Increase crop production with double cropping development

Agriculture is the main source of national economic development. As for the regions, agriculture serves as an engine of growth for ensuring food sufficiency and economic progress, and a sound foundation for improvement of social standard in rural areas.

In this regard, responsible personnel of the State are busy making arrangements for agricultural development, while providing every assistance to agricultural reforms covering the task of increasing crop per acre yield with the use of pedigree strains and advanced equipment and technology.

During his inspection tour of Ayeyawady Division on 30 January, Chairman of the State Peace and Development Council Commander-in-Chief of Defence Services Senior General Than Shwe gave guidance to local authorities and officials at different levels for progress of crop cultivation, saying, "We will have to strive for utilizing the abundant land resources of our country as much as we can. And we are going to raise crop production more and more every year by extending sown acreage, increasing crop per acre yield and multiplying mixed-cropping.'

The Senior General's inspection of the division, the nation's main agricultural region, included a bridge over Pammawady River at Myinkaseik and development undertakings.

Prospects are bright for the division's economic development as it has been putting land under ten major crops including paddy that is being grown in rainy season as well as summer according to targets. In addition the division has begun to grow 500,000 acres of physic nut plants, while plans are well under way to extend fish, prawn and poultry farming.

Now, the division is reclaiming land to set up large-scale physic nut farms to produce biodiesel from physic nut. The bio-diesel will run farm machinery that will help extend its double and mixed cropping.

Officials at different levels and farmers of the division on their part will surely strive to raise crop production by extending sown acreage, increasing crop per acre yield and multiplying mixed-cropping.

US Capitol police arrest activist Sheehan

WASHINGTON, 1 Feb - Police at the US Capitol arrested US anti-war activist Cindy Sheehan on Tuesday, shortly before President George W Bush was to give his annual State of the Union speech a police spokeswoman said.

The spokeswoman, Capitol Police Sergeant Kimberly Schneider, said she had no immediate details.

Sheehan had been invited to be a guest at the address to a joint session of Congress by US Representative Lynn Woolsey, a California Democrat.

Sheehan. who became a central figure for the US anti-war movement after her soldier son Casev was killed in the Iraq war, won wide attention with an

anti-war vigil outside Bush's Texas ranch.

CNN said Sheehan was arrested after unveiling a banner and was being held on Capitol Hill for about an hour, which would keep her away from the address, which was set to start at 9 pm EST (0200 GMT on Wednesday).

Sheehan and other activists were arrested in September for protesting outside the White House without a permit, a misdemeanor that carriers a 50-US-dollar fine. MNA/Reuters

British soldier shot dead in southern Iraq

LONDON, 31 Jan-A British soldier was killed in southern Iraq on Monday after coming under gunfire, British Ministry of Defence said.

The soldier from the 1st Battalion The Highlanders died of injuries sustained when his patrol came under small arms fire in Maysan Province, the ministry said in a statement.

"There were no other injuries to British service personnel," the ministry added. "I was very saddened to hear this morning that a British soldier had died whilst performing his duty in Iraq.

My thoughts are with his family and friend," British Defence Secretary John Reid said in the statement.

Iranian President to meet Malaysian PM over nuke disputes

KUALA LUMPUR, 31 Jan- Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad will visit Malaysia to brief leaders in this Southeast Asian country over Iran's nuke disputes, local media reported on Tuesday.

Ahmadineiad is expected to meet Malaysian Prime Minister Abdullah Ahmad Badawi within the next two months, and officials from the two countries are now working out a date for his visit, according to the reports of The Star.

This will be the first meeting between Ahmadinejad, who was elected President last June, and Malaysian Prime Minister Abdullah Ahmad Badawi.

Iran dispatched its Deputy Foreign Minister Mehdi Mostafavi here last week to explain the nuclear issue to Malaysia, ahead of the International Atomic Energy Agency's emergency meeting to decide whether to refer Iran to the United Nations Security Council over the dispute.-MNA/Xinhua

London police chief admits fatal shooting errors

LONDON, 31 Jan — London's police chief Ian Blair told a newspaper on Monday his force made errors in the aftermath of the fatal shooting of an innocent Brazilian man whom officers mistook for a suicide bomber.

investigation by an independent watchdog over comments he made after Jean Charles de Menezes was shot dead by police last July, said in an interview with the Guardian that false reports in the media should have been immediately corrected

De Menezes, a 27year-old electrician, was shot seven times in the head as he boarded a train at Stockwell underground station in south London on 22 July.

He was mistaken for one of four men who were suspected of trying to bomb London's transport system the day before. Police were already on high alert after suicide bombers had killed 52

just two weeks earlier.

Immediate reports from witnesses suggested de Menezes had been wearing a bulky jacket, had vaulted a ticket barrier and had run when challenged by officers.

However, leaked reports of evidence submitted to the Independent Police Complaints Commission, which is probing the shooting, cast doubt on the claims and showed there had been major blunders by police.

Earlier this month the IPCC submitted its full report to prosecutors to consider whether any officers involved should face criminal action, but details have not been made public "Clearly the Met

Iraq Health Minister says dead girl had bird flu

SULAIMANIYA (Iraq), 31 Jan— An Iraqi girl who died on 17 January in the Kurdish city of Sulaimaniya, had bird flu, Iraq's Health Minister said on Monday, despite the World Health Organization having initially ruled that out.

The test of Tijan's blood emphasized that she had bird flu from the kind that kills humans," Health Minister Abdul Muttalib Mohammed Ali told a news briefing in Sulaimaniya, referring to the teenager, Tijan Abdel-Qader.

Dr Shirko Abdullah, manager of health department in Sulaimaniya, told Reuters: "The (Iraqi) Health Minister based his remarks on a report he received from a Cairo laboratory that indicated that the blood samples had H5N1.'

WHO said on Saturday it was also carrying out tests on the girl's uncle, who died last Friday. A WHO spokeswoman said the initial tests on the girl had been carried out in Iraq.

Japan to complete Iraq troop pullout by May

TOKYO, 31 Jan- Japan will begin withdrawing its non-combat ground troops in March from Iraq, where they have been engaged in their riskiest mission since World War II, and complete the pullout by May, Japanese media said on Tuesday.

Japan decided last month to keep its troops in southern Iraq for up to a year from 14 December, but government officials had left open the possibility they could be withdrawn sooner.

Japan's dispatch of troops to Iraq has won praise from close ally Washington, but most Japanese voters have opposed the move.

According to government sources quoted by Japanese media including Kyodo news agency, a basic agreement on the pullout of the troops was reached between officials from Japan, Britain and Australia on 23 January at a meeting in London.

Britain, citing estimates that Iraq will establish its new government as early as next month, proposed to withdraw around half its troops in southern Iraq by May, including those around Samawa, where Japan's

Italian soldier injured in roadside bomb blast in Iraq

ROME, 31 Jan- An Italian soldier was slightly injured on Monday morning in a roadside bomb blast near Nassiriya, where the headquarters of the Italian contingent in Iraq is located, Italian media here reported.

Italian Defence Ministry sources said the soldier was riding in a three-vehicle convoy and the blast involved only the vehicle the injured soldier was riding in. The soldier was said to have received a minor shrapnel wound in his left arm.

The convoy was hit in eastern Nassiriya while it was on its way to a nearby village where a reconstruction is in progress. It returned to base after the attack. MNA/Xinhua

Guatemala to replace soldiers killed in Congo

MEXICO CITY, 31 Jan — Guatemala's Government announced on Monday it will replace the soldiers who died on UN peace keeping mission in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), according to reports from Guatemala

Guatemalan Army spokesman Jorge Ortega said that the reinforcements would reach the African country on 8 February, replacing eight soldiers killed during a gun fight in Garamba national park.

The replacements were chosen from soldiers who volunteered to reinforce the Guatemalan group of 105 soldiers in the DRC, the spokesman said. - MNA/Xinhua

100th British military death in Iraq

LONDON, 31 Jan-A British soldier was killed in southern Iraq today, taking the total death toll of UK military personnel in the country to 100 since the USled invasion in March 2003.

Cornoral Alexander Pritchard, 31, served with the Royal Scots Dragoon Guards. He died from injuries sustained in an explosion in Um Qasr in Britishpatrolled Basra Province.

Sunni Arab guerillas are waging a campaign of suicide and car bombings and shootings that have killed thousands of police officers, soldiers and civilians in an effort to undermine the Shiite-led government.

Explosion at Florida plant releases krypton gas

MIAMI, 31 Jan — An explosion on Monday at a Florida plant that makes ignition systems for aircraft engines exposed at least 100 people to krypton gas and sent 12 to hospital for treatment, a fire department official said.

The Unison Industries plant, a unit of General Electric, was quickly evacuated, Jacksonville fire-rescue spokeswoman Bennie Seth said. She said there was no health effect from the krypton gas.

Several hours after the explosion, gas levels in the plant were found to be very

low, she added Company spokeswoman Angela Milligan said she could not confirm that any employees at the plant had been exposed to any sort of gas or other potentially harmful material

Unison employees about 500 people in the

Jacksonville area but no more than 111 were located in the plant where Monday's incident occurred at about 10:45 am(1545GMT), Milligan said. Seth said investigators had not yet found the cause of the blast.

Concern grows over "Kama Sutra" computer virus

SAN FRANCISCO, 1 Feb — A destructive worm posing as a pornographic email may already have infected hundreds of thousands of computers and could erase many everyday files on 3 February, security experts warned on Tuesday.

The "Kama Sutra" worm, which targets popular Microsoft Corp, Adobe Systems Inc and ZIP files, is a threat because many users will not know the virus has infected their computers until it is too late, security experts said.

They also estimate that the worm — which spreads by e-mailing itself to addresses in an infected computer's mailbox — may already have slipped onto 275,000 to 500,000 machines and is now simply waiting to obliterate files on Friday.

The virus, also known as Grew.A or MyWife, tricks users by appearing as an e-mail attachment with subject lines such as "Hot Movie", "give me a

2006". Some variations | midnight on 3 February. refer to the ancient Kama Sutra guide to elaborate sexual positions in order to attract attention and convince victims to open.

"It claims to be a movie or picture with some sort of sexual content," said Johannes Ullrich, chief research officer at the nonprofit SANS Institute research group. "That is how it tricks you."

The virus causes a keyboard and mouse to freeze up and then disables anti-virus programmes when the computer is restarted, leaving a machine vulnerable, said Ken Dunham, rapid response director at VeriSign Corp's security unit Defence. The attack is kiss" and "Miss Lebanon scheduled to begin at

"The explosives include two mines and one wireless controller," he added while declining to tell the nationality of the foreign troops.

River erosion in Bangladesh leaves 1m homeless

DHAKA, 1 Feb — Around one million people have been rendered homeless due to river erosion in Bangladesh over the last three decades as the mighty river Brahmaputra-Jamuna continues to widen.

The Daily Star quoted official statistics as saying on Tuesday that the Brahmaputra-Jamuna, a major river system in Bangladesh, has widened to 11.8 kilometres now from 8.3 kilometres in the early 1970s, eroding about 87,790 hectares of land.

The Centre for Environmental and Geographic Information Services (CEGIS), an independent analysis wing of the Water Resources Ministry, said in a recent study that the widening process of the Brahmaputra-Jamuna still continues owing to long-term effects of the 1950 Assam (India) earthquake of 8.6 magnitude on the Richter Scale.

Experts said nearly 800 square km of valuable floodplains have been lost due to erosion along the Brahmaputra-Jamuna's total length of 240 kilometres in Bangladesh.

"Around 1 million people have become homeless and infrastructure destroyed due to riverbank erosion in the Brahmaputra-Jamuna," Knut Oberhagemann, team leader of the Jamuna-Meghna River Erosion Mitigation Project (JMREMP), was quoted by the daily as saying.

The rate of erosion becomes high

and the flow of water strongly hits the river banks when huge quantities of sediment are mixed with water, experts said.

"Assam earthquake delivered approximately 45 billion cubic metres of sediment to the Brahmaputra-Jamuna River and its tributaries in the Assam valley, raising the riverbed by three metres," CEGIS Morphologist Maminul Haque Sarker was quoted as saying.

Around 60 to 70-square-kilometre land is being devoured by the Brahmaputra-Jamuna, leaving 60,000 to 75,000 people landless every year, according to a research report of Water Resources Engineering Department of Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology.

"Depth of the Brahmaputra-Jamuna continues to decrease and its width increases.

At present, from 100 to 500 metres of land is being eroded from both banks of the river," said Professor M Monowar Hossain, who conducted the research identifying three causes of expanding width of the Brahmaputra-Iamuna

Los Angeles, 1 Feb — A former postal worker in California went on a shooting spree overnight, killing five people before she committed suicide, authorities said Tuesday.

Study shows nearly eight million children born with defects

WASHINGTON, 1 Feb — Nearly eight million children are born with birth defects around the world every year and most of them either die or are disabled for life as a result, according to a report released on Monday.

With proper medical care up to 70 per cent of these defects could be prevented, or at least treated, the report from the March of Dimes said.

"An estimated 7.9 million children are born annually with a serious birth defect of genetic or partially genetic origin," the report said.

"More than 90 per cent of all infants with a serious birth defect are born in middle- and low-income countries," the report added.

"Because most of these countries do not have adequate services to care for infants and children with birth defects, many of them will die young."

The March of Dimes, a charity whose goal is to eliminate birth defects, said 3.3 million deaths every year are associated with birth defects and another 3.2 million children born with defects become disabled.

Proper medical care and nutrition could prevent many of these, the report said.

"For example, structural birth defects including congenital heart defects, congenital cataracts, cleft lip and palate and clubfoot, can be corrected with pediatric surgery," it said.

Treatments are also available for sickle cell disease, which causes misshapen red blood cells, thyroid disease and other problems.

"In the United States alone, fortification of the grain supply with folic acid has produced a one-third decline in neural tube defects each year, with an overall cost savings calculated at 400 million US dollars annually," the report said.

In the United States, the infant mortality rate from birth defects fell 46 per cent between 1980 and 2001, the March of Dimes said .- MNA/Reuters

Baby who had heart surgery in womb goes home

NEW YORK, 31 Jan- An infant, named Grace, who underwent the world's first heart "stent" procedure in the womb was discharged to go home on Friday, according to a Press release from Children's Hospital Boston, the centre where the landmark operation took place.

in the developing fetus at 30 weeks of pregnancy on 7 November, 2005 to treat a heart defect called hypoplastic left heart syndrome (HLHS). She was born 10 January and underwent the first part of a definitive three-stage corrective operation on 13 January.

The physicians credit the earlier stent placement with protecting her lungs and making her recent operation run more smoothly than usual for these types of cases.

With HLHS, the most common heart diseaserelated cause of death during the first week of life, the left side of the heart is underdeveloped and can accept very little blood. Frequently, there is a hole

The stent was placed | that lets blood from the left side flow to the right before leaving the heart.

In Grace's case, however, there was not a hole, so blood accumulated on the left side and backed up into her lungs, which over time can cause serious damage.

To prevent the lung damage that would occur as the pregnancy went on, Dr James Lock, from Children's Hospital Boston, and colleagues decided to create a connection between the left and right sides of Grace's heart using a stent, which acted like a tiny channel for the blood.

Under ultrasound guidance, the doctors inserted a small catheter into the mother's abdomen and uterus and then into

the fetal heart. After two holes were created in the wall between the left and right sides of the heart. the stent was placed.

GENEVA, 31 Jan— More frequent floods and drought, blamed by some scientists on global warming, brought a near 20 per cent rise in natural disasters in 2005, researchers said on Monday.

But the death toll fell to 91,963 from 244,577 in 2004 when the figures were swollen by the impact of the Asian tsunami, the United Nations International Strategy for Disaster Reduction (ISDR) and Belgium's Louvain Research Centre said in a report.

Over 80 per cent of the fatalities in 2005 came from a single disaster — October's devastating earthquake in Kashmir and Pakistan's North West Frontier Province — just as the tsunami caused over 90 per cent of deaths a year earlier.

Without the earthquake and the tsunami, the death toll in both years was under 20,000, confirming a trend for more frequent, but less lethal disasters.

In 2005, there were 360 natural disasters, ranging from hurricane Katrina, which killed 1,322 people in New Orleans, to a measles epidemic in Nigeria in which more than 500 died.

AIDS cases drop in Switzerland in 2005

GENEVA, 31 Jan — A total of 234 cases of AIDS were reported in Switzerland in 2005, a drop of 20 per cent compared with the previous year, the Swiss Federal Health Office said on Monday.

"In total, 234 cases of AIDS were reported to the authorities in 2005, compared with 298 cases in 2004," said the office in a statement.

It added that 702 people were tested positive for HIV in 2005, 41 fewer than in 2004.

However, officials warned that it was too early to draw any conclusions since only 111 new cases were diagnosed last year — the rest were from previous years but first reported in 2005.—*MNA/Xinhua*

Iran detain suspects of blast which kills eight

TEHERAN, 31 Jan—Iran said on Monday that it has detained dozens of suspects of a blast which killed eight people in southern Iranian city of Ahvaz last Tuesday, the official news agency *IRNA* reported.

The detainees were suspected of involvement in two huge blasts which rocked Ahvaz on Tuesday, killing eight people and wounding over 40 others.

Iranian Foreign Minister Manouchehr Mottaki accused Britain of being responsible for the explosions.

He said British troops deployed in northern Iraq along the border might assist those who launched the two bomb attacks in Ahvaz, demanding London to respond seriously to Iran's doubts.

Middlesbrough avenged their shock home defeat earlier this season when they swept past bottom-of-the-table Sunderland 3-0 while Charlton Athletic shared a 0-0 draw with West Bromwich Albion at the Valley.

Things started to go wrong at Craven Cottage for Spurs when defender Michael Dawson was dismissed in the 72nd minute for a second bookable offence.

Bocanegra then grabbed the only goal of the game in the 90th minute, heading his first goal of the season from six metres following a free

Iran says no legal basis for UN referral

TEHERAN, 1 Feb — Iran said on Tuesday moves to send its nuclear case to the United Nations Security Council were not legally justified and that it would not bow to demands it halt atomic research and development.

"There is no legal basis to refer Iran's case to the Security Council and the Europeans will face difficulties doing so," Gholamreza Aghazadeh, head of Iran's Atomic Energy Organization, said in an interview with the semi-official ISNA students news agency.

He was speaking after the five permanent members of the Security Council agreed on Tuesday that the UN nuclear watchdog, the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), should report to the Council this week on what Iran must do to cooperate with the agency.

The agreement stopped short of recommending a formal referral of Iran to the Security Council, where

The Foreign Ministers of China, Russia, the United States, France and Britain, plus Germany and the European Union, said after a dinner in London that the IAEA must decide to bring Iran's case before the Council when the agency holds an emergency meeting on Thursday.

The tough action against Teheran - the culmination of more than three years of failed efforts to find a diplomatic solution - follows Iran's decision last month to resume atomic research and development after a break of more than two years.

The London meeting statement again called on Iran to halt atomic research, which has led to Iran removing UN seals at a uranium enrichment facility which could be used to make bomb-grade material. MNA/Reuters
