THE opening ceremony of the Yangon Innovation Centre was held in front of that building in the compound of Health Port at the corner of Pansodan road and Strand road in Seikkan Township, Yangon Region, at 10 am yesterday. State Counsellor Daw Aung San Suu Kyi delivered a speech at the ceremony.

She inaugurated the Centre by cutting the ceremonial ribbon.

In her opening remark, she said, "Innovation is emerging as a top priority during the period of the Fourth Industrial Revolution. It also has many opportunities to become an agri-power nation through efficient and effective investments by applying technologies and innovations on the vacant cultivable lands. Therefore, it is very important that we need to have absolute self-confidence.

NRPC, KNPP hold peace talks in Nay Pyi Taw

NATIONAL Reconciliation and Peace Centre Vice Chairman U Tun Tun Oo, who is also the Union Attorney-General, met with a delegation led by Khu Oo Reh, the leader of the peace implementation committee of the Karenni National Progressive Party, yesterday to discuss the peace process and the signing of the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement.

At the meeting, held at the NRPC in Nay Pyi Taw, U Tun Tun Oo said the National Reconciliation and Peace Centre and the Peace Commission were negotiating with the signatories to the NCA for proceeding with the peace process with understanding and confidence, before the fourth session of the Union Peace Conference-21st Century Panglong.

While negotiating for the NCA, the two sides have also discussed regional development, he added.

To help the residents in areas where ethnic armed organizations operate to enjoy the benefits of peace and to develop their socio-economic conditions, the NRPC was focusing on resettlement of internally displaced persons, infrastructure, transportation, agriculture, education, and health, using its funds and assistance from the UN and NGOs, he said.

Pyidaungsu Hluttaw examines human rights report, government budget proposals

ON the 2nd day of the Second Pyidaungsu Hluttaw's 13th regular session yesterday, MNHRC Chair U Win Mra read the commission's annual report for 2018 and various officials read the budget proposals of government institutions for the Hluttaw to deliberate on.

The Speaker first read minister appointments for Mandalay Region and Mon State cabinets sent from the President and the Hluttaw put them on record.

Human rights report for 2018

Next, Myanmar National Human Rights Commission Chair U Win Mra read the commission's annual report for 2018. He said we need to find methods to reduce the inmate population of prisons exceeding 50 per cent of their designated capacity.

The report suggests finding alternatives to locking up drug abusers, such as conducting awareness raising campaigns, administering communal punishment, offering health protection and focusing more on arresting the people who distribute the drugs.

U Win Mra said production camps for women in mining operations should be closed down as the heavy labour may cause injuries to their wombs over long periods. He said water purifiers should be installed in prisons with the Union budget through annual meetings. He also said necessary health staff should be assigned to administer to the inmates.

He said vocational training courses are properly conducted in Insein Central Prison and Mandalay Central Prison and

suggested contacting relevant ministries and private vocational training centers to provide similar courses in other prisons.

U Win Mra said they have witnessed concentrated efforts to help young inmates continue pursuing education in Insein, Mandalay and Obo prisons. He said the inmates who passed matriculation exams with distinctions were pardoned or had their prison sentence reduced and suggested carrying out similar reductions for the jailed teachers who taught them.

He said the MNHRC is in urgent need of cooperation from the Union Government, Union Ministries and State/Regional Governments in carrying out their various duties. However, he said there has been increased assistance compared to previous years and indicates a promising future for the nation's human rights affairs. The Speaker then called for MPs interested in dis-

cussing the report to enrol their names.

Officials explain budget for 2019-2020 Financial Year

Next, Union-level institutions explained the budgets outlined in the National Planning Bill and Union Budget Bill for 2019-2020 Financial Year.

Deputy Minister U Maung Maung Win explained that the budget for the President's Office was drawn within the framework given by the Budget Department.

He said K9198.726 million has been accounted for ordinary expenditure and K8619.935 million for capital expenditure. Under capital expenditure is the cost for constructing the office for the Ministry of President's Office at K8606.249 million, while purchasing office furniture costed K13.686 million, said the Deputy Minister. He asked the Hluttaw to approve the estimated budget for the President's Office.

Joint Public Accounts Committee Secretary U Khin Maung Than explained the budget for the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Office. He said staff salary comes out at K901.929 million, Hluttaw session planning and office administration costs come out at K1,290.331 million, various interest payments were at K18.239 million and emergency funds were permitted at K40 million.

He said they proposed for K26.125 million as capital expenditure. He said they have also proposed for K210.450 million (equivalent to approx. US\$138,000), under the categories for capital expenditure, loans and support funds, to pay for ICT infrastructure of the Union-level and state/regional Hluttaws.

He said the Finance Commission has approved their proposals and they await the approval of the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw.

Next, Deputy Minister U Maung Maung Win explained the

budget proposals of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. He asked the assembly to approve the proposal of K72,151.299 million for ordinary and capital expenditure so that the ministry may perform its duties.

Next, Deputy Minister Maj-Gen Than Htut explained the budget proposals for the Ministry of Border Affairs. He said they have calculated the budget to carry out their duties with the least amount of expenses possible and asked the assembly to give their approval.

This was followed by other high-ranking officials explaining the budget proposals of various government institutions for 2019-2020 FY.

The Speaker then announced that the remaining budget proposal readings for will be continued at the next Pyidaungsu Hluttaw meeting on 22 July. —MNA ■

I hold an unwavering belief and have said it very often that whether it is Industry 4.0 or any era and period, the most important resource is our people. No matter old or young, everybody is a valuable person. As man is of the utmost importance, we need to keep on working hard. After Industry 4.0, the next generations of Industry 5.0, 6.0 and so on will surely come about. The strength of our youths is crucial for this developing trend.

The State Counsellor continued, "The percentage of mobile SIM card users have reached 126% in Myanmar. Relay stations were built to expand coverage of mobile phones in the remote areas with poor access to landlines. It has shown that we leapfrogged technologies and innovations in a short span of time. Although our country lagged behind in development, we would be able to shorten times and reduce investments in applying intelligence and technology harmoniously as an advantage of a less-developed country after reviewing the experiences of developing countries.

Young people of our country are believed to have enough strength to keep abreast with the global people. In recent years, students from the University of Information Technology won second prize and the Chinese team won the first prize in the ASEAN Makerthon held in Malaysia. Moreover, the team of Myanmar students achieved sixth rank in the First Global Challenge 2017 Robotic Competition. What I want to highlight is our young people would be able to join hands actively in making the dream of our country come true if they received proper support and suitable guidance.

To be consistent with the developing world, the first thing we need to do is the country-wise development of our education

It is hoped the centre would become the breeding ground of techno-based businesses of Myanmar young people and more innovations. They could

try to set up a new business venture. More citizen entrepreneurs will surely come out.

Moreover, the State Counsellor said, "It is needed to support innovators as much as possible. I also hope the Yangon Innovation Centre could help develop new innovations for the country steadfastly. The government will support with policies and arrangements as we cordially invite universities, research and renovation centres, partner-organizations, well-wishers and businesspersons at home and abroad to help in the creations of our young people.

If the necessary contributions were received, our young people could get new ideas to produce new products, new forms of services and new job opportunities in coming years. Moreover, the country's economy could be supported technically through these contributions. However, success can be achieved by means of systematic and professional approaches.

We are now talking about the Fourth Industrial Revolution. It is not enough to view its physical aspects only, but we should also consider its mental aspects. Through the series of revolutions up to the fourth stage of industrial revolution, the extent of development for human beings should be reviewed. Next, French Ambassador to Myanmar Mr Christian Lechery handed over the documents of the digital museum to Union Minister for Religious Affairs and Culture Thura U Aung Ko. The museum was built with the

funds of French embassy in Myanmar in the compound of the centre.

Moreover, over 20 technological companies in the area of technology, travel and business will hold workshops and conduct training courses for students from high school level to university level.

The centre will become a hub for coworking space, supporting for business, organizing a three-month motivation programme for investment, weekly talks, shows, contests and discussions.

At the same time, the Union Government has opened the door for peace for the EAOs, including KNPP, which have not yet signed the NCA, and has been holding negotiations as part of efforts for building a Democratic Federal Republic aspired by all, and for effectively working together for regional development under the umbrella of the NCA, said U Tun Tun Oo.

The KNPP can be said to have played a major role in the NCA process as this EAO has taken part in negotiations for peace during the tenure of the previous government, said U Tun Tun Oo.

He also appreciated the leadership role of Khu Oo Reh, Vice Chairman of the KNPP, who led the Delegation for Peace Negotiation-DPN of the United Nationalities Federal Council-UNFC in the negotiation with the Union Government, which brought about good results.

Though the New Mon State Party-NMSP and the Lahu

Democratic Union-LDU, both of whom were members of the UNFC, signed the NCA, KNPP has not yet taken part in the NCA-led process to peace, and was in negotiation with the government, said the Vice Chairman of the NRPC.

The KNPP has held peace negotiations with the Union Government for 24 times and the two sides achieved good results and built trust and understanding in every negotiation.

"Therefore, I would like to urge KNPP to take one more step forward with more close cooperation with the Union Government and to fully participate in the current peace making process," said U Tun Tun Oo.

He continued to say that the peace talks would focus on signing NCA, regional development and seeking ways for proceeding with the peace making process, expressing his hope that regional stability and development could be carried out with more close cooperation with the government if the KNPP fully participated in the peace making process.

He also called for open discussions in the meeting.

Afterwards, Khu Oo Reh, Chairman of the DPN of the KNPP, said the two sides met at the negotiation table to resolve the problems that had happened for over 70 years.

He said the problem between the two sides could be considered consequences of the political problems, calling for resolving the problems while upholding the spirit of brotherhood.

"Hence, we should see the problem as a problem and focus the existing problem to find ways for resolving them," said Khu

Oo Reh.

He continued to say that both sides would understand each other and the issues they discussed as the two sides have held a number of peace talks.

"If there is a willingness to find a way which can bring both sides work together with magnanimous attitude, it is not difficult to resolve the problem," said Khu Oo Reh.

He also stressed the need not to stop just at the conclusion of 'Principally Agreed' after the negotiation that happened in previous meetings, saying that the word 'principally agreed' made

him feel that the points which were principally agreed were not fully agreeable.

"Hence, the negotiation between the two sides should reach beyond the 'Principally Agreed' and should bring about commitment to finding a solution," he said.

Afterwards, U Zaw Htay, Director-General of the Office of the State Counsellor, and Khu Oo Reh explained the peace making efforts for the NRPC and KNPP respectively before the both sides' discussion at the meeting.

The final verdict will be passed on 1 August.—MNA

Former Kanbalu sentry police charged with corruption

THE Anti-Corruption Commission received a complaint against inspector Min Thant, former commander of Koetaungbo Police SENTRY, Kanbalu Township in Sagaing Region, for his alleged extortion in a search operation for illegal lottery.

The complaint was filed by the parent of the women who was being arrested for illegal lottery. The ACC's investigation team discovered that the inspector asked for K200,000 from the complainant on 26 July 2018 for

helping their daughter in the illegal lottery selling case.

He also asked for K100,000 on 6 August 2018 as payment to erase original handwriting from the case. ACC has found inspector Min Thant, currently stationed at Ban Yin Police Station in Hsingseng Township, guilty of abusing his position and has opened a case against him at Kanbalu Police Station in accordance with Section 56 of The Anti-Corruption Law.—MNA (Translated by Zaw Htet Oo)

Union Minister U Min Thu meets GAD staff of Yangon Region

U MIN THU, Union Minister for the Office of the Union Government, met with staff of the Yangon Region General Administration Department at the Yangon Region Government office (2) yesterday.

During the meeting, U Myo Htay Aung, Deputy Director-General of the regional GAD, reported on its progress and performance.

Speaking at the meeting, the Union Minister said that although the country has experienced six different administrations, the GAD was the one taking the responsibility for governance in successive eras.

He said that in order to build a democratic federal republic, Myanmar Sustainable Development Plan-MSDP has been established for its sustainability. There are three pillars in the plan and the first aims of the first pillar are peace, national reconciliation, security and good governance.

To implement this, GAD has been transferred to Ministry for the Office of the Union Government, and it has been operating for more than 6 months.

After the move, three tasks were assigned at a workshop for decentralization, public-oriented governance and efficient workforce.

These three tasks of reforms are reforming policies, reforming regulations and managerial components, and establishing regional development and good practices. Building good governance has been set as the vision of GAD.

He stressed that the staff of GAD need to be competent as the department is not only a vital component to retain harmony in

Myanmar society but a department that prevents conflicts. For this reason, upgrading Institute of Development Administration is being prioritized.

In doing so, he and the officials of GAD went to Japan from July 7th to 13th 2019 to set up curriculum and exercises that suit the situation of the country and to work in conjunction with international universities for technical support to conduct administrative courses.

During the trip, Japanese Minister of Foreign Affairs, Japanese Minister of Defence, Chairman of Japan - Myanmar Friendship association, Chairman of JICA and officials of JICA and officials of Kansai Office discussed transition of Myanmar governance and building public oriented administration.

For governance studies, they met with officials of Graduate School of Governance Studies which is under Japan Intercultural Academy of Municipalities (JISM), Local Autonomy College, National Graduate Institute for Policy Studies (GRIPS) and officials from Graduate School of Governance Studies under Meiji University. There they observed constitution, visions and teaching methods.

For Institute of Development Administration, a curriculum that suits Myanmar governance will be written, administration and teaching methods will be reformed, and more subjects concerning governance will be added. These processes will be carried out stage by stage.

Public health push needed to tackle periodic influenza outbreaks

SEASONAL influenza poses a significant public health challenge for Myanmar every year. Yangon Region is the worst-affected in the current season, accounting for 147 cases and 43 deaths out of 56 fatalities reported nationwide as of 16 July.

Yangon Region saw a high number of H1N1 cases in 2017, and fewer cases were reported in 2018. But, this year, there has been an uptick in influenza cases.

Currently, the World Health Organization and Myanmar health authorities, along with the National Laboratory, are monitoring the situation and providing special care at homes and hospitals where the infected patients are being treated, in an attempt to control the outbreak.

As of 16 July, 117 patients were discharged from the hospital, and most of the 44 in-patients are showing signs of recovery.

Meanwhile, the health authorities in townships are also on the alert to detect seasonal influenza patients early, provide them with the necessary help, report the cases to the higher authorities, and raise awareness about H1N1.

Though an increase in influenza cases is normal in winter, prevention is better than cure.

Much care must be devoted to personal hygiene to prevent the influenza virus from spreading. One must cover the mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing, wash hands frequently with plenty of soap and water, sleep and rest well, take nutritious food and indulge in regular physical activity, stay where there is good air to breathe, and avoid public places and crowded areas. If symptoms of the disease show up, one must undergo treatment at the nearest health department.

Large-scale vaccination covering high-risk groups such as health workers, people with lung, kidney, liver, and heart disease, diabetics, and the elderly could reduce the impact of viruses in townships, especially Hlinethaya, Thingangyun, and South Dagon, from where a large number of cases have been reported.

On experiencing symptoms of influenza, high fever, difficulty in breathing, fainting, or anxiety, one must visit the nearest health centre for diagnosis and treatment.

When the general public adheres to the precautions issued by the ministry of health and sports, effective prevention and treatment can be carried out, and there will be no cause for alarm concerning seasonal influenza. We urge public and private clinics to report symptoms of H1N1 to the nearest health centre.

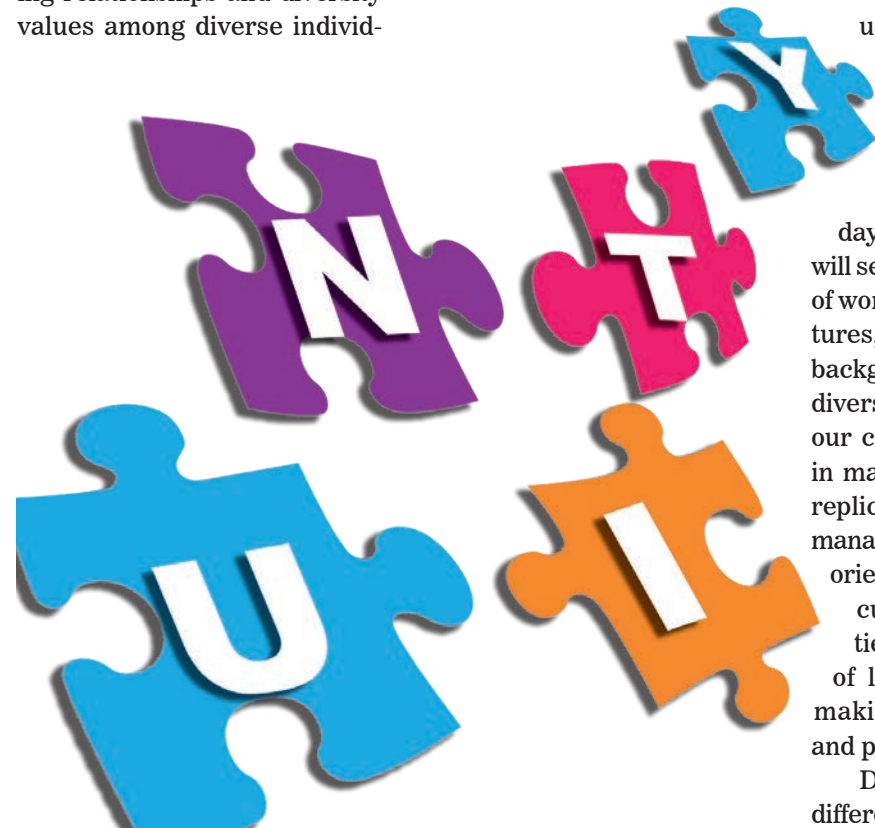

Water level in Ayeyawady River likely to reach danger mark

DUE to continuous rainfall in Putao and Machanbaw townships, the water level in the Ayeyawady River is likely to reach the danger mark at Mandalay port, said an official from the Mandalay Region Meteorology and Hydrology Department.

The danger level at Mandalay port is 1,260 cm, and the water level in the river has reached 1,127 cm on 17 July, according to the department's records.

"In Myitkyina, the water level passed the danger mark on 13 July, and now it has reduced. The water level in the river has continued to fall in Bhamo, Shwegu, and Thabeikkyin, where the level was estimated to have reached 1.5 feet (45 cm) over the danger mark in Mandalay," he added.

The water level at Mandalay port was 988 cm, 1,014 cm, and 1,065 cm between 14 and 16 July, and is approaching the danger level. If the upper regions get heavy rainfall, the water levels in

The upper regions of the Ayeyawady River — Machanbaw and Putao — have received over 3 inches of rainfall on 10 July,

and over one inch on 11, 12, and 13 July. In Myitkyina, low-lying wards witnessed flooding before the water reached the danger level. With the water level in the Ayeyawady River increasing, fire

fighters, auxiliary teams, fire engines, fiber boats, and other flood rescue measures have been put in place for any emergencies.

Yangon dump fire site set to receive trash again

THE Hteinpin dump site in Hlinethaya Township, Yangon Region, which was engulfed by fire in 2018, is preparing to receive trash again, said Dr Aung Myint Maw, the deputy head of the Yangon City Development Committee's Pollution Control and Cleansing Department.

"In order to dump trash at the site again, 80 acres of land was divided into four zones. Rocks and broken bricks will be laid in those areas," he said.

"The trash will be disposed in those areas in the current rainy season. Of the 150 acres of dumpsite burnt by the fire, 20 acres each have been designated as zone A, B, C and D. Zone A has been divided into two parts — A1a and A1b, and trash will be dumped in Zone A this year and next year. The trash will be

disposed only after bricks and broken bricks are laid on the land," said Dr Aung Myint Maw.

In addition, Myanmar's government, in cooperation

with the Poland government, is planning to generate biogas by using 1,000 tons of trash per day, according to the YCDC.

The Hteinpin dump fire

started on 21 April, 2018, and the trash site burnt for days. The fire spread to more than 100 acres of the 300-acre site. (Translated by EMM)

Seasonal influenza virus kills 56 on 1 Jan - 16 July

A total of 56 people have died of the A(H1N1)pdm09 strain of seasonal influenza in the country from 1 January to 16 July, according to the Central Epidemiology Unit under the Public Health Department. Forty-three of the total deaths were reported from the Yangon Region.

Around 54 people died of H1N1 infection across the country as of 15 July. Seven deaths were reported, one each from

Hlinethaya, Dagon Myothit (South), Thingangyun, Htantabin, Botahtaung, and Dabon townships, and two from Shwepyitha Township.

In addition, one death was reported from Ayeyawady and Magway regions and Mon State each. According to the department, 280 of 681 suspected patients across the country were diagnosed with the virus. The number of patients suffering

from the A(H1N1)pdm09 seasonal influenza has been slightly on the increase till now.

"Some patients were found to have died because of seasonal influenza. The A(H1N1)pdm09 has infected people who are aged, very young, suffering from diabetes, hypertension, heart disease, respiratory disease, and congenital diseases," said Daw Khin Khin Gyi, the Deputy Director from the Central Epi-

demology Unit (Nay Pyi Taw).

Of the total patients diagnosed with the virus from 1 January to 16 July, 49 per cent were those aged between 15 and 65, 17 per cent between 5 and 1, 13 per cent above 65, 14 per cent between 5 and 15, and 7 per cent are below the age of 1, according to the sub-central epidemiology unit.—Myo Min Thein (Mayangon) (Translated by Hay Mar)

Magway farmers expect high sesame yield this year

LOCAL farmers are expecting to produce 50 baskets of sesame from every two acres of land under sesame cultivation. They said sesame will be cultivated on more than 180,000 acres this monsoon in Magway Township of Magway Region.

Although the farmers are worried about the inputs, labour charges, and selling price for sesame, they said, they will make more profits this year than last year if the sesame yield is good as expected.

“There have been some seasons in which we could not bring even a seed of sesame home because of bad weather conditions. This year, some local farmers had to grow sesame twice because of late rain-

fall. From my own experience, sesame yield will be good this year. We expect to produce 50 baskets of sesame from every two acres,” said U Thaung Htay, a sesame grower from Magyi Kan Village.

“One basket of black sesame is selling for K85,000, while white sesame is fetching K56,000 in the local market. Cultivating sesame on two acres of land will cost around K1 million.

If the yield per acre is as good as expected and the current prices are retained, we can make about K2 million in profit,” said sesame growers. —Zayyatu (Magway)

Myanmar weaving businesses face shortage of weavers

EARLIER, Myanmar weaving businesses were passed down through generations as family businesses. But now, weaving businesses are surviving on a manageable scale in rural areas, including the Chaungzone Township of Mon State.

“We have been working on the weaving business for about seven years. We mostly weave Kayin ethnic clothes. Our looms are placed in other villages, as a branch business. Cotton is ordered from Mawlamyine, and 50 or 60 clothes can be produced daily,” said U Maung Nge, a weaver.

One packet of cotton can

produce two items of clothing, and there are 12 items of clothing per package. Those packages of sewn clothes are sent to Myawady and Mae Sot markets, and fetch between K6,000 and K7,000.

“There are many steps involved in weaving and we focus on creativity to produce a variety of designs. Normally, we dye, sew, and create designs ourselves, and we hire workers for the other steps. Nowadays, weavers have become rare, and youths are unwilling to take up weaving. Weavers can earn K300-K400 per item of clothing, depending on the design, and we

have 11 looms. The looms are placed in the weavers’ homes,” he added.

“Clothes are woven by hand usually, but machines are also being used nowadays. Currently, there are few hand-weavers, and most of them can be seen at the Kahtain robe weaving contests,” he said.

“Due to the shortage of weavers and looms, youths are not interested in weaving. Moreover, the clothes are not easy to buy. A weaver can weave 10 or 12 clothes a day, and earn K5,000-K6,000 a day,” said a weaver. —Township IPRD

Ten more hotels opened in Sagaing Region this year

THIS year, ten more hotels have been opened in four of the five tourism zones of Sagaing Region, said U Aung Thu Oo, the Head of the Sagaing Region Directorate of Hotels and Tourism.

Three hotels have been opened in Monywa and Kalay tourism zones each, and two in Sagaing and Katha tourism zones each, according to data provided by the Sagaing Region Directorate of Hotels and Tourism. “Sagaing Region has witnessed construction of more hotels to provide accommodation to the increasing number of tourists and local travellers in the region year over year. In addition, there are still more hotels

which are under construction,” said U Aung Thu Oo.

There were 23 hotels in five tourism zones of Sagaing Region in 2016, six more hotels were added in 2017, and seven in 2018. There are five tourism zones in Sagaing Region: Sagaing, Monywa, Shwebo, Katha, and Kalay. Local pilgrims mostly flock to Zalon Taung and the reclining figure called the Alaungdaw Kathapa. Those places are crowded with pilgrims during the high season.

Tourist arrivals in Sagaing Region have increased from 385,031 in 2016 to 483,784 in 2017, and 492,097 in 2018. —Win Oo/Ko Min *(Translated by EMM)*

Hong Kong-Myanmar JV to set up community market

A joint venture between a Hong Kong and Myanmar company will build a community market in Dagon Seikkan Township, according to the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration (DICA).

The JV was given the green light by the Myanmar Investment Commission for construction, sale, lease, and management of commercial offices, wholesale and retail buildings and units, according to the DICA.

“The MIC screened this proposal to ensure there is no environmental and social im-

pact. The business will execute a community market, warehouse, logistics, and commercial buildings,” said U Thant Sin Lwin, the acting Director-General of the DICA.

The project includes a car park that can accommodate over 1,200 vehicles, besides a green area project of international standards, he said.

“Yangonites will be able to go shopping at malls, the shopping center, and relax at the recreation center,” he added.

The project will pull in an investment of US\$87 million, according to the DICA.

Between 1 October, 2018

and 10 July, 2019, 207 foreign enterprises obtained permits and endorsements to invest in Myanmar, pulling in capital of \$2.09 billion.

Overall, foreign direct investments of \$3.47 billion have flowed into the country so far, including an expansion of capital by existing enterprises and investments of over \$208.3 million in the Thilawa Special Economic Zone.

During the October-June period in the current fiscal year, 26 Hong Kong-listed companies brought \$289 million in investment to the country, according to the DICA.

China plays significant role in global natural gas market: expert

NEW YORK—The recent years have witnessed China's growing role in the global natural gas market and the country will continue to be a significant player on this front, driven by its coal-to-gas conversion efforts, an energy expert said Tuesday.

China "has grown much more quickly than we had anticipated" in the gas market, particularly on the demand side and the LNG (liquefied natural gas) segment, International Energy Agency (IEA) analyst Peter Fraser said at an event in

New York City, while expounding the agency's latest report on gas. Natural gas demand will continue to grow in the medium term, fueled by emerging Asian economies and led by China, he said. According to IEA's annual market report Gas 2019, China is expected to account for more than 40 percent of global gas demand growth to 2024.

Meanwhile, the report said that the United States and China are the two largest individual contributors to supply growth to 2024, ac-

counting together for over 50 percent of total production increase. China's efforts to improve air quality by shifting away from coal is a major driver behind the big increase in its natural gas consumption, Fraser told Xinhua, noting that the country is already "a very significant player" in the global LNG market.

"China is now the second biggest importer of LNG and according to our analysis, by 2024 it will become the biggest LNG importer," he said. Chi-

na consumed more than 280 billion cubic meters of natural gas in 2018 and is considered one of the world's most robust natural gas and LNG markets,

according to competent authorities.

The country's natural gas imports exceeded 90 million tonnes, with LNG imports from 25 countries in

Asian Pacific, North America and the Middle East hitting record highs to more than 53 million tonnes, accounting for over 60 percent of total imports.—Xinhua ■

Japan sees record number of foreign visitors in 1st half of 2019

TOKYO—Japan saw a record number of foreign visitors in the first six months of 2019, with the estimated 16.63 million arrivals up 4.6 percent from a year earlier, government data showed Wednesday. Spending by foreign visitors in the period through June increased 8.3 percent from a year earlier to 2.43 trillion yen (\$22 billion), also an all-time high, the Japan Tourism Agency said. The government has set a target of attracting 40 million annual foreign visitors and increasing

their spending to 8 trillion yen next year when Japan hosts the Tokyo Olympic and Paralympic Games. By country and region, the highest number of visitors traveled from China at 4,532,500, up 11.7 percent, with the increase helped by the easing of visa restrictions in January.

However, the number of South Korean visitors fell 3.8 percent to 3,862,700, while those from Taiwan decreased 1.0 percent to 2,480,800, the agency said. —Kyodo ■

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
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Secretariat to host Martyrs' Day exhibition

Yangon to get more smoke-free zones

YANGON Region will get more smoke-free zones with nine more townships set to implement anti-smoking campaigns, said Dr Than Sein, the Chair of the People's Health Foundation.

He made the remarks at a coordination meeting on expanding smoke-free zones in the Yangon Region, which was held yesterday morning at the University of Nursing (Yangon). Officials from health NGOs and relevant departments and township administrators attended the meeting.

"The smoke-free zone project is being implemented in the Yangon Region. The project aims to cover 33 townships of Yangon Region in five years. The project was launched in Kyauktada Township in 2017, with the permission of the Yangon Region government. Five more downtown townships — Botahtaung, Pazuntaung, Pabetan, Latha, and Lanmadaw — will commence smoke-free campaigns," said Dr Than Sein.

In addition, four more townships will carry out smoke-free projects simultaneously, he

added. More than 200 places in Kyauktada Township have prohibited smoking. Based on the implementation of non-smoking zones in Kyauktada Township, plans will be drawn up for other townships to designate smoke-free zones.

An implementation committee will be formed for the no-smoking campaign. It will include officials from the Yangon City Development Committee, related departments, firemen, police force, Administrative Department, Hluttaw representatives, and Myanmar Red Cross Society staff. They will raise awareness through anti-smoking campaigns in universities, schools, and wards in the respective townships. Besides awareness campaigns, pamphlets will be distributed, no-smoking areas will be designated, and certificates of honour will be presented to offices, schools, markets, restaurants, and hotels.

The Control of Smoking and Consumption of Tobacco Product Law was enacted in 2006, but compliance with the law in some restaurants and tea-shops has

been found to be weak. Those who violate the law can face a fine or a sentence under Section 6 and 7.

"Secondhand smoke has the same harmful chemicals that smokers inhale. It is terrible that non-smokers suffer diseases owing to the harmful effects of secondhand smoke," said a doctor. During the project's implementation, a monitoring committee and a working analysis committee assigned by the Yangon City Development Committee will conduct surprise checks at the designated no-smoking areas, in accordance with the law, every three months. To implement the anti-smoking campaign, US-based Bloomberg Philanthropies has agreed to contribute US\$100,000. A 2009 survey on the consumption of tobacco and related products had found that 33.61 per cent of men and 6.13 per cent of women in Myanmar smoked. In 2014, the rate had increased to 41.4 per cent for men and 8.4 per cent for women. —Myint Maung Soe/GNLM

New conservative Greek parliament sworn in after election

ATHENS — Greece's new parliament was sworn in Wednesday after 7 July elections, led by a conservative government that has vowed to cut taxes, boost domestic security and tighten borders against migration.

The six-party parliament will officially begin its functions after electing a speaker on Thursday.

New Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis will outline his government's policies at the

weekend before a vote of confidence late on Sunday.

His conservative government, which has a comfortable majority of 158 lawmakers in the 300-seat parliament, has made boosting sluggish growth a priority, powered by tax cuts and accompanied by privatisation deals.

The 51-year-old Harvard graduate and former McKinsey consultant has also pledged to create jobs and get rid of obsta-

cles to business.

On Tuesday, Athens placed seven-year bonds at a record-low yield in its first foray into the debt markets since the election, a measure of investors' confidence in the new government's direction.

Starting in 2020, Mitsotakis has promised to cut a hated property tax called ENFIA — brought in by a previous New Democracy-led government during the

economic crisis — by 30 percent over two years.

He has also offered to reduce income tax thresholds and to gradually cut tax on business profits by eight percent.

But just hours after his July 7 victory, eurozone finance ministers warned the new government to stick to the country's strict public spending commitments.

"We must keep our commitments, this is the only way

I know to gain credibility," said Eurogroup chief Mario Centeno.

On Tuesday, the eurozone's bailout fund director and a key EU official overseeing Greece's debt repayments, Klaus Regling, suggested that tax cuts be coupled "with a broader tax base."

In a meeting with Regling later on Tuesday, Mitsotakis "confirmed that Greece would respect fiscal targets," the prime minister's office said. —AFP ■

US House votes to condemn Trump's 'racist comments'

WASHINGTON — The US House of Representatives formally condemned Donald Trump on Tuesday for xenophobic attacks on four minority Democratic lawmakers and hostile language targeting immigrants, as the president denied accusations of racism.

Top Republican leaders rallied around Trump, but four members of the president's party voted with the 235 Democrats to condemn him for "racist comments that have legitimized and increased fear and hatred of new Americans and people of color."

One independent lawmaker also supported the measure, which takes aim at Trump's weekend tweets telling a group

of progressive Democratic congresswomen of color to "go back" to other countries.

The resolution also takes the president to task for "referring to immigrants and asylum seekers

as 'invaders.'"

Trump has a long history of pandering to white suspicions about other ethnic groups, and the resolution criticizes him for "saying that Members of Congress who are immigrants (or those of our colleagues who are wrongly assumed to be immigrants) do not belong in Congress or in the United States of America."

Democrats hold a majority in the 435-member House but are outnumbered by Republicans in the Senate, where the resolution is unlikely to be considered.

The four congresswomen — all but one of whom were born in the US — are of Hispanic, Arab, Somali and African-American descent. Trump has stuck by the

provocative comments.

"Our Country is Free, Beautiful and Very Successful. If you hate our Country, or if you are not happy here, you can leave!" the president tweeted Tuesday.

Democratic leaders denounced Trump's remarks, and rallied around the lawmakers — Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, Rashida Tlaib, Ilhan Omar and Ayanna Pressley. Omar is the only one born outside the United States.

Slamming the "so-called vote" as a "Democrat con game," Trump urged Republicans not to "show 'weakness' and fall into their trap."

"Those Tweets were NOT Racist. I don't have a Racist bone in my body!" Trump said.—AFP ■

Training journalists in the era of fake news

PARIS — As uncannily realistic "deep fake" videos proliferate online, including one recently retweeted by Donald Trump, journalism schools are scrambling to adapt to an era of misinformation — or fake news.

Experts discussed how to train tomorrow's reporters for these new challenges at the World Journalism Education Congress in Paris last week.

The three-day event — "Teaching Journalism During a Disruptive Age" — was attended by 600 educators and researchers from 70 countries. "We have journalism educators from places as different as Bangladesh and Uganda, but essentially we all face the same challenges," congress organiser Pascal Guenee, head of IPJ Dauphine journalism school in Paris, told AFP. In China, the government makes no secret of its tight grip on the media. But fake news is seeping into traditional media via Weibo, WeChat and other Chinese-language social media platforms, said journalism professor Peiqin

Chen of the Shanghai International Studies University.

"When someone posts false information on Weibo, it can be reposted by a mainstream newspaper's Weibo account," she said. "Other mainstream media pick up on it from there."

"Mainstream media play the biggest role in confirming and spreading fake news in China," she added.

For politics or profit

It was US President Donald Trump who first popularised the phrase "fake news" in attacks on the news media. But in May, Trump tweeted a video of US House Speaker Nancy Pelosi which appeared to have been edited to focus on sections of a speech in which she stuttered and mispronounced certain words. "Pelosi stammers through news conference," he wrote. Another doctored Pelosi video, which went viral online, slowed down her speech to give the impression she was drunk.—AFP ■

Merkel heir apparent joins cabinet in risky bid for power

BERLIN — German Chancellor Angela Merkel's heir apparent joined her cabinet Wednesday as defence minister, a high-profile job often called a poisoned chalice in Berlin's fraught political landscape.

The surprise appointment of Annegret Kramp-Karrenbauer late Tuesday came just hours after the current head of the German military, Ursula von der Leyen, was elected as the first woman to lead the European Commission.

The decision by AKK, as she is commonly known, to take charge of a sprawling administration widely seen as unwieldy and

scandal-prone was described as a risky gambit to shore up political support. At a naming ceremony at the presidential palace in Berlin in Merkel's presence, the 56-year-old formally accepted the portfolio from von der Leyen.

"The men and women of the Bundeswehr (armed forces) deserve the highest political priority and my full commitment," she said. "I am aware of my great responsibility and want to live up to it."

Shakuntala Banerjee of ZDF public television said AKK was "stepping up and taking over the most difficult ministry".

"The chances to win big are

there — but the risk of failure is also greater." News weekly Der Spiegel said the defence ministry, rocked by a series of mismanagement allegations on von der Leyen's watch, could prove to be a "minefield" for AKK.

"But because that's the case, the ministry also offers a chance for her to sharpen her profile, in an area where she lacks it: in foreign and security policy — an area where a chancellor needs some experience," said its commentator Philipp Wittrock.

"The chancellery remains the big goal and the defence ministry can serve as a stage for her to prove herself."—AFP ■

2022 World Cup: Myanmar placed in Group F for Asian Qualifiers

MYANMAR has been placed in Group F for the Asian Qualifiers for the 2022 FIFA World Cup and the AFC Asian Cup 2023 in the drawing ceremony held yesterday in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

The 40 participating teams have been divided into eight groups of five teams.

In Group F, team Myanmar will face Japan, touted as Asia's best performers in the 2018 FIFA World Cup, where they were defeated by Belgium in the Round of 16.

Myanmar will also meet with Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, and Mongolia in the

same group.

In their earlier meetings, Myanmar lost one match to Kyrgyzstan, and another ended in a draw.

Myanmar secured a 2-2 draw against Kyrgyzstan in the third round qualifiers for the 2017 AFC Asian Cup on 10 October, 2017, and lost in the third round qualifiers for the 2019 AFC Asian Cup on 22 March, 2018.

Myanmar prevailed over Mongolia in their previous two meetings, the AFC Asian Cup Qualifying match in 2000 and the FIFA World Cup Qualifiers in 2014.

Myanmar will be likely to struggle in Group F as all teams are strong at the Asian level, especially Japan.

Twenty-four next best teams from the second round of the joint qualifiers will compete separately for the remaining 12 slots in the 24-team AFC Asian Cup China 2023.

Meanwhile, four ASEAN teams, Viet Nam, Thailand, Malaysia, and Indonesia, have surprisingly been placed together in Group G for the Asian Qualifiers with Asian giant, the United Arab Emirates (UAE).—Lynn Thit (Tgi)

North, South Korea to face off in World Cup qualifiers

KUALA LUMPUR — North and South Korea will face off in politically-charged World Cup qualifiers after being drawn in the same group Wednesday, while arch-rivals Iran and Iraq will also meet.

Heavyweights Iran, Japan, South Korea, Australia and Saudi Arabia -- who all played in the 2018 World Cup in Russia -- were drawn in different groups for the Asian qualifiers of the 2022 edition of the tournament in Qatar.

China, who are seeking to qualify for the World Cup for only the second time, look to have a promising fixture against low-

er-ranked opponents including war-torn Syria and tiny Guam.

The country and its 73rd-ranked team have grand ambitions to host and win a World Cup under football-fan President Xi Jinping.

South Korea is one of Asia's best sides and should easily beat the North, but the matches between the neighbours on the divided Korean peninsula promise to be bitter.

Sides play each other twice during the qualifiers, which run from September to June.

After the draw at the Asian football body's headquarters

in Kuala Lumpur, South Korea coach Paulo Bento insisted that facing the North was "nothing special".

"For us it is a sport -- the goal is to qualify," he told AFP.

"The message I will share with the players when we play against North Korea is to give them the same respect we will have for any other teams we will play against."

Sporting ties played a role in a diplomatic thaw on and around the peninsula last year, when the two Koreas formed their first-ever unified Olympic team for the 2018 Winter Games.

But those endeavours stagnated with the wider deadlock in negotiations over the North's nuclear arsenal.

Iran and Iraq will renew one of football's great rivalries after being drawn in the same group.

The teams will compete in a round-robin format, with the winners of the eight groups and four runners-up progressing to a final round of qualifying.
