Sagaing Division Peace and Development Council Commander of North-West Command Maj-Gen Tha Aye, the ministers, the Chief of Staff (Navy), the deputy ministers, officials of the SPDC Office, departmental heads, members of division, district and township PDCs, departmental officials, officials of PT Waagnar Biro Co (Indonesia), employees of Public Works, members of social organizations, teachers and students, drum troupe, band troupe, pom-pom dance troupe and local people.


In his address, Secre-tary-1 Lt-Gen Soe Win said that Myittha Bridge opened today is the facility built across Myittha River and it is on Monywa-YagyiKalewa motor road. Upon completion, one will be able to travel directly from Monywa to Kalewa in a short period of time. Accordingly, it is sure that there will be frequent contacts and swift trading between Kalay and Monywa region as well as Monywa region and Chin State. Meanwhile, Kalewa which has been on the top of the
bridge will see further deelopment.
Kalay region is a strategic region between Sagaing Division and Chin State when it comes to economic and transport sectors. But Mawlaik, Kalewa, Mingin and Kani which are on the west bank of Chindwin river including Kalay region lagged behind in development due to poor transport in successive eras

Being a strategic region, Kalay has been designated as a development zone of the State and universities and colleges were opened to en-
able the youths in the region including Chin State to pursue higher education and a specialist hospital (200-bed) was also upgraded.

Regarding the transport sector, Kalay airfield has been upgraded into the one that passenger jets could touch down and new KalayGangaw railway and KalayGangaw motor road constructed. Moreover, arrangements are being made for upgrading Tamu-KalayKalewa motor road into a modern one. That is why Kalay region is not only a door that Chin State (North)

## Multinational force patrol attacked in Iraq

Baghdad, 11 June 2004 - The Polish-led multinational security force in central Iraq says one of its patrols came under attack today south of Baghdad.

A spokesman said the troops were patrolling near the city of Al-Hillah when they were attacked with rocket-propelled grenades shortly after midnight. The attackers fled after the patrol returned fire
There were reports of clashes between supporters of radical Shiite Muslim cleric Muqtada al-Sadr and US forces today in Baghdad. One fighter was reported killed and several wounded in sporadic fight-
ing in Al-Sadr City, a Shi'a neighbourhood.

Also today, the US military said US soldiers have foiled a new sabotage attempt against a pipeline in northern Iraq.
Iraqi Interim Prime Minister Iyad Allawi yesterday said that Iraq lost more than $\$ 200$ million over the past seven months due to separate attacks on its pipeline network.

## China, Hungary sign six cooperation documents

Budapest, 11 June- China and Hungary signed six cooperation documents here Wednesday to strengthen their economic ties and to boost bilateral trade.

Chinese President Hu Jintao, who arrived here Thursday morning, and his Hungarian counterpart Madl Frenc witnessed the signing of the documents on education, culture, the opening of new air routes between Beijing and Budapest and on the sales of bus parts produced in Hungary

China and Hungary will jointly open a bilingual school in Budapest, teaching both Chinese and Hungarian, according to an agreement signed by ministries of education of both countries.

Another agreement, signed by the China Hainan Airlines and the Hungary airlines, has set that from August 2, the China Hainan Airlines will fly three flights each week between Beijing and Budapest.

Hu and Madl signed a joint statement themselves
after they held an hour-long talks, saying both nations will establish a relationship of "friendly and cooperative partnership"
President Madl described Hu's state visit to Hungary, the first in 10 years, as an "important event" in bilateral relations.

Despite their differences, both countries have the common wish to develop "a new type of cooperative ties", he said.

The Chinese President said the relationship between China and Hungary, which established full diplomatic relations 55 years ago, has entered a new stage.

Hu proposed that the two countries increase top-level exchanges, explore new ways of economic cooperation and step up cooperation in culture, education, environmental protection, trans-
portation, science and technology.
"China welcomes Hungarian firms to participate in China's development of its western areas and the rejuvenation of the old industrial belts," Hu told Madl. "Hungarian companies are also welcome in the construction of projects for the Beijing 2008 Olympiad and the World Expo' 2010in Shanghai."

On international issues, the Hungarian President said China has been an active force in maintaining world peace and stability as a permanent member of the UN Security Council. And Hu responded that China and Hungary can have better coordination on many international arenas like the UN and other international bodies.

## US study says kids often overuse headache medicine

Vancouver (British Columbia), 11 June- Children who suffer frequent headaches may be using far more over-the-counter pain relief medicine than parents realize and risking their health, according to a study released on Thursday.

Researchers who studied 680 children between the ages of six and 18 , found more than 20 per cent were overusing pain relief medicines, according to the report released at the American Headache Society annual meeting in Vancouver.
"I've been astounded by the large numbers of kids
using over-the-counter medications five or six times a week, some times 15 to 20 times per week," David Rothner, the study's lead researcher said in a statement.

One in five children in the study overused medications, which is defined as taking more than three doses of pain relievers per-week
for more than six weeks, according to the study by the Cleveland Clinic in Ohio.

The researchers found about one in seven of the children and adolescents did not tell their parents about the heavy medication use, often because they did not realize they should be consulted. - MNA/Reuters

## Britons punish Blair over Iraq in election

London, 11 June-Britons angry over the Iraq war handed Prime Minister Tony Blair a humiliating electoral reverse, with local poll results on Friday showing his ruling Labour Party coming third behind the main opposition parties.

Senior government figures and analysts agreed the Iraq war and ensuing instability during the US-led occupation had taken its toll, with election returns amounting to a drubbing for Blair in his seventh year in power.
"There is clearly a very strong protest vote," Cabinet Minister Tessa Jowell told BBC television. "Iraq is
certainly a factor but it is only a factor."
The results from Thursday's local council polls to be followed by London Mayor results on Friday night and European Parliament results on Sunday - will inevitably renew speculation about Blair's leadership.
But most analysts still expect him to take Labour to a third general election
victory in 2005 despite the damage from Iraq and Blair's alliance with President Bush.
With 82 of 166 councils up for grabs having reported by early Friday, Labour had lost a net 211 seats, closing in on the overall net loss of 400 or more, which analysts had said would be a serious blow for Blair.

## Schroeder doubts UN resolution will bring Iraq stability

Saint Simons (Georgia), 11 June-German Chancellor Gerhard Schroeder expressed doubts Thursday over whether a new UN Security Council resolution on Iraq's sovereignty would bring stability to the war-torn country.
"The resolution is a political basis, is an attempt, to improve the chances of stabilising" Iraq, Schroeder said on the sidelines of the Group of Eight summit in the US state of Georgia.
"Whether that attempt can succeed is an open question. I am not optimistic about this," he said, after travelling to Saint Simons from nearby Sea Island, where the summit is being held, by helicopter to speak to reporters.

The UN Security Council unanimously adopted Tuesday a US-British proposed resolution on Iraq's legal and political framework after the occupation administration under Paul Bremer hands over power on 30 June.
various religious and ethnic differences, Schroeder said: "this will be a very tough road".

He said that while much optimism had been expressed about Iraq during the G8 summit, not even the United States and Britain were saying "everything is wonderful" there.

He said his meeting with King Abdullah II of Jordan had shown that even leaders in the region "also have fears that things could become even more difficult than one or the other might have imagined."
Schroeder said talks on what further role NATO could play in Iraq did not include the idea of sending Alliance troops to replace the US-led forces there.

## British man finds body in fridge while making tea

London, 11 June - British police have launched a murder inquiry after a man found his daughter-in-law's dismembered body in his son's fridge while looking for milk, police and newspapers said on Thursday.

London police said a body had been discovered in the southwestern suburb of Kingston-upon-Thames late on Tuesday, and police sources confirmed it was
crammed into a fridge.
The Sun newspaper said the man had let himself into his son's detached house when he found nobody at home, and was making a cup of tea when he discovered the Koreanborn victim wrapped up in plastic bags.
"They seemed like such a nice couple,"
neighbours were quoted as saying.

## Car bomb explodes near US convoy in Baghdad

Baghdad, 11 June- A car bomb exploded near a US convoy on a Baghdad highway Friday, but it was not clear if there were any American casualties, Iraqi police said.

A man got out of his car and left in another one. Then the car exploded when an American convoy passed by," policeman Amjad Mohammed told Reuters at the scene.
"There were no Iraqi civilian casualties, but we don't know if any Americans were hurt."
US military vehicles sealed off the sixlane highway cutting through the Saydiya residential district in western Baghdad. The US military had no immediate comment.
Iraqi witness Abu Ahmed said he had noticed a man spending a long time appar-
ently trying to repair a gray Mercedes at the roadside before being picked up by another man in an Opel saloon. "A few minutes later, there was an explosion," he said.
Insurgents frequently target US convoys with roadside bombs, car bombs, land mines or rocket-propelled grenades.
The US military said Friday an American soldier had died of wounds sustained in an attack in eastern Baghdad on Wednesday. That raised the US combat death toll in Iraq to 606 since the start of last year's invasion.

## Survey shows most British women want to change their lives

London, 11 June - Most British women wanted to change their lives, showed a survey published on Thursday.

The Female Lifestyle Survey, carriedoutbyhealthmagazine Top Sante, suggested that 81 per cent of the surveyed women wanted to change their lives, 67 per cent felt like they were on a treadmill and were worn out, and 60 per cent believed life was easier for men. Juggling punishing work and household roles with spiralling debts, and social lives and the pressures of having a perfect body were blamed for triggering the lifestyle crisis in many
women across Britain, the survey showed.

Nearly nine out of 10 women who work full-time (86 per cent) said they still did most of the household chores, and 77 per cent said they took the lion's share of responsibility for looking after the children. One of the top causes of the female blues, according to the poll, was the quest for a perfect body.
Three-quarters of women thought their life would be
better if they were happy with their body and 26 per cent said they were prepared to go under the knife to improve their looks - 5 per cent of women under 38 already have.

The magazine's editor Marina Gask said: "The 'have it all' dream has turned into a 'do it all' nightmare. Women are bombarded with lifestyle images of perfectly proportioned celebrities whoseem to have everything, without mucheffort."-MNA/Xinhua

## National poll gives Kerry solid lead

Washington, 11 June - Democrat John Kerry has a solid lead over US President George W Bush among voters nationwide, according to a Los Angeles Times poll on Thursday that cited widespread unease over the country's direction, Iraq policies and the economy.

Kerry, the US senator from Massachusetts, led Bush by 51 per cent to 44 per cent nationally in a two-way matchup, according to the poll of 1,230 registered voters taken from Saturday to Tuesday.

The figures dropped with independent Ralph Nader in the mix: Kerry drew 48 per cent in a three-way race and Bush 42 per cent, the poll showed.
Bush campaign strategist Matthew Dowd challenged the poll results as tilted in favour of the Democrats. "It is a mess," he told ABC News. "Bushis leading independents by three, ahead among Republicans by a larger margin than Kerry is ahead among Dems, and we are down by seven? Outrageous."

In the Los Angeles Times poll, majorities disapproved of Bush's handling of the economy and of Iraq, despite encouraging news on both recently. Fifty-six per cent of respondents said America "needs to move in a new direction" because Bush's policies have not improved the country.

However, in an indication of the race's volatility, the newspaper's polling in three fiercely contested states shows the Republi-
can president with a double-digit advantage over Kerry in Missouri, with Nader included, and running even with the presumed Democratic rival in Ohio and Wisconsin.

However, majorities in each state say the country should change direction, the survey said.

Nationally, 55 per cent of respondents disapproved of how Bush was handling Iraq, while 44 per cent approved his performance. On the economy, 54 per cent did not approve of the job Bush was doing while 43 per cent did, the survey showed.

The newspaper poll said Bush was stronger on his overall job approval rating - with 51 per cent approving to 47 per cent disapproving - because of high marks for the president on the war against terrorism and virtually unanimous support from Republicans and others who consider themselves conservative.

The Times' nationwide poll has a margin of error of plus or minus 3 percentage points, while that of the state polls is 4 percentage points.

## WHO highlights grave shortage of safe blood supply

Geneva, 11 June - Eighty-two per cent of the world's population does not have access to a regular and safe supply of blood, the World Health Organization (WHO) said Thursday, ahead of World Blood Donor Day next week.

A recent WHO survey found that out of 178 countries, only 39 have access to 100 per cent voluntary, regular and unpaid blood donors which WHO considers the safest source of blood.
"In our work to increase access to treatment for people living with AIDS around the world, safe blood is a crucial part of our prevention and care strategy," said Lee Jong-wook, WHO's di-rector-general.

In countries which rely on paid-for blood and family replacement donations, prevalence of transfusiontransmissible infections such as HIV, Hepatitis B and C
and syphilis is much higher $\mid$ vow to lead healthy lives to than in countries with full voluntary, unpaid donations, said WHO.

Although little progress has been made in low- and middle-income countries on the whole, some have been very successful in addressing the issue, it said.

South Africa and Zimbabwe, at the onset of the AIDS epidemic, sought new strategies in the 1980s to ensure that their blood supply was safe, it said.

One such strategy is Zim babwe's Pledge 25 initiative in which school leavers pledge to give blood 25 times by the age of 25 . They also
ensure safe blood supply for patients.

Zimbabwe's HIV infection rates among blood donors fell from 4.45 per cent in 1989 to 0.61 per cent in 2001, demonstrating the success of the Pledge 25 concept

This year's World Blood Donor Day will be commemorated on Monday in Johannesburg, South Africa, with the theme "Blood, a Gift for Life".

The public, particularly young people, should make responsible choices, maintain a healthy lifestyle, and give blood regularly, said WHO. - MNA/Xinhua

## Coalition's Iraqi staff live in fear

Baghdad, 11 June-Iraqis employed by US-led coalition forces say they fear for their lives as guerillas turn their deadly aim away from the occupying troops and towards the locals working for them. Death threats are common for Iraqis working at this US military base where a suicide car bomb killed two people and injured more than 30
as staff lined up for work on Tuesday.
"I received two letters. the worker added. "I'm a The first one said you should leave your job because you are spying," a worker said.
"The second one said you should leave your job and, if you don't, we will kill you." The dilemma is a terrifying one for the impoverished population of Diyala province northeast of Baghdad where unemployment is estimated at about 50 per cent. "It's very, very difficult,"
teacher but there are no jobs for us. If I get a chance, I will leave directly." One translator, a former university teacher said she was afraid to mingle with her own people.
"It's very difficult to hire local translators because they're scared," said the woman, 'Hanan'
"I feel scared to go out. I bought a dress with a veil
which covers my hair and everything but still they could recognise my features because I have been on Diyala television." Public affairs officer Lieutenant Marshall Jackson said US forces found it very hard to recruit translators for the base, which has only seven interpreters for 1,700 personnel.
"Translators are a problem. They get threatened a
ot by insurgents who don't want to help the Americans," he said.
"A lot of translators live here on base - it's a lot safer." Other military sources said life was growing more dangerous for Iraqis with insurgents shifting the focus of their attacks towards the local population, most notably against dignitaries promoted by the coalition.

Ezzedine Salim, then head of Iraq's interim leadership, was killed by a suicide blast outside the coalition's Baghdad headquarters on 17 May. -Internet

## arctif <br> Russia not to send troops to Iraq

Moscow, 11 June-Russia "does not plan sending its servicemen to Iraq",Foreign Ministry spokesman Alexander Yakovenko said.
"The situation with security in the country remains complex, and the Russian Foreign Ministry believes inexpedient the return of specialists of Russian companies there. They can return only when necessary conditions will be created," Yakovenko said.
As for Iraq's debts, he said the "problem must be solved in the Paris Club". Yakovenko said the last resolution of the UN Security Council, contained a "point about the conduction of an international conference on Iraq, but preparation of it is not going so far".
"Russia considers such forum useful for maintaining relations of Iraq's new government with neighbours and hopes that it will take place," he said.-Internet

Amman, 12 June - Twenty-five Iraqi health workers concluded their first training programme here as part of a World Health Organization (WHO) scheme to develop the Iraqi nursing sector, local newspaper Jordan Times reported on its web site Thursday.

The health workers were trained in the Jordan University of Science and Technology (JUST) under an agreement between the university and the WHO, according to Linda Haddad, dean of the nursing faculty at JUST.

Under the agreement participants would be trained on updated academic capabilities and reforming the nursing and midwifery education system in Iraq, She said, adding the initial phase of the training included evaluating the nursing education programmes.

Participants discussed their needs for improving the quality of nursing education
in their country and took an active part in designing an effective curriculum, according to the report.

The trainees were members of the Iraqi ministries of health and higher education, state universities and institutions. The dean said the four-month period needed to be extended because the development process in the nursing system still requires more time and effort. The JUST has designated a centre to collaborate with the WHO, which conducts activities and training in the field of nursing, the report said. - MNA/Xinhua

## Report says use of dogs at Iraq prison was authorized

Washington, 12 June - US intelligence personnel ordered military dog handlers to use unmuzzled dogs to intimidate detainees at Iraq's Abu Ghraib Prison, The Washington Post reported on Friday, citing sworn statements from handlers provided to military investigators.

A military intelligence interrogator also told investigators that two dog handlers at the prison were "having a contest" to see how many detainees they could make involuntarily urinate out of fear of the dogs, the Post said, citing statements obtained by newspaper.

Six US soldiers face possible courts martial and one has already been jailed for a year because of the abuses at Abu Ghraib, where photographs have shown detainees being sexually humiliated, physically tormented and threatened with dogs.

Two Army dog handlers assigned to Abu Ghraib, Sergeant Michael Smith andSer-
geant Santos Cardona, told investigators that military intelligence personnel asked them to bring their dogs to prison interrogation sites numerous times to help question detainees in December and January, the Post reported.

According to the report, Smith and Cardona said they complied with the requests because they believed the tacfics had been approved by Colonel Thomas Pappas, the military intelligence officer in charge of the prison.

At the cell blocks, they allowed their dogs to menace detainees, the Post said they told investigators.
gators, Smith said, in some cases he would bring the barking dog to within six inches of terrified prisoners, the Post reported. The officer in charge of the military intelligencerun interrogation centre at the prison had to approve the use of dogs in interrogations, according to a military intelligence memo obtained by The Washington Post.

There is no explanation in the memo of what parameters would have to be inplace or what the dogs would be allowed to do, the report said.

Neither Smith nor Cardona have been charged in connection with the abuse at Abu Ghraib.

## Ministers of 23 Asia Pacific countries to meet in Jakarta

Jakarta, 12 June - Jakarta will host the annual gathering of foreign ministers from the ten-member Association of South-east Asian Nations (ASEAN), followed by a series of meeting with their counterparts from 13 dialogue partners scheduled for 29 June through 2 July.

The ASEAN Ministerial Meeting (AMM) will take place on 29-30 June to finalize the plans of action for the attainment of the ASEAN Community in 2020 agreed during the ASEAN Summit in Bali last October, Foreign Affairs Ministry spokesman Marty Natalegawa told a news briefing Friday.

ASEAN groups Brunei, Cambodia, Indonesia, Laos, Malaysia, Myanmar, Singapore, Thailand, the Philippines and Vietnam. The meeting will seek ways to enhance ASEAN's role in international community, including how to win the observer status in the United Nations as an entity, Marty said. The AMM will bring the theme of "Striving for Full Integration of ASEAN: a Prosperous, Caring and Peaceful Community."

During the Bali Summit, ASEAN leaders agreed that the integration would lean on three main pillars, namely the ASEAN Economic Community, the ASEAN Security Community and the ASEAN SocioCultural Community.

Marty said the AMM has been mandated to approve the plans of action for the security community and the socio-cultural community before being endorsed by the next ASEAN Summit in Vientiane in November. On July 1, ASEAN foreign ministers will meet their counterparts of China, Japan and South Korea, which have been increasingly cooperating with the regional grouping in recent years, primarily on the economic fronts.

On the following day, ASEAN foreign ministers will meet ministers or their representatives from Australia, Canada, China, North Korea, India, Japan, Mongolia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, Russia, South Korea, the European Union and the United States

The 22 countries and the European Union will hold the 11th meeting of the ASEAN Regional Forum (ARF), which was established in 1994 as a forum of dialogues to seek peaceful means in settling political and security problems in the region.-MNA/Xinhua

## Arab men posing as TV crew arrested in Baghdad

Baghdad, 11 June -Four Arab men posing as journalists were arrested this week when explosives residue was detected on them as they tried to enter the Baghdad headquarters of the US-led administration, a senior US Army officer said.

The officer, a top security official in the compound which hosts news conferences given by senior US and Iraqi officials and houses the US Consulate, said explosives were found in the men's hotel room after the arrests on Sunday.

## Two dead, 18 missing as tornado hits Philippines

Manila, 11 June - A tornado ripped through a town in the central Philippines, destroying hundreds of flimsy houses and killing at least two people, the national disaster agency and the Coast Guard said on Thursday

A dozen residents from the coastal town of Dulag on Leyte Island were reported missing.

The tornado, which lasted 35 minutes on Wednesday morning, destroyed about 900 houses, leaving one elderly man dead and four people wounded, agency officials said.

We are still assessing the damage on the ground," said Edna Rola of the National Disaster Coordinating Council.

She said 30 fishing boats were reported missing.

One fisherman died and six were missing on the nearby island of Samar when waves and wind whipped up by the tornado overturned two boats, theCoast GuardsaidonThursday.

Lieutenant Armand Balilo, a Coast Guard spokesman, said 26 fishermen had been rescued.

We are now searching for the missing fishermen because the seas are calmer now," he said. $-M N A /$ Reuters

## Those who daren't show their face - 54

The big and ugly task of some foreign radio stations including the BBC and the VOA at present is to broadcast special slanders in an inferior way to obstruct of the National Convention, that is in progress to draw a constitution for the future nation.

I will now explain in brief a news report the BBC had broadcast under the title "An interview with U Kyaw Zan Tha on the National Convention and the situation of Myanmar" on 22 May 2004 at 8.15 pm .

In the interview, the BBC said that Myanmar was experiencing economic hardships and the fall in the education standard; that the schools were built in the former paddy fields outside the towns; that there was the inadequate number of teachers; that some military officers were seeking means to send their children abroad for studies; that it seemed that the people found the National Convention boring; and that it was believed that if an outbreak of any unrest was impossible in Myanmar, it might happen only under the effective leadership and organization of a certain party. These were the lies aired by the notorious BBC with its ill intent for Myanmar and her people to face destruction

The persons asking foolish questions and giving crazy answers in the interview acting hand in glove were U Kyaw Zan Tha and Daw Tin Hta Swe, who were Myanmars, born, brought up and educated in Myanmar.

The interviewee, U Kyaw Zan Tha, a haughty gentleman, entered Myanmar as a visitor, but not as a BBC correspondent.

A liar will be a saint till his fabrication is unexposed. And when his true identity was revealed, he sneaked out of the country at once like a thief. The BBC staff have never entered Myanmar in an honest way. They come to Myanmar under the guise of a teacher, a tourist or a company representative. And that is the usual practice they are following and handing down to newcomers.

As the radio stations like the BBC and the VOA are always launching slanderous attacks against Myanmar without any sincerity, they dare not enter the country honestly. They come to Myanmar without the sense of adhering to journalism codes of conduct to study her objective conditions and make fair international criticism and reports on her. How can they dare come to Myanmar honestly, as they have the evil spirit to make unjust slanders against the country and have the belief that if they report false news as a so-called witness, their fabrications will be accepted as true information?

The haughty Myanmar staff of the BBC are worse than their masters in making slanders against the country as they are afraid of losing their dollar-earning jobs. As they are criticizing Myanmar and her Government with heart and soul, I would like to ask them whether they have forgotten the gratitude they owe to the nation.

The truth is that there is no starvation and no homeless person in Myanmar. But there are homeless persons in the big countries the Myanmar BBC staff are relying on. Those homeless persons are sleeping in large card boxes on roadside platforms and parks.

The BBC also said that the schools were built in the former paddy fields outside the towns; and that the education standard was falling due to the inadequate number of teachers.

As the staff of the BBC, an internationally renowned media station, is indiscriminately spreading baseless rumours and gossips as news reports, I pity them, for, he is no more than a scoundrel.

Now, I will explain Myanmar's developing education sector. At present, there are over 40,000 basic education schools in Myanmar, up from over 30,000 in 1988. The number of students has reached over 7.5 million from 5.2 million in 1988. The strength of teachers in 1988 was over 170,000, and at present it is over 220,000.

In the higher education sector, there are now 154 institutions of higher learning including four new technological universities, two new computer science universities, 26 new technological colleges, 24 new
computer colleges, the Myanmar Maritime University and the Myanmar Aerospace Engineering University, in the nation, up from 32 in 1988.

As there is increase in the number of institutions of higher learning, the number of students has risen to over 890,000 at present from over 130,000 in 1988. And the number of faculty members at present is 16,600 , up from 5,600 in 1988. In 1988 there were 59 degree courses and post-graduate courses. At present there are 316 such courses - 159 degree, post-graduate, pre-graduate, and diploma courses run by Human Resources Development Department, and 157 degree, post-graduate, diploma and doctorate courses conducted by institutions of higher learning.

The education sector of Myanmar is achieving progress to that degree, and yet there are slanderous criticisms against it. So, am I going too far to say that heir slanderous criticisms show the status of the persons who are creating them? What kind of masters have taught those persons to say that the standard of education is falling as the schools are built in the paddy fields outside he towns?

The growing population of Myanmar has reached over 52 million at present, up from round about 40 million in 1988. Thus, new towns have been built, and the institutions of higher learning have to be built at spacious places far away from crowded areas. Shame on you, BBC staff of the Myanmar programme, if your intellectual level is not high enough to understand the fact.

In the interview, U Kyaw Zan Tha said that he felt that the people would be disappointed with the National Convention. Such a statement is so aberrant that it will be ridiculed by every quarter in the country. But the BBC staff dared to say so. I felt confused to hear it. The people are not disappointed with the National Convention. Only the BBC staff and the destructive elements from inside and outside the nation including Myanmar expatriates and fugitives, who want to disturb and stop the National Convention, are disappointed.

They are evil-minded persons as they wish to make things worse. Unlike the situation in 1988, Myanmar people at present are enjoying peace, stability, security and economic development. Thus, they oppose any act to cause unrest in the nation, and have already made a firm determination to crush such an act in accord with the People's Desire - To crush all internal and external enemies as common enemy. But without understanding the objective situation, the BBC staff are wickedly trying to act as big organizers, searching the best means to create unrest in Myanmar. Their acts under the guise of democracy will bring great sufferings to Myanmar people.

Another ridiculous lie he said was that his friends in Myanmar asked him the way to send their children abroad for educational purposes. In reality, the case was so simple: all parents wish to see their children educated, brilliantly qualified and securing high positions: in this regard, they asked him the means to send their children abroad. But he lied that the parents wished to send their children abroad as the education level was low in Myanmar. In reality, he has become so abnormal that he even fails to consider the gratitude he owes to the nation.

As I have said a lot, I am going to conclude my article. The over-bearing men and women staff of the BBC Myanmar programme are seeing the political, economic and education developments of Myanmar through their raging eyes or from the negative point of view, and creating fabrications to disturb and destroy Myanmar and her people. Although they are Myanmars, they are shamelessly betraying the national cause, acting as stooges to please their masters. So, I would like to say that they are like the persons who daren't show their face in public.

Monywa-Yagyi-Kalewa motor road and bridges which are of paramount importance for the regions on the west bank of Chindwin river are the results of combined efforts of the Tatmadaw and departmental personnel. In other words, they are the fruitful results of concerted efforts of the State, the people and the Tatmadaw.

Nowadays, it has been a four-hour drive from Monywa to Kalewa. As a result, one can travel comfortably from Kalay to Mandalay. This will contribute to socio-economic

development of the peoples of 55 villages in Kani and Mingin Townships. Therefore, the main roads and bridges are the good heritage of the future generations. The countless benefits will contribute much to regional development and development of border areas.

The people of Kani and Mingin regions who had to rely only on waterways of Chindwin in the past can now be able to travel from one place to another using motor roads. With better transport, urban and rural regions that are adjacent to the main road will see further development.

In addition, 36 -mile long Mawlaik-Kalewa road is being built and people from Mawlaik region will be able to travel to Monywa region through Myittha bridge conveniently. Indeed, the Myittha Bridge, the Mawlaik-Kalewa road and big and small bridges along it are important transport infrastructures as regards development of Chin State, Monywa and western bank of River Chindwin, Kalay and Kalaywa regions as well as rural development. In addition, these facilities are beneficial to India-Myanmar border trade and they surely contribute towards further strengthening the national unity. Such transport facilities are important for strengthening national unity, ensuring rural and border developments and developing trade and business undertakings. In accordance with the guidance of Head of State Senior General Than Shwe, roads and bridges are built here and there to narrow down the development gap between one region and another throughout the nation. More roads and bridges are under construction too. He said Public Works built 172 bridges including Myittha Bridge, Defence Services Engineering Unit seven, Myanmar Railways six totalling 185 bridges. There were 21,483 miles of motor roads in 1988 and now there are 56,695 miles of roads including tarred, gravel and earth roads and the ones built by Development Affairs Committee and other organizations.

He said 12 major bridges including Myittha Bridge,

Monywa and Hsinbyushin Bridges across Chindwin River and Mu River bridge were built in Sagaing Division. Due to these bridges west bank regions of Chindwin River will develop sooner. With the development of State economy, infrastructures for transport were built one after another on self-reliance basis spending a large sum of money. Roads and bridges can be built because of better economic conditions and better transport brings about better economy.

At the same time, he said, investments on agricultural sector were made without delay for economic progress. Dams and river water pumping stations were built and underground water tapping projects were implemented to become Sagaing Division as a granary of upper Myanmar. Efforts are being made for extension of cultivation acreage and boosting per acre yield through new methods, he said.

Net cultivation acreage in Sagaing Division increased from 2.8 million acres to 3.9 million acres and cultivation acreage of various crops also increased up to 6.4 million acres. Cultivation acreage of paddy rose from over 1.2 million to 1.8 million acres. There are now surplus of 40 million baskets of paddy in the division. He said concerted efforts are to be made to produce surplus of 80 million baskets of paddy for the regions in upper Myanmar and Chin State.

He said it is important for Sagaing Division to boost production of agriculture, livestock breeding and industry year after year, making use of better foundations on economic, social and transport sectors created by the State. There are good prospects for development in the division. Water resources that can generate hydro-electric power exist along Chindwin River. On completion of Chindwin Valley development projects, production and living standard of the people in Sagaing Division will rise again, he said.

The government on its part is making endeavours for equal development of states and divisions and this means handing down better results of political, economic, social and transport sectors to posterity of Myanmar, he said.

He stressed the fact that the government is making

The bridge was built of reinforced concrete approach bridges and of main suspension bridge installed with iron frames based on reinforced concrete foundation. The 1,320 feet long bridge has 28 feet wide motor road and four feet wide pedestrian ways. Its clearance is 500 feet wide and 14 feet high. It can withstand 60 -ton loads.

The bridge has two unusual parts different from other bridges. The first is that the towers were built as A shape by connecting tops of them installed with cables of the main bridge. The second is that the concrete road was built on concrete tiles laid on the bridge.

In the past, vehicles including bicycles and motorbikes had to pass through the bridge with great care. Now, all big and small vehicles can drive on the bridge safely.

Local people residing on Myoma, Kyabin, Meime, Htongyi and other villages along Monywa-Ahlon-Yargyi-Myoma-Kalewa Road can easily travel from one place to another. Similarly, local people in Paluzawa and Nansalein villages can enjoy better transport of Mawlaik-Kalewa Road to go to Monywa or Chin State from Kalewa. Transport of local products can be made to all States and Divisions through Myittha Bridge (Kalewa). Local-made vehicles assembled at Kalay Industrial Zone can easily be transported to the main land as well as products from Pakokku and Monywa Industrial Zones to Kalay Zone through the bridge.

In addition, Kalay-Tamu Bridge can benefit development of border trade between Myanmar and India. Therefore, the bridge is important for building Asia-ASEAN Highway. Thanks to opening of the bridge, over 760,000 people residing in Kalay District of Sagaing Division and Falam District in Chin State will promote better relationship among them. The commander expressed gratitude on the occasion. A local from Kalewa Township expressed gratitude to the government for building of Myittha Bridge (Kalewa). Prime Minister General Khin Nyunt delivered a speech on the occasion. Thanks to the facility, the river-crossing one, local people in Chin State and its environs can keep in touch with those in other regions in convenience in a short time.

## World Bank urges Indonesia to revive investment climate

Jakarta, 12 June Investment in Indonesia will remain in the doldrums unless clear signs are given to investors that various problems detrimental to the business climate here are being addressed, the World Bank has warned.

Andrew Steer, World Bank country director in Indonesia, said on Thursday investors have already realized that the complexity of the problems was too deep to be resolved overnight, but what they wanted to see was signs of a clear path towards improvement.
"Investors don't yet have confidence that this country is moving clearly in a certain direction," Steer was quoted Friday by The Ja karta Post as saying.
"They (investors) are not expecting solutions to these problems overnight, but they do not have confidence that the problems are being addressed.'

The country's business climate has become worse
with investors shying away from the country and picking instead other nations in the region as their investment destination
As investment, particularly much-needed foreign direct investment (FDI), remains in the doldrums, it is depriving the country of its economic engine.

The economy consequently, has been forced to rely largely on domestic consumption and exports which has resulted in only modest economic growth 3 per cent to 4 per cent in the past several years.
The unfavourable investment atmosphere, due in large part to the weak legal system and corruption, has made Indonesia less competitive in terms of investment compared to other countries.

Steer said Vietnam has emerged lately as a favoured investment destination in the region, as it pertains to the legal system.

## Hong Kong bags elusive croc after seven-month hunt

Hong Kong, 12 June - Hong Kong conservation workers finally bagged an elusive crocodile on Thursday after it evaded and embarrassed some of the world's top croc hunters for months.

The reptile, thought to have been brought in illegally as a pet and later released in a river in the city's rural New Territories area, swam into a trap after a seven-month hunt involving everything from chicken heads to bamboo poles.
"Yes, we've got it," a spokesman for the Agriculture and Fisheries Department said on Thursday.

The 5-foot animal, named "Croc Croc Chan" after the family that first spotted it in October, became a media star in a city

## Home Depot to ${ }^{\prime}$

US do-it-yourself retailer Home Depot, the leading home decoration merchandise provider in the world, is setting its sights on China's estimated 50-billion-US-dollar home-decoration market by opening a development office in the country, according to information released here Thursday.

Bill Patterson, the newly-appointed head of the Home Depot Asia division, says about 70 per cent of home-improvement spending in China is on decorating new homes, and that gives Home Depot a solid growth opportunity in its strength in merchandise and services geared toward home interior decoration.

China's annual GDP stands at about 1.5 trillion US dollars and its popula-

Upon the first launch of business in Macao, Air Asia set the normal two-way fare at 436 patacas (54.5 US dollars) on its Macao-Bangkok route to become the first low-cost airline in Macao.

Fernandes said that the company hoped to unveil the service between Macao and Kuala Lumpur in August. With an aim to gradually increase flight frequency, Air Asia plans to ecord over 10 million passengers via the Macao airport in the next 10 years.

The exposure of the low-cost airline forced the ocal carrier Air Macao to respond in a sharp price-reduction, cutting the price of two-way fare on the MacaoBangkok line from 3,640 patacas (455 US dollars) to 435 patacas (54.4 US dolars) on a summer promotion. - MNA/Xinhua

## Philippine rubber exports rise in first 4 months this year

Manila, 12 June - The Philippine rubber exports rose 43 per cent year-on-year to 11 million US dollars in the January-April period from 7.8 million dollars due to higher demand, the Na tional Statistics Office said Friday.

The Philippines took advantage of the high world price of rubber at around 1,000 dollars per metric ton, said Basilisa Ho, chairperson of Philippine Rubber Industries Association.
"Malaysia buys our rubber to process them," Ho said. "We also sell semi-processed rubber to China but only in very limited volumes."

The association has asked the government to increase tariffs on imported rubber products to protect the local rubber industry.

The Philippine authorities impose a 3-per-cent to 5-per-cent duty on such rubber products as plates, sheets and strips, hoses, conveyor or transmission belts, inner tubes (for tyres of cars and buses), nipples of feeding bottles, surgical gloves, floor coverings and mats, and vehicle parts.

A duty of 10 per cent applies to such rubber products as pneumatic tyres and footwear.

## Mount Awu volcano <br> erupts again

Jakarta, 11 June -
Mount Awu volcano on Indonesia's Sangihe island of North Sulawesi province erupted again and ash up 3,000-metres into the sky on Thursday, performing another major eruption this week.
"Around 5.29 am this morning, the Awu volcano hurled stones, rocks and other volcanic materials from its crater," Agus Solihin, a volcanologist at the nearby monitoring post in Tahuna of the region, was quoted by local internet media as saying.

Tahuna is the main town on Sangihe, a small island of 22,000 people off the North Sulawesi Province, 2,610 kilometers northeast of the Indonesian capital Jakarta. It is located just south of the Philippines' Mindanao Island.

A number of smaller eruptions and aftershocks followed the major eruption Thursday.

Solihin said Thursday's eruption caused no injuries because the majority of the villagers living in the zones of Awu's slopes had already been evacuated.

## Cambodia to publish first provincial newspaper

Phnom Penh, 11 June - Regional newspaper, Somne Thmey (New Writing), for Cambodia's four main provinces will be launched on June 21.
"It is the first time and very important that Cambodia has the regional newspaper," Pen Bona, Editor-in-Chief of Somne Thmey, told Xinhua on Thursday.
"Local people in four provinces will be able to read the news about their own provinces. This is good," Bona said. He said the circulation will be 1,000 copies for each province of Siem Reap, Sihanoukville, Kampong Cham and Battambang.
"We start up with these provinces because they are big and have many potential readers. We will do more in other provinces when the project is successful," he said.

Somne Thmey, which is sponsored by

Asia Foundation's Fund, will be published in Khmer language weekly, covering politics, business, finance, economy, entertainment and tourism.

But it will come out only in every two weeks for June 2004. The 16 -page newspaper will be sold for 1,000 riel (about 0.25 US dollar) per copy.

According to Bona, 200,000 millions US dollars have been spent on this project. He said that he hoped the project would be success and could be continued.

Cambodia has about 200 newspapers, which are based in Phnom Penh, according to Bona. - MNA/Xinhua

## UAE among countries with lowest "AIDS" cases

Abu Dhabi, 11 June- The United Arab Emirates (UAE) is among countries with the lowest number of HIV/AIDS cases, the Khaleej Times reported on Thursday.

A report by the World Health Organization (WHO) showed that the spread of HIV/ AIDS in the Arab region has been relatively low, which stood at some 600,000 cases, said the report.

55,000 HIV/AIDS cases were infected in 2003 and about 45,000 reported deaths, it added.

However, the UAE should break its silence on the issue of AIDS and chalk out constructive awareness campaigns to curb the spread of the killer virus, Taghreed Haider, an information official of the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) in Abu Dhabi office, told the newspaper.

The multiethnic social fabric of UAE characterized by high rates of people mobility, increasing unemployment and drug use makes it quite vulnerable to the killer disease with all possible risk of an accelerated spread of the epidemic, said Haider.

The scope to halt the HIV/AIDS still exists in UAE, and the issue requires our immediate response as building awareness is the only means to prevent the epidemic, the UN official added.

As part of its commitment to fight the disease, the UNDP, UNICEF, UNAIDS and WHO in collaboration with the Executive Board of the Health Ministers' Council of the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) will hold a multi-sectoral workshop on leadership for an early response to HIV/ AIDS in the Gulf Countries on June 26-27 in Manama, Bahrain. -MNA/Xinhua

Thailand auctions 3,000 crocodiles seized in drug bust

Bangkok, 11 June - More than 3,000 crocodiles seized from a suspected drug kingpin went under the hammer on Thursday in the first auction of reptiles confiscated in Thailand's war on drugs.
"It's quite a strange auction because they are crocodiles," Justice Minister Pongthep Thepkanjana said at a farm north of Bangkok where buyers checked out the snapping beasts held in nearly 30 fenced ponds. "We auctioned them because they are property related to the narcotics trade," Pongthep told Reuters Television.

Some 9,200 crocodiles and 100,000 catfish were among the more exotic items seized by authorities in a crackdown on the country's notorious drugs trade last year.

Drug dealers often laundered their illicit wealth through legitimate businesses such as crocodile, ostrich and fish farms, and jewellery shops.

There were only three bidders and they paid 5.8 million baht ( 143,000 US dollars), well below the 10 million baht authorities had hoped to earn to defray the cost of keeping the crocs. - MNA/Reuters

## S Korean military demands

 much increased budget for 2005Seoul, 12 June - The South Korean Defence Minis-
try said Friday it has requested 21.4 trillion won (18.3 billion US dollars) for next year's budget, up 13.4 per cent from this year.

The request came several days after the United States said it would slash about one-third of its 37,500 troops stationed in South Korea by the end of next year, sparking security concerns in its major Asian ally.

The ministry said in a statement on Friday it requested the Ministry of Budget and Planning to approve its budget proposal, which includes a set of arms buildup projects such as the deployment of an airborne reconnaissance system and an advanced version of Patriot missiles.

Other force improvement projects include introduction of $F-15 \mathrm{~K}$ fighter jets, $K F-16$ jets, $K 1 A 1$ armoured vehicles, Aegis-equipped destroyers and C4I, or joint Command, Control, Communication, Computer and Intelligence system, it said.

The expanded budget represents 2.9 per cent of the nation's gross domestic product, the ministry said.

South Korea and the United States are on the final stage on negotiating details of US troops relocation in the Asian country.

They had earlier agreed to move Yongsan Base which has some 8,000 US military personnel out of Seoul and redeploy the 12,000 US 2nd Infantry Division based near the inter-Korea border to Pyeongteak, some 70 kilometres south to Seoul in the coming years.

With the realignment of the US Forces Korea (USFK), South Korean military should shoulder more defence re-sponsibility.- MNA/Xinhua

## "Doggie, speak" has new meaning in language study

Washington, 12 June- A clever border collie that can fetch at least 200 objects by name may be living proof that dogs truly understand human language, German scientists reported on Thursday

The dog, named Rico, can fetch a newly introduced object when asked, even if he has never heard the name of the object before, the researchers say.

The findings, reported in the journal Science, may not surprise many dog owners. But they are certain to re-ignite a debate over what language is and whether it is unique to humans.
"We wonder what prevents animals from speaking. The limitations are not their capacity to hear or understand," Julia Fischer of the Max-Planck Institute for Evolutionary Anthropology in Leipzig told a news conference in Berlin.

Rico's abilities seem to follow a process called fast mapping, seen when young children start to learn to speak and understand language, they report. Fast-mapping allows children to form quick and rough hypotheses about the meaning of a new word the first time they hear or see it.

The 10 -year-old dog, which beat human competitors to win a popular German TV talent show five years ago, lives as a pet with his owners Witold Krzeslowski and Susanne Baus of Dortmund, western Germany. - MNA/Reuters

The web site was started as part of the efforts to build Internet into an important medium of advanced culture and also an important step to clear the environment around juveniles, said Cai.

The tenet of the web site is to "report illegal information, protect public interest".

Internet has been developing very fast since it came into China ten years ago. By the end of this year, China is expected to have nearly 100 million netizens, said Cai.

## UNCTAD warns of failure to reduce poverty in LDCs

Sao Paulo (Brazil), 12 June - Least developed countries (LDCs) are likely to become "the major locus of extreme poverty in the world economy by 2015 " if without a strong link between trade and poverty reduction, the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) has warned.

Most LDCs undertook deep trade liberalization in the 1990 s and received some degree of preferential market access from developed and developing countries, "but trade liberalization plus enhanced market access does not necessarily equal poverty reduction", the report said.

UNCTAD attributed the failure to weaker linkages between trade and economic growth than in the more advanced developing countries. Civil conflicts in some of the LDCs have also been associated
with immiserizing trade, it said.
The Geneva-based UN
body said a more effective link between international trade and poverty reduction could help prevent LDCs from being further marginalized in a globalized world.

It suggested in the report hat actions be taken on three fronts:

- a two-way main-stream-ing of both trade and development within national poverty reduction strategies;
- increased and effective international financial and technical assistance for developing domestic production and trade capacities;
- and an enabling international trade regime.

UNCTAD also called for
phasing out of agricultural support measures by developed countries, endorsing of new international policies to reduce vulnerability to negative commodity price shocks, opening market to LDCs complemented by new sup-ply-side preferences, and enhancing South-South cooperation in the field of trade and investment.

Fifty countries in the world are currently listed by the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) as LDCs, of them 10 are in Asia, 34 in Africa, five in Oceania and one in atin America. ECOSOC reviewed the LDCs list every three years.

## China to clean up illegal web sites

Beijing, 11 June - China will start soon a nationwide crackdown on illegal or unauthorized web sites, in a bid to create a clean information environment for the healthy growth of youngsters, according to the Ministry of Information Industry Thursday

The ministry will cut off the connection of illegal web sites to servers, strengthen management on information at on-line BBS and chatting rooms, and set up a database for IP addresses in the clean-up campaign, said Minister Wang Xudong.
"In order to block charging channels of illegal web sites, the ministry will also check and standardize fee collection of some telecommunication companies, who take in payment of unhealthy information for these web sites," Wang said.

Telecommunication companies are also encouraged to support family users with technologies to filter out harmful information and with services to guarantee clean online environment.

Wang acknowledged that the Internet, as an outcome of the modern information and technological development, has played an active role in promoting China's economic growth, social progress and enhancement of people's living standards
"But slack management has led to rampant spread of violent and pornographic information in the Internet, which can easily poison minors' mental health," he said.

He noted that the ministry is developing related software to direct the online game industry to a sound and positive growth, hoping to provide youngsters a colourful and healthy online environment for amusement and relax.

With expectations high after qualifying for the tournament top of their group, the Greeks have been plagued by injuries since leaving Athens two weeks ago.

Leading striker Demis Nikolaidis returned to training on Wednesday after a nagging calf problem but goalkeeper Antonis Nikopolidis, central defender Traianos Dellas and midfielder Vassilis Lakis are the latest additions to the injury list.

Nikopolidis, who kept a clean sheet in six successive qualifying matches, has a shoulder problem, while the towering Dellas has a back injury.
"We expect him to play on Saturday and that is why we are all over him to get him fit," team doctor Charis Christopoulos told reporters.

## Totti keen to spread responsibility

Lisbon, 11 JunePlaymaker Francesco Totti, singled out by coach Giovanni Trapattoni as Italy's key player, has played down the significance of his own role at Euro 2004.
"I will take on my responsibility that's for sure but all the others have to do it as well. That is the only way we can do well," Totti told a news conference on Thursday.

Totti, Italy's main creative force in a role just behind lone striker Christian Vieri, said that while he enjoyed getting praise he did not want attention to be focused solely on his position.
"No-one should feel inferior to anyone," he said. "Everyone has their role to play. Of course it is nice to hear the praise but we are all good players here in this squad. That is why we are here."
"In the end there are many other players in this team who can make the difference on the field," Totti added. "The reality is that we have a lot of players on the same, high level and it is not the case that there are some players better than others.
"No-one can win a game on their own and everyone has their own precise role to play. In a team when everyone does exactly what they have to do then you can win," he added.

Totti said Vieri was one of the main assets available to Trapattoni and was convinced the partnership could make a big impact in Group C games against Denmark, Sweden and Bulgaria.
"With Bobo (Vieri) we have a perfect understanding and we are looking to get the very best out of each other," Totti said.

While there is no doubt that Italy expects the very best from Totti, who failed to live up to expectations at the 2002 World Cup and at Euro 2000, the player's situation at Roma has altered radically in recent weeks.

## WEATHER

Saturday, 12 June, 2004
Summary of observations recorded at 09:30 hours MST: During the past 24 hours, rain or thundershowers have been scattered in Kachin, Rakhine, Kayah and Mon States, Mandalay, Magway and Yangon Divisions and widespread in the remaining areas with locally heavyfall in Mandalay Division and isolated heavyfall in Magway Division. The noteworthy amounts of rainfall recorded were Loikaw (2.64) inches, Meiktila (2.48) inches, Mawlaik (2.34) inches, Kalewa (2.09) inches, Myitkyina (2.05) inches, Mindat (1.97) inches, Pakokku (1.77) inches, Mandalay (1.65) inches and Maubin (1.61) inches.

Maximum temperature on 11-6-2004 was $31.0^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ ( $88^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ ). Minimum temperature on $12-6-2004$ was $20.7^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ $\left(69^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\right)$. Relative humidity at $9: 30 \mathrm{hrs}$ MST on 12-6-2004 was $88 \%$. Total sunshine hours on 11-6-2004 was (3.7) hours approx. Rainfall on 12-6-2004 was 31mm (1.22) inches) at Yangon Airport, 31mm (1.22 inches) at KabaAye and $24 \mathrm{~mm}(0.95$ inch) at central Yangon. Total rainfall since 1-1-2004 was 663 mm (26.10 inches) at Yangon Airport and 545 mm (21.46 inches) at Kaba-Aye and 686 mm (27.01 inches) at central Yangon. Maximum wind speed at Yangon (Kaba-Aye) was 15 mph from Southeast at (12:38) hours MST on 11-6-2004.

Bay inference: Yesterday's low pressure area over Bay of Bengal has further intensified into a depression and moved Northwest wards. According to the observations at (12:30) hrs MST today, it is crossing Andra Coast (India), Southwest of Kolkatta. Monsoon is generally strong in the Bay of Bengal. Forecast valid until evening of the 13-6-2004: Rain or thundershowers will be widespread in Kachin, Chin, Mon and Kayin States, Sagaing, Ayeyawady, Yangon, Bago and Taninthayi Division, and scattered in the remaining areas with likelihood of isolated heavyfalls in Taninthayi Division, Mon and Kayin States. Degree of certainty is $(80 \%)$

State of the sea: Squalls with moderate to rough seas are likely at times off and along Myanmar Coasts. Surface wind speed in squalls may reach (35) to (40) mph. Outlook for subsequent two days: Likelih
