by Ei Myat Mon)

Volume of ginger exports on the rise

THE volume of Myanmar's ginger exports is currently increasing, according to the Ministry of Commerce.

Myanmar exports kitchen crops such as garlic and onion to India. Onions are exported to China and Thailand through the border gates, while garlic is sent to India through the Tamu border gate. Ginger is shipped to India, Bangladesh, Indonesia, and South Korea through the maritime routes. Turmeric is exported to India and Yemen by sea.

“The ginger market has good

potential. The weekly export volume is around 980 tons,” said Ko Sai Ye Lwin, manager, Aungban Commodity Depot.

“At present, there are two kinds of ginger in the local market — highland ginger and lowland ginger. The quality of ginger depends on the geographical location. Ginger from Kalaw region is compact and has a strong smell, while lowland ginger is mushy and has a mild scent and is the most demanded ginger in the local market,” he said. “At present, individual export licenses are not

needed for dried and wet ginger and trade can be performed in the regular way. So, ginger demand is rising in foreign markets,” according to merchants. “Onions are fetching a better price in the export market compared to the local market. In the local market, customers can buy onions at a cheap price,” said merchants. The prevailing prices of Myitthar and Kyaukse onion varieties are between K400 and K500 per viss (3.6 pounds) at the Mandalay Commodity Depot.—MYANTRADE ■ (Translated by La Wonn)

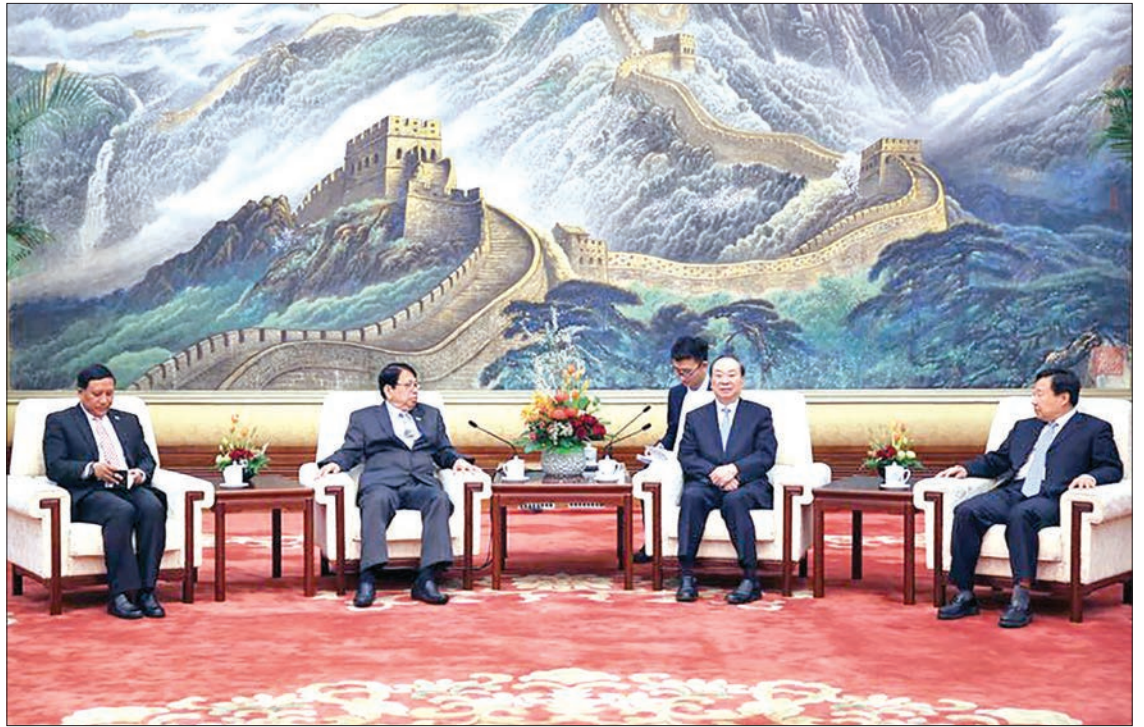

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Tatmadaw forces clash with AA, kill six

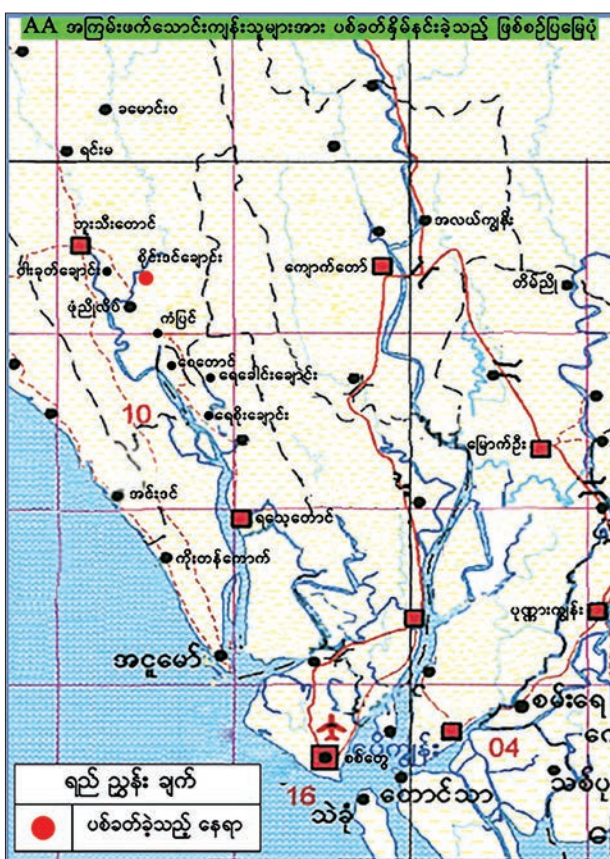
THE Tatmadaw forces fought with AA group on 3 April near Wakoatchaung Village in Buthidaung Township of Rakhine State, killing six, according to the Office of the Commander-in-Chief of Defence Services.

On Wednesday afternoon, the security forces received a tip that about 150 AA members were camping near the Saidin Creek close to the village, following which, they carried out security operations in the area.

In the fighting, six Muslims, who were with the AA group, were killed.

The slain members were from the Thayatpyin, Daphyuchaung, Kintaung, Htaiktupauk, and Phonyoleik villages.

Nine other insurgents were also injured in the clash, and are receiving treatment at the Tatmadaw Hospital in Buthidaung. They are being interrogated, the



release from the military stated.

The Tatmadaw forces are continuing security operations to ensure the rule of law prevails in

the area, according to the Office of the Commander-in-Chief of Defence Services.—MNA ■

Reforms of Union Auditor General Office: Checking and Balancing for Enhancement of Public Finance Management

Maubin-Pyapon-Kyaiklat road upgrade project conducted by Ministry of Construction with ADB loan and development of electricity distribution system project conducted by Ministry of Electricity and Energy were audited and audit reports published.

In cooperation with Norway Office of the Auditor General compliance audit and performance audit on Ministry of Electricity and Energy Myanmar Oil & Gas Enterprise head offices receiving Royalties for fiscal year 2015-2016 and 2016-2017, financial audit on organisation of management committee/joint management committee, sub-committees and sub-contracts were conducted. On publishing of reports, report on compliance with agreement and with the support of EU, audit reports on eight union level organisations' fiscal year 2017-2018 financial accounts were published. Under the technical support agreement with Norway Office of the Auditor General Performance Audit on Ministry of Health and Sports conducting works in accordance to ISSAI and Pre-Planning to conduct Pilot Audit on irrigation water distribution works of Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation were conducted.

Q. Explain about plan to conduct environmental auditing works.

A. To conduct preliminary audit on environmental policy projects and work processes of relevant ministries implementing Goal 5: Natural Resources & the Environment for Prosperity of

the Nation under Pillar 3 People and Planet of Myanmar Sustainable Development Plan (2018-2030) enacted in 2108 August an Environmental Audit Workshop jointly organized by Union Auditor General Office and Norway Office of the Auditor General was held in February 19 and 20 this year. Based on the knowledge gained the workshop an Environmental Audit works will be conducted.

Arrangements were made to setup a Knowledge Platform to share information by purchasing and establishing a Mini Data Centre (MDC) under the Public Finance Management (PFM) project, work toward practicing Audit Management System, conduct IT Audit using Audit Software.

Q. Were there any changes to the law amending Myanmar Accountancy Council Law?

A. The law amending the Myanmar Accountancy Council Law was enacted as Pyidaungsu Hluttaw law no. 5 on 30 January. There'll be changes in Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Law no. 31 and technical words in Myanmar Accountancy Council Law (2015) enacted in 5 June 2015 will be in line with International Federation of Accountant (IFAC) word usage. There'll be more complete audit types, opening of more vocational subjects on audit, transferring of the works of the Council to relevant committees, registration of course teachers and changes to be in accord with enacted laws.

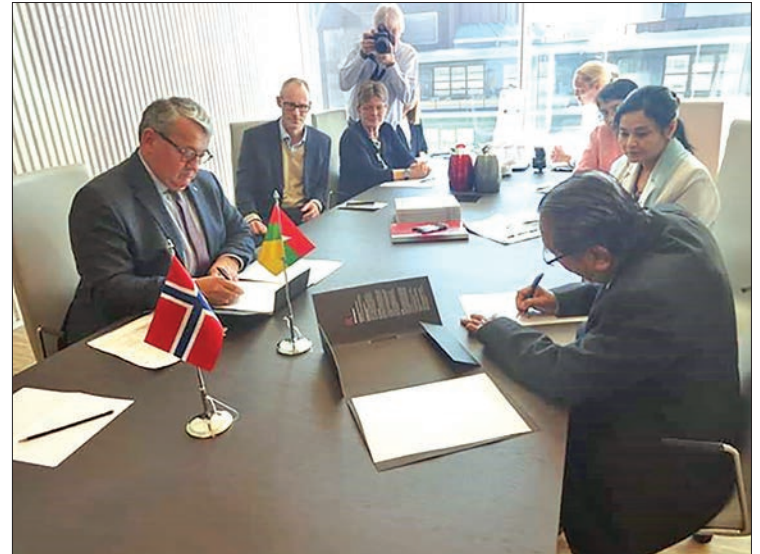
During the three year period guidance for development of the works conducted by MICPA, permission to register audit works, expanding the arrangement to

increase the number of certified public accountant, increasing the number s of private schools and teachers, preparation to comply to international accounts organisations and IFRS (International Financial Reporting Standards) norms starting from 2022-2023 were conducted while works on aligning to the enacted laws will be conducted increasingly.

Myanmar Accountancy Council being an organisation managing private account sector and account experts conducted transitions and reforms to be in line with the time and era and supported the establishment and development of accountancy in Myanmar business sector, tax and financial management.

Q. What was done about human resources development for generating excellent auditors?

A. The staffs were sent to Net

sent to courses related to Mini Data Centre conducted under the arrangement of Myanmar Public Financial Management Modernization project (MMPFMp),

Q. Please speak about courses conducted to produce experts in accounts.

A. To provide account knowledge service for personnel in other ministries and organisations basic account and office work courses were held not only in Nay Pyi Taw but also in four state/region audit offices. Mid and higher level accounting course was held in Nay Pyi Taw. Accountancy Diploma Grade 1 and Grade 2 courses were conducted by Myanmar Accountancy Council in Nay Pyi Taw and Yangon and were producing more than a thousand personnel every year. Certified Public Accountant Part 1 and Part 2 courses were conducted in Yangon producing more than 300 personnel every year.

Q. Is there anything you would like to add?

A. Union Auditor General Office was striving under the motto of A Way of Checking and Balancing for Enhancement of Public Finance Management" to improve and develop the works of the Union Auditor General Office, to have better transparency, responsible and assume responsibilities, eradicate corruption, increasing the respect and esteem of the people, to become qualified personnel who can conduct works according to international norms and raise the effective utilisation of public funds, assist and support the government with qualified personnel.

Union Auditor General Office and all levels of regional offices were conducting audit works according to Union Auditor General Law for the benefit of the country and the people and will report to the people.

IDPs in Rakhine provided with aid

MINISTRY of Social Welfare, Relief of Resettlement provided aid to over 26,000 people from over 6,000 households displaced by the armed conflicts in Rakhine State from 8 December, 2018 to 2 April, 2019.

The IDPs from six townships are sheltering in 102 camps following the armed conflicts between the Tatmadaw and AA group.

Delegations from the ministry, including a team led by Union Minister for Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement Dr. Win Myat Aye went to the IDP camps in the state in January, February and March and provided aid including food and household utensils and cash assistance the families of the victims.

The value of aid provided by

the ministry has reached K400 million so far. The ministry has also arranged to provide aid to the displaced once they call the ministry in an emergency.

Meanwhile, Under the Red Cross Movement programme and the World Food Programme, about 20,000 people displaced by the armed conflicts have been provided with aid including food, family kit, hygiene kit and kitchen sets in the state. World Food Programme also provided food and provisions to over 2,000 IDPs from Minbya Township.

Measures being taken by the ministry in cooperation with the Union Government and the Rakhine State Government to distribute seeds to the people before the rainy season.—MNA (Translated by Kyaw Zin Lin)

Farmers compensated for crop loss in Bago region

THE authorities on 3 April compensated farmers for loss of perennial crops on account of the construction of the circular road near the Hanthawady International airport in Bago region.

The compensation presentation ceremony was held in the meeting hall of the Bago regional government office.

At the ceremony, Planning and Finance Minister U Nyunt Shwe said that the Hanthawady International Airport is a national-level project.

“For deciding on the compensation, experts from the Rubber Production Association, related departments and village administrators meas-

ured the crops and evaluated them, based on their lifespan and size,” he said.

Advocate General U Ohn Myint then explained the terms and conditions of the contract, and the method by which the compensation was calculated.

Thereafter, compensation was presented to individual

farmers after they signed a contract with the government.

A total of 16 local farmers were to be compensated for perennial crops, which they were required to destroy as they are located within the area of the airport circular road.

However, the authorities presented compensation,

amounting to K1,55,548,766.3, to 13 local farmers.

The ceremony on 3 April was attended by officials from related departments at the region, district, and township level, and local farmers.—Hein Htet (Bago) ■

IN preparation for the 2019 Southeast Asian Games (SEA Games) in the Philippines, the Myanmar U-22 men's football team will play international friendlies in May and June, according to the Myanmar Football Federation.

At the invitation of the Viet Nam Football Federation, Myanmar will play an exhibition match against Viet Nam on 7 June, said a source with the MFF.

Myanmar will also compete in the International Football Tournament 2019 in Taebaek, the Republic of Korea, from 23 May to 2 June.

The tourney will be held under the supervision of the Asian University Football Federation (AUFF).

More than ten teams will be competing in the tourney, according to the Myanmar Football Federation.

Team Myanmar is now preparing hard to succeed in the upcoming SEA Games.

According to the organizers of the Southeast Asian Games, Myanmar has been placed in Pot 3 with Singapore for the drawing ceremony that will decide the group play line-up for the men's U-22 football matches at the SEA Games.

Meanwhile, the Philippines, the host team, is in Pot 1 with defending champion Thailand. Indonesia is in Pot 2 with Malaysia. Pot 4 has Viet Nam, Laos, Cambodia, Brunei, and Timor Leste.—Lynn Thit (Tgi) ■

Man City back on top as Spurs party in style

LONDON (United Kingdom) — Manchester City brushed aside struggling Cardiff to leapfrog Liverpool at the top of the Premier League on Wednesday as Tottenham opened their glittering stadium in style.

City's 2-0 victory over Cardiff took Pep Guardiola's quadruple-chasers to 80 points — one clear of Jurgen Klopp's Liverpool, with both sides having six matches to go.

Tottenham marked their long-delayed move into their state-of-the-art new home with a 2-0 win against Crystal Palace, while Chelsea thumped Brighton 3-0.

Kevin De Bruyne put City ahead in the sixth minute at the Etihad Stadium, firing in from a tight angle and Leroy Sane doubled the lead for the defending champions with a sharp finish just before half-time.

Guardiola, whose team take on Brighton at Wembley in the FA Cup semi-final on Saturday, made seven changes to his starting line-up, handing teenager Phil Foden his first Premier League start.

Despite the win, Guardiola said his side, who had 11 shots on target, needed to be more clinical.

"We played really well," he said. "We started really well. A magnificent goal from Kevin De Bruyne. Unfortunately we missed a lot of chances, we need to score more goals.

"Phil Foden played excellent. He did everything, arriving in the right positions with the right tempo. He always has chances, has a sense of goal. He's ready, we know it, to play any game in any position."

The defeat leaves Neil Warnock's Cardiff third from bottom, five points from safety, with only relegated Huddersfield and Fulham below them.

Spurs, who were on the

edge of the title race for a large chunk of the season, started their match at home to Palace in fourth spot, behind north London rivals Arsenal.

Spurs back on winning track

But Son Heung-min and Christian Eriksen made sure the celebrations did not fall flat, scoring second-half goals that enabled Spurs to end a wretched run of four defeats in five league games.

Spurs boss Mauricio Pochettino said it was a "special night" as they re-energised their bid to finish in the top four.

"The emotion was amazing from the beginning," he told Sky Sports.

"To win was so important to us. Today we touched the glory. Now we need to touch the glory of lifting trophies. Now is the start of a chapter. We close one chapter and open another chapter and bring victory to our fans."

Chelsea boss Maurizio Sarri made multiple changes from the team that started Sunday's tense 2-1 win at Cardiff, with Eden Hazard and N'Golo Kante back in the starting XI.

But the main talking point was a first Premier League start for 18-year-old Callum Hudson-Odoi, who has already impressed for Gareth Southgate's young England side.

Sarri has angered Chelsea fans with his refusal to start the winger and they vented their feelings at Cardiff on Sunday.

Hudson-Odoi was in the thick of the action at Stamford Bridge, setting up Olivier Giroud for just his second Premier League goal of the season in the first half.

Hazard doubled Chelsea's lead in the 60th minute and midfielder Ruben Loftus-Cheek put the game beyond doubt just three minutes later.

Sarri said his team had returned to the good form they showed at the start of the season and praised Hudson-Odoi.

"Callum played very well and defended very well," he said. "He has improved during the season a lot. He's ready to play 90 minutes in very important matches."

City's victory against Cardiff was their eighth consecutive Premier League win and puts them back in pole position in the Premier League.

With the League Cup already in the bag, City are struggling to quell growing talk of a historic quadruple even as Guardiola attempts to keep his players' feet on the ground.

After this weekend's match against Brighton at Wembley, they will take on Tottenham in the first leg of the Champions League quarter-final, with a maximum of 13 games to make history. The race for the top four is tight, with just three points separating third-placed Spurs from Manchester United, in sixth position.

Ole Gunnar Solskjaer's team suffered their second Premier League defeat in three games on Tuesday, losing 2-1 to Wolves.—AFP ■
