MoU signed for \$215-mln grant for healthcare activities of MoHS

HE Ministry of Health and Sports signed an MoU with the Access to Health Fund yesterday on funding for healthcare services in Myanmar. Under the MoU, the Access to Health Fund will provide US\$215 million grant for healthcare projects in Myanmar for a period of five years (2019-2023). The grants will be provided to the MoHS and international non-governmental organizations for projects in 144 townships of eight region and states.

Speaking at the signing ceremony at the Kempinski Hotel in Nay Pyi Taw, Union Minister for Health and Sports Dr. Myint Htwe said the MoU would be of great assistance in conducting healthcare activities in all parts of Myanmar. He then expressed his gratitude to the main donor countries — the United Kingdom, Sweden, and Switzerland — who have contributed to the Access to Health Fund.

With the signing of the MoU, the MoHS has received grants

for conducting healthcare activities for two years. The activities cover implementing the National Healthcare Project, fighting tuberculosis, AIDS, and drug abuse, preventing Hepatitis, and improving nutrition, maternal, newborn, and child health, and reproductive health. "It is important to draw up work plans to practically implement the projects on the ground with effective use of funds to meet the National Health Plan's objectives, and to build the flow of funds capacity,

such as fund handover, receipt, and use of funds to carry out projects," the Union Minister said.

He added that applied research has to be undertaken to effectively carry out the projects.

Through effective use of grants provided by donor organizations, the Ministry will implement projects that are suited to ground conditions and are relevant to the subject matter, in cooperation with partner organizations, the Union Minister said.

Tatmadaw Commander-in-Chief's Office urges effective peace building works during ceasefire period

TATMADAW Commander-in-Chief's Office issued an appeal yesterday to conduct effective peace building works during the ceasefire period.

The appeal issued stated that any organization or person should demand their wishes according to democratic methods when establishing a modern developed democratic nation desired by the entire ethnic nationals and the people. The Tatmadaw believed that finding solutions through discussions and negotiations is the only way to resolve the armed conflicts which have been caused by demanding through force of arm which was the opposite of pursuing the democratic path. Therefore to enable all participants of the peace building process to conduct their works with a high level of trust, an unprecedented unilateral ceasefire for six-months was announced by the Tatmadaw on 21 December 2018 and 30 April 2019.

On 30 June 2019 a third announcement was made as per requirements to extend the ceasefire for two more months. During the first and second ceasefire period of six months ethnic armed organizations (EAOs) and their representatives had conducted meetings and negotiations to find a solution and to strengthen and develop the peace building works, it has been found that the progress that the people had expected was not achieved. As the Tatmadaw had initiated the path of peace building works for EAOs

to systematically walk down towards multi-party democratic system, it would be necessary for the EAOs are to sign the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement (NCA) as soon as possible and participate in the peace process by engaging in discussions and negotiations.

Therefore organizations and persons who were involved in the peace building works were urged to use the 2 months cease-fire period conceded by the Tatmadaw to walk down the democratic path in a correct, proper and beneficial manner so as to achieve modernization, development and socio-economic development of the people which was the desire of the entire ethnic nationals and the people, said the Tatmadaw statement. —MNA

Myanmar begins repatriating 4th batch of migrant workers from Thailand

THE fourth batch of Myanmar migrant workers returning from Thailand on their own volition are being scrutinized and welcomed at the border gates from 1 to 3 July, according to a news release from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

With cooperation between the governments of Myanmar and Thailand, 151 Myanmar migrant workers from Nu Po refugee camp, 5 from Mae La refugee camp and 1 from Umpiem refugee camp were brought to the Myanmar-Thai Friendship Bridge (1) yesterday. They were warmly accepted by Myanmar officials and transported to Kyauk Lone Gyi camp in Myawady.

The repatriation process was overseen by the Myanmar Ambassador in Thailand, U Myo Myint Than, and embassy staff, the Kayin State Minister for Security and Border Affairs and members of the repatriation committees of Yangon, Mandalay and Sagaing regional governments.

The government officials arranged transportation for the returning Myanmar workers to reach their homes and provided humanitarian and financial assistance for the moment.

They will arrange for the workers' household registration form-10 and verify or issue NRC cards followingly.

In addition, relevant State and Region governments have arranged for the returning families to receive education and health-related assistance.

The repatriation process continues today with Myanmar migrant workers from Ban Nai Soi and Tham Hin refugee camps arranged to be accepted at Maese and Hteekhee gates respectively. And on the last day of repatriation tomorrow, migrant workers from Mae La, Umpiem and Mae La Oon refugee camps will be accepted at Kyauk Lone Gyi camp in Myawady. —MNA

Over 1,200 senior citizens in Kyaukpadaung get social pension

THE Mandalay Region government disbursed social pensions to the tune of K36.75 million to 1,225 citizens, aged 85 and older, in Kyaukpadaung Township in a door-to-door campaign on 28 June.

Officials with the government handed K30,000 each to senior citizens in the township. In addition, they provided cash support to 765 persons with disabilities (PWDs) residing in the township.

The Department of Social Welfare, under the Ministry of Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement, which is responsible for the care of the elderly, provides door-to-door delivery of pension every three months.

As part of efforts to improve services to the country's senior citizens, the government of Myanmar enacted the Myanmar Ageing Law in 2016 to protect the elderly people from neglect, abuse, or deprivation, and to improve their living conditions.

According to the 2014 census, the country has more than 230,000 citizens aged 85 and above.—Ko Nay (Kyaukpadaung)

Exports of animal products up by over \$190 mln in current fiscal

MYANMAR earned US\$306.9 million from the export of animal products from 1 October and 21 June, registering an increase in value of over \$190 million from the corresponding period last 2017-2018 fiscal year, according to the weekly trade report of the Ministry of Commerce.

During the period, public sector exports of animal products stood at just \$0.238 million, while private sector exports were valued at over

\$300 million. From this time last FY, the private sector solely conducted the export of animal products with a value of \$115 million.

Myanmar exports animal products mainly to neighboring China, India, and Thailand.

During the 2018 mini-budget period (April-September), the exports of animal products were pegged at \$178 million, with the public sector accounting for \$2.8 million, and the private sector \$175 million.

According to statistical report issued by the Ministry, the country exported animal products worth \$60 million in the 2017-2018FY, \$10 million in the 2016-2017FY, \$8 million in the 2015-2016FY, \$8.3 million in the 2013-2014FY, \$32 million in the 2013-2014FY, \$32 million in the 2012-2013FY, and \$90 million in the 2011-2012FY.— Shwe Khine

Sagaing improves value chains of climate friendly agribusinesses

A PROJECT to improve value chains in the climate friendly agribusiness sector was inaugurated yesterday in Sagaing Region.

"The project aims to improve infrastructure in the climate friendly agribusiness value chain. The project will increase climate resilience and aims to adopt climate friendly practices and eco-friendly technologies," said U Aye Ko Ko, project director.

The project is planned to be implemented jointly by the Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation and the Ministry of Commerce, and will be funded by the Asian Development Bank and Global Agriculture Food Se-

curity Program (GAFSP).

"The project will cover some inputs through ten farms owned by the Agriculture Department. Preparations are underway to provide basic infrastructure such as irrigation water and a 300-meter-long road for transportation. The Agriculture Department and the Consumer Affairs Department will upgrade laboratories for pesticide and food analysis. An irrigation water management course will also be offered," he said. The seven-year project was signed on 6 November, 2018, and will end in September, 2025. — Myo Win Tun

Work on foundation of Yangon-Dala bridge begins

DRILLING WORK for installing bored piles on the Dala side of the Yangon-Dala bridge across the Yangon River was started on 28 June. The bridge is expected to be completed by December, 2022, according to the Bridge Department under the Ministry of Construction.

The bridge will connect Bo Min Yaung street in Dala Township with Phone Gyi street in Lanmadaw Township. Currently, drilling work for installing bored piles has begun on Dala side. The department plans to construct 14 piles.

Union Minister for Construction U Han Zaw, the South Korean Ambassador to Myanmar, Hluttaw representatives, and officials from the Bridge Department inspected the project area on the first day of drilling.

"Today is the first day of bridge foundation implementation. We will build the bridge step by step. The construction is being done with the use of Korean technology. We began implementing the project in May, 2019. We expect to complete construction by December, 2022. Once completed, the bridge will contribute to the socio-economic development of local people residing on both sides," said U Thet Wai Aung, Assistant Director (Civil), Bridge Department.

Myanmar has obtained US\$ 137.833 Million, a 40-year loan, from South Korea's Economic Development Cooperation Fund at an interest of 0.01 per cent. The main contractor of the bridge is GS Engineering Group from Korea.

In the second phase of the project, an approach road will be built from Phone Gyi street by the Shwe Taung construction company. The third phase will involve the construction of two towers in the middle of the river and a cable suspension bridge. The phase will be implemented by CCEC, a Chinese company.

The Yangon-Dala bridge will measure 6,144 feet in length, including the 690-meter main bridge, the 577-meter approach road from Dala side, and the 601-meter approach road from Yangon side. The bridge will be 370 m long and clearance of the of 49 m high. The bridge will

have a four-lane road, with each lane measuring 4 m in width.

The bridge will shorten the time taken to travel from Yangon to Ayeyawady region. It will also lower the transportation cost for locals commuting between the regions. The project is expect-

ed to benefit residents of Dala, Twantay, Kungyangon, and Kawhmu townships of Yangon region and locals living in Maubin, Kyaiklat, Dedaye, Pyapon, and Bogale townships of Ayeyawady Region.—Myo Min Thein

Salted plum businesses reaping profits in Ngathayauk Township

BUSINESSES producing value-added salted plums in Ngathayauk Town of Nyaung U District are doing well financially, said U Thein Swe, a salted plum business owner.

"Our family has been running a salted plum business for 40 years. Ripe plums are picked between December and March, and sour plums are processed into salted plums. Plum trees are found growing naturally in the tropical regions of Myanmar, and there is no plum cultivation in the central regions of

the country. The residents here mostly depend on crop cultivation as the main source of livelihood. The plums collecting is good side jobs for extra income and the plums are sold for K,3000 per basket," said U Soe Naing, a farmer from Sintharmhway Village.

"There are three steps involved in processing raw plums to make value-added salted plums. First, plums are sun dried because well dried plums can be stored for a long time. Then, plum seeds are grounded

into powder. Finally, the plum powder is mixed with palm sugar, salt, and other fruit powders. After processing, packets of value-added salted plums are mainly distributed to Hpa-an, Mawlamyine, Thaton, and Mogok towns," said a salted plum business owner.

Salted plum products can be regarded as the regional products of the central region of Myanmar, and business owners are earning well on a manageable scale.—Ko Htain (Ngathayauk)

Agro exports up \$268.4 mln

MYANMAR'S agricultural exports crossed US\$2.5 billion in the period from 1 October to 21 June in the current fiscal year, an increase of \$268.4 million from \$2.24 billion recorded in the corresponding period of the 2017-2018FY, according to figures released by the Ministry of Commerce.

The agriculture industry has performed the best along with the natural gas sector in terms of exports. The chief items of export in the agricultural sector are rice and broken rice, pulses, corn, and rubber. Myanmar also ships fruits and vegetables, sesame, dried tea leaves, sugar, and other agro products to other countries.

The country mainly exports agro products to China, Singapore, Malaysia, the Philippines, Bangladesh, India, Indonesia, and Sri Lanka. Howev-

er, the export market remains uncertain with unsteady global demand.

Myanmar is facing slower market information access, which sometimes poses obstacles in the market. Moreover, the country has poor logistics and warehouse infrastructure, which affects the quality of fruits, said an official from the Myanmar Fruit, Flower and Vegetable Producers and Exporters Association (MFVP).

U Ye Min Aung, the president of the Myanmar Rice Federation, said that quality control and food safety are key to export promotion. Therefore, good agriculture practices are needed to be fostered and developed, he said.

In addition, the country requires an export-specific plan for each agro product as they are currently being sent to ex-

ternal markets based on supply and demand. A contract farming system which involves the regional and state agriculture departments, exporters, traders, and some grower groups is required in order to meet the production target, said an official from the Agriculture Department.

Myanmar's agricultural exports have not seen a remarkable increase in terms of trade value owing to China's tight confiscation on some agro products, including rice, since the second week of October.

The Commerce Ministry has been working to help farmers deal with challenges such as high input costs, procurement of pedigree seeds, high cultivation costs, and erratic weather conditions. — Ko Htet

Border trade up by \$1.17 bln in current FY

DURING the period from 1 October to 21 June in the current fiscal year, the value of border trade increased by US\$1.17 billion compared with the same period in the 2017-2018FY to reach \$7.6 billion, according to data from the Commerce Ministry. Exports rose by \$1.08 billion and imports by \$93 million.

The value of exports was registered at \$5.36 billion and imports at \$2.27 billion. In the corresponding period of the previous fiscal, Myanmar's border trade was pegged at \$6.47 billion.

Myanmar mainly carries out border trade with neighboring China through Muse, Lwejel, Chinshwehaw, Kanpikete, and Kengtung checkpoints, and with Thailand through the Tachilek, Myawady, Kawthoung, Myeik, Hteekhee, Mawtaung, and Maese gates.

Myanmar conducts border trade with Bangladesh through Sittway and Maungtaw, and with India through the Tamu, Reed, and Thantlang border gates.

Among the 16 border trade camps, Muse recorded the highest trade value of \$3.64 billion in the current FY, followed by Hteekhee at \$1.86 billion, and Myawady at \$683 million.

Myanmar exports agricultural, animal, fisheries, and forest products along with minerals, and it imports capital goods, intermediate goods, and consumer goods.

Currently, around 80 per cent of the country's external trade is carried out via sea routes.—Zwe

Lower imports drag maritime trade value down to \$17.7 bln

THE value of Myanmar's maritime trade for the period between 1 October, 2018 and 21 June, 2019 in the current fiscal year stood at US\$17.7 billion, a decrease of \$893.9 million compared with the corresponding period of the previous FY, according to data provided by the Ministry of Commerce.

Over the past eight months, maritime exports reached \$6.7 billion. Meanwhile, imports were registered at \$10.96 billion, a sharp decline of \$1 billion from the year-ago period.

The value of trade through the border gates exceeded \$7.64 billion, an increase of \$1.17 billion amid tight confiscation and trade suspension by Myanmar's main trade partner China, as cross-border trade with Thailand doubled compared with the year-ago period.

During the period, the country's total external trade crossed \$25.35 billion. In the previous FY, the figure stood at \$25 billion.

Myanmar exports agricultural products, fishery products, minerals, livestock, forest products, finished industrial goods, and other products, while it imports capital goods, consumer goods, and raw industrial materials.

The country currently has nine ports involved in sea trade. The Yangon Port is the main gateway for Myanmar's maritime trade, and includes the Yangon inner terminals and the outer Thilawa Port. — Mon Mon

Crops that need a stable market

YANMAR has 12.25 ne agriculture sector contributes 24 per cent to the nation's GDP and 30 per cent to the exports. Despite the government's all-out efforts for the improvement of the lives of the farmers of the agro-based country, there is no steady crop market yet.

Interest of farmers

"The government is providing loans and technology for farmers, and the farmers are working hard. But there is a market problem, and the need for price instability. So there should be a firm market for farmers," said peasant U Win Bo of Minbu Township, Magway Region.

The voice of farmers reached the parliament. At the 12th regular session of the second Pyithu Hluttaw, U Win Win of Minbu constituency tabled a motion, saying, "List of crops with firm marker should be announced season-wise or annually. There must be harmonious cooperation between the government and the people for producing marketable crops." The proposal of U Win Win was supported by seven MPs, and later approved by the Hluttaw.

A stable market

of the motion, U Than Lin Lin of Maese Constituency said, We are an agro-based country with suitable weather and soil for many kinds of crops species. But sadly, farmers are facing an unreliable market. So the government should find local and foreign crop markets The MP told the Lower House

of his constituency. He said, "After rice Maese farmers grow garlic. Thailand was the main buyer of garlic till 2014. So the garlic business was brisk then. But the demand dropped during the period between 2015 and 2019. Now there is no garlic market at all for local farmers. The main crops of hill regions including northern and central parts of Shan State were watermelon and maize since a decade ago. Neighbouring China is the main importer. Farmers were happy to see their thriving large watermelon fileds, expecting huge profits from the exports of the fruits. Unfortunately, there were a lot of watermelon trucks at the Muse border gate, and they had nowhere to go as there was no alternate market. The main buyer was paying the price which was too low. Farmers are regularly facing this kind of trend for a long time. In fact, it is the bad outcome of an unreliable market," said U Sai Maung Pwint of Tangyan Con-

Supplier-oriented market

The Ministry of Commerce is implementing a market that is favourable for the sellers. In October 2017 General Administration of Quality Supervision, Inspection and Quarantine (AQSIQ) of China issued an announcement on the legal permission of the export of certain kinds of fruits from Myanmar through maritime routes or border points. The Myanmar Embassy in China has been instructed to consult with General Administration of Customs of China (GACC) for the legal export of crops to the

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New Zealand bans single-use plastic bags

WELLINGTON (New Zealand)— New Zealand officially banned single-use plastic shopping bags Monday, introducing hefty fines for businesses that continue to provide them.

Plastic pollution has become a growing global concern, with a million birds and more than 100,000 marine mammals injured or killed every year by becoming entangled in packaging or ingesting it through the food chain.

Companies that break New Zealand's ban will face heavy penalties, including fines of up to NZ\$100,000 (\$67,000).

"New Zealanders are proud of our country's clean, green reputation and want to help ensure we live up to it," environment minister Eugenie Sage said.

"Ending the use of single-use plastic shopping bags helps do that."

Under the new rules, thin plastic single-use shopping bags can no longer be supplied — but the law allows reusable carriers to continue being provided.

The legislation — which was announced in August last year and came into force on Monday — will have little practical effect, as New Zealand's major supermarkets have already voluntarily banned the bags.

However, Sage said it was putting the issue of recycling on the agenda.

"(The ban) doesn't go far enough, but what is really great is it's started the conversation," she told Radio New Zealand.

"People are now talking about single-use plastics and

how we can phase them out."

Britain's Royal Statistical Society estimates 90.5 per cent of all plastic waste — some 6,300 million metric tons — has never been recycled and is either in landfill or accumulating in the natural environment.

If current production and waste management trends continue, the ocean of plastic waste is estimated to almost double to 12,000 million metric tons by 2050. More than 80 countries have already introduced bag bans similar to New Zealand's, according to the UN Environment Programme.

While it praised such initiatives, it said more needed to be done to minimise other sources of plastic waste including microbeads and single-use items such as straws.

Canada last month announced plans to ban disposable plastic items such as straws, cutlery and stir sticks from 2021.

The Pacific nation of Vanu-

atu will implement a ban in December on disposable diapers, which not only have non-biodegradable plastic linings but also use chemical absorbents which leach into the environment.

Sage said the New Zealand government was committing NZ\$40 million (\$27 million) to find ways to reuse plastic waste instead of sending it to landfill overseas. "We have been sending our waste offshore for too long," she said. "China and other countries refusing to take our waste is the wake-up call we need."

The issue of wealthy developed nations using poorer countries as trash dumps was highlighted this week when Canada had to accept back tonnes of rubbish it shipped to the Philippines years ago.

For years, China received the bulk of scrap plastic from around the world, but closed its doors to foreign refuse last year in an effort to clean up its environment. — AFP

Monsoon rains soak India's financial capital

MUMBAI (India) — Heavy rains flooded parts of India's financial capital of Mumbai on Monday, as the country's four-month summer monsoon swung into full force.

Children were seen wading through waist-high waters as they made their way to school, while some motorists were forced to get out and push their vehicles through low-lying streets.

Trains on Mumbai's colonial-era rail network, a lifeline for the city's 20 million residents, were delayed due to waterlogged tracks, and traffic moved even more slowly than usual.

Mumbai's streets regularly flood during the monsoon, which runs from June until September or October, and which provides India with most of its annual rainfall.

The Indian Meteorological Department (IMD) said 91 millimetres (3.6 inches) of rain fell in Mumbai in the 24 hours up to 08:30 am (0300 GMT) on Monday.

In 2005, 950 millimetres (37 inches) of rain fell on the coastal

metropolis in just 24 hours, killing more than 500 people.

In August 2017, intense rainfall brought the commercial hub to a virtual standstill for two days and left at least 10 people dead.

Activists say Mumbai's susceptibility to floods has worsened in recent years due to a construction boom that is trying to keep up with the city's swelling population.

Much of Mumbai's mangrove cover, which is extremely effective in helping to drain water, has been destroyed over the past decade to make way for glitzy high-rises.

According to various studies, anywhere between 40 to 50 percent of the city's population live in slums, which become a sea of blue tarpaulin every monsoon as residents try to keep out the rain.

The downpour follows a period in which large parts of the country endured weeks of sweltering heat — with temperatures rising above 50 degrees Celsius (122 Fahrenheit) in the desert state of Rajasthan.— AFP ■



Paris bans old diesel vehicles to tackle pollution

PARIS (France) — Paris on Monday banned all diesel vehicles aged 13 years or over from the city centre, the latest move in a campaign to tackle pollution on the city's streets.

Diesel vehicles over 18 years old and petrol vehicles over 21 years old are already banned in Paris — a measure that was extended Monday to a new "low-emissions" belt surrounding the city.

Central Paris meanwhile went further by also banning diesel cars, trucks and motorbikes aged 13 years and over — a move aimed at cleaning up the air in a city that is regularly shrouded in smog.

Motorists who flout the traffic restrictions in central Paris, which were trialled during last week's heatwave, face a 68-euro (\$77) fine, rising to 135 euros for trucks and buses.

A Greenpeace report listed Paris as the worst western European capital for small particle air pollution in 2018, with levels higher than cities such as the Philippines capital Manila or the Colombian capital Bogota.

Beyond the city's boundaries, the authorities are also clamping down on polluters in the 47 districts that ring the central Paris region, which are home to around 5.5 million people.

Unlike in central Paris, however, offenders in the suburbs, where car dependency is greater, face no punishment for the first two years of the ban. The government agreed to a two-year punishment-free "learning period" after resistance from some mayors who feared that the ban could rekindle the "yellow vest" protests, which erupted late last year among motorists furious over fuel price hikes.

The protests quickly escalated into an anti-government revolt, marked by weekly demonstrations in cities around France that have regularly turned violent. Reflecting on the lessons learnt, a senior official for the greater Paris area, Patrick Ollier, told reporters last week: "We don't want to force the environment on people, but rather that it be accepted as the outcome of dialogue." The subject of air quality has become a burning issue for governments across the EU, where green parties made strong gains in May's elections to the European Parliament. In November, Madrid followed a handful of other European cities that have restricted traffic in their centres.—AFP ■

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EU leaders adjourn summit to break jobs stalemate

BRUSSELS (Belgium) — Sleep-deprived European Union leaders adjourned marathon talks until Tuesday amid stalemate over filling the bloc's top jobs in the wake of May elections that have fragmented the EU political landscape.

The 28 EU leaders are trying to agree on who will steer the bloc over the coming years through the looming challenges of Brexit and the rise of populist parties in Europe.

Despite more than 18 hours of talks since Sunday, they needed more time to debate new proposals to overcome opposition to a Franco-German compromise on who will be the new chief of the European Commission, the bloc's executive arm. "We are giving an image of Europe that is not serious," French President Emmanuel Macron told journalists after the leaders adjourned until 11 am (0900 GMT) on Tuesday.

With challenges from climate change to illiberal democracy, the EU must reform the way it takes decisions and avoid becoming "hostage" to small groups, Macron said. After the talks adjourned, German Chancellor Angela Merkel said she still "hoped that with good will a compromise will be feasible".

The compromise Merkel and Macron forged on the sidelines of the G20 summit in Japan on Saturday called for Dutch Social Democrat Frans Timmermans to head the commission, rather than his conservative rival German Manfred Weber. Weber would instead be put forward for election as speaker of the European Parliament, where he leads the largest political bloc. A liberal candidate would succeed Tusk as president of the European Council of national leaders.

But when Merkel put this to fellow centre-right leaders in the European People's Party (EPP) several rebelled, and the summit was thrown into crisis as heads of government shuttled between side meetings late into Monday morning.

'Strong consensus'

The EPP is still the biggest bloc in the European Parliament, but no longer the dominant force it was before the May elections.

The liberals, which include Macron supporters, and Greens are increasingly assertive trying to choose the top jobs after they made huge gains in those elections.

Even though the Social Democrat bloc also lost ground,

Timmermans, the commission's current vice president, emerged as a compromise candidate to head the powerful commission.

"There is a strong consensus for Timmermans but the situation is very volatile. I'm more optimistic than I was three hours ago," another European source said. The latest idea is to have Timmermans head the commission, and the EPP's Kristalina-Georgieva, a Bulgarian, heading the European Council, several European sources told AFP.

They also want a liberal as the diplomatic chief to replace outgoing commissioner Federica Mogherini of Italy. That could either be Belgian prime minister Charles Michel or Danish politician MargretheVestager, who currently oversees anti-trust policy on the commission.

But Bulgarian Prime Minister BoykoBorissov later told his country's news media in Brussels that Georgieva was no longer in the race for the council.

'Historical mistake'

The stalemate has already lasted for weeks. An EU summit on 20-21 June failed to resolve differences over candidates.

Timmermans, as vice-president of the commission for the

past five years, has made enemies in the east of the EU, but it is not clear whether they have enough support to block his nomination. Timmermans spearheaded EU efforts to impose its vision of the rule of law on authoritarian-leaning eastern members and is firmly opposed by Hungary and Poland.

Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orban, in a letter to EPP leader Joseph Daul, said appointing Timmermans would be a "serious or even historical mistake".

Polish Premier Mateusz Morawiecki said: "FransTimmermans is a candidate who deeply divides Europe and he certainly doesn't understand Central Europe." Britain's Prime Minister Theresa May is attending her last EU summit. A spokesman said she would play a "constructive role" and would not abstain from any vote.

For a nominee to go forward, he or she must secure the backing of 21 of the 28 EU leaders, representing 65 per cent of the bloc's population. The European Parliament is due to decide on its new speaker in its inaugural session on Wednesday, whatever the outcome at the Brussels summit.

If the EU leaders settle on a Commission candidate before then, the European Parliament could debate the issue during a session in mid-July.—AFP ■

OPEC moves towards output cap extension as meeting kicks off

VIENNA (Austria)— OPEC and its oil-producing allies shifted Monday towards extending their daily output caps, sending oil prices racing higher before the outcome of the cartel's official gathering.

Ministers from the 14-nation Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) met in Vienna to discuss output, before gathering a day later for OPEC+ — which is a grouping of 24 oil-producing countries that includes Russia and together accounts for almost half of global crude.

The enlarged crude producing club had already decided in December to remove 1.2 million barrels per day from the market to bolster prices and soak up excess supplies.

Russian President Vladimir Putin and Saudi Arabia agreed on Saturday to extend the deal by between six and nine months, but the move provoked consternation from some quarters.

The news nevertheless fired New York oil prices above \$60 per barrel, with sentiment boosted

also by the China-US trade truce agreed at the G20 in Osaka.

"Everyone supported the proposition to extend for nine months the limits agreed in December," said Russian Energy Minister Alexander Novak ahead of the cartel's main meeting.

Saudi Arabia's energy minister Khalid al-Falih was meanwhile swift to deflect criticism from archfoe Iran that OPEC could "die" in the face of Riyadh and Moscow's Osaka deal.

Reports of OPEC death 'greatly exaggerated'

Falih told reporters before OPEC's main meeting: "I think OPEC is more vibrant than ever. As Mark Twain said once, the reports of OPEC's death have been repeated many times, and every time it was ... greatly exaggerated.

"We believe that oil as a commodity is unique. It's the blood of the global economy. Ideally every producer should be around the table with us today."

He added: "Saudi Arabia and Russia are the largest producers, we are delivering the largest cuts, we (...) agree first and then discuss our agreement with our colleagues from other countries."

Iran had earlier slammed the Osaka move, arguing that OPEC did not simply exist to rubber-stamp a decision made outside of the cartel, but has however voiced its support for the extension. The Islamic republic, with production severely hit by US sanctions, is however exempt from the December cuts agreement along with crisis-stricken pair Venezuela and Libya.

United Arab Emirates Energy Minister Suhail al-Mazrouei predicted that OPEC would agree to the plan amid the brighter post-G20 demand outlook. "We in the United Arab Emirates see that nine months would be more appropriate and we look forward to a healthier demand in the second half of the year after the good results from the G20 meeting," Mazrouei said.—AFP ■

German military helicopter crash kills at least one

BERLIN — A German military helicopter crashed on Monday in Lower Saxony, killing at least one person, according to local media.

The Bild newspaper reported that the helicopter crashed early afternoon in Aerzen. The person killed in the accident was the pilot. Another person has been seriously injured. The cause of the accident is still unclear. The crash site is located near a forest area, said a spokesman for the community Aerzen. There were fires broke out and the fire department is in action.

The International Helicopter Training Center in Bueckeburg is about 30 kilometers from the crash site. According to the information of the German Press Agency (DPA), the area around the crashed helicopter was cordoned off. The crash came after two German air force Eurofighters collided with each other in the air last week during exercises above the state of the Mecklenburg-Vorpommern.— Xinhua ■

Global stocks rally on Trump-Xi breakthrough

LONDON (United Kingdom) - Stock markets surged Monday after US **President Donald Trump** and Chinese counterpart Xi Jinping agreed on the sidelines of the G20 summit to restart trade talks, reviving hopes of an end to their tariff war.

Trump's historic visit to North Korea also at the weekend, where he met leader Kim Jong Un, further soothed geopolitical concerns and propelled the dollar, as investors shunned havens, notably gold. Oil prices also rose after OPEC and its oil producing allies appeared firmly on course to extend their oil output caps.

"European markets are uniformly higher, particularly the heavily China-exposed DAX" index in Frankfurt, noted Fiona Cincotta, a senior market analyst at City Index trading group.

'Nicely higher'

German stocks were supported also by official data showing unemployment in Germany held steady in June. US stocks were also higher, with the Dow Jones Industrial Average up around 125 points in

the late New York morning having, however, given up about half of its opening gains. The broader S&P index even set a new record high at the opening.

However Wall Street optimism may take a hit after fresh data on Monday showed that US manufacturing activity last month fell to its lowest level in nearly three years.

"US stocks are nicely higher in early action to begin the third quarter, with global markets rallying on the weekend's G-20 summit in Japan that delivered a trade truce between the US

and China that agreed to hold off on implementing further tariffs," analysts at Charles Schwab said.

Trump said negotiations to resolve the standoff between the US and China — the world's two biggest economies — were "back on track", adding that he would hold off imposing threatened new levies on Chinese goods.

Trump also signalled a softer position on Chinese telecom giant Huawei, a major bone of contention in the row, by saying US companies could sell equipment "where there's no great national security problem". China meanwhile pledged to buy more US agricultural machinery.

'Exhausted sigh of re-

"Investors heaved a massive, but exhausted, sigh of relief that both the US and China opted to push the reset button and restart trade negotiations amidst other pleasantries - now we'll have to see whether it all sticks," said Stephen Innes at Vanguard Markets.

Elsewhere on Monday, the WTI oil price jumped back above \$60 per barrel for the first time in a month after OPEC kingpin Saudi Arabia and non-cartel producer Russia said they would extend caps on crude output. "Everyone supported the proposition to extend for nine months the limits agreed in December," Russian Energy Minister Alexander Novak told reporters after a gathering of oil ministers and before the cartel's main meeting later Monday. Oil prices gave up some of their gains, however, as analysts suspected OPEC and its allies couldn't put to rest all of the worries hanging over the oil market.—AFP■

Viet Nam and EU sign free trade agreement

HANOI (Viet Nam)—The European Union and Viet Nam on Sunday signed a long-awaited free trade deal that will slash duties on almost all goods as fears grow over mounting global protectionism.

The signing comes amid worldwide trade turmoil, with a dragging US-China row and Britain's impending exit from the European Union casting a dark cloud over global growth.

The deal was hailed by EU trade commissioner Cecilia Malmstrom as "an important milestone" between the trading partners.

"We want to make sure that EU trade in this region has a positive impact so we have enshrined high standards in the deal," she said at the signing ceremony Sunday. The deal will come into force only once it is ratified, which could come by the end of the year.

It comes on the heels of a landmark agreement on Friday between the EU and South American trade bloc Mercosur that will link 800 million people in what will be one the world's largest regional commercial accords. Vietnam's export-led economy has largely been buoyed by free trade, and

open access to the Euro pean market is expected to boost its main deliveries to the bloc, namely textiles, shoes, smartphones and computer parts.

European countries are also eager to tap into Viet Nam's market of 95 million people and its fast-mushrooming consumer class. Viet Nam has seen some short-term gains from the trade spat as some companies shift from China into friendlier markets. But analysts warn that a weaker China or US could ultimately dent economies like Viet Nam that largely rely on

exports to the world's two biggest economies. With exports from Viet Nam to US soaring amid the trade spat, US President Donald Trump last week threatened to slap tariffs on the manufacturing hub, calling it "the single worst abuser of everybody".

The EU-Viet Nam free trade pact will eventually see duties slashed on 99 per cent of Europe's imports from Viet Nam. Billed as a so-called high quality deal, it also includes rules around labour rights and environmental and intellectual property protections.—AFP■

Abe, Erdogan agree to step up negotiations on Japan-Turkey trade pact

TOKYO — Prime Minister Shinzo Abe and Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan agreed Monday to accelerate negotiations on an economic partnership agreement between their countries.

In a meeting in Tokyo, the two leaders also exchanged views on the situation in the Middle East as tensions flare between the United States and Iran over Tehran's 2015 nuclear deal, according to Japan's Foreign Ministry. Abe said in the meeting, their first since December last year, that there is "great potential for cooperation with Turkey, a major regional power," citing education, disaster prevention and energy as areas to explore.

Erdogan earlier in the day said he wants to conclude an EPA with Japan "at an early date in 2019."

Meeting with sen-

ior officials of the Japan Business Federation, the country's most powerful business lobby known as Keidanren, he stressed the importance of enhancing bilateral economic ties as Turkey hopes to boost agricultural exports to Japan.— Kyodo News ■

Trump returns to critics after historic N.Korea stop

WASHINGTON (United States)— US President Donald Trump has returned from a historic, impromptu stop on North Korean soil to a skeptical Washington, with critics saying he is normalizing a nuclear-armed Pyongyang. In the sort of made-for-television, down-to-the-wire diplomacy relished by the former reality television host, Trump walked a few paces across the Demilitarized Zone on Sunday to greet North Korean leader Kim Jong Un, a day after the US leader proposed a meeting over Twitter.

Trump, the first sitting US president to enter North Korea, said it was an "honor" to step across the 66-year-old military divide, while Pyongyang's state media lauded the day as "amazing."

In practical terms, Trump said that he and Kim agreed to start working-level talks on a denuclearization deal, ending a standstill in place since the two leaders' second summit, in Hanoi in late February, ended without an agreement.

Secretary of State Mike Pompeo told reporters as he flew back that the talks will start "probably around the middle of the month."

US officials say they want to lay more groundwork before another fullfledged summit, although they acknowledge that mid-level North Korean officials have little room to negotiate on Kim's cherished nuclear program.

The New York Times, which did not identify its sources, said the Trump administration was considering an accord that would freeze but not dismantle North Korea's nuclear program, effectively accepting it as a nuclear state and acknowledging that it will not budge fur-

Such a deal would be at odds with the "final, fully verified denuclearization of North Korea" that Pompeo has insisted upon — and far less than the nuclear deal former president Barack Obama reached with Iran, from which Trump pulled out, calling it "terrible." John Bolton, Trump's national security adviser, denied the report and said that he and his staff had never heard of the idea of settling for a nuclear freeze.

"This was a reprehensible attempt by

someone to box in the President. There should be consequences," Bolton tweeted.

'Not a photo-op'

But critics said that Trump was already spending precious diplomatic capital by meeting Kim on his own terms and inviting him to the White House.

Rights group say that the North Korean regime holds tens of thousands of political prisoners in labor camps, with many locked up for even minor acts seen as disrespecting Kim. "Let's be clear. Trump isn't negotiating with North Korea. He is normalizing North Korea," said Senator Chris Murphy, a Democrat. Several Democratic presidential candidates hoping to defeat Trump next year also harshly criticized his diplomatic skills.

"Our President shouldn't be squandering American influence on photo-ops and exchanging love letters with a ruthless dictator," said Senator Elizabeth Warren, referring to correspondence including a birthday card over which Trump voiced delight.

Protesters ransack Hong Kong parliament on China handover anniversary

HONG KONG(China)—Hundreds of protesters stormed Hong Kong's parliament late Monday as the territory marked its China handover anniversary, ransacking the building and daubing its walls with graffiti as the city plunged into unprecedented depths of political chaos.

The financial hub has been rocked by three weeks of record-breaking demonstrations against a hugely unpopular bill that would allow extraditions to the Chinese mainland.

Tens of thousands of democracy activists staged another peaceful march on Monday afternoon, calling for the city's pro-Beijing leader to step down and reverse what they see as years of sliding freedoms.

But that rally was overshadowed by small groups of mainly young, masked protesters who managed to breach the legislature after clashes with riot police, ending two weeks of relative calm.

Once inside they tore down portraits of the city's leaders, hoisted a British colonial era flag in the main chamber and sprayed the city crest with black

"There are no violent protesters, just tyranny," one banner that was hoisted above the podium read.

Riot police appeared to have abandoned the building, which had been on lockdown.

Anti-government demonstrators breached the complex after hours of attempting to smash into the building, using a metal cart as a battering ram and wielding steel poles to prize open gaps in the reinforced win-

Many of those protesting said they felt compelled to take the action because the city's pro-Beijing leaders had ignored public sentiment following marches against the loathed extradition law.

"We have marched, staged sit-ins... but the government has remained unmoved," Joey, a 26-year-old protester, told AFP as he walked over shattered glass inside the building. "We have to show the government that we won't just sit here and do nothing."

A protester surnamed Cheung, 24, added: "We know that

this is breaking the law, but we have no choice".

Years of fears

The past three weeks of rallies are the latest expression of growing fears that China is stamping down on the city's freedoms and culture with the help of the finance hub's pro-Beijing leaders.

But the increasingly hardline tactics from some protesters have alienated some, with a large counter-rally in support of the police taking place on Sun-

Although Hong Kong returned from British to Chinese rule on 1 July, 1997, it is still administered separately under an arrangement known as "one country, two systems".

The city enjoys rights and liberties unseen on the autocratic mainland, but many residents fear Beijing is already reneging on that deal.

Activists have organised a march every handover anniversary, calling for greater democratic freedoms — such as the right to elect the city's leader.

They have mustered large

crowds in recent years — including a two-month occupation of parts of the city centre in 2014 but have failed to win any concessions from Beijing.

"When I heard that there are clashes outside (parliament), I was very worried," Amy Siu, a 37-year-old accountant taking part in the rally, told AFP. "I'm worried about the youngsters' safety. I hope they can be

This year's rally is framed by unprecedented anti-government protests of the past three weeks that have drawn millions,

with the public angry over police use of tear gas and rubber bullets.

The spark for the current wave of protests was an attempt by chief executive Carrie Lam to pass the Beijing-backed extradition law, which she has now postponed following the public backlash. But she has resisted calls to permanently shelve the law or step down.

As a result the demonstrations have morphed into a wider movement against her administration and Beijing.

Japan fisherman catch first whales as commercial hunts resume

KUSHIRO (Japan)—Japanese whalers brought ashore their first catches Monday as they resumed commercial hunting after a three-decade hiatus, brushing aside criticism from activists who say the practice is cruel and outdated.

Five vessels set sail under grey morning skies from northern Japan's Kushiro with their horns blaring and grey tarps thrown over their harpoons. By Monday afternoon they were back with their catch: two grey minke whales.

The hunts come after Japan decided to withdraw from the International Whaling Commission, a move slammed by activists and anti-whaling countries but welcomed by Japanese whaling communi-

"Today is the best day," said Yoshifumi Kai, head of the Japan Small-Type Whaling Association, as the ocean giants were hauled ashore.

"It was worth waiting for 31 years," he said with a smile. One of the whales, more

than eight metres (27 feet) and whalers and government onto a truck and driven to a warehouse.

Inside, whalers hosed it down with water and then lined up to pour ceremonial cups of the Japanese liquor sake over the animal — a ritual to purify and celebrate the catch.

Vessels left from other ports elsewhere in Japan on Monday, including in Shimonoseki in the west of the country,

long, was hoisted from a ship officials hailed the resumption of the hunts.

> "I'm a bit nervous but happy that we can start whaling," 23-year-old Hideki Abe, a whaler from the Miyagi region in northern Japan, told AFP before leaving from Kushiro.

"I don't think young people know how to cook and eat whale meat any more. I want more people to try to taste it at least once." —AFP ■

Philippine defense chief voices concern over suicide bombings in Philippines

MANILA — Philippine Defense Secretary DelfinLorenzana voiced concern on Monday over the frequency of suicide bomb attacks in the Philippines.

Lorenzana said the twin bombing attacks, committed in broad daylight at an army camp in Indanan, a town in Sulu province in the southern Philippines Friday last week, was "obviously a suicide bombing" and has raised the level of extremism in the Philippines.

The twin attacks, carried out by two motorcycle riding suicide bombers, left seven killed, including three soldiers, and 22 others injured.

Lorenzana said the incident was the third suicide attack in the Philippines. "This is the third one so it's becoming an occurrence and we are very much concerned about this,"

The first suicide bomb at-

tack was recorded on 31 July, 2018 when a powerful bomb exploded in a van the troops were inspecting at a military checkpoint in Lamitan, a city in the island province of Basilan. A soldier, five militiamen, four villagers and the driver of the van were killed in that incident.

Lorenzana said at the time that the bomb-laden van driven by the lone Moroccan terror suspect was intended for a planned "feeding program" in the city's plaza that will be participated in by 4,000 children.

The second suicide bombing attack happened on 27 January this year. At least 27 people were killed and many more injured as a result of the bomb attacks at a Roman Catholic cathedral on the remote Jolo Island in Sulu province. Authorities said Indonesian suicide bombers carried out that attack. — Xinhua ■

At least 50 children wounded in Taliban attack on Kabul

KABUL (Afghanistan)—At least 50 children were among more than 100 people wounded Monday when the Taliban detonated a powerful car bomb in Kabul, officials said, the latest deadly attack in one of the most dangerous countries in the world to be a child.

Save the Children led international condemnation of the blast targeting a defence ministry building, which sent a plume of smoke into the air during rush hour and shook buildings nearly two kilometres (1.2 miles) away.

It was followed by gunmen storming a nearby building and triggering a gun battle with special forces in the PuliMahmood Khan neighbourhood of the Afghan capital.

Officials said all five attackers have been killed and a clearing operation is ongoing.

At least three people have been killed, including one child, and 116 wounded, according to the health ministry, though that figure is expected to change once the clearing operation has been completed.

Among the wounded were 50 children, the education min-

istry said in a statement, adding that most had been hurt by flying glass and were in stable condition.

Some social media images purportedly taken at a hospital showed wounded, stunned children in school uniforms, still clutching books as they arrived for treatment. In its statement, the education ministry said five schools had been partially damaged, and asked "all sides involved in fighting to guarantee the safety of students, teachers, education workers and schools".

Such an attack was "utterly

deplorable", Save the Children said in a statement, warning that "Children's smaller bodies sustain more serious injuries than adults" and that the trauma of such attacks can stay with them for years to come.

The Taliban claimed the attack, which came just two days after the insurgents began a seventh round of talks with the US in Qatar as Washington eyes a breakthrough before Afghanistan's September presidential election.

"We were sitting inside the office when the world turned up-

side down on us," said ZaherUsman, an employee at a branch of the culture ministry, which he said stands just 150 metres (yards) from the blast.

"When I opened my eyes, the office was filled with smoke and dust and everything was broken, my colleagues were screaming," Usman told AFP by telephone.

AFP reporters could hear gunshots and multiple smaller explosions for hours after the initial blast, before the clearing operation was announced. The interior ministry said 210 civilians had been rescued from buildings nearby.

Brief lockdown

Shams Amini, a spokesman for the Afghan Football Federation, told AFP that the blast occurred near their HQ gates, and said some colleagues had been injured.

Nearby Shamshad TV station, which was attacked in 2017, aired images of broken glass and damage to its offices. "I was terrified," Shamshad anchor HashmatStanikzai told AFP. A media watchdog said seven Shamshad journalists were among the

wounded

The attack came as the US was set to begin a third day of negotiations with the militants in Doha. With the attack still ongoing, the Taliban spokesman in Doha again insisted that the insurgents will not negotiate with Kabul. "Once the timeline for the withdrawal of foreign forces is set in the presence of international observers, then we will begin the talks to the Afghan sides, but we will not talk to the Kabul administration as a government," SuhailShaheen tweeted.

A potential deal would see the US agree to withdraw its troops after more than 17 years in Afghanistan, igniting deep concerns among Afghans who fear Washington will rush for the exits and allow the militants to return to some semblance of power.

In return, the Taliban would guarantee the country would never again become a safe haven for violent extremism, as happened with Al-Qaeda before the September 11, 2001 attacks. However, US officials have insisted that "nothing is agreed until everything is agreed", including intra-Afghan talks.—AFP

Kenya, South Sudan ink deals to shore up trade ties

NAIROBI — Kenya and South Sudan on Monday inked agreements aimed at deepening trade ties between the two neighboring countries.

The deals which were signed in Nairobi between visiting South Sudan President SalvaKiir and his host Kenya President Uhuru Kenyatta will also see the two countries set up a joint border commission for the management of the common border.

Under the agreements, Kenya will hold a trade expo in Juba in November to help deepen trade ties between the two nations and also work as a show of confidence in South Sudan's economy.

"The expo will not only showcase Kenyan products but also reciprocate by exposing South Sudan's products to Kenyan business people," Kenyatta told a joint news conference after holding bilateral meeting with Kiir.

Kenyatta said his government has also agreed to allocate land for a dry port to South Sudan at the Naivasha Special Economic Zone and for a logistics hub near the new Lamu Port.

Kenyatta assured South Sudan that Kenya is fast tracking the completion of an ambitious Lamu Port-South Sudan-Ethiopia Transport (LAPPSET) corridor project, an economic and transport corridor that stretches from Kenya's coastal Lamu Port to South Sudan and Ethiopia, including transnational highways, oil pipeline and the Lamu Port, among others, to link the two countries.

"The first berth (of the Lamu Port) will be ready this August while Berths 2 and 3 are expected to be completed within the year 2020. I will invite Your Excellency, with other regional leaders, to inspect the Lamu Project in due course," said Kenyatta.

He said Kenya and South Sudan will put more efforts in completing trans-national highways including Eldoret-Lokichoggio-Nadapal-Kapoeta-Torit-Juba Road. —Xinhua

Iran says it exceeds enriched uranium stockpile limit

TEHRAN (Iran)— Iran said Monday it had exceeded a limit on its enriched uranium reserves under a 2015 nuclear deal that has edged towards collapse as the US imposes a "maximum pressure" campaign.

"Iran has crossed the 300-kilogramme limit based on its plan" announced in May, Iranian Foreign Minister Mohammad JavadZarif told semi-official news agency ISNA.

The United States withdrew from the nuclear deal last year and reimposed biting sanctions on Iran's crucial oil exports and financial transactions as well as other sectors.

Tehran, which has sought to pressure the remaining parties to save the deal, on 8 May announced it would no longer respect the limit set on its enriched uranium and heavy water stockpiles. It also threatened to go further and abandon more nuclear commitments unless the remaining partners — Britain, China, France, Germany and Russia—helped it to circumvent



sanctions, especially to sell its oil.

In his comments published Monday, Zarif said Iran had set out its intentions "very clearly" in May. The International Atomic Energy Agency on Monday confirmed Iran had exceeded the limit that the deal had imposed on its stockpile of low-enriched uranium (LEU).

The IAEA "verified on 1 July that Iran's total enriched uranium stockpile exceeded 300 kilogrammes", a spokesperson said.

The EU said Friday after a

crisis meeting aimed at salvaging the deal that a special payment mechanism set up to help Iran skirt the sanctions, known as IN-STEX, was finally "operational" and that the first transactions were being processed.

But "the Europeans' efforts were not enough, therefore Iran will go ahead with its announced measures," Zarif said.

INSTEX, which "is just the beginning" of their commitments, has not yet been fully implemented, he added.—AFP ■

"Originally on loan from Atletico Madrid, the attacking midfielder has put pen to paper on a fiveyear permanent deal."

An Atletico Madrid statement read: "Atletico Madrid and AS Monaco have reached an agreement for the transfer of Gelson Martins.

"The midfielder moved to Monaco on 27 January and, after an agreement was reached, will remain with the Monte Carlo club."

Martins signed for Atletico last summer from Sporting Lisbon but only played 12 competitive matches and has said he struggled to adapt to Diego Simeone's style.

The 24-year-old played a more prominent role with Monaco, scoring four goals in 16 Ligue 1 games during his loan spell and helping the team steer clear of relegation.

The 21-year-old Japanese said she had felt a weight lifted from her after losing her number one world ranking but it did not show against a talented opponent on Centre Court.

Indeed Putintseva simply franked the form

from the recent Birmingham tournament where she had beaten the US Open and Australian Open champion in the second round.

Russia-born Putintseva had never been on Centre Court before and admitted to being taken aback by its circular shape, although she was far fom over-awed in the manner she played.

"I did a good job out there and I was fighting great," said the 24-yearold. "It is amazing." Putintseva said she was getting more accustomed to grass, although, she still feels clay is her best surface, and added having a good record against Osaka counted for nothing when they walked out onto Centre Court

"Honestly every match is a battle I don't know what is going to happen," she said after her third win in three against the Japanese.

"I do my best, that is all I can do." —AFP■



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
