## PTTEP donates \$100,000 to Alliance for Smiles for treatment of children with cleft lips and palates

ALLIANCE For Smile said that a child is born with cleft lip and palate every three minutes worldwide. This American organization has been providing free treatment and surgery to children and adults with such conditions around the world.

On their 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary of operation in Myanmar, PTTEP donated \$100,000 to Alliance For Smile. It was reported that the money will be used to provide surgery to 100 Myanmar children with that condition.

Ms. Tina Faschin said that

the reason for this occurrence is that at the early stage of pregnancy, the baby is unable to close its mouth from opening mouth position, and that this act of charity will do much good to families and communities of children with such condition".

She added that even though the cause of the condition is still unknown, it is already known that genes, mother's medication and lack of nutrition, harmful substance from surroundings are responsible for the anomaly in the development of fetus.

Mr. Piya Sukhumpanumet, General manager of PTTEP Myanmar said that children with such condition face challenges over eating, living, articulation and appearance, and that it triggers psychological weakness such as lack of self respect and confidence.

She went on to say that the surgery can heal such condition, and that they are delighted to help children gain physical benefits they deserve and confident smile.

Then, the official signed the memorandum of understanding.

## 4<sup>th</sup> NCA-S EAO Summit meeting underway in Thailand from 14 to 19 May

The 4<sup>th</sup> Summit meeting of the Ethnic Armed Organizations (EAOs) which have signed the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement (4<sup>th</sup> NCA-S EAO Summit) commenced in Chiang Mai,

Thailand, yesterday morning. The meeting will be held for five days from 14 to 19 May.

In his opening speech at the meeting, Peace Process Steering Team (PPST) acting

leader U Yawd Serk said attendees to the summit meeting were to openly and cordially discuss to achieve the federal union desired by all through political discussions.

He added that all were to march in cooperation hand in hand towards the goal that benefits the people and the country and the discussion were to be in a way that was acceptable to all. Holding on tightly to one's own policies success would not result in success. If all wanted democracy and a federal system, discussion must be toward a federal system. If all of us set aside own policies and discuss what ought to be discussed naturally, we would not face failure and achieve success.

Fighting between brother organizations that had not signed the NCA and the Tatmadaw was the biggest problem for the union. Peace was the main thing in resolving problems. If the peace process was damaged numerous problems would occur and the government, Tatmadaw, EAOs and related organizations must strive towards the success of peace process.

Ways to overcome obsta-

cles and bottlenecks to the peace process, reviewing the organizations of PPST and to conduct reforms courageously were the main matters to be discussed, added the PPST acting leader.

Implementation report of sector wise peace processes of NCA-S EAOs will be submitted and discussed and organizations of groups will be reviewed and discussed in the meeting.

The meeting was attended by 8 EAOs that had signed the NCA, and NMSP (New Mon State Party) and LDU (Lahu Democratic Union) that were implementing partners of NCA. Brother EAOs of KIO (Kachin Independence Organization) and KNPP (Karen National Progressive Party) also attended the meeting as observers.

## Talk on Role of Women Leaders in Increasing Public Resistance to Adversity held in Nay Pyi Taw

**V**ICE President U Henry Van Thio's wife Dr. Shwe Hlwan delivered an opening speech at a talk on "Role of Women Leaders in Increasing Resistance to Adversity" held at the Thingaha Hotel in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday morning.

In her opening speech, Dr. Shwe Hlwan said the day's talk on Role of Women Leaders in Increasing Public Resistance to Adversity was led by MRCS.

MRCS was the only Red Cross organization in the country and was formed under MRCS Law as the country's reserve force in the humanitarian assistance sector. Thus it is providing support and assistance without discriminating with regard to race, religion, political belief and gender with the aim of developing mutual friendship and understanding among human beings and peace in the country and abroad.

In doing this, in addition to supporting the recovery of women's physical and mental damages in facing natural disasters, it places emphasis towards raising the role of women and achieving gender equality.

It had gained much experience by becoming a member of the Gender and Diversity Network of IFRC (International Federation of Red Cross and

Red Crescent Societies).

Based on Sustainable Development Goals, Goal 5: Gender Equality and guidelines on women's empowerment, a Gender and Diversity Policy was announced in 2017 for the balanced development of women in all sectors of the Ministry of Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement as outlined in National Strategic Plan for the Advancement of Women (2013-2022) and acknowledging and accepting the rights of women and women having those full rights; raising the capacity of women in Myanmar through the support of the government based on gender equality.

MRCS follow this Policy and provides support specifically for women following IFRC's minimum norms of DAPS - respecting the Dignity, equal Access to support and assistance without discrimination, equal Participation in decision making and Safety. Furthermore it provides support to expecting women and children, participation of women in health talks and in local health and natural disaster committees.

With the aim of increasing the health, security and mitigation efforts on occurrence of natural disasters, MRCS had implemented programs in co-

operation with partner organizations for the participation of the people.

The day's talk was held to increase the cooperation and participation of women in social and compassionate programs. Through sharing women's understanding and experience on resisting adversity, the role of women leaders will be raised in increasing public resistance to adversity, said Dr. Shwe Hlwan.

Next, MRCS President Prof.

Dr. Daw Mya Thu presented a commemorative gift to Dr. Shwe Hlwan, after which a commemorative group photo was taken.

Later, discussions were held by participants on MRCS activities and women's roles in various sectors.

## Press Release on the Official Working Visit of President U Win Myint and Spouse Daw Cho Cho to the Socialist Republic of Viet Nam

**AT**THE invitation of His Excellency Nguyen Phu Trong, President of the Socialist Republic of Viet Nam and Spouse, President U Win Myint and Spouse Daw Cho Cho visited Viet Nam from 10 to 14 May 2019 to attend the 16<sup>th</sup> United Nations Day of Vesak and to pay an official working visit.

In the evening of 10 May 2019, Myanmar delegation led by President and Spouse visited Myanmar Embassy in Hanoi and met with Ambassador U Kyaw Soe Win, staff and family members of the Embassy and the Military Attache Office and attended the dinner hosted by Myanmar Ambassador and Spouse.

On 11 May, President and party laid a wreath at the Monument of National Heroes and Martyrs as well as at the Ho Chi Minh Mausoleum. The President also visited Ho Chi Minh's Stilt House.

President U Win Myint then held bilateral talks with the Prime Minister of Viet Nam H.E. Nguyen Xuan Phuc at the Government House. During the meeting, the two leaders reviewed the close friendship and cooperation cultivated by successive leaders and peoples from both countries. They also discussed the positive achievements in bilateral cooperation in recent years, particularly after the elevation of bilateral ties to Comprehensive Cooperative Partnership level in August 2017, which has opened up a

new chapter in Myanmar-Viet Nam bilateral relations.

Both sides discussed to cooperate more closely to strengthen the effectiveness of comprehensive cooperation in all areas, including trade and investment, agriculture, agro-forestry and fishery, connectivity, energy and telecommunications, tourism, Information and Communication Technology; to promote cooperation in regional and international arena; to celebrate activities commemorating the 45th anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic relations between the two countries in 2020; to arrange the goodwill visit of Vietnamese Prime Minister to Myanmar; to continue working closely and extending support to each other at the regional and international fora, especially under the frameworks of ASEAN, the United Nations, ASEM and Mekong sub-regional cooperation mechanisms, to coordinate more closely during Viet Nam's Chairmanship of ASEAN in 2020 and to support Viet Nam's candidacy for a non-permanent seat at the United Nations Security Council for the period of 2020-2021.

The two Leaders reaffirmed their commitments to enhance cooperation and find new means to reach the target of two-way trade to USD 1 billion or higher by 2020 since the trade volume between Myanmar and Viet Nam in 2017-2018 fiscal year reached USD 764

million. Viet Nam now stands as the 9<sup>th</sup> largest trading partner and 7<sup>th</sup> largest foreign investor in Myanmar.

The Vietnamese side stressed the importance attached to its relations with Myanmar and reaffirmed its continued support for Myanmar's effort towards peace and national reconciliation. Likewise, Myanmar side congratulated Viet Nam on the achievements of reforms, especially for the progress on socio-economic lives of its people and sustainable development. The Myanmar side expressed its appreciation to Viet Nam for its consistent support to Myanmar's peace

and national reconciliation process as well as for sharing its experiences in economic development to Myanmar.

The President and Spouse attended the luncheon hosted by the Prime Minister and Spouse at the Government Guest House and the two leaders delivered speeches and exchanged toasts.

In the afternoon, the President received Viet Nam-Myanmar Parliamentarian's Friendship Group at the hotel and exchanged views to promote the existing friendly relations between parliaments, governments and peoples of the two countries, including exchange of visits between the two Parliamentarian's Friendship Groups established in Myanmar and Viet Nam.

The President also met with Madame Nguyen Thi Kim Ngan, President of the National Assembly of Viet Nam. During the meeting, both sides reviewed the existing traditional ties of friendship established by General Aung San and President Ho Chi Minh, and exchanged views on matters pertaining to the positive achievements in bilateral cooperation in recent years and ways to enhance close cooperation between the two parliaments in the ASEAN and other inter-parliamentary organizations.

In the evening, the President and Spouse attended the dinner hosted by Madame Nguyen Thi Kim Ngan, President of the National Assembly of Viet Nam, in honour of the Heads of delegations attending the 16<sup>th</sup> United Nations Day of Vesak Celebrations 2019.

In the morning of 12 May 2019, the President and party attended the opening ceremony of the 16th United Nations Day of Vesak (UNDV) Celebrations held at the Tam Chuc International Convention Center. President U Win Myint delivered an opening speech at the ceremony.

In his speech, the President gave a brief account of the background of the annual convening of the United Nations Vesak Day which was recognized by the United Nations General Assembly's Resolution No. 54/ 115 of 1999, as it is the most Sacred Day commemorating the Birth, Enlightenment and Parinirvana of the Gauthama Buddha. He also apprised the meeting of the historical records indicating the roots of Buddhism in Myanmar since 2 A.D. as well as the Myanmar Government's efforts for propagation of Buddha Sasana. ## Additional statistical bulletin on drug seizures, acting on information

1. In order to prevent and eradicate the dangers of narcotic drugs and psychotropic drugs, the Office of the President has formed the **Drug Activity Special Complaint Department** on 26 June 2018 to systematically accept and respond to reports on drug abuses and other related cases from the general public.
2. With orders from the Office of the President, the Drug Activity Special Complaint Department relayed information on reports on drug-related offenses up to 11 May 2019 to the Ministry of Home Affairs to take action, as displayed below:

# What kind of investments should we make?

**I**NVESTMENT plays a vital role in developing a country. Generally speaking, local and international investments are considered basic drivers that help boost a country's economy.

Investments create job opportunities and stabilize a country's monetary flow.

Thus, investments must be encouraged through several measures such as offering a balanced law, easing regulations, cutting red tape, reducing taxes, and making the investment process easier.

As local and international investments have a bearing on national interests, it is important to scrutinize them and the sectors they flow into.

All types of investments must be assessed, whether they flow into industry, agriculture, production and consumption of natural resources, services, trade, construction, or wholesale sectors.

All we ask is that investors approach investments responsibly and incorporate environmental, social, and governance factors (ESGs) in their enterprises.

The ultimate factor is responsible investment. Both local and international projects must be assessed on the basis of their impact on the environment, the checks they will put in place so that Myanmar's culture and values are not harmed, and the attention they will pay to public healthcare and security.

The government has been constantly adjusting policies, rules, and regulations to bring them in line with international best practices and to make the investment climate more favorable, predictable, simpler, and friendlier.

The government of Myanmar is wholly committed to continued improvement in the country's investment climate. All we ask is that investors approach investments responsibly and incorporate environmental, social, and governance factors (ESGs) in their enterprises.

It is also important that the rights of stakeholders, including employees, are prioritized through the creation of fair and favorable working conditions as part of the responsible investment approach.

Before deciding which investments are to be encouraged, we need to consider how many jobs they will create, whether the opportunities would be reserved for citizens alone, how much technology transfer would they involve, what kind of influence they would have, the socio-economic life of citizens, what potential disadvantages they may have, and finally, how they would impact the environment.

It would be rash to think that magnificent skyscrapers built by reputed construction enterprises will change the life of the general public.

Who benefits from the investment is a big question, along with its potential to help or harm the people.

The ultimate factor is responsible investment. Both local and international projects must be assessed on the basis of their impact on the environment, the checks they will put in place so that Myanmar's culture and values are not harmed, and the attention they will pay to public healthcare and security.

# Beware of shadowy businesses which deceive people to fall into trap of "Get-Rich-Quick" schemes

Some companies are operating illegally through investments and loan programs with giving 10-25% interest for shares. Having a incentive by the high return rates, the public who are not financially literate fall victims to such scams. The Myanmar News Agency met with officials from Bureau of Special Investigation, the Ministry of Home Affairs to talk about how to avoid the traps the cheaters.

**Q: Can you tell us about the investigations on financial crimes?**

**A:** We've been investigating illegal financial companies that have popped up since 2017. There were two branches under SCL Myanmar Co. Ltd in Pyay Township, Bago Region that was selling high return shares illegally in the region. The Bago Region administration reported the activities of the company to us. Subsequent to further investigation, we were able to prosecute a Myanmar and Thai national in the case. Similarly, we were also able to shut down several illegal financial activities online and offline that were scamming the hard earned money of our citizens.

**Q: How can people protect themselves from such crimes?**

**A:** I would advise people to

not be easily swayed by high returns on investments and spot for illegal loans. You have a high risk of losing the investments especially if the company goes under investigation or is shut down. If you encounter or are aware of any illegal operations, report to respective authorities.

**Q: How do you prosecute criminals on financial crimes?**

**A:** In the case of SCL Myanmar Co. Ltd, we found that the Thai national put the Myanmar national in the front and worked behind the scenes to launder the money. It was structured as of pyramid scheme. They managed to have the initial "investors" who were put into teams with the incentive to recruit more "investors". These were further organized into pods that continue to recruit with different bonus schemes for the number of new members for that particular person/pod can manage to

add into the pyramid. There are also systems that the more you "invest", the higher the return was going to be. By the time the company was investigated with the responsible persons prosecuted, the company had over 40,000 members with more than kyats 30,000 million. There are warrants for their arrest being put out at this moment with the money yet to be recovered. Another company was the Malaysian JJPTR Investment Co., Ltd. They practice invest-

ments and small loans from those investments. Under the company name Royal JJ Co., Ltd in Myanmar, JJPTR was operated by Daw Tuan Pi Kyaing. Royal JJ Co., Ltd was registered in Myanmar but the parent company wasn't registered here. How it worked was that people can invest from US\$25 to US\$1000 or more. They have to register and open an account on www.jjptr.com and then transfer the money via Daw Tuan Pi Kyaing. The interest is around 20% and people can look into their accounts online. This business wasn't registered with the Myanmar Central Bank. We were able to prosecute Daw Tuan Pi Kyaing and confiscate company vehicles and Kyats 7900 million of investments.

**Q: Where can citizens report such cases?**

**A:** You can send letters to our department as well as lodge complaint online.

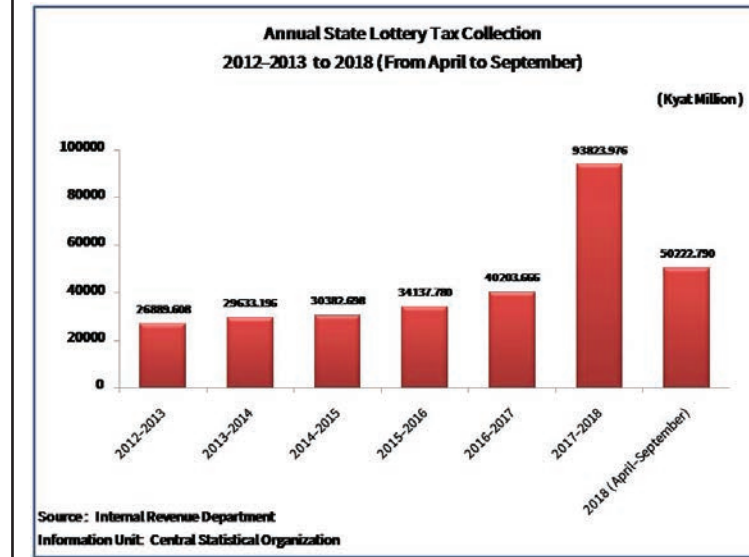
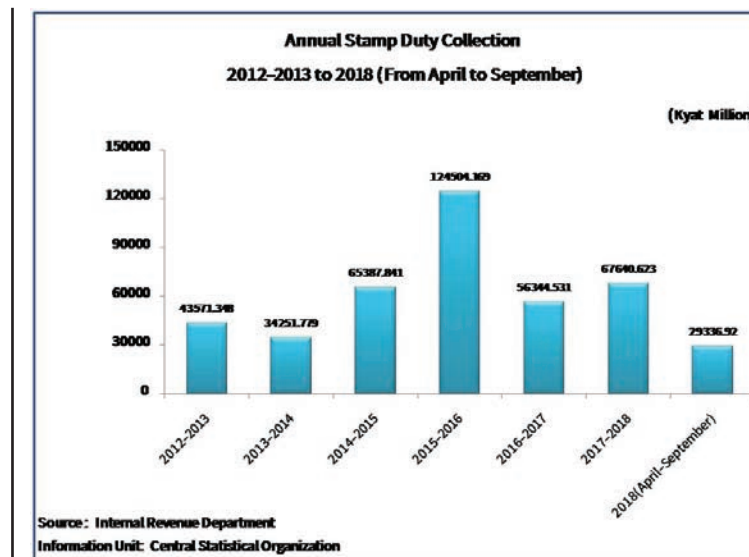
**A:** There is the Financial Institutions Law for the financial sector passed in 2016. According to section 159 of the law, no other institution is allowed to form a creditor entity without the approval of the Central Bank of Myanmar with a minimum of 2 years to maximum 5 years of imprisonment and up to 500 million Kyats in fines if the law is broken. There are also other notifications and trade laws that restrict certain activities by various ministries.

**Q: How do you recover the money that was lost?**

**A:** We try our best during the time of prosecution to make sure that people who lost money are able to recover this amount.

This is either done through the judge who acts as a third party to redistribute the money through the proper due process. They can also sue the culprits with due process according to civil law.

# Eliminate cervical cancer? We can do it

**A**LTHOUGH cervical cancer is for the most part preventable and treatable, its burden is disproportionately high. As part of the global drive to tackle the problem, comprehensive screening, vaccination and treatment – including of pre-cancerous lesions – is crucial

Cervical cancer is a deadly

threat to women's health. Across the world, the disease kills one woman every two minutes, with women between the ages of 30 and 49 most at risk of developing it. But while cervical cancer can affect all women everywhere, its impact is far from uniform: Nearly 90% of the women cervical cancer kills are in low- and middle-income countries, including those of the WHO South-East Asia Region. As the numbers show, cervical cancer is at the core of intersecting inequalities, both global and local.

**Despite the world-beating progress**

Tackling the problem is critically important. Though the Region accounts for just over a quarter of the world's population, it represents 28% of the 570 000

new cases reported every year. More egregiously, in 2018 the Region accounted for 30.7% of the 311 000 deaths attributed to the disease annually, equating to more than 95 000 deaths. Despite the world-beating progress Member States have made in women's health (most notably on maternal health), women continue to be left behind when it comes to preventing, detecting and treating cervical cancer, including pre-cancerous lesions.

WHO and its Member States are working to change that. As per the Region's Flagship Priorities, which each Member State helped develop, all countries are committed to investing in 'best-buys' aimed at preventing noncommunicable diseases (NCDs), including cervical cancer, as well as achieving uni-

versal health coverage (UHC), which will enhance services that will help prevent HPV infection through vaccination, aid early detection and provide pre-cancer treatment. Importantly, Member States are also committed to implementing the Region's own Strategic Framework for the comprehensive control of the problem, as well as the many training packages WHO has produced to support health workers at all levels.

The potential for the Region to accelerate progress and harness key innovations is nevertheless ripe. In May 2018, for example, WHO Director-General Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus made an unprecedented call to eliminate the disease as a public health problem, highlighting the need for high-level buy-in,

including from global partners. In February this year WHO's Executive Board noted the urgent need for decisive action, bringing the issue to the World Health Assembly in May. Come that time, Member States, including from the South-East Asia Region, will have the opportunity to lend their voice to what is a growing chorus to eliminate the disease and achieve a massive win for women's health. Each and every vote will count.

**Promotes healthy behavior**

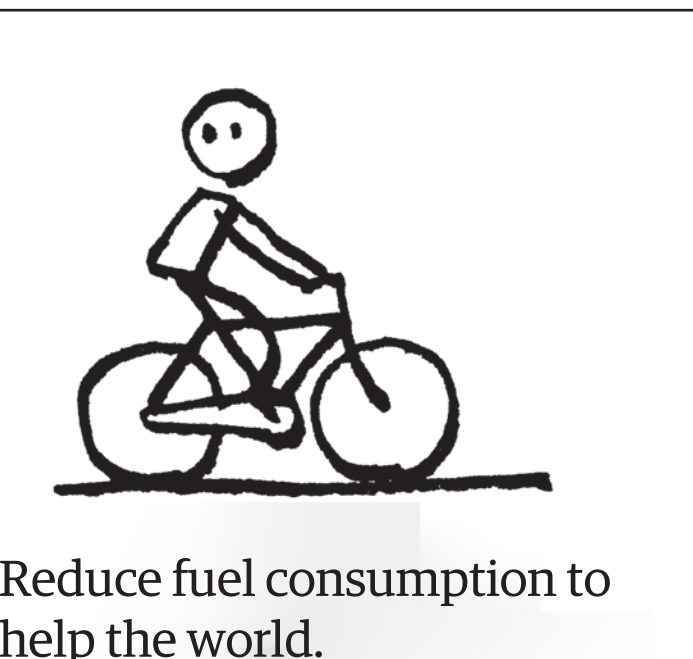
As WHO has made clear, access to the human papilloma virus (HPV) vaccine is crucial to driving rapid and lasting change. Why? Because although most types of HPV infections do not cause cervical cancer, almost all cases of cervical cancer are

caused by HPV. By providing two doses of the HPV vaccine to girls between the ages of nine and fourteen they can be better protected against HPV-caused cervical cancer, thereby dramatically reducing the disease's burden. They can also be provided information that promotes healthy behavior that can help prevent cervical cancer. To date, Bhutan, Sri Lanka, Thailand and, most recently, Maldives have introduced the vaccine nationally, while India's Sikkim State has made the vaccine part of its routine schedule. Bangladesh, Indonesia, Nepal and several Indian states have conducted pilot projects.

These initiatives are to be commended. Where absent, they should be pursued.

## Two flyovers being built on Yangon circular railway

AS part of the circular railway upgrade, Myanmar Railways is constructing two flyovers on the Yangon circular railway for the convenience of passengers.

"There are 26 flyovers on the Yangon circular railway. Among them, nine flyovers need to be upgraded because of their low height. The remaining flyovers are high enough for the trains to pass under them. Currently, MR is upgrading the Ahlon and Insein (Mingyi) flyovers," said U Maung Cho, the engineer from the Mahlwagon factory of MR.

"The Ahlon flyover is 31 feet and 6 inches wide and 12 feet and 6 inches high. So, the drainage canal cannot be built between the bridge and the railway to protect against floods in the rainy season. Sometimes,

trains have to stop at the Ahlone railway station during rains. Therefore, MR will upgrade the flyover to increase its height to 17.5 feet and width to 57 feet. We will be able to dig the drainage canal after upgrading the flyover.

The width of the four-lane flyover will be extended to 44 feet. MR will spend K200 million from this year's on upgrading the bridge, which is expected to be complete in February, 2020," he said.

MR has constructed only

one arm of the forked flyover in Insein. It did not construct the other arm of the flyover in the direction of Mingyi road because of budget constraints. Now, MR will construct the remaining arm of the flyover. The flyover will be 441 feet long, with the approaching road measuring 112 feet and 9 inches. MR will spend K2,000 million on the construction of the flyovers.

MR plans to complete the construction of the Ahlon flyover by January, 2020 and the Insein flyover by the end of 2020. Among the nine bridges under construction, two bridges are being constructed this month, and the remaining will be constructed next year, depending on the budget.—Myint Maung Soe

## Strong winds destroy 800 houses in Sagaing Region

STRONG winds destroyed about 800 houses in two townships of Sagaing Region on the evening of 13 May, according to the Director of the Disaster Management Department.

"We have received data about the scale of damage from Pale and Kani townships. We heard that strong winds were reported in Mingin Township, but the damage has not been calculated yet. We are now collecting data from other townships affected by strong winds," he added.

On 13 May, 780 households in Kani Township and about 20 houses in Pale Township were

reportedly destroyed by strong gusts of wind.

"About 800 houses were damaged in Kani Township. The most affected villages were those

which had been struck by strong winds earlier. The Sagaing Region Chief Minister and officials from concerned departments are currently surveying the areas and

providing necessary relief," said U Theik Soe Tun, Kani Township administrator.

In areas that witnessed strong winds, some villages were battered by hailstones and there were reports of a cargo ship sinking in the Chindwin River, said U Tun Tun Win, region Hluttaw representative of Kani Township constituency. "The winds were strong and hailstones fell in some villages of Sagaing Region. Therefore, many homes were destroyed. A cargo ship sank in the Chindwin River near Medin village on 13 May evening," he said.—Myo Win Tun (Monywa)

## Kachin Investment Committee approves three manufacturing enterprises

THE Kachin State Investment Committee recently endorsed three manufacturing businesses that are expected to create over 200 jobs for local people, according to news released online by the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration.

The three enterprises will be engaged in manufacturing animal

feed, biomass carbon, and plywood and veneer from *Broussonetia Papyrifera* Plant, according to a meeting convened by the investment committee on 10 May at the Kachin State Government Office.

The new Myanmar Investment Law authorizes region and state investment committees to grant endorsements to investment proposals with

a capital of not more than US\$5 million (K6,000 million), in order to simplify the verification process of investment projects.

Kachin State primarily attracts domestic investments. The investments flow into the mining sector; manufacturing of various sizes of cobbles and fire bricks; manufacturing of cork flaps; cold storage services for

crops; cultivation and export of Brazil bananas; construction of wholesale centers for fruits; and, manufacturing and sale of rubber, according to the DICA.

To increase investments, the Myanmar Investment Commission is granting tax incentives to investors, depending on the development status of the states and

regions. The least developed regions, designated as Zone 1, grant income tax exemptions of seven years, while moderately developed regions (Zone 2) have a five-year tax holiday, and adequately developed regions (Zone 3) are exempt for three years. Fourteen townships in Kachin State are included in Zone 1 and investors in the state

can enjoy a seven-year tax break. At present, the Yangon Region absorbs 60 per cent of foreign investments flowing into the country.

Mandalay attracts 30 per cent of investments. Other regions and states get only a small share of investments, according to DICA statistics. — GNLM (Translated by Ei Myat Mon)

## Myanmar rice exports plunge 800,000 tons to reach 1.3 mln tons over seven months of FY

MYANMAR has exported over 1.3 million tons of rice and broken rice in the first seven months of the current fiscal year, a decline of 800,000 tons compared with the corresponding period of the 2017-2018FY, according to the Commerce Ministry.

From 1 October, 2018 to 26 April, 2019, Myanmar shipped over 1.3 million tons of rice and broken rice worth US\$412.377 million, according to data from the

Commerce Ministry.

The country exported 2.1 million tons of rice and broken rice in October-April in the previous fiscal. With the volume of exports falling by 800,000 tons, income has also fallen by \$300 million.

As per data from the Commerce Ministry, over 505,770 tons of rice and broken rice, worth \$153.6 million, were exported through the border gates in the current financial year, while maritime exports were registered at over 831,000

tons and valued at \$258.7 million.

China is the main buyer of Myanmar rice, followed by the Philippines and Côte d'Ivoire. Cameroon is the fourth largest buyer of Myanmar rice, followed by Guinea.

Myanmar sends broken rice mostly to Belgium, followed by Indonesia, China, the UK, and Poland.

Rice trade to China through the Sino-Myanmar border trade channels has halted as China has been

cracking down on illegal goods from October, 2018. This has led to a steep drop in rice exports to China, leaving about 50,000 tons of rice stockpiled at Muse gate. "As China's market constitutes 46 per cent of overall exports of Myanmar, the market is affected by China's demand," said U Aung Than Oo, the Chair of Myanmar Rice and Paddy Traders Association. Myanmar shipped over 3.6 million tons of rice to other countries in the 2017-2018 fiscal year, which is the highest rice export volume so far on record.

## Eliminate cervical cancer? We can do it

But as crucial as national commitment is, other factors are at play, from vaccine procurement and supply issues to pricing and sustainability, especially as economies grow and countries transition away from external assistance. While innovative Regional mechanisms such as the South-East Asia Regulatory Network can have a powerful impact (especially on price transparency and collective bargaining), concerted action is needed to overcome vaccine supply constraints to better reflect Member State ambition. That is, in part, why supporting a global push is so important.

Still, vaccination alone is no silver bullet – it must be accompanied by increased access to health services and a sufficient and affordable supply of screening and treatment technologies, including for pre-cancerous lesions. Screening is recommended for every woman from age 30 and regularly after that. Though all countries in the Region have incorporated these measures

in national cervical cancer screening plans, implementation – especially at the primary level – should be significantly increased as part of the broader drive towards UHC, alongside efforts to better integrate services. This requires Member States to enact the proactive measures needed, as well as promote global buy-in via the World Health Assembly and an action-oriented high-level meeting on UHC at the UN General Assembly later this year.

WHO will remain steadfast in its support to Member States to leverage the full range of interventions to prevent, detect and treat cervical cancer throughout the life-course. In doing so, it will also remain steadfast in helping them leverage global momentum and the innovations needed to make rapid advances to eliminate cervical cancer as a public health problem. Together we must raise our voice and highlight the unconscionable burden women across the Region have borne for far too long. Together we must accelerate progress to eliminate cervical cancer once and for all. ■

# US, Russia test tense ties as Pompeo visits Putin

SOCHI (Russia) — Russian President Vladimir Putin on Tuesday meets US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo in the highest-level talks between the rival powers in nearly a year as they see if they can make headway on a raft of disagreements from Venezuela to Iran to arms control.

Pompeo will visit Putin in the Black Sea resort of Sochi less than two weeks after President Donald Trump voiced optimism about improving relations with Moscow during a more than one-hour telephone conversation with the Russian leader.

The renewed diplomacy followed the long-awaited report in the United States by investigator Robert Mueller which found that Russia interfered in

the 2016 election but that the Trump campaign did not collude with Moscow, partially lifting a cloud that

had hung over the mogul-turned-president for two years.

Pompeo is the high-

est-ranking US official to see Putin since July when Trump met him in Helsinki and stunned the US politi-

cal class by appearing to accept the Russian leader's statement at face value that he did not meddle in the US election.

Trump on Monday announced that he expected a "very fruitful meeting" with Putin and Chinese counterpart Xi Jinping at the G20 summit in Japan, only for Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov to deny Washington had requested such a meeting and say there were "no agreements so far."

Trump's enthusiasm for courting Putin has little support in Washington, even within his own administration, which has kept up a campaign of pressure including sanctions on Russia over alleged election meddling and Moscow's support for armed separatists in Ukraine.

Pompeo, despite his close relationship with Trump, left little doubt on where he stood in remarks Saturday in California.

Addressing the conservative Claremont Institute, Pompeo said that US policymakers in recent decades had "drifted from realism" and chastised them for believing that "enfolding the likes of China and Russia into a so-called rules-based international order would hasten their domestic evolution towards democracy."

"But we can see now 30 years on, after the end of the Cold War, that the Putin regime slays dissidents in cold blood and invades its neighbours," Pompeo said, three days before he sees the Russian president.—AFP ■

## Mystery shrouds 'sabotage' of oil tankers in tense Gulf

DUBAI (United Arab Emirates)—Investigators sought Tuesday to shed light on a series of mysterious attacks on ships off the coast of the UAE, as President Donald Trump warned Iran against doing anything to harm US interests.

Washington and its Gulf allies stopped short of blaming Tehran for what the UAE and Saudi Arabia called the "sabotage" of four ships, including two Saudi oil tankers, on Sunday.

But Trump vowed that Tehran would "suffer greatly" were it to "do anything" to threaten US interests.

"If they do anything, it would be a very bad mistake," Trump warned at the White House. "If they do anything they will suffer greatly."

Iranian President Hassan Rouhani hit back, saying the Islamic republic was "too great to be intimidated by anyone".

"God willing we will pass this difficult period with glory and our heads held high, and defeat the enemy," Rouhani said at a late night meeting with clerics.

The attacks came after

the United States deployed B-52 bombers and an assault ship to bolster an aircraft carrier in the region.

The dispatch of the USS Abraham Lincoln carrier group, the amphibious assault vessel, a Patriot missile battery and the bombers has triggered fears of a possible military confrontation.

"In an environment of rising regional tensions, limited Iranian operations against the UAE and Saudi Arabia might be designed to dissuade Abu Dhabi and Riyadh and signal that war with Iran will not be limited to Iranian soil," said Alex Vatanka, senior fellow at the Middle East Institute.

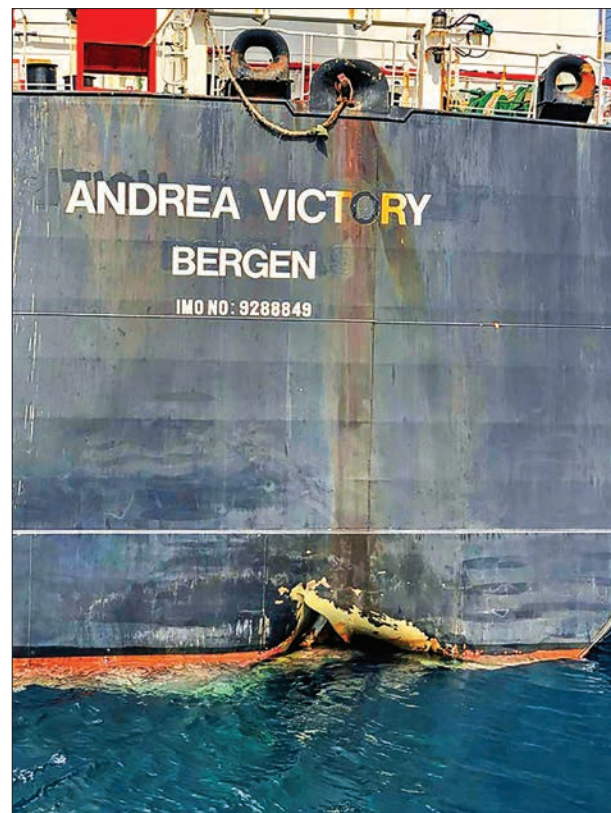
### 'Deliberate sabotage'

A UAE government official said the Saudi oil tankers Al-Marzoqah and Amjad were attacked off the emirate of Fujairah along with the Norwegian tanker Andrea Victory and an Emirati ship, the A. Michel.

No casualties were reported and none of the vessels sank.

Saudi Arabia, Iran's regional arch-rival, condemned "acts of sabotage" and a "criminal act".

The UAE minister of

state for foreign affairs, Anwar Gargash, said the Emirates will probe the "deliberate sabotage".

"The investigation will be conducted in a professional manner, the facts will be made clear, and we have our own readings and conclusions," he tweeted.

Saudi Arabia said its two tankers suffered "significant damage" but there

was no oil spill.

The attacks raised many questions, including the nature of the sabotage.

The Andrea Victory's managers, Thome Group, said the ship had a hole in its hull "after being struck by an unknown object on the waterline".

Asked whether the United States believed Iran played a role in the attacks,

Brian Hook, the US special envoy for Iran, declined to comment, saying only that US authorities would be assisting the investigation at the request of the UAE.

Acting Pentagon chief Patrick Shanahan proposed a revamped military plan at a meeting with senior national security aides, The New York Times reported.

The plan would see up to 120,000 US troops deployed to the Middle East were Iran to attack American forces or speed up nuclear weapons development, the newspaper said.

The United Nations called on all sides to "exercise restraint for the sake of regional peace."

### 'Possibly a warning'

Oil prices initially spiked in response to news of the attacks, but were largely flat in trading on Tuesday.

Fujairah port is the only Emirati terminal located on the Arabian Sea coast, bypassing the Strait of Hormuz through which most Gulf oil exports pass.

Iran has repeatedly threatened to close the strait in case of a military confrontation with the United States.—AFP ■

## 460,000 customers' data possibly leaked from Uniqlo, GU websites

TOKYO—Fast Retailing Co. said Tuesday personal information from 461,091 customer accounts for the shopping websites of its Uniqlo and GU brands may have been leaked through unauthorized access.

The operator of the two fast-fashion brands said the two online store websites were hacked between April 23 and May 10 and customers' names, addresses, phone numbers and credit card data may have been leaked.—Kyodo News ■

## Watson 'gave blood' for Chennai during IPL final

NEW DELHI (India) — Bloodstains on the leg of Shane Watson's trousers during the IPL final as he scored a blistering 80 for Chennai Super Kings were revealed Tuesday to be from a cut that needed six stitches when he finished.

The 37-year-old Australian batsman was on the losing side in the end, but teammate Harbhajan Singh hailed Watson's courage in continuing to play despite suffering a gashed knee while diving for a catch. "Respect brother what a LEGEND @srwatson33 given sweat, blood and everything for the team.. INSPIRING," Singh wrote on Instagram.

The Indian off-spinner posted a picture of Watson with blood-stained yellow trousers while batting in the Twenty20 final against the Mumbai Indians, and said the opener needed six stitches after the valiant innings.

"Can you guys see the blood on his knee.. He got 6 stitches after the game," Harbhajan wrote. "Got injured while diving but continue to bat without telling anyone," the bowler added.

Watson smashed 80 off 59 deliveries only to see his team lose by one run. Watson was run out going for an unlikely second in the final over; and Mumbai pacesman Lasith Malinga denied Chennai the two runs needed off the last ball to win the game and a record fourth title. Watson's return to the IPL next season remains uncertain. He has already bid farewell to Australia's Big Bash T20 tournament, and Chennai captain M.S. Dhoni indicated he would make changes to the batting lineup for next year. —AFP ■

## Herrera confident Solskjaer can restore United's lustre

LONDON (United Kingdom) — Ole Gunnar Solskjaer possesses the qualities necessary to restore Manchester United as a genuine title contender, according to departing midfielder Anders Herrera.

The 29-year-old Spanish international — who has been linked to a move to French champions Paris Saint-Germain — believes the common decency of Solskjaer will be rewarded with better performances on the pitch.

Solskjaer's star faded almost as soon as he was given the job full-time after a terrific spell

as caretaker manager following the sacking of Jose Mourinho in December.

The former United striker guided them to 14 wins in 17 games but the end of the season has been nothing short of a disaster as they lost eight of their last 12 — ending up 32 points off city rivals and champions Manchester City — and missed out on Champions League football next term.

"He is one of the best people I have ever met in football," said Herrera, quitting United after the club declined to offer him a new contract when he demand-

ed increased wages of £300,000 (\$388,000) a week.

"Everyone loves him in the dressing room. Everyone wants to fight for him. "When you have the players behind you and wanting to fight for you, part of the job is done. "I believe in karma and if you are a good person, if you are honest and sincere with the players and the fans, sooner or later it will work.

"I think Ole is the right person because he has qualities and knowledge but also he is a great man and a great person."

### 'The right person is at the wheel'

Herrera, who is likely to be followed out the door by a slew of players in the close season, added Solskjaer and his coaching staff needed the fans to be patient as the turn around will take time.

Solskjaer showed there was a harder edge to him when he cancelled an end-of-season review with the players because he was so angry at the limp display in the 2-0 home defeat by relegated Cardiff in their final match of the season.

"I really believe in Ole. I really believe in Michael (Carrick), Kieran (McKenna), Mick Phelan,

in Demps (Mark Dempsey), but I think there is a tough job ahead," said Herrera. "They (the coaches) need time because this is not going to be from the first day. The club will need time, confidence and support. "I am sure they will give it but the only thing I ask for them is time because this is not easy.

"(But) the right person is at the wheel. He's the right person."

Aside from Herrera veteran defender Antonio Valencia is also leaving on a free transfer, whilst several others including Juan Mata, inconsistent French World Cup winner Paul Pogba and even Belgian striker Romelu Lukaku are thought to be on the way out.

According to Tuesday's Daily Mirror Solskjaer is keen to bring in fresh blood in the shape of Senegalese international central defender Kalidou Koulibaly from Serie A side Napoli and Ivory Coast striker Nicolas Pepe from Ligue 1 outfit Lille.

Koulibaly, the Mirror claims, would cost even more than the £75 million Liverpool paid Southampton for Dutch central defender Virgil van Dijk whilst Pepe would not be cheap either, the paper citing a figure of £45 million. —AFP ■
