Lt-Gen Kyaw Win on inspection tour of Manhero in Muse

NAY PYI TAW, 25 Feb — Member of the State Peace and Development Council Lt-Gen Kyaw Win of the Ministry of Defence, together with Chairman of Shan State (North) Peace and Development Council Commander of North-East Command Maj-Gen Aung Than Htut, met departmental personnel and merchants at 105-mile border trade checkpoint near Mongyu Village in Muse Township yesterday.

Checkpoint in-charge Director U San Nwe Win of Border Trade Department gave report on export capacity and 10 kinds of exports. The commander then gave supplementary reports on efforts to know the markets in other local townships by directly having contacts with Muse Border Trade Camp through information technology, and adoption of Border Trade Online System (BTOS) to grant work licenses to trucks.

In his speech, Lt-Gen Kyaw Win called on the officials to prevent the flow of commodities that are illegally transported by avoiding the 105th mile border trade route, to cooperate with local authorities and One

Stop Service (OSS) to increase the volume of trade and to try to know the market situation in other countries and to seek extensive market. He also said that national entrepreneurs are to do their business with goodwill as the 105th mile border trade camp is the place where most of the import and export services of the State are carried out. In addition, it is important to increase the trade volume in accord with the objectives of border trade for cementing the bilateral relationship between the two countries, to fully collect taxes and revenues and to ensure the booming business of the private national entrepreneurs.

Lt-Gen Kyaw Win looked into the 105th mile gate in Muse Township.

Lt-Gen Kyaw Win, the commander and party met departmental officials and local residents at Manhero and presented gifts and uniforms to townsellers and members of fire brigade. At the Station Hospital in Manhero, Lt-Gen Kyaw Win encouraged the patients and presented gifts to them.

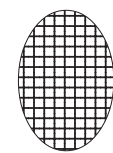
On the occasion, the doyens and the outstanding students and personnel were honoured.

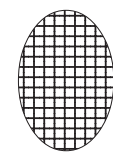
The report and financial statement of the executive committee of the association were read and approved.

Raul Castro elected President of Cuba

HAVANA, 24 Feb—Cuban Army General Raul Castro was elected the new president of Cuba on Sunday during a legislative session held at Cuba's Palace of Conventions in Havana.

Raul said his older brother Fidel Castro would remain a key figure and vowed to be on guard against US "meddling" as he assumed the presidency.

"We have taken note of the offensive and openly meddling declarations by the empire and some of its closest allies," the new Cuban leader said.

"I am assuming the

responsibility entrusted to me with the conviction that the commander-in-chief of the Cuban revolution

remains unique. Fidel is Fidel," said Raul, during his acceptance speech at the seventh session of

Cuba's legislature, the National Assembly of People's Power (ANPP).

"Today a more compact and functional structure is needed," Raul, 76, told the ANPP, adding that Cuba needs "a smaller number of central administration bodies and a better distribution of their functions. We have to make our government more efficient."

On Sunday, 597 deputies unanimously elected a 31-member Council of State for a term of five years, which in turn elected Raul as president of the country.

Turkish strike will not solve PKK problem

CANBERRA, 25 Feb—Turkey's military strike against Kurdish PKK guerillas in northern Iraq will not solve its problem with the separatist rebels, US Defence Secretary Robert Gates said on Sunday, calling for Ankara to take political and economic measures to isolate the group. Gates, in Australia as part of a longer Asia trip, also urged Turkey to respect Iraq's sovereignty and improve communication with Baghdad about both the ongoing operation and other efforts against the PKK.

"I think it's important for everybody to bear in mind the importance of the sovereignty of Iraq," Gates told reporters.

There has been contact at high levels about this activity that is in northern

Iraq right now. I think that there can always be improvement in the timeliness and in the depth of the dialogue. It can't be just a one-time event. It needs to be an ongoing dialogue." MNA/Reuters

No legal basis for new UN sanctions against Iran

TEHERAN, 25 Feb—Iranian Government spokesman Gholam-Hossein Elham said on Saturday that there is no legal basis for new UN Security Council sanctions against Iran over its nuclear programme.

He made the remarks one day after International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) Director General Mohamed ElBaradei circulated his latest report on Iran's nuclear programme to the Agency's Board of Governors.

What was said in the report once more indicated that "referring of Iran to the UN Security Council was a political move which lacked legal basis," the official IRNA news agency quoted Elham as saying.—MNA/Xinhua

"Shame on you," Clinton tells Obama

CINCINNATI, 25 Feb—Hillary Clinton slammed rival Barack Obama on Saturday for campaign leaflets on her health-care plan that she called "blatantly false" and accused him of using Republican tactics in their contest for the Democratic US presidential nomination.

In a bitter exchange, Obama defended the leaflet as accurate and campaign spokesman Bill Burton decried Clinton's "negative campaign".

"Shame on you, Barack Obama," Clinton said, speaking to reporters after a rally in Ohio, a state that is key to her struggling campaign.

Brandishing a copy of the leaflet, Clinton said the Obama campaign was spreading "false, misleading, discredited information" about her health-care plan.

"Senator Obama knows it is not true that my plan forces people to buy insurance even if they can't afford it," Clinton said. "It is blatantly false and yet he continues to spend millions of dollars perpetuating falsehoods. It is not hopeful. It is destructive, particularly for a Democrat to be discrediting universal health care."

Obama said the content of the leaflet was correct. He said he was puzzled by the sudden "change in tone" by his rival because the leaflets Clinton referred to were sent out days or weeks ago. He suggested there was something "tactical" about her attacks now.—MNA/Reuters

Microsoft to stop making HD DVD players

BEIJING, 25 Feb — Microsoft said it will stop making HD DVD players for its Xbox 360 video game system and said the move won't have a material impact on its video game business, media reported Monday.

Toshiba Corp. ceded the high-definition video format battle to Sony Corp's Blu-ray. Toshiba President Atsutoshi Nishida last week estimated about 300,000 people own the Microsoft video player, sold as a separate 130 US dollars add-on for the Xbox 360.

Microsoft said it would continue to provide standard warranty support for

its HD DVD players and is looking at how the HD DVD technology it has developed, such as HDi, which adds interactive features to HD DVDs, and its VC-1 video encoding technology, can be applied to other platforms.

"HD DVD is one of the several ways we offer a high definition experience to consumers and we will continue to give consumers the choice to enjoy digital distribution of high definition movies and TV shows directly to their living room, along with playback of the DVD movies they already own," Blair Westlake, a corporate vice president of Microsoft's media and entertainment group, said in a written statement.

Microsoft was one of HD DVD's main backers, along with Intel Corp. and Japanese electronics maker NEC Corp., and its support for the format was seen as a big win for Toshiba's format.

But support for the HD DVD waned as major movie studios — Sony Pictures, Walt Disney Co, News Corp's Twentieth Century Fox and Warner Bros. Entertainment — picked blue-ray to distribute high-def DVDs.

Four guilty in China's fake receipt case await sentencing

KUNMING, 24 Feb— The case against four men in China's largest case of making and selling fake receipts were in court on Friday in southwest China.

The four were charged with illegally making receipts and selling fake receipts by the prosecutors at the Luoping County court in Yunnan Province and pleaded guilty. The court adjourned to consider its sentence.

Yunnan police arrested five suspects in the case, including one who is to stand trial in a separate case.

More than one million bogus receipts worth 1.05 trillion yuan (147.3 billion US dollars) were confiscated in the case. The national treasury would lose more than 75 billion yuan in tax revenue if the receipts were put into circulation, officials said.—MNA/Xinhua

Egypt-to-Syria gas link near completion

DAMASCUS, 25 Feb— Commercial volumes of gas will start flowing from Egypt to Syria in August through an Arab gas pipeline that is near completion, regional energy officials said on Saturday. Testing of the pipeline from Al-Arish in Egypt to Deir Ali in Syria is due to commence in March.

Philippine military on red alert to face anti-govt protests

MANILA, 25 Feb— The Philippine military Sunday warned soldiers not to join any government protest while declaring a nationwide red alert as opposition forces plan to hold rallies Monday, which falls on the 22nd anniversary of the downfall of former President Ferdinand Marcos.

Philippine military chief Hermogenes Esperon told local media that the military is now prepared for possible "contingency" during Monday's rallies by opposition parties and individuals, who could use the occasion to call for the resignation of President Gloria Macapagal Arroyo over alleged corruption.

Police raise alert level

The Philippine police have raised alert level in

Metro Manila to prepare for possible rallies on Monday, which falls on an anniversary marking the downfall of former president Ferdinand Marcos, reported local television network GMA News Saturday.

The National Capital Region Police Office (NCRPO) of the Philippine National Police said Saturday it had raised its alert level to a notch higher from normal to heightened.

NCRPO Director Geary Barias earlier said police will be raising the alert in preparation for the 22nd anniversary celebration of the uprising which led to the ouster of Marcos, also known as EDSA I in reference to the name of the thoroughfare where protests were held at the time.

Meanwhile, some religious groups will hold a rally on 29 February in protest against alleged corruption in the government.—MNA/Xinhua

Battery of Samsung laptop P10 model melts

BEIJING, 25 Feb— A battery in a Samsung notebook computer P10 model melted in South Korea's capital Seoul, but no people were injured or killed, media reported Monday.

"After being used for about three and a half hours on a pillow on Sunday, the laptop battery emitted smoke," a fire department official in Seoul said. "The battery burned a bed and a floor a bit, but did not cause a big fire."

A Samsung's spokesman James Chung said the notebook was the P10 model, which was produced in 2002 but did not give further details such as a producer of the battery. —Internet

Ahmadinejad demands US apology over nuclear issue

TEHERAN, 25 Feb—Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad on Saturday demanded an apology from the United States and its allies for groundlessly condemning its nuclear ambitions.

Ahmadinejad said in a televised address to the nation that the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) report vindicated Iran over the nuclear issue and the best way for the US and its allies

to “compensate for their mistakes” is to “apologize and pay compensation”.

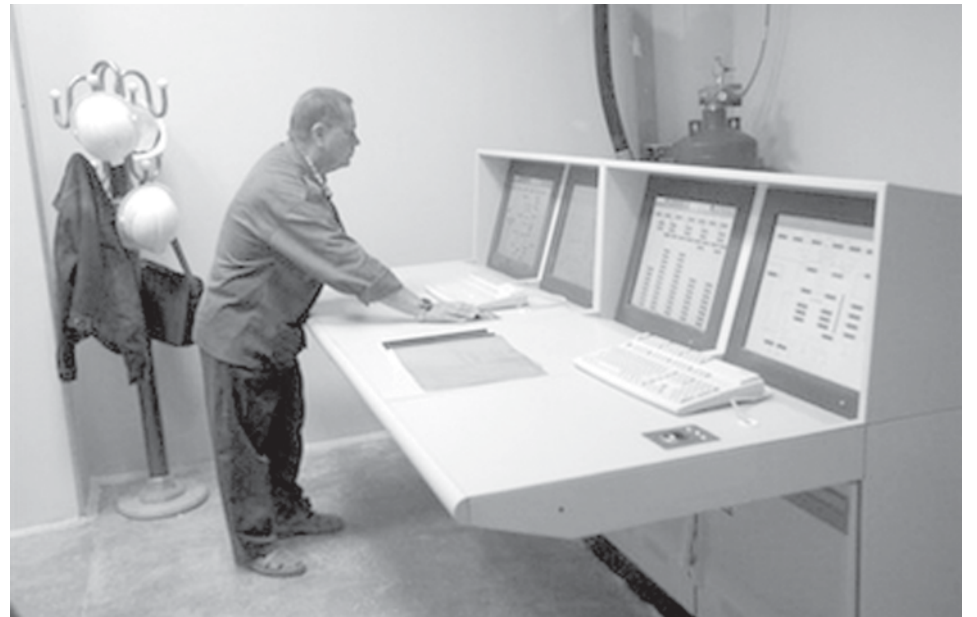
In the latest report on Iran’s nuclear programme, the UN nuclear watchdog said Iran had clarified the majority of open issues in its nuclear programmes but highlighted Teheran’s continued refusal to halt uranium enrichment.

Iran said the report once more indicated that “the referring of Iran to the UN Security Council was

a political move which lacked legal basis”.

Ahmadinejad warned that Teheran would take unspecified “decisive reciprocal measures” against any country that could impose additional sanctions on Iran. Western countries have accused Iran of using a civilian nuclear programme as a cover to develop nuclear weapons, a charge repeatedly denied by Teheran.

Lee Myung-bak sworn in as S Korean President

SEOUL, 25 Feb.—South Korea’s conservative leader Lee Myung-bak was sworn in as the country’s 17th President at 11:08 am (0208 GMT) on Monday in Seoul.

Lee, who won the presidential elections on 19 December last year, is expected to unveil his vision to revive the

country’s economy on the basis of the market economy and to introduce pragmatic ideals into foreign policy in his inaugural address.

A total of 45,000 South Koreans attended the inauguration ceremony held in front of the National Assembly in Yeouido, central Seoul. Japanese

Prime Minister Yasuo Fukuda, Chinese President Hu Jintao’s special envoy Tang Jiaxuan, Russian Prime Minister Victor Zubkov, US Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice, Mongolian President Nambaryn Enkhbayar are also invited to scene of the ceremony.

Nepali Govt given 15-day ultimatum to end crisis

KATHMANDU, 15 Feb—The recently formed Consumers’ Struggle Committee has given a 15-day ultimatum to the Nepali Government to end the persisting problems of load-shedding, crisis of petroleum and cooking gas, *The Himalayan Times* reported on Sunday.

According to the daily, the committee has also warned of violent protests if the government do not solve the problems. The committee said Saturday they had set the deadline for 7 March to put an end to the scarcity of basic facilities. They have come up with four-point

demands: decrease load-shedding hours that is keeping for at least 8-hours per day in the capital, ensure smooth supply of liquefied petroleum gas, kerosene, diesel, petrol and water, bring down the prices of essential items and create a peaceful environment for living.—Xinhua

FARC vows to hold three US hostages for 60 years

BOGOTA, 25 Feb—The Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia (FARC) on Saturday said it would hold the three US hostages for 60 years as one of its member was sentenced to a six-decade imprisonment by a US court earlier.

The announcement was made by Ivan Marquez, a

senior member of the FARC, Colombia’s largest anti-government group, at an interview posted on the website of the Bolivian Press Agency.

The three US defence contractors—Marc Gonsalves, Thomas Howes and Keith Stansell—were captured by the FARC

five years ago.

In January FARC commander Ricardo Palmara was sentenced by a US court to the maximum jail of six decades after he was extradited to the United States and was convicted in the three contractors’ kidnapping.

Five people killed in murder-suicide in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, 25 Feb—Five people died and a 14-year-old boy was hospitalized in what appeared to be a murder-suicide at a condominium complex in Los Angeles, police said Sunday.

The boy called 911 about 11 pm on Saturday and said his father had just shot him and his brother, said police Sgt. Peter Rodriguez.

When police arrived at the condo they found the body of a woman on the doorstep and the bodies of three children—a boy, 5, and two girls, 8 and 9—inside the home, he said.

Police also found the body of a man with a shotgun beneath him, he said.

32 injured as plane loses control at Manila airport

MANILA, 25 Feb—Thirty-two passengers and three crew members of a small Filipino air line catering for tourists were slightly injured as the plane lost control when landing at an airport in Manila Sunday afternoon, reported local television network GMA News.

The European-made *Dornier 328* plane belonged to the Sea Air company and it lost control during landing and ploughed through a grassy patch at the Manila Domestic Airport in Pasay City, said the report.

Airport officials said the turboprop plane came from a tourist resort in central Philippines developed mechanical trouble soon after landing on a runway.

45 injured in train crash in Turkey

ANKARA, 25 Feb—Forty-five people were injured when a cargo train collided with another train in central Turkey early on Saturday, the semi-official *Anatolia* news agency reported.

Turkish Railways General Directorate was quoted as saying that the cargo train heading from Ankara to the eastern province of Malatya collided with 4 Eylül Mavi Train in Sarkisla town of the central Anatolian province of Sivas at 6:20 am (0420 GMT) after the cargo train violated red signal.

The injured were immediately taken to hospitals for treatment, added the general directorate.

Beijing pledges to ensure air quality for Olympics

BEIJING, 24 Feb — Olympic host Beijing and its surrounding regions have pledged to make concerted efforts to ensure the air quality in the capital during the event.

Tianjin, Hebei, Inner Mongolia, Shanxi, Shandong and Beijing will jointly take pollution treatment measures to control dust, vehicle exhaust and industrial pollution emissions, according to a plan aimed at ensuring the air quality

for the 8-24 August Games.

"During the Games, Beijing will limit the number of vehicles on roads, stop polluting work at construction sites and impose pollutant reductions on key companies," said Du Shaozhong, deputy director of the Beijing Environmental Protection Bureau. The neighbouring areas will also take temporary measures to control pollution, he said.

A latest 2008 "Blue Sky" plan released by the Tianjin Environmental Protection Bureau, said the municipality will take compulsory pollution control measures for the Olympic Games. Tianjin will host some of the Games' football tournament.

The plan has marked Tianjin's Wuqing, Baodi, Jixian and Beichen areas bordering Beijing as key pollution control areas.

Kenyan wildlife park bush fire rages for second day

She, like other villagers near to the park, jumped through a fence to come and help.

Fire destroys over 1300 shops, 17 offices, 113 rooms at Advanced Yadanabon Market in Mandalay

NAY PYI TAW, 25 Feb — A fire broke out at Advanced Yadanabon Market between 33th Street and 34th Street and 77th Street and 78th Street in Chanaye Thazan Township, Mandalay at 8.20 am today.

Shortly after the market was on fire, Commander of Central Command Brig-Gen Tin Ngwe and officials, members of fire brigades with 78 fire engines, members of social organizations and the public numbering about 4,000 arrived at the scene and put out the fire. And the fire was put under control at about 2.25 pm.

The fire engulfed 1,293 shops on the ground floor,

Altogether 21 people—four monks, 11 firemen, three men and three women—were injured in the fire.

The injured were admitted to Mandalay General Hospital for medical treatment while fire victims were provided with necessary assistance by officials concerned.

The fire started in Shop No 261 on the ground floor of the market due to wire short-circuit.—MNA

Maubin and Pyapon districts produce fish, meat, agriculture and marine products for export and has underpinned the economy of the country.

In the past, it took two hours to reach Pyapon from Kyaiklat by ship. Thanks to the newly-opened road, it takes only 20 minutes to reach Pyapon from Kyaiklat by car. It was attended by Deputy Minister for Foreign Affairs U Maung Myint, staff of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and

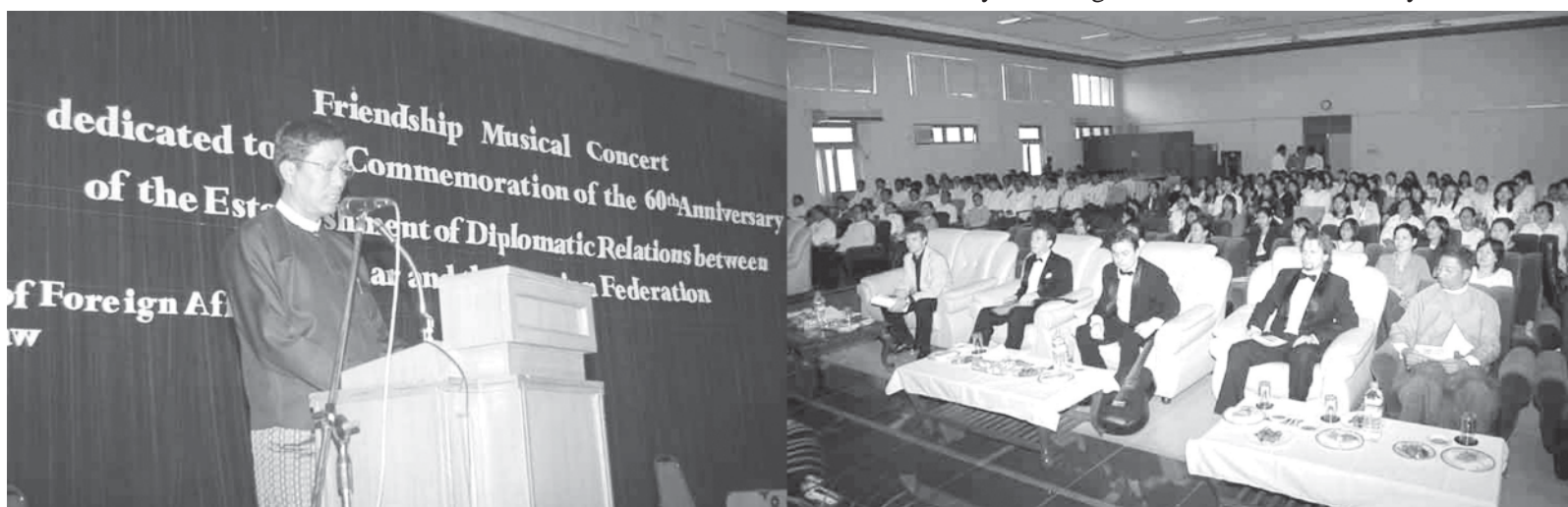
the Embassy of the Russian Federation.

Turnout low in voting for Thailand's senatorial election

Somchai Chungprasert, one of the five election commissioners, said on Sunday that one of the major reasons for the low turnout in the advance voting was

because eligible voters felt that number of elected senators was still unfair compared with the size of population in a city.

For example, Bangkok has more than 10 million people but only one senator out of the total candidates would be chosen by voters like the rest of provinces nationwide, Somchai was quoted by the state-run *Thai News Agency* as saying.

According to the new

Constitution of Thailand, the Senate will have 150 members, with 74 appointed and the remainder elected by the public in all 76 provinces, one for one province.

The senatorial election, held for the first time under the 2007 Constitution, will be conducted 2 March.

It is unfair to large provinces and the Constitution should be amended to suit demands of the people, Somchai said. — *MNA/Xinhua*

UK opposition chief criticized over Auschwitz comment

LONDON, 25 Feb— British opposition leader David Cameron faced demands for an apology on Saturday after he called government funding for school visits to the former Nazi concentration camp at Auschwitz a "gimmick". Cameron accused Prime Minister Gordon Brown's Government in a speech on Friday of being "obsessed with short-term gimmicks", including a recommendation to schools to make "trips to Poland".

"We've had a gimmick for every week that Gordon Brown has been Prime Minister. It would be funny if it wasn't so serious," the Conservative leader said.

A list of 26 gimmicks released to accompany the speech included "Trips to Auschwitz", a Nazi death camp in Poland.

The government announced this month it would give 4.65 million pounds (9.14 million US dollars) to the Holocaust Educational Trust — set up in 1988 to educate young people about the Holocaust.

Iran reinforces Iraq border after Turkish attack

TEHERAN, 25 Feb — Iran said on Sunday it had reinforced its border security after Turkey launched an offensive in north Iraq against Kurdish rebels, a move an analyst said was likely aimed at

stopping rebels hiding in Iran. Turkey said it launched the cross-border offensive after Iraqi authorities failed to stop an estimated 3,000

members of the separatist Kurdistan Workers Party (PKK) from using northern Iraq as a base to stage attacks on Turkish territory.—*MNA/Reuters*

Philippines backs ban of cluster bombs

MANILA, 25 Feb — The Philippines has thrown its support on a planned international treaty that will ban the

use and proliferation of cluster bombs, noting that effective implementation of the convention would reduce the risk and enhance the security of Filipinos overseas, said the Department of Foreign Affairs on Sunday.

At the Wellington Conference in New Zealand held this week, some 80 countries have agreed to finalize preparations for the treaty, a legally binding instrument that will prohibit the use, production, transfer and stockpiling of cluster munitions that cause unacceptable harm and providing for adequate resources to assist survivors and clear contaminated areas.

Vietnam to pour \$2.5b into building oil refinery

HANOI, 25 Feb — State-run Vietnam National Oil and Gas Group (PetroVietnam) and two foreign companies are expected to form a joint venture in the second quarter, according to local newspaper *Vietnam Economic Times* on Friday.

PetroVietnam, Kuwait's KPI and Japan's Idemitsu are negotiating in Hanoi capital for the establishment of the joint venture, to build the Nghi Son oil refinery in central Thanh Hoa province, which will have an annual capacity of processing seven million tons of crude oil. The refinery costing 2.5 billion US dollars is expected to become operational by 2011.

PetroVietnam, investor of Vietnam's first oil refinery named Dung Quat with an annual processing capacity of 6.5 million tons of crude oil under construction in central Quang Ngai Province, plans to put it into operation in the first quarter of 2009.—*MNA/Xinhua*

"Virtual fence" ready for use at US border with Mexico

WASHINGTON, 24 Feb—The US border with Mexico is expected to be strengthened as a high-tech "virtual fence" is ready for service, a government official said on Friday.

According to Homeland Security Secretary Michael Chertoff, the so-called Project 28 "virtual fence", which was supposed to be completed in mid-2007, was delayed to February, 2008, because of software problems and criticism by Congress.

He told a seminar on illegal immigration that the technology of sensor towers and advanced mobile communications applied on the 20-million-US-dollar project can fight illegal crossings all along the frontier.

"I have personally witnessed the value of this system, and I have spoken directly to the Border Patrol agents ... who have seen it produce actual results, in terms of identifying and allowing the apprehension of people who were illegally smuggling across the border," he said.

Earlier this month, US President George W Bush requested from Congress for 775 million dollars on more fencing along the southern border with high-tech surveillance equipment.

Canada pledges \$555m in fresh aid to Haiti

PO RT-AU-PRINCE, 24 Feb—Canadian Foreign Minister Maxime Bernier pledged 555 million US dollars in fresh aid to Haiti on Friday, as he wrapped up a three-day visit to the impoverished Caribbean nation. The funds, to be paid over the next five years, were earmarked to help build roads, police precincts and implement social and economic programmes in the Western Hemisphere's poorest country, Bernier told reporters.

"Compared to other donor countries, our assistance to Haiti is one of the biggest per capita contributions," he said.

"We are proud to be able to help Haiti because we have in Quebec a Haitian community that has brought so much to Canada," said Bernier, adding that Canada will act according to aid priorities set by Haitian authorities. — MNA/Reuters

Bomb destroys bus near Sri Lankan capital

MOUNT LAVINIA (Sri Lanka), 24 Feb—A suspected Tamil Tiger bomb blast destroyed a passenger bus on the outskirts of the Sri Lankan capital on Saturday morning, but there were no immediate reports of any fatalities.

Hospital officials said nine people were admitted with blast injuries following the explosion at a bus stand in the town of Mount Lavinia, just south of Colombo.

It was latest in a series of bombings blamed on the rebels in recent months.

A Reuters witness saw the charred, mangled wreckage of the bus, its rear blown completely apart. He said there were no immediate signs of any fatalities.

Local television reported the bus had been evacuated shortly before the blast after a woman passenger saw an unattended bag.

Iraqi security forces kill 10 al-Qaeda insurgents

TIKRIT (Iraq), 24 Feb—Iraqi security forces backed by the US aircraft raided insurgents' hide-outs in Salahudin Province on Saturday, killing 10 suspected insurgents, including a local leader, and capturing four others, a provincial police officer said.

A joint force from the Iraqi Army and police and fighters from local anti-Qaeda Awakening Council group carried out a raid at dawn on the open areas near the al-Thirhar Lake, west of Samarra city, 120 kilometres north of

Baghdad, Col Hassan Ahmad told Xinhua.

The raid resulted in the killing of 10 insurgents, including six non-Iraqi Arab nationals, and the capturing of four others, Ahmad said.

Among the killed was Abdul Basit al-Nissani, a local leader of the al-Qaeda in Iraq network, who blew himself up after he was surrounded by the security forces while crossing a small river, he said.

There were no casualties among the joint troops who also confiscated a

large amount of weapons and ammunition during the raid, Ahmad said.

The targeting area was used by the al-Qaeda militants to conduct attacks against civilians and Iraqi security forces.

Armed groups, including al-Qaeda, which were active in the swath stretching from the city of Samarra to the Thirhar Lake, northwest of Baghdad, has long been out of the control of the Iraqi security forces before the major operation against them in the area.

Japan launches experimental Internet satellite

TOKYO, 25 Feb—Japan launched an experimental communications satellite on Saturday as part of an ambitious space programme that could help ensure super high-speed Internet access in remote parts of Japan and elsewhere in Asia.

The H-2A rocket carrying the 2.7 tonne KIZUNA (WINDS) communications satellite took off into over the tiny island of Tanegashima, about 1,000 kilometres (620 miles) south of Tokyo, at 5.55 pm (0855 GMT).

The launch had been briefly delayed after a ship strayed into restricted waters.

The KIZUNA, equipped with three antennas targeting Japan, Southeast Asia and the Pacific regions, is referred to as the Wideband InterNetworking engineering test and Demonstration Satellite or WINDS.

The geostationary satellite will be used to conduct experiments on large-volume, high-speed data communications on remote mountains and islands with little Internet access.

Japan's scientists say the 52.2 billion yen (490 million US dollars) launch of WINDS will help the country build one of the world's most advanced information and telecommunications networks.

The launch comes 12 years after the project started, due mainly to technical glitches involving launch vehicles. —MNA/Reuters

Google found guilty of violating film copyright

PARIS, 25 Feb—US internet giant Google has been found guilty of contravening copyright laws in connection with a film that was posted on its site prior to seeking authorization from the owner.

Google has been found guilty of "counterfeiting" by the Paris District Commercial Court for posting the film, "The World According to Bush (Le monde selon Bush)" by William Karel, online, without seeking permission from the copyright holders and despite their protests, film producer Jean-Francois Lepetit announced on Friday.

In compensation, the internet group has been forced to pay 150,000 euros (about 220,000 US dollars) in damages to Flach Film, the company that produced the film, and Editions Montparnasse, which had been contracted to distribute the film legally," said Lepetit.

In November 2006, Flach Film filed a lawsuit against Google because it had allowed internet users to access the movie in its entirety and free of charge, through its site Google Video France, despite complaints from the producer, according to Lepetit.

On the platform of Google video, the film could be accessed by simply clicking in the form of streaming or downloading and "it was viewed many times in a very short time," according to the producer.

"Until the court proceedings began in December 2007, it was possible to find the film on Google," said Lepetit. —MNA/Xinhua

Strong quake jolts Sumatra, no tsunami warning

JAKARTA, 25 Feb—An earthquake with magnitude of 6.5 rocked Bengkulu Province of Sumatra Island on Sunday, but there is no potential for tsunami, meteorology agency said here.

The quake struck at 21:46 local time (1446 GMT) with epicentre at 151 kilometres northwest Muko Muko town of Bengkulu Province and at 57 kilometres under sea bed, an official of the agency Beny H said.

"We do not issue tsunami warning, as the quake is not potential for tsunami," he told Xinhua. The official said that the quake was felt in the whole province and nearby province of West Sumatra.

The agency were trying to confirm the intensity of the quake, according to the official.

Study hints stroke drug could have wider use

CHICAGO, 25 Feb—A study aiming to expand the three-hour time window for giving a clot-busting drug to stroke patients fell short of its goal, Australian researchers said on Friday, but the study hinted that certain stroke sufferers might still benefit from late administration of the drug. They had hoped to prove the clot-buster

known as tissue plasminogen activator or tPA would significantly reduce the spread of a stroke three to six hours after the first symptoms appeared.

Under current guidelines, the drug can only be given within three hours of the first symptoms, a restriction that leaves out all but a lucky few who get immediate help.

When given promptly,

tPA can reduce permanent disability. It only works on ischemic stroke, which is caused when a blood clot chokes off blood flow to the brain.

Stephen Davis of Royal Melbourne Hospital in Victoria, Australia, wanted to see if the drug could help a subset of stroke patients with salvageable brain tissue after the three-hour time limit had passed.

He and colleagues studied 101 patients who received tPA or placebo three to six hours after their stroke started. Of these, 99 people or 86 per cent were believed to have salvageable brain tissue. About half of these got tPA and half got placebo.

Incidence of heart diseases drops in France

PARIS, 25 Feb—The incidence of smoking-related diseases has sharply decreased after France enacted tough anti-smoking laws, the Health Ministry said in a report released on Saturday.

According to the report, the incidence of myocardial infarction and cerebrovascular diseases dropped by 15 per cent in recent two months.

It will be further proved in the next two months that

anti-smoking laws will bring significant and instant benefits to the health of the French people, said the report. French has banned smoking in companies, government offices and shopping

centres since 1 February, 2007. From the beginning of this year, smoking are banned in all public places across France, including bars, cafes, restaurants and discotheques.

Villa are in sixth place with 47 points, the same total as Liverpool and Everton who occupy fourth and fifth respectively.

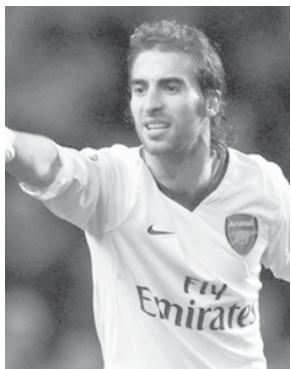
Reading remain third from bottom with 22 points.

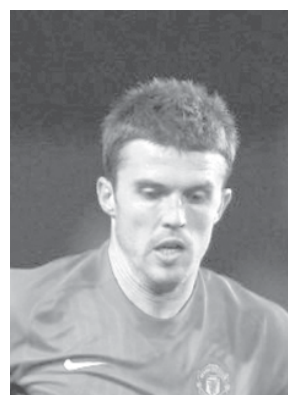

Seven die due to heavy rainfalls in Colombia

BOGOTA, 25 Feb— Seven people including three children died in Colombia due to heavy rainfalls, according to Colombian rescue team Friday.

"Four municipalities have been affected by Santander's rainfalls. The most critical situation occurred in Bucaramanga, where 110 people were affected," said rescue workers in the region. — MNA/Xinhua

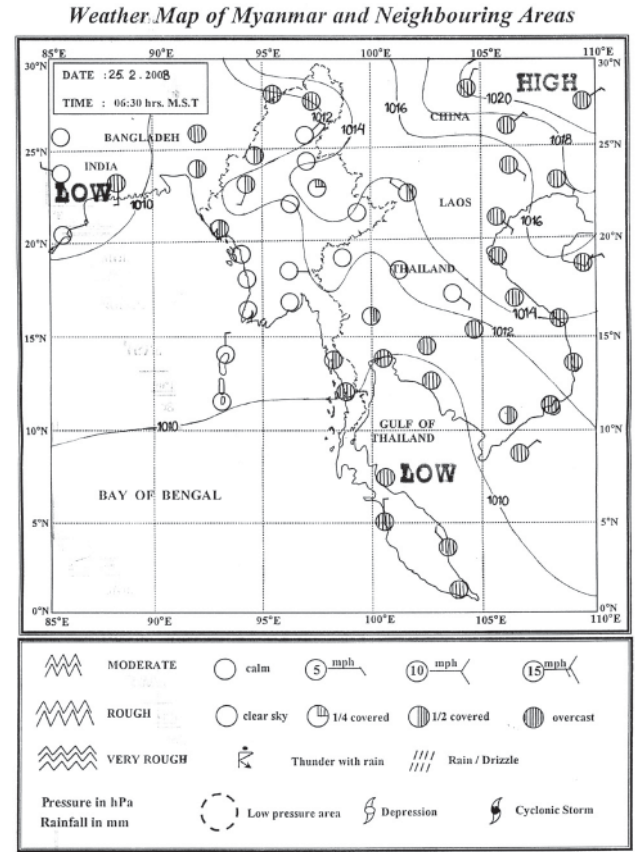
Chavez sends condolences to families of air crash victims
