# Vice President U Henry Van Thio inspects gasfired power plants, steel factory in Myingyan

Vice President U Henry Van Thio who was in Mandalay, inspected a 225 MW natural gas and waste heat power station, a 90 MW natural gas power station and No. 1 Steel Factory in Myingyan Township.

Vice President U Henry Van Thio accompanied by Deputy Minister for Electricity and Energy Dr Tun Naing, Region minister U Zarni Aung and officials arrived at the Sembcorp Myingyan Power Co., Ltd's 225 MW natural gas and waste heat power station 9 miles southeast of Myingyan Town in the afternoon and observed a video clip on particulars about the power station, electricity generation and distribution, in the power station meeting hall.

Next factory safety man-

ager U Tin Maung Thein ex-

plained about the status of protecting the natural environment and Deputy Minister Dr Tun Naing provided additional explanations.

Afterwards the Vice President inspected and observed the distribution of electricity from the power station control room where Deputy Minister Dr Tun Naing and Deputy Factory Manager Yaza Myo Thein provided explanations.

The Vice President then inspected the factory compound by car.

From there the Vice President and party went to V Power Group Hodling Limited and Zeya & Associates Co. Ltd.'s 90 MW natural gas power station where an official explained about the power station particulars and status of electricity

Both power stations were running with Shwe Offshore natural gas and the electricity generated were fed into the natural grid.

After the inspection, the Vice President and party were explained about the factory, availability of electricity, natural gas and water for Phase-1, fiscal year wise production

and sale, works required to restart Steel Making Plant-1, direct raw material wise balance in hand, works required to restart Steel Making Plant-2 in Phase-2, completion status of constructing Direct Reduction Plant, products to be produced after Phase-3 and status of machinery and parts arrival, status of storing packages in storage area and status of obtaining funding were explained by No. 1 Heavy Industries Enterprise Managing Director U Kan Chun.

CFPA to annually provide K 2 bln for education from next year

AS part of the programme to provide funds for education in Myanmar, the China Foundation for Poverty Alleviation Myanmar (CFPA) will annually provide K 2 billion for the Myanmar education sector beginning in the next academic year, said Mr. Wang Xingzui, the Executive Vice President of CFPA.

He made his announcement at the fourth anniversary of the China Foundation for Poverty Alleviation Myan-

mar and at the ceremony to donate school bags and stationery, held at the Chatrium Hotel Royal Lake, Yangon, on 17 August. "We mainly targeted to develop the Myanmar education sector. So, we are implementing the Panda Pack Program to fulfill the needs in the education sector and to carry out the "Paukphaw" education project. We expect to donate not less than K 2 billon to the education sector annually," said Mr Wang Xingzui. The **China Foundation for Poverty** Alleviation was recognized as a

non-government organization in Myanmar in 2015.

Since 2015, CFPA Myanmar has been supporting education in Myanmar. Among the projects, the Paukphaw scholarship project, China-Myanmar friendship scholarship project, Myanmar Love Package (or) Panda Pack school bags and stationery donation project, along with enabling access to clean water, are being carried out during a four year period. "The education sector is very important to Myanmar. To achieve success in the education sector, we need support from experts, citizens, social organizations, students, teachers and parents," said Dr Win Maw Tun, the deputy minister for Education. CFPA Myanmar has provided K 4.5 billion for the four-year project. While CFPA had a fund amounting to Chinese Yuans 10 million to support the Myanmar education sector.

The Alibaba Benevolent Association is also providing support. Moreover, CFPA will provide 1,000 solar lanterns to schools in Myitkyina Township in Kachin State, where there is a shortage of electricity. CFPA will provide the solar lanterns, as suggested by the Ministry of Education. Some 20 schools are to receive assistance.

For the development of the Myanmar education sector, CFPA started the Paukphaw scholarship project in 2014. Currently, CFPA has donated 100,000 Panda Pack school bags and stationery to the Ministry of Education under the Panda Pack project. ■

### Chinese experts to inspect tissue culture bananas for import

AN inspection team from China is expected to visit Myanmar in August to inspect tissue culture bananas in preparation for importing the fruit from Myanmar, according to the Ministry of Commerce.

The move comes after the Ministry of Commerce approached China to allow legal exports of five fruits—pineapple, avocado, lemon, pomelo, and tissue culture bananas.

"We replied to queries by the Chinese side about pests. They, in turn, told us that a delegation of experts will visit Myanmar at the end of this month," said U Khin Maung Lwin, Assistant Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Commerce.



The ministry is also working to get permission for export of pineapple, avocado, lemon, and pomelo through diplomatic channels.

As China accounts for 95 per cent of its total fruit exports, Myanmar needs to adopt a systematic plan for promoting trade with the neighboring country. Myanmar traders have been exporting tissue culture bananas to China through the border illegally. —Thurein Kyaw (*Translated by Kyaw Zin Lin*)

### Fish farms in Ayeyawady, Yangon regions should take protective measures against floods : Fisheries Department

ALTHOUGH the fish farming sector in Mon and Kayin states, and Taninthayi Region, have suffered less damage due to floods, because fish farming is less developed in these states and region, fish farms in Ayeyawady and Yangon regions should be prepared against floods, said U Hla Win, the head of Yangon Region Fisheries Department, while speaking at the 14th Fisheries Sector Entrepreneurs Regular Meeting held on 13 August at Myanmar Fisheries Federation, Yangon.

"Currently, flooding is everywhere because of climate change. Flooding has occurred mainly in Mon and Kayin states, and the Taninthayi Region. But our fisheries sector is less developed in those areas. So, we have less damage. If the Ayeyawady River water rises, the impact of the floods on the Ayeyawady and Yangon regions could be dramatic. So, we should take precautionary measures. If the storms and the rising water break out earlier than expected, the impact on the fisheries sector could be substantial, he added.

Currently, the fisheries department is adding fingerlings to fish farms to prevent a scarcity of these fish. The department is breeding mostly Rohu, Barb and mrigal fish. If the farmed fish are harmed by flooding, the department will distribute fingerlings at no cost after conducting a survey, in cooperation with various departments. Although flooding occurs mostly in Mon and Kayin States and the Taninthayi Region, there is less damage because fish farming in these areas is less developed. But, we have planned to supply fingerlings to those areas. Two months ago, we did not take precautionary measures. The fish farming entrepreneurs are also aware of the weather situation. Some have already made preparations," he added. There are some 20 state-owned fish hatching farms across the country, according to the Fisheries Department.

"The fisheries department has already reminded entrepreneurs to take precautions. We were not faced with substantial damages, because some of the fish farming workers have good experiences," said U Nay Soe, chairman of the Myanmar Fisheries Federation (MFF).

Since 2015, the Fisheries Department has been providing financial support to enable fish and prawn farmers to purchase fingerlings, as they suffered from flooding. The support was conducted in cooperation with MFF.

In 2015, 34,720 fish farms from five regions, and over 58,600 acres of prawn farming in Rakhine state, were damaged. The farming losses were estimated at some Ks 50 billion.

In 2018, a total of 1044 acres of fish and prawn farms were damaged in Kungyangon township, over 64 acres in Kawhu township, 1,291 acres in Yangon region, 35 acres in Bago township, and over 800 acres in Kayin States, according to MFF. *(Translated by Hay Mar)* 

### Drugs seized in six townships

A combined team comprised of local anti-drug squad members and police seized 973 stimulant tablets from two women and discovered 21,217 stimulant tables from their house in Myawady on 16 August.

Action has been taken agains Ma Wah Wah Tun (a) Wa Wa and Daw Soe Soe Htay (a) Mi Nge under the Anti-Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Law.

Similarly, a combined team of Mandalay anti-drug squad members and local police searched a motorcycle driven by Kyaw Ko Ko Htet 9a) Ko Htet on the Thameinbayan Road in Pyigyitagun Township, and seized 50 stimulant tablets from him on the same day.

In connection with the case, the team also discovered 4,800 stimulant tablets from his house. Similarly, a local anti-drug squad in Thabeikkyin Township seized 24,000 stimulant tablets from a motorcycle on the Momeik-Twinnge Road. They arrested Ar Kar Min who was driving the motorcycle. On the same day, a local anti-drug squad in Sittway, acting on an tip-off, searched a room at Prince Guest House and seized 1,045 stimulant tablets, 0.6 g of marijuana, K140,000 and two



mobile phones.

Similarly, police from the Maung District Police Force and local anti-drug squad searched the house of Soe Oo in Parkwe Village, Lwetawkham Village-tract in Tachilek and seized 15 g of heroin, 1,6000 stimulant tablets and one mobile phone. Actions have been taken against them under the Anti-narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Law. — Ko Ye ■

## Local, foreign firms looking to form JV, invest in Thanlyin industrial zone

TWO local firms and a Chinese company are currently in negotiations with the regional government for forming a joint venture and investing in the Thanlyin industrial zone, said Naw Pan Thinzar Myo, the Minister for Kayin Ethnic Affairs, Yangon Region Government.

The local companies — Ta Mo Hnye group and Shwe Paing Htike Company — have applied for permission to invest in the Thanlyin industrial zone by forming a joint venture with a Chinese company. They have discussed with the regional government how they will invest and how much capital they will put up for the project.

"The Ta Mo Hnye group is interested in investing in the Thanlyin industrial zone. They will bring in investors. They made a presentation to the chief minister, explaining how they will implement the project as a local partner, how much they will invest, and how best they can implement the project as soon as possible to meet the project deadline. Four entrepreneurs had demonstrated their interest in investing in the Thanlyin industrial zone. However, when we explained what and how we want the investment to be, only two entrepreneurs showed interest by submitting proposals," said Naw Pan Thinzar Myo.

"Currently, Shwe Paing Htike Company has brought in a Chinese company which is producing 70,000 containers of luxury mattresses per annum," she added.

"We don't want local farmers to sell the farmlands on which industrial zones are being planned by the Yangon Region government. Local farmers must not sell such land at a low price When the government realizes the project on paper, the local farmers will earn much more money," said Naw Pan Thinzar Myo. At present, discussions are being held for the implementation of the joint venture project under the supervision of government officials and experts.

The Yangon Region Government is planning to implement industrial zones in 11 townships outside the municipal areas of Greater Yangon. So far, the establishment of the Htantabin and Hlegu industrial zones has been approved by the Regional Hluttaw.  $\blacksquare$  (*Translated by Hay Mar*)

# Sagaing timber logging remains lower than permitted volume

SAGAING Region is logging timber lower than its annually permitted volume, said U Than Soe, the Director of the Sagaing Region Forest Department.

"The incumbent government only prohibited harvesting timber in 2015. In the following years, the government granted timber extraction in some states and regions. Sagaing Region has high timber harvests because it has many forests. But, we produced timber at lower than the annually permitted volume. Based on the calculations of the volume of the forest, authorities decided on the volume of logging in such a way that the logging cannot cause deforestation within a year," said U Than Soe.

Saging region has plentiful forests, compared to other states and regions. Currently, Bago Yoma is not permitted to extract timber. Other states and regions are permitted to cut down timber, depending upon the volume of the forest. Some forests could not be allowed to produce timber.

"Katha, Mawlaik, Kalay and Kani districts form Sagaing region and are felling large trees (Kanyin), including ironwood and teak. Also, they are planting hardwood and teak trees," said U Than Soe.

Forests often have difficulties in replenishing new trees. So, natural forest planting activities are being conducted in targeted areas.—Myo Win Tun (Monywa) (*Translated by Hay Mar*)

# Locals informed not to worry on overflow from Kyi Ohn Gyi Wa Dam spillway

ACCORDING to Pwintbyu Township Irrigation and Water Utilisation Department water over flowing above the Kyi Ohn Gyi Wa Dam spillway was found to be 5 ft. 8 inches at 6 am on 17 August and this was not an amount to be concerned for.

"Full water depth of Kyi Ohn Gyi Wa Dam in Pwintbyu Township was 340 ft. According to measurements taken at 6 am water was overflowing 5 ft. 8 inches above the spillway. This was not an amount to be concerned for as normal overflow over the spillway was from 5 to 6 ft. The situation of the dam was monitored by the department and the public informed about it," said Pwintbyu Township Irrigation and Water Utilisation Department official U Aung Thu Lin.—Ye Win Naing (NyaungU) (Translated by Zaw Min)

# AA/TNLA/MNDAA armed groups sabotage bridges, attack Lashio, Tatmadaw columns, police stations

ACCORDING to news released by Office of the Commander-in-Chief of Defence Services and Myanmar Police Force, AA/TNLA/MNDAA armed groups mined and destroyed bridges on Hsenwi-Kunlong Road, torched a petrol station on Lashio-Hsenwi Road, fired on Lashio with heavy arms and also fired on Tatmadaw columns and police stations.

During the night of 16 August, AA/TNLA/MNDAA armed groups fired three rocket propelled grenades (RPGs) on a battalion headquarter in Kyaukme, Shan State North and retreated to the west after being fired back.

The group also mined the reinforced concrete bridge (Byone Taung) on Namt Slup-Kunlong Road and the reinforced concrete Mantonsun Bridge on Hsenwi-Namt Slup Road around 3:30 am and 4:30 am cutting off the road communication.

Tatmadaw columns conducting security operations around Kutkai-Namtpatkha-Muse region also encountered with armed groups until yesterday morning.

Later in the afternoon, about 200 armed personnel approached from Kone Sar side northeast of Lashio to attack the town but were engaged but Tatmadaw columns forcing the armed group to retreat with heavy casualties.

Tatmadaw columns conducting security operations along Lashio-Hsenwi-Kutkhai (105) miles Union Road also came into contact with armed groups and had about ten armed engagements.

Security personnel near Namt On Village fired on a motorcycle with two suspicious persons who were driving toward Namtpatkha from Muse and captured a TNLA armed personnel with a RPG.

Around 9:30 am, armed groups fired on Tane Phyu Petrol Station near Pan Hat Village north of Lashio and houses in Lashio Town Ward 12 with heavy arms, leaving the petrol station burn down and some houses in Ward 12 were damaged.

In addition, a vehicle from a local philanthropic association from Lashio was attacked with heavy arms by the armed groups and a person was killed in the attack.

Tatmadaw was conducting mine clearance operation around Gote Twin Bridge sabotaged by AA/TNLA/MNDAA armed groups and found 33 Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs) with 0.53 tons of C-4 explosives, 160 TNT blocks (80 lbs), 222 detonators, one RPG grenade, two hand grenades, one 40 mm round and two EN-ERGA rounds.

A A / T N L A / M N D A A armed groups were conducting these terror and destructive acts because Tatmadaw captured their drug making camps with drugs and drug making accessories in Kutkhai Township from July 25 to 28.

In the operation, the Tatmadaw troops also seized 9000 stimulant tablets, 750 kilos of ICE worth of over K16 billion, 2262 5-gallon acid containers, 356 10-gallon acid containers, 195 50-gallon acid containers, 478 acid tanks, 5280 bottles of acid, 90 bags of washing soda, 20 bags of charcoal, 1220 bags of sodium exodus, 50 bags of sodium sulphate, tents, 1,144 gas cylinders, 69 boilers, 95 steam boilers, six big generators, 30 refrigerators, seven freezers, 11 washing machines, 40 steel trays, 8 steel mixers, five pelleting machines, six scales, several steel trays and two vehicles.

In addition to this, security personnel caught about WY brand 250,000 ecstasy pills (worth about K 5 billion), 36 mines, 52 Walkie Talkies and mine making accessories in the home of Tagundaing Village chief administrator U San Thar Kyaw, an AA hard core person, in Yathedaung, Rakhine State, on 8 August.

As Tatmadaw detained and captured their drugs and drug making camps that were the main business activities of AA/TNLA/MN-DAA greatly affecting their economy, TNLA group had nine armed engagements and MNDAA group had two armed engagements in August 2019.

Armed engagements by armed groups in Shan State on 17<sup>th</sup> August, 2019.

Armed engagements with TNLA group were in Shan State (North) Kutkhai, Tarmoenye and Mawhan regions while armed engagements with MNDAA group was in Tarmoenye, Chinshwehaw region.

The armed engagements were in defence of their drug making camps as well as due to the intrusion of their forces beyond their areas and an attack on a Tatmadaw administrative convoy.

The attacks on narcotic inspection gate, inspection vehicle, bridge, Tatmadaw academy/headquarters in Pyin Oo Lwin Township and Nawnghkio Township were not an attack to ease military pressures of Tatmadaw but in response to Tatmadaw's anti-drug operations, the losses it caused to them, to harass and destroy road transport and security. These activities show that they have no wish nor will to participate in the peace process conducted by the government, Tatmadaw, ethnic nationals and the people, according to press release issued by Office of the Commander-in-Chief of Defence Services. — MNA ■

# Border trade tops \$8.9 bln

Trade between Myanmar and its four neighbouring countries has reached US\$8.9 billion as of 9 August, this financial year, according to the Ministry of Commerce.

The country's export via border gates amounted to \$ 6.2 billion while its import shared \$ 2.65 billion.

This fiscal year's figures increased by \$1.14 billion compared to the same period of last FY when it showed \$ 7.7 billion.

Muse topped the list of border checkpoints with the most trade value of \$4.3 billion, followed by Htikhi with \$2.14 billion and Myawady with \$ 824million.

Myanmar shares borders with Bangladesh, China, India and Thailand. Myanmar has 17 border trade centers: Muse, Lweje, Chinshwehaw, Kanpikete, Kengtung, Techilek, Myawady, Kawthoung, Myeik, Nabule/Htikhi, Mawtaung, Maese, Sittwe, Maungdaw, Tamu, Reik, Htantalan.

The country's agricultural products, animal products, fisheries, minerals and forest products are mainly exported, while capital goods, intermediate goods and consumer goods are imported. — GNLM (*Translated by Hay Mar*)

# It is time to address non-communicable diseases

MEMBER of parliament submitted a motion in August stating, to quote the Health and Sports Ministry's reports, that there were 3 million inpatients, 12 million outpatients and 760,000 surgeries performed for kidney, liver transplants and heart surgeries in the past three years.

There has been an annual increase in reported non-communicable diseases, such as diabetes, hypertension, cardiac-related complications and cancer, while communicable diseases have been consistently decreasing.

In Myanmar, the number of deaths from non-communicable diseases has risen from 48 per cent in 2014 to 52 per cent in 2017. The report also states that aortic stenosis is the cause of most deaths, while cancer comes in second.

Globally, non-communicable diseases (NCDs) kill 41 million people each year, equivalent to 71% of all deaths worldwide.

Also, 15 million people between the ages of 30 and 69 years die annually from a NCD; over 85% of these "premature" deaths

come countries. Cardiovascular diseas-

occur in low- and middle-in-

es account for most NCD deaths, or 17.9 million people annually, followed by cancers (9.0 million), respiratory diseases (3.9 million), and diabetes (1.6 million).

These 4 groups of diseases account for over 80% of all premature NCD deaths.

Tobacco use, physical inactivity, the harmful use of alcohol and unhealthy diets all increase the risk of dying from a NCD.

Detection, screening and treatment of NCDs, as well as palliative care, are key components in the response to NCDs

Also, we need to enforce

the Tobacco Control Law for the production, sales and import of alcohol, because the diseases caused by alcohol are also reported in great numbers in Myanmar.

Now is the time for all relevant ministries to enforce the existing laws and ensure proper taxation of tobacco and alcohol products, along with other related measures, including properly educating the public to combat the rise of non-communicable diseases.

To lessen the impact of NCDs on individuals and society a comprehensive approach is needed, requiring all sectors, including health, finance, transport, education, agriculture, planning and others, to collaborate to reduce the risks associated with NCDs, and promote interventions to prevent and control them.

It is high time we made comprehensive efforts for addressing NCDs in Myanmar. We must ensure multi-sectoral synergetic efforts, such as developing a strategic action plan on NCDs, strengthening health services for screening, referral and management of NCDs, raising public awareness about healthy lifestyles, encouraging people to participate in more physical activity, promoting healthy foods, and introducing sin taxes on alcohol and tobacco.

Adequate human and financial resources must be ensured for addressing the country's rapidly expanding NCD health needs.

# Iran tanker in limbo off Gibraltar as US issues warrant

GIBRALTAR (United Kingdom) - A last-minute US warrant to seize an Iranian tanker preparing to leave Gibraltar after weeks of detention cast doubt over its departure on Saturday, prolonging a diplomatic spat between Tehran, London and Washington.

The US Justice Department alleged the ship was part of a scheme "to unlawfully access the US financial system to support illicit shipments to Syria from Iran by the Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps," which Washington has designated a foreign terrorist organisation.

There was no immediate comment from Britain or Gibraltar, its overseas territory, over whether they would act on the warrant.

Gibraltar seized the ship on July 4 on suspicion it was transporting oil to Syria in breach of European sanctions, triggering a sharp deterioration in relations between Tehran and London. Iran has repeatedly denied this.

Iran subsequently detained the British-flagged tanker Stena Impero in what was seen as a tit-for-tat move.

On Thursday, Gibraltar's Supreme Court ordered the tanker released after the British overseas territory said it had received assurances from Iran that the Grace 1 would not head

to any country subject to European Union sanctions.

Preparations are underway for the ship to set sail, with a new crew set to arrive to pilot the tanker and its 2.1 million barrels of oil. But in a last-minute twist on Friday, the United States, which is at loggerheads with Iran, issued the warrant.

The warrant says the vessel and all the oil aboard are subject to forfeiture based on violations of a US law, the International **Emergency Economic Powers** Act, which revolves around any unusual or extraordinary threat from overseas to the national security, foreign policy or economy of the United States.

It also cites violations to bank fraud, money laundering and terrorism statutes.

### **Ship released on Thursday**

The US move comes after it tried — and failed — to block the tanker's release on Thursday. The 4 July seizure came amid surging tensions in the Gulf after several alleged Iranian attacks on smaller tankers. The US — citing Tehran's threat to American allies — expanded its military presence in the region with a new aircraft carrier task force, missile batteries and strategic bombers.

Iran called the detention of the Grace 1 an "illegal interception" staged by the United States, while Washington cheered it as "excellent news."

Ties between Tehran and Washington are at a low point since US President Donald Trump withdrew last year from a landmark 2015 nuclear deal between major powers and Iran, reimposing crippling unilateral sanctions.—AFP ■

### Nine killed in Ukraine hotel fire

KIEV (Ukraine) – Nine people were killed in a hotel fire in Ukraine's port city of Odessa on Saturday, leading authorities to launch a country-wide inspection of safety regulations in holiday resorts and hotels.

The fire broke out at 1.34 am (2234 GMT) in the southern city's Tokyo Star hotel.

Emergency services initially said eight people had died and ten were injured, later saying the number of deaths rose to nine. – AFP 🔳

### Sudan generals, protest leaders sign transition deal

KHARTOUM (Sudan)–Sudan's military council and protest leaders on Saturday signed a "constitutional declaration" that paves the way for a transition to civilian rule.

The agreement was signed by Mohamed HamdanDaglo, deputy chief of the military council, and Ahmed al-Rabie, representing the Alliance for Freedom and Change protest umbrella group, an AFP reporter said.

Heads of state, prime ministers and dignitaries from several countries attended the ceremony in Khartoum. – AFP 🔳

### South Sudan

When the country became independent in 2011, it made English its official language despite having very few resources or qualified personnel with which to teach it in schools.

### China

The situation in East Asia is more dramatic. China currently has more speakers of English as a second language than any other country. Some prominent English teachers have become celebrities, conducting mass lessons in stadiums seating thousands. In South Korea, meanwhile, according to the sociolinguist Joseph Sung-Yul Park, English is a "national religion". Korean employers expect proficiency in English, even in positions where it offers no obvious advantage. In not-dis-

tant-future, thanks to English, the curse of Babel will be undone and the children of men may together once again, united with the aid of a common tongue.

In other parts of the world, though, English still carries the full weight of its colonial past. Colonial education, in which pupils were physically punished for speaking their native languages while at school. For most of history, people lived in small communities. That did not mean they were isolated from one another. Multilingualism must have been common. Instead of representing a fall from human perfection, having languages is a gift. It is something to remember before we let English swallow the globe.

education schools. According to EF English proficiency Index 2017 which measures English language skills in 116 countries, several Asia-Pacific countries rank low or very low. Except for Indonesia, all ASEAN countries have compulsory classes in English at primary level. Yet Myanmar students still face challenges when it comes to speaking, which may hinder their careers and force them to take English classes even after university. Indeed, English skills are an advantage in the labor market, which can contribute to attracting to investment and enhancing job opportunities. Furthermore, speaking English allows participation in the world economy, sciences, trade and so on.

According to the online em-Myanmar students still lack ployment agency JobNet 2017 survey of 33 human resources managers, directors and over

300 job offers, 97% believe that English plays a critical role in career progression within their companies. To address the issue, Education Minister said Education Ministry worked with the British Council to upgrade the English of students and teachers in universities and colleges. The Ministry has started implementing the KG+12 curriculum under the National Education Law enacted in 2014.

In conclusion, there is no doubt English plays a critical role in international relations. Suffice it to say that it will play a vital role for the leaders of the new generations. The Ministry of Education is mainly responsible for carrying out the issues.

# US stocks end wild week on a hopeful note

NEW YORK (United States)— Wall Street closed a rollercoaster week on a positive note amid hope for progress in the US-China trade war and a reprieve from recession fears, with all three major indexes posting solid gains.

US economic data was mixed but offered enough good news not to ruin the party created by President Donald Trump's announcement that he has a phone call scheduled soon with Chinese leader Xi Jinping.

After a wild week in which the Dow Jones Industrial Average posted its worst day of the year, the index ended the session with a gain of 1.2 per cent at 25,886.01, but is still down compared to the previous Friday.

The broad-based S&P 500 jumped 1.44 per cent to finish at 2,888.68, and the tech-rich Nasdaq Composite Index increased 1.67 per cent to end at 7,895.99.

"In the last couple of days, the sellers have been exhausted," said Maris Ogg of Tower Bridge Advisors. "The volatility continues. But I don't think this is the beginning of a trend."

Investors were spooked when a key recession signal was flashing red: The yield on the 30-year Treasury bond hit an all-time low on Thursday, falling below two per cent for the first time, but peeked just above that level Friday, back above shorter-term yields.

Trump late Thursday revealed plans for call with Xi, and said trade negotiations set for September are "still on," offering signs of hope that a deal could be reached.

Any agreement is likely to remove a key source of turmoil that has fueled growing concerns about a possible recession on the horizon.

"The market is still grappling with the impact of the tariffs and deceleration in Europe and China," Ogg told AFP. "We don't know how far it's going to go."

Farm machinery manufacturer Deere saw its shares gain 3.8 per cent despite reporting disappointing earnings, due to uncertainty amid the trade war that has hit US farmers hard, as it also posted strong results in its construction and forestry business.

Industrial titan General Electric surged close to 10 per cent after CEO Larry Culp bought nearly \$2 million in shares, boosting investor confidence after whistleblower Harry Markopolos accused the company of massive accounting fraud — a charge the company vehemently denied. — AFP ■

# PBOC unveils LPR reform plan to cut real economy financing cost

BEIJING — China's central bank Saturday unveiled a plan to improve and reform the country's loan prime rate (LPR) mechanism in its latest efforts to cut financing costs for the real economy. Introduced in 2013

and disclosed every trading day, the LPR functions as a market-based reference for lenders to set

Starting from 20 August, the National Interbank Funding Center will disclose the new LPR at 9:30 am on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of each month, according to a statement by the People's Bank of China (PBOC).

their loan interest rates.

The number of quotation banks will be expanded from 10 to 18, including not only national banks but also urban commercial banks, rural commercial banks, foreign-invested banks and private banks, to improve the representativeness of the LPR. An above-fiveyear LPR will be available in addition to the current one-year LPR to serve as pricing references for new bank lending, according to the PBOC. Banks should take the LPR as the major lending rate reference when issuing loans, the statement said.

The PBOC plan came after the country's State Council decided Friday to take market-oriented reform measures to reduce real interest rates and ease financing difficulties.—Xinhua

## Rival rallies as Hong Kong's divisions deepen

HONG KONG (China) — Hong Kong democracy activists kicked off a weekend of fresh rallies on Saturday in a major test for the movement following criticism over an airport protest earlier this week — and as concerns mount over Beijing's next move.

The new marches came as thousands of pro-government supporters — many waving Chinese flags — gathered in a park to condemn their opponents and support the police, a stark illustration of the polarisation now coursing through the city.

Ten weeks of demonstrations have plunged the international finance hub into crisis, with communist-ruled mainland China taking an increasingly hardline tone, including labelling the more violent protester actions "terrorist-like". Democracy activists are billing the weekend rallies as a way to show Beijing and the city's unelected leaders that their movement still enjoys broad public support, despite increasingly violent tactics deployed by a minority of hardcore protesters that have cast a shadow. On Tuesday, protesters blocked passengers from boarding flights at the city's airport and later assaulted two men they accused of being Chinese spies. The images damaged a movement that until then had largely only targeted the police or government institutions, and prompted some soul-searching among protesters. China's propaganda apparatus seized on the violence, with state media churning out a deluge of damning articles, pictures and videos.

State media also ran images of military personnel and armoured personnel carriers across the border in Shenzhen, prompting the United States to warn Beijing against sending in troops, which analysts say would be a reputational and economic disaster for China. —AFP SRINAGAR (India)— India and Pakistan exchanged "heavy" cross-border fire on Saturday, after New Delhi's move to strip the restive Kashmir region of its autonomy prompted a rare meeting of the UN Security Council.

The two foes regularly fire potshots over the Line of Control (LoC) in the disputed Himalayan territory, which is divided between the two countries and poisoned their relations since independence in 1947.

But the latest exchange follows India's decision this month to rip up the special constitutional status of its part of Kashmir, sparking protests from the local population, outrage from Pakistan and unease from neighbouring China. "The exchange of fire is going on," a senior Indian government official told AFP, calling it "heavy".

was reportedly killed. Pakistan made no immediate comment on the violence.

Late Friday, Pakistan and China succeeded in getting the UN Security Council to discuss Kashmir — behind closed doors — for the first time since the Indo-Pakistan war of 1971.

Pakistani Prime Minister Imran Khan on Saturday hailed the gathering, saying that addressing the "suffering of the Kashmiri people & ensuring resolution of the dispute is the responsibility of this world body".

New Delhi insists the status of the territory is a purely internal matter.

"We don't need international busybodies to try to tell us how to run our lives. We are a billion-plus people," India's UN envoy Syed Akbaruddin said after the meeting.

US President Donald Trump urged the nuclear-armed rivals to come back to the negotiating table, speaking to Khan by phone on the importance of "reducing tensions through bilateral dialogue". —AFP ■

# 7 killed, 4 missing as ship catches fire in central Indonesia

JAKARTA — Seven people including two children were killed and four others went missing as a ship caught fire in waters off central Indonesia's Southeast Sulawesi province on Saturday, head of communication for media at the national search and rescue office Yusuf Latief said.

The incident happened in waters off Bokori Island in Konawe district after the ship left from a sea port in Kendari of the province. "The incident started with appearance

of fire in the engine room. The crews of the ship tried to extinguish it but failed. The fire kept getting bigger.

Consequently, passengers jumped into the water," the official told Xinhua over phone. The fire has been extinguished by another ship. A total of 61 people survived the incident and they were rescued by local sailors, he said. So far, the cause of the fire has not been clear and investigation will be conducted, Yusuf said. —Xinhua

**BRIDGE** crossing the Nantmyitkha Creek in Waingmaw Township, Kachin State was built by the Bridge Construction Group No-1 under the Ministry of Construction. The 260 ft long old bridge between mileposts 480/7 and 481/0 on the Mandalay-Lashio-Bhamo-Myitkyina Road was replaced with new structure as local people, pedestrians and vehicles suffered traffic congestion and experienced travel delays. The Ministry of Construction decided to build a new bridge over the creek with the funds from the local government.

The new bridge is of reinforced concrete facility and is 302 ft long and 48 ft wide. The bridge has 3 ft long pedestrian walkway on each side and can withstand up to 75 tons. The main structure of the bridge was built with K 2,310 million and K 840 million was spent on

construction of an approach and retaining walls. Construction of the bridge began on 20 February 2017 and the first phase was completed on 28 May 2018. The second phase of the bridge was finalized in early April this year. Now, local people can traverse the new bridge in all seasons with greater ease, thereby contributing to development of trade and transportation in the area and facilitating swift flow of goods and reducing transpor-

tation charges.

The Shwebo-Myitkyina Road connecting Sagaing Region and Kachin State is being extended to 18 ft from the current 12 ft this fiscal year, said an official from the Road Department under the ministry. The Shwebo-Myitkyina Road is crucial to transport goods between Sagaing Region and Kachin State and plays a vital role in facilitating better flow of commodities. Extension for

40-mile and one furlong road section is being undertaken this financial year and the project has been about 70 per cent finished. The road was built in the fiscal year 1962-1963 and it was upgraded to a 12 ft wide road on 18 September 1996. 174.1 mile of the Shwebo-Myitkyina Road is located in Sagaing Region. So far 66 miles and 7 furlongs of the road has already been extended to 18 ft facility, according to the Department of Road.

Likewise, two retaining walls were built at separate locations along the Nantyin Creek in Mohnyin Township, Kachin State in order to solve the problem of riverbank erosion, according to a responsible person from the construction company. Construction task was completed ahead of the rainy season. The local government awarded a private construction firm named "Shwe Nan Tin Co" to build the retaining walls with the use of K270 million and construction work has begun since February. "We constructed the retaining walls along the Nantyin Creek and construction of the projects took around one month," said the project engineer from the construction company. Some part of the creek was dredged for better flow of water.

In addition, a rural road is being built in Hopin region, Mohnyin Township in Kachin State in an attempt to transport agricultural products manufactured by farmers in rural areas. The Department of Rural Development under the Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation allocated K 203.6 million and gave a green light to a private construction firm "Ayeyawady Phyo Company" to build the 3-mile long gravel road. Construction of the road began on 4 February 2019 and has been 80 per cent finished so far.

WHY YOUNG PEOP the newspaper and watch TV news less and less & its solutions

OWADAYS young people spend their time on social media such as Facebook, Twitter, Instagram. They spend most of their precious time chatting, taking selfie, posting and updating their Facebook status to 'in a relationship'. Besides, they argue with one another about nothing special, instigate hate speech, giving bad comments under other people's posts. In this way, they waste their precious time unwisely. They forget to read the daily newspaper and watch TV news to get general knowledge and broaden their horizons. Thus, the problem of young people not reading the daily newspaper and watching daily TV news has increased alarmingly in society today. This can potentially affect the future of the country if the younger generation of today has no knowledge of either local and global affairs, thus creating a majority of uneducated people with no critical thinking skills. However, just as there are several causes of this problem, so also are there certain practical measures that can be taken to overcome the problem.

The main cause of this problem of young people reading newspapers and watching TV news less and less is due to lack of interest in local and global affair. To start with, a considerable number of young people have the attitude that what happens in the country or in the world has nothing to do with them, whether there is a war occurring in a country or in the world. This could be due to the fact that the definition of education has been drastically restricted to merely passing the exam instead of being knowledgeable.

Besides, related to young people's lack of interest in local and global current affairs is their more urgent emphasis on themselves in this highly competitive society in which young people have to improve themselves by getting as many qualifications as possible to get ahead in life. As such, young people put all their time and energy into their education, qualification and relaxation. Even if they have access to the daily newspaper, they are not interested to turn the pages at all. In the evenings, they may be relaxed by doing something interesting rather than watching TV news.

However, fortunately, there are some potentially practical ways of tackling young people alienation from their society. First of all, the government can reform education policy by widening it to include global affair and global issues that affect our country so that the leader of next generation will be mentally and intellectual equipped to deal with any problems that arise. The government could also provide access to daily newspapers and journals as well as TV news to the public by setting up media centers throughout the city and library and reading rooms throughout the country. Schools could also help by having regular quizzes on local and global affair at different levels. It would also be useful if parentes encourage their children to take an interest in local and global affair on a daily basis.

In conclusion, while the problem of young people not wanting to read the newspapers or watch the TV news is a fact, the problem is not without practical solution, which can rectify the situation if implemented immediately. Failure to do so would result in nothing less than negative effects in the future.

# Matupi's **Bontalar Waterfall** is popular tourist destination

HE Bontala Waterfall in the forests of Chin State's Matupi offers an amazing vacation for holiday makers.

The waterfall has become popular among local and foreign travelers due to its promotion in the media.

The fragrance of pine trees floating in the air of Matupi, walking on the pebbles around the waterfall, along with monkeys, birds and wildlife in the forests, are attracting a wide range of visitors.

With seven falls, the Bontalar waterfall offers an impressive sight in a very

scenic location. Each waterfall is about 60 ft high. The name Bontalar comes from the local Matu ethnic language "Bung Tla". It means flowing neat and tidy.

### **Camping at Bontalar**

Road access to the falls has improved, and travelers need to walk about three miles from Matupi to reach the falls.

Previously, vacationers had to walk for some 15 miles to visit the waterfalls, while camping nearby for one or two days. Since 2013, the road has reached a point three miles from the waterfall.

#### Natural beehives in cliffs

Natural beehives in the cliffs around the Bontalar Waterfall are another impressive sight.

In the evening, visitors can see groups of monkeys from the forests vying with each other to grab pieces of beehives that are within their reach

According to local residents, there once were some 1,000 beehives in the cliffs. But, today the number has fallen to below 500.

The Bontalar is at the peak of its beauty in the rainy season, with very large amounts of water flows down the falls.

The waterfalls attract large numbers of visitors in the summer. But, its beauty in summer is not as magnificent as in the rainy season. Year by year, the water flowing over the falls has been decreasing in the summers. In the rainy season, there are few people who visit the falls due to natural barriers, such as possible landslides which can block the roads.

According to residents, the river provided large amounts of water year round until 2000. Now that there is less water in summer, local people blame land reclamation and deforestation along the river beyond the waterfalls.


To save the Bontalar Wafertall, residents demanded strict law enforcement of deforestation in the area.





In the market, do you overhear the conversation between the marker sellers and the customers, complaining about the condition of the meat appearing fade in color, the vegetables and fruit seeming withered?

Let me tell you about my firsttime buying experience of fruits. When I saw the bananas selling in the market, I immediately bought it and when I saw the dragon fruit that was normal in size and a bit wilted, I also bought it. At the hostel, when I ate the banana, I found out that the taste was insipid, lacking the essence of the taste of the natural banana. Then, I tasted the wilted dragon fruit, which seemed not mouth-watering in appearance, and found out that it was in fact delicious and sweet. So far, what I would like to mention is not to be always confiding in choosing the food by the look of the outer appearance.

Nowadays, the food safety should be taken into account seri-

ously as the sellers of the foodstuff and the growers tend to dye the food. As the growers, the amount of the pesticide and insecticide that they apply to the plants is on the increase and also the additive-food is also on the increase. For them, if their fruit and vegetables seem small and have bruises and is ruined by pests, they have the pressure that their products do not make much profits in the market. As for the market sellers, they have the pressure that the stuff will not be sold out if they cannot please the customers' eyes. Thus, they tend to apply so many chemicals, pesticides, on the consumer goods to obtain high selling prices and to be appealing to the customers' eyes. So, on the part of the consumers, we should support the natural goods to be healthy and we should not be obsessed with the appearance of the food.

Continuously, in today's goods, artificial sweetening to season food (A Cho mont), chicken powder becomes the housewife's and the restaurant's constant companions for the dishes as these can sharpen the consumers' appetite. However, if the consumers indulge in these seasoning, these can have negative impacts on the health in the long run. If we have the food that contains these artificial sweetening, we feel thirsty at once and ultimately, the terrible problems will certainly follow. Especially, in Yangon as the company employees, the university students have to rely on the "eating out in the restaurants" as they have to commute from home to work most of the time, the unhealthy food can be of a serious problem for them.

If the consumers take action for that, the producers have no reason to produce such kind of stuff as their business is totally dependent on the consumer's demands.
