State Counsellor opens power infra in Mon State, meets locals in Thaton

TATE Counsellor Daw Aung San Suu Kyi, the Chairperson of the Central Committee for Development of Border Areas and National Races, inaugurated the 40.48 miles long 66-KV Mawlamyine-Thanbyuzayat power line, the 66/33 KV, 20 MVA Thanbyuzayat sub-station, and the 118.9 MW natural gas-fired power plant in Thaton yesterday.

Present at the ceremony

were Union Ministers Lt-Gen Kyaw Swe, Lt-Gen Ye Aung, U Min Thu, Dr. Aung Thu, U Ohn Win and U Win Khaing, Mon State Chief Minister Dr. Aye Zan, State Hluttaw Speaker Daw Tin Ei, state ministers, Hluttaw representatives, departmental heads and local people.

At the ceremony the State

As of now, we have not fulfilled 50 percent of the requirement yet. However, the neighboring countries were fulfilling more than 80, 90 or even 100 percent. So, more efforts needed to be put in, as electricity was a very important matter for all the people.

Nowadays to open a new power line or sub-station was Counsellor said electricity was considered as progress in the the whole country's requirement. livelihood of the people. Progress

in livelihood means not only economic progress but also included road transportation and electricity. Electricity supports health and education. This shows that the country was moving forward one step at a time. Electricity connection had not reached 50 percent of the country yet but it was expected to reach 50 percent before the end of this year. After opening this sub-station and power line a total of 220,000 households in Mon State would have electricity. It was hoped the people would be happy to know that efforts were continuing with the 230 KV Mawlamyine-Khayugu power line and a sub-station expansion work, the 230 KV Mawlamyine-Ye-Dawei power line and sub-station project work,

the 230 KV Dawei-Myeik power line and sub-station project work, the 66 KV Myeik-Taninthayi power line and sub-station project works to provide electricity sufficiently to Mon State.

Electricity supply projects were spreading out in the entire country rather than concentrating in one place. Therefore even though the current success was in one place, it could be taken as a success for the whole country. Various ethnic nationals live in Mawlamyine, Thaton and Thanbyuzayat. Not only Mon but Kayin, Pa-O and Bama ethnic nationals live there. Opening a power line and a sub-station in an area could be taken as progress for all the people in the Union. Physical progress was there, and spiritual progress could also be expected. Spiritual meant the union spirit. Secondly, it meant the spirit to have metta (unconditional love) and cetana (volition, intention).

The current power line was the Mawlamyine-Thanbyuzayat line. Thanbyuzayat was an infamous area during Second World War. The place was a symbol Second World War's horror. There is a war cemetery here for the allied soldiers who fell during Second World War. In some of the final resting place of these soldiers, who were sons, husbands and brothers of the people they left behind, memorial flowers were found to be placed. This showed the metta and cetana of the people. Due to the greed, anger and ignorance of people, wars broke out and due to the metta and cetana of the people, the fires of

war were extinguished.

Myanmar had not completely extinguished the fires of war ever since gaining independence. Internal war had been born together with independence. However, nowadays, where ever the people might be, they were striving for peace with full conviction. This must be done both physically and spiritually. A peace process could not head only towards peace. It must also head towards development. Only with development would peace be firm.

The Union government was happy that last year New Mon State Party signed the NCA. An

can we come out of the dark and step into the light. Each one of us should have the will and the spirit to leave the darkness and stay in the light. It was important to be determined and work together hand in hand in order to walk down the path of development. If there were no discrimination, competition, anger, hatred and animosity towards one another but metta and cetana; if efforts were made to strengthen the spirit to develop and establish a union; and if the march was continued, an enormous light wave would have been created connected by minds.

increase of one group was an indication of an increase in possibility of achieving peace. Therefore, when working towards physical and spiritual development, obtaining electricity played an important role in its own way. In the physical sense it meant coming out of darkness and into the light. It was hoped that it would be the same spiritually. It was the duty and responsibility of every son and daughter of the union to be able to come out of the dark and step into the light. Only when the spirit was properly placed happy occasion as the mindset of opening a sub-station in Mon State was not for a single ethnic national race but for all ethnic nationals. If the present generation fulfilled its tasks now, the situation of the next generation would be much better. In order to work for such the future, all needed to cooperate and work together. Myanmar would progress and develop quickly if the three pillars namely the executive, legislative and judicial consisting of the government, Hluttaw and the justice system worked hand

Next Union Minister for Electricity and Energy U Win Khaing explained about transmission line and sub-station project works followed by Thanbyuzayat Township Pyithu Hluttaw representative U Nyan Hein speaking words of thanks on behalf of the local people.

After that, Mon State Chief Minister Dr. Aye Zan, Mon State Hluttaw Speaker Daw Tin Ei, state minister U Wunna Kyaw, Pyithu Hluttaw representatives U Nai Thaung Nyunt and U Nyan Hein, Amyotha Hluttaw representatives Daw Nwe Nwe Aung and Daw Myat Thida Tun cut the ceremonial ribbon to open the 66 KV Mawlamyine-Thanbyuzayat power line and 66/33 KV, 20 MVA Thanbyuzayat sub-station. Later, the State Counsellor, Union Ministers, State Chief Minister, State Hluttaw Speaker, Hluttaw representatives and local ethnic nationals took a commemorative group photo.

The State Counsellor and Union Minister U Win Khaing then pressed a switch to send electricity to the Thanbyuzayat sub-station.

After the ceremony the State

Counsellor met cordially with the sub-station personnel and inspected the sub-station.

From there the State Counsellor and party went to Thaton by helicopters and attended the opening ceremony of the 118.9 MW natural gas-fired power plant.

Meeting with local people in Thaton

We will draw out from our past experiences as a civilian government overcoming various obstacles and hardships, as we work to the best of our ability for the immediate present and head towards the future of a democratic nation that respects human rights and is free from all stains of corruption.

Having successfully implemented a project reinforces another successful implementation of another project. Steps taken towards setting up power stations and providing electricity were aimed to raise the capacity and ability of the people. In doing this the Union government needed to participate. Not only the three pillars of government namely the executive, the judiciary and the legislative but also the people's cooperation and participation were required for a quicker and more effective development process.

It was a happy occasion for the entire country when electricity became available to Thaton in Mon State. For areas where electricity was yet to be available, this would raise the expectation and spirit toward achieving it soon. A progress in one place meant a progress for the entire country. Every place would develop only when the entire country achieved progress. People should take note of the fact that the main thing was for they themselves to strive towards their development. It was best to depend on self rather than others. It was

believed that if one's own capability were used effectively, other capabilities could be achieved as well, said the State Counsellor.

Following the State Counsellor's opening address, Union Minister for Electricity and Energy U Win Khaing explained about how the 118.9 MW natural gasfired power plant project came into being, construction works and status of test running the power station.

After that, the Thaton Township Pyithu Hluttaw representative Daw Mar Mar Khaing spoke words of thanks on behalf of the local people. Then, Mon State Chief Minister Dr. Aye Zan, Deputy Minister Dr. Tun Naing, state minister U Wunna Kyaw, Thaton Township Pyithu Hluttaw representative Daw Mar Mar Khaing and Amyotha Hluttaw representative Dr. Zaw Lin Htut opened the 118.9 MW natural gas-fired power plant by cutting the ceremonial ribbon.

Afterwards the State Counsellor, Union Ministers, State Chief Minister, state ministers, Hluttaw representatives, local ethnic nationals and children took a commemorative group photo.

Later State Counsellor Daw

Aung San Suu Kyi, Union Minister U Win Khaing and State Chief Minister Dr. Aye Zan unveiled a stone pillar commemorating the opening of the power station and sprinkled scented water onto the pillar.

After the ceremony, the State Counsellor and party inspected the power station on a motorcade.

Following the opening ceremony of the power station the State Counsellor went to meet with the local people in the Thuwunna Hall in Thaton.

In addressing the meeting the State Counsellor said there were two reasons for coming to Mon State. The first was to attend the day's opening ceremonies on electricity projects and the second was to meet with the people. Emphasizing on obtaining electricity was a matter of emphasizing on the people. Whenever in a trip, we strive toward doing things together. Emphasizing on such matters meant emphasizing toward taking a forward step for the country's development.

The country's development was good. Trade deficit was falling. Previously imports were high and exports were low. Now

export value was seen to be approaching the value of import showing the progress the country was making. Even though these progresses were occurring daily, the effect would not be immediately felt by the people. They would gradually feel this.

Getting electricity was something that ordinary people could feel at the same time. Everyone could see the lights coming on when they flick a switch in any house. That was why projects related to the majority were being implemented with great emphasis. Road transport was also the same. Roads and bridges were not for a single group but for all the people. Good roads and bridges go a long way for the people in the region. Priority must be given towards the benefit of the majority. It does not mean minority matters were not considered. However, priority must be for the majority so that if the majority progressed or developed, they would take along the progress and development of the minority too.

If we can feel mudita (sympathetic joy) in other people's well-being, towards all, we would not need to worry or there would not be difficulties towards establishing unity in the country or in establishing a union. The spirit of benefit for self being the benefit for all would be strengthened. In a union formed with many ethnic nationals, if all felt good about any other ethnic national's progress and development, the union spirit will have strengthened. If all felt mudita towards electricity being supplied to Mon State as well as nearby Kayin State and Taninthayi Region, our country's development would speed up in leaps and bounds.

The honor and pride of a country depends on the fair and just treatment within the country's people as well as fair and just treatment with others outside the country in the world. Some thought the honor and pride of the country depended on its wealth. It must be accepted practically that influence, not honor depended upon wealth. No one could deny the power of physical force. For our honor, it was important for us to feel mudita while we must strive towards having influence by making our country develop. Only with development can we maintain the country's stability and peace.

Workshop reviews ASEAN action plan for ending violence against children

A NATIONAL-LEVEL workshop was held yesterday in Nay Pyi Taw to review the ASEAN Regional Plan of Action on the Elimination of Violence against Children (ASEAN RPA on EVAC).

Speaking at the opening ceremony, Union Minister for Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement Dr. Win Myat Aye said the workshop was being held as Myanmar's implementation of the action plan needed to be reviewed. Eight tasks being carried out as part of the action plan will be reviewed at the workshop, said the Union Minister, who is also the chairman of the National Committee on Children's Rights. The ASEAN action plan came as the ASEAN Commission on the Promotion and Protection of the Rights of Women and Children (ACWC) has taken the responsibility to implement the declaration of ASEAN leaders in 2013 to eliminate violence against women and children, he said.

"Myanmar's Children's Rights Law (1993) needs to be amended. A bill on children's rights is being discussed at the parliament, and the bill is expected to be made into law," said the Union Minister:

A chapter on prevention of violence against children has been included in the new law, which also carries strict punishment for violators, he added. Union Minister Dr. Win Myat Aye also stressed the need to increase awareness of children's rights in the country. He said the related ministries are working together to draft a Child Protection Policy, while implementing a social management system to resolve violations against children.

At the opening ceremony, Resident Representative of the UNICEF Ms. Junekunugi extended greetings, and Director-General of the Social Affairs Department Dr. San San Aye gave an overview of the ASE-AN Regional Plan of Action for Elimination of Violence Against Children.—MNA (*Translated by Kyaw Zin Lin*)

THE Myanmar Investment Commission (MIC) meeting (5 / 2019) was convened at the meeting room of MIC in the morning on 5th April 2019 in Yangon. U Thaung Tun, Chairman of MIC, Dr. Than Myint, Vice Chairman of MIC and nine members attended the meeting.

The meeting approved five projects in education services, manufacturing and other services from Singapore and Myanmar. The amount of USD 19.38 million and Kyats 69,384.754 million have been approved for above projects which will be create (1,121) job opportunities for citizens.— MNA

Media campaign spurs 60% of betel chewers to quit

A MASS media campaign to discourage betel quid chewing, launched in October, 2018 by the Ministry of Health and Sports and conducted with the help of the People's Health Foundation, was highly successful.

A post-campaign survey has revealed that 81 per cent of the respondents remembered the campaign message, and that more than half tried to kick the unhealthy habit.

The smokeless tobacco campaign with the tagline 'Avoid Betel Chewing So You Don't Regret Your Life Choices', launched by Union Minister for Health and Sports Dr. Myint Htwe on 10 October, was designed to raise awareness about smokeless tobacco use in Myanmar and the related health risks.

The campaign objectives were to generate positive changes in the behavior of current smokeless tobacco users, motivating quit attempts and preventing non-tobacco users from starting, and to reduce the social acceptability of smokeless tobacco use. Hard hitting TV spots, radio spots, wall posters and a social media campaign were utilized to drive the message home.

The campaign ran for six weeks, after which a post-campaign survey was conducted to measure the campaign recall and the effectiveness of the messag-



ing. For the study, 2,624 households were visited. Ultimately, 678 respondents (current betel quid chewers) were selected to be interviewed at length.

The research was conducted by Quality Research Firm Myanmar and overseen by the People's Health Foundation.

"The interviews took place in six townships across Myanmar," said Dr U Than Sein, President of the People's Health Foundation. "Our respondents were between 18 and 55 years old, and 88% of them used smokeless tobacco in betel quid on a daily basis. It was very encouraging that 81% of respondents overall, and 89% in urban areas, recalled the campaign message when prompted. In total we were able to reach 22,95 million people in our target group." "About 96% knew that betel chewing can cause serious illness. They knew that smokeless tobacco use will

harm their vital organs and that it is important to try to quit. Revealing is also that people are very aware of the role of tobacco advertising: 63% of respondents believe that tobacco advertising encourages young people to start using tobacco and 69% agree that the tobacco industry misleads the public when saying tobacco is not addictive," Dr U Than Sein. According to the statistics, 62 per cent of men and 24 per cent of woman in Myanmar consume tobacco when chewing betel quid.

Consumption of tobacco and Virginia leaves-based products is a preventable problem which leads to some 7 million deaths every year throughout the world.

The number of tobacco related cancer patients is predicted to reach 22 million within 20 years, increasing from 14 million in 2012, according to the World Health Organization.—GNLM

THE Myanmar delegation led by Union Information Minister Dr. Pe Myint visited the center for digital movie industry, film and broadcast located in Beijing, China, yesterday.

The Union Minister and delegation first watched a demonstration in the China Film Giant Screen Format (CFGS) at China Film Group and listened to a presentation of China Film Equipment Co. Ltd's first use of CFGS in 2012, continually improving it, and reducing costs, after which they asked questions.

CFGS was created to combat foreign technological penetration and compete with other technologies. The technology is now used in nearly 400 out of the 40,000 movie screens in China and has crossed over to America, Indonesia and other countries. CFGS is commonly known as DMAX and has been described as a competitor to IMAX digital cinema projection system.

Later in the afternoon, the Union Minister and delegation travelled to State Production Base of the China Film Group located at Yangsong Town, Huairou District in Beijing. There they observed the indoor and outdoor studios, settings, and

HE infrastructures of a nation such as transport, technology and electricity are highly significant. The Ministry of Transport and Communications (MoTC) has been responsible for the national transportation projects and other transportation related obligations since the new administration took office. MoTC is charging ahead in its new policy to upgrade current transportation facilities to catch

> up with other regional countries in order to bring the National Central Transportation project to life. The main objective has always been efficient and affordable transportation system for MoTC. This is mentioned in the Ministry of Transport and Communications' third year report.

Q: How have you executed the policies of MoTC within the past year to give the best possible transportation service to public

A: The main goal for the MoTC has been to find the intersection between business orientation and regulation compliance to be the best transportation service we can. This is done by looking at how people chose their transportation modes, providing the service that is best suited for users and putting a price that have minimal government intervention and fair to the users that is set by the market. We still need to upgrade our facilities to compete that of the private ones. The ministry is currently working towards using the funds from taxes in developing the state-owned corporations to be



more efficient, environmentally friendly and fulfilling the needs of the public.

Q: What kind of developments have been in place for the railway sector?

A: We are working towards catching up to international standards regarding the railway sector in terms of how it operates and the services available. There are 39 express trains, 53 for local trains, 47 for passenger trains and 221 for circular trains operating within the city and its' nearby towns. New equipment has been ordered along with newer carts to upgrade the railway facilities.

This year, the ministry is prioritizing the Yangon city circular train, Yangon-Mandalay Rail line, Pegu-Mawlamyine Rail line, Mandalay-Myitkyina Rail line and Yangon-Pyi rail line.

Q: What about for the Yan- already re-welding 129 miles of gon Circle Train?

A: We have trenches dug along the tracks, raised railway platforms and upgraded the tracks. The bottom at the PC Girder bridges has been raised, there are fences with iron posts and meshes, roads have been paved and PC Concrete has been enforced in

For bigger renovations, we are calling for tenders from private companies. Current developments are as follow: 59 miles of welded railway with 14 platforms renovated with 10 in progress, 9 overhead bridges with 2 in construction and plans for additional 30, 2 crosswalks in renovation with 15 in construction and 8 planned.

Q: Pegu – Mawlamyine and Yangon-Mandalay rail routes are being upgraded as well. Can you explain to us about the improvements?

A: For the Pegu -Mawlamyine railway renovation, we have rail tracks with steel and are near completion. And for refilling the stones in the rail tracks, we have completed 49 miles out of 80.

For Yangon-Mandalay railway, there are 385 miles long and the renovation is divided into two phases with a budget of 2115 million U.S. dollar loan from the Japan

there have to a total 141179 piles of pebbles to be collected, 166548 concrete blocks and 14550 feet of brick fences. The Japanese has called for a total of 8 tenders and has already signed joint ventures for Tender CP 102, 103, 104, 107 and 108 and area already starting their constructions. CP-101 is currently in the contract negotiations phase with a call for PQ for CP-105 and CP-106 is scheduled to resume after the railway infrastructure building.

The second part of the project on May 2018 and is expected to finish September 2019 with detailed designs signed this year's January between JICA and Myanmar railways. For the project consultancy, OCG-JV is currently in effect.

Q: Can you explain to us about the Upper Myanmar Myitkyina Railways and the widely popular Yangon-Pyay railway upgrades?

tion projects for Mandalay-Myit-

kyina rail line and heavy machines were utilized on the 85th mile Mandalay-Myitkyina rail line to weld steel rails together. We are also getting help from Korea to make the track less step and lessen the curve in Gotauk-Mazar 23rd mile and Mawhan-Kardu 10th mile posts. The final report was sent on January 2019 and we're trying to get 100 million dollars funding for this. We have inspected 447 bridges on the 166 mile Yangon-Pyay rail track. We're working on securing financing from ADB to achieve a 120km/hr 20 ton Axle Load.

Q: Including the Yangon Circular Train, what other developments have been done in the railroad sector within the past year.

A: An Urban Transport Development long-term Plan in Greater Yangon (2016-2035) was drawn with the help of Japan. The detailed report which includes the Yangon Urban Mass Rapid Transit (YUMRT), North-South Road connecting Dala and Mingaladon spanning over 27 km and East-West Road between Hlaing Thar Yar- Toekyaung Lay of 25 km is currently being drafted with the help of the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) and is expected to be completed September 2019.

This is expected to alleviate much of Yangon's traffic problems and make transportation smoother. There are also plans to build more passenger coaches and locomotives. The Myitnge Carriage and Wagon Workshop and Napyitaw factory have built up to 10 new locomotives with 2000 horse power and substituted 5 new diesel engines with old ones. They refurbished a total of 432 locomotives upgraded (100 largescale and 79 mid-scale). With the help of China, Myanmar was able to build 21 passenger coaches in the 2018-2019 Financial Year in the Muitnge Carriage and Wag-

on Workshop. With the national budget, we were able to build 35 new passenger coaches and repaired 40 coaches more.

Running the New Passenger Carts

The new locomotive and passenger coaches with air bags started running on the Mandalay -Myitkyina line starting Dec 29, 2018. With the loan from the Republic of Korea, there are plans to buy 100 more coaches worth 45 million US dollars in the span of time three years (2017-2020). Design Meetings are currently taking place at the Myitnge Carriage and Wagon Workshop with production expected to end in 2020. Utilizing the interest free loans from the Republic of China of 80 million Yuan, Myanmar was able to buy 28 more passenger coaches in line with the Dec 3, 2018 Resolution of Hluttaw and the project is estimated to be completed within 2 years of its start date.

Lowering Frequency of Accidents

Within the financial year 2018-2019, there were a total of 277 accidents. There were 363 during 2016-2017 and 350 during 2017-2018 and the ministry is working on more educative talks so as to reduce the number of accidents.

Thingyan festival: Water guns from Thailand, China selling well in Myeik

WITH the Myanmar traditional water festival approaching, water guns and shooters from Thailand and China are selling well daily in Myeik Township of Taninthayi Region, said a seller near the Myeik clock tower.

Sales of water guns and shooters have picked up since the third week of March. The prices of water guns have declined this year compared to

last year. Most of the water guns enter Myanmar via Thailand and China. Although many kinds of water guns have entered the market, no new designs can be found in the market yet.

"Most buyers prefer products from Thailand. But the majority of buyers choose the Chinese-made ones because the Thailand products are more expensive. Children like

to play with water guns with backpacks. There is an abundant supply of water guns at shops this year compared with last year. But no new creative designs are seen. The festive season toys are selling well as the festival is drawing nearer," said Daw Tin Sein, the owner of Sein Gabar store near the Myeik clock tower.

Domestic gold prices likely to remain stable, say traders

GOLD prices have stabilized in the domestic market, with one tical of gold (one tical equal to 16.329 gm) currently being sold for about K1.04 million, said U Ohn Myaing, General Secretary, Myanmar Gold Entrepreneurs Association.

"For the time being, the market is seeing regular gold trading. Domestic gold prices are likely to remain stable in the market as global gold rates and dollar exchange rates have remained unchanged," he added.

"Currently, the gold market is witnessing regular buying and selling.

Therefore, prices are expected to remain steady because of stability in world gold prices and the dollar exchange rate. The current prices are fair for both buyers and sellers," said U Ohn Myaing.

"Local gold prices track global gold rates. Gold prices in the global market exceeded US\$1,300 per ounce in the final week of last month.

The prices have decreased to \$1,288 per ounce," said gold traders.

U Ohn Myaing said there is little difference between domestic and global gold prices.

"Currently, domestic gold prices have reached K1.04 million per tical, while global gold prices are approximately K1.038 million per tical.Domestic gold prices have decreased due to decline in gold prices in the global market," he said.

"In addition, gold prices are likely to see a downward trend if local demand declines," said U Myo Myint, the chair of the Yangon Region Gold Entrepreneurs Association.

According to traders, domestic gold prices stood at K1.05 million per tical between 17 and 29 January, K1.06 million between 30 January and 7 February, and K1.07 million from 8-18 February. They reached a record high of K1.08 million per tical between 19 and 21 February. The market then saw a gradual decline in prices, with gold touching K1.04 million.

Gold prices stood at K1.043 million per tical on 1 January in the domestic market. They reached K1.061 million on 31 January.

The prices rose to K1.087 million on 20 February from K1.058 million on 2 February.

Local gold prices reached K1.069 million on 21 March and then decreased to K1.048 million by the end of March.

Rice price slides as demand shrinks

THE price of broken rice is currently on the decline as demand from domestic as well as external markets has fallen off, according to the Wadan rice depot.

"Brewing businesses purchase broken rice. It is also demanded by exporters. But, purchases have come to a halt for now, and the price of broken rice has plunged in recent days, decreasing by K400-500 per bag. With the drop in price, rice milling businesses are not doing well," said U Zaw Khaing, joint secretary, Wadan rice depot.

Myanmar broken rice (B1/2) is currently priced at K16,300-16,500 per bag, while extra wellmixed (EWM) broken rice is being sold for K17,000 per bag. The prices are down K1,000 compared with last month.

"The price of EWM broken rice has decreased from K18,000 to 17,000 per bag, while the rate of B 1/2 has slipped from K17,300 to K16,300. The price gap is around K1,000 per bag," said U Zaw Khaing.

Myanmar's broken rice exports to China have been halted on account of China's crackdown on entry of illegal goods, said U Aung Than Oo, the chair of the Myanmar Rice Federation.

"The price of broken rice is

on the lower side. It cannot be exported to the Chinese market. The governments of China and Myanmar are still working on a Sanitary and Phytosanitary (SPS) Protocol for broken rice. Once the SPS agreement is reached, the broken rice market will stabilize," said U Aung Than Oo.

"A delegation led by Union Minister for Planning and Finance U Soe Win, which included members of the Republic fof the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry (UMFCCI), attended the 2nd China-Myanmar Economic Corridor Forum held in the Yunnan Province of China in February. The members of the delegation met with their counterparts in Yunnan and discussed increasing the quota limit by up to 400,000 tons. China had granted Myanmar a rice export quota of 100,000 tons in 2016," according to an MRF press release issued on 25 February.

Myanmar's broken rice is shipped to 25 countries. Between 1 April, 2018 and 1 March, 2019, over 393,790 metric tons of broken rice, worth US\$114.69 million, were sent to external markets, according to an announcement of the MRF. ■ (*Translated by Ei Myat Mon*)

AMCD launches sale of Kanthayar condominiums in Yangon

THE Asia Myanmar Consortium Development has launched the sale of condominiums from the Kanthayar project, which was successfully implemented with an investment of US\$25 million, according to the AMCD.

The sale is currently on at the office lobby of the Kanthayar Residence, located on the corner of U Aung Myat Street and Kanyeiktha Street in Mingalataungnyunt Township, downtown Yangon. The sale was launched on 5 April and will continue till 7 April. The Yoma Bank is offering a 25-year loan to condominium buyers.

U Kyaw Khine, the chair of the AMCD, said buyers will get ownership of the apartments in keeping with the Condominium Law. "This was not a build-operate-transfer (B.O.T) project. This was a joint project with the

Yangon City Development Committee. Hence, condominium owners will have rights provided by the law, including the right to mortgage their apartment with the bank," he said. Initiated in 2015, the Kanthayar project is now complete. The residential tower has 132 units, of which 100 units have already been sold. The current sale has been organized for the remaining 32 condominium units. The units are priced at K150,000-K200,000 per square feet.

U Nay Min Thu, the managing director of iMyanmarHouse. com, said only condominium apartments from the Kanthayar residential tower near Kandawgyi Lake have been put up for sale.

"Yoma Bank's home loan services are available for buyers to purchase the condominiums on a 25-year instalment plan. In addition, apartment owners may join Slade Property Services Co. Ltd. for rental services," he said.

The Kanthayar Center includes a residential tower, an office tower, service apartments, a five-star Wyndham hotel, a shopping center, and a JCGV cinema. (*Translated by Khaing Thanda Lwin*)

Kerry Logistics and Resource Group Logistics won the tender for construction of dry ports with the BOT system and made their building work at Ywarthargyi on November 18, 2018 and the Myitnge dry port has been opened on Jan 23, 2019. There were increase in cargo rail coaches with an average of two journeys for Yangon-Mandalay marking up to 69 round trips to date with a total of 3017 containers with the weight of 53786 tons transported.

Q: How are you working towards safety in the road transportation sector?

A: We have registration for cars, licenses for rental cars and drivers and other rules and regualtions for road transportation safety. We registered a total of 7.2 million cars in December 2018 compared to 5.5 million in March 2016. The accident rate has also gone down 9.26 per cent per 10,000 cars in 2013 to 7.18 per cent per 10,000 cars.

Q: How did the reform processes in Aviation Sector?

A: We are working towards bringing the airlines up to the International Air Transport Association (IATA) standard along with the international rules and regulation regarding safety, security and environmental management. There are plans to expand the runaway and rebuild the infrastructure on popular airports like Myitkyina, PutaO, Lashio, Heho, Minesat, Sittwe, Thandwe, Mann Aung, Loikaw and Nyaung U airports. For Heho, Mawlamyine and Kawthaung airports, we called for tenders and picked on Public-Private Partnerships (PPP) program while we have a tender out for Muse airport.

For remote areas such as PaLan, Chin State an airport is in development with the national budget to upgrade the ATR-72 aircraft capability airport to landing airplanes by 2020-2021. There are plans to build a Hantahwaddy international airport with the help of Japanese loans in negotiation. There were 9.9 million travelers into Myanmar in 2018, increase from 10.12 million in 2017 and 9.26 in 2016.

Q: Are there any difficulties running the Myanmar National Airways?

A: The airline was transformed on 2013-2014 financial

year with domestic flights that expanded to international flights. With the short amount of time that was make possible, it was a success. The airline currently runs to 28 domestic cities and international flights to Singapore, Thailand, Hong Kong, China and India regularly. Yangon -Pathein chartered flights are available starting December 25, 2018. There are a total of 16 aircrafts in 2016: 3 Boeing, 2 Embraer, 5 ATR, 4 Caravan. 2 Craft but now the airline has expanded to have a total of 17 aircrafts: 4 Boeing, 2 Embraer, 9 ATR and 2 Caravan. We started doing large scale renovations on the ATR starting April to get the European Aviation Safety Agency (EASA) certificate in hope to save the country some losses regarding operation costs. There were a total of 1,709,715 passengers during 2018, an increase from 1459,882 in 2017 and 1041981 in 2016.

Q: Did you encounter any natural obstacles while operating the water transport?

A: There is a total of 6737 km of waterway in Myanmar with the three major rivers (Ayeyarwaddy, Chindwin and Thanlwin) combined. The rivers are unpredictable with their levels, sedimentary deposits, flood, eroation and change in directon of flow of water. We have prioritized making sure the water flow is good in 40 areas in the 2018-2019 year along with prevention measures against landslides in 683 especially in the NamYamand Moko streams, Thaung Yin and Shwe Li River, Maesaingmae Hawt and Nam Want. Landslide prevention walls of 64137 feet were added from 39000 the previous year.

Q: How about floods?

A: We are forming committees in States and Regions to deal with floods, especially for the coming three years. There is a total of 115 work plans and 11 work plans are to be done completely in 2018-2019. Projects are being implemented as well in the Mandalay -Myitkyina Railway, Yangon-Mawlamyine railway and highway, Yangon-Mandalay railway and highway and Hpa-An for flood protection.

All round development in Ayeyarwaddy Delta

With the help of 100 million US dollars from the World Bank, the government is working towards developing the delta region all around. This includes the Tuntay Canal Development Project with 61.3 million USD loaned from the Republic of Korea and 7.9 million Kyat budget from the National budget. These projects to dig trenches, maintain coasts and prevent floods in the Tuntay area will be carried out from 2018-2023.

Rakhine Waterway development

The Japanese government has contributed three Kisapanadi vessels from March 2017 to March 2019 and by using them there are more services in the waterways of Rakhine.

Q: What are some significant changes you have notice at the ports? A: We have started rebuilding the Mandalay jetty with JICA's fund of 55 million USD starting November 2018 with plans to build a 180 m bridge, 29540 sq meters for container yard and 2 drawbridges of 236 m and 183 meters. Japan will be calling for tenders starting April with plans to start construction in 2019 and completed 2020.

Upgrading of Yangon Port

There is a total of 9 ports along the coastline spanning over 1385 miles with Yangon s Erving as a main port processing 90% of shipment with a total of 41 bridges for vessels of international standards to dock. There are plans to build more ports/bridges/ docks such as Green Asia 200 m terminal, Elite Petro Chemical terminal Wilmar International docking bridge and International Bulk Terminal Thilawa . Puma Energy Asia Sun bridge is 135 m long and two others built recently with Japan's ODA loan is 400 m long each. Kyimyindaing International Port Terminal is 80 m. During the administration, there were a total of 3035123 containers with 76323581 tons handled.

There are also plans to improve on our safety procedures regarding water vessels such as moving the Pilot Station during bad weather, building a state of the art 3 story building to move the marine traffic control by March 2019. We are using the Japanese grant of 14.27 million USD to digitalize Port-EDI between 2016-18.

Q: Regarding communication, can you explain to us about the improvements in mobile connectivity.

A: The new internet era in Myanmar began in 2014. Thanks to the investments flooding in the industry, we have about 99 percent mobile penetration in the market with 53.74 million people estimated with access to a mobile phone. The internet penetration has jumped from 55.41% to 82.56% with coverage for up to 92% of the people. There is a total of 10,000 telecom towers in 2016 with the number approaching 21,000 in 2019. Fibers cables run up to 49452km from the 68130 km planned. The bandwidth has also increased to 613.30 Gbps.

Q: What about efforts towards an e-Government?

A: A master plan for e-governance has been drawn on 2016 with a committee formed on Jan 2018 to carry out the plan. Myanmar National Portal was also launched September 2018.

A system in Myanmar

The National Standard Council is trying to implement a mandate released on February 2019 on installing the International Standard Organisation (ISO) 10646 approved Unicode font for Burmese with plans to implement it national wide starting April 2019 for telecom operators and government offices.

The servers for respective departments have been built in a Tier-2 Data center in Naypyi taw with plans to build a Tier-3 e-Government Integrated Data Center(eGIDC) worth 93 millino USD with a loan from Korea starting December 2018. The Loan Pledge Acceptance Letter was sent to Korea and the eGIDC is expected go e completed in 2022.

Q: What about the Satellite system?

A: We are still working on launching one. We have rented the MyanmarSat 1 Condosat satellite from Intelsat Satellite Operator with 862 Mhertz on a Indefeasible Right of Use which is going to end in 15 years starting this September. Currently, Myanmar Aviation University iw working with Japan's Hokkaido University to launch and Earth Observation Satellite (EOS) starting 2019-2020.

Q: Can you explain to us about people oriented postal service?

A: We are working to includes all domestic and international postal services such as mail and package delivery with tracking, collecting fees for mobile apps, car fares, online shopping businesses, mobile money and bank representatives.

The Mobile Post Office has also been set up at crowded areas in 2016 such as in Yangon, Mandalay and Naypitaw. The postal services of Myanmar have increased its ranking from 126 in 2018 to 91 in the Universal Postal Union.

Q: What about the third year for the Department of Meteorology and Hydrology?

A: We have real time weather stations installed at Kyauk Phyu, Yangon and Mandalay. We are also working towards installing a station that can detect for storms for the whole country every 15 minutes in Dawei in collaboration with Japan. Within the 3 years of the administration, 2 weather stations and 5 seismic stations were added to the department.

British PM asks EU to delay Brexit until 30 June

LONDON (United Kingdom)— Prime Minister Theresa May asked the European Union on Friday to delay Britain's departure from the bloc until 30 June, with the extension ending earlier if parliament approves her Brexit deal.

"The United Kingdom proposes that (the extension) should end on 30 June 2019. If the parties are able to ratify before this date, the government proposes that the period should be terminated earlier," May wrote in a letter to EU Council president Donald Tusk. Downing Street released May's letter moments after a senior EU official told AFP that Tusk was proposing to postpone Brexit day by up to a year, also pending parliament's approval of the EU-UK Withdrawal Agreement.

Prime Minister Theresa May asked the European Union on Friday to delay Britain's departure from the bloc until 30 June, with the extension ending earlier if parliament approves her Brexit deal. May also told EU Council president Donald Tusk in a formal letter that Britain would start preparing for its participation in European Parliament elections in case it is still a member of the bloc when they begin on 23 May.

"The United Kingdom proposes that (the extension) should end on 30 June 2019. If the parties are able to ratify before this date, the government proposes that the period should be terminated earlier," May's letter said.

Downing Street released May's request moments after a senior EU official told AFP that Tusk was proposing to postpone Brexit day by up to a year, also pending parliament's approval of the EU-UK Withdrawal Agreement. The current deadline is 12 April, which has already been pushed back once from 29 March because of the UK parliament's failure on three occasions to back the deal May signed with the other 27 EU leaders in December.

In her letter, May said she wanted to make sure that Britain left the bloc after 46 years in an orderly manner, with an agreement that could help unwind intricate political, security, diplomatic and economic ties. "The government's policy has always been and remains to leave the European Union in an orderly way, and without undue delay," May wrote. "The government agrees that leaving with a deal is the best outcome," she said.

European elections

May is racing against the clock in a desperate bid to get her deal approved in time for an EU leaders' summit in Brussels on Wednesday, when a formal decision on any extension will be made. EU nations must give unanimous backing to any new deadline. Some, like French President Emmanuel Macron, have said they want to hear a clear reason from May as to why Brexit should be delayed yet again - a move that would add to uncertainties weighing on business across the bloc. May's team is currently holding negotiations with leaders from Britain's main opposition Labour Party in a bid to secure enough votes to push through her deal on a fourth attempt. But the talks so far have failed to clinch a breakthrough.

"I don't think we are quite at the point where the government can indicate where their concessionary strategy might apply," deputy Labour leader Tom Watson told BBC radio.—AFP

US revokes ICC prosecutor's visa over Afghan probe

THE HAGUE (Netherlands) — The United States has revoked the visa for the chief prosecutor of the International Criminal Court, her office said Friday, over a possible investigation of American soldiers' actions in Afghanistan.

Prosecutor Fatou Bensouda would continue to pursue her duties for the Hague-based court "without fear or favour" despite the ban, her office said in a statement.

The move against Bensouda, a Gambian national, comes weeks after US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo announced restrictions on ICC staff who probe US or allied personnel.

"What we can confirm is that the US authorities have revoked the prosecutor's visa for entry into the US," the Office of the Prosecutor of the ICC said in a statement. Bensouda's office said that under the Rome statute governing the ICC — which Washington has declined to join since it was set up in 2002 — she had an "independent and impartial mandate".

"The prosecutor and her office will continue to undertake that statutory duty with utmost commitment and professionalism, without fear or favour," it added.

The US decision was not expected to impact Bensouda if she is travelling to the United Nations in New York where she gives regular briefings to the UN Security Council on investigation, it said.

There was no immediate comment on Bensouda's visa ban from Washington.

Bensouda asked ICC judges in November 2017 for authorisation to open an investigation into alleged war crimes in Afghanistan by the Taliban, Afghan government forces and international forces including US troops.

The court has not yet decided whether to launch a full-blown probe.

However, the administration of US President Donald Trump has struck preemptively, with Pompeo warning on 15 March that the ICC was "attacking America's rule of law".

Pompeo said he was "announcing a policy of US visa restrictions on those individuals directly responsible for any ICC investigation of US personnel."

"If you're responsible for the proposed ICC investigation of US personnel in connection with the situation in Afghanistan you should not assume that you still have, or will get, a visa or that you will permitted to enter the United States," Pompeo added.—AFP

Turkey opposition says ahead in Istanbul election recount

ANKARA (Turkey) — Turkey's opposition candidate for Istanbul mayor Ekrem Imamoglu said Friday he was still winning by nearly 19,000 votes after the ruling AKP demanded a recount following Sunday's tight election race.

President Recep Tayyip Erdogan and his AKP suffered an upset in local elections when results showed the party lost the capital Ankara and was narrowly defeated in Istanbul, the country's largest city and economic hub. The two rival Istanbul candidates declared victory soon after the vote when initial results showed them in a dead heat. AKP appealed after electoral authorities later said Imamoglu had taken a very slim lead.

In an interview with Fox Haber broadcaster, CHP opposition candidate Imamoglu said the difference between himself and the AKP's candidate, Binali Yildirim, was now 18,742 votes.

He said nearly 120,000 previously annulled votes had been recounted in 17 Istanbul districts, with 2,184 extra votes being allowed for Yildirim, and 785 for himself. Imamoglu estimated the final difference could finish between 18,000 to 20,000 once counting ended, probably by Sunday. Nearly 200,000 more votes still need to be recounted, he said.

"It should be over by the end of the weekend," he told the station. The AKP has said the recount will show its candidate won.

Election authorities provide ongoing recount details to observers from both parties to ensure transparency. Political parties have until 10 April to challenge the results.—AFP

Forever young: study uncovers protein that keeps skin youthful

TOKYO (Japan) — Beauty might only be skin deep, but for those wondering how to keep that skin young, scientists may have found an answer in the form of a protein that encourages cell competition.

The prosaically named CO-L17A1 might not sound like a fountain of youth, but the new study suggests it does the heavy lifting when it comes to keeping skin intact and unimpaired.

The protein works by encouraging cell competition, a key process to maintain tissue fitness. That effectively "drives out" weaker cells while encouraging replication of stronger ones.

"Damaged or stressed stem cells can be selectively eliminated by intact stem cells every day in our skin," said Emi Nishimura, a professor at the Tokyo Medical and Dental University's Stem Cell Biology department, who led the research.

But ageing results in a depletion of COL17A1, as do familiar enemies of youthful skin, like UV radiation and other stress factors.

And when that happens, weaker cells replicate, leaving the skin thinner, more prone to damage and slower to heal.

The research published Thursday in the journal Nature is based on investigations using mice tails, which share many of the same characteristics as human skin. After confirming the importance of COL17A1, the team decided to investigate whether they could stimulate the protein once it was depleted — effectively looking for compounds that could kickstart the anti-ageing process in skin. They isolated two chemical compounds — Y27632 and apocynin — and tested both on skin cells, with positive results.

"Application of these drugs to full-thickness skin wounds significantly promoted wound repair," the study said.

The two compounds point to ways of "facilitating skin regeneration and reducing skin ageing," the study added.

In a review of the study commissioned by Nature, two professors from the University of Colorado said cell competition had previously only been studied extensively in fruit flies.

The research "provides evidence that healthy cells in mammals can also efficiently repopulate adult tissues, replacing unfit or damaged cells," wrote professors Ganna Bilousova and James DeGregori.

And they said the research offered "proof-of-principle" that the two chemical compounds could combat ageing.

"Future studies are needed to determine the mechanisms of cell competition in other tissues, and to identify compounds capable of reversing ageing in other organs," they said.

Nishimura told AFP that the work could eventually lead to products like creams or tablets that could stop skin deterioration and promote repair. "We are going to collaborate with pharmaceutical or cosmetic companies for the clinical use of the chemicals," she said.—AFP

Roscosmos vows support to S7 Group in Sea Launch project

MOSCOW — Russian space corporation Roscosmos is set to help S7 Group in the development of the Sea Launch project after the tragic death of the company's co-owner Natalya Fileva, Roscosmos Director General Dmitry Rogozin told the Komsomolskaya Pravda radio station.

"I hope that the [Sea Launch] project would live on. Apparently, Roscosmos will have to be not just a partner, but a helping hand," he said. "I will do so once all those mourning ceremonies are over.

We will meet with [S7 Group Director General] Vladislav Filev, and I will offer him all kind of cooperation on our behalf."

Rogozin said he "took to heart" the death of Fileva, who was travelling on board a private plane that crashed in Germany on Sunday evening,

"She was a tough negotiator. She came and demanded this or that thing from Roscosmos. And the project kept moving forward," the Roscosmos chief said.

S7 Group is the owner of the assets of the Sea Launch rocket and space compound where 36 launches (including 32 successful) were carried out by the end of May 2014.

The sea compound comprises the Odyssey floating launch platform and the assembly and command vessel where rockets are assembled and control of prelaunch operations is exercised.

The vessels are based in the state of California, the United States.—Tass ■

Boeing delays capsule's first space test flight

WASHINGTON (United States) — Boeing has delayed from April to August its test flight for its Starliner capsule, intended to carry American astronauts to the International Space Station.

The US space agency NASA blamed the delay on "limited launch opportunities" in April and May from Cape Canaveral, Florida.

It noted that the August launch target is a "working date and to be confirmed."

The Starliner spacecraft, which is in the final phase of ground tests, is set to be launched into space atop a United Launch Alliance Atlas V rocket.

If the unmanned test goes well, the capsule's next flight will

have three astronauts aboard -- NASA's Nicole Mann and Mike Fincke, along with Chris Ferguson of Boeing.

Ultimately, Starliner will be one of two American vehicles used to carry NASA astronauts to the ISS -- the other is SpaceX's Dragon capsule.

In March, SpaceX successfully completed a nearly weeklong test mission in space. The Dragon capsule successfully docked at the ISS before returning to Earth. The first manned mission aboard the Dragon spacecraft is set to take place by the end of the year, with the date due to be confirmed "in the next couple weeks," according to NASA.—AFP

Following the bout on Sunday, Hasegawa had said he suffered a big injury as one of his ribs "stabbed" him in the lung.

"Sorry to my supporters. I lost it. My ribs were broken during the game, and I've got about 2 liters of blood in my lungs, so I'm going to have an emergency surgery," he stated on his social media page.

"I'm sorry, everyone who supported me!" Hasegawa stated on Twitter. "It is the result of working out with all my might from preparation. Thank you for your support. I will be hospitalized again, I got blood in my lungs. I will be hospitalized and treated," he stated.

The bout on Sunday was the second face-off between the two fighters. In June last year, Aung La N Sang had successfully defended his title during their bout in Yangon with a fifthround TKO delivered at 23 minutes.—Lynn Thit (Tgi) ■

Woods 'on track' for pursuit of fifth Green Jacket

AUGUSTA (United States) — Tiger Woods heads back to Augusta National to resume his pursuit of a 15th major championship with a firmer grip on the realities of his game and fitness than he could claim in his long-awaited Masters return last year.

"This year, to be able to

ramp up a schedule and be able to know what I can and can't do going into the event, is a lot more comforting than this has been in the previous years because it's been kind of an unknown going into that event," said Woods, who played 18 tournaments in his 2018 comeback season along with the Ryder Cup and has teed it up in five events this season.

"Tm right there where I need to be," Woods said in March. "Tve gotten a little bit more consistent with my play, and I think that everything is headed on track toward April."

For Woods, April is virtually

synonymous with the Masters. He won the first of his four Green Jackets there in historic style in 1997, completed the "Tiger Slam" there in 2001, successfully defended the crown in 2002 and won in dramatic style in 2005 with a chip-in to force a playoff in which he beat Chris DiMarco.—AFP

Marathon man Lonyangata eyes Paris record from Rift Valley hideout

ITEN(Kenya) — As dawn breaks high in Kenya's Rift Valley, car headlights pick out groups of elite athletes, mere silhouettes on roadsides as their grinding daily training routine gets under way. Coach Lawrence Saina, himself a sub-2hr 10min marathon runner in his day, oversees nine of his Kenyan proteges, sending them out on a 40-kilometre (25-mile) run.

Hitting the tarmac under a wan rising sun, the athletes take advantage of the cardiovascular benefits from training at an altitude of 2,500 metres (8,200ft), which boosts oxygen-carrying red blood cells. "Today, it won't be quick," said Saina, his charges still clocking mind-boggling speeds of 3min 42sec per kilometre, far removed from the average runner. These are, after all, elite athletes: among the nine breaking sweat in the cool morning are Saina's younger brother Emmanuel, fourth in the Dubai marathon in January in 2hr 05min 02sec. He is due to race over the 42km distance in Rotterdam on Sunday.—AFP
