The Senior General urged them to make studies on general knowledge apart from respective subject-wise curricula. Education is an endless and deep arena without frames. Depend-

Next, Adjutant General Lt-Gen Hsan Oo presented reports on the outstanding prizes honored to the servicemen and the children of Tatmadaw family members who passed the matriculation exam with flying colours in 2018-2019 academic

years, the children of war veterans, all-round outstanding youths, and those who won in article, essay, painting, cartoon competitions at the State level, and the outstanding students who won university scholarships in 2019-2020 academic years.

Afterwards, the prize presentation ceremony followed. The Senior General presented honorary prizes and certificates of honor to the in-charge officers of school management from No 2 BEHS (Mingaladon) Aung San Thuriya Hla Thaung School that stood in the first-place in pass rate, BEHS (Shwenettaung) that stood in the second place and No 2 BEHS (Theinni) that stood in the third place in the pass rate in the 2018-2019 academic years, the school heads from No 3 Tatmadaw Education School (Aungban) that won the best pass rate, No 2 Tatmadaw Education School (Meiktila) that won the second best pass rate and No 6 Tatmadaw Education School (Mawlamyine) and cash prizes to the responsible persons for 26 Tatmadaw Basic Education High Schools and nine Tatmadaw Education Schools.

Then, the Senior General presents honorary medals, prizes and certificates of honour to six-distinction winners in 2018-2019 academic year and an outstanding schoolgirl for English proficiency skill.

Afterwards, Daw Kyu Kyu Hla, wife of the Senior General, presented honorary medals, prizes and certificates

of honour to six-distinction winners officer.

Next, Vice-Senior General Soe Win presented honorary medals, prizes and certificates of honour to six-distinction winners.

Then, Daw Than Than Nwe, wife of Vice Senior General Soe Win, presented honorary medals, prizes and certificates of honour to six-distinction winners.

At today's prize presentation ceremony, gold medals, honorary medals and certificate of honour were presented to three best pass rate winning Tatmadaw Basic Education High Schools and three best pass rate winning Tatmadaw Education Schools, 32 military personnel who won one and two distinctions each, and outstanding students who are offspring of Tatmadaw families, war veterans and military personnel-substitute civilian servants, including 38 six-distinction winners, 72 five-distinction winners, 88 four-distinction winners, 106 three-distinction winners, 36 state-level all-round outstanding students, five winners in the State-level article/essay contests, and 83 students of Tatmadaw families and war veterans in winning higher education level vocational university scholarship awards, totalling 460.

Likewise, K110,000 per one distinction was awarded in distance to 693 one-distinction winners and 207 two-distinction winners, totalling 900 winners,

who are offspring of Tatmadaw families and war veteran families with the cash donations of well-wishers.

The prize presentation ceremony has been held since the 2011-2012 academic year for honouring the outstanding military personnel and offspring of Tatmadaw families and those of war veteran families in the matriculation examination and offspring of military personnel-substitute civilian servants.

This was the eighth time of its kind. So far, gold medals and cash awards were presented to 316 six-distinction winners, 646 five-distinction winners, 1,038 four-distinction winners, and 1,195 three-distinction winners, 1,563 two-distinction winners and 5,403 one-distinction winners in total. Starting the 2014-2015 academic year, higher education level vocational university scholarship awards were also given to the outstanding students.

Monthly stipends are being given to a total of 488 students, including 72 students in 2014, 86 in 2015, 82 in 2016, 81 in 2017, 84 in 2018, and 83 in the current year. Of them, outstanding military personnel and all-round outstanding youths have been sent abroad as excursion trips since 2013.

Arrangements for more overseas excursion trips will be arranged this year, according to the Office of the Commander-in-Chief of Defence Services. — MNA ■

Nominees should have exceptional merit in contributing to the following designated focus areas:

- Outstanding collaboration between ASEAN Member States (AMS);
- Outstanding collaboration between ASEAN and the world;
- Outstanding people-to-people engagement among AMS;
- Outstanding economic integration and promotion of standards between or among AMS; or
- Other outstanding contributions to ASEAN Community Building

The Judging Committee, consisting of eminent high-level members, including incumbent and former ASEAN Secretaries-General, will select a recipient who will be awarded the ASEAN Prize Trophy and a cash prize of US\$ 20,000. This year's prize will be presented at the Opening Ceremony of the 35th ASEAN Summit in November 2019 in Bangkok, Thailand.

Nominee must submit the duly fill-in form to the ASEAN Affairs Department, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Office No.9, Nay Pyi Taw or dgasean@gmail.com and psaseanmmr@gmail.com no later than 6 September 2019.

Nominee must be an ASEAN citizen or an ASEAN-based organization. In the nomination form, the nominee need to elaborate within three or five pages highlighting the achievement the nominee has contributed to the building of a rule-based, people-oriented, people-centred ASEAN Community and intra-ASEAN collaborative efforts since the launch of the ASEAN Community on 31 December 2015. Niigata University of Japan and National Health Laboratory signed MoU in Yangon yesterday in the presence of Union Minister for Health and Sports Dr Myint Htwe and officials.

Speaking on the occasion, Union Minister Dr Myint Htwe stated gradual development of both the government and the private sectors for progress of the country's health undertakings. "The private sector must take into account the quality and safety alongside the rules and regulations, medical ethics, social conducts and business codes of conduct in providing public healthcare services," he urged, adding, "The division concerned under the ministry is regulating public healthcare

services within the legal framework and rules."

DHIS-2 had been introduced at 43 hospitals through staff trainings, he explained, and urged specialist physicians of the government and private sectors to lead staff efficiency promotion programs.

The Union Minister stressed the adoption of monitoring and evaluation system at hospitals in compiling a checklist of quality services, and pointed out the importance of government-private cooperation in the health sector. "A national seminar will be held soon to share suggestions and means toward cementing government-private cooperation," he said.

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Polio vaccine to be administered three more times in Myawady

AS Poliovirus strain mutation has been found in Hpapun, Kayin State, polio vaccine will be administered to children under 5 three more times in Myawady Township.

Deputy Director from Min-

istry of Health and Sports, Dr Hnin Ngwe Ni Aye, said due to the discovery of poliovirus strain characterization in a child in Sin Swal village, Hpapun Township, Kayin State, the vaccine will be administered three more times,

adding that only administering it three times can ensure 100 percent prevention, that is why caution should be taken to have the children given vaccine three times. The vaccination campaign was ordered after a child

in Sin Swel village near Hpapun Township, Kayin, was found to have contracted the VPDP1 virus in June.

Present at yesterday vaccine campaign were District Administrator, U Tay Za Aung, Township Administrator, U Phyo Zaw Ko Ko and officials, Chairperson of Myawady District Myanmar Maternal and Child Welfare Association, Daw Aye Mya Mya Kyine and members, Medical Superintendent of Myawady District People's Hospital, Dr Yan Naing Oo, and officials.

This vaccine administration was the first time and will take place from July 7th to 9th. The second time will be from July 21st to 23rd and third time from August 4th to 6th. Myawady Department of Health reported that this vaccine administration will be conducted in 7 townships in Kayin State, 3 in Mon State, 2 in Bago Region, 12 townships in total.— Htein Lin Aung (IPRD)

One killed after truck overturns in KhinU Township

ONE person was killed after a 12-wheeled truck overturned on 7 July in Khin U Township, Shwebo district, Sagaing Region, according to the Gone Gyi traffic police.

According to the police, the truck loaded with coal was heading to Shwebo Township from Kanbalu Township when it struck a tree between mileposts 16/0 and 16/1 on the Shwebo-Myitkyina (Union) road and overturned, after the driver, identified as Nam Htike Aung, 26, lost control of the ve-

hicle. Nam Htike Aung's co-driver, identified as Kyaw Win Sai, 46, was killed on the spot. Nam Htike Aung also sustained serious injuries and was rushed to Khin U general hospital, from where he was transferred to the Shwebo general hospital after receiving preliminary medical care.

The traffic police have charged Nam Htike Aung with reckless driving under Sections 337, 338, and 304 (A) of the Penal Code.— Chit San (Khin U) ■

Three Chinese workers die, one injured after falling off grid in Pyawbwe Township

Four Chinese workers from CEEC company installing power cables in Pyawbwe fell off the lines in Pyawbwe on 6 July, and three died and one was injured.

The accident happened at the 500 KVA transmission tower 91, which is between mile post 269/6 and 7, on Yangon-Mandalay Expressway, in Pyawbwe Township. Zi Fayou, Li Wenquan, He Kaili and

Uang Shihua fell off while working on the tower due to nuts coming off. Zi Fayou, Li Wenquan and He Kaili fell from about 100 feet and died on the spot. Yang Shihua's leg got caught on the tower and injured. He was sent to the Mandalay General hospital. A case has been opened at the Nyaung Kone police Station. — Myanmar Police Force

Myanmar-Thailand border trade reaches over \$3.14 bln in 2018-2019 FY

BORDER trade between Myanmar and neighboring Thailand reached over US\$ 3.14 billion as of 28 June in 2018-2019 fiscal year (FY) which started in October, according to the official weekly statistical report of the Ministry of Commerce.

The value of export between two countries hit \$2.25 billion,

while its import reached \$ 889 million as of 28 June in this FY.

The country mainly conducts border trade with Thailand through seven border checkpoints, Tachilek, Myawady, Kawthoung, Myeik, Hteekhee, Mawtaung and Maese gates.

From 1 October to 28 June this year, Hteekhee border gate

topped with most bilateral border trade value of \$ 1.97 billion, followed by Myawady with \$708 million and Myeik with \$194 million.

Myanmar primarily exports fishery products such as crab, fish and shrimp, as well as onions, sesame, dry tea leaves, coconut and turmeric, while consumer goods, cosmetic machinery, food products, while agricultural equipment and track cars are imported into the country from Thailand.

The country is also trading with these neighbouring countries_ China, India and Bangladesh. Sino-Myanmar border trade is through Muse, Lweje, Kanpikete, Chinshwehaw and Kengtung gates while Myanmar is carrying out border trade with India via Tamu and Reed. The country's border trade gates with Bangladesh are Sittway and Maungtau. Border gates as of 28 June this FY totalled over \$ 8 billion which increased by \$ 1.27 billion more than last year.—Zwe ■

Import of semi-finished goods declines by over 4% in nine months

MYANMAR imported US\$5.09 billion worth of semi-finished goods in the current 2018-2019 Financial Year, down by \$226.9 million or 4.3 per cent, from the corresponding period last 2017-2018 FY, according to the Ministry of Commerce reported.

Between 1 October and 28 June, the public sector imported semi-finished goods worth nearly \$138 million while the private importers bought the same amounting to \$4.9 billion.

This year saw a decline in value of imports of semi-finished goods from both sectors. When compared with the same period last FY, this year's imports of intermediate products by the public sector decreased by \$39 million, while the private sector imports of the same declined by \$187 million.

Usually, Myanmar imports three major groups of products, consisting of capital goods, semi-finished products, consumer goods and CMP raw

materials. The country spent its \$13.6 billion on importing the groups of products in the past nine months this FY, including capital goods valued at \$4.5 billion, consumer products pegged at \$2.3 billion and CMP raw materials amounting to \$1.8 billion.

According to the ministry's yearly statistical report, the country's import value of semi-finished goods was \$4.071 billion in the 2011-2012 FY, \$3.728 billion in the 2012-2013 FY, \$5.682 billion in the 2013-2014 FY, \$5.682 billion in the 2014-2015 FY, \$6.165 billion in the 2015-2016 FY, \$4.820 billion in the 2016-2017 FY and \$7.670 billion in the 2017-2018 FY.

During the 2018 mini-budget period (April-September), the country purchased semi-finished products worth \$3.7 billion, with \$3.4 billion from non-border trade and \$342 million from border trade.—Shwe Khine ■

Export of manufactured goods up over 60% on 22-28 June

MYANMAR'S export of manufactured goods has exceeded over US\$400 million during the week between 22 and 28 June, increasing by nearly \$155 million, or more than 60 per cent, from this time last 2017-2018 Fiscal Year, the Ministry of Commerce reported.

The current figures includ-

ed \$258.5 million by the public sector and \$147.8 million by the private sector. From the corresponding period last FY, the country's export of the same totalled \$251.8 million.

From October through June this 2018-2019 FY, the country's exports of manufactured goods reached \$7.08 billion, including

public sector exports pegged at \$2.9 billion and private sector exports valued at \$4.15 billion.

In the 2018 mini-budget period between April and September, Myanmar exported manufactured goods worth \$4.53 billion, with the public sector earning \$1.6 billion and the private sector fetching \$2.932 bil-

lion, according to the ministry.

According to the ministry's annual statistical report, the country earned \$6.9 billion from the export of manufactured products in the 2017-2018 FY, \$5.7 billion in the 2016-2017 FY, \$6.5 billion in the 2015-2016 FY, \$4.6 billion in the 2014-2015FY, \$4.4 billion in the 2013-2014 FY,

and \$4.08 billion in the 2012-2013 FY,

During the same period, Myanmar's overall export stood at \$12.6 billion, with \$.75 billion by the public sector and \$8.85 billion by the private sector.—Swe Nyein ■

Residents of Yay Pauk Gyi village earn additional income from weaving

LOCAL families living in Yay Pauk Gyi Village, Pwintbyu Township, Magway Region, said they are happy with the additional earnings generated from weaving cloth by hand on a small scale.

There are more than 3,000 people residing in 623 homes in Yay Pauk Gyi Village. While the villagers mainly depend on agriculture for their livelihood, they practise weaving during their free time, with people from neighbouring villages purchasing their hand-woven cloth. The villagers produce longyis for men and sarongs for women, blankets, towels, and schoolbags and sell them in villages within the township to earn additional income.

“Our village has more than

3,000 people living in over 600 houses. We mainly pursue agriculture. Our village is quite far from Pwintbyu Township. So, we cannot cultivate crops with the use of irrigation water and depend on rain instead,”U Nyo, the leader of the village said.

“Therefore, we are weaving cloth on a manageable scale to earn extra income. All the people in our village practise weaving,” he added.

“We sell longyis for K6,000-9,000, depending on the type of loom, towels for K2,500, and cotton bags for K2,500. The price of our blankets ranges between K15,000-17,5000, depending on the size,” said a local weaver from the village.—Ye Win Naing (Nyaung Oo) ■

NSSA certificate awarding ceremony held in Yangon

CERTIFICATE awarding ceremony of National Skill Standards Authority (NSSA) was held at Central Construction Training Center in Thuwunna, Yangon at 9 am.

Present at the event were Union Minister for Labour, Immigration and Population, U Thein Swe, Yangon Regional Ethnic Affairs, Labour and Rakhine Affairs Minister U Zaw Aye Maung, members of the NSSA, representatives from Skill assessing departments and private training schools, employers, employees organizations, GIZ, Swisscontact, development organizations and certificate recipients.

At the event, the Union Minister delivered keynote speech. He said that NSSA is

responsible for judging skills for supervisor-level and employees below the rank of supervisor at workplaces. There are four levels competency of skills. Level 1 and 2 were able to be assessed this time and they are working on to assess level 3 and 4. The employees have been assessed their skills with a set of norms 2014 to in 2019, there were 13445 candidates and 11900 passed on National skill standard 1 and 2 and subsequently were awarded certificates.

NSSA is working towards producing disciplined and competent workers to provide basic need, which is quality human resource, to built developed the nation. Policies of the future of work and technology, vocational training and assessing skills

should be made. NSSA has ISO 9001:2015 certificate and with the help of ISO they are trying to achieve Mutual Recognition of Skill within ASEAN countries. They are also preparing for Industrial 4.0 in the world's market.

The Union Minister called for adapting along with technology change.

From 2018 August to December there were 737 male and 435 female successful workers from 17 different fields. A total of 1172 were awarded level 1 certificates.

NSSA awarded certificates to 38 examiners from 11 Skill assessment departments. Now NSSA has awarded certificate to 8631 male and 3269 female workers, 11900 in total for 23 work field around Myanmar.—MNA ■

New marionette theatre opens in Mandalay

A new marionette theatre was formally opened on Sunday in Mandalay as part of efforts to sustain and revive the traditional art in Myanmar.

The new theatre is located near the two big lion statues at the entrance of the Mandalay Hill in Aungmyethazan Township.

At the opening ceremony, Daw Ma Ma Naing, the chairperson of the Myanmar Marionettes Committee, stated the purpose behind launching the new theatre, saying it is expected to draw more international visitors.

published a book on Myanmar Puppet Theatre in 1966, frequently conducts modern educational puppet shows at local schools to disseminate knowledge about the traditional art and help revive it.

"According to the project, children are in the early childhood till

they reach the age of eight years," the Union Minister said, and added that Kayah State was covered by personal hygiene and family education project, which also involved the task of providing financial aid to expectant mothers and their babies up to two years. "The project ensures optimum neurodevelopment during the first 1000

days of life," he noted, adding, "The country has parent circles for children up to three years, government-run, self-help and private preprimary schools for children up to five years in providing child care and protection." The Union Minister highlighted the systematic supervision and responsibility and accountability of

personnel concerned at different levels of work. The Ministry of Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement has set up hotlines, 067-3404222 and 067-3404999, for any requirements or complaints.

Participants then put forward requirements in opening self-reliant and private preprimary schools, discussed ar-

reas where government assistance is needed and shared means to protect children against sexual violence and legal punishment against the crime.

The Union Minister, the deputy minister, the minister concerned of Kayah State and officials looked into their requirements.—MNA (Translated by TMT)

As Bagan gets world heritage status, conservation must be prioritized

With Myanmar's living heritage Bagan making it into the list of UNESCO World Heritage sites, the people of the nation have cause to celebrate. Bagan has more than 3,500 stupas, temples, monasteries, and other religious structures, built between the 11th and 13th centuries, which have endured different kinds of challenges for more than a thousand years.

A world heritage tag for our national heritage shows that the world has recognized the outstanding universal value of Bagan and its unique cultural significance, transcending national boundaries and generations of humanity, present and future.

This means Bagan will be preserved for generations, over the next thousands of years, under the protection and management of the international community.

It is important to know that Bagan's inclusion on the UNESCO World Heritage List not only brings opportunities to maintain and help the site to thrive, but also responsibilities, which we must share with the international community.

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We must improve the legal and institutional framework for protecting the site, especially to address pressures from uncontrolled development in a protected area, which still remain an imminent threat.

As we could not reverse inappropriate conservation interventions in the most important archaeological and monument site in Asia, the nomination to the World Heritage List in 1995 was rejected.

We then adopted a new heritage law and formed plans to reduce the impact of hotels and tourism development around the pagodas, and to stop any infrastructure from being built in the cultural zone.

The religious devotion and wealth of this early Buddhist empire is expressed through the remarkable scale and density of the architecture and continuing religious activities, which have survived for centuries and influenced the region.

In fact, the conservation of cultural heritage does not mean conserving lifeless edifices and items, but things which are connected with the history and culture of our country.

The duty to conserve our national heritage falls on the shoulders of all the people, and all parties involved in the conservation work have the responsibility to follow the rules prescribed by the UNESCO.

All parties concerned are urged to continue their efforts and to cooperate with the authorities so that our cultural heritage remains intact for another thousand years.

National academies call for immediate action on air pollution

COUNTRIES across the world must urgently adopt emissions controls and air monitoring systems for the worst pollutants, if they are to grapple with the growing problem of air pollution causing millions of deaths each year, five national academies have said.

The Academies of Sciences and Medicine from South Africa, Brazil, Germany, and the United States issued a joint statement on 19 June, which they presented at the United Nations Headquarters in New York, calling for intensi-

fied funding and action under a new global compact to tackle air pollution.

"If we do not urgently address this global challenge, air pollution will continue to take a startling toll in terms of preventable disease, disability and death, as well as in avoidable costs of care," said Marcia McNutt, president of the US National Academy of Sciences. "We need to act much more decisively. We need more public and private investments to tackle air pollution that match the scale of the problem."

Air pollution causes some 7

million premature deaths every year, with vulnerable people such as women, children and the elderly most at risk. Scientific evidence shows that exposure to pollutants can lead to heart disease, asthma, diabetes, eczema, cancer and impact brain development in children.

Air pollution has also been linked to climate change. If we were to reduce short-lived pollutants such as methane, and black carbon, we could reduce global warming by up to 0.5°C over the next few decades, simultaneously avoiding 2.4 million premature

deaths.

According to the academies, the biggest contributor to air pollution is fossil fuel and biomass combustion, used for power-generation, heat and cooking, transport and agriculture. Air pollution from fossil fuels is particularly adverse for humans as it contains large amounts of particulate matter, which enter the body and damage its organs.

With the global economic costs of disease caused by air pollution across 176 countries in 2015 estimated to be US\$138 million, the academies call for this preventable

problem to be addressed in tandem with climate change mitigation and sustainable development.

The academies recommend that all countries make air pollution reduction a priority by placing emission controls on industry and embracing clean fuels. Where possible, success stories from individual cities and countries should be shared and used as lessons for those grappling to improve air quality.

The global compact would encourage governments, businesses and citizens to increase investment for air pollution measures

and work together to improve air quality around the world.

"Air pollution is not only harming our planet and contributing to climate change but cutting millions of lives short," said Inger Andersen, Executive Director of the UN Environment Programme. "It is encouraging to see the global scientific community come together and call for urgent action on this truly global problem. It is time to place air pollution high on the political agenda."

Water system of medieval German city gets world heritage status

AUGSBURG—The German city of Augsburg was Saturday granted World Heritage status by UNESCO for its over 800-year-old water management system boasting an aquaduct, water towers, ornate fountains, canals and hundreds of bridges.

The 2,000-year-old city in Bavaria state calls the system which has since the Middle Ages provided clean drinking water and sanitation an “intricate interplay between the innovative spirit and a technical tour de force”.

The old town centre of Augsburg, located on Germany's Romantic Road, is criss-crossed with canals and boasts over 500

bridges, “more than in Venice”, according to the city. “The history of water in Augsburg is linked to the cultural and artistic wealth of this city,” Thomas Weitzel, the city's cultural affairs director, told AFP. “Augsburg considered water such a precious asset that it has always sought to protect it.” Augsburg's resourceful engineers were European forerunners in damming and redirecting river water, from the Lech, Wertach and Singold streams. Water flowed via an aquaduct and into water towers from 1416, making the waterworks at the city's Red Gate “the oldest in Germany and also in central Europe”. The wa-

ter flowed through hollowed pine logs connected with metal casts to ornamental fountains in the city, including the Mercury and Hercules fountains. It also entered the city's butchers house, the Stadtmetzg, where the flowing water helped to cool the meat and dispose of the waste. Later water power was used for industry, with water wheels driving mills and pumping stations as Augsburg became an early centre of textile and paper production. With the Industrial Revolution in the 19th century, the city saw the creation of the first large hydroelectric power plant, at nearby Wolfzahnau.— AFP ■

Iran denies tanker detained by UK was headed to Syria

TEHRAN—Iran denied Sunday that an oil tanker detained by Britain in Gibraltar was carrying crude to Syria, which would put it in violation of EU sanctions.

“The tanker was carrying Iran's oil... Contrary to what the British government claims, its destination was not Syria,” said Iranian Deputy Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi at a press conference in Tehran. “The port named in Syria does not even have the capacity for such a supertanker to dock. Its destination was somewhere else,” he added. The 330-metre (1,000-foot) Grace 1, capable of carrying 2 million oil barrels, was halted in the early hours of Thursday by police and customs agencies in Gibraltar, a British overseas territory on Spain's southern tip at the western entrance to the Mediterranean.

The ship was detained 2.5 miles (four kilometres) south of Gibraltar in what it considers

British waters, although Spain, which lays claim to the territory, says they are Spanish.

Araghchi said the tanker was crossing the Strait of Gibraltar because its “high capacity” meant “it was not possible for it to pass through the Suez Canal”. He insisted the tanker was intercepted in international waters and accused Britain's Royal Navy of committing “maritime piracy”. The tanker's detention came at a sensitive time in Iran-EU ties as the bloc mulls how to respond to Tehran breaching the uranium enrichment limit it agreed to in the troubled 2015 nuclear deal. Iran is currently following “the legal path through court” but hopes the issue can be resolved by “ongoing diplomatic consultations”, Araghchi added. Iran Friday demanded that Britain immediately release the tanker, but Gibraltar's Supreme Court ruled that the vessel can be held for 14 more days.— AFP

In Yakutia, Russia digs for diamonds in permafrost

MIRNY (Russia) — Diamonds are forever, and so is the permanently frozen ground of Yakutia in north eastern Siberia, home to huge diamond deposits that ensure Russia's supremacy in world production of the luxury stone.

In the city of Mirny, the sun shines almost continuously during the region's white night season in early July, with temperatures exceeding 30 degrees Celsius.

But the summer does not last long. Yakutia is known for having the coldest winters on the planet, which drag on for nine dark months. This region — rich in oil, gas and precious metals — is also home to eleven out of twelve mines belonging to Russia's Alrosa group, the world's largest producer of rough carats.

The majority state- and local government-owned company employs most of Mirny's 35,000 inhabitants and contributes around 40 per cent of the wider region's budget in taxes.

Alrosa, which has been criticised by some locals for alleged environmental damage including polluting water supplies, has a reputation for secrecy but is

now making efforts to demonstrate some of its work.

In Mirny, a gaping hole of massive depths — the abandoned mine "Mir" — stretches out into the city. It is more than a kilometre in diameter and 525 meters deep, or nearly two Eiffel towers placed end to end.

Oleg Popov, the director of Mirny's diamond sorting centre, shows off a billiard table covered in shiny stones. "There are 14,000 carats worth around \$9 million on this table," he said.

Explosions in -55 centigrade

"Each stone must be sorted by size," said Irina Senyukova, leaning on stones in the nearby sorting room.

To reach the next diamond deposits themselves, visitors board a 20-seater Antonov plane and head north, across the taiga, to Nakyn, where Alrosa operates two open pit mines and is planning for a third out in the wilderness. The most productive mine, Botuobinskaya, is currently only 130 metres deep, but the company plans to dig down 580 metres. The operating mines will be exploitable until 2041, the company hopes.—AFP ■

Scientists develop chemical computer, storing images with molecules

WASHINGTON — Scientists from Brown University found a way to encode and decode images, not with microchips but with small molecules, and it worked with a 98-per cent accuracy.

The study published on Wednesday in the open-access journal PLOS ONE demonstrated that the small-molecule information storage can successfully encode more than 100,000 bits of digital images into synthetic metabolomes.

Previously, biomolecules like DNA have been used to help store information. In the new study, the researchers resorted to another molecules: metabolites, which are smaller, more diverse and have the potential to store information at greater density than the genome.

Metabolite is any chemicals involved in metabolism,

either as a product of metabolism or as necessary for metabolism.

They used liquid-handling robots to write digital information by dotting mixtures of metabolites into a grid on a surface. An instrument called a mass spectrometer can read the locations and identities of the metabolites and report out binary data.

They could encode the information from a picture and then decode it to redraw the image with 98 to 99.5 per cent accuracy. In the study, the researchers recovered the image of an anchor and a banner with the inscription of "Hope."

"A molecular hard drive or a chemical computer might still seem like science fiction, but biology shows us it is possible," said Jacob Rosenstein with Brown University, who led the study.—Xinhua ■

Oil giant Total's chief announces new unit to invest in forests

AIX-EN-PROVENCE (France) — The head of French energy giant Total announced Saturday that the company would invest a hundred million dollars annually on a new forest preservation and reforestation project.

"We want to set up a business unit to invest in projects that will preserve forests," chief executive Patrick Pouyanne told a meeting to discuss economic issues in Aix-en-Provence, in the south of France.

The company would spend \$100 million a year on the project, he said. "The most effective way today to eliminate carbon, for less than \$10 a tonne, is reforestation," he added. "This is not philanthropy," he added. "It's about investing in the medium- and long-term. A project for the forests, it has to last a long time to be positive for the planet."

Pouyanne was speaking just days after Total said it had begun producing biofuel at a

refinery in southern France, a project that has sparked an outcry from environmentalists and farmers over its plans to import palm oil.

The site at La Mede near Marseille is a former oil refinery which has been converted and is now one of the largest biorefineries in Europe. A study released on Thursday said that a massive campaign of reforestation could help battle climate change.

The study, carried out by

ETH Zurich and published in Science, said a large-scale operation could capture two-thirds of man-made carbon emissions and reduce overall levels in the atmosphere to their lowest in almost a century.

It found that the Earth can support 2.2 billion acres (900 million hectares) of trees that would sequester 205 billion tonnes of carbon. Some environmental campaigners have reacted cautiously to the research.—AFP ■

US media sector braces for brutal year for jobs

WASHINGTON — The struggling US media industry is facing its worst year for job layoffs in a decade as news organizations continue to cut staff and close shop, according to a new survey.

The consultancy Challenger Gray & Christmas reported this week that media companies, which include movies, television, publishing, music, and broadcast and print news, announced plans to cut 15,474 jobs so far this year, of which 11,878 of which were from news organizations.

That is nearly three times more than the 4,062 cuts announced in the media sector in 2017 and the highest total since the economic crisis in 2009.

“Members of the media, especially journalists, have had a tough few years,” said Andrew Challenger, vice president of the Chicago-based firm.

“Many jobs were already in jeopardy due to a business model that tried to meet consumer demand for free news with ad revenue. As media outlets attempted to put news behind pay walls, in many markets, consumers opted not to

pay.”

Some of the notable events this year included the closing of the Youngstown Vindicator, the only daily in the Ohio city, with 144 jobs lost, and the sale of the New Orleans Times-Picayune resulting in the loss of some 160 positions including 65 in

the newsroom.

But the troubles have also impacted the digital sector with BuzzFeed cutting 200 employees in January and Verizon eliminating 800 jobs in its media division, which includes Yahoo, AOL, and HuffPost, the Challenger report noted.—AFP ■

China to overtake U.S. as world's biggest insurance market

BEIJING — China is expected to surpass the United States to become the world's largest insurance market in the mid-2030s, according to a report from Swiss Re Institute.

China consolidated its position as the second largest insurance market globally in 2018, with total premiums reaching 575 billion US dollars. However, the Chinese market is currently still less than 40 per cent of the size of the US market and is also smaller than the three largest markets in Europe - Britain, Germany and France - combined.

The shortfalls serve to highlight the catch-up po-

tential. Swiss Re Institute forecast that the Asia-Pacific region will account for 42 per cent of the global premiums by 2029, mainly driven by China.

China's share of the global premiums went from zero in 1980 to 11 per cent in 2018 and is forecast to reach 20 per cent over the next decade and then surpass the US as the biggest market in the mid-2030s.

Global insurance premiums passed the 5 trillion dollar mark for the first time in 2018, equivalent to more than 6 per cent of the world's gross domestic product, the report said.—Xinhua ■

African leaders to launch 'historic' free trade deal

NIAMEY — African nations will officially launch a landmark trade agreement at an African Union summit in Niger on Sunday, with the long sought-after agreement hailed as a historic step towards “peace and prosperity” across the continent.

The deal, which African leaders hope will create the world's largest free trade area, was given a boost when Nigeria

and Benin's presidents signed on to rapturous applause on Sunday at the two-day summit in Niger's capital Niamey. After 17 years of tough negotiations, the AU is expected to launch the “operational phase” of the African Continental Free Trade Area (Af-CFTA) later in the day in what AU commission chairman Moussa Faki said would be a “historic” moment.

“An old dream is coming true, the founding fathers must be proud,” said Faki, adding that Af-CFTA would create “the greatest trading area in the world”.

Niger's President Mahamadou Issoufou hailed it as “the greatest historical event for the African continent since the creation of the Organisation of African Unity in 1963,” referring to the AU's predecessor.

With Nigeria and Benin's signatures, 54 of the 55 AU member countries have now signed onto the deal, with Eritrea the only holdout. Around 4,500 delegates and guests — including 32 heads of state and more than 100 ministers — attended the AU summit in Niamey, which has been revamped and boasts a brand-new airport, upgraded roads, and new hotels for the occasion.—AFP ■

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
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
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Naung Tung Lake Landmark of Kengtung Town

Historical places of Kengtung

Ethnic Shan tribes settled and lived together in Shan State (East) Kengtung region. From Kengtun Haw (Palace) 44 reigns of Saophas (Sawbwa in Myanmar) ruled the region from AD 1243 to 1962. Kengtung is located at an elevation of 2,700 ft. and is a gateway to border regions of China, Thailand, Laos and Cambodia.

In Kengtung the three hills of Swam Tong, Swam Mon and Swam Sat are situated at an imaginary vertexes of a triangle and the wards of the town are on or at the foot of the hills. Be-

tween the two hills of Swam Tong and Swam Sat is Naung Tung Lake about 33 acres wide lying on a north to south axis. Kengtung town was first established on the east of the lake and had many historical places like Swam Tong (also called Swam Kham or Zom Kham) Pagoda, Haw ground on which Kengtung Haw was built, Maha Myat Muni Pagoda, Aung Myay Nat Abode, old market, tomb of Saopha and Pa Leng Gate.

Swam Tong Pagoda, Kanyin Phyu tree and Standing Buddha

On top of Swam Tong hill on the east of Naung Tung Lake is Swam Tong Pagoda built

hundreds of years ago. Due to repeated renovations it is now 226 ft. tall. The uniqueness of this pagoda is not having pagoda umbrella like other pagodas in the country. On top of Swam Mon hill is a several hundred years old Kanyin Phyu tree. The tree rises up to a height of 218 ft. and had a girth of 39 ft. 10 inch at the bottom of the tree. Even though the name of the hill was Swam Mon, it was also called Lone Tree Hill (Thit Ta Bin Taung) due to

this lone tree rising high above it.

Southwest of the lake is Swam Sat hill and according to early Shan history there was once a pagoda on top of it. Digging on top of the hill in 1995 unearthed old Buddha images and based on research conducted, the ground was considered as a religious ground. In 1998 a Standing Buddha image 74 ft. 6 inch high was built on the hill. This huge Standing Buddha image is visible from all parts of Kengtung town.

History of Naung Tung Lake

According to a book written in 1930 that was a copy made from early Gon Shan writings, Kengtung was once a flooded area. Four hermits who came down from the north drained the water from the flooded area and after 7 years and 7 months, only a small lake remains. As the water recedes Hermit Tonga built a pagoda on top of Swam Tong hill. The small lake and the town took up the name of the Hermit Tonga and became Naung Tung Lake and Kengtung town.

Saopha administration and tradition

Earlier, Kengtung region

was a vast canyon, gorge or ravine submerged in water surrounded by three hills. The town was established after the hermit built the pagoda. When the hermits drained the water, the submerged land became a fertile land where people came to settle. Later it became a town administered by Saophas. As the region had good climate and fertile land the town was barricaded in a 4 miles 1 furlong long wall with 12 gates and a moat to protect it from invaders. It becomes a tradition for a new Saopha to hold a coronation ceremony in the town. The town was owned by the hermit but it becomes a tradition to transfer administrative matters of the town from the hermit/monk to the Saophas and successive Saophas continued this tradition.

Today's Naung Tung Lake

Naung Tung Lake had become a well known place in Kengtung. As it existed since the town was founded it became a landmark of the town. Not only was it a well known landmark locally but it was also known by neighbouring countries and had become a landmark for international tourists as well.

cies, restaurants, hotels and houses. There's also a physical exercise area with fitness and exercise equipments installed.

Western part of the lake is considered as a best view point. From there the Standing Buddha image can be seen to the southwest of the lake. Looking toward the south of the lake, the Swam Mon hill can be seen with the tall imposing Kanyin Phyu tree on top. In the evening the water fountain in the middle of the lake was brightly lit up with multi colour lights.

Loved and cherished place

Naung Tung Lake is a place loved and cherished by the locals. It was also a place that remains in the memories of visitors. Locals say visitors who went around the lake once will become so attracted or attached to it that they'll come back again.

Naung Tung Lake flocks with walkers, joggers, families, children, picnickers and visitors in the morning and afternoon. During sunsets and evenings, Naung Tung Lake became a painting where artistes visualize images from their minds.

returning to Old Trafford from Juventus in a club-record deal in 2016. He was included in the PFA Team of the Year last season but his often-lethargic performances split opinion among supporters, while he reportedly had a major falling-out with former United

boss Jose Mourinho.

Talking to The Times last week, Pogba's agent Mino Raiola said he had made the club aware he was looking to move the player on and offered no assurances that the 26-year-old would travel for the tour.—AFP ■

Park maintains share of lead at Thornberry Creek Classic

LOS ANGELES (United States)— Park Sung-Hyun maintained a share of the lead with a 69 Saturday in the Thornberry Creek Classic where Monday qualifier Noh Yealimi is trying to win in her first start as a pro.

The world number one Park is tied atop a crowded leaderboard with Feng Shanshan, Tiffany Joh and Ariya Jutanugarn at 20-under 196 heading into the final round of the tournament in Oneida, Wisconsin.

But just one stroke back is Park's third round playing partner Noh, who has been the biggest surprise of the week after the 17-year-old rookie shot the same three-under 69 score. It was Noh's third straight round in the 60s to reach a 19-under total, placing her alone in fifth spot.

The Korean-American Noh played the opening two rounds alongside an amateur whom she beat by 73 shots and Saturday she went toe-to-toe with the top ranked player in the world.

Park said Noh's maturity surprised her.

"She spoke very good Korean so I had time to speak with her some. I asked her how old she was and she said she was 17," said Park.

"Even though she's a young player, her swing is really good, her playing is really good. I look forward to her play in the future."

The long hitting Park, whose win last week in Arkansas returned her to the No. 1 position, finished with five birdies in a seven-hole stretch on the front nine.

The 25-year-old South Korean could have had the outright lead but stumbled to the finish with a double bogey on 15 and a bogey on her next hole.

She started the day with a one shot lead over runner-up Noh, who turned down a scholarship to a major US university and decided instead to turn pro in January. "It was so fun watching her play," said Noh of Park. "She's really friendly. I was, like, really impressed with her distance obviously and then just how many birdies she made. I lost count during the front nine."

She is trying to become just the third Monday qualifier in history to win a tournament and the first since Canadian Brooke Henderson four years ago. The other was Laurel Kean in 2000.

Noh played with the poise of a veteran on Saturday, rolling in two birdies and an eagle on the par-four sixth. She had one bogey on 14 but recovered to post a birdie two holes later. Noh had an opportunity to share the lead but missed her 17-foot putt on 18.

China's Feng scorched the course with a seven-under 65 that included an eagle on the back nine and three straight birdies on the front.—AFP ■
