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New Year Greetings for ME 1381 from President U Win Myint

My dear esteemed citizens,

On this auspicious New Year day I send these greetings to all esteemed citizens with blessings for your good health and well-being.

My dear esteemed citizens,

On the day I took my oath of office as President in the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw on 30th March 2018, I spoke about the three priority tasks of our Union Government. Furthermore, I have already spoken about the 11 tasks that needed to be carried out for the implementation of the above three priority tasks in my Myanmar New Year day message of last year.

As my New Year day message for this year, I report to you how much our Union Government has been able to achieve in the implementation of our goals during this third year.

Our Union Government has undertaken sector-wise reforms. If we were to show visible and tangible results you would see our successes to a certain extent in the area of preventing and combatting corruption, a chronic disease which has taken deep roots for many administrations. Our Union Government has been taking action against corruption in accordance with the law without favoring anyone with only the interest of the people and the country in our minds. We were able to establish branch offices of the Anti-corruption Commission in the regions/states and set up Corruption Prevention Units (CPUs) in the ministries.

With regard to combatting narcotic drugs, apart from the usual actions, we have initiated a special project by making it easy to report direct to the Office of the President. We have elevated the powers of the anti-narcotics police and on the other hand we have started using the reward and punishment system effectively. Because of this it may be seen that we have been more effective and successful.

Our ability to transfer the General Administration Department to the Ministry of the Office of the Union Government is also a significant reform measure because the GAD is an administrative organization that has daily contact with the people. This is because as our Union Government implements the reform measures it is necessary to begin our reform measures from the grass roots level and the GAD is one of the key departments.

We were able to give more agricultural loans than in previous years to improve the lives of farmers; at the same time efforts are being made to ensure that unnecessary obstacles and delays are eliminated in the settlement of land ownership cases. In the same way, in the case of lands which have been confiscated, to review these cases in accordance with State policies; to return lands which have been released to the original owners; and in the case of lands which cannot be released efforts are being made to en-

sure that reasonable compensation and settlement money are being given. You may all see that compared to previous years effective and expeditious actions are being taken.

The Union Legal Aid Board has been established and instructed to provide assistance and support to people in need of legal services who have been accused, detained, arrested, taken to court, sentenced, and imprisoned, namely poor and destitute people, children, women, elderly, people suffering from infectious diseases, migrant workers and displaced persons.

With regard to human rights, because of efforts being made to organize training courses and seminars, talks to create awareness and spread knowledge, translation of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights from the Myanmar language to 10 ethnic languages, you may all see that we have been able to give more protection in cases of human rights abuses.

Furthermore, we have been able to preserve and record the traditions and culture of ethnic nationals which are on the verge of extinction, and to prevent the disappearance of their language and literature.

My dear esteemed citizens,

The amount of Foreign Direct Investment that have flowed into the country from 1st April of the 2016-2017 to 31st March of the 2018-2019 fiscal amounted to USD 15.99 billion for a total of (584) projects from 22 foreign countries. These projects have been reviewed and approved by the Myanmar Investment Commission during the three year period.

During a similar period, the Myanmar Investment Commission reviewed and approved (359) projects submitted by Myanmar nationals amounting to Kyats 7390.34 billion.

During the first six months period of April to September 2018, the rate of increase of our GDP was 6.5 per cent.

During 2018, our country was able to meet all three indicators to be removed from the list of LDC (Least Developed Country) countries.

On the other hand we have imposed tighter administrative controls over departments that have lagged behind in the reform process. We have been making necessary changes to transform the judiciary into an impartial body depended upon by the people and well-respected by them. We built low-cost and affordable housing for the citizens. We have also been able to build housing for government employees to enable them to live in dignity after retirement. We raised the salaries and pensions of government employees to a reasonable amount. We are now giving out pensions using the Wave money mobile system. We were also able to raise the minimum wage of workers. We are making efforts to create more job opportunities within the country and at the same time creating job opportunities in foreign countries. We put in more efforts to protect our migrant workers working abroad and to ensure that they receive all their rights and entitlements. I have noted that measures have been taken for the safety and security of our migrant workers. I have also noted the implementation and emergence of more youth training schools, domestic science schools, and modern garment manufacturing schools. I have also noted rural vocational training schools and projects for training rural people for better paying jobs and obtaining clean drinking water.

We have been able to do more for providing electricity all over the country. We are able to build roads and bridges from east to west and north to south for ease of travel. We were able to upgrade roads and bridges according to each region. We were able to expand the territory for promoting tourism. These included granting visas using the E-visa system and upgrading of airports. We also accomplished projects for protection of river embankments and repair works for

embankments. We are also implementing projects for the sustainable management of our natural resources and projects for reforestation. We opened vocational training courses in IDP camps. We also provided financial support to handicapped people. We were able to formulate and issue laws, by laws, regulations, procedures and rules for the efficient and proper use of public funds without wastage in places where they are needed. In cases where there had been lack of responsibility and accountability we have taken effective action. We can thus say that all these measures have been taken in the interests of the people and that to a certain extent there has been progress.

We were able to successfully convene the Union Peace Conference – 21st Century Panglong 3rd Session and sign agreements of fundamental principles for a total of (14) points, namely 4 in the political sector, 1 in the economic sector, 7 in the social sector and 2 in the land and natural environment sector.

Mindsets and beliefs that have become habitual for over half a century, habits that are difficult to get rid of, and ways of doing things which are now ingrained in the mind, in spite of obstacles and efforts to cause problems along the path of democratic transition, within this short period of time we may see visible signs of progress. These may be seen as the fruits of success born out of a common belief and commitment that exists between the Government and the people working together in trust and good spirits.

In spite of all these successes and progress, at the same time in the international arena we may see that we are facing and solving efforts to put pressure, hurl criticisms and condemnations, and efforts to take action against us with regard to the Rakhine state issue. We are also facing and solving problems such as security breaches in northern Rakhine, matters relating to repatriation, and internally displaced persons due to conflicts occurring in certain areas. We are also meeting these challenges and solving them. I wish to state that, in fact I regard these difficulties as good opportunities for us to nurture our collective strength.

No matter how many challenges, difficulties and crises our Union Government may have to face, we firmly believe that with the understanding, compassion, participation, and cooperation of the people we will successfully reach our goal of establishing a Democratic Federal Republic. I wish to remind the people to be careful not to fall into the trap of religious, racial and political conflicts. We should also be careful of incidents designed to divert our attention. I also want you all to be careful not to be affected and swayed by efforts to incite the people by making reprisals.

“ I will carry out the implementation of the priority goals of the Union Government which are as follows:

1. Rule of law and improvement of the socio-economic life of the people,
2. National Reconciliation and internal peace,
3. Amending the Constitution which is the foundation for building a Democratic Federal Republic.

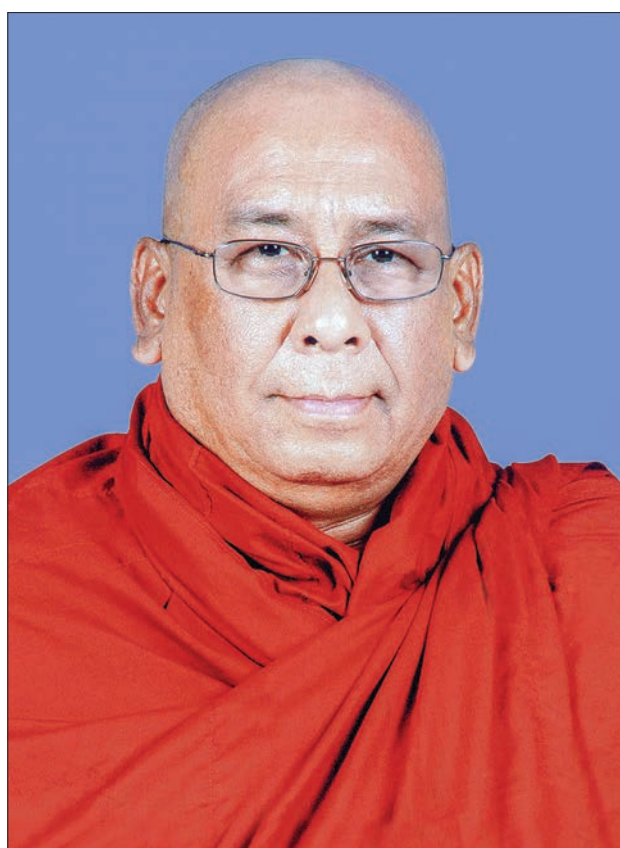
Myanmar enters New Year 1381 ME: Greeting of Sayadaws


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May a democratic federal Union be established with collective strength of people incoming years

Accomplishments of Nay Pyi Taw Council: Focusing on development, cleanliness and rule of law in urban and rural areas

THE Nay Pyi Taw Council is setting its goal of development in both towns and villages in sight and is working diligently to achieve this. During the third year of the current administration, the Nay Pyi Taw Council has accomplished several work plans in Nay Pyi Taw's development, carrying out cleanliness of the city and upholding rule of law.

The media team enjoyed the chance to interview with the Nay Pyi Taw Council Chairman Dr. Myo Aung about the progress of the council during the third year of the incumbent government.

Q: What are some of the work plans the Nay Pyi Taw Council completed during the three years of the current administration?

A: There are 8 townships with 1 million residents in Nay Pyi Taw: around 350,000-400,000 is government employees while 650,000-700,000 are local populace. The main focus -especially in our third year- was to fill the gaps in health care, electricity, transportation and education that people need and the Nay Pyi Taw Council embraced the measures with great vigor. In addition, we are working with the Nay Pyi Taw Development Committee to bring life to the city with clean streets, thriving greenery and neat public spaces in line with the laws and regulations in place.

Q: How is the council developing the education sector, amongst others?

A: In the education sector, we had over kyats 5492 million approved for the 106 work plans during the 2018-2019 financial year using the different funding sources from national to other donations. Over 96 basic education schools have been upgraded with additional 566 teachers employed on the national and regional levels along with introducing the new curriculum.

Q: What about the health sector for the public?

A: The council has spent over kyats 1700 million on 24 different work plans for its 6 month mini-budget. Our current emphasis is on immunization program such diseases as polio, diphtheria and acute pneumonia. There were no health outbreaks last year. There is also the 1000 bed Nay Pyi Taw hospital with 23 specialist units. Our biggest accomplishment in last year has been on the new wing for operating heart surgery. We operated on 79 patients successfully in our first batch and has treated over 100 patients over the 5 months. There is also the new X-ray machine installed that reduces the side-effects for the operator. Also, as part of the One Stop Service - a new initiative by the current administration- we treat and house child sexual abuse victims and orphaned/abandoned babies temporarily before handling them with the respective

government departments.

Q: What about improvements regarding infrastructure such as roads and bridges building?

A: The council is focusing on the big roads to connect the villages. There are a total of 624 work plans with kyats 31814 million budget from different sources for funding. These are spent towards upgrading existing infrastructure such as the Yangon-Mandalay highway with proper drainage so there will be no floods during monsoon.

Q: Can you talk to us more about the Irrigation, Livestock and Farmland sectors?

A: Nay Pyi Taw has a lot of farmers and most of their livelihood is working in the farms. This made Nay Pyi Taw very self-sufficient in the region regarding

staples. There are over 700,000 farmers working on rice paddy fields of 17000 acres producing up till 15 million tons of grains. The council is building drainage systems so there will not be floods during heavy rains. In the 2018-19 year alone, these systems have protected up till 2400 acres of land from flood. Regarding livestock, the council is also distributing vaccines along with giving training on raising livestock to over 5000 people.

Q: Can you elaborate more on distributing electricity?

A: The biggest advantage for Nay Pyi Taw is that we get our energy from dams including upper and middle Paunglaung dams. Out of the 796 villages in Nay Pyi Taw Council Area, 432 villages have access to electricity with plans for the national grid to roll out to 48

more villages. The rest are also planned to gain access through the 2019-2020 and 2025-2026 financial years as we build more substations and wire lines.

Q: What about access to clean water?

A: There are a total of 30 dams that Nay Pyi Taw Development Committee is in charge of and 10 other managed by the Irrigation Department for drinking water. We also build wells for areas that the dams cannot reach. During the 2018-2019 financial year, there was a budget of kyats 6200 million for over 100 work plans.

Q: Can you elaborate on the plans for the socioeconomic development in the area?

A: Every year at Uttara Thiri Township, the residents are often burdened by floods in the area.

With the council's work plans activities, we managed to save over 2900 houses and 3500 acres of farm land from floods. There are also 43 additional housing units built for government employees in the 2017-18 financial year and 76 more during the 2018-19 financial year that is almost 20% finished. For socioeconomic development, there are more than 22 vocational training opened and planning to organize the 72 training workshops with a kyats 135 million budget planned for the 2018-2019 financial year.

Q: What about regarding rule of law?

A: There were educative talks by the law enforcements officers educating people on crime. There are 51 CCTV cameras that operate 24/7 around the gates of the towns. We have also amped up our efforts against drugs, busting 93 cases

alone last year.

Q: Can you explain to us about the small loans program with little interest that is available for Nay Pyi Taw locals?

A: EXIM Bank is working towards giving small loans with minimal interest to start farmers up for their crops. This year, the bank was able to lend to 22001 members for around kyats 3366 million. Such kind of systems protect farmers against loan sharks and lowers their interest by heart. For other SME loans, the second round of the SME program loaned kyats 4132 million.

Q: What about the efforts towards a clean city?

A: There was a new market opened last year - the Aung Zabu Market. Building such markets takes the vendors off the streets, keeping the streets cleaner and also helping with traffic and trash created from the sales. There were also 77 concrete bridges built, with over 3244 feet long roads built in townships in Nay Pyi Taw Council Area. We also decided to give out tenders to build water-fountain park in 2018 and are already drawing out tender application outlines and requirements.

Q: Any additional comments?

A: There are 5 main roadmaps that our senior advisor has given. Within those, there is a call for discussion regarding development. Our focus is tourism. We are currently working on building a studio for entertainment on an international scale for international attraction. Hopefully, our department contributes to the best of our abilities to aid in developing not only Nay Pyi Taw, but the country as a whole.

that it will be able to accommodate more patients.

A unique thing we have done is regarding illegal squatters. There are over 1200 people illegally squatting in Nay Pyi Taw. We have started projects on building affordable housing on a 15 year installments.

Q: What about preventative measures against natural disasters?

A: Nay Pyi Taw, like other states and regions in Myanmar, experiences a lot of natural disasters with a total of 85 last year. This affected around 934 households with a total of 19000 people with 86 million kyats aid distributed for rehabilitation. There have been educational talks for natural disasters and earthquake simulations along with up till 227722 students trained by volunteer groups on aiding during a natural disaster.

Q: Can you elaborate more on the Smart cities initiative?

A: Nay Pyi Taw is part of the ASEAN Smart Cities Network and is working towards the status through an Action Plan to improve on three areas. The Hotel and embassy zones have been selected as a pilot area with smart street lighting installed in collaboration with Singapore. E-Government along with public services using ICT are also being implemented towards this step. The GIS database is also under construction so that people can look up electricity voltages and crowds in certain places online. The GIS pilot project is currently implemented in Thapayay Gone district.

Q: Any additional comments?

A: There are 5 main roadmaps that our senior advisor has given. Within those, there is a call for discussion regarding development. Our focus is tourism. We are currently working on building a studio for entertainment on an international scale for international attraction. Hopefully, our department contributes to the best of our abilities to aid in developing not only Nay Pyi Taw, but the country as a whole.

644 traffic mishaps reported in Yangon Region in Jan-Mar

A TOTAL OF 644 road accidents were reported in Yangon Region between January and March, according to an official with the No. 2 Traffic Police Unit (Yangon).

In January, 85 people were killed and 269 injured in 232 accidents, while in February, 53 people were killed and 174

were injured in 194 mishaps. Meanwhile, in March, 59 people died and 282 were injured in 218 accidents.

Of the total accidents, 410 cases were reported in the Yangon City Development Committee area, in which, 135 people were reported dead and 434 injured.

Last year, 38 accidents were reported in Yangon Region during the water festival, between 13 and 16 April. Of them, only two accidents were caused due to merry-makers and revellers playing with water, while the rest occurred due to other reasons. To reduce road accidents, the

traffic police are conducting regular awareness talks and distributing pamphlets. The traffic police have filed charges against suspected reckless drivers under Sections 279, 337, 338, and 304 (A) of the Penal Code. — Phyo Cho ■

Indonesia's 'everyman' leader on track to beat firebrand ex-general

JAKARTA (Indonesia) — Indonesia's Joko Widodo was on track to be re-elected leader of the world's third-biggest democracy as unofficial results put him in a comfortable lead over firebrand ex-general Prabowo Subianto after voting closed Wednesday across the 17,000-island archipelago.

While official results are not due until next month, a series of so-called "quick counts" by pollsters showed Widodo as much as 11 percentage points ahead.

The vote ended at 1:00 pm (0600 GMT) in Sumatra, although some of the 800,000 polling stations across the volcano-dotted nation remained open late due to delays and long queues.

The quick counts have proven reliable indicators in past elections, but Widodo held off declaring victory.

"We've all seen exit poll and quick count numbers, but we still need to wait for the official results," he told cheering supporters in Jakarta.

His 67-year-old rival — who

lost to Widodo in their 2014 presidential contest and warned he would challenge this year's results if he lost — insisted that exit polls suggested he was in the lead. He did not cite specific evidence. "I'm calling on my supporters to keep calm and don't get provoked," he said.

The campaign was punctuated by bitter mudslinging and a slew of fake news online — much of it directed at the presidential contenders. "I hope after this that there will be a call for reconciliation because... we've been living in a very polarised atmosphere," political analyst Gun Gun Heryanto told Kompas TV.

Papua to Sumatra

From the jungles of Borneo to the slums of Jakarta, Wednesday saw millions of Indonesians cast their ballots in one of the world's biggest exercises in democracy.

Horses, elephants, motorbikes, boats and planes were pressed into service to get ballot boxes out across the vast country

that is home to hundreds of ethnic groups and languages.

More than 190 million voters were asked to choose between the incumbent Widodo and his fiery nationalist rival, who has strong ties to the country's three-decade Suharto dictatorship.

The call to prayer had rang out as voting began at first light in restive Papua province in the east of the 4,800 kilometre-long (3,000 mile) Muslim majority nation.

Leading in pre-vote polls, Widodo, 57, pointed to his ambitious drive to build much-needed roads, airports and other infrastructure across Southeast Asia's largest economy.

But Widodo, a political outsider with an everyman personality when he swept to victory in 2014, has seen his rights record criticised owing to an uptick in discriminatory attacks on religious and other minorities.

His choice of conservative cleric Ma'ruf Amin as his running mate also raised fears about the future of Indonesia's reputation for moderate Islam.—AFP ■

Singapore's Changi Airport opens mega mall, boosting air hub status

SINGAPORE — Singapore's Changi Airport on Wednesday opened a S\$1.7 billion (about \$1.26 billion) retail and nature-themed complex that aims to give it a competitive edge as an air hub in the region.

The 135,700 square metre, 10-story complex, named Jewel Changi Airport, offers 280 retail and food outlets as well as a hotel and is linked to Changi's Terminals 1, 2 and 3.

It is more than just a shopping mall as it houses the world's largest man-made indoor waterfall, surrounded by a lush artificially created rainforest to give shoppers a unique combination of both retail experience and leisure. Standing 40 metres tall, the gigantic circular water feature has become the main attraction for visitors with its water plunging from a height of about seven stories from an oculus in the huge glass roof of the building. The climate around the waterfall is controlled to appear cool and misty.

The complex, designed by world-renowned architect Moshe Safdie, is aimed at turning the airport into a tourist destination and attracting more transit visitors.

Taking advantage of Singapore's abundant rainfall all-year round, the waterfall uses rainwater that has been funneled into it, with the water also diverted for irrigation of indoor plants.

Japanese firms have carved

out a presence at the mall, with cosmetics giant Shiseido Co. having secured the naming rights for the indoor forest around the waterfall. Shiseido Forest Valley has more than 900 trees and palms and about 60,000 shrubs spread over a 4-storey incline.

Pokemon Center Singapore, the first shop outside Japan dedicated to selling merchandise related to the popular video game, is also there, in addition to fashion accessory maker Motherhouse Co. and lifestyle retailers Tokyu Hands Inc. and Ryohin Keikaku Co, provider of Muji brand products. Sabrina Stefani, 33, who visited the complex during a pre-opening preview last week, described the expansion as breathtaking.

"Singapore is always trying to be in the forefront of technology and has its own definition for airports. This is not just an airport but is really like a masterpiece in architecture, and in greenery and landscape," she said. Changi Airport was voted by air travelers as the world's best airport for the seventh consecutive year this year, with Tokyo's Haneda airport in second place and South Korea's Incheon International Airport coming third.

It is the world's seventh busiest airport for international traffic, with a record 65.6 million passengers passing through last year.—Kyodo News ■

Thunderstorms kill 35, leave widespread damage in India

NEW DELHI — Thunderstorms swept across western India killing at least 35 people and leaving widespread damage, officials said on Wednesday (April 17).

Strong winds barreled through Rajasthan, Gujarat and Madhya Pradesh states fell-

ing walls, trees and electricity lines. The storms have also been blamed for at least 25 deaths in Pakistan this week.

At least 10 people were killed in the desert state of Rajasthan, where a wall of dust swept over several cities. Another 10 were

killed in neighbouring Gujarat and 15 in the central state of Madhya Pradesh, state emergency services told AFP. Officials said victims were hit by lightning, falling trees or electrocuted by power lines. Strong winds and sudden rains also hit the capi-

tal, New Delhi, bringing searing summer temperatures down by 10 deg C. The storms forced the cancellation of several political rallies as India's national election gathers pace. The wind blew away a tent that was to have been used for a rally by Prime Minister

Narendra Modi at Himmatnagar in Gujarat. More than 125 people were killed in a wave of storms that battered northern Indian states in May last year. Lightning kills thousands in India every year, mostly farmers working in fields.—AFP ■

Ronaldo not enough as Juventus crash out to Ajax young guns

TURIN (Italy)—Even Cristiano Ronaldo was not enough for Juventus to end their 23-year wait for the European title as they crashed out in the Champions League quarter-finals for a second consecutive year.

Juventus splashed out 100 million euros (\$117 million) on the five-time Champions League winner last summer and the Portuguese star headed in his 126th Champions League goal to put the home team in front on Tuesday.

But a devastating young Ajax team, spearheaded by 19-year-old defender Matthijs De Ligt, ran riot in the second half in Turin to seal a famous 3-2 aggregate victory.

"Apocalypse," read the headline in daily Corriere dello sport, as Juventus shares plunged 15 percent on Wednesday on the Milan stock exchange.

"Not even a huge investment like Ronaldo was enough to win a title that Juve have been searching for since 1996," the sports daily added.

Juventus have lost five times in the final since 1996 when they won their last title, at the expense of Ajax.

Ronaldo was bought to change that and was handed an annual salary of 31 million euros. He has won the title five

times and scored a 97th-minute penalty for Real Madrid against Juventus last season in the quarter-finals. Coach Massimiliano Allegri said he had no regrets, blaming injuries for the team's failure to progress. "Football isn't maths," said Allegri.

"Ronaldo gave us a lot during the season. We signed him to increase our chances of winning the Champions League, but in football one plus one does not always make two, it can also be either six or zero.

"I have always said that you have to arrive at the right time in the best condition, when you reach the quarter-final, you need every player. "We've been in a bit of an emergency situation for a while and that can only be sustained for so long. "We were missing four or five players."

End of Ronaldo era

For the first time since 2010, Ronaldo will not be in the Champions League semi-finals.

And he held his head in his hands in despair as he slumped to the pitch at the Allianz Stadium.

He had single-handedly lifted Juventus into the quarter-final with a stunning hat-trick in the second leg against Atletico Madrid.

But he was unable to lift his

team to a Champions League title he had won in the three previous seasons and in 2014 with Real Madrid, as well as with Manchester United 11 years ago. He holds the record for Champions League goals with 126. That total includes 65 goals in the knockout rounds, another record. Rival Lionel Messi is second on 110 goals after his double for Barcelona against Manchester United on Tuesday.

"Ajax deserved to qualify and you saw that on the pitch," said Juventus president Andrea Agnelli, who said Allegri would be continuing as coach.

Ironically Agnelli—who is also president of the European Clubs Association (ECA) — is the driving force behind moves to change the Champions League and make it even harder for teams from smaller countries, like Ajax, to qualify.

Agnelli, 43, stressed that the team was growing.

"For our part, we are aware of having been in the Champions League quarter-finals for five or six years and are proud to continue this path," said Agnelli.

Although Juventus are on course to seal an eighth consecutive Serie A title next weekend, they are out of the Coppa Italia, which they had won the four previous seasons. —AFP ■
