## Chavez seeks Russian submarines

Moscow, 5 April — Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez may sign a contract for four Russian diesel submarines on a visit to Moscow next month, the *Kommersant* daily reported on Friday, citing unidentified officials.

Chavez has been invited to the May inauguration of Dmitry Medvedev as Russian President.

If he takes up the invitation, the Venezuelan leader may use the opportunity to sign a contract to buy four Kilo-class diesel submarines agreed at the start of this year, the paper said.

*Kommersant* said the

submarine contract, worth about one billion US dollars, had been set to be signed in February.

Venezuela is seeking a loan of about 800 million US dollars from a Russian bank, probably from Russia's official debt agent, Vneshekonombank, for some of the arms purchases, the paper said, adding that the loan had

yet to be agreed.

The paper said Venezuela also wants to buy 12 *Ilyushin Il-76* military transport aircraft while Russia is interested in selling Caracas its new generation *Sukhoi Su-35* fighters, which are still being tested.

Venezuela is Russia's fourth biggest arms buyer after China, India and Algeria.

## British police seize 350 kilos of heroin

LONDON, 6 April — British police have made one of the country's biggest ever heroin seizures with a street value estimated at 15 to 20 million pounds (30 US

dollars to 40 million US dollars) and arrested three men, the Metropolitan Police said on Saturday.

The specialist crime central task force seized 350 kilos (770 pounds)

of heroin from two cars at a motorway service station in Kent, southeast England, on Thursday. Two men living in London, Harminder Chana and Atif Khan, and Dutchman Patrick Kuster have been charged with conspiracy to supply heroin, police said.

Chana and Kuster were arrested in the motorway service station, while Khan was arrested in Ilford in east London.

"This is one of the largest ever seizures of heroin by police in the UK," said detective chief inspector Peter Beyer.

### Death toll rises to 20 in Diyala suicide bombing

BAGHDAD, 6 April — The toll from the suicide bomb attack on mourners in Diyala Province on Friday rose to 20 killed and 30 people injured, a provincial police source said.

"Our latest reports said that 20 people were killed and 30 others wounded," Lieutenant-Colonel Ali Salim told *Xinhua* by telephone.

A suicide bomber blew up his explosive vest among a crowd of people at a cemetery in the town of al-Sadiyah, northeast of the capital city of Baquba, Salim said.

The mourners were burying a policeman killed a day before in Diyala violence, he said.

Earlier, a police source put the toll at 10 killed and 30 wounded.

Diyala Province, which stretches from the eastern edges of Baghdad to the Iranian border in the east, is a hot bed for sectarian violence and a major stronghold for al-Qaeda network. —*MNA/Xinhua*

### NATO soldier dies of wounds in Afghanistan

KABUL, 6 April — A soldier of the NATO-led International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) who sustained injuries in an explosion in south Afghanistan died, a Press release of the alliance issued on Saturday said.

"An ISAF soldier died Friday from injuries sustained in an explosion during a patrol in southern Afghanistan," the Press release added.

However, it did not disclose the date and the exact place of the incident where he faced the fatality.

In the Press release the multinational force also did not disclose the nationality of the soldiers, adding ISAF does not release the casualty's nationality prior to the relevant national authority doing so.

Conflicts and Taliban-related violence have left more than 300 people dead, including Afghan and NATO troops as well as civilians, since the beginning of this year in Afghanistan.

## Argentina celebrates Olympic torch relay

BUENOS AIRES, 6 April — Argentine Buenos Aires government's sports undersecretary Francisco Irarrazabal said on Friday that the Olympic Fire's passing through Argentina's capital, Buenos Aires, "will be the biggest event" of this sort "in the forthcoming two to three years".

Irarrazabal said "we started organizing it seven months ago and everything is ready" for Friday April 11 when the Olympic Flame relay will be carried out with Argentine athletes.

Irarrazabal said in a speech at Buenos Aires' Legislature, where the Olympic Flame was presented, that the event will be transmitted through television to some "1.300

billion people worldwide". "It is a historic opportunity to unite peoples, nations and ethnic groups," said Irarrazabal.

## US lawmakers invest \$196m in Pentagon contractors

WASHINGTON, 5 April — The US lawmakers have invested a total of 195.5 million US dollars in the defence department's contract companies and gained much profit from the Iraq war, said a new study released on Thursday.

The Centre for Responsive Politics, a Washington-based nonpartisan group, conducted the study by reviewing lawmakers' financial statements in 2006.

From 2004 to 2006, a total of 151 Congress members invested 78.7 million dollars to 195.5 million dollars in companies that have contracts with the Pentagon, and brought them profit

of between 15.8 million dollars and 62 million dollars, according to the study.

It also found more congressional Republicans than Democrats have stocks in the defence companies, but Democrats' military-related investment in 2006 is higher than Republicans, which is 3.7 million dollars to 577,500 dollars.

The Centre for Responsive Politics voiced the concerns that lawmakers' investment in the defense department contractors could constitute a conflict of interest as they take part in the decision-making on Iraq war budgets.

## Canadian man sentenced to 18 years for spreading HIV

OTTAWA, 5 April — A Canadian man was sentenced to 18 years' in prison Friday after being convicted of spreading HIV through sexual relations with 15 women.

Carl Leone, 32, pleaded guilty last year to 15 counts of aggravated sexual assault after failing to inform his sexual partners of his HIV status. Five of the 15 women are now HIV-positive, *Canadian Press* reported.

Justice Joseph Quinn

from the Ontario Superior Court in Windsor originally handed him 15 consecutive sentences totaling 49 years, but later reduced to 18 years. Leone's age, his lack of a criminal record and the fact he pleaded guilty to spare his victims the

trauma of testifying were factors in his sentence, said Quinn.

But he pointed out that Leone committed a "despicable and selfish crime for five to 10 minutes of sexual gratification".

## Pirates seize French yacht, 30 crew off Somalia

PARIS, 5 April 5— Pirates have taken over a French luxury yacht with 30 crew on board off the coast of Somalia, the boat's owner said on Friday.

Luxury sailboat the *Ponant* was heading from the Seychelles to the Mediterranean Sea when pirates stormed it in the Gulf of Aden, which lies between Somalia and Yemen, said a spokesman for the boat's owner, the Compagnie des Iles du Ponant. There were no customers on board, a spokesman for the tour company said, adding that most of the crew are French.

"We have been informed that pirates are on board. We are in close contact with the Foreign Ministry," said Guillaume

Foucault, of the Compagnie des Iles du Ponant, which is part of the CMA-CGM shipping group.

France Info radio said the French Navy had lost contact with the yacht, adding that surveillance aircraft had been diverted

to the area and a ship from the US-led Operation Enduring Freedom was heading towards the site of the attack. The French Foreign Ministry said in a statement it was verifying reports of the attack.

## Congo finds radioactive minerals in ore export

KINSHASA, 5 April — Security forces in Democratic Republic of Congo's Katanga Province have intercepted a truck transporting radioactive mineral ore bound for export, local authorities said on Friday.

The truck, carrying 30 tonnes of copper and cobalt ore for Chinese-run firm Hua-Shin Mining, was stopped at an inspection checkpoint near Kolwezi, one of Congo's biggest copper belt mining towns, on Wednesday.

Kolwezi mayor Christian Busindi said only part of the load was

believed to exceed the acceptable levels of radioactivity and those minerals would be deposited at a secure site to be determined by state copper miner, Gecamines.

"We have detained some of the company's representatives ... Now we need to find out where

(the minerals) came from," he told *Reuters*.

Ore mined in Katanga, home to one of the world's richest belts of copper and cobalt, habitually contains trace amounts of uranium, which Congo is currently banned from exporting.

## Suicide attack kills four, injures eight in S Afghanistan

KABUL, 5 April — A suicide attacker Friday morning exploded himself near a police vehicle, killing three policemen and one civilian, injuring eight others, in southern Afghan province of Helmand, said a police official.

Mohammad Hussein Andiwal, the provincial police chief, told *Xinhua* that it occurred at around 9 a.m. (0430 GMT) when the suicide attacker came by foot to the police vehicle parking outside a local market in Lashkar gah District, the capital of Helmand Province, then exploded himself. — MNA/Xinhua

## Bus crash kills 15 in eastern India

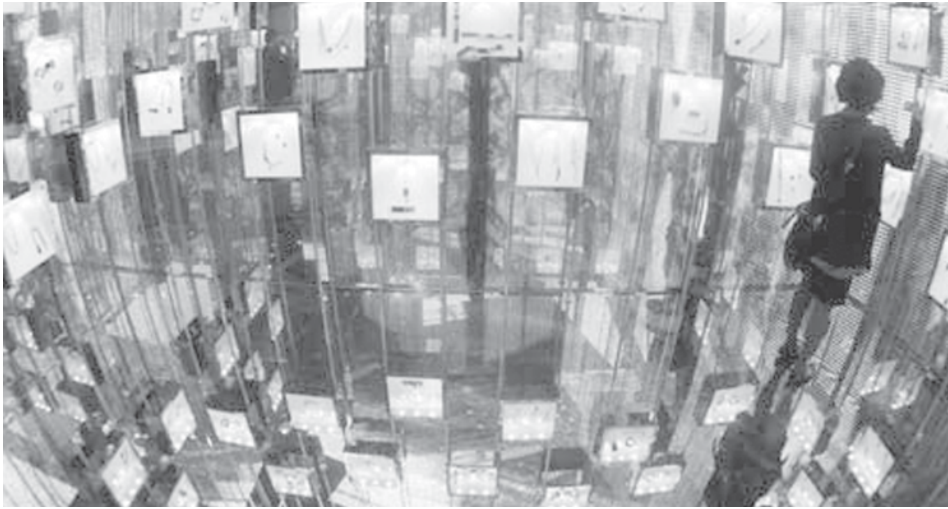
KOLKATA (India), 5 April — At least 15 people were killed on Friday when a bus in which they were travelling veered off the road and plunged into a canal in eastern India, police said.

The driver of the bus, carrying 50 passengers, lost control while overtaking another vehicle in a busy street of Kolkata, the capital of West Bengal State, police and witnesses said.

Rescuers took dozens of injured people to a hospital as divers looked for more bodies in the water.

"The toll may rise later in the evening as we are looking for more bodies," Raj Kanojia, a senior police official, said in Kolkata. — MNA/Reuters

## Egypt mulling ways to curb price hikes

SHARM EL-SHEIKH, 6 April — The Egyptian Government is seeking coordinating efforts to curb price hikes that hit the country greatly in recent months, Egyptian Minister of Investment Mahmoud Mohieddin said on Saturday at the Red Sea resort of Sharm el-Sheikh.

On the sidelines of the Second Asia-Middle East Dialogue (AMED II) opened here earlier in the day, Mohieddin said one of the options is to stop turning agricultural crops into organic fuel that will only result in further rise of food prices.

On Wednesday,

Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak issued a decree to exempt import Customs on basic commodities to increase supply in the local market to stabilize prices.

During the AMED II,

Mohieddin said he will post participants on investment opportunities and measures to encourage investments in a bid to lure more investments for the development of Egypt.

## US seizes \$1.3m illegal dietary supplement products

WASHINGTON, 15 April — The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) announced Friday that at its request US Marshals on Wednesday seized nearly 1.3 million US dollars of illegal dietary supplements from a Michigan-based company. The products, made by LG Sciences in Brighton, Michigan, contain unapproved food

additives or new dietary ingredients that cause the products to violate the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act, FDA said in a statement.

Labelled as dietary supplements, the seized products were marketed for use by body builders and sold on-line and in retail stores under the names “Methyl 1-D”, “Methyl 1-

D XL” and “Formadrol Extreme XL”.

“Working with the FDA, we are taking prompt civil action to protect the public health by seizing these illegal products and forestalling their shipment into the stream of commerce in any manner that could create harm to the public,” said US Attorney Stephen J Murphy. — MNA/Xinhua

## Japanese green tea bottle tainted with weedkiller

TOKYO, 6 April — A bottle of green tea produced by Japan’s Kao Corp was found tainted with a large amount of weedkiller, the company said on Saturday.

Kao, Japan’s largest household products maker, said the bottle,

sold at a Tokyo supermarket late last month, may have been contaminated intentionally as the weedkiller was not used in the production line.

A man who drank the “Healthya” tea suffered a minor diarrhoea but has

already recovered, the company said, adding that he said the bottle may have been half-open.

Kao said it has not found any other tainted bottles in its inspection and it has no plan to recall the products.

## Singapore, India bilateral trade rise to \$16.7b in 2007

SINGAPORE, 5 April — A total trade figure between Singapore and India rose to 23 billion Singapore dollars (about 16.7 billion US dollars) last year, making Singapore as India’s 11th biggest trading partner, a Singapore minister said on Friday.

Singapore is also the fourth largest cumulative investor in India, with 2.26 billion US dollars worth of foreign direct investments (FDI) in India, Vivian Balakrishnan, Singapore’s Minister for Community Development, Youth and Sports, said at the opening ceremony of the Incredible India Business Conference

here. He said that 60 per cent of this FDI was invested after 2005, when the two countries signed the bilateral free trade agreement, named Comprehensive Economic Cooperation Agreement.

The minister called on Singapore’s businessmen

to involve in India’s economic development as India is poised to be the 3rd largest economy in the future. He hoped that Singapore “will have some part to play in this rise of India in the next 60 years”.

## Bangladesh expects \$7b remittance in current fiscal

DHAKA, 5 April — Bangladesh expects an inflow of seven billion US dollars remittance in current fiscal (from July 2007 to June 2008), a senior Central Bank official said here Thursday.

The fresh expectation of Bangladesh Bank (BB) came after around 500,000 Bangladeshis, living and working abroad, sent home a record 809 million dollars in March, taking the inflow of the total remittance in the first nine months of the fiscal to over 5.67 billion dollars.

From January to March this year, at least 220,099 Bangladeshis found work in over 100 countries, which is 42.51 per cent more than the same period of the previous year, according to the Bureau of Manpower, Employment and Training (BMET) statistics.

The country’s foreign exchange reserve stood at 5.30 billion dollars Thursday due to robust remittance growth, the Central Bank official said.

## Karzai praises China for role in Afghanistan

BUCHAREST, 5 April — Afghan President Hamid Karzai praised China on Thursday for its role in helping the reconstruction of Afghanistan.

“China is very close

to Afghanistan, and also a long-time friend of Afghanistan,” Karzai said at a Press conference after meeting with leaders of NATO nations and UN Secretary Ban Ki-moon and other high-level representatives of international organizations, including the World Bank and the European Union.

He said this in reply to a question as to what kind of role China could play in Afghanistan. He said that China, one of

the biggest trade partners of Afghanistan, has made big contribution to the reconstruction, development of his country and “training of our people”.

“China has a very significant role to play for the stability of Afghanistan and the region,” Karzai said. NATO Secretary General Jaap de Hoop Scheffer said that NATO had good relations with China.

## Supply problems push gasoline prices to record high in LA

LOS ANGELES, 6 April — Supply problems at refineries pushed the average prices of regular gasoline to record levels in Los Angeles and surrounding areas this week following slight declines the week before, the Automobile Club of Southern California reported on Friday.

The average price of a gallon of self-serve regular unleaded gasoline was 3.639 dollars in the Los Angeles area on Friday, erasing the previous record of 3.62 dollars set March 18.—Xinhua

## Blasts rocks south of Nepali capital

KATHMANDU, 6 April — Three blasts have been heard in the south of Nepali capital Kathmandu on Friday night.

In Lalitpur District, which borders Kathmandu across Bagmati River in the south, two blasts occurred at around 7:30 pm (GMT 1345).

## Computer glitch causes new chaos at Heathrow T5

LONDON, 5 April — The new Terminal 5 at London's Heathrow airport was hit by new baggage chaos Saturday as a computer glitch forced British Airways to cancel 24 short-haul flights.

“This morning, a software problem has arisen in the baggage system at Terminal 5. This is entirely BAA's responsibility,” a spokeswoman for airport operator BAA Ltd said.

In a statement explaining the cancellations, British Airways said: “We are now having to manually reconcile bags for each flight, which takes considerably more time

than using the automated system.”

The 4.3-billion-pound (8.7-billion-US dollar) terminal, used solely by British Airways, has become a public relations

disaster, with computers, baggage handling systems, lifts and telephone wires meeting with problems shortly after it opened on 27 March.

## Olympic torch relay starts in St Petersburg

ST PETERSBURG, 6 April — The Olympic torch relay starts on Saturday morning in St Petersburg for the third leg of its global journey.

The relay kicked off here at about a quarter to 11 a.m. local time. After a brief ceremony on the Victory Square, Galina Zybina, Russia's shot put gold medalist at the 1952 Summer Olympics in Helsinki, Finland, became the first person to bear the torch.

After 250 metres, she handed the flame over to Leonid Tyagachyov, the president of the Russian Olympic Committee, who ran another 250 metres.

The torch race will end

at the Palace Square at 3 p.m. (1100 GMT) on the South of the Hermitage museum when a show is carried out to celebrate the journey. A short break will be made near the St Isaac's Cathedral.

In all, the torch will be carried by 80 people, among them famous athletes, cultural and business figures and politicians, covering a distance of about 20 kilometres.

The stop in St Petersburg is the third in the Olympic torch relay outside China, and it has already been in Almaty, Kazakhstan, on 2 April and Turkey's Istanbul on 3 April. It will go on Saturday from St Petersburg to London, the capital of Britain.—Xinhua

# Keep watchful eye on any suspicious destructive acts

An aphorism says that anyone has the right to form ideas wrongly, but has no right to express opinions and act wrongly. That reflects the essence of democracy.

If asked what democracy practice is, I would like to say that you can wave your stick freely, but do not hit my head. I think it is comprehensible.

In Myanmar, it has become nearly rooted that democracy and anarchy are exercised in tandem. Up to now, there still have been many persons who fall into the snare of beautiful words such as no strings attached, spectrum and democracy. Myanmar Communists were also claiming democracy. Movements for airing grievances that took place at Mya-ra-pin ridge in Bago Yoma mountain range around 1969 were indeed, democratic terrorist acts. In the incident, revisionists in the central committee of the Burma Communist Party were slaughtered.

It is common knowledge that eventually, the BCP (Central) met its tragic end, while terrorizing and attacking the people. That reflected a saying "Crime does not pay".

The evil practice reared its head again in the 1988 unrest. Then, the practice grew into mob rule in which many innocent people were beheaded. At that time, burglaries and lootings were taking place even in daytime. Later, many people from the mobs planned to threaten and bully those against whom they harboured grudge. Therefore, local people had to take security measures street, ward and village-wise in order not to be bullied and attacked.

The people were then free from the dangers posed by the terrorist suboteurs due to the fact that the Tatmadaw took control over the situations in time. So, the people escaped from staying in a state of panic, and the trade and businesses of the people returned to normalcy.

Nonetheless, terrorist destructionists stuck to their misconduct. They were no longer in a position to terrorize the people because the Tatmadaw was standing firmly by the public. In desperation, they turned to the tactics of armed revolts, defending themselves by establishing political parties, and carrying out semi-underground movements.

Later, there emerged expatriate insurgent groups such as NCGUB, FTUB, ABSDF, NLD (LA), DPNS and NCUB in border areas that got involved in above-ground and underground movements in combination as necessary. Claiming that what they were doing were just for democracy, they contacted many organizations of certain powers.

In consequence, the government and the people fall victim to the economic sanctions. That was not all. The people had to withstand the stresses and strains of psychological warfare launched with media superiority, along with a variety of terrorist acts.

It was very despicable of those terrorist saboteurs to kill many persons by delivering letter bombs and parcel bombs to the targeted persons. In fact, they were sacrificing the lives of the people on the pretext of democracy movements.

Since 28 August 2005, the government has declared NCGUB, FTUB, ABSDF, and SSA-S, that were masterminding and committing in collusion various forms of terrorist acts and murders, as unlawful associations. Moreover, it has declared the members of NCGUB, FTUB, ABSDF and NLD (LA) as terrorists.

The government has declared them as unlawful associations and terrorists because it has got reliable sources, profound exhibits, and compelling evidences. One shall pay for one's misdeeds. There have been many evidences that they are staying hiding in certain countries and masterminding terrorist acts. They have

been put on record in respective archives.

The list of terrorist destructionists' atrocities on the public is endless. Among them, I would like to present some of the hostilities they committed in and after 1988, targeting religious rites and social occasions.

On 23 January 1988, they fired heavy weapons and small arms on the places around the platform of the Kyaik-hti-yo Pagoda, killing five pilgrims and wounding six.

On 25 December 1996, they detonated time-bombs in Maha Pasana Cave in Kaba Aye where the ceremony to temporarily keep Buddha Tooth Relic for public homage was taking place. Five people including members of the Sangha were killed and 18 other people were injured.

On 15 April 2002, a time-bomb went off in Myawady, and five victims died on the spot and 31 were injured.

They also fired small arms and launchers on the convoy of Alantaya Sayadaw and missionary group. From 1988 to 2003, KNU insurgent group launched attacks on the people including members of the Sangha for more than 50 times, and over 100 innocent people were killed and over 230 were wounded.

From 1966 to date, Ywet Sit's SSA-S insurgent group committed more than 30 terrorist acts, killing over 220 people and wounding over 140.

So, hundreds of innocent people have fallen victim to the terrorist attacks of NCGUB, FTUB, ABSDF and NLD (LA).

The terrorist saboteurs are plotting to disrupt the referendum that is scheduled to take place in coming May. According to the information received, many bombers underwent training on explosives to detonate bombs in the forthcoming Water Festival.

Accordingly, security forces are now taking measures for stability of the State, community peace and security of the people.

An enemy in disguise of a true friend is the most dangerous one. We cannot notice who is a terrorist by just looking at him. They may be in disguise of anti-government groups, and they will never hesitate to sacrifice the lives of the people to achieve their targets.

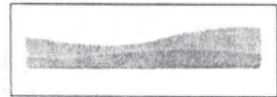

Canada urged to protect fresh water from US

OTTAWA, 5 April — A think-tank urged Canada Thursday to develop a better strategy to protect its fresh water from the United States, which will face severe shortages in the near future.

In a report titled “Turning on Canada’s Tap”, the Polaris Institute criticized the government for not having a good policy on water exports.

The document warns of a future where American companies’ appetite will supersede domestic demand for Canada’s water. Water is included in the North American Free Trade Agreement so Canada may be forced to make it available to the US and

Mexico on the free market, says the report.

With the United States’ southern cities experiencing increasingly depleted reservoirs, many will soon begin looking north, says the report. “Twenty-four per cent of America’s medium sized cities and 17.3 per cent of its large cities are expected to face serious water shortages by 2015,” it says.

US President George W Bush and US Ambassador to Canada Paul Cellucci have both requested publicly that Canada begin making bulk water exports to the United States, according to the report.

HK, Indonesia sign agreement on mutual legal assistance

HONG KONG, 5 April — Hong Kong and Indonesia signed here Thursday an agreement concerning Mutual Legal Assistance in Criminal Matters (MLA).

The agreement was signed by Wong Yan Lung, secretary for Justice of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region (HKSAR) Government, and Indonesia’s Attorney General Hendarman Supandji, on behalf of their respective governments.

The agreement is the 23rd of its kind that the HKSAR has signed to facilitate greater international cooperation

to combat serious crimes.

It will allow for a wide range of reciprocal assistance to be offered in the investigation and prosecution of criminal offences and in the proceedings relating to criminal matters.

The assistance provided for in the agreement includes service of documents, taking evidence, effecting temporary transfer of persons in custody to provide assistance, facilitating the voluntary appearance of persons to provide assistance.

It also includes providing documents and other records, executing requests for search and seizure as well as identifying, tracing, restraining, seizing, forfeiting and confiscating proceeds of crime. — MNA/Xinhua

Russia ready to return to CFE treaty conditionally

BUCHAREST, 5 April — Russian President Vladimir Putin said here Friday that his country was ready to return to an arms reduction treaty if there was a compromise from Western nations.

“We are ready to return to the treaty but expect a mutual step,” he told a meeting of the NATO-Russia Council on the last day of a three-day NATO summit. Russia imposed a moratorium on the Conventional Forces in Europe Treaty (CFE) in December 2007 in protest against US plans to deploy a missile

defence system in Eastern Europe and NATO’s ongoing expansion.

Moscow has insisted it would resume its participation if NATO countries ratify the 1999 version of the treaty, which limits the stationing of troops and heavy weapons from the Atlantic coast to Russia’s Ural mountains.

Putin said Russia had withdrawn troops from Afghanistan and other countries and destroyed heavy weapons according to the treaty, but NATO members failed to ratify it.

Aide to Israeli security minister shot near Gaza

JERUSALEM, 5 April — A top aide to Israel’s Internal Security Minister Avi Dichter was wounded by gunfire from the Hamas-controlled Gaza Strip on Friday during a border tour with a delegation from Canada, medical staff said.

The aide was evacuated to a nearby hospital suffering from a gunshot wound to the leg. Dichter was nearby but was not injured in the shooting.

Israel Radio reported said the minister was accompanying a delegation of Canadian Jews on a visit to the Israeli border community of Nir Am, which is the target of frequent cross-border shooting and rocket attacks by Palestinian militants.

Two men held after severed head found on UK beach

LONDON, 5 April — Two Lithuanian men were arrested on Friday by British police investigating the murder of a woman whose severed head was found by children in a plastic bag on a Scottish beach. Police said the men, whom they have not

named, were being questioned over the death of fellow Lithuanian Jolanta Bledaite.

The men, aged 19 and 40, have not been charged.

Bledaite, 35, from the town of Alytus, 150 kilometres west of the capital Vilnius, was

identified after hundreds of calls were made to police following the discovery on Tuesday of her severed head by two sisters aged 8 and 11.

Two hands were also found on the foreshore at Arbroath, in eastern Scotland.—MNA/Reuters



## Malaysia seeks UNESCO to recognize its education system

KUALA LUMPUR, 6 April — Malaysia will seek recognition for its national education system from the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), according to local reports on Friday.

Malaysian Education Minister Hishammuddin Tun Hussein said that he will ask the UNESCO, at the body's meeting on 7-10 April, to study and compare Malaysia's

national education system with those in other countries to dispel allegations on its weaknesses, according to Malaysia's national news agency *Bernama*.

Hishammuddin also said that he will share his experience with the UNESCO in improving the national education system, including the use of information and communication technology and career

development opportunities for teachers.

The UNESCO has recognized Malaysia's efforts in helping those in rural areas, especially those programmes to narrow the digital gap by providing access to education, he added.

Hishammuddin was elected to the UNESCO executive board on 24 October last year, according to *Bernama*.

## Climate change threatens Australia's koala

SYDNEY, 6 April — Australia's unique tree-dwelling koalas may become a victim of climate change, new research reported on Saturday shows. Australian scientists say that eucalyptus leaves, the staple diet of koalas and other animals, could become inedible because of climate change.

"What we're seeing, essentially, is that the staple diet of these animals is being turned to leather," Australian National University science professor Bill Foley was quoted as saying in the *Weekend Australian*.

"Life is set to become extremely difficult for these animals."

Increased carbon dioxide reduced nitrogen and other nutrients in eucalyptus leaves and boosted tannins, a naturally occurring toxin, greenhouse experiments by James Cook

University researcher Ivan Lawler found.

This sharply reduced the levels of protein in the leaves, requiring koalas and

other animals to eat more nutritionally-poor eucalyptus leaves to survive.

## India plans 70 space missions

NEW DELHI, 6 April — India plans to undertake 70 space missions in five years, a nearly three-fold jump from the previous half-decade, to address requirements and develop new technologies for future needs, according to the NDTV Friday.

the tenth plan period," Chairman of Indian Space Research Organization G Madhavan Nair said.

"Future developments will be towards the manned space mission and reusable satellites and Ka-band satellites," he said.

## Russian's rocket ready to put first Korean in orbit

BAIKONUR (Kazakhstan), 6 April — Preparations for the launch of a Russian rocket due to take South Korea's first astronaut into space next week entered their final stage on Saturday as technicians assembled the spaceship.

The rocket, originally designed during the Cold War as a ballistic missile, will carry South Korean nanotechnology engineer Yi So-yeon and Russian cosmonauts Sergei Volkov and Oleg Kononenko.

Arsenal's title bid fades after another draw

LONDON, 6 April — Arsenal and Liverpool drew 1-1 for the third time this season on Saturday in a further blow to the London side's Premier League title hopes. # Philippines deports two Jordanian nationals linked to bomb plot

MANILA, 6 April — Philippine Bureau of Immigration deported Thursday night two Jordanian nationals suspected of plotting to bomb several embassies in the Philippine capital, including the US Embassy in Manila, according to local media Friday.

Immigration Commissioner Marcelino Libanan identified the deported Jordanians as Khalil Kh Al-Ali and Walid Abu Aisheh, Philippine TV network GMA reported.

Both were expelled pursuant to a summary deportation order that the Bureau of Immigration board of commissioners issued against them on 13 March for violating Philippine immigration laws.

"They were also placed in our immigration blacklist, hence they are now banned from re-entering the Philippines for being undesirable aliens," Libanan said.

Bureau of immigration records showed that Al-Ali was ordered deported for working in the country without a valid permit while Abu Aisheh was found to be an overstaying and undocumented alien.

# Czech police uncover pervitine lab producing drug for Britain

PRAGUE, 6 April — Police from the Czech National Anti-Drug Squad (NPC) recently uncovered one of the largest laboratories for the pervitine production that weekly produced 500 grammes of the drug for Britain, NPC head Jiri Komorous said on Friday.

The police detained five people, including two British citizens, during the operation codenamed Lotus, the Czech news agency CTK reported.

The detained have been taken into custody and face up to 15 years in prison if found guilty, Komorous

and NPC spokesman Bretislav Brejcha said.

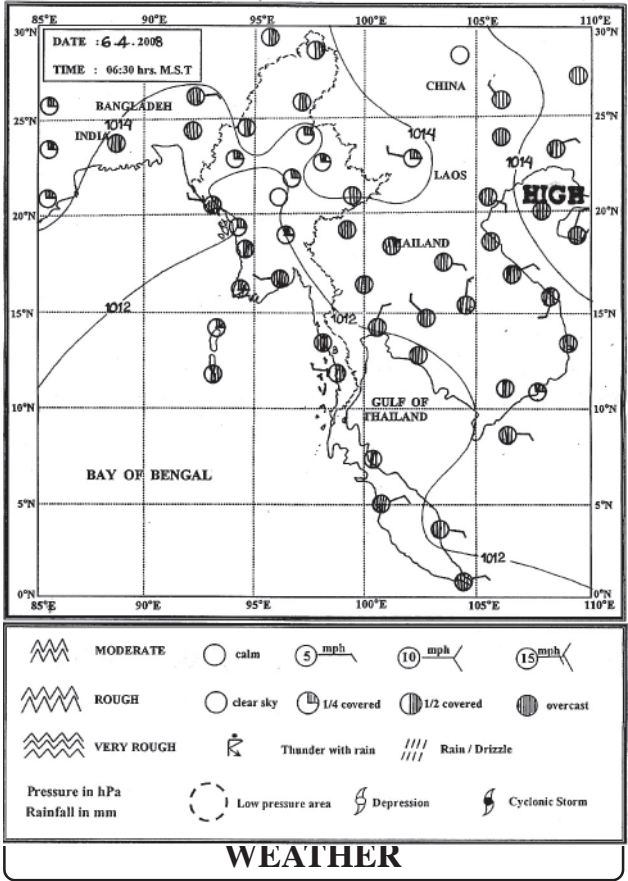
Two foreigners who sold heroin in the Czech Republic were also recently arrested by NPC officers, they said.

The gang busted during the Lotus operation produced pervitine from over-the-counter medicines in a garage.

It was led by a British citizen and money for drug production also came from Britain. People in the Czech Republic bought medicines containing pseudoephedrine for it, from which they produced pervitine.
