State Counsellor participates in roundtable meeting of 2nd Belt and Road Forum

STATE Counsellor Daw Aung San Suu Kyi participated in the roundtable meeting of the Second Belt and Road Forum for International Cooperation (BRF) in Beijing yesterday.

Upon arrival at the Yanqi Lake International Conference Centre in Beijing, the State Counsellor was welcomed by Chinese President Xi Jinping.

She took part in the roundtable meeting entitled “Boost-

ing Connectivity to Explore New Sources of Growth” at the Jixian Hall.

Speaking at the meeting, she said Myanmar recognized fully that enhancing connectivity, both hard and soft, would

bring more benefits to all Belt and Road partner countries through improved infrastructure and people-to-people linkages.

Facilitating connectivity in regional infrastructure plans

and mega-infrastructure projects contributed largely to trade facilitation, economic growth and job creation through flows of goods, services and people, she added.

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Government, businesspersons hold 26th regular monthly meeting in Yangon

VICE President U Myint Swe, Chairman of the Private Sector Development Committee (PSDC) and businesspersons held the 26th regular meeting at the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry (UMFCCI) in Yangon yesterday morning.

In his address to the meeting the Vice President said the 20-members PSDC was formed in 24 October 2016 by Presidential order to effectively carry out the tasks of the private sector development framework. It had reached a life term of two and half years and had formed five work committees to coordinate difficulties faced by businesses with relevant union ministerial departments and state and region governments.

It had been holding regular monthly meetings with business persons starting from December 2016 and this was the 26th meeting. Responses to suggestions and issues raised by business persons up to the 25th meeting were being sent back to relevant businesses through the UMFCCI. Responses included matters that were resolved as well as matters that were still being resolved as it needed time.

For these matters, officials from the five work committees made arrangements for public-private dialogues among private businesses and relevant ministries to resolve the matter in stages, said the Vice President.

The Trade sector played an important role in the development of a country's economy. Private and public sectors were cooperating towards increasing annual trade volume and during fiscal year 2018-2019 (as of 12 April) trade volume reached US\$ 18.612 billion which was US\$ 0.312 billion more than the same period of the last fiscal year. Private sector participation in this was US\$ 15.662 billion or 84 percent.

As obtaining the latest news and information played a vital role for business persons to catch up with the changing economic environment, all were urged to regularly check websites and Facebook pages of government departments.

Illegal imports through the border were threatening the existence of small and medium enterprises (SMEs) and PSDC has formed illegal trade control and prevention groups in nine regions and states and during September 2019 to March 2019, 436 arrests of an estimated Ks 5.145 billion worth of illegal imports were made.

On the matter of raising the quality of the products, all need to cooperate towards long term durability of the products. Business persons in the entire Supply Chain including manufacturer, transporter, port clearance, shipping line, stores, packers, distributors and consumers need to cooperate.

Now was the final phase for this year to increase Ease of Doing Business. Index wise responsible departments need to make timely changes. Indicator wise Reforms were being made in preparation of the Doing Business 2020 Report. For business persons to know how Indicator wise Reforms were conducted by relevant government departments and where to enquire about it, the Myanmar Ease of Doing Business Website was launched starting from today in addition to the websites of the ministries.

On this website works conducted on the 10 Indicators; Call Centers where questions can be raised; frequently asked questions and answers;

changes to laws, rules, work procedures; time required; fees and costs etc. were posted so everything could be learnt at a single place.

UMFCCI President U Zaw Min Win also explained about the status of implementing decisions made at the past meetings, public-private discussions held for private sector development, increasing export and status of sector wise works.

Ministry of Commerce Department of Trade Director General U Min Min then explained about posting the Myanmar Doing Business Website.

Later Muse-Namkham Border Trade Merchant Association Vice Chairman U Min Naing Soe, Myanmar Retailers Association general secretary Daw Tin Su Hlaing and Myanmar Cosmetics Association Chairman U Kyaw Min submitted sector wise difficulties faced and suggestions

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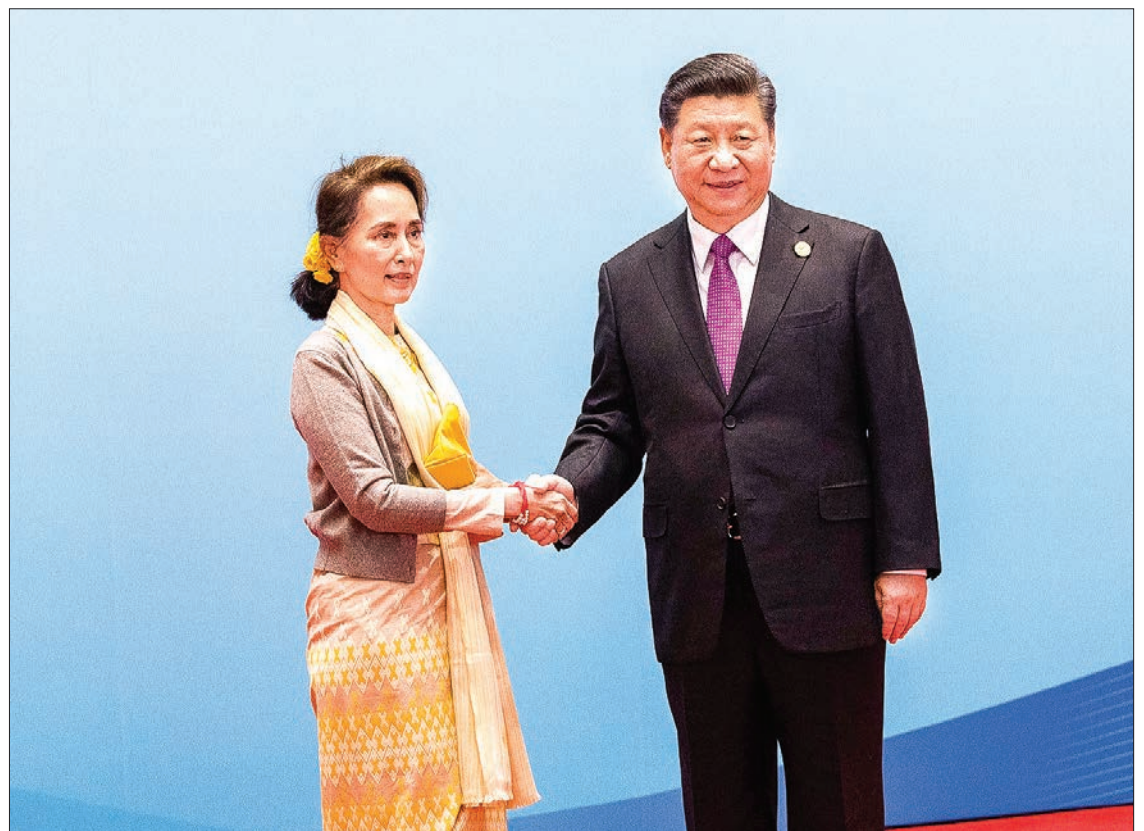
She continued to say that at the same time, they were aware of possible challenges, such as financial risks embedded in mega infrastructure projects. Comprehensive long-term financial planning, adequate investment funding and a well-equipped regional financial risk early-warning system to foster the development of sustainable and resilient infrastructure within the BRI framework would be crucial.

It was worthwhile to remind ourselves that the maintenance of big infrastructure enterprises was sometimes more challenging than their initial implementation. But some successful mega

infrastructure projects could transform a country’s economy and effectively improve the livelihood opportunities of local populations. Developing countries such as Myanmar were in dire need of infrastructure development, she added.

No less than facilities connectivity, People-to-People connectivity contributes to the fostering of sustainable development. In her concluding remarks, the State Counsellor highlighted a few key areas where special attention was required in the interests of enhancing people-to-people connectivity:

- First, in the field of education, especially higher education, we need cooperation and

standardization, along with globalization for better quality assurance. This could be promoted through exchanges of ideas and experiences between peoples and disciplines and we are eager to see more academic exchange-

es, educational cooperation and scholarship programmes to enhance people-to-people bonds and friendship.

- Second, the field of tourism can also enhance mutual understanding and provide substantial foreign capital inflow and employment opportunities. It can also contribute to greater harmony and peace between diverse societies. We could work together to promote tourism by facilitating tourist safety and security measures, easing visa regulations for tourists, and fostering socially, culturally, and environmentally sustainable tourism.

- Third, cultural exchanges deepen intercultural understanding and bring peoples from far flung regions closer together.

- Fourth, we should keep in mind that the business sector could also play a valuable role in fostering people to people connectivity through social and environmentally responsible enterprises, said the State Counsellor.

In the afternoon, State

Vice President U Henry Van Thio continues inspection tour of Chin State

VICE President U Henry Van Thio who was in Chin State to inspect regional development works went to Kan Pa Le elephant foot yam and hill fruit drying and value adding work at No. 2 Ward, Kanpetlet Town on 26 April in the afternoon. The Vice President was accompanied by Chin State Chief Minister Salai Lian Luai, State Hluttaw Speaker U Zo Bawi, Deputy Minister Maj-Gen Than Htut and U Hla Maw Oo, state ministers and officials.

There, the Vice President was briefed about the status of planting elephant foot yam or white spot giant arum (*Amorphophallus paeoniifolius*), Avocado and coffee and development of MSMEs (micro, small and medium enterprises) by Myanmar Fruit, Flower and Vegetable Producers and Exporters Association general secretary Daw Sanda Myo.

In response to the briefing the Vice President gave comments regarding producing and marketing elephant foot yam, avocado and coffee as value added products, the need to control the market in the best possible way, to form associations and groups to produce Chin products that meet the market requirement and arranging loans for MSMEs.

In Chin State elephant foot yam was produced in Matupi, Mindat and Paletwa townships. An acre of land can yield more than 3,000 Viss (Viss = 1.53293 kg = 3.6 lb) of elephant foot yam and if properly planted, the yield per acre can be from 5,000 Viss to 8,000 Viss earning the farmer more than Ks 8.3 million.

An acre of avocado yield about 3 tons per year and at US\$ 1,300 per ton, an income of Ks 5.8 million can be achieved. If both avocado and elephant foot yam were planted the income for the

farmer can be more than Ks 14 million it is learnt.

Yesterday morning the Vice President and party went to Mindat District, Kanpetlet Township, Khaw Nu M' Cong (Natma Taung) National Park and inspected the national park conservation and protection works. The Vice President gave advice regarding retaining cleanliness and conservation of eco-system, and departments and local people to protect and preserve scarce species as cultural heritage.

Khaw Nu M' Cong National Park was established in 1936, proposed as national park in 1997, became a national park in 2010 and finally became an ASEAN heritage park in 2012. It covers an area of 176,202 acres (71,305 hectares) and was at an elevation of 10,200 ft (3053 meter).

Next the Vice President and party went to Hornbill coffee factory in west ward, Mindat

town where factory owner U Ma Hon explained about the factory, production of coffee and future expansion plan.

The Vice President commented that support and assistance would be provided to successfully produce world class coffee in Chin State. Efforts must be made toward penetrating international market with high quality coffee and quality packing system and provided advice to ensure coordination regarding the requirements with departmental officials. The factory was learnt to be producing best quality Arabica coffee with modern equipment by systematically selecting best quality natural Arabica coffee beans from Chin State.

The Vice President and party went on to Mindat Town, District People's Hospital to inspect the health care services provided, encouraged and provided cash support for the local people ob-

taining treatment.

From there the Vice President went to the Ministry of Construction, Construction 3, Special Building Group 9 briefing hall where Chief Engineer U Khin Maung Swe explained about construction of the hospital expansion ward and staff house undertaken by the Special Building Group 9.

The Vice President gave advice and comments to ensure coordination regarding the explanation made and inspected the construction site.

Afterwards the Vice President and party went to inspect the construction of Mindat University where District Administrator U Maung Htoo explained about works completed, future works and work requirements. The Vice President remarked on retaining existing trees in the construction site as much as possible, to speed up the construction work and to

arrange for supplying clean and potable water.

The Vice President and party then went to Baw Khwee plantation and inspected the planting of avocado and medicinal orchids. Agriculture Department Deputy Director General U Aye Ko Ko explained about works to be implemented in the plantation from 2018-2019 to 2020-2021 and the Vice President and State Chief Minister gave advice to ensure coordination.

Later, the Vice President inspected the construction of Mone Chaung Bridge and Lemyo Chaung Bridge on Mindat-Matupi road. The bridges were being constructed by the Special Bridge Group 1.

Mon Chaung Bridge was 60 ft. long and the construction will be completed on 30 September 2019. Lemyo Chaung Bridge was 240 ft. long and the construction will be completed on 30 April 2020.

After inspecting the bridges the Vice President went to the Matupi People's Hospital where Dr. Talun Kyon Htan explained about patients undertaking treatment, status of providing medicines for free, construction work status in fiscal year 2018-2019, status of constructing a two-story six rooms staff house, employment of medical personnel and other personnel in the hospital, construction of Public Health Officer Office and concrete lining the circuit road around the hospital and the road to the staff house.

The Ministry of Health and Sports Director General Dr. Soe Oo then explained about fulfilling and supporting the hospital's requirements. Later the Vice President inspected the health care services provided, gave encouragement to patients and provided them with cash support.—MNA (Translated by Zaw Min)

The object was a 6 inch long 4 inch diameter plastic pipe made up as an IED and the security personnel deactivated it.

AA group had been setting up and IEDs on public roads as well as placing explosive devices

to destroy departmental buildings.

The public was urged to report on any suspicious objects to security personnel in a timely manner and the security forces will continue to work towards defusing and deactivating mines and explosive devices, according to news released by Office of the Commander-in-Chief of Defence Services.—MNA (Translated by Zaw Min)

Union Minister Dr. Myo Thein Gyi attends inauguration of empowerment training courses for private school teachers

THE inauguration of empowerment training courses for private school teachers conducting the B.E.H.S School-level courses was held, yesterday morning, at No. 6 B.E.H.S in Mandalay, where Union Minister for Education Dr. Myo Thein Gyi attended and delivered a remark.

First, Chair of Mandalay Region Private School Teachers' Association Daw Hnin Hnin Maw presented the reports on empowerment training course for private school teachers who are conducting basic, education-level courses.

In his opening remarks at

the meeting, Dr. Myo Thein Gyi said that in carrying out the changes of the educational reforms, most reforms had been made for primary education sectors since 2016. As for the Ministry of Education, efforts were being made to promote the private educational sector, which was as an effort to generate outstanding students while striving to boost the empowerment of the teachers from state-run schools, private schools and monastic education schools. In making the changes of the curriculum, all the text books, including KG and Grade 12, would be completed in 2022-2023 academic year. In this year, training courses for Grade-3 was being conducted for all the primary teachers from state-run schools, private schools and monastic education schools while carrying out to conduct the courses for Grade-6 for the middle-school teachers. Moreover training course for Grade-4

would be conducted for all the primary teachers, training course for Grade-7 would be conducted for middle-school teachers and training course for Grade-10 would be conducted for the high-school teachers in coming 2020. As for the teachers, continuous learning should be done to enhance their English and ICT skills while carrying out to train the students for their understandings and instilling the value of diversity, cooperation, extensive learning with the use of library and vast reading, developing sports, music and arts skills, responsibility, accountability, innovation, creativity for the long-term development. With the cooperation of the education and health, training courses for tobacco, drinks and betel quid-free zones, abiding by the traffic rules, reproductive health, parentless children and healthy lifestyle, would be carried out. Thus, cooperation plays a central role

in fostering a higher standard of education. Then Union Minister and party took part in the discussion entitled "Survey of Improvement and Challenges in Basic Education" at the event.

Next, Union Minister Dr. Myo Thein Gyi and officials replied the queries raised by the attendees, and the event was carried out according to the procedures. On 26 April, Union Minister and party went to Automotive Technology Research Institute (ATRI) in Pyin Oo Lwin and continued to the University of Technology (Yatanarpon Cyber City) and the University of Mandalay, where Union Minister met with rector, pro-rector, professors (heads of departments), lecturers, faculty members with their families and students to discuss their educational measures, research works, difficulties, weakness, strengths and on-going process, it was learnt.—MNA ■ (Translated by Win Ko Ko Aung)

Mango festival to be held on 16-18 May in Mandalay

THE Myanmar Mango Market and Technology Development Association will sponsor the second annual mango festival near Kuthodaw Pagoda in Mandalay between 16 and 18 May, according to its secretary, U Kyaw Soe Naing.

This is part of the association's efforts to introduce locally produced mangoes to merchants and seek new markets for potential varieties of mango through festivals.

A wide variety of mangos grown in regions and states, plus value-added mango products, will be displayed for sale during the three-day festival. The number of booths is expected to increase during the second festival.

The first mango festival was successfully held on 20-22 May 2018, when more than 15 tons of mangos were sold through a special sale programme, which attracted people to the

festival.

Market experts estimate that mango production is likely to drop this season, due to unfavourable weather conditions. Mango growers in Mandalay Region are currently facing

losses due to damage at mango plantations.

Growers are expected to rely on local consumption this season, instead of export markets.

Myanmar's mangos are

exported mostly to China, Singapore and Thailand. Among other varieties, Seintalone, Myakyauk and Machitsu are the most popular.—IPRD ■

Free rabies vaccination underway in Kyonepyaw Township

THE Department of Livestock, Breeding and Veterinary in Kyonepyaw Township, Ayeyawady Region, will give free rabies

vaccines to dogs and cats beginning in May.

The department will issue 300 free rabies shots across the township, including 200 rabies shots in Aungsan and Pinlong wards and the remaining 100 in Tayza and Pinlong wards.

Regarding rabies, Dr. Swe Mu Han, assistant director of the Township Livestock, Breeding and Veterinary Department, said, "Rabies can spread to all animals. The people should give vaccines to their pets, if they love them. This would amount to safeguarding the lives of humans, as rabies cannot be spread to people if pets get vaccinated. Showing the signs

and symptoms of rabies is slow, when dog bites are not close to the brain. The signs and symptoms are fast when the dog bite injuries are very close to the brain.

The symptoms of rabies can appear from 14 to 15 days to more than a year after the bite happens.

Pets were required to be vaccinated in order to prevent the loss of animal and human lives.

Dr. Swe Mu Han has urged the public to give free rabies vaccines to their animals at the office on 1 May.—Nay Win Myint ■ (Translated by Khaing Thanda Lwin)

32 houses destroyed as fire breaks out in Chanmyathazi

SOME 32 houses were destroyed when a fire broke out in ward 853, Chan (South) ward, Chanmyathazi Township, Mandalay yesterday.

The blaze occurred around 7:50 am at the house of Daw Khin Than Nu due to an electric short-circuit caused by overheated wires.

The fire quickly spread to other houses.

About 400 firemen and

93 fire engines worked for 42 minutes to bring the fire under control. Three people were seriously injured in the fire and 32 houses were destroyed.

Myanmar's overseas trade up over \$130 mln in current FY

TRADE between Myanmar and international trade partners crossed US\$18.8 billion so far in the current fiscal year, an increase of over \$130 million, or 0.7 per cent, from the corresponding period last FY, the Ministry of Commerce reported this Friday.

During six and a half months, Myanmar exported \$8.98 billion worth of domestic products to international buyers, and imported \$9.8 billion worth of commodities, resulting in a trade deficit of over \$844 million, which decreased by over \$656 million, as against the same time last FY, when the country recorded a trade deficit of \$1.5 billion.

Compared with last FY, the current import value declined by over \$600 million from both border and non-border trade, while the current export value increased by over \$740 million.

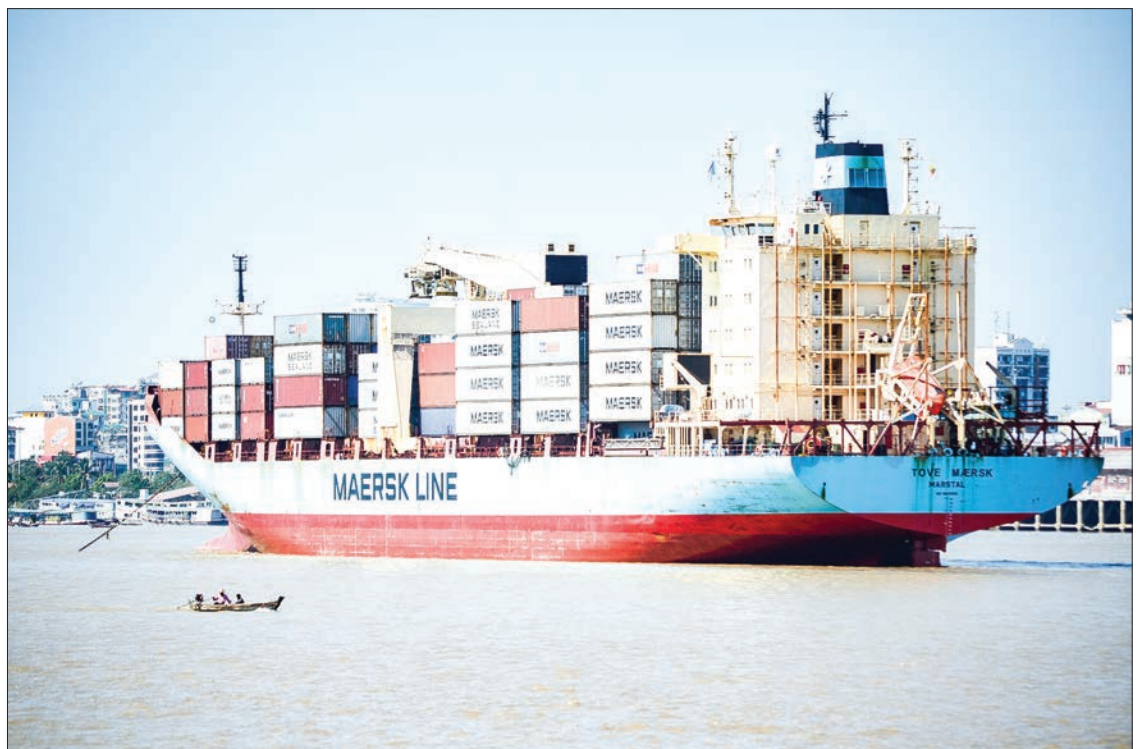
Goods are delivered mainly

through by sea in international trade. As of 19 April in the current fiscal, the country's maritime trade amounted to almost \$13.3 billion, whereas its external border trade was pegged at \$5.5 billion.

When compared with this time last year, Myanmar's non-border trade decreased by over \$300 million but its border trade increased by over \$460 million.

Normally, the country exports seven major groups of commodities—agricultural, forest, marine and animal products, minerals, manufactured products and other miscellaneous items. It usually imports four major categories of commodities—capital goods, intermediate products, consumer goods and CMP raw materials.

During the 2018 mini-budget period (April-September), the country's exports reached \$8.8 billion while its

imports were \$9.8 billion, totaling \$14.2 billion.

The ministry's statistical

report indicated that Myanmar-international trade exceeded \$25 billion in the previous

Prices of mango fall in Myanmar-Sino market in post-Thingyan period

THE price of mango has fallen in the Myanmar-Sino bilateral export market in the post-Thingyan period, said U Kyaw Soe Naing, secretary of Myanmar Mango Market and Technology Development Association.

The prices of exported mango decreased to 140 Chinese yuans per package, from its peak of 170 yuans during the period before Thingyan, the annual New Year Water Festival of Myanmar.

U Kyaw Soe Naing said the mango market was remaining firm. The current market prices for mango were 140 yuans. A package of mango had fetched 170 yuans in the pre-Thingyan period. The decrease in prices

of the mango was linked to an increase in inflow of mangos to the market.

Regularly, China imports local varieties of Seintalone, Hinthath, Yingwe and Padamyangmauk from Myanmar.

Commercial plantations of mangos are found mostly in Mandalay and Sagaing regions, as well as Shan and Kachin states.

In his view, U Kyaw Soe Naing said mango growers need to purchase insurance to protect themselves from financial losses caused by damage to mango plantations.—Myanmar Digital News ■

Farmers to get land compensation after resale of confiscated lands

YANGON regional government will deliver land compensation to local farmers after reselling confiscated lands, said U Phyo Min Thein, the Chief Minister for Yangon Regional Government.

He made his announcement at the 26th regular meeting between the Vice President and the entrepreneurs held on 27 April at the Office of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry (UMFCCI).

"We have planned to pay land compensation to the local farmers. We have heard that some local farmers only want their land back, instead of compensation. People are saying that they don't want the compensation. As for us, we will resell all the confiscated land. Then, we will offer the land compensation at the market price prevailing at the time of confiscation. Even if there are people living on the confiscated land, we will sell

such occupied land to those who want to purchase land with occupancy. But the cost of the buildings will be added to the selling price," said the chief minister.

A regional-level committee has been formed to oversee the disposal of the confiscated land and payment of the compensation. Nearly K 40 billion needs to be paid to local farmers for the confiscated land.

"In fact, there are already terms and conditions which the buyers must abide by. The buyers are the entrepreneurs, and the government's objective of selling the land to them is to construct factories and conduct business, in contribution to a part of the national industrial development. But the majority of the entrepreneurs are merely holding the land ownership and the permits to implement government projects. It is quite clear that they buy land, not to take part in implementation of the government projects, but to hold the land, doing nothing, just

waiting for a chance to manipulate property prices", said U Phyo Min Thein, the chief minister.

The regional government will not resell the land to those who will manipulate the land market only. They will sell the land to those who will invest in building factories and workshops, as well as in implementing low-cost and affordable housing projects.

The committee will announce the list very soon. "Investments are annually made in billions to upgrade the roads and bridges, as well as to improve the drainage system. Dagon Myothit has developed through this kind of investments in infrastructure. The land price will not increase without government building the infrastructure. We will not allow local farmers to get back their land at the prevailing prices. They will be reimbursed what they have paid only," said Chief Minister U Phyo Min Thein. ■

The government has been making strenuous efforts to improve connectivity within our own country by placing emphasis on the improvement of our infrastructure, in particular, the constructions of roads, ports and railways, as well as electrification.

THE Ministry of Hotels and Tourism is tremendously beneficial to the nation's economy both directly and indirectly. Since the new administration in office, there has been increase in the number of tourists every year into the country. The news team met with the Union Minister U Ohn Maung to inquire about the progress throughout the 3rd year of incumbent government.

Q: Can you explain to us about the Tourism Law?

A: Yes, the Myanmar Hotels and Tourism Law was passed on 17th September 2018, creating the much needed committees with the help of the Office of the Union Attorney General and several other ministries and departments. The Region and State administrations are also given more autonomy to help with further delays for businesses. Businesses can also get temporary licenses as well. With the creation of the Tourist Committees, we are working towards proper transfer of responsibilities for granting permits and licenses from the regional authorities.

Q: What about efforts to-

wards Digital Marketing?

A: Because we are in the age of Information Technology, online promotion is crucial in trying to advertise and attract tourists. The Ministry's website is available in 10 languages which is monitored by the Digital Marketing Task

Force. Digital Concierge systems are installed throughout the country at information counters in the Ministries. We are also building a Tourism Web Portal to be launched soon. The Look West Policy was introduced as well through TTTG Asia. The Min-

istry met with Polish government officials to collaborate with their Chamber of Tourism to increase tourism between the countries. We are also launching a B2B campaign so more tourists are aware of Myanmar and all it's got to offer.

Q: Are there any restrictions that are being relaxed to attract more tourists?

A: This isn't something that can be accomplished with the Ministry's efforts alone. There are a lot of related ministries involved such as opening places tourists can access, relaxing some financial barriers for the tourists and other aspects for ease of travel. Because of the relaxed visa restrictions, we had more tourists from the ASEAN+3 countries. There were some downward trends but it got progressive further into 2018. In the first two months of 2019, we had an increase of 23% with the trend going upwards.

This is not only due to the effort of the Ministry but all respective ministries and stakeholders as well.

checkpoints such as Tachileik, Kawthoung, Myawaddy, Tamu and Htee Kee where you can enter Myanmar via land. The Thilawa, Bo Aung Kyaw and Kawthoung ports also allow passengers to enter Myanmar via sea. There are also plans to get Ngapali and Kyaikame beaches for entry as well. The Ministry also sent representatives to attend the ITB Berlin 2019 in March to learn more about ways we can accommodate travelers from Europe.

Q: What about human resource development?

A: The Hotels and Tourism industry is for capability building of workers. Hence, there are training schools according to their sections in collaboration with others. Within the 3rd year, we had over 191 students graduate as tour guides from the Training school in Yangon alone with 916 more in various states and regions. For hospitality training, the ministry had over 22 cohorts with 1972 graduates in the previous year.

There were also 6832 students posted for On the Job Training at various locations Development Workshops as well as language classes with various governments. For instance, the Colombian Government had 2 training courses for 114 students on Spanish lessons and Chinese classes with the help of the Chinese Embassy. Other capability training such as the Capacity Building and Technical Assistance on Public Private Partnerships in the Tourism Sector in collaboration with GIZ was pretty successful as well as Tourism Foundation Courses with other organizations. A conference was also held in late 2018 to discuss about the improvements we can make to the tour curriculum.

Other partnerships for capability includes hospitality management trainings with Luxembourg Development Cooperation Agency, healthcare in the tourism sector with Tokyo Metropolitan Assembly Federation and Tour Hosting classes with Swisscontact. The Partnership for Change project with Norway also trained

Q: Any other partnerships?

A: Television Broadcast Limited from Hong Kong recently visited Myanmar to showcase various spots in Yangon, Mandalay, Bagan, Pyin Oo Lwin, Inle, Nyaung Swe and Kyaiktiyo. The Ministry made sure to support them during their travels. Wan Jing Tai is also filming all over the country from Kayin, Kachin to Tanintharyi Region. Q: What are some other additional efforts to boost tourism in Myanmar?

A: In September 2018, we celebrated World Tourism Day with the slogan "Tourism and the Digital Transformation". CNN also conducted a CNN Task Nation Branding Masterclass for Myanmar. Lastly, the Adventure Bagan temple Marathon was a huge success thanks to the partnership between Myanmar Voyages International Tourism and Denmark based Albatros Travel.

FOLLOWING the decisive victory in the 2015 General Election in Myanmar, the incumbent government assumed the responsibility of State and now sailing through the third year period, despite rowing at rough sea, it is reasonable enough and fair to say “Striving for success of reforms”.

As a nascent nation in transition, the Government sincerely endeavors with focus on state development in political, social and economical reforms since its inception.

In the pattern of proper chain of command paradigm, the regional and state governments shifted into changes in line with the policies, the objectives, and the instructions of the Union Government, moved in top gear into the third year

period.

Administrative pillar

In its cruise into the third year term, the Bago Regional Government has conducted the most essential tasks for the grassroots level such as the election of the ward and village administrators in accordance with the Ward and Village Tract Administration Law. Judicial Pillar

Easy access to information for the public has been facilitated at 33 courts and law offices with the opening of separate divisions such as that of the Information Counter and that of the Intake Counter.

Furthermore, the Case Management Program (CMP) has been administering at Bago District Court and Law Office, and Courts and Law Offices at township levels. The offices are providing that of the services of negotiating of settlements system; that of assisting legal aids to vulnerable and marginalized clients especially women and children; and that of the establishment of legal aid associations and teams.

System on the Case Management Program (CMP) has resulted with transparency, relieving the unnecessary huge burdens on the clients and witnesses, and reduced waste of time and energy.

Legislative Pillar

Putting into law, the Bago Regional Hluttaw has enacted the Regional City Development Law, and the Regional Freshwater Fisheries Law, creating job opportunities.

In line with the policy laid

down by the Union Government, the Bago Regional Government has been implementing the relevant tasks such as that of the ceasefire agreement to have stability in the region; that of the emergence of democracy federal union; that of the elevating of socio-economic development of the people; that of the prevention of drug abuse; and that of the balanced development of urban and rural areas.

With a view to have transparency and smooth functioning of the departments, the e-government practices have been established in the Bago Region and that the “Citizen’s Budget” could be downloaded through e-Bago Application for the public access.

Programs for the interests of the people

In the interest of the people, K40 millions has been spent in providing vocational trainings to 700 trainees in the first six month of 2018, and moreover, courses on bamboo handicraft arts, on motorcycle repair course, on basic sewing course, on basic electric wiring course, and household goods manufacturing course, for a total of 11 separate classes from April to September in 2018.

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Similar courses and other basic courses have been imparted for 29 separate events in 2018-2019.

Ongoing short courses on vocational nature are provided in connection with the textile, fabric and weaving professions in Shwedaung Township. Total of 16 buildings and 320 apartments are in the process for the staff members and officers.

For the convenience of the people, total of 313 miles have been stretched out as appropriate and suitable roads for rural and urban population in three years period at the cost of K 26,402 millions. Other work programs totaling 1,211 projects have been utilized for K2654 millions. Water supply projects numbering 117 has been allocated with K602.68871 millions.

Reinforcement and strengthening river embankment tasks have been carried out on Kwayma Waterway (Ayeyawaddy); Sharbinkone Village Waterway (Ayeyawaddy); Ledi Village Waterway (Myitmakha River); Hlay-swemyaing Village Waterway and Chaungkyoe Village Waterway (Sittaung River); Mahlwabin Village Waterway (Sittaung); Sinywar Village Waterway (Thaing Chaung) during 2018-2019.

GDP is the final value of the goods and services produced, and that K 8572 billions has been earmarked for 2018-2019 fiscal year and estimated at the GDP growth rate of (7.8) per cent based on 2015-2016 statistics.

In Bago Region, various economic sectors have been estimated in their own terms of GDP growth rate at different circumstances and conditions in 2018-2019.

In the first quarter of 2018-2019 fiscal year, K2995 billions

has been spent on development projects at the implementation target of (34.9) per cent, showing improvement of (2.1) per cent than the previous year.

Linking up programs

Member Cards have been issued to 1,706 small enterprises and 247 medium-sized enterprises, totaling 1,953 cards. Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME) have been formed into 47 clusters, and that they have been facilitated with JICA two step loans in terms of ODA assistance.

Road Transport Administration Department is making progress in road building and construction tasks in Bago Region with the asphalt and concrete roads; the tar roads; the gravel rock roads; the designed measured double layer asphalt roads; the sand stone roads; the bridges; the box culvert construction; the bailey bridge construction; the stone embankment; the drainage; the platform; and road related tasks.

With regards to electricity supply and distribution at substations, many small MVA [MVA stands for Mega Volt Amp or Volts X Amp /1000, 000] substations have been upgraded into larger capacity units in Bago Region in 2018.

The Irrigation and Water Utilization Management Department (IWUMD) is under taking 126 tasks such as that of reform in irrigation system; that of making drainages; that of making embankment in water distribution, spending K2277 millions.

In Bago Region, a Master Plan for tourism development strategy has been in process looping in historical sites such as Kaytumadi Royal Palace and Kambawzathadi Palace.

One was set up in cooperation with Haka public based community centre while 14 mobile libraries were set up in cooperation with IPRD.



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Ghosn's trial to be delayed possibly until next year: media

TOKYO (Japan)—Former Nissan chief Carlos Ghosn's trial, which was expected to begin in September, will be delayed, local media said Saturday, hinting that it may not start this year. The 65-year-old tycoon, currently on bail, is preparing for his trial on four charges of financial misconduct ranging from concealing part of his salary from shareholders to syphoning off Nissan funds for his personal use.

The Tokyo District Court had proposed to start his trial in September during its pre-trial meetings with his defence lawyers and prosecutors, news reports said, quoting unnamed sources. But the court told the lawyers and prosecutors on Friday that it had retracted the plan without proposing a new time frame, Kyodo News said, adding that the move could mean the trial will not start this year.—AFP ■

Four major bridges contribute to fast commodity flow and commuter traffic in **Rakhine State**

WITH the positive intention of ensuring fast commodity flow and commuter traffic in Rakhine State, the western part of the country, the government is not only upgrading but also newly building essential facilities such as roads and bridges linking regions with states, townships, towns, and roads and bridges spanning villages.

The four major bridges namely Hset Yoekya Creek Bridge, Kyetsin River Crossing Bridge, Teinnyo Bridge and Darlet Creek Bridge contributing toward smooth and secure flow of commodities and commuter traffic in Rakhine State have been already commissioned into service.

With regard to these bridges, U Khin Maung Myint, the director of Rakhine State Road Department, said, “The construction of Hset Yoekya Creek Bridge began in December in 2016 with the funds of Rakhine State Government and it was terminated in February in 2019. It was built across Hset Yoekya Creek. It links Lanmadaw Ward in Sittwe with Hset Yoekya village in Shwemingan on other side. It is 1,642 feet long. It is a reinforced concrete type. There are a 240-foot-long main steel beam room, eleven 100-foot-long rooms and ten 30-foot-long rooms on the bridge.

“The lower structure of the bridge is a reinforced concrete type. Its foundation is a type of reinforced concrete pile.

Hset Yoekya Creek is just 200 feet wide. There is navigation traffic in the creek. There is also a traffic light on the side of Sittwe. The bridge has to be considered to be free from the ships sailing in the creek and the traffic light on the side of Sittwe. Therefore, the clearance height is 11 meters. Due to these reasons, the length of the bridge becomes 1,642. Slowdowns are needed to reduce the speed of the car near the traffic light.”

Hset Yoekya Creek Bridge links Lanmadaw Ward in Sittwe with Hset Yoekya village in Shwemingan on other side. Therefore, a great number of new land plots can be extended in Sittwe, Hset Yoekya and Shwemingan. There is a jetty in Shwemingan. There is also

a plan to build a new highway bus terminal. Commodities can be easily transported to Sittwe via Shwemingan jetty. Local people can easily go to Sittwe crossing Hset Yoekya Creek Bridge through the highway bus terminal. It is an advantage of Hset Yoekya Bridge. Local people from Sittwe can go to the highway bus terminal in an easy manner. The bridge contributes much toward flow of commodity

and commuter traffic in Rakhine State, said U Khin Maung Myint.

A 1,642-foot-long Hset Yoekya Bridge linking Lanmadaw Ward in Sittwe with Hset Yoekya village in Shwemingan on other side was built at a cost of Ks 8,823 million. The people and the vehicles are now using the newly-built bridge on which they can be seen crossing. New businesses will flourish around this area as trading activities can be carried

out in a short time. Trade will enormously increase because commodities can be transported to Sittwe through Shwemingan jetty. For these reasons, it is a bridge capable of contributing much toward trading activities of Rakhine State.

Similarly, a 1,920-foot-long Kyetsin River Crossing Bridge linking Myaybon with Minpyar Townships was built at a cost of Ks 11,324.487 million. Now the

local people and the vehicles are crossing the newly-built bridge.

It is a major bridge for Myaybon. Myaybon previously had to rely on water transportation and the town had a difficult access to transport. Now it is easy for Myaybon residents to move from one place to another without difficulty. The construction of the bridge began in 2014 and it was over in February, 2019. It is 1,920 feet in length and it was built with the combination of Union funds and Rakhine State funds. It was built spanning Kyetsin River. Myaybon will rapidly develop from a town of difficult access to transport to a town of thriving business center, said U Khin Maung Myint.

Likewise, located at mile post numbers between 26/7 and 27/0 on Minbu-An-Sittwe road section in An Township, Kyaukphyu District, a 960-foot-long Darlet Creek Bridge was constructed at a cost of Ks 7,070.00 million of Union funds. It is situated on Union Road and also a very important bridge. The construction of the bridge was initiated in 2016 and ended on January 30 in 2019.

The bridge was previously a bailey bridge and it was narrow in width. Vehicles had to wait in a line to cross the bridge. Now the bridge has turned into the concrete one with a two-lane concrete road. It is unnecessary for the people, the visitors and the commodities to wait in a queue. It can save much time. The bridge can bear 75 tons of commodities.

In the same way, situated at the place between the mile posts 120/3 and 120/4 on Minbu-An-Sittwe-Union Road in MraukU Township, MraukU District, a 360-foot-long Teinnyo Bridge was

built at a cost of Ks 2,280 million. The bridge is very useful to local people and for vehicles.

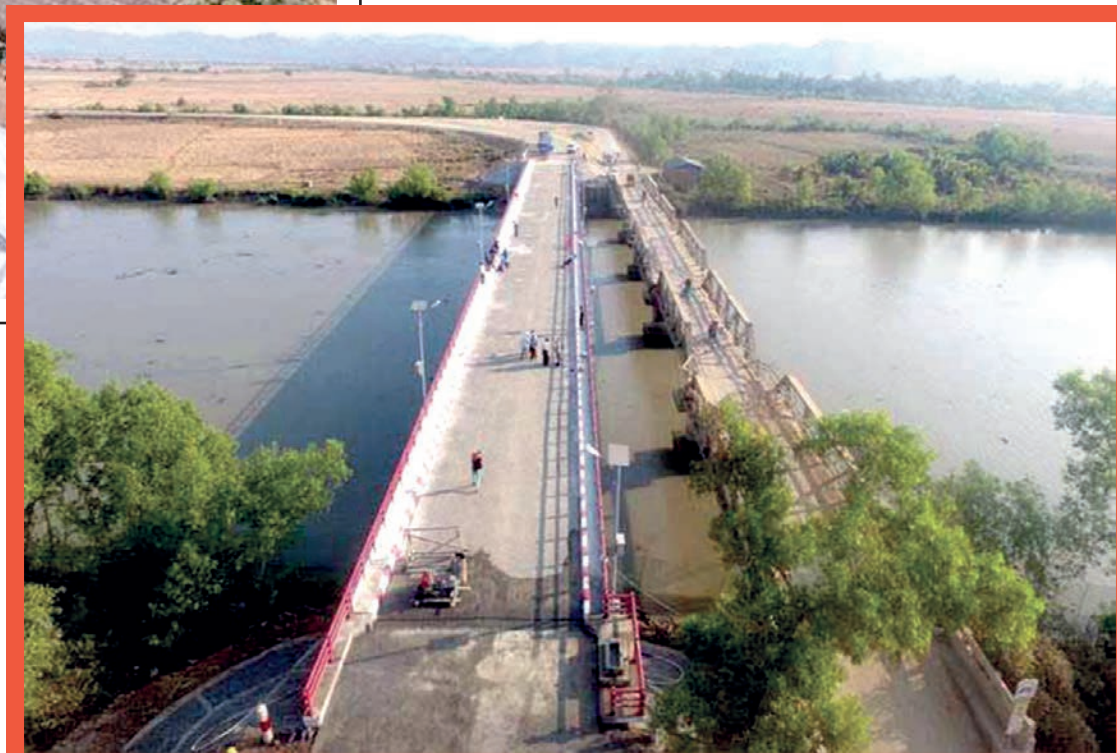
The bridge is located on Minbu-An-Sittwe-Union Road and its construction was initiated in 2017 and ended in December in 2018. It is of vital importance as it is a part of Union Road. The bridge was previously made of RPT steel beam and it was a one-way bridge. The vehicles had to wait in a queue to cross the bridge. It can withstand 16 tons of commodities. The bridge is now a different matter. It is a reinforced concrete type on which two cars can drive in the opposite direction at the same time. Local people can travel crossing the bridge any time for the time being, U Khin Maung Myint said.

The Road Department is upgrading existing roads and bridges and also building new ones where necessary in Rakhine State. The roads in Sittwe, Ponnakyun and Yathedaung are now being upgraded to concrete ones. Also in Maungtau, four roads are under construction to cross over MayU mountain.

Furthermore, extensive measures of tarmacked roads and concrete ones are being taken on Minbu-An-Sittwe road and inner roads in Rakhine State are being upgraded.

The Road Department is maintaining existing roads and bridges to keep them in a good condition by checking and repairing them regularly apart from the roads and bridges that are under construction. Only if the local people using roads and bridges join hands with the Road Department in maintenance work on a regular basis, can they last longer in the future.

Durant nets 50 as Warriors advance to NBA second round

LOS ANGELES (United States) — Kevin Durant scored a playoff career high 50 points as the Golden State Warriors blasted their way into the second round of the NBA playoffs by clobbering the Los Angeles Clippers 129-110 on Friday.

Durant made history by equalling the most points scored in the first half of a playoff game with 38 of his 50 coming in the opening half. He tied former Phoenix Sun star Charles Barkley who scored 38 of his 56 points in the first half of a series clinching win over Golden State 25 years ago.

"That was one of the great performances I've ever seen in my life," Warriors coach Steve Kerr said. "He's the ultimate weapon because there's no defense for Kevin." Durant was at a loss to explain his masterful performance on Friday.

"I am just out there playing. I was so lost in the game I am not really thinking about anything else but winning the possession. It is tough to explain. I am just in it," he said.

The Warriors advance to face the Houston Rockets, beginning on Sunday in Oakland. Houston was already in Oakland waiting

for the Warriors to finish the series so they can start the second round on Sunday. Durant said the Rockets are going to be a whole new challenge.

"They are a talented ball club with a lot of high IQ players that shoot well and penetrate well so we got our work cut out for us," he said. Draymond Green had 16 points, 14 rebounds and 10 assists, Stephen Curry scored 24 points and Andre Iguodala contributed 15 points off the bench for the Warriors, who won three road playoff games in the same series for first time in franchise history.—AFP ■

The beauty of Anyar (Upper Myanmar) and the life of Toddy palm trees farmers

ROWS of toddy palm trees or toddy forests are a symbol of the beauty and serenity of the rural life of Anyar (Upper Myanmar). Kyaukpadaung, a town close to the Mt. Popa and Bagan, has offered travelers to Bagan a stop over to enjoy food made from toddy.

There are over 417,200 toddy-palm trees on 4,127 acres in Kyaukpadaung Township. Of these, over 250,000 trees can produce sap for drinking and making jaggery.

Palm trees have a lifespan of 150 to 200 years, with their average height being 60 to 80 feet. Starting from the age of 20, a today-palm can produce sap and fruits.

According to statistics from 20 years ago, there were over 7,100 farmers and their families relying on the today-palm trees for their livelihoods.

The hard work and less lucrative business has resulted in declining number of toddy farmers, reaching just about 1,200 in the town today.

Why? A whole family of toddy farmers had to work for eight months per year. That means they had no jobs in the rainy season.

Due to their hand-to-mouth lives, the older generation was not willing to pass down their family business to their next generation. This situation has resulted in decreasing the number of toddy-palm farmers, reaching just 1,200 today.

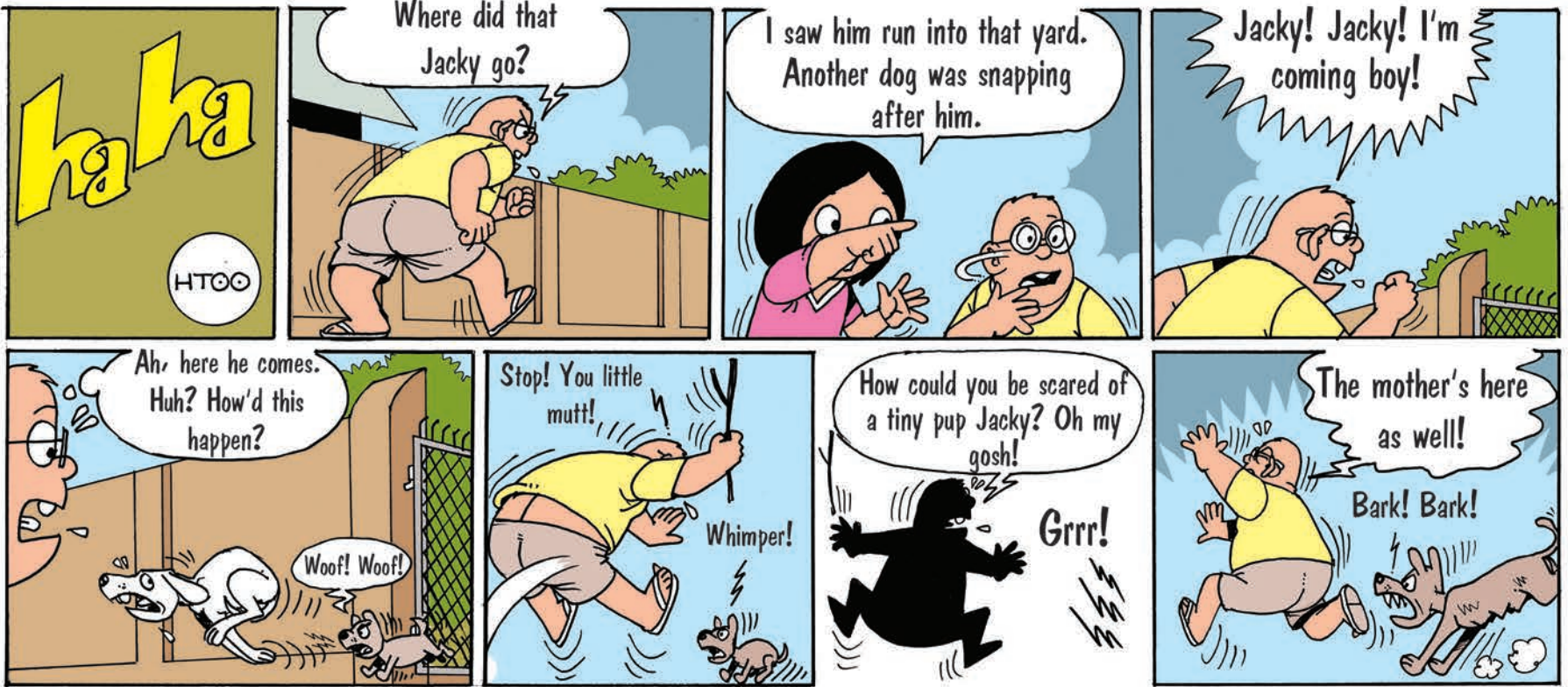

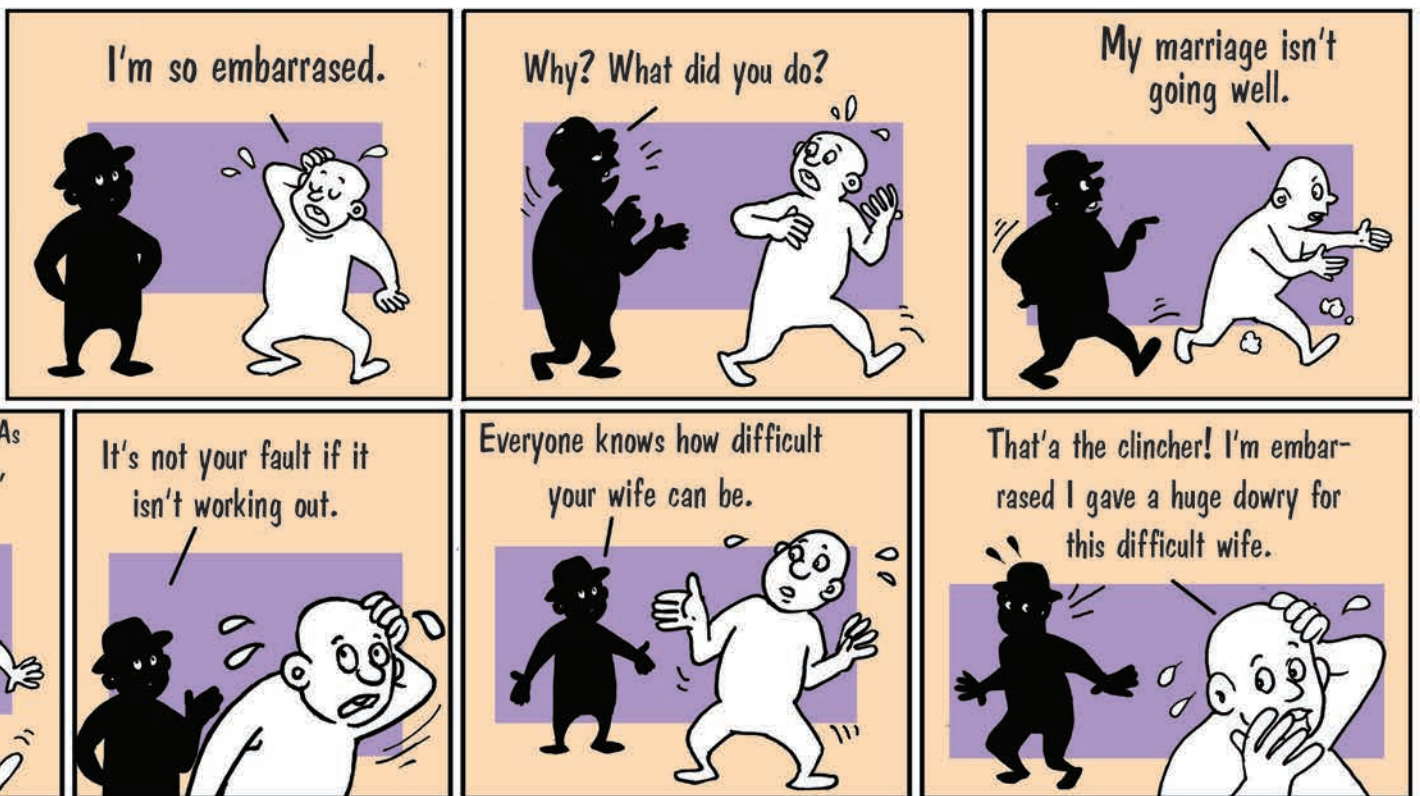

A change in my perspective on literature & the impact of literature on me



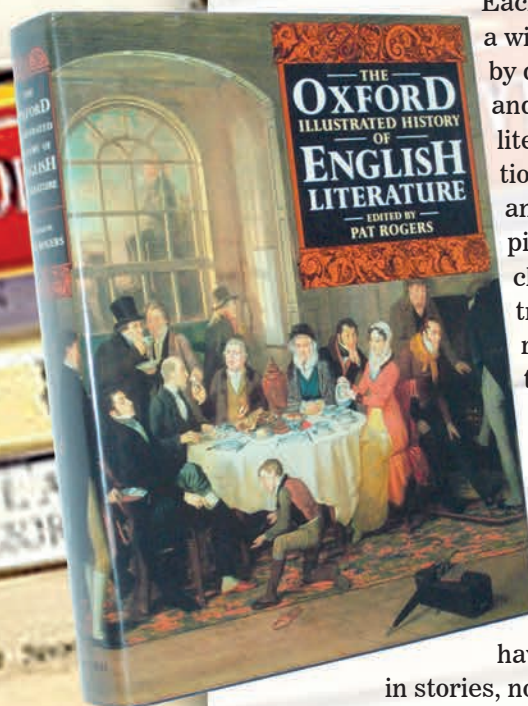
