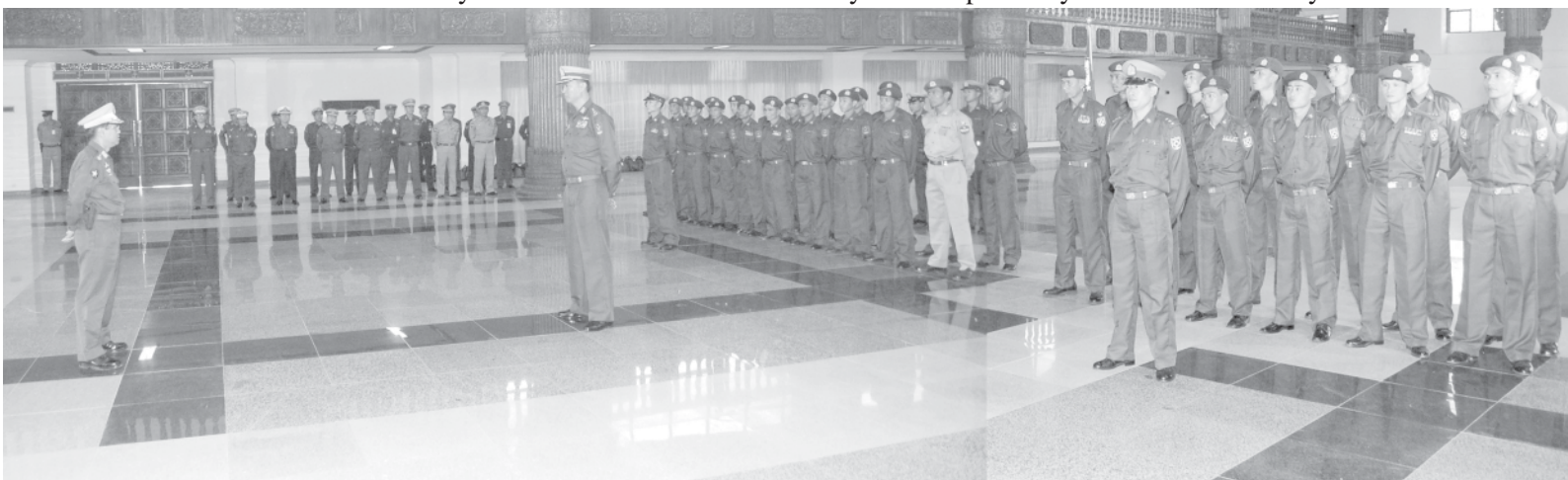

Actively take part in environmental conservation

Each and every nation is taking all possible measures to prevent environmental degradation. And conservation of environment is being carried out through establishment of forests and guarding against the deprivation of bio-diversity.

In Myanmar the National Commission for Environmental Affairs was formed in 1990, and work is well under way for conservation of environment through the protection and preservation of over 60,000 square miles of reserve forests, protected forests and natural forests.

In the meantime, greening of Bago Yoma, greening of the arid zone, extended establishment of forest plantations and natural forests, sanctuaries and wildlife sanctuaries are being carried out extensively.

Over one million acres of forest plantations including special teak plantations, commercial plantations, rural fire-wood plantations, plantations for industrial raw materials and watershed plantations have already been established.

The nine-district greening project that was launched in 1994 to prevent soil degradation has now been extended to 13 districts of the arid zone.

The protection and preservation of land and water resources of the State amounts to enhancing socio-economic life of the people. Hence, the entire national people are to actively take part in the drive for environmental conservation in order to protect endangered species of wildlife.

African Union head meets Kenya's feuding parties

NAIROBI, 11 Jan—African Union chief John Kufuor shuttled between Kenya's President and opposition leader on Wednesday to try to break a political impasse behind post-election turmoil that has killed 500 people.

Kufuor, Ghana's President, met President Mwai Kibaki first at State House before holding talks with Raila Odinga at a central hotel. He then returned to Kibaki and was

due to speak to Odinga again on Thursday.

Kibaki's office said the President and Kufuor reiterated that dialogue was "the only way forward towards a sustainable solution to the current political situation."

An opposition spokesman said Odinga discussed forming a transitional government, a vote recount and a new poll as possible options to end a crisis that has dented

Kenya's reputation for stability in volatile east Africa.

"(Kufuor) will leave very soon, after having created a framework in which these negotiations can take place," he said.

Odinga says Kibaki supporters cheated him out of the 27 December vote by rigging. Washington and London have said the vote counting was flawed.

IAEA chief arrives in Iran for talks on nuclear programme

TEHERAN, 11 Jan—Director-General of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) Mohamed ElBaradei arrived in this Iranian capital early on Friday for a discussion on Iran's nuclear programme.

This is ElBaradei's first visit to Iran in over one and a half years. Received by Mohammad Saeedi, deputy head of Iran's Atomic Energy Organization, the UN nuclear watchdog chief declined to make any

comments on his arrival. Earlier this week, IAEA spokeswoman Melissa Fleming said ElBaradei would spend two days in Iran. ElBaradei hoped his visit can contribute to the clarification of some vague issues regarding Iran's nuclear programs and would help to find measures to improve and accelerate the IAEA's supervision and inspection on the programs, Fleming said. Fleming said ElBaradei would meet some

senior Iranian officials, but refused to give details. On 30 December, 2007, Iranian Foreign Minister Manouchehr Mottaki said Tehran would put the country's first nuclear power plant into operation with half capacity in the summer of 2008.

Obama says New Hampshire loss shows change not easy

JERSEY CITY (New Jersey), 11 Jan—Barack Obama said on Wednesday his upset loss to Hillary Clinton in New Hampshire's US presidential primary was a reminder change was not

easy and would be resisted by those who gain from the status quo.

"My voice is a little hoarse, my eyes are a little bleary, my back is a little sore, but my spirit is strong," Obama said the

day after Clinton won narrowly in New Hampshire despite opinion polls before the vote showing she trailed Obama by double-digits.

Obama, bidding to be the first Black President, had hoped for a New Hampshire win that would solidify his hold on the top spot in the state-by-state race to pick candidates for the November election to succeed President George W Bush.

The Illinois Senator was greeted like a rock star by about 3,000 people at a college gym. He apologized for starting late, saying he had been thanking 2,000 people still waiting to get into the venue at St Peter's College in Jersey City.

Richardson to drop US presidential bid

WASHINGTON, 11 Jan—New Mexico Governor Bill Richardson is dropping out of the race for the Democratic US presidential nomination after a poor showing in early contests, US media reported on Wednesday.

Richardson, who hoped to become the first Hispanic US president, won just 5 per cent of the Democratic vote in Tuesday's New Hampshire primary, finishing fourth behind Senator Hillary Clinton and Barack Obama and former North Carolina Senator John Edwards.—MNA/Reuters

Japan plans \$10b aid to fight global warming

TOKYO, 11 Jan—Japan plans to set aside about 10 billion US dollars over the next five years to help countries such as China

and Indonesia fight global warming, a newspaper reported on Thursday.

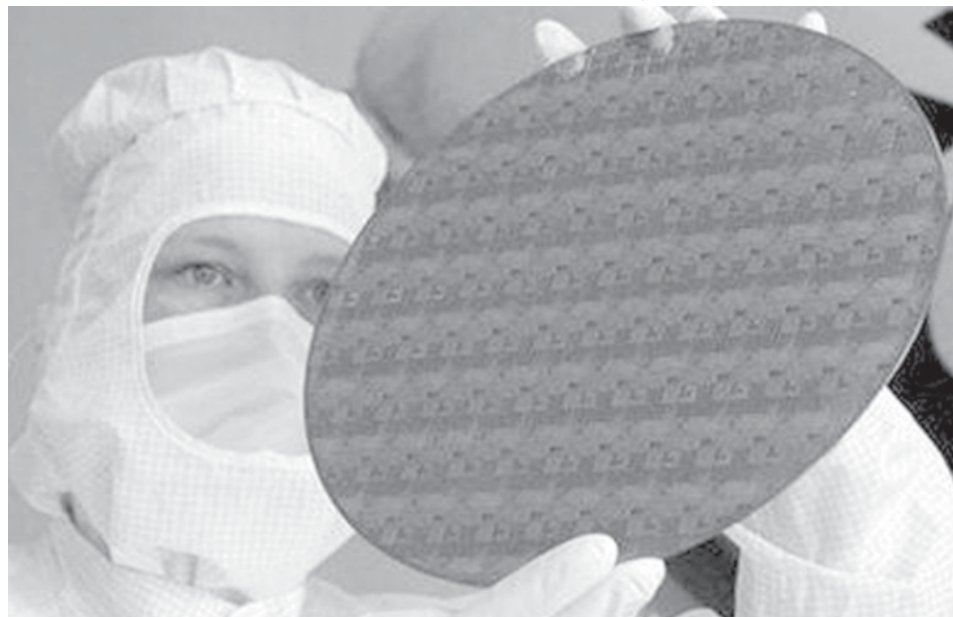
Japan's aid programme would focus on measures to cut greenhouse gas emissions, ease the effects of disasters caused by global warming and promote the use of alternative energy sources, the Nikkei business daily said.

The aid package would come in the form of grants

or yen-denominated, low-interest loans, the daily said.

Apart from helping improve the efficiency of China's ageing coal-fired power plants, it would be used to help developing countries gather and monitor meteorological data so that they could take measures to prevent natural disasters, Nikkei said.

Message, not gender turns US voters from Clinton

MANCHESTER (New Hampshire), 10 Jan — Voters are not turning their backs on Hillary Clinton because of doubts about a woman in the White House but rather turning on to the optimistic message of her rival Barack Obama, according to some experts on gender and leadership.

The 46-year-old Senator with his wife and two young children makes Clinton, a 60-year-old political veteran, seem outdated to some voters, they said.

Clinton lost caucuses in Iowa last week to Obama and has seen her poll lead overturned going into Tuesday's Democratic primary in New Hampshire, part of a state-by-state process by which parties choose a candidate

for President. Victory in November's election to succeed US President George W Bush would make Clinton the first US female president after 43 male heads of state.

But that possibility could be fading if primary voters opt for the promise

of hope and change projected by Obama over Clinton's experience and readiness to lead.

US diplomats critical of Bush Iraq policy

WASHINGTON, 10 Jan — Nearly half of US diplomats who do not want to serve in Iraq say a key reason is because they do not support the Bush Administration's policies there, according to a union survey released on Tuesday.

The survey by the American Foreign Service Association, which represents the rank-and-file diplomatic corps, not political appointees, also found that most US

diplomats were frustrated by what they saw as a lack of resources.

Four out of 10 think Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice is doing a bad job supporting them.

The survey canvassed the opinions of 4,311 foreign service members out of a total of about 11,500. It was unclear how representative the survey was but it indicated what many diplomats say is growing discontent among the rank and file.

The Iraq war has strained the US diplomatic corps and become unpopular among Americans in general.

In the survey, 48 per cent of the diplomats surveyed who said they would not volunteer to go to Iraq cited opposition to US policy on Iraq.

Other reasons were security concerns, time away from family and "obstacles to performing assigned duties".

Iraqis, Iranian protest at British base in Cyprus

NICOSIA, 10 Jan — Seven Iraqi men and an Iranian were threatening to throw themselves off a building at a British military base in Cyprus on Wednesday unless they got British passports, witnesses said.

The men scaled a 14-metre (45feet) fire brigade training tower in the western sovereign base area of Episkopi and said they would only come down if they got British citizenship.

"Nobody cares about us or what we want. Maybe some of us will throw ourselves down," protester Nabil Naji, 36, told Reuters by telephone.

"We want citizenship, we have been here for seven years and we want our rights.

We will stay here until we get them," he said.

The men had entered British sovereign territory in Cyprus seven years ago, getting on the island via Turkish held northern Cyprus, an unrecognized Turkish Cypriot state.

British authorities rejected their application for asylum.

Naji, who said he was from Babylon, said British authorities had told him he had to leave by 14

January. "I have no-where to go," he said.

Cyprus was a British colony until 1960 and Britain retains sovereignty over two pockets of territory on the Mediterranean island, now used as military bases.

The men, who are all single, had broken into the abandoned tower on Wednesday morning.

Their applications for asylum were rejected by Britain's border and immigration service after a thorough assessment, a British bases spokesman said.—MNA/Reuters

Russia gas blast kills eight, seven missing

MOSCOW, 10 Jan — Eight people were killed and seven were missing after a suspected gas explosion on Wednesday in an apartment building in the Russian city of Kazan, local emergency services said.

"Rescue and recovery teams have stopped combing through the debris. At this moment, we can say eight people were killed," said Svetlana Lebedeva, emergency services spokeswoman in the city, around 800 kilometres (500 miles) east of Moscow.

She did not clarify if rescue works would continue later.

Seven tenants of the three-storey building were unaccounted for, she said, adding their chances of survival under the rubble were slim in temperatures of about minus 20 Celsius (minus 4 Fahrenheit).

She said there was hope the missing were away at the time.

Wednesday is Russia's first working day after 10 days of New Year and Orthodox Christmas holidays.

At least two people were rescued alive from the ruins, the emergency services spokeswoman said.

Tea production in Bangladesh up 8% in 2007

DHAKA, 10 Jan—Bangladesh's tea production posted an 8-per cent growth to a robust 58 million kilogrammes in 2007, thanks largely to favorable weather and expansion of gardens, local newspaper *The Financial Express* reported on Wednesday.

The country's 163 tea gardens, located in greater northeastern Sylhet, southeastern Chittagong and northern districts, were hit by a drought in 2006 when the production fell to 53.7 million kilogrammes.

"This year most of the gardens witnessed very good growth in tea

production. Our estimate for this year's tea output is around 58 million kilogrammes," said Shantanu Biswas, who is a General Manager of the country's leading tea planter, MM Ispahani Limited.

Plucking of tea leaves in the gardens begins in March and ends on 31 December last year. "The high output was due to favourable weather and

expansion of existing tea gardens by at least two and a half per cent as per the directive of the authorities," said Biswas, also the chairman of Tea Traders Association of Bangladesh. The growth is likely to boost tea export and keep the domestic prices down in the current fiscal, traders said.

Vietnam, Laos to strengthen, investment cooperation

HANOI, 10 Jan—Laos and Vietnam have targeted increasingly closer investment cooperation, and two-way trade of one billion US dollars in 2010, two billion US dollars in 2015 and five billion US dollars in 2020, Lao newspaper *Vientiane Times* reported on Wednesday.

The 30th meeting of the Laos-Vietnam Cooperation Commission, and the Vietnam-Laos

Cooperation Commission co-chaired by Lao Deputy Prime Minister Somsavat Lengsavad and his Vietnamese counterpart Nguyen Sinh Hung in Laos' Vientiane capital lasting from 8 to 10 January is reviewing past achievements and discussing cooperation orientations this year.

On 10 January, the two commissions will sign a cooperation agreement in various areas in 2008,

including enhancing the quality of education, and creating more favourable conditions for Lao and Vietnamese enterprises to invest in areas of high potential like mining, hydroelectricity, industrial crop and service.

Laos and Vietnam gained two-way trade of 307 million US dollars in 2007, up 18 per cent against 2006.

S Korea, EU postpone FTA talks

SEOUL, 10 Jan—South Korea and the European Union (EU) will hold their sixth round of free trade

talks in the last week of this month, one week later than scheduled, South Korea's *Yonhap* news agency reported on Wednesday.

"Both sides agreed that more time is needed to review revised offers from each other," said an official at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade.

The talks on their free trade agreement (FTA) will be held from 18 January to 1 February, the official said.

The FTA talks between South Korea and the EU has been in impasse due to difference over restrictions on auto trade and

auto-related technical standards, one of the most divisive issues in the trade negotiations.

Brussels wants Seoul to cut regulations for European carmakers by applying international standards instead of different domestic rules. The EU said it cannot accept Seoul's revised proposal on auto-related technical standards, which include a quota and a five-year grace period for cars imported from European carmakers.

But Seoul reiterated that it cannot accept the EU's demand.

China auto production, sales to hit 10 m units in '08

BEIJING, 10 Jan—Auto production and sales in China are both likely to hit a record 10 million units this year, an industry executive forecast on Tuesday.

Dong Yang, vice chairman of the China Association of Automobile Manufacturers (CAAM), told *Xinhua* it was a "foregone conclusion" that both China's auto output and sales would surpass 8.7 million units in 2007.

"They will continue to expand at double-digit rates in 2008," he added.

In 2006, China overtook Japan to become the world's second largest car market, trailing only the United States, with sales of 7.2 million units, up 25.13 per cent from a year earlier. The country was also the world's third largest vehicle producer, after Japan and the United States.

Currently, vehicle ownership in China was 44 for every 1,000 people. This was compared with the world average of 120. The United States had 750 vehicles for every 1,000 people.

Dong said the domestic car market had huge potential as the country had 57 million motor vehicles by the end of last year. Among them were 21.5 million privately-owned cars, according to latest government figures.

AU wants common African position on EU trade deals

YAOUNDE, 10 Jan — Trade ministers from around Africa will meet before the end of February to hammer out a common position for the world's poorest continent on new trade deals with Europe, a senior African Union official said.

After years of negotiations, the European Union had hoped to sign far-reaching economic partnership agreements (EPAs) with mainly poor former colonies

before preferential trade terms expired on 31 December, but most failed to reach a full deal.

Some African leaders have been critical of the proposed agreements, saying they were being strong-armed by Europe into signing deals that would be damaging to local economies.

But others who were anxious to safeguard their exports — including cocoa and banana growers Ivory Coast, Ghana and

Cameroon — broke ranks last month and initialled 11th hour interim deals.

“We at the AU intend to hold a meeting of trade ministers in Addis Ababa before the end of next month to critically analyse the provisions of the EPAs and adopt a common position before comprehensive agreements are signed,” AU Trade Commissioner Elisabeth Tankeu said in Cameroon late on Monday.

Six killed in US winter storm

WASHINGTON, 10 Jan — A storm system caused by abnormal warm winter weather pounded central parts of the United States in last two days, leaving at least six people dead.

The National Weather Service (NWS) said on Wednesday that the winter storm has brought tornadoes and floods to Missouri, Tennessee, Kentucky, Wisconsin, Arkansas, Illinois and Oklahoma, and spun off floods in Indiana, where at least three people were killed. Two more deaths were reported from Missouri and one was confirmed dead in Arkansas. The NWS said the storm system is moving east and has already hit New York state, where some 40,000 customers were knocked out of power.

Critics try to sway debate on US-India nuclear deal

WASHINGTON, 10 Jan — Critics of the US-India civil nuclear agreement on Wednesday urged two international groups whose approval is vital to the deal to take steps to ensure it does not undermine global nonproliferation efforts.

Nearly 100 nongovernmental organizations and 25 individuals made their case in a letter to the 45 nations of the Nuclear Suppliers Group, which governs international nuclear trade, and to some board members of the International Atomic Energy Agency, the UN nuclear watchdog.

The letter, a copy of which was obtained by Reuters ahead of its public release on Wednesday,

argued that the deal would “damage the already fragile nuclear nonproliferation system and set back efforts to achieve universal nuclear disarmament.”

China's union charity drive benefits 71 m poor families

BEIJING, 10 Jan — All-China Federation of Trade Unions (ACFTU), the country's top level trade union, disclosed the figures at an international forum on economic globalization and trade unions which was concluded here Tuesday. Launched by the ACFTU 16 years ago, the charity programme aims

to give care and material support to poor workers. In the past 16 years, trade unions at various levels have visited 1.14 million enterprises with financial difficulties and have lifted about 4.45 million poor workers' families out of poverty, the official said.

A nation-wide assistance network for poor workers has come into place, with assistance centres for poor workers covering 100 per cent prefectures and 80 per cent counties, according to the official. “The network provides a strong backup for maintaining workers' lawful rights and for ensuring a more equal sharing of the fruit of economic and social development in the country,” the official said.

Most vulnerable homeless at risk of dying in LA

LOS ANGELES, 10 Jan — Dozens of most vulnerable homeless are at risk of dying at Los Angeles Skid Row and need immediate assistance, city officials said on Tuesday.

To provide housing and social services to the most vulnerable homeless people, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors has approved a 5.6-million-dollar bud-get, the board announced.

The effort, named “Project 50”, is patterned after efforts in New York and other cities designed to save the lives of those most likely to die on the streets.

New York City-based Common Ground, one of the advocacy groups being contracted for the effort, implemented a similar programme in a 20-block area of Times Square and reduced the

number of homeless people there by 87 per cent, according to the organization.

Last month, Los Angeles officials, assisted by Common Ground staff, canvassed an area of Skid Row in downtown Los Angeles for nine days during early morning hours and surveyed people they found sleeping on the streets.

English, Maths poor in one fifth of schools in Britain

LONDON, 11 Jan—One in five schools in England fails to give pupils a decent education in maths and English although the trend is improving, exam league tables showed on Thursday.

Some 639 state-funded schools last year failed to meet the government target of 30 per cent of their students achieving a good grade—at least a C—in five GCSEs including English and Maths.

Prime Minister Gordon Brown said in November he wanted all schools to reach this level by 2012 in the exams taken by 15 and 16-year-olds.

He said those that failed to hit the target faced closure or federation with another school.

Schools Minister Jim Knight said 150 more schools had made the required grade in Thursday's tables than the previous year.

"The vast majority are improving year on year and those at the lowest level are receiving intensive support." He said improvement over the past decade was excellent—in 1997 only half of schools reached the target. The opposition Conservatives said the tables showed that more than 500,000 pupils were at schools the prime minister regarded as failing.

Venezuelans fly to Colombia to free hostages

CARACAS, 11 Jan— Venezuela flew aircraft to Colombia on Thursday in an operation for the release of two women hostages being freed by Marxist rebels, after a similar effort led by President Hugo Chavez collapsed on New Year's Eve.

Aided by the International Committee of the Red Cross, Venezuela plans to pick up Colombian politicians Clara Rojas and Consuelo Gonzalez, held for years in secret jungle camps, after the FARC guerrillas again promised to free them.

The release would be the first major breakthrough for years in moves toward peace between the Colombian Government and the rebels and should bolster the standings of Chavez and Colombian President Alvaro Uribe, despite weeks of bickering over the deal.

"At this moment I can confirm that the operation is in progress," said Irma Alvarez, spokeswoman for the Red Cross, in an interview with Venezuelan state television.

Chavez last year brokered a deal with the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia, the FARC, to release the two hostages and a boy born to one of them in captivity, but the mission crumbled as it emerged the child was already in Colombian custody.

Bomb threat snags Giuliani campaign stop in Florida

MELBOURNE (Florida), 11 Jan —Republican Rudy Giuliani, who regularly touts his leadership of New York City during the September 11 attacks, saw his plan to jump-start his presidential campaign tripped up by a bomb threat in Florida on Wednesday.

The threat threw off his schedule and reduced the turnout for the former New York mayor's speech

in Melbourne from what his campaign manager Bill McCollum said was initially expected to be "several hundred" people to about 50.

The anonymous threat was called into the headquarters of communications equipment maker Harris Corp at about the same time Giuliani's plane landed at the airport for his scheduled appearance at the company, according to

Melbourne Police Commander Ron Bell.

All 500 Harris employees were evacuated and sent home while the presidential hopeful waited at the airport for police to secure a hangar as an alternative site for the event and check reporters and supporters with bomb-sniffing dogs.

"There was no specific threat made to Mayor Giuliani at any time," Bell said. —MNA/Reuters

South Korea, China resolve kimchi pickle

BEIJING, 11 Jan— South Korea and China have resumed normal kimchi trade, state media said on Thursday, two years after Seoul kicked up a stink about the quality of the Chinese version.

Kimchi is a fiery, pungent dish of raw, pickled vegetables, including cabbage and radish, served at every meal in Korea but an acquired taste for many outsiders.

South Korea launched an investigation into Chinese-made kimchi after the discovery of parasite eggs in October 2005. In response, China banned several imports of Korean food and started an investigation into Korean cosmetics.

South Korea agreed to cut down random sampling of Chinese kimchi from 100 per cent to 20 per cent in August and this week cut the sampling to the regular 10 per cent, Xinhua news agency said.

Ex-bodyguard says British Intelligence Services bug Diana

LONDON, 11 Jan— A former bodyguard of deceased British Princess of Wales Diana told the inquest into her death on Wednesday that the government's intelligence services had been recording her conversations. The recordings featured Diana talking on the phone with her close friend James Gilbey who affectionately called her "Squidgy" and said repeatedly, "I love you", Sky news reported.

Ken Wharfe, who guarded Diana for around seven years until 1993, told her inquest he believed the British intelligence listening station GCHQ had routinely bugged the Princess' conversations and had broadcast the recording of the phone conversation over the airwaves for radio enthusiasts to pick up.

He added that he believed GCHQ were monitoring members of the royal family due to heightened IRA (Irish Republican Army) activity at the time. Diana and her boyfriend Dodi Al Fayed died in Paris after a car crash in August 1997. And the inquest started in London last year into their deaths. — MNA/Xinhua

UK lawmakers want tougher, faster drug appraisals

LONDON, 11 Jan— Britain's medicines advisory agency should assess all new drugs at launch but set a tougher initial cost hurdle for using them on the state health service, lawmakers said in a report on Thursday.

The proposals could add to pressure on drug prices in Britain, where the government is already renegotiating a pricing agreement with industry in a bid to get better value for money.

Since 1999, the

National Institute for Health and Clinical Excellence (NICE) has led the world in measuring the cost-effectiveness of new treatments, and its actions are closely watched by other governments and insurers. Parliamentarians said NICE played a vital role in rationing healthcare but they criticized the arbitrary nature of the threshold above which it deemed drugs as too expensive, which was higher than used by primary care trusts.

Chrysler recalls Jeep models in China over brake flaws

BEIJING, 11 Jan — US auto maker Chrysler is recalling 1,371 Jeep brand vehicles sold in China due to brake problems, the nation's product quality watchdog said.

The affected vehicles were Grand Cherokee and Commander models made between on 31 January, 2005, and on 12 July, 2007, the General Administration of Quality Supervision, Inspection and Quarantine said in a statement on its website.

All the vehicles, which had been imported, had problems with their electronic brake control system. In addition, 57 of the units, made between on 11 June and 11 July last year, were also found to have flaws in the front brake calipers due to unqualified materials used in their production.—MNA/Xinhua

South Korea starts special probe of Samsung Group

SEOUL, 11 Jan — South Korea launched a special investigation into Samsung Group on Thursday on suspicions the country's largest conglomerate bribed public officials to squash investigations into its management practices.

Samsung has warned the probe could upset its business operations but some analysts said the investigation could shed welcome light on the group's secretive leadership.

South Korea's Parliament approved the special counsel in November in response to allegations made by a former top legal executive at Samsung, who said the company used its subsidiaries to help create a 200-billion-won (213.4-million-US-dollar) slush fund.

Samsung has denied the accusations, calling them groundless, and issued detailed rebuttals of the claims made by its former legal executive Kim Yong-cheol.

The special counsel legislation allows the team about 100 days to conduct its investigation.

South Korean prosecutors have been conducting a separate probe. Kim, who waited about three years after leaving Samsung to make his allegations in late 2007, said the company bribed senior members of the prosecutors office.

In December, soon after Kim's allegations, the country's top financial watchdogs said a bank and a brokerage had violated banking rules on naming account holders in setting up accounts for the Samsung Group.

Kim said Samsung set up accounts in employees' names as a way to hide money for slush funds.

Chinese customs uncovers 1,190 smuggling cases in 2007

BEIJING, 10 Jan —The Chinese General Administration of Customs (GAC) uncovered 1,190 smuggling cases in 2007, up 4.3 per cent year on year, according to a notice posted on the official website of the GAC.

These cases involved a total of 7.568 billion yuan (1.04 billion US dollars), down 45.7 per cent from the same period last year, of which 26 cases were "severe" ones involving more than 10 million yuan each.

It spotted and handled 356 drug cases, seizing 496 kilos of different kinds of drugs, said the notice.

The GAC said although it had achieved some tangible results in its anti-smuggling endeavors in 2007, it said commercial fraud and illegal cases in the processing trade are on the rise.

Portugal Parlt to approve EU treaty, not referendum

LISBON, 10 Jan—In an apparent change of position, the Portuguese Government said Tuesday that the new reform treaty of the European Union (EU) will be presented to Parliament instead of a referendum for approval, Portugal's *Lusa* news agency reported.

The decision will be formally announced by Prime Minister Jose Socrates at a parliamentary session Wednesday, a leader of the ruling Socialist Party (PS) told *Lusa*. The move appears to be a change in stance, as last year, Socrates, who is also general secretary of the PS, and other party

leaders said Portugal should approve the Lisbon Treaty in a referendum to embody public opinion and democracy.

Earlier in the day, President Anibal Cavaco Silva called on all EU members to approve the treaty, which he said is important for the 27-nation bloc's future.

The Lisbon Treaty, signed by EU heads of

state and government on 13 December in Portugal's capital, replaces the failed EU Constitution.

The new treaty, aimed at conducting far-reaching changes in the EU's institutions and decision-making mechanisms, has to be ratified by each member state before entering into force in January 2009.

AWAS leasing company orders 75 "A320 Airbus" jetliners

PARIS, 10 Jan—AWAS, one of the world's leading aircraft lessors based in Dublin, has completed a firm order for the delivery of 75 new A320 Airbus medium-range jetliners, according to a statement issued Wednesday by the European aircraft manufacturer.

This is the first order to be announced by Airbus this year, although the statement did not indicate the total amount of the order or other details about the aircraft ordered.

"This order of the A320 Family by AWAS, one of the leading aircraft leasing companies in the world, shows that this model remains the most popular, and responds to the current and future demands of the market," said John Leahy, Airbus commercial director.

The Airbus Family, consisting of A318, A319, A320 and A321, is recognized as being the most popular market reference for single-aisle aircraft family. The smallest among them, A318, can carry about 107 passengers, while the largest model, A321, can carry 185 passengers. — MNA/Xinhua

UN says to help Iraqis choosing to return home

GENEVA, 10 Jan—The United Nations refugee agency said on Tuesday it was not ready to recommend Iraqis return home despite its plan to help repatriate 15,000 refugee families.

In a 2008 appeal to governments, the UN High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) is seeking 261 million US dollars to provide health care, education, and cash to Iraqis uprooted by the 2003 US-led invasion and subsequent sectarian violence. The appeal includes funds to assist up to 15,000 families who may choose to return home from Syria, Jordan and other countries that host two million Iraqis.

Many of those who fled Iraq have congregated in cities such as Damascus and Amman where they are running out of money

and finding it increasingly difficult to get by, the UNHCR said.

"This refugee situation represents the largest urban population which UNHCR has ever been called upon to respond to and poses an unprecedented load on the economies and social infrastructures of host countries," it said in its appeal. UNHCR said it was "seeking to ensure the continued safe stay of Iraqis in their respective asylum countries until voluntary repatriation becomes a viable option".

EU, WB eye loan for climate change fight

BRUSSELS, 10 Jan— The European Union and the World Bank are discussing raising a major long-term loan to help poorest countries fund essential measures to combat climate change, the EU's development chief said on Wednesday.

Industrialized countries would borrow the money on the international capital markets and advance it to developing states to help reduce their emissions of greenhouse gases and protect them from environmental damage, Development Commissioner Louis Michel told reporters.

The size of the fund had not yet been discussed but it could involve the "colossal sums" needed to help poor countries fight against global warming, he said.

"I don't agree to use existing development funds to finance the fight against climate change in the least developed countries," Michel said.

"My aim is to create a global loan with the World Bank — we are working with (World Bank President) Bob Zoellick — to help the LDCs (Least Developed Countries) fight climate change."

Indonesia records 117 bird flu patients

JAKARTA, 11 Jan— A 16-year-old Indonesian girl from an outskirts city of Jakarta has been infected by avian influenza, putting the total number of cases in the hardest-hit country to 117 with 94 fatalities, the health ministry said here Friday.

The girl from Bekasi city has been treated at the bird flu-designed hospital of Persahabatan in East Jakarta since Wednesday after receiving treatment at a hospital in Bekasi since 4 January, an official of bird flu center of the ministry Joko Suyono said.

All lab tests indicated that the girl was positively contracted by the H5N1 virus, he said.

"Both laboratories tests of her blood samples are positive," he told *Xinhua*.

The girl consumed three chicken eggs two weeks ago after scores of chicken died suddenly in her residence in the last two months, said Suyono.

The girl first showed symptoms of the disease with high fever and throat problems on 30 December, he said. Then she went to doctors on 31 December and 2 January, said the official.

He also called for a serious response to any hygiene violations to ensure a healthy festival—*MNA/Xinhua*

Six US soldiers killed in booby-trap bomb attack in Iraq

BAGHDAD, 10 Jan — Six American soldiers were killed in a house trapped with explosives in the volatile Diyala Province on Wednesday during a new US-Iraqi offensive against al-Qaeda extremists, the US military said.

Another four were injured in the explosion, the military said in a statement.

Earlier in the day, the military also announced that three US soldiers were killed and two others wounded on Tuesday in an attack in Salahuddin Province, another target area of the new offensive against al-Qaeda in Iraq.

The latest deaths bring the total number of American soldiers killed in Iraq since the 2003 US-led invasion to 3,921, according to media reports based on Pentagon figures.

Russia joins world tobacco control organization

Moscow, 11 Jan — Russia has decided to join the world tobacco control organization in a bid to promote a healthy lifestyle among Russians, the *ITAR-TASS* news agency reported on Thursday.

The Cabinet approved on Thursday a draft law which, if accepted by the Parliament, would allow Russia to ratify the World Health Organization (WHO) Framework Convention on Tobacco

Control.

Under the convention, signatories should impose a ban on tobacco advertising for five years and place smoking-is-harmful slogans on cigarette packets for three years.

The signatory governments should also introduce new taxes, price regulating measures and tough rules against tobacco advertising, sponsorship and smuggling.

Japan may protect G-8 site with missiles

TOKYO, 11 Jan — Japan may position missile interceptors around the site of the Group of Eight summit of industrialized nations, to be held on the northern island of Hokkaido in July, a newspaper said on Wednesday.

Japan introduced its first Patriot Advanced Capability 3 PAC-3 ground-to-air missile interceptors at the Iruma air base north of Tokyo last March, as part of a shield aimed at protecting the country from ballistic missile attack.

But the interceptors have a range of about 20 kilometres, so they would need to be positioned closer to the summit venue at Lake Toyako in order to provide protection during the conference. The G-8 summit brings together the leaders of the United States, Canada,

the United Kingdom, France, Germany, Italy and Russia as well as Japan.

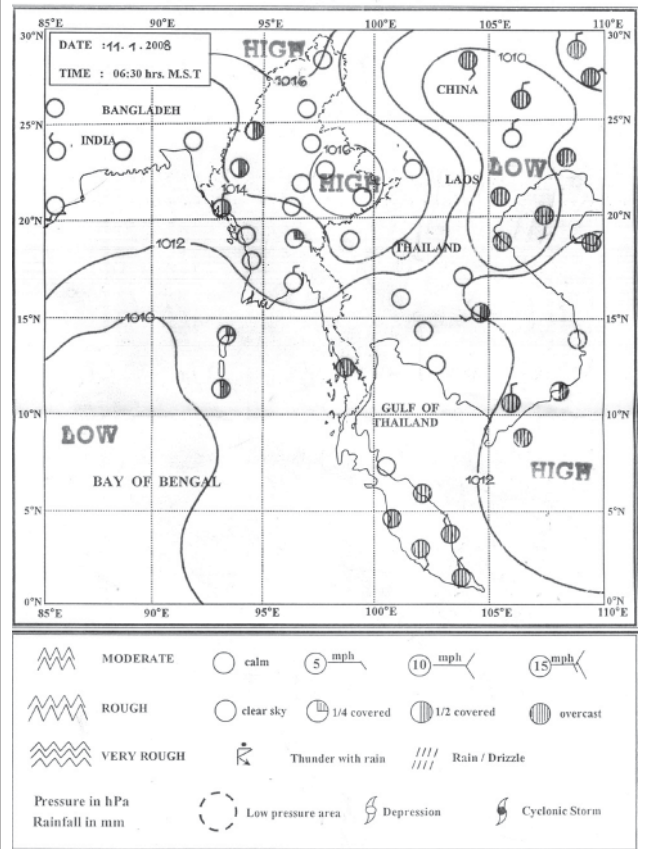
The *Sankei Shimbun* quoted a Defence Ministry official as saying that although the chances of a ballistic missile attack on the venue are extremely low, Japan wants to take all possible precautions against air attack.

“We must consider measures to deal appropriately with whatever situations may arise,” said a Defence Ministry spokesman, who declined to comment directly on the report.

A “Summit Unit” made up of air, ground and sea troops is also to be set up to respond immediately to any eventuality, the *Sankei Shimbun* said.

Myanmar, UAE consult bilateral air services

YANGON, 11 Jan—Consultations for the conclusion of an air services agreement between the Government of the Union of Myanmar and the Government of the United Arab Emirates were held at the Department of Civil Aviation in Yangon International Airport on 9 and 10 January.

The Myanmar delegation was headed by Director-General U Tun Hlaing of the Department of Civil Aviation of the Ministry of Transport, comprising representatives from the Attorney-General's Office, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the Department of Civil Aviation, Myanma Airways, Myanmar Airways International, Air Bagan, Air Mandalay and Yangon Airways as members and the UAE delegation headed by Air Transport Manager Miss Aysha Al Hamili of the General Civil Aviation Authority of UAE, comprising representatives from the General Civil Aviation Authority of UAE, Dubai Civil Aviation Authority, the Department of Transport of Abu

Dhabi, Etihad Airways and Emirates Airline as members.

In the course of consultations the two delegations drafted and agreed on a new Air Services Agreement and also agreed to take continuous actions for the signing of the Agreement after securing the approvals of the respective governments.

The two delegations further agreed on route rights for the designated airlines and, traffic rights between the two countries, traffic rights to and from third country, operation rights for using leased aircraft and rights on airlines cooperation agreement, signing a Memorandum of Understanding.

Myanmar Airways International and Air Bagan of the Union of Myanmar and Emirates Airline, Etihad Airways, Air Arabia and RAK Airways of UAE were designated for the operation of air services between the two countries.
