NAY PYI TAW, 8 April — Vice-Chairman of the State Peace and Development Council Vice-Senior General Maung Aye and party, while at Jamnagar, Gujarat State of India, visited petrochemical plants, and freshwater processing plants of Reliance Jamnagar Complex of Reliance Industries Ltd, which was carrying out the tasks of greening the environments, on 4 April.

Myanmar, India promoting bilateral cooperation in transport and trade

Vice-Chairman of the State Peace and Development Council Vice-Senior General Maung Aye, at the invitation of Indian Vice-President Mr Mohammad Hamid Ansari, paid a goodwill visit to the Republic of India from 2 to 6 April.

During the visit, Vice-Senior General Maung Aye called on Indian President Ms Pratibha Patil and Vice-President Mr Mohammad Hamid Ansari. The meetings focused on matters for promotion of bilateral relations and cooperation.

In addition, Myanmar entrepreneurs who accompanied the goodwill delegation and Indian entrepreneurs signed the MoU on economic cooperation between the two countries.

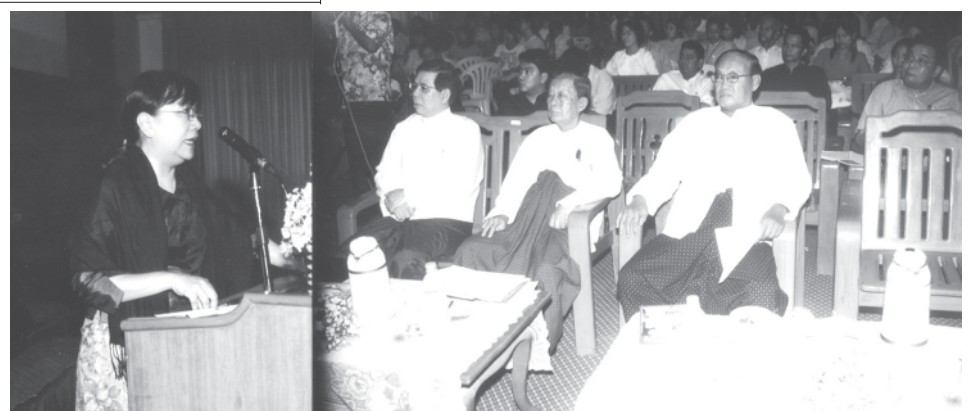
Talks on Brands & Branding held

Iraqi PM condemns US Blackwater contract extension

BAGHDAD, 8 April—Iraqi Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki has criticized the renewing of a US contract with Blackwater to protect American diplomats, saying the security firm had committed a “massacre” against Iraqis.

The US State Department announced on Friday that Blackwater’s deal would be extended for a year while the FBI investigates a September 2007 incident in which the

company’s guards are accused of wrongly killing 17 Iraqis.

“They committed a massacre against Iraqis and until now this issue has not been resolved. No judicial action has been taken, no compensation has been made,” Maliki told CNN in an interview broadcast on Monday.

“I would say that the US side should not have moved to renew the contract before the

outstanding issues with this company are finalized. I feel this decision was taken without the approval of the Iraqi Government.”

Last year’s shooting enraged the Iraqi Government and prompted the State Department to change elements of its deal with Blackwater, including tightening up rules of engagement and putting cameras and diplomatic security officers on all convoys.—MNA/Reuters

Abbas confirms serious talks ongoing with Israel

RAMALLAH, 8 April—Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas said on Sunday that the Palestinians are holding serious peace negotiations on the permanent status issue with Israel.

“We are holding serious peace negotiations (with Israel) and we are keen to reach a solution on all the permanent status issues,” Abbas told senior Fatah movement leaders at his Ramallah headquarters.

On Monday, Abbas is

scheduled to meet with Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Olmert in Jerusalem to tackle issues related to the Israeli blockade measures and settlements expansion in the West Bank.

Peace Talks between the Palestinian National Authority (PNA) and the Jewish state came to a standstill following a deadly Israeli ground military operation in northern Gaza Strip early March, leaving around

130 Palestinians killed.

Abbas said if a final peace agreement is worked out by the end of the year, “the agreement will be presented before the Palestinian people for a referendum”.

Though US President George W Bush pressed the two sides to ink a final agreement before he leaves office in January, Israeli and Palestinian officials doubted whether a deal will be reached.

DPRK slams US N-policy amid stalled 6-party talks

PYONGYANG, 8 April—The Democratic People’s Republic of Korea (DPRK) on Monday blasted the US nuclear policy amid the stalled six-party talks.

The United States is proliferating nuclear weapons to the world and should be condemned, the official *Rodong Sinmun* newspaper said in a signed commentary.

Citing the US deployment of nuclear weapons in South Korea,

the article accused Washington of transferring nuclear technology to a number of countries.

The United States is not entitled to say anything about the “nuclear issue” of others, it added.

Washington blames the DPRK for the deadlocked talks which also involve South Korea, Russia, China and Japan, saying Pyongyang failed to give a full declaration of its nuclear programmes and activities, as promised

under an agreement reached in Beijing in February last year. It also warns the DPRK not to transfer nuclear technology to other countries.

Blast injures police after Putin-Bush summit

MOSCOW, 8 April—An explosion injured a policeman in the Russian Black Sea resort of Sochi after Russia’s President Vladimir Putin met United States leader George W Bush, *RIA Novosti* news agency reported on Monday.

The policeman was checking a bag found outside a cinema on Sunday when it exploded, the source inside the security services told *RIA Novosti*.

“As a result of the injuries both hands had to be amputated and there were abdominal injuries,” the source said.—MNA/Reuters

Three US soldiers killed, 31 injured in Baghdad strikes

BAGHDAD, 8 April—Three US soldiers were killed and 31 others were injured in two attacks with rockets or mortar bombs in Baghdad on Sunday, a US military official said. One of the strikes, on the heavily fortified Green Zone government and diplomatic compound, killed two US soldiers and wounded 17. The other attack, at a US base elsewhere in the Iraqi capital, killed one soldier and wounded 14, the official said.

He was not able to say whether the attacks used rockets or mortars, both of which are frequently fired by militants at US positions in Iraq.—MNA/Reuters

East Timor Army kills rebel supporter in operation

DILI, 8 April—East Timor’s security forces have shot dead a civilian believed to be a supporter of rebel soldiers involved in an assassination attempt on the country’s President, the military said on Sunday.

The killing on Saturday marks the first casualty since a joint military-police operation was launched following a rebel attack on President Jose Ramos Horta at his home on 11 February in which he was seriously wounded.

Prime Minister Xanana Gusmao escaped unhurt in a separate attack the same morning.—MNA/Reuters

Bush, Putin fail to resolve missile differences

SOCHI (Russia), 7 April — US President George W Bush and Russia's Vladimir Putin ended their last face-to-face meeting as heads of state on Sunday with warm words for each other but no solution to their row over missile defence.

With Putin to step down next month and Bush in the twilight of his presidency, both leaders stressed the strong personal rapport which

they say has helped keep relations between their countries on an even keel.

But differences over US plans for a missile defence shield in eastern Europe, which have helped drive diplomatic ties to a post-Cold War low, meant their summit on the Black Sea coast ended with no firm agreements.

Afterwards, a top Bush aide implied that no agreement would be

agreed until the inauguration of new presidents in both countries.

That would delay progress until early next year.

"This is an area we've got more work to do to convince the Russian side that the system is not aimed at Russia," Bush said after a morning of talks with Putin at the Russian leader's vacation retreat in the resort of Sochi. —MNA/Reuters

Iran says to boost nuclear capacity despite pressure

TEHERAN, 7 April — Iran said on Saturday it would press ahead with plans to expand its nuclear programme, after diplomats in Vienna said Teheran was installing advanced centrifuges in its key uranium enrichment plant. The government spokesman also rejected any idea of halting work the United States suspects is aimed at building nuclear bombs in return

for trade, technology and other benefits. Speaking a few days before the Islamic Republic's annual National Nuclear Technology Day on 8 April, Gholamhossein Elham said he hoped for "good news" on that day but did not elaborate.

The world's fourth-largest oil producer says it needs to produce nuclear fuel for a planned network of power plants to satisfy soaring electricity demand.

"The trend of advanc-

ing nuclear capacity until reaching the production of nuclear fuel and building nuclear power plants to produce 20,000 megawatts of electricity will continue," Elham said.

On Thursday, diplomats told Reuters Iran has begun installing advanced uranium enrichment centrifuges in its Natanz enrichment complex, accelerating activity that could give it the means to make atom bombs in future if it chose to.

Colombia ends contract after flap with Clinton aide

WASHINGTON, 7 April — An angry Colombia said on Saturday it ended a contract with a lobbying firm headed by a top campaign aide to Democratic presidential candidate Hillary Clinton after he apologized for meeting with Colombian officials to advocate a trade deal that she opposes.

Mark Penn, who in addition to working as Clinton's chief campaign strategist is a lobbyist in his capacity as chief executive officer of Burson-Marsteller Worldwide, said his meeting with Ambassador Carolina Barco Isakson "was an error in judgment that will not be repeated".

"The Colombian Government considers this a lack of respect to Colombians, and finds this response unacceptable," the Colombian Embassy in Washington said in a statement. —MNA/Reuters

Italy election underdog laments "uncivil" campaign

ROME, 7 April — Walter Veltroni, who hopes to defy polls by winning Italy's general election in just over a week, accused his rivals on Saturday of waging an uncivil campaign against him, as a former ally predicted his defeat.

Veltroni was set to campaign again on

Saturday in Campania region, where his centre-left party has endured withering criticism for its inability to sort out the basic job of collecting and disposing of trash in regional capital Naples.

Poll favourite Silvio Berlusconi, a two time prime minister who Veltroni says shares past blame for Campania's woes, said on Friday he would base his next government in Naples until the trash crisis was resolved.

Berlusconi has also begun to attack Veltroni's record as former mayor of Rome.

Afghan forces arrest Taleban commander

KABUL, 7 April — Afghan police have arrested a Taleban commander in the southern province of Kandahar while 15 insurgents have been killed in clashes with Afghan and NATO troops, the government said on Sunday.

The violence came days after the United States and its NATO partners reaffirmed long-term commitment to Afghanistan.

The United States has urged allies to redouble efforts in the face of rising Afghan violence and is sending an extra 3,500 Marines. France has promised another 700 troops for NATO's 47,000-strong Afghan force. —MNA/Reuters

Hamas issues threat to kill captured Israeli soldier

JERUSALEM, 7 April — A senior Hamas official said on Sunday that if Israel rejects Hamas' demand over the release of captured Israeli soldier Gilad Shalit, the group will negotiate with Israel "over his bones", Israeli newspapers reported.

Moussa Abu Marzouk, deputy leader of Hamas' political bureau, issued the death threat in an interview with Kuwaiti newspaper *Al-Qabas*, according to Israeli daily *Ha'aretz*. He said the group will free Shalit only if Israel frees 350 Palestinian prisoners as Hamas has demanded. —MNA/Xinhua

Wen Jiabao says Chinese people are self-sufficient in food

BEIJING, 7 April— Chinese Premier Wen Jiabao said during a spring planting inspection in the northern Hebei Province on Saturday and Sunday that the Chinese people were fully capable of feeding themselves.

Wen said the country's self-reliance in feeding its 1.3 billion people with its own grain production was a great contribution to the world.

"China has abundant

grain reserves standing at 150 million to 200 million tons," said Wen. The government had already taken a series of measures to support farm and rural sectors.

The central government vowed this year to spend 562.5 billion yuan (80.1 billion US dollars) to support farms and the rural sector, 130.7 billion yuan more than last year.

The State Council, or Cabinet, decided last

month to spend another 25.25 billion yuan in addition to this year's rural budget, mainly to subsidize farmers' purchase of seed, diesel, fertilizers and other production materials.

Wen told farmers in Renxian County, Hebei, "The government will not change its position in supporting farmers, and it will give more and better preferential policies to farmers.—Xinhua

US cities denied millions of dollars in crimefighting money

LOS ANGELES, 7 April—Less crimefighting money has been distributed to US southern border cities because of San Francisco's inflated estimates of border-related crimes, local media reported on Sunday.

Los Angeles, San Diego and other cities closer to Mexico were denied millions in federal crimefighting dollars because of inflated claims from the city 500 miles

away from the border, the Federal Justice Department said.

The San Francisco Chronicle reported that according to a federal audit, the federal government said San Francisco officials apparently vastly overstated the number of illegal aliens arrested in the city.

Ironically, San Francisco has declared itself a sanctuary city, and has a formal policy against

reporting immigration law offenders to the federal government.

San Francisco told Washington officials that it had prosecuted 2,000 criminal cases based on border-related crimes. As a result, the federal government gave San Francisco 5.4 million US dollars in border-related crimefighting assistance grants over three years.

British troops sent back into Basra

LONDON, 7 April— British troops have been sent back into Basra in southern Iraq just months after control of the southern city was placed in the hands of the Iraqis, the *Sunday Telegraph* reported on Sunday.

Up to 150 British soldiers are now "embedded" with Iraqi Army units in Basra, fighting insurgent groups which now

hold power in large areas of the city, the daily said. The paper said British Prime Minister Gordon Brown approved the move following pressure from the United States, whose military chiefs feared the restive southern city was on the brink of falling under the control of the Shia militias.

The move comes days after British Defence

Secretary Des Browne announced plans to withdraw 1,500 soldiers from southern Iraq this spring, which have now been shelved. The daily said senior defence sources have disclosed Britain's entire exit strategy is now in "tatters", and no further troop reductions would take place for at least 12 months.—Xinhua

Seven killed in flash flood in Indonesia

JAKARTA, 8 April— Indonesian rescuers on Monday recovered seven bodies from a river in West Java Province after the Sunday's flash flood that slammed into a boat carrying 13 people.

Five other passengers managed to escape the accident at the Cipelang River in Sukabumi, about 100 kilometres south of Jakarta, while one person remains missing, reported leading news website Detikcom. The bodies were found at separate places up to 10 kilometres from the scene.

Cambodian NEC orders strengthened security for elections

PHNOM PENH, 7 April— The National Election Committee (NEC) of Cambodia has issued a directive ordering directors of municipal and provincial election secretariats to improve protection, strengthen security and maintain order, the *Mekong Times*

newspaper reported on Monday.

"To make the election process successful and conducive to an atmosphere of good security without threats, intimidation and violence, directors of municipal and provincial election secretariats should pay

attention to maintaining security and order well because it is crucial to maintain security and safety during the fourth-mandate parliamentary election scheduled for Sunday, 27 July," NEC President Im Suosdey said in the directive.

To ensure security during the election campaign from 26 June to 25 July, Im Suosdey ordered election security officers to arrange protection from the Interior Ministry and the Military Police.—Xinhua

IMF chief says downside economic risks materialize

WATFORD, (England), 7 April — Most of the downside risks to the world economy identified six months ago have now materialized, the head of the International Monetary Fund said on Saturday.

“The forecasts we are going to release in a few days are not really improving and most of the downside risks identified six months ago have materialized,” IMF chief Dominique Strauss-Kahn told a conference hosted by British Prime Minister Gordon Brown.

“So it already means the global forecast for the global economy is around

3.7 per cent for next year which is one of the lowest in the last two decades,” he said. Although he spoke of “next year”, Strauss-Kahn appeared to be referring to 2008 economic growth.

The IMF’s twice-yearly World Economic Outlook is due to be released on 9 April. The IMF said on Thursday it had cut its 2008 outlook for world economic growth for the second time this year, in a move that acknowledged housing and credit problems in the United States were exacting a heavy toll on the global economy.—MNA/Reuters

Liberia to plant more rice as import costs soar

MONROVIA, 8 April — Liberia signed over 15,000 hectares of land for commercial rice production at the weekend under an aid agreement intended to increase local production and help offset soaring import costs as world food prices surge.

The 30 million US dollars concession deal with Swiss-backed aid group African Development Aid (ADA) is one of the first large-scale attempts to boost mechanised food farming since 14 years of on-off civil war that destroyed Liberia’s economy ended in 2003.

Agriculture Minister Christopher Toe said developing commercial rice production was a key objective of the government of President Ellen Johnson-Sirleaf, a Harvard-trained former World Bank economist who has led Liberia since early 2006.

Food farming in Liberia, as across much of west and central Africa, is largely done on a subsistence basis by families living on small-holdings who sell any crops they have left over after they have fed themselves.

Diplomats say push for WTO deal likely from 19 May

BRUSSELS, 7 April — Ministers from trade powers are likely to meet in the week of 19 May for their long-awaited push for a breakthrough in global trade talks, European diplomats said on Saturday.

“It’s not yet been agreed but the idea is for

technical-level talks in Geneva the week of 12 May followed by a ministerial meeting in the week of 19 May,” one of the diplomats told Reuters. World Trade Organization Director-General Pascal Lamy said on Thursday ministers were likely to meet at the end of May to seek an outline deal on the Doha

round.

The negotiations for a global trade deal were launched to much fanfare in late 2001 to bring down barriers to exports around the world, giving developing countries a better chance of fighting poverty and to give the global economy a boost.

But the talks have limped from crisis to crisis and without a breakthrough in the coming weeks they could suffer further years of delay as the White House changes hands and a new European Commission takes office in 2009, and key developing countries such as India face elections.

Indonesia to import beef from Brazil, Uruguay

JAKARTA, 8 April — Indonesia plans to import beef from Brazil and Uruguay in order to meet domestic demands amid soaring domestic meat prices, local Press said Monday.

The two countries will join Australia, New Zealand, the United States and Canada as Indonesia’s main beef meat suppliers.

While import plan from Uruguay is proceeding smoothly, Indonesia must first send a team to verify if Brazil is fully free from lethal, infectious cow diseases, major national newspaper Kompas reported, quoting a senior official with the Agriculture Ministry.

“The team who will conduct a feasibility study on beef import from Brazil will depart later this month. Hopefully, by the end of April, they will come up with a recommendation,” said Turni Rusli, director of veterinary.

Bangladesh to import 400,000 tons of rice from India

DHAKA, 7 April — The caretaker government of Bangladesh Sunday opened a letter of credit to import 400,000 tons of rice at 430 US dollars per ton from India, a senior official said. “India will supply 100,000 tons of rice within a month and the rest within two months,” Food Secretary Mollah Wahiduzzaman told Xinhua Sunday. Four state-owned Indian companies will supply the rice under an agreement signed by Bangladesh and India last month. The government’s highest purchase body approved the import of 400,000 tons of rice from India on 30 March, after

weeks of protracted negotiations on the price by the officials of two countries.

The food secretary said Bangladesh has enough supply of rice and the new import of rice from India is aimed at beefing up its falling stock and put a lid on the soaring rice prices in the local market.

The government was keen to ensure the supply from India as most of the traditional rice exporters have already stopped shipment of rice, resulting in over 50-per-cent increase of rice price in the global market in the last one month.

US to have new talks with Iran on Iraq security

WASHINGTON, 8 April — The United States confirmed on Monday that it is prepared to resume long-delayed talks with Iran on security in Iraq. “We have reconfirmed to the Iraqi Government our readiness to have these discussions (with Iran) focus on the

security situation in Iraq. There’s no date set for them,” State Department spokesman Sean McCormack said. Washington conveyed the message Sunday to the Iraqi Government, according to the spokesman.

The United States,

which accuses Iran of providing weapons and funds to the insurgents to fight against coalition forces in Iraq, has held with Iran three rounds of talks over Iraq’s security issue but failed to reach any agreement.

Iran denies US accusations, saying “the US just wanted to find excuses for its failed policies in Iraq” and it was the existence of US forces made that war-torn country volatile. —MNA/Xinhua

Italian police target Calabrian mafia, 42 arrested

ROME, 8 April — Italian authorities launched a series of raids on Monday targeting some of the most influential organized crime families in the southern region of Calabria, police said.

About 300 officers took part in the operation, in which 42 people were arrested, and homes were searched and weapons seized, according to police in the Calabrian province of Crotona.

The raids targeted members of the ‘Ndrangheta organisation, the Calabrian Mafia, who are suspected of crimes including murder, extortion, drug trafficking and association with the mafia, they added.

27 injured in Serbian pesticide warehouse fire

BELGRADE, 8 April — Twenty-seven people were injured in a fire ignited by an explosion at the warehouse of a pesticide company in Belgrade on Sunday night, police and medical

sources said.

The explosion rocked the warehouse of Galenika Pharmaceutical Company at the Zemun District of Belgrade, but the cause is still unknown.

Doctor Nada Macura from the Belgrade centre for Emergency Medicine said that 27 people including 19 firefighters, six security guards and two policemen sustained minor injuries.

Predrag Maric, chief of the Rescue and Protection Sector in the Serbian Ministry of Internal Affairs, said firefighters managed to extinguish the fire after two-hour fight, adding that they had to put on special suits as the burning material is poisonous.

400 kilos of heroin seized in N-W Turkey

ANKARA, 8 April — Turkey’s security forces seized 400 kilos of heroin in an operation carried out in the northwestern provinces of Sakarya, Bursa and Edirne, the semi-official *Anatolia* news agency reported on Sunday.

Following a tip-off that certain olive wholesalers in Sakarya were smuggling drugs to foreign countries, the security forces

launched a large scale operation in Sakarya, Bursa and Edirne and tracked down a company and the wholesalers for nine months, according to the report.

The security forces who were informed that large quantities of olive would be exported abroad, launched an operation in the Kapikule border gate in Edirne, said the report, adding that they

impounded 400 kilos of heroin stashed in olive cans on a truck during their searches with X-ray devices and narcotic dogs.

The driver was taken into custody and the security forces are pursuing the suspects, said the report.

Turkey is a key transit route for smuggling drugs from Asia and the Middle East to markets in western Europe. —MNA/Xinhua

222 endangered lizards rescued in Malaysia

KUALA LUMPUR, 8 April—A total of 222 endangered clouded monitor lizards, believed to be destined for cooking pots in exotic meat restaurants overseas, were rescued in Maran, Malaysian central state of Pahang on Saturday, local media reported on Monday.

The seizure at a palm oil plantation was carried out by enforcement

officers of the Department of Wildlife and National Parks (Perhilitan), led by district Perhilitan chief Sharil Apindi Ahmad.

The six-man team had arrived at the plantation on Thursday and were monitoring the area before carrying out their operation on Saturday night.

It is learnt that the lizards would usually be held captive in the

plantation, which acted as a stop-over spot, for several days before being sent overseas.

Early investigations revealed that the lizards were obtained from the Orang Asli (original peoples) who lived nearby and Indonesians who worked in the plantation, State Perhilitan director Saharudin Anan said.

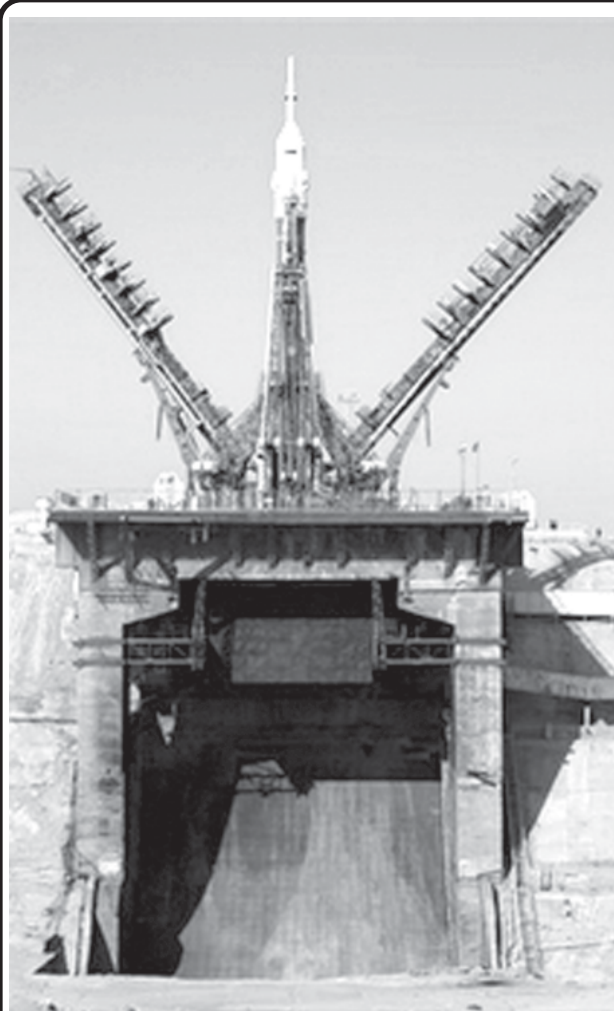

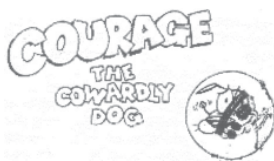

Wenger says Arsenal can win league, European double

LIVERPOOL (England), 8 April — Arsene Wenger tried to bolster Arsenal's faltering confidence by insisting on Monday they can still win a Premier League and Champions League double. Wenger's side are six points behind in the league with five games left and travel to Liverpool on Tuesday after drawing last week's Champions League quarterfinal, first leg 1-1 at home.

Arsenal have won just two of their last 11 games, but after leaders Manches-

ter United were held 2-2 at Middlesbrough on Sunday, Wenger is positive about his side's chances of pulling off an unlikely double.

"I still believe we can finish as champions in the league," Wenger told a news conference.

"Manchester United's result helped us a lot because if they had won, I believe we could not have caught them. But it is compulsory that we win (at United) on Sunday to win the league. "I also believe we can win the Champions League. I wouldn't be here if I didn't think that."

Guinea face stadium ban for World Cup qualifiers

"Rio went for a scan on Monday and we can confirm that he has not suffered any break," a club official told United's website (www.manutd.com).

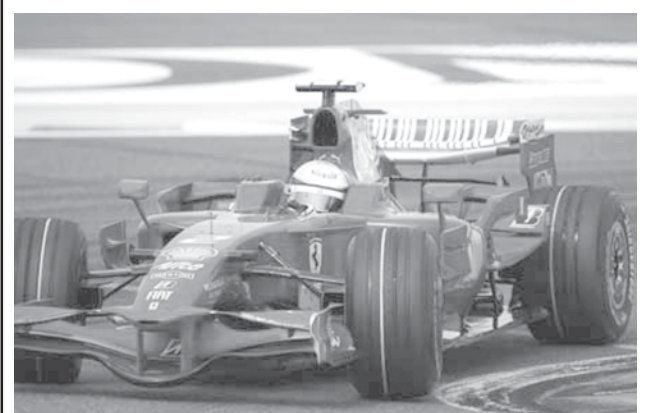

800 grammes of heroin seized from suspect's stomach in Dubai

ABU DHABI, 8 April — Dubai police seized 800 grammes of heroin which a Pakistani visitor had attempted to smuggle into the United Arab Emirates (UAE) by putting them into his stomach, local newspaper *Khaleej Times* reported on Monday. The suspect, identified as MA, arrived at the Dubai International Airport on a flight from Karachi around 3 am local time last Tuesday (2300 GMT last Monday), police said. At the security

check, the Customs officials did not find anything unusual in MA's baggage but grew suspicious on seeing his posture. The Customs officials then informed the police and admitted him to Dubai Hospital under tight supervision. At the hospital, doctors recovered a total of eight plastic shells in the shape of eggs, which contained 800 grammes of heroin, from MA's body.

Slow deforestation may worth billions of dollars

OSLO, 8 April — A slowdown of deforestation from the Amazon to the Congo basin could generate billions of dollars every year for developing nations as part of a UN scheme to fight climate change, a study showed on Monday. Burning of forests by farmers clearing land accounts for 20 per cent of world greenhouse gas emissions. A 190-nation UN climate conference agreed in Bali, Indonesia, in December to work on ways to reward countries for slowing deforestation. "Even with quite conservative assumptions, you can generate substantial amounts of money and emissions reductions," said Johannes Ebeling of EcoSecurities in Oxford, England, of a study with Mai Yasue at the University of British Columbia in Canada. They said a 10-per-cent decline in the rate of tropical forest loss could generate annual carbon finance for developing nations of between 1.5 billion and 9.1 billion euros (2.4 US dollars to 14.30 billion US dollars) assuming carbon prices of 5 to 30 euros a ton.

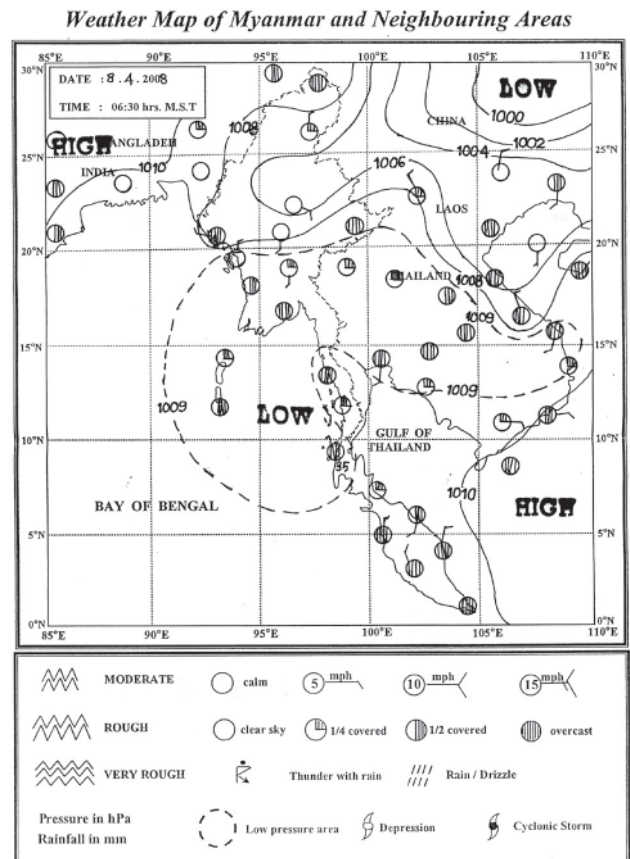
Malaysia, Indonesia to conduct aerial patrol along border

KUALA LUMPUR, 8 April — Malaysia and Indonesia have agreed in principle to conduct aerial patrol along their common land border, local media reported on Monday. The move was made at a joint committee meeting chaired by Malaysian Defence Forces Chief General Abdul Aziz Zainal and Indonesian Armed Forces chief General Djoko Santoso on Monday in Kuching, capital of the Sarawak State in East Malaysia. Abdul Aziz said that the "Eye in the Sky" aerial patrol carried out by Malaysia, Indonesia and Singapore, three littoral states of the Malacca Straits, had drastically reduced the incidence of piracy and robbery in the

waterway and restored confidence in navigation. "So far this year, there has not been a single report of piracy in the Straits," he said.

CANBERRA, 8 April — Several young men armed with bats and a machete stormed a Sydney high school around 9:45 am Monday morning, attacking students and teachers and leaving a trail of damage. Police said a total of 18 children were treated by ambulance crews at the scene following the incident at Merrylands High School, in Sydney's west. One student and one teacher were taken to nearby hospital for treatment, according to a report by the *Australian Associated Press*. "We've assessed 18 school-aged children ... all having minor injuries, some lacerations, some bruising and they're obviously quite anxious about what has happened," an ambulance spokesman said. —MNA/Xinhua
