Prime Minister General Thein Sein meets officials, residents in Bhamo

Nation-building tasks not for development of one particular sector but for harmonious progress of all sectors

NAY PYI TAW, 23 Jan — Chairman of the Work Committee for Development of Border Areas and National Races Prime Minister General Thein Sein met with departmental officials, members of social organizations and townsenders in Bhamo on 20 January.

Also present at the meeting were Member of the State Peace and Development Council Lt-

Gen Ye Myint, Chairman of Kachin State Peace and Development Council Commander of Northern Command Maj-Gen Ohn Myint, Chairman of Sagaing Division Peace and Development Council Commander of North-West Command Brig-Gen Myint Soe, the ministers, the deputy ministers and departmental heads.

At the meeting, Chairman of Bhamo District

Peace and Development Council U Soe Win reported on the district's target of paddy cultivation in the rainy and summer seasons and plans for cultivation of nine major crops, irrigation facilities, transportation, education, health and development tasks in the district.

Speaking on the occasion, the Prime Minister said Bhamo District is one the most important

districts as it shares border with a neighbouring country. Therefore, the district is included in the 24 development regions and plans have been implemented for the development of the region so that it will not lag behind in development.

A technological university, a university of computer studies and a 200-bed specialist hospital were established in Bhamo District. The district relied on only water way for transportation in the past. Today, Mandalay-Tagaung-Bhamo Road, Mandalay-Lashio-Bhamo Road and the rail road linking Katha and Bhamo were constructed in the division and Bhamo Airport was upgraded.

NAY PYI TAW, 23 Jan — Member of the State Peace and Development Council Lt-Gen Kyaw Win of the Ministry of Defence together with Chairman of Shan State PDC Eastern Command Commander Maj-Gen Thaug Aye inspected Mongpang-Tarsan road section in Mongpang in a motorcade on 20 January.

Putin-Medvedev duo “could run Russia until 2033”

Moscow, 23 Jan—Russian President Vladimir Putin and his favoured successor Dmitry Medvedev could take turns to run Russia for another quarter of a century, a senior Kremlin ally said in an interview published on Monday. Sergei Mironov, a Kremlin loyalist and the speaker of the Russian Parliament’s Upper House, said Putin could become president again after a Medvedev term, serve two terms himself and then hand over once more to Medvedev. Neither Putin nor Medvedev have indicated they plan to be in government so far in the future, but the fact Mironov is floating the idea suggests Russia’s ruling elite feels firmly entrenched in power and expects to remain there for many years. “I will gaze a long way into the future,” the *Moskovsky Komsomlets* newspaper quoted Mironov as saying. “There could be a variety of scenarios.

Vladimir Vladimirovich (Putin) could come

back in 2012 (as president).”

“I think that by that time we will increase the head of state’s term to five or seven years. If it is seven years and Vladimir Putin is elected to two consecutive terms, he will run

the country for 14 years, that is from 2012 to 2026.”

“And in 2026, it could be that Dmitry Anatolyevich (Medvedev) will once again return to the post of president,” Mironov said.

Yemen says holding suspects in Belgians’ killing

SANAA, 23 Jan—Yemen said on Monday it had identified the suspected killers of two Belgian tourists and their Yemeni drivers among dozens of al-Qaeda suspects rounded up since last week’s attack.

“Among those who were arrested in the past few days, four are believed to be the attackers,” a security official told Reuters. He declined to give further details.

Friday’s attack came less than a week after al-

Qaeda’s wing in Yemen vowed to carry out unspecified operations to win the release of jailed Islamic militants.

Yemeni officials have not ruled out al-Qaeda involvement in the attack though no one has claimed

responsibility for the shooting near Shibam, famous for its old towers, in the Hadramout region.

The arrests were made in Hadramout and the nearby Maarib and Shebwa regions.

Bomb in Iraq’s Mosul kills seven, wounds 70

BAGHDAD, 23 Jan—A bomb attack on a residential building in Iraq’s northern city of Mosul on Wednesday killed at least seven people and wounded more than 70, police said.

Witnesses said it was one of the biggest explosions they had ever heard in Mosul, part of a region where al Qaeda in Iraq militants have regrouped after being pushed out of Baghdad and western Anbar Province.

The Sunni Islamist militant group is blamed for most major bombings in Iraq.

Women and children were among the victims, police said, adding that the death toll was expected to rise.—Internet

US military deaths in Iraq at 3,931

WASHINGTON, 23 Jan—As of Tuesday, 22 Jan, 2008, at least 3,931 members of the US military have died since the beginning of the Iraq war in March 2003, according to an *Associated Press* count. The figure includes eight military civilians. At least 3,197 died as a result of hostile action, according to the military’s numbers.

The AP count is two higher than the Defence Department’s tally, last updated Tuesday at 10 am EST.

The British military has reported 174 deaths; Italy, 33; Ukraine, 18; Poland, 21; Bulgaria, 13; Spain, 11; Denmark, seven; El Salvador, five; Slovakia, four; Latvia, three; Estonia, Netherlands, Thailand, Romania, two each; and Australia, Hungary, Kazakhstan, South Korea, one death each.—Internet

Gaza lights up as Israel eases fuel blockade

GAZA, 23 Jan — Israel resumed fuel supplies to the Gaza Strip’s main power plant on Tuesday, offering limited respite from a blockade that had plunged much of the Hamas-ruled territory into darkness and touched off international protests.

Only 13 truckloads of food and medicine entered Gaza on Tuesday, short of the 50 Israel had agreed to, but Foreign Ministry spokesman Arye Mekel said the rest would cross in the coming days.

At the United Nations in New York, Israeli and Palestinian envoys traded accusations of blame in

the Security Council for the recent wave of violence in Gaza, which threatens to torpedo a fragile Middle East peace process.

John Ging, who heads the leading UN aid agency in Gaza, said Israel’s decision to let some supplies into the coastal strip was a first step but would not be sufficient to head off a humanitarian disaster.

US Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice said earlier she had voiced her concerns to Israel, which has argued that sealing the borders could make the Palestinians stop rocket salvos being fired into its territory from Gaza.

PPP MP elected as Thai new House Speaker

BANGKOK, 23 Jan—Thailand's People Power Party (PPP) MP Yongyuth Tiypairat was elected as the House Speaker at the first parliamentary meeting on Tuesday.

Yongyuth, former deputy leader of PPP, got 307 votes while his only rival — Democrat Party MP Banyat Bantadnan got 167 votes during an hour-long balloting by the newly-elected lawmakers, whose victory in the 23 December general election. PPP MP Chai Chidchob, who was selected as the acting Speaker as he is most senior member, chaired Tuesday's meeting for MPs to elect the House Speaker and two deputy speakers.

PPP party executives and MPs reached an agreement after a meeting Monday to nominate Yongyuth as the party's only candidate for the House Speaker post. Meanwhile, the PPP's five coalition partners — Chart Thai, Matchimathipataya, Puea Pandin, Pracharaj and Ruam Jai Thai Chart Pattana parties, had

agreed to not contest the House Speaker and two Deputy Speakers positions on Monday, according to PPP spokesman Kudep Saikrachang.

Yongyuth's victory had been widely anticipated among political observers as the 480-seat House was controlled by PPP and its allies.

Red Cross says changing climate worsens disasters

GENEVA, 23 Jan — Climate change is making it harder for many people to access clean water and food, and widening the spread of malaria and dengue fever, the world's largest humanitarian aid agency said on Monday.

The International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC) is asking donors for 292 million US dollars per year for 2008 and 2009 to help communities steel themselves for the threats of global warming.

"Response alone is no longer enough," said Markku Niskala, secretary-general of the Swiss-based federation. Health care and disaster management make up 75 per cent of the appeal.

The 186 national Red Cross and Red Crescent societies around the world pledged at a strategy-setting conference in November to boost aid to those most vulnerable to the effects of climate change, a phenomenon scientists have linked to emissions from cars, factories and power plants.

They also agreed to step up disaster preparedness and risk reduction programmes, especially for small island states, in delta regions and across Africa, where shifting patterns of weather, rainfall and temperature are expected to be most acute. —MNA/Reuters

Russia not to pressure Poland over US missile shield

MOSCOW, 22 Jan—Russia is not planning to put pressure on Poland over the deployment of US-planned anti-ballistic missile systems in eastern Europe, said Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov here on Monday.

"We will not exert pressure on Poland or any

other participants in the talks on the creation of the third missile deployment area in Europe," Lavrov told a news conference in Moscow Monday.

Moscow wanted Warsaw to understand its concerns over the deployment plan, ITAR-TASS news agency quoted

Lavrov as saying.

The United States is planning to deploy 10 missile interceptors in Poland and a radar system in the Czech Republic as part of its European missile shield. Russia has objected the plan with concerns over its national security.—MNA/Xinhua

Sri Lankan troops kill 15 rebels in latest fighting

COLOMBO, 23 Jan — Sri Lankan troops killed 15 Tamil Tiger rebels in an assault on rebel positions in the northern Jaffna Peninsula on Monday, the military said, taking the rebel death toll from three days of clashes to 89.

Suspected Tamil Tiger rebels also killed three police personnel in southern Sri Lanka.

The rebels were not immediately available for comment and there are no independent accounts of the battles that have escalated

following the formal abrogation of a six-year truce by the government last week.

"The Army launched an attack and completely destroyed 24 LTTE terrorist bunkers, killed 15 and injured 30 terrorists in Nagarkovil area in Jaffna today morning," said a spokesman at the media centre for national secu-

rity, asking not to be named.

Two soldiers were killed and nine wounded in the fighting, he said, the latest in a series of battles along a "border" that separates government territory from the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam's (LTTE) de facto state in the north.

Ten hurt as US flight hit by turbulence

WASHINGTON, 23 Jan—Ten people were injured as a US flight was hit by a heavy turbulence on Monday.

The Flight 1028 from the United Airlines from Los Angeles, California, with 187 passengers on board was diverted to Denver International

Airport in Colorado about 3 am, where eight passengers and two flight attendants were sent to hospital, the airline said.

The plane resumed flight to its original destination, Chicago, after being inspected by maintenance crews, it added.

EU to set easier CO2 regime for heavy industries

BRUSSELS, 22 Jan— Europe's steel, aluminium and cement industries will have a special, less strict regime for greenhouse gas emissions under European Commission proposals to fight climate change to be announced this week.

After weeks of intense lobbying by business and governments, EU sources said on Sunday those

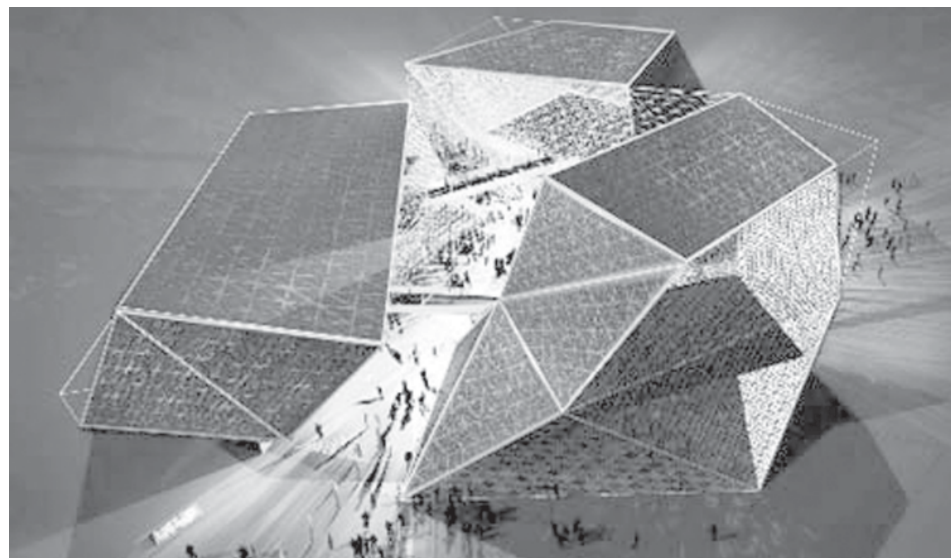
three energy-intensive industries would be introduced more slowly into a new system for auctioning permits to emit carbon dioxide (CO2) from 2013.

The sources insisted on anonymity because wrangling is continuing in the Commission on final details of the proposals on CO2 emissions, renewable energy sources,

biofuels and carbon sequestration to be unveiled on Wednesday.

A key flaw of the EU's Emissions Trading Scheme—the main instrument for curbing pollution blamed for global warming—has been that governments issued emission permits for free, handing industry windfall profits.

UAE to develop hydrogen-fired power generation project

ABU DHABI, 23 Jan—Masdar, an initiative for alternative energy of the United Arab Emirates (UAE), signed an agreement on Monday with Hydrogen Energy to develop an industrial-scale hydrogen-fired power generation project, *Emirates News Agency* reported.

Masdar and Hydrogen Energy, a joint venture between BP Alternative Energy and Rio Tinto, will collaborate on the front-end engineering design of the hydrogen-fired power plant to be located in Abu Dhabi.

In the plant, natural gas will be processed to create hydrogen, which will be used to generate low-carbon electricity and carbon dioxide, which will be captured for later use. The captured carbon dioxide will be injected into a producing oil field where it could replace natural gas currently being injected into the field to maintain pressure. The injected carbon dioxide also has the potential to increase the proportion of Abu Dhabi's oil that can be recovered. The plant will limit greenhouse gas emissions by capturing some 90 per cent of the carbon dioxide generated, and safely and permanently storing up to 1.7 million tons of carbon dioxide per year, the equivalent of decarbonizing Abu Dhabi's entire domestic transport sector.—MNA/Xinhua

Venezuela says no need for OPEC to up output

CARACAS, 22 Jan— Venezuela does not believe OPEC needs to increase output to tame high oil prices despite pressure from consumer nations, especially the United States, Oil Minister Rafael Ramirez told reporters on Monday.

The position of Venezuela, a price hawk in OPEC, reinforced the resistance that group members have offered in the face of calls for larger supplies. "We don't think it will be necessary to put more barrels on the market," Ramirez told reporters. "The price has been moving quite a bit, which demonstrates (there

has been) speculative movement."

Earlier on Monday, US Energy Secretary Sam Bodman repeated his plea for more oil from top exporter Saudi Arabia. OPEC's has cautiously responded to Washing-

ton's requests so far.

Oil has fallen by more than 10 per cent from a record high of 100.09 US dollars a barrel hit early this month, easing some of the pressure on OPEC to raise supplies, analysts said.—MNA/Reuters

S Korea suggests further eco ties with Russia, DPRK

MOSCOW, 22 Jan— A special envoy from South Korea suggested on Monday the establishment of a northeast Asian economic bloc along with Russia and the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK), news agencies reported.

Lee Jae-oh, envoy of South Korean President-elect Lee Myung-bak, will discuss the South Korean president-elect's plan to create a northeast Asian economic community during his six-day visit to Russia.

"We propose establishing a joint peace and economic committee between South and North Korea and Russia, which could serve as a platform to discuss peace and economic issues in the region," *RIA* news agency quoted the senior diplomat as saying at a meeting with Konstantin Pulikovskiy, co-chair of a Russian-South Korean intergovernmental commission.

Lee, who is the fourth envoy to Japan, China, Russia and the United States, delivered a letter from his boss to the Russian President Vladimir Putin via Putin's foreign affairs adviser, *RIA* said.

China sends teams to ensure market supply

BEIJING, 23 Jan — China's central government has sent inspection teams to 22 provinces in a nationwide survey of efforts to ensure adequate market supply and stabilize prices of household commodities.

"The move aims to ensure the central government's policy will be carried out to the letter by discovering and solving grassroots problems," the State Council, or the Cabinet, said in a statement.

The survey would focus on the measures local authorities have taken to boost the production of grain, pork, milk and cooking oil and price fluctuations of these key commodities, it said.—MNA/Xinhua

Russia urges Hamas to stop missile attacks

Moscow, 23 Jan— Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov has urged Israel to lift its blockade of the Gaza Strip and urged Hamas to stop missile attacks against Israeli cities.

Lavrov made the remarks in a Monday telephone talks with Khaled Mashal, one of the leaders of Palestinian militant group Hamas that runs Gaza Strip, the Russian Foreign Ministry said in a statement posted on its website.

The top Russian diplomat “emphasized that Russia consistently stands for lifting the blockade of the Gaza Strip and for easing the position of the Palestinian civilian population”, it said.

“Simultaneously, it is necessary that the

interested parties should make maximum efforts to stop terror, violence and armed confrontation, creating a favourable environment for the process of Palestinian-Israeli political settlement,” said the statement.—MNA/Xinhua

Afghan blast kills NATO soldier, wounds five

KABUL, 22 Jan — A soldier of the NATO-led International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) was killed and five others sustained injuries when a roadside bomb struck their vehicle in south Afghanistan, a statement of the alliance released here Monday said.

“One ISAF soldier was killed and five soldiers were injured when their vehicles were involved in an explosion during a patrol in southern Afghanistan 20 January,” the statement said.

It also added that the soldiers’ injuries are not thought to be life threatening.

However, it did not disclose the exact place of the incident and the victims’ casualties by adding, “In accordance with ISAF policy, ISAF does not release the casualties’ nationality prior to the relevant national authority doing so.”—MNA/Xinhua

Thai coalition partners jostle for Cabinet posts

BANGKOK, 22 Jan— Thailand’s newly elected Parliament met for the first time on Monday as a six-party ruling coalition argued over Cabinet posts in the new civilian government in waiting.

Legislators were due to choose a prime minister later this week with People Power Party (PPP) firebrand leader Samak Sundaravej expected to lead a coalition commanding 315 of 480 seats in the House of Representatives, which convened on Monday nearly a month after the 23 December election.

The PPP, which backs ousted prime minister Thaksin Shinawatra and fell just short of an outright majority in the election, will get two-thirds of the 36 Cabinet posts, including the key finance, commerce and defence portfolios, party officials say.

“Nothing will stop Samak from becoming the prime minister. This is a reward for him leading the PPP to victory,” retired academic-turned-political commentator Sukhum Nualskul said.

PPP Secretary-General Surapong Suebwoonglee, whom Thai newspapers have tipped as a potential finance minister after other candidates turned down the post, would not confirm or deny his candidacy.

Slovenia’s Bajuk concerned about US economy

BRUSSELS, 23 Jan— Slovenian Finance Minister Andrej Bajuk expressed here on Monday his and his euro-zone colleagues’ concern over the prospect of the US economy.

“We are all concerned. We are following events on a daily basis,” Bajuk told reporters before a meeting

of euro-zone finance ministers.

“We hope it won’t be as bad as commentators say,” said the minister, whose country is currently holding the European Union rotating presidency.

EU Commissioner for Economic and Monetary Affairs Joaquin Almunia told reporters on

the same day before the meeting that the euro-zone economy would not be directly affected by a slowdown in the United States.

“Our economies in the past were more dependent on the US,” he said.

“I hope that the measures that the US Administration and the

Federal Reserve can adopt in the coming days can counter this risk of recession,” he added, referring to US President George Bush’s plans for a 150-billion-dollar package of measures to activate the economy and Federal Reserve’s expected cut of key interest rate in the months to come.—MNA/Xinhua

US planes bomb al-Qaeda safe haven south of Baghdad

BAGHDAD, 22 Jan — US warplanes dropped 30,000 pounds of bombs on a suspected al-Qaeda safe haven south of Baghdad, the US Air Force said, the latest in a series of air strikes aimed at disrupting the Sunni Islamist group’s operations. The US Air Force said the operation, which began on Sunday night and continued on Monday morning,

involved B-1 bombers and F/A-18 jets. It targeted Salman Pak, an area 35 kilometres (20 miles) south of Baghdad.

US and Iraqi forces launched an offensive against al-Qaeda on 8 January in Iraq’s four northern provinces and Baghdad’s southern out-

skirts. The US military has declared al-Qaeda the biggest threat to peace in Iraq. “This particular mission targeted an area where al-Qaeda laid obstacles in the way of improvised explosive devices and took up safe haven at the same time.

Clinton leads Obama among California Democrats

SAN FRANCISCO, 23 Jan— Presidential candidate Hillary Clinton holds a 12-point lead over Barack Obama among Democrats likely to vote in California's 5 February primary, according to poll results released on Tuesday.

Thirty-nine per cent said they would vote for Clinton, the Senator from New York, and 27 per cent said they would vote for Obama, a first-term Senator from Illinois, the survey conducted by The Field Poll showed.

Since December, each of the leading candidates has gained ground by pulling voters from John Edwards, who now polls at 10 per cent, and other candidates.

A relatively large number, 20 per cent, remain undecided. Voters who ranked health care, jobs and the economy as the campaign's most important issues were most likely to favour Clinton, whose lead is largest among women, Latinos and lower-income voters.

Voters who ranked the Iraq war and foreign policy as the most important issues were

most likely to favour Obama, who is preferred by Blacks, college graduates and Democratic primary voters with household incomes of 80,000 US dollars or more.

Both candidates are highly regarded by three-quarters of the Democratic voters, but 58 per cent said Clinton has the right experience for the presidency.

The accident took lives of five male

passengers and seven female, and caused injuries to six male and one female passengers.

The injured were rushed into Thayet Township People's Hospital where they are receiving medical treatment and necessary aids. — MNA

Car plunges from 8th floor of Jakarta building

JAKARTA, 23 Jan— A car plunged from a parking lot on the eighth floor of a building in the Indonesian capital on Tuesday, killing the driver who had dozed off with his foot on the accelerator, a security guard at the building said.

The driver, who was waiting for his employer, crashed through the parking lot's metal railing after he accidentally stepped on the accelerator with the engine running, the guard said.

The vehicle landed on a parked car.

It was the second such accident in Jakarta in less than a year.

Last year a family of three was killed when their car plunged from the sixth floor of a shopping mall's parking lot in south Jakarta.

6.2-magnitude quake off Sumatra

JAKARTA, 23 Jan— A strong earthquake has struck Indonesia's Nias Island west of Sumatra Island, causing panic and some damage, but no reports of casualties, an official at the country's meteorology agency said on Wednesday.

The magnitude 6.2 quake struck just after midnight, 172 kilometres (107 miles) west of Sibolga at a depth of 12 kilometres, the US Geological Survey said in a bulletin on its website.

"The epicentre was on Nias Island and caused panic, as well as cracking several houses, although there were no immediate reports of casualties," said Andri Gsetiaji at the meteorology agency in Jakarta.

A weaker aftershock later struck about 80

kilometres southwest of Gunungstoli, the capital of Nias, the official added.

Indonesia suffers frequent earthquakes since it lies on an area of intense seismic activity where a

number of tectonic plates collide. The Pacific Tsunami Warning Centre said there were no immediate tsunami warnings or watches in effect. — MNA/Reuters

Eight injured by carbon monoxide poisoning in W Canada

OTTAWA, 23 Jan— Eight residents of a seniors home in Canada's western Alberta Province were poisoned Monday after exhaust from a running car permeated the building with carbon monoxide, reports reaching here said.

Five of them were in critical condition when they were carried out the building, located in the community of Linden, about 100 kilometres northeast of Calgary.

They were taken by air ambulances to hospitals in provincial capital Edmonton and Calgary to receive treatment in hyperbaric chambers, where three have been upgraded to stable condition and two remain in critical condition.

About 35 paramedics and firefighters from communities around the small village rushed into the condo-style seniors home after a caretaker noticed an odd smell, police said.

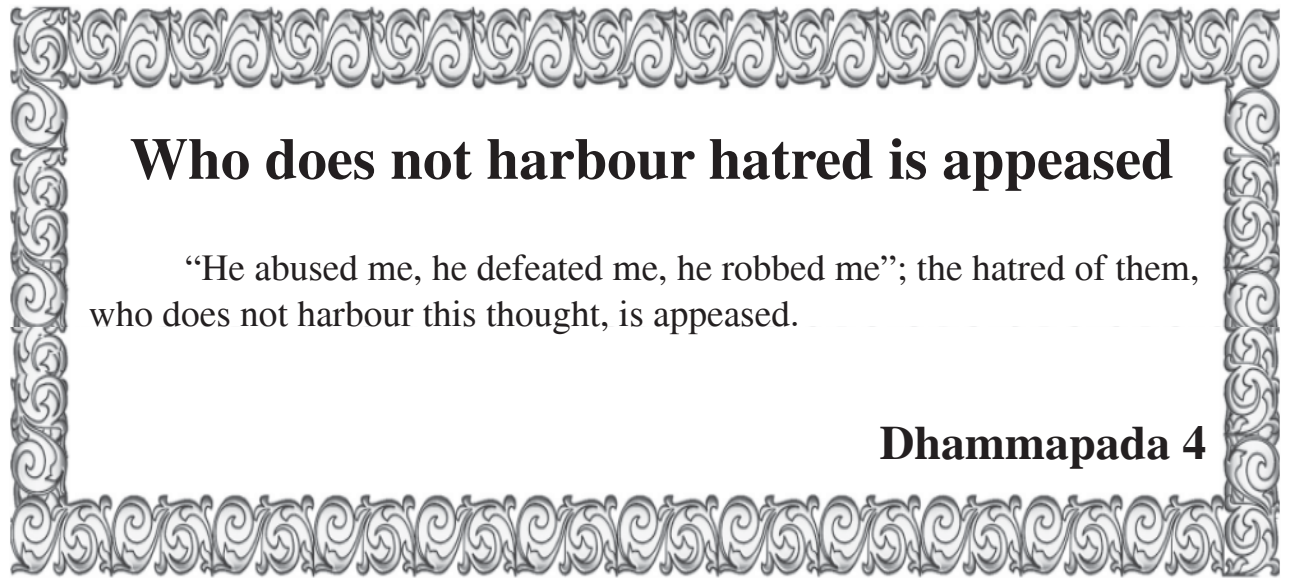
stituted separately. They effectively undertook the tasks for development of education, health, transport, agriculture and livestock breeding. Rural regions, border areas and border towns have developed, he said.

Five killed, 20 injured in botched Peru robbery

LIMA, 22 Jan—Five people were killed, including one police officer, and 20 others injured when thieves attacked two long-distance coaches in a mining area in the southern Peru province of Puno, Peruvian website El Comercio said Sunday.

Highway police chief Colonel Eduardo Artera told El Comercio that 12 men armed with muskets and pistols burst on to the vehicles and shot passengers at point blank range at Pasha bus garage, in Puno's Sina District, some 1,400 kilometres southeast of Peru's capital Lima and close to the Bolivian border.

The gunmen wanted to steal gold, silver and other property of the passengers, most of whom are miners.

By coincidence, two police officers aboard the buses returned fire killing one of the robbers. MNA/Xinhua

Singaporeans' health-care costs jump 6.2% in 2007

SINGAPORE, 23 Jan—Singaporeans' costs of health care shot up by 6.2 per cent in 2007, a big jump over the annual average of 2.4 per cent in the previous five years, local media reported Tuesday.

Health Minister Khaw Boon Wan attributed the increase to higher medical fees and prices of Chinese medicine, English-language daily The Straits Times reported.

The minister on Monday explained to the Parliament that the health-care

China's tycoon loses appeal against 16 years jail

BEIJING, 22 Jan—A Shanghai court on Monday upheld a 16-year jail sentence handed down to a corrupt property tycoon once named one of China's richest men, Xinhua news agency said. Zhou Zhengyi, who only completed a three-year jail term in 2006 for stock market fraud and falsifying documents, was found guilty in November of five charges including misappropriation of funds, bribery and forging VAT receipts.

The court at the time described the sentence as lenient and said it took into account the fact Zhou, 46, had confessed to some of his crimes and returned much of the embezzled funds. Shanghai Higher People's Court on Monday rejected Zhou's appeal against the sentence.

Zhou, a former snack shop owner who rose to become one of China's richest men with a net worth estimated at 320 million US dollars, was detained in a crackdown that followed the ousting of Shanghai's former Communist Party boss, Chen Liangyu.

Chen himself faces a criminal investigation for his part in a 3.7-billion-yuan (500-million-US-dollar) social security fund scandal. Dozens of other officials and executives have been jailed or investigated in connection with the case.— MNA/Reuters

Taleban kills six Afghan drivers, guards

KABUL, 22 Jan—Taleban insurgents attacked on Sunday afternoon trucks contracted with foreign troops for transporting construction materials, killing four drivers and two security guards in Gereshk District of southern Afghanistan's Helmand Province, a senior local police officer said.

"A group of militants

opened fire on the trucks, which were hired by the NATO-led International Security Assistance Force for transportation of construction materials in the region," a senior police officer in Helmand, who identified himself by one name Koka, told Xinhua.

As a result, six trucks were completely destroyed, four drivers and another two guards accompanying the trucks were killed, and three more guards were injured, the official said, adding that all casualties were Afghan nationals.

Qari Yousuf Ahmadi, a purported spokesman for the Taleban, told media that his outfit took the

responsibility, saying the Taleban fighters used the attack to punish those who were cooperating with foreign troops.

The Taleban, removed from power by the US-led invasion in late 2001, has waged years-long insurgency against the Afghan administration and continued to attack Afghan and foreign troops.

Rising militancy-related violence killed over 6,000 people in the post-Taleban nation last year and analysts and NATO commanders have expected an upsurge of guerilla-style attacks by Taleban militants in 2008.

Some 511 kilos of hashish seized in Turkey

DIYARBAKIR (Turkey), 22 Jan—Turkish police seized 511 kilos of hashish in operations launched in southeastern province of Diyarbakir and eastern province of Van on Monday, police sources told Xinhua.

Acting on a tip-off, the police launched operation in Diyarbakir Province and confiscated 246 kilos of hashish, which was going to be transferred to Turkey's largest city of Istanbul and the capital city of Ankara, according to the sources. The sources added that in another operation launched earlier in the day, the police stopped two cars in Van and confiscated 265 kilos of hashish in the vehicles. A total of 10 suspected smugglers were arrested during the operations, said the sources. Turkey is a key transit route for smuggling drugs from Asia and the Middle East to markets in Western Europe.

inflation rate was measured by the price changes of a basket of items and the cost of three had soared particularly, including fees in public and private hospitals; outpatient specialist fees in public health-care institutions; and the cost of Chinese herbs and treatment from a Chinese physician.

There were also such factors as higher oil prices causing imports to cost more; the rise in wages of health-care workers; and the goods and services tax (GST) going up from 5 per cent to 7 per cent last July, said the report.

The minister pledged that public health-care costs would always stay affordable, even though some inflation was inevitable. The government has given help in several ways to the needy, he added, such as absorbing the GST hike on their health-care bills, and reviewing Medishield to see if the national medical insurance scheme can cover bigger hospital bills.

Study: Weight loss surgery can cure diabetes

BEIJING, 23 Jan — A new study published in the Journal of the American Medical Association indicated that obesity surgery can cure diabetes, according to US media reports Tuesday.

In the study, Australian researchers found that patients who had surgery to reduce the size of their stomachs were five times more likely to see their diabetes disappear over the next two years, compared with patients who had standard diabetes care.

"It's the best therapy for diabetes that we have

today, and it's very low risk," said the study's lead author, Dr John Dixon of Monash University Medical School in Melbourne, Australia.

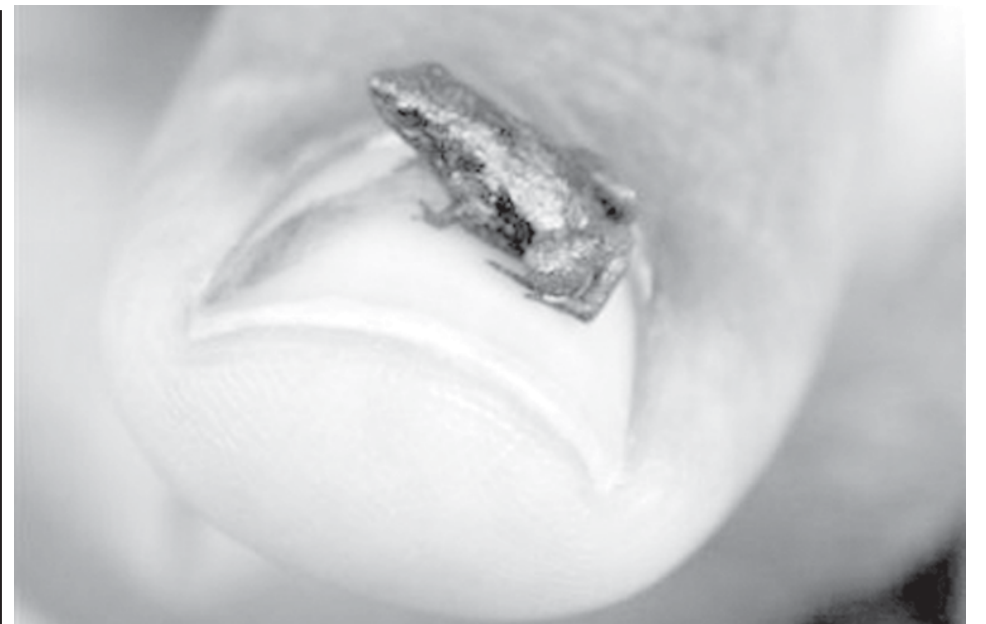
Dixon and colleagues studied 60 obese people with a body mass index greater than 30 but less than 40. Body mass index or BMI is a ratio of height and weight. A BMI of 30 or greater is considered obese.

All the patients were obese and had been diagnosed with type 2 diabetes during the past two years. Their average age was 47.

Half of the patients were given gastric band surgery, and the other group had the normal weight-loss treatments; through the study, the team wanted to see if surgically induced weight loss could be an effective treatment for type 2 diabetes.

Seventy-three percent of patients given gastric band surgery found their diabetes was in remission two years after the surgery. For those given normal weight-loss treatments, only 13 percent were able to send the disease into remission.

20 killed in blast in N China illegal coal mine

TAIYUAN, 22 Jan— A total of 20 people were killed following a blast in an illegal coal mine in north China's Shanxi Province late Sunday, local authorities said on Monday.

The blast occurred at around 9 pm Sunday in Weijialing Coal Mine in Fenxi County, Linfen City. The rescue operation has

been concluded. According to Shanxi Work Safety Administration, the mine was opened in 2004 but has been closed for failing to meet safety requirements. Illegal miners took the opportunity afforded by heavy snow cutting the area off to sneak into the mine at about 7 pm on

Sunday. It was not immediately known how many people were in the mine as the illegal mine's foreman was killed in the blast. Police are trying to catch the organizers of the illegal mining activities.

Drinking water freezes, affecting 100,000 in China

WUHAN, 22 Jan— More than 100,000 people are enduring a drinking water shortage in central China's Hubei Province since Thursday when the plunging temperature froze supply. The low temperature, along with continuous heavy snowfall, burst water pipes and frozen hydrometers in Wuhan, the Hubei capital.

About 2,000 citizens have contact a water-supply hotline for help, a record high in recent years, according to the Wuhan Water Bureau. "The water supply here has been cut off for four days since the water tank in our building froze. We have had to fetch water from downstairs ever since," said a local resident. — MNA/Xinhua

World genomes project to promote research on human diseases

SHENZHEN, 22 Jan — Chinese, US and British scientists on Tuesday launched the 1000 Genomes Project, with the aim to promote research on human diseases.

The project will involve sequencing the genomes of at least a thousand people from around the world to create the most detailed and medically useful picture to date of human genetic variation.

It will receive major support from the Wellcome Trust Sanger Institute in Hinxton, England, the Beijing Genomics Institute (BGI) Shenzhen, China and the National Human Genome Research Institute (NHGRI), part of the US National Institutes of Health (NIH).

Drawing on the expertise of multidisciplinary research teams,

the 1000 Genomes Project will develop a new map of the human genome that will provide a view of biomedically relevant DNA variations at a resolution unmatched by current resources.

Using the map, scientists will work out detail information on genome containing genetic variants that are associated with risk of common human diseases, such as diabetes, coronary artery disease, prostate and breast cancer, rheumatoid arthritis, inflammatory bowel disease and age-related macular degeneration.

The new map would enable researchers to more quickly zero in on disease-related genetic variants, speeding efforts to use genetic information to develop new strategies for diagnosing, treating and preventing common diseases.

Fulham, who have not won in their last 13 games, had defender Dejan Sefanovic sent off in extra time and went down 5-3 on penalties.

In the fourth round this weekend Rovers will visit Barnet, who upset League One Swindon after they finished 1-1 after extra time.

Swindon contrived to miss the four penalties they took in the shootout, allowing the League Two (fourth division) side to advance by scoring two.

Derby County, bottom of the Premier League, scraped into a fourth-round home game with Preston North End after they finished level at 1-1 after extra time against Sheffield Wednesday at a sodden Hillsborough. — MNA/Reuters

Nations-Champions Egypt crush Cameroon 4-2

KUMASI, 23 Jan — Mohamed Zidan scored a first-half double as title holders Egypt made an impressive start in the African Nations Cup with a 4-2 thrashing of Cameroon on Tuesday.

The striker netted in the 17th minute and in first half stoppage time as Egypt went 3-0 up at the interval in the Group C game at Kumasi's Baba Yara stadium.

Midfielder Hosni Abd Rabou also scored twice, putting Egypt ahead with a 14th-minute penalty and adding a powerful shot nine minutes from time.

Samuel Eto'o pulled two back for Cameroon, heading in a cross six minutes into the second half and converting a penalty just before the final whistle.

Egypt showed the title they won two years ago on home turf, their fifth all told, was no fluke and sent a serious warning to the other contenders.

"We are not here just to be part of the tournament, we are here to win a second successive title," Zidan told Ghanaian television channel TV3.

"We give everything, we have to be in the final in Accra."

Stunning Sharapova batters top seed Henin

MELBOURNE, 23 Jan — Russian Maria Sharapova produced a blistering performance to overpower world number one Justine Henin 6-4, 6-0 in the Australian Open quarter-finals on Tuesday.

The fifth seed was in ebullient mood, smashing 30 winners as she took a tight first set and ripped through the second to line up a semi-final against Serbian third seed Jelena Jankovic.

"It's funny because I felt like I was in my own bubble today," Sharapova said in a courtside interview.

"It's amazing when you go out on the court and feel you're doing the right things to beat such an amazing player as her. It's just incredible."

Sharapova, runner-up in Melbourne last year, had lost six of her eight meetings with top seed Henin but she came out firing on all cylinders, storming to a 5-2 lead.

Targeting the Belgian's backhand, considered to be her strength, Sharapova was able to dictate the majority of rallies, keeping Henin pinned to the baseline and never allowing her to take control.

Spurs thump Arsenal 5-1 to reach League Cup final

LONDON, 23 Jan — Tottenham Hotspur reached the League Cup final after ending a nine-year winless streak against Arsenal on Tuesday, an emphatic 5-1 victory earning a 6-2 aggregate triumph over their north London neighbours.

Tottenham had not beaten Arsenal in 21 games, including last year's semi-finals, but were always in command at White Hart Lane after Jermaine Jenas put them 1-0 up after three minutes of the second leg.

A Nicklas Bendtner own goal in the 27th was followed by a breakaway third by Robbie Keane three minutes into the second half as Arsenal's reserve team had no answers. Aaron Lennon and Steed Malbranque were also on target.

Substitute Emmanuel Adebayor pulled one back for last season's runners-up but Spurs never looked in danger and will face holders Chelsea or Everton, who meet at Goodison Park on Wednesday with the Londoners 2-1 up, in the February 24 final at Wembley.

Heavy snow kills 17, cuts power in many areas of China

BEIJING, 22 Jan—China has beefed up disaster alleviation work as an unusually heavy snowfall claimed at least 17 lives and caused widespread traffic and power disruption.

The death toll increased by two after a car collided with a truck on an ice-covered road on Monday night in Wuhan, capital of central China's Hubei Province, leaving two dead and five others injured.

Before that, six people were confirmed dead in buildings collapsed by bad weather in Hubei and Anhui provinces and nine others died in weather-related traffic accidents in Hubei.

In southwestern Gui-

zhou, power has been cut off in nine counties because of grid damage caused by the freezing rainy weather.

In eastern Anhui, more than 3 million people have been affected by a heavy snow from Friday through Sunday, which caused snow drifts of up to 50 centimeters in certain areas. A total of 3,635 houses collapsed under the weight of snow, according to the provincial disaster relief office.—Internet

Mexico City starts grope-free buses for women

MEXICO CITY, 23 Jan— Mexico City has started a women-only bus service to protect female passengers from groping and verbal abuse common on the city's packed public transportation system.

Millions of people cram into subway trains and buses in the Mexican capital, one of the world's largest cities, and women have long complained of abuse from men taking advantage of over-crowding to sneak in an inappropriate grab.

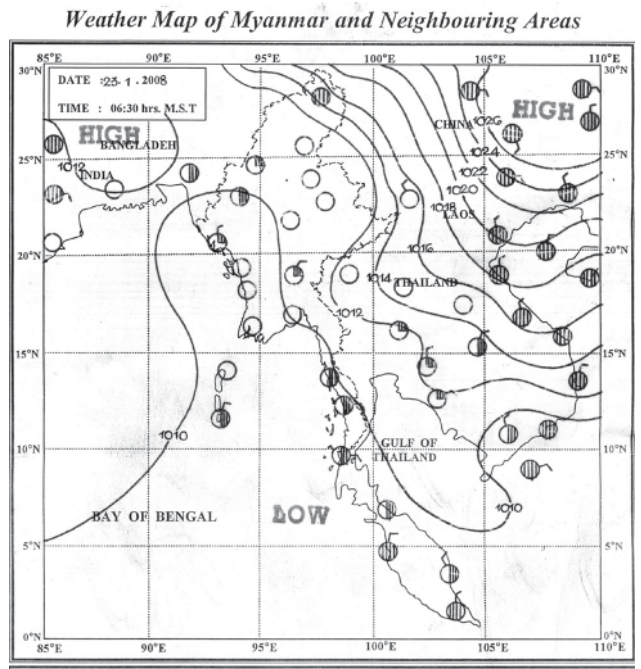
"One time a man stuck his hand up my skirt. They grab your butt. It's gross," said 27-year-old office assistant Lourdes Zendejas, who waited 20 minutes during the evening rush hour to catch one of the new buses.

The special buses pull up at ordinary stops but have large pink "women only" signs on the front and side. They were added to two busy routes last week and the city government plans to expand the programme to 15 other

routes by April. Mexico City's transport system, which also includes hundreds of privately operated "micro" buses, carries twice as many riders as New York's.

"We were constantly receiving complaints of women being leered at, kissed or followed," said Carlos Cervantes, spokesman for the city's public bus system.

Prime Minister General Thein Sein inspects development of Bhamo in Kachin State

Prime Minister urges faculty members to organize youth, parents to utilize sound foundations of respective regions

NAY PYI TAW, 23 Jan — Chairman of Work Committee for Development of Border Areas and National Races Prime Minister General Thein Sein, accompanied by Member of the SPDC Lt-Gen Ye Myint, Chairman of Sagaing Division PDC Commander of North-West Command Brig-Gen Myint Soe, ministers, deputy ministers, the director-general

of the Government Office and departmental heads, left Mandalay International Airport on 20 January morning and arrived at Bhamo Airport of Kachin State at 10.20 am.

The Prime Minister and party were welcomed by Chairman of Kachin State PDC Commander of Northern Command Maj-Gen Ohn Myint, senior military officers and departmental officials.

At the lounge of the airport, Minister for Transport Maj-Gen Thein Swe reported on matters related to the runway extension project of Bhamo Airport.

Director-General U Tun Hlaing of Department of Civil Aviation briefed the Prime Minister on extension of the runway. After attending to the needs, the Prime Minister instructed officials to grow trees and flowery plants for greening the airport's environs and construct the runway meeting set standards.

The runway of Bhamo Airport was 5,500 feet long and 100 feet wide. So far, the runway has been extended to the 7,500 feet long one.

At University of Computer Studies (Bhamo), Acting Principal Dr Nan Saw Kalyar reported to the Prime Minister on academic and management matters of the university.

After fulfilling the requirements, the Prime Minister heard reports on the ratio of faculty members to students and producing of graduates.

In his instructions, the Prime Minister urged the faculty members to organize the youth and parents to utilize sound foundations of the regions, to train the students to have theoretical and practical skills, to constantly study respective subjects for uplift of work proficiency and to disseminate knowledge to the students to abide by laws, rules and regulations.

Afterwards, the Prime Minister presented gifts to the faculty members.

At the site for construction of the three-storey main building of the university, officials of Asia Metal Construction Co Ltd reported on facts about the project. The Prime Minister gave necessary instructions.

The three-storey main building can accommodate 300 students, and it will be 513 feet long, 358 feet wide and 66 feet high building.
