Union Minister promises housing for Rakhine IDPs before monsoon

A HIGH level meeting on allocating the internally displaced persons (IDPs) of Rakhine State in safe housing before the arrival of monsoons was held yesterday in Sittway, the state's capital.

At the meeting, Union Minister for Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement Dr Win Myat Aye said, "The rule of law and socio-economic progress are the Government's highest priority programs for Rakhine State.

"The relevant ministries, committees and organizations, and the public, are joining hands to enforce the rule of law in Rakhine State," he pointed out, adding, "The socio-economic progress of the state is the most focused program of the Union Enterprise for Humanitarian Assistance, Resettlement and Development in Rakhine State (UEHRD), the related ministries, social organizations, NGOs, INGOs, entrepreneurs and the people."

The Union Minister also explained his ministry's role in fulfilling the needs to ensure equality among the peoples of Myanmar, and reforms whose priority was based on the degree of requirements. "Because of its volume of requirements, Rakhine State is included in the priority list," he added.

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“We are a government body that is responsible for looking after the vulnerable and victims, and we are here to assist the people who were driven away from their homes by the recent armed conflicts,” he noted.

“It is the fourth time we come here for this purpose. During the past three visits, the ministry provided rice, clothing and household items for the victims of the conflicts. Moreover, over K 900 million were channeled through the UEHRD for the victims.

“The Government is striving for the development of the whole Rakhine State and ensuring the rule of law. Additionally, it is seeking out the means for making the state a conflict-free area. Currently, the government is participating in its mission to

provide a safe shelter for the victims of the conflicts.”

The Union Minister called for collective efforts of all relevant departments, organizations and persons.

In his discussions, U Nyi Pu, the Chief Minister of Rakhine State, elaborated on providing for the needs of the IDPs, the program to provide shelter for them before the onset of monsoons, and the responsibility and involvement of the departments.

After a presentation, made by director of Rakhine State Government on the temporary shelter for the IDPs, Deputy Minister U Soe Aung, cabinet members of Rakhine State, and officials took part in the discussions. The Union Minister and the Chief Minister joined in the discussions.

Knife-waving man shot while resisting arrest, dies in hospital



MANDALAY Police received news that a man, identified as U Min Htwe, was brandishing a knife at the corner of streets 66th and 14th in Daw Na Ward, Aungmyethazan Township, at 4 am on 18 May.

When police arrived at the scene with witnesses, U Min Htwe became aggressive to the police and was given a warning shot. Police fired another shot when he continued his aggressive actions.

He suffered wounds to his abdomen and right ankle and was rushed to Mandalay General Hospital where he died at 4:30 am. His national identity card (without a photo) and a train ticket from Lashio to Mandalay was discovered on his body. Police have filed the case as No. 4/2019 under death at the crime scene and are continuing investigations. — Police Information Department (Translated by Zaw Htet Oo)

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Mango growers face hurdles posed by higher prices for inputs

MANGO growers in Sagaing Region are now facing hurdles posed by an increase in prices for various inputs, such as fertilizer, insecticide and farming equipment.

U Kyaw Myint, a mango farmer from Depayinkwe Village, said, "Difficulties faced by mango growers include an increase in prices of fertilizer, insecticide and farming equipment. In addition, there are some difficulties in the roads used to send mangos to the market."

He also said that in his view the village is in need of a sale centre where only growers who have been awarded Good Agricultural Practices (GAP) certificates will sell their quality products. The plan is expected to receive more attention from the merchants for those products and encourage other local growers to grow crops

under the GAP system.

In Sagaing Region, seven mango growers won the GAP

certificates in 2017 for the first time. A total of 19 mango growers received GAP certificates in

the following year and 14 mango growers were awarded GAP certificates this year.

In Depayinkwe Village alone, there are roughly 3,000 mango plantations run by about 300 farmers, and farmers estimated that approximately 10,000 mangos are likely to be harvested this season, he added.

Ko Hmway, another mango grower, said farmers receive a good price for mangos this season, especially in the export market.

However, they are also facing higher input prices. Currently, the prices of fertilizer, farm trucks and pumping machines are increasing in the market.

For the time being, a 15-kilo package of mango is priced at about K12,000 in the market. Last year, growers received only K10,000 per package, he said.—Win Oo, Myo Win Tun ■

Import outperforms export in Myanmar's trade with Singapore in seven months Oct-Apr

THE value of Myanmar's import surpassed export in bilateral trade with Singapore in the first seven months (Oct, 2018-Apr, 2019) of current fiscal year, according to data of the Ministry of Commerce.

Singapore is the second largest trading partner of Myanmar in the region, after Thailand.

Myanmar's export to Singapore was worth US\$298 million while import was valued \$1.67 billion, totaling \$1.94 billion.

Myanmar exports agricultural products, footwear, textile and clothing, minerals and animal products, to Singapore while its imports are plastic, fuel oil, capital goods, intermediate

goods, consumer products, metals and chemicals.

Myanmar's bilateral trade with Singapore were registered at \$1.9 billion in past mini-budget period, \$3.83 billion in 2017-2018 fiscal year and \$2.96 billion in 2016-2017 FY. Next, Singapore listed 20 enterprise brought into over \$1.57 billion in Oct-Apr pe-

riod, according to data released by the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration.

Additionally, Singapore stood first on the list of countries with largest FDI inflow in Thilawa Special Economic Zone, followed by Japan and Thailand.—Ko Khant ■ (Translated by Ei Myat Mon)

Capital goods import down by 15% in current FY

MYANMAR'S import of capital goods as of 10 May in the current 2018-2019 Fiscal Year topped US\$ billion, down by over \$600 million or 15 per cent, from the corresponding period last FY, the Ministry of Commerce's report this Friday. At this time last year, the imports of capital goods exceeded \$4 billion, with \$638.1

million by the public sector and \$3.4 billion by the private sector.

The current value of capital goods included \$525.8 million by the public sector and \$2.9 billion by the private sector. When compared with the same period last FY, this year's imports of capital goods by the public sector decreased by \$112.2 million where-

as the private sector's import of the same declined by over \$500 million. The country spent its \$11.05 billion on importing four major groups of products between 1 October and 10 May, including \$4.14 billion worth of manufactured goods, \$2.03 billion worth of consumer goods and \$1.4 billion worth of CMP raw

materials. Myanmar continues external trade with international countries, including China, India, ASEAN member countries, European states and Western nations and African countries not only maritime routes but also land border points of entry.—Shwe Khine ■ (Translated by Khaing Thanda Lwin)

Transport, Communication sector pulls the largest FDI in current fiscal year

THREE enterprises brought foreign direct investments worth US\$1.15 billion in transport and communication sector in past seven months (Oct-Apr) of current fiscal year, according to statistics provided by the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration (DICA).

Between 1 October 2018 and 30 April 2019, FDI of \$2.4 billion including expansion of capital

were brought into the country. Myanmar Investment Commission (MIC) and the respective investment committees of the states and regions allowed 150 enterprises to invest in the country. The manufacturing sector attracted 115 projects worth \$668 million so far this FY. The agriculture sector attracted four foreign investment with a capital of \$14 million. Livestock and Fisheries

sector witnessed seven foreign investment projects worth \$33.9 million. Two projects worth \$93 million invested in power sector. The real estate sector also received investments worth \$54 million from one project. The hotels and tourism sector attained FDI of \$58.9 million with new four foreign projects. Industrial estate sector also attracted one project worth \$48.45 million. Over \$276.3

million of FDIs were pumped into other services.

MIC targets to attain \$5.8 billion of FDIs for next fiscal year 2018-2019, according to the DICA.

FDI registered at \$1.76 billion in the past mini-budget period, \$5.7 billion in FY 2017-2018, \$6.6 billion in FY 2016-2017 and \$9.4 billion in FY 2015-2016 respectively.—GNLM ■ (Translated by Ei Myat Mon)

Myanmar-India trade exceeds \$100 in March

MYANMAR-India trade totalled US\$100 million in the first half of this 2018-2019 Fiscal Year, with \$38.3 million in exports and \$63.6 million in imports, according to the monthly report issued by the Ministry of Commerce this Friday. Between October and March this FY, Myanmar's export to neighbouring India was pegged at almost \$337.6 million, while the bilateral import stood at \$444.9 million, totalling \$782.5 million. Myanmar and India mostly deliver goods via marine trade routes. Border trade between the two countries is conducted through Tamu, Reed and Htantalan cross-border points of entry. According to the ministry's trade data, border exports between the two countries this FY was \$122.3 million, whereas border imports exceeded \$70 million.

India is one of Myanmar's top trading partners. The two countries inked bilateral border trade agreement in 1994. The marketable products between the two countries are ginger, saffron, turmeric, bay leaves and other kinds of fruits and vegetables, plus human hair, fishery and forest-based products, medicines, oil-cakes, electronic products, motorbikes, cotton yarn, non-alloy steel and other construction materials to Myanmar.—Khine Khant ■ (Translated by Khaing Thanda Lwin)

Organized on 18 May each year or around this date, the objective of the International Museum Day (IMD) is to raise awareness of the fact that, “Museums are an important means of cultural exchange, enrichment of cultures and development of mutual understanding, cooperation and peace among peoples.”

At the IMD held at the National Museum in the capital city, Director-General U Kyaw Oo Lwin of the Department of Archaeology, National Museum and Library, pointed out that

museums were responsible for preserving and protecting heritage of human race and preventing illicit trafficking of artifacts, especially the age-old objects.

“Additionally, museums in Myanmar need innovative ideas in arranging systematic and attractive displays, while applying the collecting methods that are within the legal framework,” he noted.

All around the world, more and more museums participate in International Museum Day. Last year, more than 37,000 museums participated in the event in about 158 countries and territories.

“Since its establishment in 1946, the International Council of Museums (ICOM) has been

combating the illegal ancient antiques trade, apart from enhancing its Museum Emergency Program (MEP) which is carrying out the work of shielding the artifacts against human and natural hazards,” the director general explained.

“MEP is also cooperating with the International Council of the Blue Shield (ICBS,” he added.

Deputy Director of the department Dr Thein Lwin explained the salient points of IMD. Organized in cooperation with the British Council, the IMD in Nay Pyi Taw includes roundtable talks and paper reading sessions. It continues till 20 May. —Aye Aye Thant ■

NARCOTIC drugs are a blight on the human race. We can clearly see the problems they are causing in Myanmar, as our societies are forced to face their negative consequences. Narcotic drugs are a serious challenge, not just for the people of Myanmar, but for everyone around the world, as well. There are many hardships to eliminating drug suppliers and introducing alternative crops to poppy plantations. We need to establish genuine peace to resolve this problem and elevate the lives of poppy farmers, so that their perspectives are changed for the better.

For replacing poppy plantations with alternative crops to succeed, relevant authorities need to ensure the development of borders, better production paths in rural development, proper electrification, planting short-term and long-term crops, technological support, fixing farmlands, access to proper water supplies, and creating a space for the alternative produce in the wider market. The most important factor, however, is regional stability, which requires a peace processes to succeed.

The Union Government is the main facilitator for projects replacing poppy plantations with alternative crops, and if private businesses were to cooperate in this, it could further benefit the local people and reduce problems arising from drug abuse. There have been similar projects deployed before, but they were largely unsuccessful due to ongoing conflicts in those regions. The people need to adopt the understanding that this project is designed to instill stability in their region.

Drug plantations and their illegal trade still exist in Southeast Asia and our neighboring countries, but the steady tasks of preventing and eradicating drugs has produced considerable results. Myanmar has also vowed to strengthen cooperation with its neighbors in that regard.

The Union Government has been working hard to finalize the peace process by regularly holding political dialogue with the Hluttaws, Tatmadaw and ethnic armed organizations.

We urge every citizen to cooperate with us to encourage more alternative crop plantations and reduce the dangers of narcotic drug use.

Putao: Encouraging development tasks in outlying region of Myanmar

PUTAO in Kachin State is a landscape painted with mountainous backdrop and home to several rare animals with its preserved natural habitats living harmoniously with several ethnic minorities in the region.

Putao spreads across a total of 10610 square km and consists of 5 townships: Putao, Machyanbaw, Naungmoon, Hkawng Lamphu, Sumpra Burn.

As Putao is part of the Himalayas, the area is mountainous with nice flat land rare to find. Standing at an elevation of 1329 feet above sea level, the Putao Valley is 12 miles wide and 20 miles long with the mountainous surroundings, home to the famous confluence of the May Kha and Malikha in Kachin State. Putao is bordered by China in the East, Myikyina District in the South, India to its east and China in the North. Naung Mon Township is also home to the highest peak, Mt Hkakabo Razi in Myanmar at 19296 feet (5,881 m).

Popular tourist attractions

Putao is filled with natural scenery that includes ice capped mountains, 7 storied waterfalls, historic pagodas and rivers. There is Mt. Phon Kan Razi, Mt. Hkakabo Razi and Gamlang Razi that is a stronghold for biodiversity in Myanmar, extraordinarily rich flora and fauna and colorful rare species of animals. Mt. Hkakabo Razi is 164 miles away from Putao with no direct route. Hence, visitors often take the 12-day trek amongst the mountains, cliffs, caves, tunnels in extreme weather to arrive at the famous mountain. The challenge, however,

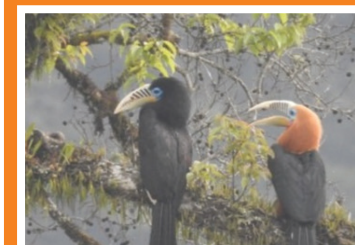

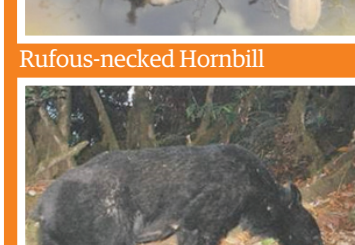

Access to energy

The improvement of roads and the flights have drastically increased movement to and from Myitkyina and Putao. In 2018, due to lack of sources for energy, Putao only received 19 hours of electricity everyday while other towns received as little as 3 hours. However, with the completion of the Upper Nam Htuan Hydro power project, 10 wards in Putao as well as 4 in Machyanbaw are now supplied with 24-hour electricity with other towns receiving at least 5 hours of electricity per day. These developments have greatly opened a wave of new opportunities for residents and increased the number of small businesses significantly.

Biodiversity

The area is home to a variety of ecosystems such as the mountain ecosystem, forest ecosystem, grassland ecosystem and inland wetland ecosystem. These systems house a plethora of wildlife and fauna that are sources of food, fresh water and even medicine. These also provide a potential practical field for study for geologists, biologists and botanists. Lastly, the waters, mountains and animals serves as a great attraction for nature

lovers for hikes, bird watching, rafting and other adventures in the area. However, it is important to preserve these by preventing hunting, mining, and forest fires.

Social development indicators

There has been a project in continuous development to bring libraries across the area with members having access to not only stories and news but also children books and subject matter specific books such as those on botany and other native species. There have also been community centers in development with various social, cultural and economic events held starting 2013. The centers also host training workshops, hobby clubs, competitions and roundtables as well.

Encouraging development

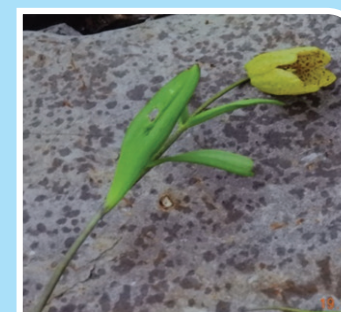

However, from the constant and strenuous effort from the government starting 2015, the developments have greatly improved the everyday lives of the residents as well as introduced the beauty of the area to the rest of the world.

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Solo cyclist completes over 2,500 mile-trip for almost five months

A cyclist from Myanmar has arrived at Bayintnaung Cape in Kawthoung, the southernmost town of the country via outlying Town of Putao, on Saturday afternoon, May 18.

Cyclist Win Ko Ko Tun first successfully reached the summit of Mount Everest, the world's highest mountain. He started his solo bike trip on December 27, 2018, leaving the northernmost villages in Putao in Kachin State by bicycle. He biked more than 2,500 miles between the starting point and final point in nearly five months.

Win Ko Ko said the cycling tour took four months and 26 days, as it covers research on natural resources along the tour.

Jade, jewellery worth K6 bln sold at emporium in Myitkyina

THE 2nd Jade and Jewellery Emporium held last Saturday in Myitkyina saw over K6 billion in sales, mainly organized by the Gems and Jewellery Entrepreneurs Association (Myitkyina) and supported by the Myanmar Gems and Jewellery Entrepreneurs Association, under the guidance of the Kachin State government, according to the

S. Arabia calls urgent Gulf, Arab League meetings over tensions

RIYADH (Saudi Arabia)—Saudi Arabia has called for urgent meetings of the regional Gulf Cooperation Council and the Arab League to discuss escalating tensions in the region, the kingdom's official news agency said on Saturday.

The Saudi Press Agency (SPA) said King Salman had invited Gulf leaders and Arab states to two emergency summits in Mecca on May 30 to discuss recent "aggressions and their consequences" in the region. Tensions have soared in the Gulf, with the United States deploying an aircraft carrier and bombers there over alleged threats from Iran. Saudi foreign affairs minister Adel al-Jubeir said his country does not want to go to war with Iran, but was ready to defend its interests. Riyadh "does not want a war, is not looking for it and will do everything to prevent it". The United Arab Emirates "welcomed" Saudi Arabia's invitation.

Four ships, including two Saudi oil tankers, were damaged in mysterious sabotage attacks last Sunday off the UAE's Fujairah,

located at the crucial entrance to the Gulf. That incident was followed by drone strikes Tuesday by Yemen's Huthi rebels on a major Saudi oil pipeline, which provided an alternative export route if the Strait of Hormuz closed.

Iran has repeatedly threatened to prevent shipping in Hormuz in case of a military confron-

tation with the United States, which has imposed sanctions on Tehran in recent months. Jubeir said the UAE was leading the probe into the damaged oil tankers, but added that "we have some indications and we will make the announcements once the investigations are completed". Despite international

scepticism, the US government has been pointing to increasing threats from Iran, a long-time enemy and also a rival of US allies Israel and Saudi Arabia. SPA on Sunday said the Saudi crown prince spoke on the phone with US Secretary of State Mike Pompeo about efforts to enhance security in the region. —AFP ■

Australia's Morrison returned as prime minister in general election

SYDNEY—Australian Prime Minister Scott Morrison led his conservative Liberal-National coalition to a surprising come-from-behind victory in the country's general election on Saturday.

"I have always believed in miracles," Morrison declared in his victory speech to Liberal Party faithful gathered at a Sydney hotel shortly after midnight, referring to exit polling that pointed to a slim win for the main opposition Labor Party.

Flanked by his wife and daughters, Morrison thanked the "quiet Australians" who supported him.

"Tonight is not about me or it's not about even the Liberal Party," he said to chants of "Sco-Mo" from the elated crowd. "Tonight is about every single Australian who depends on their government to put them first!"

He also said that Labor Party leader Bill Shorten had shortly before called him to concede defeat.

Morrison, 51, campaigned

tirelessly into the final hours of the election, making a last-ditch trip to the southernmost state of Tasmania to visit two marginal seats before returning to his Sydney electorate to cast his vote with wife Jenny.

With just over 70 percent of the vote counted, the coalition appears on track to win 74 seats in the lower house, just short of the 76 needed to govern with a

majority.

Earlier in the evening, Shorten delivered a concession speech in which he announced he would step down from the party leadership but remain in parliament.

"I know that you're all hurting, and I am too," the 52-year-old former trade union leader said at Labor Party headquarters in Melbourne. "It is obvious

that Labor will not be able to form the next government."

His party campaigned strongly on a policy of greater action on climate change, as well as a raft of changes to taxation, while the Liberal Party, the dominant party in the coalition, stressed the importance of fiscal stability at a time of global economic uncertainty.

One of the few seats which the Liberal Party lost was that of former Prime Minister Tony Abbott, who saw his previously safe northern Sydney seat go to independent Zali Steggall, who campaigned mainly on climate change.

There are more than 16 million eligible voters in the population of 25 million, with voting being compulsory. The Labor Party lost the last two general elections in 2013 and 2016.

Morrison successfully faced his first election as leader since he replaced former Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull last August after a party-room revolt.—Kyodo News ■

Bolivian president launches bid for reelection to fourth term

CHIMORÉ (Bolivia)—Bolivian President Evo Morales launched his campaign Saturday for a fourth term, rejecting opposition allegations that he leads a corrupt and dictatorial government. Morales, 59, is Bolivia's first indigenous president and is aiming to be reelected in October. Bolivia's 2009 constitution, promulgated by Morales himself, limits a president to two consecutive terms of office. A 2016 referendum saw Morales defeated in his bid to secure public support to remove term limits. But his government rejected the result while the constitutional court, filled with Morales loyalists, ruled it was his human right to seek reelection. Before a massive rally of more than one million people, the leftist leader asked for "five more years (of leadership) to guarantee this liberation for life." —AFP ■

Helicopter crashes in Hong Kong, at least 1 dead

HONG KONG—A helicopter crashed at Hong Kong's Kadorie Farm on Sunday, leaving at least one dead, according to police sources of China's Hong Kong Special Administrative Region. The crash happened at Lam Kam Road in the New Territories at around 5:30 p.m. local time, and one dead body was found at the scene. Due to the incident, the only lane of Lam Kam Road both bounds near Kadorie Farm and Botanic Garden are closed to traffic.—Xinhua ■

One UN peacekeeper killed, several others wounded in Mali

UNITED NATIONS—A United Nations peacekeeper was killed and several others were wounded in two incidents in Mali on Saturday, the UN said. A UN statement said a Nigerian blue helmet "succumbed to his wounds following the armed attack by unidentified assailants" in Timbuktu. Another Nigerian peacekeeper was also injured in the attack. While expressing his deep sadness over the loss, UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres said the attack could amount to a war crime.—Xinhua ■

Mineral misery: Viet Nam salt farmers battered by imports, climate

HON KHOI (Viet Nam)—The salt farmers of Hon Khoi rise before dawn as they have for generations, fanning out across shallow seawater pools in southern Vietnam to harvest the precious mineral, hoping for a better season than the last. The work is punishing and the incomes unstable, subject to seesawing demand swayed by foreign imports, and increasingly unpredictable weather patterns. Many people in the sleepy seaside town in Khanh Hoa province have worked much of their lives in the salt fields—an Instagram hotspot where workers wearing conical hats ferry mountains of the saline crystals in bamboo baskets along reflective ponds against a setting sun.

They shuffle carefully along narrow ledges separating the rectangular plots that are pumped full of salty seawater. But the farmers say life is tough on the fields where they toil during the annual harvesting season from January to June. “This job is no fun at all, we have to work so hard in the sun and then during the cool season we are off,” said Nguyen Thanh Lai, his tan skin weathered from nearly four decades working in the fields. He sells his harvest to local traders who pass it up the value chain until it reaches dining tables or factories around Vietnam, where it is used to preserve fish, concoct Southeast Asia’s popular, pungent fish sauce, or make soda water.—AFP ■

Over 200 stranded people rescued on Yakushima Island after heavy rain

KAGOSHIMA (Japan)—More than 200 people descended a mountain on Yakushima Island in southwestern Japan on Sunday with the help of rescuers after they were left stranded following heavy rain the previous day. Torrential rain of around 120 millimeters per hour fell on the island late Saturday afternoon. Roads heading to the main attraction—a giant cedar tree—were flooded and blocked by landslides.

Hikers in more than 10 cars and buses were forced to spend the night in the ve-

hicles and a mountain cabin. Some spent the night outdoors. Due to the weather conditions, the rescue operation only commenced Sunday. Several of the hikers complained of pains or feeling unwell and some were taken to hospital. None were in serious condition, according to local officials.

The island, known for its Jomon cedar tree and the 1,936-meter Mt. Miyaura, has been designated as a world natural heritage site by the U.N. Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization.—Kyodo News ■

India’s acrimonious election comes to an end

KOLKATA (India)—Voting in one of India’s most acrimonious elections in decades entered its final day Sunday as Hindu nationalist Prime Minister Narendra Modi scrambled to hang on to his overall majority. The seventh and final round of voting ended the world’s biggest election with 900 million

eligible voters from Goa’s beaches to Mumbai’s slums and Ladakh’s Himalayan monasteries. Long queues formed outside polling stations in eight northern states electing the final 59 candidates to India’s 543-seat lower house. Polls close at 1230 GMT with vote counting on Thursday. Heavy security

was imposed in West Bengal, which has seen street battles between followers of Modi’s Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) and opposition groups.

An improvised bomb was thrown from a motorbike at one polling booth in the state capital Kolkata but no one was injured,

officials said. One group attacked a makeshift BJP office in the city and police also cleared other activists blocking polling stations. Modi’s constituency in Varanasi, the holy city in Uttar Pradesh state, was also among those to vote.

The conservative BJP has campaigned aggressively on Modi’s strongman image and played up recent cross-border air strikes against Pakistan. The opposition, led by the Congress party and its leader, Rahul Gandhi, have accused him of pursuing divisive policies and neglecting the economy. Modi and Gandhi have hurled insults at each other on a near daily basis with the prime minister calling his rival a “fool” while Gandhi derides Modi as a “thief”. —AFP ■

Take this app: tech firms tackle opioid crisis with software

WASHINGTON (United States)—Technology firms are taking aim at the opioid crisis and related health problems with a new class of treatments—digital therapeutics—delivered by smartphone.

These new treatments, backed by medical research and offered by prescription, are seen as potential ways to supplement, and in some cases replace, pharmaceuticals to treat addiction and an

array of other mental and physical health issues.

Smartphone technology may be well-suited to behavioral therapy for addiction, depression and other disorders by making treatment more accessible and trackable by medical professionals, researchers say. “Digital therapeutics are validated scientific treatments delivered in the form of software, which can increase access and provide an immediacy,”

said Yuri Maricich, head of the clinical and regulatory team at Pear Therapeutics.

The company has received approval in the United States for apps to treat opioid addiction and other kinds of substance abuse.

“It’s the same level of rigor (as pharmaceuticals) in terms of how the products are manufactured. We’ve run randomized clinic trials to make sure it produces the desired outcome and that it is safe,”

Maricich said.

In January, Pear launched in coordination with Novartis unit Sandoz the reSET-O prescription digital therapeutic 12-week cognitive behavioral therapy to treat opioid addiction after receiving approval by the US Food and Drug Administration.

It is offered with the commonly used medication buprenorphine for adults under the care of a therapist. —AFP ■

Soil heavy metal cadmium makes plants more sensitive to ozone pollution: research

SHENYANG—Chinese researchers have discovered that a high density of metal cadmium in soil makes plants more sensitive to ozone pollution. Heavy metal and ground-level ozone pollution have been steadily increasing, especially in cities with heavy industry, said the research paper published on the journal *Ecotoxicology and Environmental Safety*.

Researchers from the Institute of Applied Ecology of the Chinese Academy of Sciences used the Urban Field Experiment Platform to conduct research on the effects of elevated ozone concentration and a high density of heavy metal on plants in

northeast China. The results showed that high cadmium content in soil increased the susceptibility and toxicity of plants, such as a hybrid poplar mentioned in their study, to ozone pollution, meanwhile the ozone exacerbated cadmium accumulation in above-ground parts of the plants grown on cadmium-polluted soil. The researchers did not find a significant effect of low cadmium soil on photosynthesis and above-ground biomass. The research results may be consulted when selecting plants for urban afforestation and ecological soil restoration in ozone-polluted and high soil heavy metal areas.—Xinhua ■

Heading for Maliwan

A SPEED boat on Dawei-Myeik-Kawthoung run left Dawei at dawn and reaches Myeik Jetty at 9 a.m. Before these speed boats ply this route, travellers from Dawei to Myeik or the other way round took coastal liners from Myanmar Five Stars Line, private motor launches, trawlers or cargo boats which makes the travel time longer.

Five years ago speed boats start running the Dawei to Kawthoung route. With their safe and fast service, it attracted more and more passengers. This was an improvement of transport modes in Taninthayi coastal region. However, speed boats run the routes only in the open season and the services were halted during the rainy season.

We boarded the speed boat at Myeik jetty and after storing our bags we descended into the hull where the passenger compartment was. Even though the passenger compartment had windows, the windows were water tight and sealed shut. The passenger compartment was air conditioned and the seats were arranged as on a highway express bus with entertainment provided for the passengers via a television. There were four entrances from the deck to the passenger compartment but the doors of these entrances were also closed once the speed boat was on



its way.

After a brief 45-minute stop at Myeik jetty, the boat sped on to Dawei. As the passenger compartment was down in the hull of the boat, except for the waves, we were unable to view much scenery. When we asked a crew member to view the scenery from the deck, the crew member replied that for safety reason, passengers were not allowed onto the deck while the boat was underway. That was why the doors were closed and we ended up either reading books or watching whatever was shown on the television. The speed boat took eight hours run and reaches Kawthoung at

about 5 p.m. Comparing our trip on the speed boat with the trip made before the speed boat ply the route, we miss viewing the natural scenery but we gain in travelling speed.

Our first destination in Kawthoung was Bayintnaung Cape. Kawthoung was the southernmost city of Myanmar while Bayintnaung Cape was the southernmost land of the country. Steel hand rails circled the Bayintnaung Cape while the floor was tiled. As the sea breeze blow through the cape, I stood enjoying the panoramic view as my clothes flap in the wind. I found it hard to describe my feeling at that time. Remembering the vast-



naung in Myanmar and English written by retired director general of Department of Archaeology Professor Sayagi Dr. Khin Maung Nyunt.

King Bayintnaung (AD 1551-1581) was born of father Minye Thihathu Mingyi Swe and mother Khin Myo Myat in 877 Myanmar Era (AD 1515). His was born Shin Ye Htut. His father was guardian of King Tabinshwehti and mother was a wet-nurse of King Tabinshwehti. Tabinshwehti and Shin Ye Htut were thus close friends since childhood. Tabinshwehti was three months and four days older than Shin Yet Htut. As they grew up, Shin Ye Htut fell in love with Khin Khin Gyi, elder sister of Tabinshwehti. When Tabinshwehti ascended the throne, King Tabinshwehti allowed his close friend Shin Ye Htut to wed his elder sister Khin Khin Gyi.

King Tabinshwehti also conferred a title of Kyawhtin Nawrahta on his faithful and brave friend Shin Ye Htut. While serving under King Tabinshwehti, Kyawhtin Nawrahta or Shin Ye Htut displayed his physical prowess as well as mental capability. He fought bravely in the victorious Naungyoe battle in 1537. King Tabinshwehti was so impressed that he took off his ring and bracelet and presented to Kyawhtin Nawrahta and also conferred Kyawhtin Nawrahta to rule Hline City. King Tabinshwehti also conferred the title of Bayintnaung on Kyawhtin Nawrahta and thus Shin Ye Htut became Bayintnaung Kyawhtin Nawrahta but was known more as Bayintnaung in Myanmar history.

Bayintnaung became crown prince in 1541 and took over the throne in 912 Myanmar Era (AD 1551). He founded the second Myanmar Empire and ruled it from Kanbawzathadi Royal Palace established at Hantawady Bago in 1553. He expanded eastward and brings in Phitsanulok and Ayutthaya into

his empire. As King of Ayutthaya presented four white elephants, King Bayintnaung was named White Elephants Owner Hantawady King. The Second Myanmar Empire stretched from Kengtung, Lan Xang, Luang Prabang, Ayutthaya to the east and Manipur in the west.

66 years old King Bayintnaung passed away in 943 Myanmar Era (AD 1581). As I read his brief biography, my patriotic and nationalist spirit rises. I ended up bowing to the 2nd Myanmar Empire founder King Bayintnaung kept in high esteem by citizens of Myanmar.

The next day we drove north of Kawthoung by car along the Union Highway to Maliwan Village at the 25 mile post. On the way, we visited Pulontontone wooden bridge that spans across the sea and paid homage to a Buddha image made of bamboo strips. Along the way we saw oil palm plantations and areca palm farms. We also saw areca nuts dried under the bright sun.

Bama, Shan and Salon arrived and settled in Maliwan area around 1750 as they seek greener pasture along the bank of Pak Chan River. The area was a flat plain with blossoming small jasmine flowers. In Thai, Mali means small jasmine and

Wan means day. So Maliwan means the day when small jasmine flower blossom. Locals say Maliwan is a land of blossoming jasmine.

Maliwan Village is home to some 4,000 people in more than 850 houses. We saw three monasteries, a primary school and a dispensary. The majority of the people work in agriculture – horticulture farms, rubber plantations and areca palm farms.

Maliwan Village host Kawthoung's sole waterfall and hot spring. Due to poor transportation in the past, Maliwab waterfall and hot spring were not known to many people. Now a local tour company TZK was working with the government to promote the waterfall and hot spring as a tour destination. Locals as well as visitors from afar can now visit and enjoy the waterfall and hot spring as the area develops.

As we entered Maliwan resort by walking over the wooden bridge, we saw a wide body of water that was the dam-up waters of the waterfall. There were a bunch of swimmers in the water while small groups of picnickers were here and there picnicking beside the water. Some had hiked along the mountain path to reach the

resort while there were some foreigners who seems to be there after visiting Kawthoung. There were waterfalls and hot springs in Ranong, Thailand, opposite of Kawthoung. I may be bit biased but I think Maliwan waterfall and hot spring was more beautiful. At least it was more of a virgin place.

After swimming, we hiked up to the top of the waterfall along the hill route. In addition to the natural beauty that surrounds the path, near the top was a concrete bock with an X-mark on it ringed with an iron chain. Some say it was something hidden by the Japanese during Second World War but no one knows for sure.

On the way back to Kawthoung, we visited 10 Mile Village, a seaside village where marine products including the famous Pashu fish paste was available.

Kawthoung associated with smuggling in the past was now thronged with visitors visiting Pulontontone beach resort five miles from Kawthoung, 10 mile beach resort 10 miles from Kawthoung and Maliwam resort. My visit to Kawthoung will remain in my memory for long.
