## Democrats accuse Bush of fanning terrorism fears

WASHINGTON, 17 Feb — Democrats accused US President Bush on Saturday of fanning terrorism fears shamelessly as he was about to lose certain authority to wiretap foreign suspects without a court warrant.

Bush, for his part, flailed the Democratic-controlled House of Representatives for what he called putting US security at risk for political motives in an election year.

The Democratic leaders of the House and Senate, responding to a Republican blitz on the issue, said there should be no question in anyone's mind that US intelligence agencies retained the right to take "all actions necessary to protect" US security. "For anyone to

suggest otherwise is irresponsible and totally inaccurate," Senate Democratic leader Harry Reid of Nevada and House Speaker Nancy Pelosi of California said in a joint statement.

Senator Sheldon Whitehouse of Rhode Island, in the Democratic Party response to Bush's weekly radio address, added, "We know this

President dislikes compromise, but this time he has taken his stubborn approach too far."

"He is whipping up false fears, and creating artificial confrontation," said Whitehouse, a former federal prosecutor and Rhode Island attorney general who serves on the Senate intelligence and judiciary committees.

WELLINGTON, 17 Feb — An explosion at an Auckland restaurant caused furniture and debris to be strewn across the road early Sunday morning, New Zealand police said.

Police said the explosion, at Cafe Hasan Baba restaurant in the Auckland suburb of Howick, occurred just after

3:00 am local time (1400 GMT Saturday). No one was injured in the explosion or resulting fire.

Furniture was spread over a nearby street and cemetery.

Fire safety officers were investigating the cause of the explosion and fire.—Internet

## Death toll of suicide attack in Pakistan's tribal area rises to 46

ISLAMABAD, 17 Feb — The death toll of a suicide attack in northwestern Pakistan's tribal area has risen to 46 on Sunday, local TV channel DAWN NEWS reported.

The explosion took place near the election office of an independent candidate in Parachinar of Kurram tribal agency Saturday, the report said, adding that 46 people were killed and over 100 others injured in the attack.

The government has imposed curfew and

deployed army to maintain order in Parachinar after the suicide attack occurred.

The political agent of Kurram Agency Zaheerul Islam was quoted by the Associated Press of Pakistan as saying that the

bomb was planted in a car parked outside the election office of national assembly candidate Riaz Hussain Shah. He was addressing an election meeting inside the office when the blast occurred.—Internet

## Tanzanians demonstrate against Bush visit

DAR-ES-SALAAM, 17 Feb — About 2,000 Tanzanians marched through Tanzania's capital on Friday and burned US flags in protest against a visit by President George W Bush.

Chanting "Bush is an oil thief" and "evil is not a foreign policy", the demonstrators, tried to march from the city's centre to the US Embassy on its northern outskirts.

They were diverted to open ground by a small force of

police but tore down US flags erected for Bush's visit this weekend and burned them.

The police did not

intervene and there was no violence. The protesters chanted "Who is a terrorist? Bush".

## Village defence volunteer killed in

### Thai South

BANGKOK, 17 Feb — A village defence volunteer was killed apparently by insurgents inside a teashop in Thailand's southern border province of Pattani Saturday morning.

Maduanwar Dohing, 32, was killed inside a teashop in Phorming village of Panare district at 7:00 am (2400 GMT), according to local

newspaper *The Nation's* website.

Police were quoted as saying that two men arrived on a motorcycle and opened fire at Maduanwar, a village defence volunteer, and fled on the motorcycle.

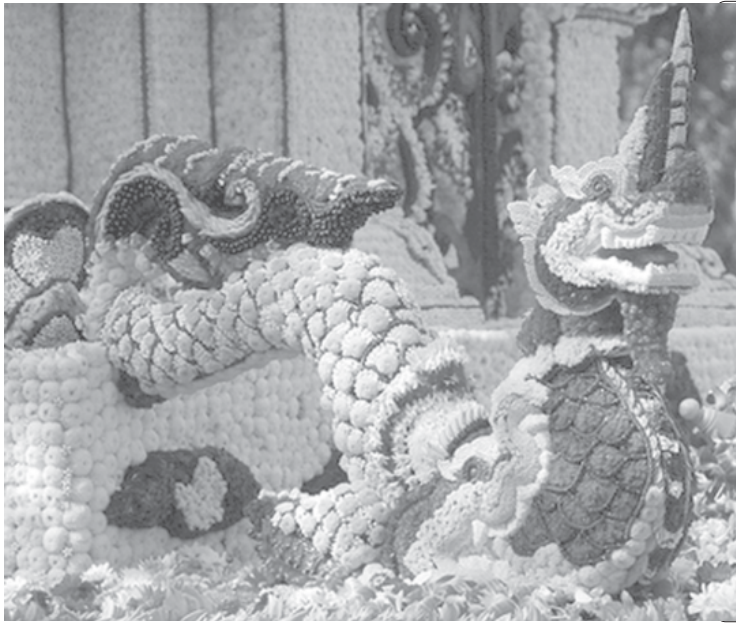
Also on Saturday morning, a suspected insurgent was injured during a gunfight with soldiers in Narathiwat

Province. The shooting occurred when about 50 soldiers searched the province's Borngo village for suspects.

When the soldiers approached a house, about five armed men ran out and fired at the soldiers. After the insurgents retreated, soldiers found a suspect left behind.

## DPRK urges US to withdraw forces from South Korea

PYONGYANG, 16 Feb — The Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK) Friday criticized the United States for deploying its Armed Forces in South Korea, and urged Washington to withdraw its troops from the Korean Peninsula as soon as possible.

"The US forces' presence in South Korea poses an actual danger to

ensuring peace on the Korean Peninsula," said a commentary filed by the official *Korean Central News Agency* (KCNA).

"If the United States truly wants peace and stability on the Korean Peninsula, it had better make a bold decision to pull its forces out of South Korea at an early date as this is a touchstone for showing its will for

peace," the commentary added. Around 28,000 US troops are stationed in South Korea in a legacy of the 1950-53 Korean War, leaving the two Koreas technically in a state of conflict.

The number of American troops is set to decline to 25,000 by 2008 as part of the Pentagon's worldwide realignment of its forces.—MNA/Xinhua

## Protests over rape case continue in Okinawa

TOKYO, 16 Feb — Protests over a US Marine's rape of a minor girl in Okinawa Prefecture continued Friday on the southern Japanese island, with nine local municipal assemblies passing resolution condemning the heinous crime.

The assembly of Futenma, where the largest US air force base in the Far East is located, demanded a quick finding of truth of the case and serious punishment for the criminal, according to

Japanese media.

It also requested the US forces to apologize to and compensate the victim, and take effective measures to fundamentally prevent similar incidents from happening again.

Up to now, a total of 16 local assemblies has passed documents condemning the case.

Representatives of the Okinawa Prefectural Assembly gathered in front of a US military base in central Okinawa,

demanding improved moral education and stricter discipline for the troops. In a statement released earlier in the day, the Okinawa Lawyers Association asked the Japanese and the US Government come up with swift and concrete plan for the realignment and reduction of Okinawa-based US forces, and take radical measures to prevent fatal crimes involving US military personnel.

## Pakistan police arrest another suspect in Bhutto case

ISLAMABAD, 16 Feb — Pakistani police arrested on Friday another suspect in connection with the assassination of former prime minister Benazir Bhutto, a senior police investigator said.

"Yes, we have arrested a suspect and we are interrogating him," said the investigator, who declined to be identified.

He identified the

suspect as Abdul Rashid but declined to give further details.

Private Geo Television said Rashid was suspected of providing "arms and ammunition" to those involved in the attack on Bhutto.

The two-time prime minister was killed in a gun and bomb attack in the city of Rawalpindi on 27 December as she left

an election rally.

Television footage showed a man firing three shots from a pistol at Bhutto moments before a bomb went off.

Pakistani and US intelligence officials have blamed Baitullah Mehsud, an al-Qaeda-linked militant commander based in a tribal region on the Afghan border, for the assassination.—MNA/Reuters

## Lack of kit blamed for British soldier's death

LONDON, 16 Feb — A British soldier died after being sent into combat in Afghanistan with a lack of basic equipment, a coroner said on Friday.

Captain James Philipson of seven Parachute Regiment Royal Horse Artillery was shot in the head in a gunfight with the Taliban in June 2006. The 29-year-old from Hertfordshire was the

first casualty after troops were deployed to the violent southern province of Helmand, where the Taliban remains strong.

Assistant coroner for Oxfordshire Andrew Walker said he died after an unforgivable "breach of trust between the soldiers and those who govern them".

The inquest at Oxford heard that troops had

repeatedly complained about a lack of proper equipment, in particular standard night-vision kits.

Four kits had to be shared between as many as 30 men, the inquest heard.

The Taliban were armed with multiple rocket-propelled grenade launchers and other firepower, it heard. "They (the soldiers) were defeated not by the terrorists but by the lack of basic equipment," Walker was quoted by the BBC as saying at the end of the inquest.

He said sending troops into a combat zone without basic kit was "unforgivable and inexcusable", he added.—MNA/Reuters

## US university shooting death toll rises to seven

WASHINGTON, 16 Feb — One more person injured in the shooting rampage at Northern Illinois University (NIU) has died in hospital, bringing the total number of those killed to seven, the authorities said Friday.

The shooting took place shortly after 3 pm (2100 GMT) Thursday when the gunman, a young, White male all dressed in black, walked out from behind a screen in a geology class taking place in 600-seat lecture hall and opened fire, the university's president, John Peters, told a Press conference.

The gunman fired 20 to 30 shots at the some 160 students sitting in the hall before killing himself, he said.—MNA/Xinhua

## US economy “on the edge” of a recession

BEIJING, 16 Feb — Former Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan said the US economy is on the verge of its first recession in six years as falling home values hurt consumer spending.

“We are clearly on the edge,” Greenspan told a group of energy-industry executives at the Cambridge Energy Research Associates’ 27th annual CERAWEEK conference in Houston. He reiterated comments from last month that the odds of an economic contraction are “50 percent or better”.

Greenspan’s view has evolved from a year ago, when he saw a one-in-three chance of a recession, citing slowing profit growth and becoming one of the first economists to warn of the risk. Now, Wall Street firms including Merrill Lynch & Co and Goldman Sachs Group Inc are forecasting a contraction in the aftermath of the worst

housing downturn in a quarter century.

Fed Chairman Ben S Bernanke, Greenspan’s successor, acknowledged “downside” risks to the expansion on Thursday, while telling lawmakers he expects growth to pick up later this year. He reiterated the central bank is prepared to take “timely” action to aid the

economy as needed.

“While we are at stall speed in the US at the moment, we haven’t yet seen the discontinuity that characterizes recession,” Greenspan said during a question-and-answer session on Thursday. “American business was in such extra-good shape before this problem hit.

## China-Czech bilateral trade surges 61.9% in 2007

BEIJING, 17 Feb — Bilateral trade volume between China and the Czech Republic rocketed 61.9 per cent year on year to 9.9 billion US dollars, Petr Vavra, the Czech Embassy in Beijing’s commercial and economic section head, told *Xinhua* on Friday.

The Czech Republic

imported goods from China equaling 9.2 billion US dollars in 2007, up 61.1 per cent compared with 2006. This figure accounted for 7.8 per cent of the total Czech imports volume.

“China has become an increasingly important Czech’s supplier of machinery and electronic

products as well as consumer goods, including shoes, toys and glasses,” said Vavra.

The Czech Republic’s exports to China reached 700 million US dollars last year, up 73.7 per cent year on year, with a trade deficit of 8.5 billion US dollars.

## Sinopec buys 64 gas stations from private Tianfa Group

BEIJING, 17 Feb — Sinopec, the country’s largest oil refiner, said on its website on Friday that its Hubei branch company in central China had signed an agreement to purchase 64 gas stations from the private-owned Hubei Tianfa Group.

The total assets of these

stations stood at 140 million yuan (19.51 million US dollars) after evaluation.

Hubei branch company of Sinopec has total assets of nearly five billion yuan and more than 1,800 filling stations.

Founded in 1988, Tianfa Group is a conglomerate engaged in

petroleum businesses, petrochemical development, papermaking and agricultural by-products.

It is the largest shareholder of the Shenzhen-listed Tianfa Petroleum, the country’s largest listed private oil firm.

## No law to allow foreigners to buy land in Cambodia

PHNOM PENH, 16 Feb — Cambodia has so far prepared no law to allow foreigners to buy land on their own in the kingdom, said Prime Minister Hun Sen on Thursday at a school inauguration ceremony in Kampong Speu Province. “We have never thought and dreamt to organize draft law to allow foreigners to buy land in our country,” he

said. Some people wanted to criticize and tarnish the government before the general election on July 27, by gossiping that the government is planning draft law for foreigners to purchase land on their own in the kingdom, he said.

“If we have such a draft law, our neighbouring countries will buy all our land along the borders,” he said. — MNA/Xinhua

## US food sales to Cuba hit new peak in 2007

HAVANA, 17 Feb — American producers sold 437.5 million US dollars in food to Cuba in 2007, a new peak in value despite Cuban complaints that the Bush Administration is hindering trade.

The main items were corn, chicken, wheat, soybean products and rice, according to the New York-based US-Cuba Trade and Economic Council, which monitors trade with Cuba.

Sales of agricultural

products to Cuba, allowed under an exception to the US embargo placed on Fidel Castro’s leftist government back in 1962, had fallen to 340.4 million US dollars in 2006 in a two-year decline.

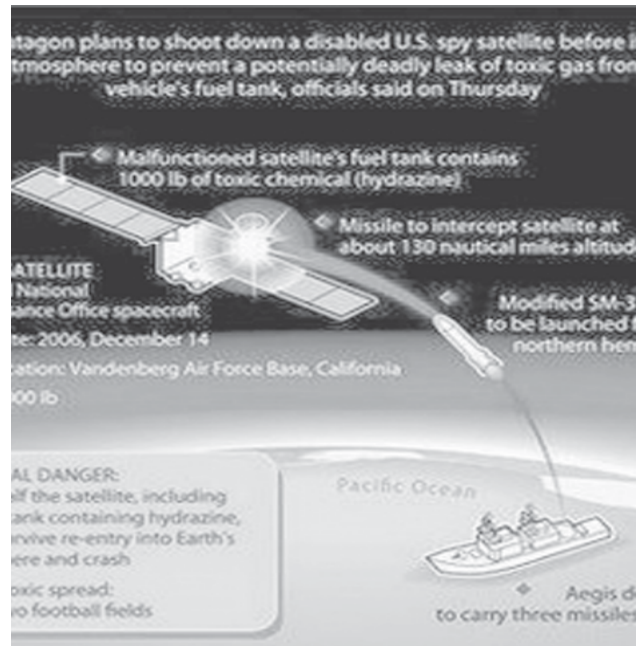
Cuba’s food import agency Alimport blamed restrictions introduced by the Bush Administration, such as demanding Cuban payment prior to shipment, for causing US

sales to fall from a 2004 peak.

Alimport president Pedro Alvarez said the increased value of Cuban purchases last year reflect higher world food prices, not greater volume, and said trade with United States is flat.

Still, the fact is that the United States has remained Cuba’s main supplier of food and farm products, with sales totalling 1.99 billion US dollars since they began in 2001. — MNA/Reuters

## US to compensate countries hit by satellite debris

GENEVA, 16 Feb — The United States said on Friday that it would compensate countries whose territory might be hit by debris of an inoperable US spy satellite that the Pentagon plans to shoot down.

Christina Rocca, US ambassador for disarmament affairs, said the United States had recently modified three SM-3 missiles and three US Navy ships to try to shoot down the satellite, which is currently in a decaying orbit.

Whether the effort succeeds or fails, the United States is prepared to offer assistance to countries to mitigate the consequences of any satellite debris impacts on their territory, Rocca told the Geneva-based Conference on Disarmament.

She added that if the action fails, the satellite is expected to make an uncontrolled re-entry into the Earth's atmosphere on or about 6 March in any region on the Earth's surface between 58.5 degrees North and 58.5 degrees South Latitudes. —MNA/Xinhua

## Delhi policeman arrested in kidney racket scandal

NEW DELHI, 16 Feb — An Indian police inspector has been arrested for taking bribes from doctors accused of running an illegal kidney transplant racket on the outskirts of New Delhi, police said on Friday.

Ravinder Singh, an assistant sub-inspector in Delhi's police force, is accused of taking a two-million-rupee (50,000-US-dollar) bribe to let off doctors alleged to have forced poor labourers into donating their kidneys.

Singh and his colleagues visited the doctors on 7 January after

receiving complaints, said police spokesman Rajan Bhagat.

"Instead of booking them under laws they let them off on a bribe," he said. Police in Gurgaon, one of Delhi's satellite cities, broke up the ring at the end of January.

## Turkey sends humanitarian aid to Iraq

ANKARA, 17 Feb — Turkish Red Crescent sent seven trucks loaded with 85 tons of humanitarian aid to Iraq on Friday, the semi-official *Anatolia* news agency reported.

"We will distribute the aid in Mosul and Tal Afar," Omer Tasli, director general of Turkish Red Crescent, was quoted as saying, adding that they also sent one communication vehicle and three personnel to the war-torn country.

Tasli continued that the organization would also send 23 tons of medicine and medical equipment, as well as 40 tons of serums to the region.

## Taleban kills four police, takes away two in S-W Afghanistan

KABUL, 16 Feb — Taleban fighters attacked a police patrol, killing four policemen, wounding two others and taking away two more in southwestern Afghan province of Nimruz, provincial governor said on Friday.

The ambush on police vehicle took place Thursday evening in Chakhansur District of Nimruz, provincial governor Ghulam Dastagir Azad told *Xinhua* via phone.

Earlier, a purported spokesman for the Taleban Qari Yousuf Ahmadi told *Xinhua* via phone from an unknown location that the outfit's fighters killed four policemen, kidnapped two others and captured six machine guns during the attack.

## Coach accident kills three, injures 14 in Vietnam

HANOI, 16 Feb — Three people have been killed and 14 others seriously injured as two inter-provincial coaches collided head-on in Vietnam's central Thua Thien Hue Province, local newspaper *Young People* reported on Friday.

The accident occurred in Phong Dien District on Thursday, killing two passengers instantly. Another passenger died in hospital.

## Quake jolts Mideast, injures three in Lebanon

BEIRUT, 16 Feb — An earthquake shook the Middle East on Friday, damaging buildings in south Lebanon where three people were injured.

The earthquake of magnitude 5.0 had an epicentre 15 kilometres (nine miles) northeast of the Lebanese coastal city of Tyre, according to the US Geological Survey website ([www.usgs.gov](http://www.usgs.gov)).

The tremor was felt across Lebanon, Israel, the Palestinian territories and in the Syrian capital of Damascus. —MNA/Reuters

## Expanding US Service workers union backs Obama

added that the labour group also had "enormous respect" for Obama's chief rival for the Democratic presidential nomination, Senator Hillary Clinton. The SEIU, one of the fastest-growing labour organizations in North America, represents health care and other service

industry workers. The endorsement will allow Obama to tap into the union's organizational resources and help him in his battle for the Democratic presidential nomination against Clinton going into the 4 March primaries in Texas and Ohio.

At the lounge of Sittway Airport, Minister for Transport Maj-Gen Thein Swe reported to the Prime Minister on facts about the airport, completion of the extended building, extension of the runway and the apron, tarmacking of asphalt concrete along the runway.

Rakhine State has an area of over 14000 square miles with a population of more than three million who have been residing together since ancient times. The

state is covered with hills and mountains and forests and it has vast stretches of coastline with rich marine resources. It can produce rice, meat and fish and marine products not only for self-sufficiency but also for sales on commercial scale.

## Russia voices concern about US spy satellite situation

Moscow, 17 Feb — The Russian Defence Ministry expressed concern on Saturday about Washington's decision to destroy its damaged intelligence-gathering satellite with air defence systems.

Washington's decision to liquidate the spacecraft and the hastiness with which the Pentagon is trying to destroy its satellite raise a number of questions, said the Defence Ministry's Department of Information and Public Relations.

"In particular, there are not enough arguments to substantiate the decision for intercepting the falling satellite with air defence systems," *ITAR-TASS* news agency quoted the department as saying.

In addition, the United States has not provided "a comparative assessment of the consequences of intercepting the satellite in orbit and its uncontrolled descent", said the ministry.

The ministry said the operation to destroy a US spy satellite could prove to be the testing of an anti-satellite

weapon, the *ITAR-TASS* reported.

"Essentially, speculations about the danger of the satellite hide preparations for the classical testing of an anti-satellite weapon," it said.

"Such testing essentially means the creation of a new type of strategic weans," it added.

The United States plans to shoot down a malfunctioning spy satellite carrying toxic fuel, known by its military designation as USA 193.

The satellite, launched in December 2006, lost power and its central computer failed almost immediately afterward, leaving it uncontrollable.

Left alone, the satellite would be expected to hit earth during the first week of March.

Military and administration officials said the satellite is carrying fuel called hydrazine that could injure or even kill people who are near it when it hits the ground.

Indonesian Air Force chief Vice Marshal Subandrio received US Under Secretary of the Air Force for International Affairs Bruce S Lemkin for a closed-door meeting on Friday, aimed at procuring new defence equipment for Indonesia,

particularly combat and personnel carrier planes.

"We'll consider purchases for the 2010-2014 period," Air Force spokesman Rear Marshall Soenaryo was quoted by English-language daily *The Jakarta Post* as saying.

He said the latest version of *F-16* jet fighters was a necessary replacement for the Air Force's aging fleet.

He said the Air Force would be able to save maintenance fees allocated between 2008-2019 by having the new jet fighters.

## Kiribati declares world's largest marine reserve

WELLINGTON, 17 Feb — The tiny Pacific island nation of Kiribati has declared the world's largest marine protected area, the Suva-based *Pacnews* reported on Friday.

The Phoenix Islands Protected Area (PIPA), a California-sized ocean wilderness, includes pristine reefs and eight coral atolls teeming with fish and birds.

It lies about halfway between Hawaii and Fiji and also includes undersea mountains. It would conserve one of the Earth's last intact oceanic coral archipelago ecosystems.

Kiribati Environment Minister Tetapo Nakara said the government wanted to conserve the area's "biological diversity".—MNA/Xinhua

## Precision clock traps atoms in light to keep time

CHICAGO, 17 Feb — US physicists have made a clock so accurate it will neither gain nor lose even a second in more than 200 million years, a finding sure to please even the most punctually minded.

The clock, described in the Friday issue of the journal *Science*, outperforms the official atomic clock used by the US Commerce Department's National Institute of Standards and Technology, which promises to keep accurate time down to the second for 80 million years.

The new atomic clock is vying for the title of world's most accurate with another experimental clock developed in the same lab at the Joint Institute for Laboratory Astrophysics, a collaboration between NIST and the University of Colorado in Boulder.

## Wal-Mart, rivals pick Blu-ray in HD DVD disaster

NEW YORK, 17 Feb — Wal-Mart Stores Inc on Friday abandoned the flailing HD DVD format, potentially ending a war over next-generation DVDs as it joined Best Buy and Netflix in supporting rival Blu-ray technology.

The format war between Toshiba Corp-backed HD DVD and Sony Corp's Blu-ray, often compared to the Betamax-VHS battle in the 1980s, has slowed the development of what is expected to be a multibillion-dollar high-definition DVD industry.

It also has been a thorn in the side of retailers, which have had to commit shelf space to devices from both camps even as they field complaints from customers frustrated that some films come out in HD DVD while others are released in Blu-ray.

**Auction nets over \$40m for AIDS in Africa**

NEW YORK, 16 Feb — Contemporary art collectors opened their wallets on Thursday and shelled out 42.6 million US dollars at a Valentine's Day charity auction spearheaded by rocker Bono and British artist Damien Hirst to benefit the fight against AIDS in Africa. Spirited bidding and prices far in excess of pre-sale estimates marked "The (Red) Auction" at Sotheby's, where all but one of the 83 contemporary works, each donated by the artists or their estates, found buyers.

The 42,584,300-US-dollar total easily eclipsed even the highest expectations of about 29 million US dollars for the

sale, which Sotheby's said was among the biggest single charity events in history.

Proceeds from the sale were earmarked for the United Nations' Global Fund's fight against AIDS in Africa in conjunction with Bono's "Red" brand, wherein products from major corporations including Apple, the Gap, Microsoft and Hallmark have generated 58 million US dollars for AIDS.

"This was a really historic night," said Bono, sporting his trademark sunglasses. "I'm really very, very moved," he said, having "seen people dying for lack of the two pills a day" it takes to treat AIDS.

**Japan children to spend more time on math, science**

TOKYO, 16 Feb — Japanese schoolchildren will spend more time on core subjects such as math and science under guidelines unveiled on Friday, in an effort to boost academic standards months after the country slipped in global education rankings.

The changes, to be implemented gradually from next year, reverse reforms implemented in 2000 to create a more

"relaxed" environment that would foster creativity and reduce rote learning. An OECD survey published in December showed Japanese 15-year-olds fell to sixth place from second among 57 countries in science, to 10th place from sixth in maths and to 15th from 14th in reading.

The new guidelines, which *Kyodo* news agency said would be formalized in March after

a period of public comment, would also strengthen "moral education" but stopped short of making ethics a formal classroom subject, as many conservatives had advocated. "Many people recognize the need for ethics education," Prime Minister Yasuo Fukuda told reporters. "There are various ways to do this even without making it a formal subject."

**DPRK voices strong stand against US provocation**

PYONGYANG, 16 Feb — Kim Yong-nam, top legislator of the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK), Friday vowed to take strong counter-measures against any provocation by the United States, the official *Korean Central News Agency*

reported. Kim made his remarks at a meeting to mark DPRK leader Kim Jong-il's 66th birthday, which falls Saturday.

"We are closely following the double-dealing attitude of the US as it is employing double-edged tactics of

appeasement and pressure, persistently trying to stifle the DPRK by force," he said.

"We will not tolerate even a slight hostile action on the part of the US but decisively react to it with a stronger measure," he added.

**UK police chief demands apology over Diana probe**

LONDON, 16 Feb — The former British police chief who conducted an inquiry into Princess Diana's death angrily denied on Thursday "scurrilous allegations" that he had not done his job properly.

"Allegations trip off people's tongues — it's just not right," John Stevens told the London inquest into the deaths of Diana and her lover Dodi al-Fayed, killed in a high-speed Paris car crash in August 1997.

"I am looking for an apology in relation to

that," he told the court. "There were scurrilous allegations made."

His police probe concluded in December 2006 that Diana's death was a tragic accident and that she was not the victim of a murder plot, as has been alleged by Dodi's father, luxury storeowner Mohamed al-Fayed.

Fayed alleges that his son and Diana were killed by British security services on the orders of Prince Philip, Queen Elizabeth's husband and Diana's former father-in-law. — MNA/Reuters

**Somali leader unhurt in mortar attack on residence**

MOGADISHU, 17 Feb — Somali President Abdullahi Yusuf escaped unhurt from a mortar attack on his official residence in the capital on Saturday, hours after returning to Mogadishu from an overseas trip, one of his aides said.

"Four mortars were fired at the Presidential Palace. Three of them landed outside, while one landed inside the compound. No one was hurt," the aide, who declined to be named, told *Reuters*.

He confirmed that Yusuf was in the heavily guarded presidential compound at the time of the shelling, but it was unclear whether the attack was directly targeting the president, whose forces are battling an Islamist insurgency.

Yusuf arrived in Mogadishu in the morning after seeking medical treatment abroad. The 73-year-old who had a liver transplant nearly 14 years ago left Somalia on 4 January, a month after a chest illness sparked a health scare. Presidential spokesman Hussein Mohamud Hubsired said Yusuf's "main priority is to hasten the government's works" and to continue reconciliation efforts to establish lasting peace. — MNA/Reuters

## Study warns Indian women against smoking

NEW DELHI, 16 Feb — About 62 percent of Indian women who smoke will die in their productive age as compared to 38 per cent of non-smokers, indicating that women smokers will lose about eight years of their life, says a new study. The study, which was

published in the *New England Journal of Medicine* and was conducted by Indian, British and Canadian scientists, said women smokers are at a much higher risk of getting respiratory, heart and tuberculosis diseases as

compared to non-smokers. "For both men and women, the risks of smoking are evident even before age 50. Around 15 percent of women smokers would die in the age of 30-49, as compared with seven per cent of non-smokers," said the lead author of the study Prabhat Jha.

The study said that 20 percent of women smokers are at the risk of getting respiratory diseases as compared to 7 percent who do not smoke.

## UN peacekeepers, Tutsi rebels clash in east Congo

KINSHASA, 17 Feb — UN peacekeepers trying to enforce a ceasefire signed last month have clashed with Tutsi rebels in eastern Democratic Republic of Congo, the United Nations said on Saturday.

One rebel was wounded in the incident on Friday and several were arrested by the South African peacekeepers, a spokesman for the

UN mission in Congo (MONUC) said.

Congo's Government, Tutsi insurgents loyal to renegade General Laurent Nkunda and Mai Mai militia signed a ceasefire on 23 January aimed at ending more than a decade of violence in eastern North and South Kivu provinces.

## Fossil found in China could be 580m years old

BEIJING, 16 Feb — Chinese archaeologists have found a fossilized body of an octoradiate spiral organism dating back 580 million years in the southwestern part of the country, the *Guangming Daily* reported. The creature in question would have been a multicellular animal.

The fossil was found in Wenghui Village, Jiangkou County, in southwest Guizhou Province. It was jointly confirmed as an octoradiate spiral organism

by a research team under the Institute of Geology of the Chinese Academy of Geological Sciences and an expert from Switzerland's National Museum of Natural Sciences.

The fossil is three centimetres in diameter and is said to be a 580-million-year-old multicellular animal that belonged to the Sinian Period (800 million years to 570 million years ago).

It was the earliest spiral organism body fossil that

has so far been found by scientists, the *Guangming Daily* said.

The fossil is a new genus and might be the ancestor of coelenterate and spiral organisms. The new finding could provide very important evidence for the comparative study of phosphatized spheroidal fossils dating to the Sinian period and the Ediacaran fauna (635 million years to 543 million years ago), scientists claim.

## Freezing cold kills over 900 in Afghanistan

KABUL, 17 Feb — Persistent cold snap and snowfall have claimed the lives of more than 900 people over the past six weeks in the war-ravaged Afghanistan, a government official said on Saturday.

Reports collected by authorities till Saturday indicated that 926 people including women and children have lost their lives and 231 others sustained injuries due to the ongoing bitter cold across the country, Amir Jan, an official with Anti-Disaster Directorate told *Xinhua*.

Some of the injured have

been left to amputate their fingers and toes because of cold-caused injuries, according to doctors in western Herat Province.

Most of the affected belong to the western Herat Province, January said, adding that also a number of poor people were reported affected in the northern provinces of Jauzjan, Sar-e-Pul and Faryab.

The official further said that 316,055 heads of cattle died due to cold in the Central Asian country.

The cold wave and snowfall starting from early January is continuing in major parts of the country and, according to local elders, is unprecedented over the past 20 years. The Afghan Government with the support of international community has distributed 52 million Afghanis (around one million US dollars) worth of humanitarian aid to the affected areas but the locals are calling for more assistance.—MNA/Xinhua

## Britain publishes new space strategy

LONDON, 16 Feb — Britain published on Thursday its civil space strategy for 2008-2012 and beyond, outlining new proposals for the country's future involvement in an increasingly competitive international space sector.

The new proposals on how Britain would continue to be at the forefront of this expanding sector, an-

nounced by Science and Innovation Minister Ian Pearson, include continued involvement in Earth observation, space science and telecom development, and establishing an international space facility at Harwell, Oxfordshire, which will focus on climate change, robotic space exploration and applications.

Close involvement in international initiatives on the future shape of space exploration to the Moon, Mars and beyond, and setting up a national space technology programme to support the development of new, innovative technologies and services are also on the agenda.

### Real Zaragoza 1 Barcelona 2

Thierry Henry put Barca ahead late in the first half when he steered in past keeper Cesar after appearing to control a through pass from Deco with his hand.

Argentine international Diego Milito missed a chance to equalize before the break when he fired a penalty over the bar but strike partner Ricardo Oliveira levelled early in the second half after good work from former Barcelona player Sergio Garcia.

## Premier League chief sticks by overseas matches plan

LONDON, 17 Feb — Premier League chief executive Richard Scudamore has stuck by his widely-criticized plans to play extra matches abroad and accused FIFA President Sepp Blatter of not knowing enough about the idea when he denounced it. The 20 top flight clubs agreed last week to consider extending the league season to 39 games from 38 to include an international round of fixtures to be staged in January.

Blatter has said the plan could harm England's bid to host the 2018 World Cup and also accused rich clubs of simply wanting to get richer, while the English FA told FIFA on Friday it had serious reservations over the proposals. Scudamore told Saturday's edition of *The Times* that he wanted to meet Blatter to explain the plan in more detail so he could make a more informed judgement. —MNA/Reuters

## Japan's Nishikori reaches first semi at Delray

DELRAY BEACH (Florida), 16 Feb — Japanese teenager Kei Nishikori reached the semifinal of an ATP event for the first time in his career after a 6-2, 6-4 victory over American Bobby Reynolds in the Delray Beach International on Friday.

The 18-year-old Nishikori will meet the US's Sam Querrey in Saturday's semi-final after he comfortably beat compatriot Vincent Spadea 6-2, 6-4.

Nishikori's previous best result was a quarterfinal finish in last year's event at Indianapolis.

The other two quarterfinals feature top-seed James Blake of the US against Russian Igor Kunitsyn and another all-American match-up between Robby Ginepri and Mardy Fish. — MNA/Reuters

## Wenger hits back at Blatter criticism

LONDON, 16 Feb — Arsenal manager Arsene Wenger hit back on Friday at FIFA president Sepp Blatter's criticism of the English Premier League's plans to play a round of international fixtures all over the world.

Wenger, who said he was "not a 100-per-cent defender of the idea", said he felt it was unreasonable to criticise the proposals without weighing up the implications.

"My reaction is that I am surprised by the immensity of the battle, that people are against it without really analysing the pros and the cons," he told reporters on Friday.

Blatter was quoted as saying on Thursday the scheme was a money-making exercise that ignored the wishes of fans and may also affect England's bid to stage the 2018 World Cup finals. —MNA/Reuters



# Crash at street car race kills 8 near Washington

WASHINGTON, 17 Feb — Eight people were killed early on Saturday when a car plowed into roadside spectators watching an illegal high-speed street race in a town near Washington, according to media reports.

A sedan, which had not taken part in the race, crashed into the crowd gathered along a highway in Accokeek, Maryland, 20 miles (30 kilometres) south of Washington, at about 3 a.m., *The Washington Post* said.

“The driver told police that he was blinded by a cloud of white smoke and debris kicked up by the spinning wheels of two vehicles that had just finished racing,” it said.

“It was a very horrific scene with the number of individuals in the road at one time and the amount of debris,” the Post quoted Corporal Clinton Copeland of the Prince George’s County Police Department as saying.

Eight people were killed and at least five were

injured, including a passenger in the sedan, the newspaper said. Police had said earlier the passenger was among those killed.

The Post quoted one of the spectators as saying a crowd of between 200 and 300 people had gathered to watch the race.

Copeland said it was too early to determine if any criminal charges would be filed.—MNA/Reuters

# Quake jolts Bolivia-Chile border, no damage

SANTIAGO, 17 Feb — A 6.0 magnitude earthquake struck Bolivia in the region of Potosi near the border with Chile on Saturday, but there were no immediate reports of injuries or damages.

The US Geological Survey said the quake was centered about 105 miles (170 kilometres) northeast of Calama, Chile, and had a magnitude of 6.0.

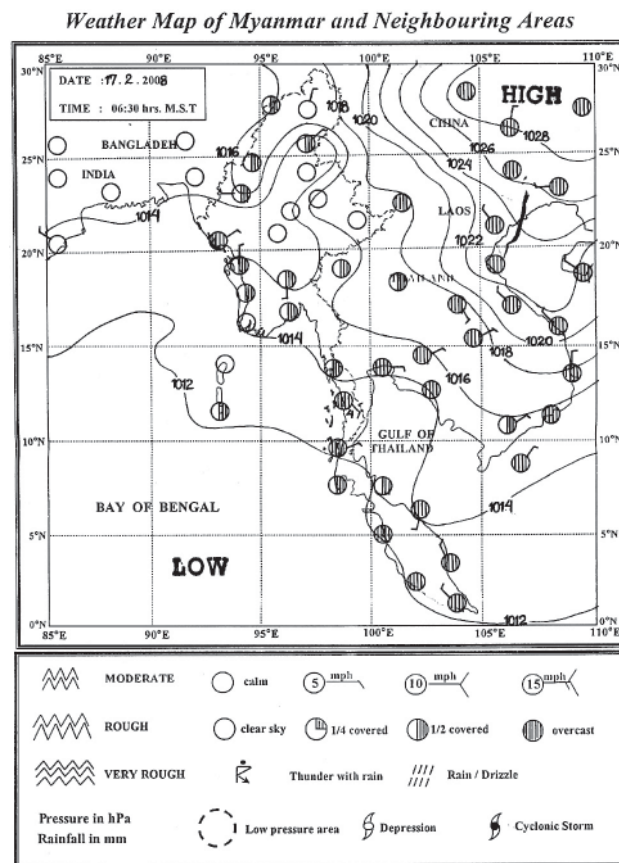
It hit at 1445 GMT at a depth of 83 miles (134 kilometres), the agency said.

No injuries or damages were reported in either

country. Chile’s emergency response agency described the tremor as a “low intensity quake”.

The mineral-rich northern Chile region has experienced several tremors of similar strength since a mammoth 7.7-magnitude quake on November 14 interrupted production at some of the country’s largest copper mines.
