Well aware of the loss of lives and property of the people caused by fires the entire people are to cooperate with the organizations concerned and property contractors in taking fire preventative measures.


All in all, preventative measures against outbreakes of fires are to be taken in all seriousness. Only then, will the people be free from the dangers of such natural disaster.

NATO allies undecided on missile shield plan

Brussels, 14 March— NATO will delay a decision on whether to commission a missile shield to protect those parts of Europe not covered by a planned US system because major issues remain open, an alliance official said on Wednesday.

NATO allies Greece, Romania, Bulgaria and Turkey will not be fully covered by a proposed US shield in East Europe to counter missile threats from what Washington

calls "rogue states" such as Iran and North Korea.

The United States had originally sought a decision by an alliance summit in Bucharest next month on whether to go ahead with a NATO "bolton" shield to cover those countries, but a number of allies are sceptical about the plan. "I don't think we are going to see a decision there. I don't see any nation pushing for a decision on an actual procurement programme," NATO Assistant Secretary-General for Defence Investment Division Peter Flory told a news briefing.

"The questions tend to be: How much would this cost? How effective would it be? Where would it fit in with a broader concept of how you would deal with weapons of mass destruction?" While insisting that Russia—which opposes the US plan —had no say in the final decision on a NATO shield, Flory said: "It is clearly an element in our discussion."

US voters say they are worse off than 2004

WASHINGTON, 14 March —A plurality of US voters heading into the November presidential election said they are worse off than they were four years ago, according to an NBC News/Wall Street Journal poll released Wednesday.

NBC reported that this was the first time since 1992 that a majority of voters answered "no" when asked "Are you better off now than you were four years ago?" Forty-three per cent of respondents said they were worse off, compared with 34 per cent who said they were better

off and 21 per cent who said their status was the same, NBC reported.

By contrast, strong pluralities or majorities said that they were better off before entering the general elections in 1996, 2000 and 2004, NBC said.

But Democrats, who are trying to take back the White House after eight years of George W Bush's presidency, remain divided over who they want to take on presumptive Republican nominee Senator John McCain in the 4 November general ele-ction, NBC said.

Wounded East Timor President names gunman

CANBERRA, 14 March—East Timor President Jose Ramos-Horta, critically wounded in an assassination attempt in February, has named the gunman who shot and nearly killed him, an Australian newspaper reported on Thursday.

Ramos-Horta, 58, named Marcelo Caetano, one of 600 rebel soldiers sacked after going on strike in 2006, as the gunman who shot him outside the gates of his villa near the capital Dili, the Age newspaper said, quoting Ramos-Horta's brother Arsenio.

"The President recognized him. This man must be brought to justice," Arsenio Ramos-Horta told the paper. Rebels ambushed Ramos-Horta during an early morning walk on 11 February, and also mounted a separate failed attack on Prime Minister Xanana Gusmao. Ramos-Horta was shot several times in the attack in which rebel leader Alfredo Reinado was killed—MNA/Reuters

Armenian leader pledges to soften emergency rule

YEREVAN, 14 March— Armenian President Robert Kocharyan pledged on Wednesday to ease a state of emergency which he imposed earlier this month after opposition protests led to violent clashes with police. Kocharyan also warned the opposition not to stage any new protests while political tension remained high. "Tonight or tomorrow morning I will

sign a decree which will change the interpretation (of emergency rule)," Kocharyan told reporters. He said he would ease some of the restrictions on media coverage. —MNA/Reuters

France's last WWI veteran dies at 110

Paris, 14 March— France's last surviving veteran of World War One, an Italian immigrant who fought in the trenches with the Foreign Legion, has died at the age of 110, the president's office said on Wednesday.

Spokesman says US HR **Report on Vietnam false**

Hanoi, 14 March — The US State Department's Human Rights Report 2007 was based on false and prejudiced information about Vietnam, local newspaper Vietnam News Friday quoted a spokesman of the Vietnamese Foreign Ministry as saying.

It was regrettable that it had again failed to make objective observations about the real situation in the country, spokesman of the Vietnamese Foreign Ministry Le Dung said.

Vietnam has made great strides in ensuring and developing freedom of its citizens and the achievements have been recognized and highly appreciated by international community, he said.

Vietnam respects the rights of all citizens to freedom and democracy, he said, noting that like other countries, it is unacceptable to exploit the rights to violate the law. Dung said it is normal that Vietnam and the United States have differences on human rights issues. He has called for an increased exchange and dialogue based on equality between the two countries without interfering in internal affairs of each other.—MNA/Xinhua

Cambodia rejects US human rights assessment

But is there any perfect human rights situation anywhere in the world?" the statement said, adding that the report relied too heavily on the views of anti-government NGOs (Non-Government Organizations) and appeared timed to coincide with the national election. —MNA/Xinhua

ASEAN scholars say China not a threat

Beijing, 14 March — Scholars from the Association of the South-East Asian Nations (ASEAN) said on Thursday that China was not a threat to its 10-member countries and appreciated China's foreign and defence policies.

"China threat is not really a hard, physical, reality-based assessment," said Bernard Loo, Nanyang Technological University assistant professor, at a dialogue between senior defence scholars from China and ASEAN countries that opened here on Wednesday.

"China has been much involved in the world economy and world globalization." If there would be a war, the process will be jeopardized. In that respect, I don't really think China is a threat to the region," said the Singaporean.

He said China's diplomacy had been a success, and the country was now prepared to deal with ASEAN as a whole, and continued to deal with individual countries on a bilateral basis.

Loo noted China ranked first in a survey in terms of trustworthiness in Southeast Asia. The country was becoming more confident and more countries felt more comfortable in dealing with it. — MNA/Xinhua

B'desh Govt terms US HR report disappointing

DHAKA, 14 March — Bangladesh Government Thursday termed the US State Department's human rights practices report-2007 on Bangladesh disappointing for its "lack of balance" in presenting the country's ground realities, private news agency UNB reported Thursday.

The state department reportreleased in Washington Tuesday said the Bangladesh caretaker government's human rights record worsened, in part due to the state of emergency and postponement of elections.

Reacting to the report, Bangladeshi Foreign Ministry said Bangladesh is committed to upholding human rights of all its citizens in accordance with its constitutional obligations.

A spokesman for the ministry noted that all, including the international community, know the circumstances which led to the declaration of state of emergency early January 2007. "It is understood that during the State of Emergency, some fundamental rights remain suspended. However, the government is extremely careful in enforcing such provisions so that the fundamental rights are not infringed," the spokesman said.

The spokesman also said that the government is disappointed at the report's lack of balance as it failed to mention the significant reform measures taken by the caretaker government for consolidating and sustaining democracy.

US soldiers accidentally kill Iraqi child

Baghdad, 14 March – US soldiers accidentally shot and killed a child on Wednesday in Iraq's Diyala Province, the US military said on Thursday.

The killing of Iraqi civilians has long put a strain on relations between Baghdad and Washington, who this week began talks on future relations and the presence of US troops after the current UN mandate expires at the end of this

The military said soldiers were operating in an area where roadside bombs had been found recently in ethnically and religiously mixed Diyala, one of four northern provinces where US and Iraqi have launched a series of operations this year.

The soldiers fired a warning shot into a sand berm after they found a "suspicious woman who appeared to be signalling to someone".

The military said a young girl was found on the other side of the berm suffering from a gunshot wound. Soldiers treated the girl and called for emergency help but she died on the way to a military hospital. They said the incident was under investigation but no other details about the girl or the exact location were available.

Iraqis bury 10 after blast US says killed no one

BAGHDAD, 14 March – It was an incident that aptly summed up the fog of war in Iraq — relatives burying nine women and a child they said were victims of a bomb attack on a bus in which the US military said no one died.

In Iraq, acts of violence almost always accompanied by multiple accounts from witnesses, police, health officials and MNA/Reuters | US forces. But even by Iraqi standards Tuesday's attack on a bus full of mourners was a puzzle.

The US military said in a statement on Wednesday the bus was hit by an explosively formed penetrator, a particularly deadly type of roadside bomb normally used against US armoured vehicles. A nearby US convoy was also caught in the blast.

"Operational reports

confirm one US soldier and one civilian were wounded in the convoy," the military said in a statement that came after a day of conflicting casualty reports.

A spokesman for British military forces in the nearby southern city of Basra, Major Tom Holloway, said he was still trying to work out the number of casualties after police initially reported 16 people being killed. —MNA/Reuters

China, Russia to further enhance strategic cooperation

Beijing, 13 March— China and Russia are ready to further enhance their strategic partnership of cooperation, Foreign Minister Yang Jiechi said here on Wednesday.

"China-Russia relations are in good shape," Yang said in response to a question raised by a Russian journalist at a Press conference on the sidelines of the annual parliamentary session. He voiced China's "warm congratulations" Russia's President-elect Dmitry Medvedev, and the country's high appreciation for outgoing President Vladimir Putin for his great contributions to Sino-Russian relations over the years.

Beijing, 14 March — Jia Qinglin was reelected chairman of the National Committee of the Chinese People's Political Consultative Conference (CPPCC), the top political advisory body, here on Thursday afternoon, starting a new term of five years.

A total of 25 vice-chairpersons, a secretary-general and 298 Standing Committee members of the 11th CPPCC National Committee were also elected at the fourth plenary meeting of the First Session of the 11th CPPCC National Committee.

The 11th CPPCC National Committee has 2,236 members, and 2,178 attended Thursday's plenary meeting.

Fifty-four ballot examiners checked 23 ballot boxes before the voting, which started at 3:45 p.m. and lasted about half an hour.

Among the newly elected chairman and vicechairpersons, 13 people are members of non-Communist parties and the All-China Federation of Industry and Commerce, or personages without party affiliation, while five are from ethnic minorities and four are women. — Xinhua

Four killed in Mississippi shooting

Washington, 13 March—A man shot dead his exwife and two other people before committing suicide in McComb, Mississippi on Wednesday.

Witnesses said the man walked into the Regions Bank on Main Street where his ex-wife worked, and opened fire. He killed a customer and an employee there and then took his ex-wife away with him.

The woman's body was later found on a highway a few kilometres from the bank. The shooter apparently shot himself and crashed his vehicle at another location. He finally died in a hospital.

McComb Police Chief Billie Hughes described the incident as a domestic dispute. None of victims nor the killer have been identified.—Xinhua

French Army helicopter crashes in Ivory Coast

ABIDJAN (Ivory Coast), 13 March—A French Army helicopter crashed near the central city of Bouake in Ivory Coast, with both crew members escaping unhurt, the army said in a statement Monday.

"About 13:45 local time (GMT), a Gazelle helicopter belonging to the French Licorne Force crashed above a dam some kilometres south of Bouake," the statement from the Licorne base in Ivory Coast said. An error of the pilot was indicated as the possible cause of the accident. —Xinhua

Russians prefer Clinton to Obama to be US President

Moscow, 13 March—Who in the United States presidential race will get a vote from a Russian? Most probably Senator Hillary Rodham Clinton of New York rather than Senator Barack Obama of Illinois, a latest poll shows.

Of the 1,600 respondents to the poll carried out in mid-February by the All-Russian Public Opinion Research Centre (VTsIOM), 19 per cent said they would vote for Cliton but only 4 per cent for Obama and 1 per cent would vote for a different candidate if they could.

In the poll conducted in 135 Russian regions, 19 per cent of respondents believe that it will be better for Russia's national interests if a Democratic candidate wins the elections, while 4 per cent prefer a Republican candidate, Interfax news agency reported on Wednesday.—Xinhua

EU calls for clarification of **Gazprom-Ukraine ties**

Brussels, 13 March—European Union governments called on Tuesday for Ukraine and Russian natural gas monopoly Gazprom to clarify their relations after a recent spat over debts cut energy supplies to the former Soviet republics.

Gas experts from the EU's 27 nations also said the gas cuts to Ukraine —which threatened supplies to the EU—strengthened the case for the bloc to improve coordination of its energy policies.

"The group underlined the importance and the necessity of urgent clarification of relations between Gazprom and Ukraine as far as domestic Ukrainian gas consumption and gas transit towards the EU is concerned," it said.

Philippines Govt debt down 3.6% in 2007

Manila, 14 March—The Philippines' Government debt fell to 3.712 trillion pesos (90.31 billion US dollars) at the end of December 2007, down 3.6 per cent from the previous year, the country's Bureau of Treasury said on Wednesday.

Total debt shrank 1.0 per cent from November, as the peso's appreciation against the greenback helped trim debt by 46 billion pesos (1.12 billion dollars), the Bureau of Treasury said in a Press release, adding that the gain of other currencies against the dollar also brought down government debt by 13 billion pesos (316 million dollars).

Of the total outstanding debt, 1.511 trillion pesos (36.76 billion dollars), or 41 per cent, is owed to foreign creditors and 2.201 trillion pesos (53.55 billion dollars), or 59 per cent, to domestic creditors.

The peso gained nearly 19 per cent against the US dollar in 2007 to become Asia's best performing currency, supported by strong foreign exchange inflows that included last year's record 14.4 billion dollars in remittances from overseas Filipino workers.

The Philippine Government is aiming for a balanced budget this year following a decade of deficits that had led to a bloated public debt. The Philippines registered a budget deficit of 9.4 billion peso (about 230 million dollars) in 2007, the lowest in 10 years. —MNA/Xinhua

Google wins EU approval to buy DoubleClick

Brussels, 13 March—The Internet search engine giant Google won Tuesday approval from the European Union (EU) to buy US online advertising firm DoubleClick for 3.1 billion US dollars.

"The transaction would be unlikely to have harmful effects on consumers, either in ad serving or in intermediation in online advertising markets," the European Commission, the EU's antitrust watchdog, said in a statement after concluding an in-depth investigation into the deal. Google operates an Internet search engine that offers search capabilities for end users free of charge and provides online advertising space on its own websites. It also provides intermediation services to publishers and advertisers for the sale of online advertising space on partner websites through its network "AdSense".

DoubleClick mainly sells ad serving, management and reporting technology worldwide to website publishers and to advertisers and agencies. Such technology allows Internet publishers and advertisers to ensure that advertisements are posted on the relevant websites and to report on the performance of such advertisements.

The Commission said its in-depth market investigation found that Google and DoubleClick were not exerting major competitive constraints on each other's activities and could, therefore, not be considered as competitors at the moment.—MNA/Xinhua

UAE national airline to increase flights in summer

ABU DHABI, 14 March—Etihad Airways, the national carrier of the United Arab Emirates (UAE), will increase its weekly flights to 728 with a new summer flying programme starting from 30 March, local newspaper Gulf *News* reported on Tuesday.

With the new summer programme, Etihad's weekly flights will pose an increase of 47 per cent from 494 in the same period of 2007, according to the report. On 30 March, the airline will launch a new non-stop service linking its hub city Abu Dhabi and the Chinese capital Beijing, adding four flights a week to its summer schedule.

"In addition to the new Beijing service, Etihad will offer travellers from around the world significantly improved connection opportunities through our Abu Dhabi home base as we continue to add breadth, depth and additional frequency to the airline's expanding global route network," the airline's CEO James Hogan said. — MNA/Xinhua

The Airline said it has firm orders for another 16 A380s and options on six more. — MNA/Xinhua


Crude oil prices hit \$110





Pakistan court dismisses graft case against Zardari

ISLAMABAD, 13 March A Pakistani court dismissed one of two corruption cases against the widower of former prime minister Benazir Bhutto on Wednesday, his lawyer said, in a step towards clearing the way for him to hold government office. Bhutto's husband, Asif Ali Zardari, led her Pakistan People's Party (PPP) to election victory on Feb-Oruary 18 and he is forming a coalition government with other parties.

Zardari's lawyer, Faroog Naik, said a court dismissed one of two outstanding cases against his client as it fell within the ambit of an October presidential ordinance that wiped out graft charges against Bhutto, Zardari and others, introduced as part of a power-sharing deal with Bhutto. "The judge ordered he stand acquitted and the case stand terminated and withdrawn," Naik told reporters.

Naik said a court would rule on the the final case against Zardari on Friday. Zardari did not run

in the February 18 vote, in which his party rode a wave of sympathy after Bhutto's murder on December 27. The party finished with the most seats but not enough to rule alone.

Pakistanis convicted of a crime are barred from standing for election and while Zardari has never been convicted, corruption cases have been hanging over him, raising doubts about his future.

Overseas fraud hitting British bank cards

London, 13 March cards have surged 25 per doubling of fraud committed overseas, new figures show.

Total card fraud losses rose to 535.2 million pounds in the past year, reversing a two-year decline, according to figures from APACS, the payments UKassociation.

That was driven by a 77-per-cent increase in fraud committed overseas by criminals using stolen UK card details. That rose to 207.6 million pounds in 2007 from 117.1 million pounds in 2006.

Fraud abroad, generally committed in countries that are yet to upgrade to chip and PIN technology, accounts for 39 per cent of total British card fraud losses. Counterfeit criminals stealing card details in the UK to make counterfeit magnetic stripe cards for use overseas - has increased 46 per cent in the past year. —MNA/Reuters

Many UK schools breaking rules over fair admissions

London, 13 March state-funded schools are breaking the government's new code on fair admissions, with some asking parents to make a financial contribution before accepting an application, Schools Secretary Ed Balls said on Tuesday.

The code, which came into force in time for secondary school places granted last week, bans schools from selecting children on the basis of academic ability or social

Schools can no longer interview children or parents before admission and have to give priority to those in care.

But a survey of three local authorities in Northamptonshire, Manchester and Barnet in north found London "significant minority" of schools were complying.

Balls said he would tighten up regulations, requiring local authorities to report each year on the legality and fairness of admissions policy at each school in their area.

The code is currently largely policed by parents making objections where they feel admissions are unfair

But Balls said that across England there had only been 79 objections from parents to the Schools Adjudicator, who has the power to order changes in the ways pupils are admitted.

Balls said he would publish a guide for parents admissions and appeals, and extend the period during which objections could be made to the adjudicator.

As well as asking parents for financial contributions, banned practices discovered in the three areas surveyed included:

-asking about the marital status of parents, their jobs and income

-giving priority to family members who were not siblings currently at the school.

Newer air bags not linked to more driver deaths

NEW YORK, 13 March—The use of secondgeneration air bags in motor vehicles does not appear to have increased fatalities among drivers involved in head-on crashes, study findings suggest.

"The point of second generation, or depowered, air bags was to reduce deaths among children, small adults, and vulnerable occupants who were previously killed by air bag deployment," Dr Elisa R Braver noted in an interview with Reuters Health.

In 1997, when US air bag testing regulations were changed, there were concerns that depowering air bags might place drivers at increased risk, said Braver, of the National Study Centre for Trauma and EMS, at the University of Maryland School of Medicine in Baltimore.

To determine whether newer air bags placed drivers at increased risk, Braver and colleagues looked at driver fatalities in 1,572 two-vehicle, head-on collisions between passenger vehicles. "A head-on collision is a very demanding test of how restraint systems work," Braver noted. — MNA/Reuters

FBI arrests US surgeon wanted in Australia

PORTLAND (Oregon), 13 March—A US surgeon wanted in Australia on charges of manslaughter, negligence and fraud was arrested in Oregon on Tuesday. Jayant Patel, who could face life in prison in Australia, appeared before a US federal magistrate who set the doctor's extradition hearing for 10 April. The FBI arrested Patel at his home in suburban Portland.

Patel was charged in Australia with three counts of nanslaughter after an inquiry in late 2005 linked him to the deaths of at least 13 patients and the harm of at least 31 others while he was working as a surgeon at the Bundaberg Base Hospital in Queensland State.

Patel, a US citizen born in India, was also charged with three counts of causing grievous bodily harm, two counts of negligence and seven counts of fraud, according to court documents. Australian police began formal extradition proceedings in 2007.

According to court documents, Patel has a history of botched surgeries and negligent care going back two decades.Regulators in New York found Patel guilty of gross negligence in 1984 and then he moved to Oregon where he eventually had his surgical privileges restricted after a high number of complaints, the documents said. -MNAReuters

Australian wins Astrid Lindgren Memorial Award

STOCKHOLM, 14 March — Australian author Sonya Hartnett was Wednesday declared the 2008 winner of the Astrid Lindgren Memorial Award for Literature, the highest children's book award in the world. "Sonya Hartnett is one of the major forces for renewal in modern young adult fiction," a spokesman for the award jury said at a Press conference in the Swedish southern city of Vimmerby, where Astrid Lindgren lives.

Cat carried woman's antibiotic-resistant infection

Boston, 14 March — Pets can harbour virulent antibiotic-resistant infections and spread them to humans, German researchers reported on Wednesday.

The warning is based on the case of a woman who had deep abscesses caused by methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus or MRSA. Her husband and two children showed evidence of infection, too, but it disappeared with treatment even as the woman's abscesses festered.

So Dr Andreas Sing of the Bavarian Food and Health Safety Authority and colleagues examined the woman's three appar-ently healthy cats.

Study says drinking prevention needed in grade school

New York, 13 March — A significant number of children are already drinking by middle school, suggesting that prevention needs to start in the elementary grades, researchers conclude in a new report.

In their study of more than 4,000 sixth-graders at Chicago schools, 17 per cent of the children had used alcohol in the past year. Those students who had started drinking were also more likely than their peers to have a range of problems, such as getting into fights, shoplifting or

getting into trouble at school.

The findings, reported in the journal *Health Education and Behaviour*, suggest that alcohol prevention needs to start in grade school, researchers say.

And such prevention efforts should include parents, according to lead researcher Dr Keryn Pasch, of the University of Minnesota School of Public Health in

Minneapolis.

One way to do that, she told *Reuters* Health, would be for school-based programmes to include take-home assignments or other activities that involve parents.

The study included an ethnically diverse sample of sixth-graders at 61 Chicago schools; 713, or just over 17 per cent, said they had drunk alcohol in the past year.

Short-term stress can affect learning, memory

Washington, 13
March — Short-term stress lasting as little as a few hours can impair brain-cell communication in areas associated with learning and memory, University of California, Irvine researchers have found.

It has been known that severe stress lasting weeks or months can impair cell communication in the brain's learning and memory region, but this study provides the first evidence that short-term stress has the same effect. The study appears in the 12 March edition of the *Journal of Neuroscience*.

"Stress is a constant in our lives and cannot be avoided," said Dr Tallie Z Baram, the study leader.

"Our findings can play an important role in the current development of drugs that might prevent these undesirable effects and offer insights into why some people are forgetful or have difficulty retaining information during stressful situations."

In their study, Baram and her colleagues identified a novel process by which stress caused these effects. They found that rather than involving the widely known stress hormone cortisol, which circulates throughout the body, acute stress activated selective molecules called corticotropin releasing hormones (CRH), which disrupted the process by which the brain collects and stores memories.—MNA/Xinhua

Man arrested for running onto Heathrow runway

London, 14 March — A man was arrested on Thursday after running onto a runway at London's Heathrow Airport carrying a bag, police said.

"I can confirm that at approximately 2:05 pm a man was seen airside at Heathrow Airport on the northern runway. He's been arrested by police and he's currently in custody," a police spokesman said. He declined to say whether the incident was considered terrorism-related. "A bag has been recovered and obviously it will be examined," he said.

BBC television pictures showed several emergency cars with flashing lights parked on the airport runway.

A spokesman for airport operator BAA, owned by Spanish company Ferrovial said he was aware of an incident and was checking details.

A spokesman for British Airways the largest user of the airport, said the incident would effect mostly short-haul flights.

"We expect to have to cancel a number of flights but at this stage we don't know how many," he said.

Heathrow, the world's busiest international airport, has been the object of protests in the past from environmentalists angered at plans to boost traffic with the addition of a third runway and a sixth terminal.

Britain's FMD blamed on "shabby" lab

London, 13 March — Shabby facilities and substandard practices at a government research centre were in part to blame for last year's outbreak of foot and

mouth disease in southeast England, an independent review said on Tuesday.

Foot and mouth (FMD) disease was found at a farm in Surrey on 3 August and traced to the Pirbright research facility.

Pirbright houses a laboratory run by the Institute of Animal Health (IAH) and one by Merial, a private company owned by US pharmaceutical firm Merck and French firm Sanofi-Aventis SA.

The review released to parliament pointed to "a creeping degradation of standards at Pirbright, combined with a lowering of expectations in spite of the potential dangers".

Mother quizzed over cocaine-strapped children in London

London, 14 March — A mother was questioned by Customs officers on Wednesday after cocaine with an estimated street value of 675,000 pounds was found strapped to the legs of her young children. The family was stopped at Heathrow after they arrived on a British Airways flight from Mexico City on Tuesday. Customs officials found 15 kilos of the drug strapped to the legs of the woman's daughter, aged 11, and son, 13, HM Revenue & Customs (HMRC) said.

"We never cease to be amazed at the lengths to which some people will go to hide drugs from us when they pass through our controls," Bob Gaiger, HMRC spokesman at Heathrow said.

JOHANNESBURG, 14 March — A 17.6-million-US-dollar prize fund will be divided among the eight countries in next year's Confederations Cup in South Africa, FIFA announced on Thursday.

The two-week tournament, featuring the world champions, six continental champions and hosts South Africa, is a test event for the 2010 World Cup.

"It is an ideal test run for the organiszers of the 2010 World Cup in terms of infrastructure, logistics and services," FIFA President Sepp Blatter said in a statement on the governing body's website (www.fifa.com).

Top 36 German clubs earn record \$2.7b

Berlin, 24 March—The 36 clubs in Germany's top two leagues earned a record total of 1.75 billion euros (2.73 billion US dollars) last season, up 15 per cent from the previous campaign.

The clubs benefited from a combined extra income of around 50 million euros from the 2006 World Cup in Germany, according to the DFL (Football League). Attendances also rose for the sixth successive season, up to a record 16.3 million, while the proportion of female fans increased from 21 to 23 per cent.

Borussia Dortmund, the only Bundesliga club listed on the stock exchange, said last month it posted a net loss in the first half of 2007-08. —MNA/Reuters

Rangers, Sporting through to UEFA Cup last 8

London, 14 March — Rangers and Sporting completed the UEFA Cup quarterfinal line up on Thursday, the Scottish league leaders knocking out Werder Bremen while the Lisbon side ended the run of Bolton Wanderers.

Werder, bidding to become the third German side into the last eight after Bayern Munich and Bayer Leverkusen qualified on Wednesday, could only win 1-0 at the Weserstadion and went out 2-1 on aggregate.

Sporting, beaten finalists in 2005, edged a weakened Bolton side 1-0 at home to secure the tie 2-1.

Bundesligatitle challengers Werder forced 18 corners against Rangers, peppered their opponents's goal from all angles but found visiting keeper Allan McGregor in inspired form.

He pulled off a string of fine saves in both halves to keep the German side at bay. He was finally beaten just before the hour when Brazilian Diego struck with a sweet left-footed shot on the half volley.

But with the clock ticking down McGregor saved his best to last, get-

ting the faintest of touches to push Boubacar Sanogo's close-range shot up onto the crossbar when the Ivorian seemed destined to send the game into extra time.

Benzema extends Lyon contract until 2013

Lyon (France), 14 March — France striker Karim Benzema has extended his Olympique Lyon contract until 2013, the six-times French champions said on Thursday.

Benzema, 20, has scored 27 goals in all competitions this season, including 17 in Ligue 1, and has been linked with several leading European clubs including Manchester United.

His new contract includes an option for an additional year "(Financially), we did what we had to do to keep him in Lyon," club president Jean-Michel Aulas told a news conference.

"We did our best so that he does not go abroad. He deserves it."

Benzema, who has scored three goals in nine matches for France since earning his first cap in a 1-0 defeat of Austria a year ago, said he wanted to stay at Lyon to improve.— MNA/Reuters

Cuban team start with 10 men after defections

Orlando (Florida), 14 March — Cuba's Olympic soccer team took to the field with only 10 men on Thursday after up to seven players defected.

Five members of the Communist state's Under-23 team defected after their Olympic qualifier against the United States in Tampa on Tuesday and two others were absent from the line-up against Honduras on Thursday.

Both were reported to have defected.

With one player suspended following a red card, Cuba coach Raul Gonzalez could field only 10 men, with no substitutes.

Cuba held Honduras for 69 minutes before goals from Marvin Sanchez and Hendry Thomas condemned them to defeat.

"It was a great game for Cuba," said Gonzalez.

"It's hard to play with 10 players. It's something you have to accept." — MNA/Reuters

Bomb scare forces evacuation of US City Hall

Los Angeles, 13 March — A suspicious suitcase prompted the evacuation of Maywood City Hall and the city's poli1ce depart-ment headquarters in the Los Angeles area, authori-ties said on Wednesday.

The evacuation took place Tuesday night, but the sheriff's bomb squad blew the suitcase up early this morning, said Maywood police Chief Frank Hauptmann.

Investigators determined that the suitcase contained only clothing, Hauptmann said.

The suitcase — a large, '70s vintage-type piece of luggage — was standing upright and off to the side at the bottom of the stairwell in the city hall, Hauptmann said. There were chalk-like inscrip-tions on the exterior that "appeared to be graffiti", he said. "Everyone who passed by noticed it just sitting there," Hauptmann said. — MNA/Xinhua

Severe gales batter Britain for third day

CHELTENHAM (England), 14 March — A third day of severe gales disrupted road and rail travel across the country and forced organizers to cancel day two of the Cheltenham horse racing festival on Wednesday.


The Met Office issued severe weather warnings for much of central and northern England, north Wales and Northern Ireland and said conditions "extremely were hazardous".

Heavy rain, snow showers and wind gusting at up to 80 miles per hour swept across the country early on Wednesday.

The second day of racing at Cheltenham was called off after strong winds damaged temporary buildings, making the course unsafe for the 55,000 spectators due to watch the races.

"We cannot guarantee the safety of the customers but the good news is we can stage all the races now over the next two days," said Cheltenham Managing Director Edward Gillespie.

Several lorries overturned in the early hours on the Thelwall Viaduct on the M6 west of Manchester, police said. None of the drivers was injured. — MNA/Reuters

Iraq says to sue Halabja chemical weapons suppliers

BAGHDAD, 14 March—Iraq plans to take legal action against the suppliers of chemicals used in a poison gas attack on the town of Halabja in Iraq's Kurdish north, which killed 5,000 people in 1988, the government said on Wednesday.

Iraq's Cabinet also approved six million US dollars to finance construction in the town ahead of the 20th anniversary of the attack on March 16, it said in a statement.

"The Cabinet decided

to take legal measures to sue the companies who provided the ex-regime with the chemical weapons used in Halabja," the statement said, without naming the companies.

In 2005, a Dutch court Dutch sentenced a

businessman to 15 years in prison, later raised to 17 years, for supplying the raw materials for poison gas to Saddam Hussein's Iraq. The gas was used in Halabja, and also in Iraq's 1980-1988 war with Iran.
