Obama's lead over Clinton in nat'l poll shrinks to zero

WASHINGTON, 30 April — US Democratic Presidential candidate Barack Obama's lead in the national poll has shrunk to zero after his rival, Hillary Rodham Clinton, won the Pennsylvania primary on 22 April, said a poll released on Monday.

According to the Gallup poll conducted on 24 to 26 April, Illinois Senator Obama and New York Senator Clinton are now

dead even at 47 per cent among 1,240 Democratic and Democratic-leaning voters.

It was the second survey that has been made after Clinton's win on Tuesday in Pennsylvania with nearly 10 percentage points lead over Obama.

These results "suggest that Democratic voters are — for the moment at least — divided right down the middle as to which

candidate they most want to represent their party in November's general election", the poll says.

The polling body also found in the latest survey conducted among national registered voters from 22 to 26 April that Clinton maintains her advantage over Republican presumptive presidential candidate, Arizona Senator John McCain, in the general election preferences at 47 per cent to 44 per cent. Obama and McCain are tied at 45 per cent each, it added.

Qingdao-Jinan Railway reopens after fatal accident

ZHOUCUN (Shandong), 30 April—The Qingdao-Jinan Railway reopened to traffic early on Tuesday, after more than 20 hours of interruption caused by a train collision that killed 70 people and injured more than 400 on Monday.

At 2:16 am, a cargo train weighing 1,185 metric tons rolled over the restored section of the

railway in Zibo City of east China's Shandong Province, followed by passenger train T196 from Qingdao to Beijing at 2:41 am. Thousands of passengers were stranded at railway stations in Jinan, Qingdao and other destinations following the pre-dawn collision and derailments on Monday, but most were transferred

to long-distance buses.

"So far, the accident site has been cleaned up and the stranded passengers evacuated," said Wang Jun, head of the State Administration of Work Safety. "All the injured have been hospitalized and the dead have been transferred to local funeral homes."

Moderate quake hits northern California

SAN FRANCISCO, 30 April—A moderate earthquake struck near the coastal city of Eureka in Northern California on Tuesday but there were no immediate reports of damage.

The magnitude 5.2 quake occurred at 8:03 pm (0303 GMT on Wednesday) 35 miles east of Eureka and was felt across the region from the Pacific Ocean to near the Oregon border, the US Geological

Survey reported on its website.

Nearly an hour later, the dispatch officer for the Eureka Police Department said she had not received any reports of damage.

US airline says Heathrow is "worst in Europe"

LONDON, 30 April — A senior American Airlines executive said on Tuesday that London's Heathrow was the worst airport used by the company in Europe.

Don Langford, head of customer services Europe for the airline, said its base at Terminal 3 had suffered from a lack of investment and was "a bit of a dump".

"I would have to say that Heathrow is in many ways the worst of all the airports that my company flies to in Europe," he told the BBC.

The damning verdict comes a month after the opening of Heathrow's new Terminal 5 building descended into chaos, with hundreds of flights cancelled and baggage lost.

No comment was immediately obtainable from Heathrow's operator, BAA. — MNA/Reuters

US military deaths in Iraq at 4,058

BAGHDAD, 29 April—As of Tuesday, 29 April, 2008, at least 4,058 members of the US military have died since the beginning of the Iraq war in March 2003, according to an *Associated Press* count. The figure includes eight military civilians. At least 3,306 died as a result of hostile action, according to the military's numbers.

The *AP* count is one more than the Defence Department's tally, last updated Tuesday at 10 am EDT.

The British military has reported 176 deaths; Italy, 33; Ukraine, 18; Poland, 21; Bulgaria, 13; Spain, 11; Denmark, seven; El Salvador, five; Slovakia, four; Latvia, three; Estonia, Netherlands, Thailand, Romania, two each; and Australia, Hungary, Kazakhstan, South Korea, one death each.—Internet

Militiamen ambush drives back US patrol in Sadr City

BAGHDAD, 30 April—Dozens of fighters ambushed a US patrol in Baghdad's main Shiite militia stronghold Tuesday, firing rocket-propelled grenades and machine gun bursts as the American push into Sadr City increasingly faces pockets of close urban combat.

US forces struck back with 200-pound guided rockets that devastated at least three buildings in the densely packed district that serves as the Baghdad base for the powerful Mahdi Army militia.—Internet

Greenpeace occupies US radar site on Czech soil

PRAGUE, 29 April — Members of Greenpeace occupied on Monday the site in the Brdy military district southwest of the capital of Prague, where a US missile Defence radar base is to be installed, the Czech news agency CTK reported.

Some 20 people have put up tents to protest against the planned building of the radar base, some 90 kilometres southwest of Prague.

Greenpeace mountaineers climbed trees at the site to fix up a giant banner.

The military district head Martin Brezovsky set 2:00 pm local time as a deadline for the activists to leave the site.

“We won’t meet the deadline,” Greenpeace’s Jan Freidinger said.

Defence Ministry spokesman Andrej Cirtek said the protesters have committed an unlawful act.

“The Defence Ministry

has nothing against political meetings if held outside the military district,” said Cirtek.

Greenpeace anti-radar campaign head Martin Kloubek said he does not know how long the activists will stay on the planned radar site, situated near the Misov Village.

The protest is not violent, the participants have not chained themselves to trees, Kloubek said. — MNA/Xinhua

Ukrainian helicopter crashes in Black Sea, 20 dead

KIEV, 29 April — A Ukrainian helicopter crashed onto an offshore drilling platform in the Black Sea on Monday, killing all 20 people on board, an Emergencies Ministry spokesman said.

Nineteen people were killed on impact and one initially survived, but he later died from his injuries, the ministry said. No one on the platform was injured.

The platform, on the West coast off the Crimea, is operated by state energy firm Naftogaz, which also owned the helicopter. “An Mi-8 helicopter with 20 people on board clipped the Tavrida platform with its tail rotor,” Naftogaz spokesman Ilya Savin said, in explaining how the crash happened. —MNA/Reuters

Suicide car bomb kills policeman in Baghdad

BAGHDAD, 29 April — A suicide car bomb struck a police patrol in eastern Baghdad on Sunday, killing a policeman and wounding three others, an Interior Ministry source said.

A suicide bomber rammed his explosive-laden car into a police patrol near an intersection near Baghdad’s al-Shaab Stadium, damaging two police vehicles, killing a policeman and wounding three others aboard, the source told Xinhua on condition of anonymity. US and Iraqi security forces sealed off the area as ambulances rushed to evacuate casualties, the source said.

Earlier in the day, a ministry source said that two roadside bomb detonated in a quick succession near an Iraqi Army foot-patrol in the 14th Ramadan Street in Mansour District, killing an officer and wounding four of his soldiers, along with two civilians. —MNA/Xinhua

Israeli Army storms central Gaza, detains nine in W Bank

GAZA, 29 April — In spite of the efforts to reach a ceasefire in the Gaza Strip between Israel and the Palestinians, several Israeli Army tanks and armoured vehicles stormed central Gaza town of Deir el-Ballah on Sunday.

Palestinian security sources and witnesses said that the Israeli Army Forces stormed the eastern Area of the town amid intensive gunfire, while bulldozers razed trees and leveled the ground of some farms in the area. AL-Qassam Brigades, Islamic Hamas armed wing, said in a leaflet that its militants attacked the Israeli Army forces in Deir el-Ballah with RBG missiles and mortar shells. —MNA/Xinhua

Britain’s Prince William on secret Afghan trip

LONDON, 30 April — Prince William, second in line to the British throne, paid a secret visit to Afghanistan to meet British troops there, his office said on Wednesday.

A spokesman said the 25-year-old Prince, who was recently awarded his Royal Air Force wings after a training course, flew a military transport plane for part of the journey to Kandahar.

He spent three hours with British service personnel at the airfield before returning to Britain, the spokesman said.

Permission for the confidential trip on Monday had been given by his grandmother, Queen Elizabeth, and his father, Prince Charles.

Blast kills 15 Afghans, wounds 25

KABUL, 30 April — At least 15 Afghans were killed and 25 wounded on Tuesday in an explosion in eastern Afghanistan, close to the border with Pakistan, a spokesman for NATO-led forces said.

“Initial reports are that 15 local nationals were killed and another 25 were wounded in an explosion in Nangarhar Province,” the spokesman for NATO’s International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) said. Residents in the district, south of the city of Jalalabad, said Afghan forces and civilians were among the dead, which they said could total as many as 31.

One resident, reached by phone from Kabul, said the dead included 11 members of the Afghan security forces and two children.

It was not immediately clear what caused the explosion but suicide bombers have carried out attacks in the area in the past. — MNA/Reuters

Putin, Greek PM to sign South Stream pipeline deal

Moscow, 29 April—Greece and Russia will sign a deal to cooperate on building a major gas pipeline, South Stream, when President Vladimir Putin meets Greek Prime Minister Costas Karamanlis this week, a Kremlin source said.

The source said Karamanlis will meet outgoing president Putin and his successor Dmitry Medvedev, who will be sworn in on 7 May, when he visits Russia on 29-30 April.

Development Minister Christos Falias said earlier this month Greece has agreed to join the Kremlin-backed pipeline project, further boosting energy ties with Russia.

The pipeline, which will be jointly built by Russian

gas export monopoly Gazprom and Italy's energy group ENI, will eventually transport 30 billion cubic metres (bcm) of Russian gas a year to Europe.

Greece will become a transit state on the southern leg of the pipeline which will pump

gas to Italy.

The project, which aims to link Gazprom's Siberian gas fields with Europe and is seen as a competitor to the EU and US-backed Nabucco pipeline, will cost around 10 billion euros (15.66 billion US dollars).

US-based COs mostly positive about China prospects

BEIJING, 29 April—The majority of US-based companies are positive about business prospects in China, with 89 per cent characterizing their five-year outlook as optimistic or cautiously optimistic, according to a survey released here on Monday by the American Chamber of Commerce.

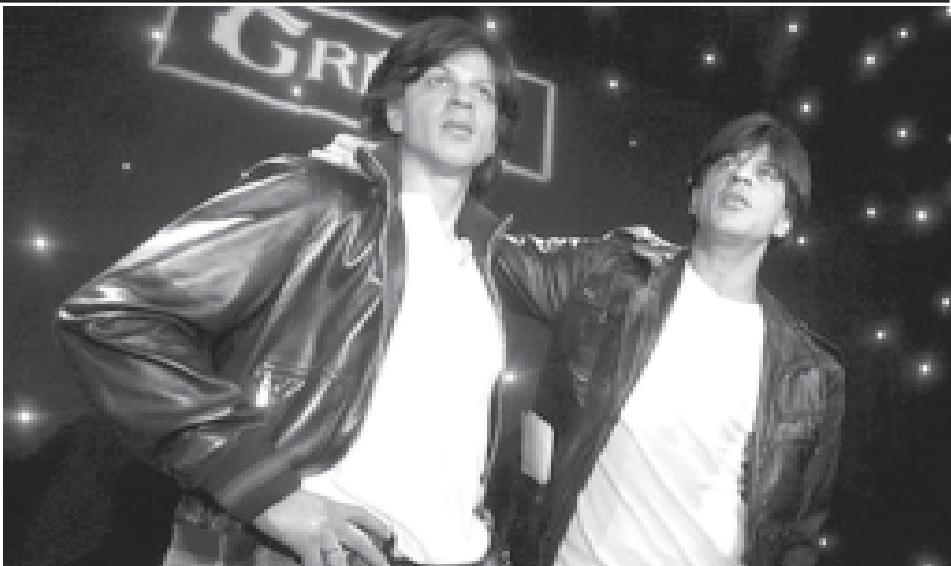
The findings of the 2008 Business Climate

Survey revealed that US companies remained bullish in China as an investment destination, with many planning to expand.

However, despite the positive outlook and improved operating margins, competitive forces and rising costs are increasingly affecting these companies, according to the survey.

While China's continued growth is playing an important role in investment decisions and expansion throughout the country, the rapid growth of the domestic economy has also created a fiercely competitive business environment that is driving significant cost increases, according to the survey.

Contract signed to heighten Russaires Dam

KHARTOUM, 29 April —The Sudanese Government and two Chinese companies on Sunday signed a contract of heightening the Russaires Dam on the Blue Nile River at the cost of 396 million dollars.

Sudanese President Omer Al-Bashir and a number of Cabinet ministers and high-ranking officials attended the signing ceremony held at the Friendship Hall, as well as representatives of

the two Chinese companies — the Sinahydro Corporation and the China International Water and Electric Corporation.

Addressing the ceremony, Sudanese Minister of Irrigation and Water Resources Kamal Ali Mohammed said the heightening of the Russaires Dam comes in implementation of the National Comprehensive Strategy and the Nile Water Agreement signed by

Sudan and Egypt in 1959.

He said the heightening of the Russaires Dam is the second phase aimed to increase the stored water from three billion to 7.3 billion cubic metres and increase the electricity power generation by 50 per cent, adding that the heightening of Russaires Dam will double the electricity generation of the Sennar Dam and will boost the capability of the Merowe Dam on the Nile River. —MNA/Xinhua

Vietnam wins rice tender in Philippines

HANOI, 29 April — Vietnamese firms have won a bid to sell 102,000 tons of rice to the Philippines, according to local newspaper *Vietnam Economic Times* on Monday.

The 25-per-cent broken rice priced at 1,200 US dollars per ton, the highest-ever price, will be delivered from now to June, the paper quoted the Vietnam Food Association as reporting.

Vietnamese businesses have signed contracts of shipping abroad 2.4 million tons of rice with delivery slated for this year, of which nearly 1.4 million tons worth 566 million dollars have been handed over to customers. —MNA/Xinhua

British oil refinery strike pushes high oil price

LONDON, 29 April — Oil prices have hit a fresh high just below 120 US dollars a barrel after a strike at a British refinery disrupted production from the North Sea.

Light crude on the US market hit a high of 119.93 US dollars a barrel before edging down to 119.40 US dollars on Monday. The

previous record mark of 119.90 US dollars a barrel was achieved on Friday.

In London, Brent crude rose 72 cents to 117.06 US dollars a barrel on Monday. BP (British Petroleum) shut down a key North Sea pipeline after staff walked out of the Grangemouth refinery in Scotland in a two-day

strike over pensions.

The BP-run pipeline from the Forties oil fields in the North Sea relies on steam and electricity from the Ineos refinery at Grangemouth. Providing a third of British oil output, the closure of the Forties pipeline has raised fears about supply shortages.

Hizbollah militants briefly detain Frenchman in Beirut

BEIRUT, 29 April — A Frenchman said on Sunday that he had been briefly detained on Saturday by militants of Hizbollah in Beirut.

Karim Pakzad, a French delegate to a Socialist International Meeting in Beirut, told a news conference here that he was stopped and questioned by armed

men who “spoke on behalf of Hizbollah” while he was taking a picture of a “beautiful mosque” at the airport road Saturday.

He said they questioned him for five hours before freeing him, adding that “this kind of behaviour can not be accepted in Lebanon or anywhere else.”

Lebanese Progressive

Socialist Party leader Walid Jumblat, who hosted the press conference, said there should be only one authority in Lebanon which has the right to interrogate people.

The airport road, which lies in southern Beirut, is a stronghold of Hizbollah, whose arms are a controversial issue in the country. — Xinhua

Sri Lanka, Iran sign six agreements

COLOMBO, 30 April — The visiting Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad and Sri Lankan President witnessed the signing of six agreements between the two countries Monday night and vowed to push the relations to a new level. Officials from the Sri Lankan Presidential Secretariat said Tuesday that among the major agreements were the Financial Assistance for the Expansion of the Sapugaskanda Oil

Refinery and the Uma Oya project, Iran’s Development Assistance to Sri Lanka, and the Establishment of Political Consultation Mechanism.

Addressing journalists after bilateral talks and the agreements signing ceremony, Ahmadinejad pointed out that comprehensive cooperation between the two countries would provide security for both.

“We are seeking justice and fair play in the world.

Sri Lanka and Iran have agreed to cooperate in all spheres for the mutual benefit of each other,” said the Iranian President. He said there had been a constructive dialogue for the betterment and economic prosperity of the two countries whose cooperation has been increasing, and has the capacity to increase further. President Rajapaksa thanked his Iranian counterpart for the economic aid.—Xinhua

China, Surinam agree on furthering military cooperation

BEIJING, 29 April — China and Surinam agreed to step up military cooperation during the talks between the defence ministers of the two countries here on Monday.

“China values its ties with Surinam as well as that between the two militaries,” said Chinese

Defence Minister Liang Guanglie.

Liang, who is also state councillor, applauded the recent growth in relations between the two nations, saying that China will explore with Surinam new fields and new approaches to step up the ties between the Armed Forces.

Visiting Surinamese

Defence Minister Ivan Fernald said the cooperation between Surinam and China bears strategic significance and Surinam will join with China to continue to expand the friendly cooperation between the two armies in fields such as military personnel training.

Chinese soldiers leave for UN peace mission in Liberia

BEIJING, 29 April — A 283-member team of Chinese soldiers left here on Monday for an eight-month UN peacekeeping operation in Liberia.

They formed the second batch of the seventh peacekeeping team that China has sent to the African country. The first batch of 275 soldiers departed on 18 April. The seventh team, 558 in total, is comprised of 240 transportation troops, 275 engineers and 43 medical staff, according to the Ministry of Defence. The engineering troops will build roads and bridges, and maintain airports and water and power facilities in Liberia. The transportation staff will be in charge of troop transport and logistics, while the medical unit will care for the sick and wounded and conduct epidemic prevention work.—Xinhua

Hamas denies plot against Egypt’s national security

GAZA, 29 April — Islamic Hamas movement on Sunday denied plotting any operation threatening Egypt’s national security.

“The Egyptian national security and the Arab security are both red lines that Hamas can not cross,” said Mohammed Nasser, a member of Hamas politburo.

Nasser’s remarks were made following reports that Egyptian authorities arrested two members of the Muslim Brotherhood opposition party, who, with Hamas, planned to prepare an unmanned aircraft.

The reports did not clarify what

the aircraft was designated to be used for. Nasser said the Palestinian factions “carry out resistance works without harming Egypt’s national security”.

He also said that such reports were motivated by holding “hostile to the Palestinians, the Egyptians and the Arabs”.

The reports come as Egypt mediates between Hamas and Israel to broker a ceasefire in the Hamas-ruled Gaza Strip. Hamas has handed over its position to Egypt, and is waiting for response from the Israelis.

No place for saboteurs in new nation to be built in accord with new constitution

Maung De Doh: Hi, Bagyi Toe and Uncle Myo.

Come and take a seat. Where do you come from?

Bagyi Toe: We are at the old age. So, we took a walk together and held discussions in the morning. And we happened to drop in on you. You are discussing and writing articles about the constitution. We have to find someone to chat because people by nature want to speak a lot when they are old.

Maung De Doh: Yes, it is a pleasure for me to chat with patriotic and well-experienced elderly persons who participated in Anti-Fascist Resistance like Bagyi Toe and knowledgeable pensioners like Uncle Myo.

Bagyi Toe: Well, I noticed some of the persons who took a walk in the morning listened to the radio for some news. Some news stories said that some persons are trying to disrupt the referendum in which the draft constitution will be approved. Then, I wonder what politics is. When I was young, I used to do politics. In the Japanese period, I was just a teenager. I joined Asia Youths' Asiayon to participate in the movements. They were underground movements for Anti-Fascist Resistance. When Bogyoke and patriots launched the Anti-Fascist Resistance, I joined the resistance troops. But I didn't want any titles and medals for my performances. So, I didn't apply for titles and medals. I took part in the movements because it was the concern of the entire people, not because I wanted titles and medals.

As far as I am concerned, politics is a very noble term. Actually, politics is an affair that is carried in the national interest. I understand so. If something is done in the national interest, it is national politics. However, nowadays, the term 'politics' is wrongly defined a lot. I would say, if some groups try for power, saying that they will serve the national interest only after they have come to power, it is called power politics. If they deceive the people that the nation will have a prosperous future only after their party has come to power, and they give priority to their self-interest rather than to the public interest when they come to power, it is called party politics. And if they use violence, claiming that the nation will develop only after the ruling government is removed through violence, it is called violent politics. Indeed, they are seeking self-interests in disguise of national interests. So, as British General Lord Mountbatten once said that politics became a haven for waifs and strays. How stupid it was to blast some automobiles of ordinary people with the intention of creating public panic for disrupting the referendum. What is the use of doing so for the owners, human society and the

State? That is just violence, not politics.

Uncle Myo: Yes, Bagyi Toe. In reality, the constitution is not just for any particular person, organization, party, or group. Frankly speaking, it is not just for Tatmadaw government or NLD, either. It is national politics that concerns the whole nation and entire people. The constitution doesn't concern policies and political concepts. A constitution is necessary for all countries, Socialist, Communist, imperialist, kingdom or feudal. A constitution can be called social contract that prescribes the responsibilities, authority and rights of the people and the government.

If someone puts me a question, is a constitution essential, I must reply that it is not. But, in the times of emergency, the people are helpless, and are at the mercy of the ruling government. If there is a constitution, every citizen with grievances may submit a complaint to the Supreme Court. The people can recall the representative under the right of recall if they no longer like him. If they assume that the President or members of the governing body are incompetent in discharge of duties and commit corruptions, they can remove them by impeaching them through the hluttaw concerned. In short, State power can be derived from the public, the ultimate owner of State power, only when there is a constitution.

Maung De Doh: I wonder why saboteurs are not happy with the drive for the approval of the constitution for entrusting State power to the people.

Uncle Myo: In my opinion, it is because there will be no places for them in the new State. I'm sure the new constitution is not beneficial to them. So, they dislike it, and they will continue to try to disrupt the process for the approval of the constitution.

As you Ko De Doh once said, the constitution is a nutrient for a country. In a family, some of the family members like very much the meals the mother cooks, some like the meals fairly, and some dislike them. Perceptive children will have the meals even if they don't like them much. Negligent ones might turn violent and shout at the dinning table. In the end, they might overturn the table. Then, their acts cannot bring any benefits to them and they have intention that others cannot have meals.

Maung De Doh: The new constitution carries a checks and balances system. And there will be Tatmadaw member representatives who will safeguard national security. So, saboteurs who want to break up the nation and the lackeys groups of the colonialists will not be in a position to come to power and do at will even if they come to power. I think therefore they are committing destructive activities in order that there cannot be a new

constitution.

Bagyi Toe: I think in the process of holding the referendum, the people will understand more than ever who are constructive forces and who are destructive forces. I have witnessed that the Tatmadaw government has devoted itself to nation-building tasks at unprecedented levels. In the past, the people of our village in Anya region had to spend the whole night to fetch a pot of drinking water in handscooped wells in the dry creek. The villagers could take bath only once or twice a week. They had to feed green watermelon to cattle. Now, the people are leading an easy life due to the tube-wells of the underground water tapping stations. Now, they don't need to be worried about food because now they can grow paddy with the use of irrigation water. Recently, I went to my native village to attend the ceremony to initiate 101 children into novices, the situations of the village were unlike in the past. Almost all the households have a TV and a motor cycle. Unlike in the past, the people no longer need to wait the whole night to take a Z-craft to cross the river. The new bridge is a magnificent facility. They are tangible proofs.

The constitution is part of the nation-building drive. I notice the government is taking measures systematically in this regard. To regain power, the people just need to go to the polling booth and cast 'yes' vote.

I have heard of saboteurs many times in my life. They are committing various forms of destructive acts such as blasting trains, kidnapping, collection of distortion money, murder, instigation of riots in rural areas, murders when the government's administrative mechanism is no longer effective, if they are not in a position to commit any acts, they dissuade the monks from sitting for oral examinations, creation of public panic among the national people, inventing rumours, spreading slanderous news stories, detonation of bombs among the people, misleading of the people into considering that the nation will be in ruin soon. They are committing subversive acts, and criticizing the people who serve in the national interest.

Now, the constitution is going to be approved. Like the devils that are afraid of voices of reciting Kammava, so they are now trying to disrupt the processes for the approval of the constitution. However, if the entire national people cast 'Yes' vote in the referendum, there will be no places for the evil saboteurs to live.

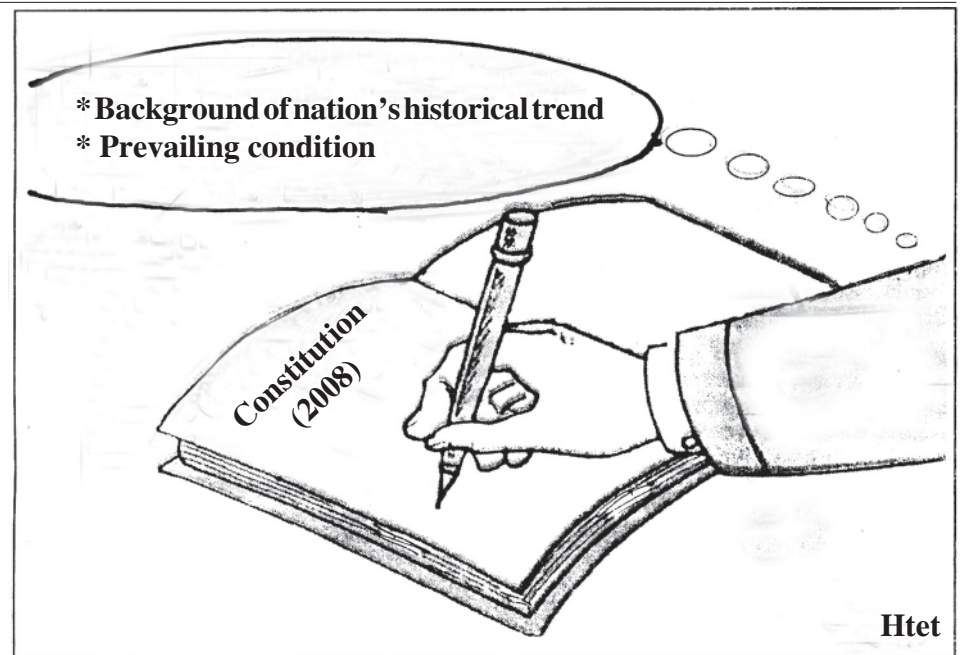

5. To make efforts for improvement of health and sanitation work in the environs and use of safe water and full use of fly-proof latrines.
6. For family members to take traditional medicine course, to provide family health care service with the application of traditional medicine and cultivate medicinal plants
7. To carry out school health activities, to create healthy atmosphere for the children and to carry out measures for declaration of rubbish free schools, Aedes free schools and tobacco free zone
8. To open more pre-primary schools for development of children, for every school-going age child to complete primary education and to provide assistance for learning in middle and high schools
9. To upgrade education promotion programmes
10. To enhance micro-credit scheme to generate family income and to conduct vocational courses
11. To raise momentum of education, social and economic aspects and health care services by mobilizing ten-house in-charge members and to report the register of births and deaths in the wards to the nearest health care units.

Medvedev to visit China on first foreign trip

Moscow, 30 April — Russia's president-elect Dmitry Medvedev said on Tuesday he would travel to China as part of his first foreign visit following his inauguration next month. "As I promised ... I

will first go to Kazakhstan, a country that is close to us, and from Kazakhstan I will go to China. That will be my first international trip," Medvedev said in a question-and-answer session at a Russian newspaper.

Medvedev takes over from Vladimir Putin as Russia's President on 7 May. Putin, who has been President for eight years, says Russia's ties with China have never been better.—MNA/Reuters

Armed gang robs security van in Mexico

MEXICO CITY, 30 April — An armed gang Monday robbed a security van at the office building of Mexico's state oil company Pemex stealing 477,000 US dollars.

Seven armed robbers attacked the security van when the guards were putting cash into automatic teller machines inside the office building, Pemex said in a statement.

After a number of gunshots, the assailants overwhelmed the van's crew and several passers-by before stealing some

five million pesos (477,000 dollars).

The gang fled in a green Ford Expedition pick-up along Marina National Avenue after the raid, said the statement, adding that nobody was injured in the incident.

An investigation showed that the robbers had used four old cars with license plates from the central Mexican state of Hidalgo to block roads around the Pemex building ahead of the attack.

Guatemalan police seize 470 kilos of cocaine

MEXICO CITY, 30 April — Guatemalan police have seized 470 kilos of cocaine at an illegal runway between the northern province of Peten and the Caribbean Province of Izabal, official sources said.

The drugs, seized Friday, were brought into the country on a small airplane apparently from Colombia. It landed at the clandestine runway in the northern region of Guatemala.

The crew members abandoned the plane and fled, Guatemala's Interior Ministry's spokesman Ricardo Garcia said, adding that the drugs allegedly belonged to Mexico's Gulf Cartel.—MNA/Xinhua

British PM says NATO's Afghan mission in trouble

LONDON, 30 April — British Prime Minister Gordon Brown told his allies that NATO's mission in Afghanistan was "critically" short of key troops and equipment, the *Daily Telegraph*

reported on Tuesday.

Brown has repeatedly tried to persuade allies including France and Germany to bear more military burden in Afghanistan, but the daily said his efforts had largely

failed.

The newspaper said according to a "confidential Foreign and Commonwealth Office paper" it obtained, there was a catalog of problems and weaknesses in

Western attempts to stabilize the country.

The three-page document, which summarized the British view of Afghanistan, was drawn up at Brown's request to be distributed to Western allies.

In a list of "critical areas to fill", the document said NATO would still need three infantry battalions, more helicopters, more aircraft and more training teams to help the Afghan Army.

It also raised concerns about the situation after November this year, when more than 2,300 US Marines are to be withdrawn from the south, where British forces are based.—MNA/Xinhua

Wild elephants kill children in Bangladesh villages

COX'S BAZAR (Bangladesh), 30 April — Two children were trampled to death and a man maimed as straying wild elephants destroyed two villages over the last 24 hours in southeastern Bangladesh, officials

said on Monday.

A girl was killed and six bamboo houses flattened as elephants ravaged a village near Cox's Bazar District town, 400 kilometres (250 miles) from the capital Dhaka on Monday.

A boy was killed and a man seriously injured when wild elephants

strayed into another village in the same district on Sunday. Five houses were levelled by the rampaging elephants.

In both the attacks, the villagers fled their homes but later returned with drums and firecrackers to scare off the herds of wild elephants.

Bird flu virus detected in Denmark

STOCKHOLM, 30 April — Bird flu virus has been detected on a farm in Denmark's central Fyn island, the country's veterinary department announced Monday.

Some 2,000 chickens on the farm in Stenstrup on the island will be culled Tuesday to contain the spread of the disease, the Danish Veterinary and Food Administration said

in a statement.

Initial checks show that the virus detected is not the deadly H5N1 strain that has ravaged Southeast Asia over the past two years.—MNA/Xinhua

Venezuelan capital, 8 states hit by power cut

CARACAS, 30 April — A major power outage hit Venezuela's capital and eight states on Tuesday, and emergency officials called for calm as the blackout caused traffic chaos.

Caracas' metro train system ground to a halt, traffic lights went out and mobile phone services

collapsed across the country.

A government official said the power failure was caused by a snapped cable and that it expected electricity supplies would be restored within a few hours.

"We have some electrical failures in several states across the country,"

Luis Curvelo, head of Venezuela's emergency services, told television station Globovision.

He called on the population to remain calm.

Initial reports did not suggest oil refineries were affected, although the power was out in the oil-producing states of Falcon and Zulia.—MNA/Reuters

Two arrested for factory fire in Casablanca

RABAT, 29 April— The owner and manager of a mattress factory in Casablanca were detained Sunday after at least 55 people were killed in a fire which broke out in the factory, Morocco's official news agency MAP reported.

Factory owner Adil Moufareh and his son Abdelali, the factory's manager, have been detained for questioning. Poor safety measures and locked doors which trapped workers were blamed for the tragedy, during which at least 55 people have been confirmed dead and six others were hospitalized, local police said.

Italy eyes minimum income rules for immigrants

ROME, 29 April—Italy's next government should create a minimum income requirement for immigrants, including those from other European Union countries, the man expected to be Italy's new Foreign Minister said. Franco Frattini, who holds the EU's top justice and security post and is a longtime ally of prime minister-elect Silvio Berlusconi, said the income requirement would become necessary for visits of more than three months.

"We need a national law that establishes a minimum income below which foreigners cannot stay in our country for more than 90 days," Frattini said in an interview published on Monday in *Il Giornale* newspaper, owned by Berlusconi's brother.

36 prisoners tunnel out of Brazilian jail

BRASILIA, 29 April— A group of 36 prisoners tunneled their way out of a prison in northeast Brazil Saturday morning, said Brazilian officials.

The escape happened at a jail in Campina Grande, Brazil's northeast state of Paraiba. The prisoners dug a six-metre-long tunnel from the prison's courtyard to the street outside, which goes right between the prison's two sentry boxes.

Till now, only one escaped prisoner has been recaptured.

Pedro Adalson, director of the Penitentiary Administration of Paraiba state, called the escape a "product of negligence".

Mass intestinal virus infection kills 20 in E China

HEFEI, 29 April—A total of 20 children have died and 1179 others fallen ill in an outbreak of a lethal intestinal virus in Fuyang City, east China's Anhui Province, since March.

The enterovirus 71 has sickened a total of 1,199 children and kills 20 of them by Sunday night, the municipal government of Fuyang said Monday night, quoting statistics from local hospitals and centre for disease control.

By Sunday night, 341 children remain in hospital for further medical observation, of whom, 27 are said to be in critical conditions and eight terminally ill.

Hospitals in Fuyang, in northwest Anhui, started to take in children with fever, along with blisters, ulcers in the mouth, or rashes on the hands and feet, in early March. Some of the victims were diagnosed with brain, heart and lung damage.

All of the victims were aged below six, of whom, the majority being children under the age of two. Enterovirus 71 can cause hand, foot and mouth disease which usually starts with a slight fever followed by blisters of ulcers in the mouth and on the hands and feet.

Sri Lanka uncovers child trafficking racket

COLOMBO, 29 April—Sri Lankan officials arrested three people when they uncovered a child-trafficking racket after three children were deported

from Singapore for having false documents.

The Child Protection Authority of Sri Lanka said on Monday investigations were under way to find the people behind the child smuggling, which had taken place over several months, adding the group had smuggled "a considerable number" of children.

"We have arrested three people and the investigations are going on," said Jagath Wellawattha, chairman of the authority.

Wellawattha said the investigations began when Singapore authorities deported three children, an 11-year-old girl and two 16-year-old boys, who had tried to go to Britain on

forged Malaysian passports. The children were taken from Sri Lanka to Malaysia where false Malaysian passports were prepared for them to enter Britain via Singapore, Wellawattha said.

Ukraine PM tells Russian PM all gas debts settled

KIEV, 29 April— Ukraine has paid off its debts to Russia for its gas imports, Prime Minister Yulia Tymoshenko said on Monday at a meeting with her Russian counterpart Viktor Zubkov.

A row over Ukraine's gas debts caused Russia's export monopoly Gazprom to briefly cut supplies in early March, threatening deliveries to

European Union states.

"We have sent the last payment, which completely settles the accumulated debt for natural gas. Right now, one can say that Ukraine has completely accounted for its obligations," Tymoshenko said at a meeting with Zubkov.

Zubkov said settling the debts opened the door for talks on a longer-term

supply contracts, but did not give any details. Neither prime ministers said how much the debt amounted to.

The EU gets almost of a quarter of its gas needs from Russia via Ukraine and watches closely any disputes between the two countries.—MNA/Reuters

Drive with care

Study shows tomato dishes protect skin

LONDON, 29 April — British researchers have found adding cooked tomatoes to the daily diet improved the skin's ability to protect against harmful UV rays, according to a BBC report on Monday.

Researchers at the universities of Manchester and Newcastle found adding five tablespoons of tomato paste to the daily diet of 10 volunteers could help ward off skin damage by providing some protection against the effects of UV rays. Damage caused by these rays can lead to premature aging and even skin cancer.

In a study, the

researchers gave 10 volunteers around 55 grammes of standard tomato paste which contains high levels of cooked tomatoes and 10 grammes of olive oil daily, with a further 10 participants receiving just the olive oil.

After three months, skin samples from the tomato group showed they had 33 per cent more protection against sunburn, the equivalent of a very low factor sunscreen, and much higher levels of procollagen, a molecule which gives the skin its structure and keeps it firm.

The study suggested

the antioxidant lycopene, found at its highest concentration when the tomatoes have been cooked, was behind the apparent benefit.

"The tomato diet boosted the level of procollagen in the skin significantly. These increasing levels suggest potential reversal of the skin aging process," Lesley Rhodes, a dermatologist at the University of Manchester, was quoted as saying. — MNA/Xinhua

H5 strain of bird flu virus detected in N-E Japan

TOKYO, 29 April — Japan's northeastern Akita Prefecture has detected the H5 strain of the bird flu virus in several dead and dying swans in the past week, officials said on Monday. Japanese media report said three dead swans and one dying swan were found last Monday near Lake Towada, with the virus being detected in three of them. Another dead swan and two dying swans were later found on the shores of the lake from Wednesday to Saturday.

Links between the virus and the swans' death are yet to be confirmed, prefectural government officials said, adding that no widespread deaths of birds or animals had been reported in the region. — MNA/Xinhua

Vietnam to investigate rice speculation

HANOI, 30 April — Vietnamese Prime Minister Nguyen Tan Dung has required the Ministry of Public Security to investigate false rumour on rice insufficiency and the commodity's speculation, which has caused soaring prices in recent days and panic buying.

Accordingly, the ministry will focus on inspecting paddy and rice millers and traders, and coordinate with relevant agencies to timely detect and prevent speculation of the grain, local newspaper *Youth* re-reported on Tuesday.

People in Vietnam's southern Ho Chi Minh City rushed to buy rice, causing rice scarcity and price hike of up to 100 per cent several days ago. However, rice prices and buyers in the city have sharply decreased since Monday, said the paper.

The Prime Minister has also asked local food traders to ensure sufficient rice supplies and stabilize local rice market.

Highways closed down in Argentina due to smoke cloud

BUENOS AIRES, 29 April — Argentine officials Sunday shut down a number of highways due to low visibility triggered by farmland burning that has been affecting a large part of Argentina for some weeks.

To prevent accidents, officials closed different stretches of highways 8, 9 and 12 which cross the provinces of Buenos Aires, Entre Rios and Santa Fe.

Buenos Aires Province and its surrounding areas have been affected by farmland burning in the delta zone of the Parana River, which has caused a dense smoke cloud, smothering cities and routes. Rosario city and the villages of Zarate,

Baradero and San Pedro are the most affected by the smoke cloud.

The government has been unable to stop the hundreds of farmland fires due to strong winds.

Russia launches rocket with Israeli satellite

MOSCOW, 29 April — Russia launched a carrier rocket on Monday to send an Israeli communications satellite into space, news agencies reported.

The Russian booster *Zenit-3SLB* with the upper-stage rocket *DM-SLB*, which lifted off from the Baikonur spaceport in Kazakhstan at 9 a m Moscow Time (0500 GMT), has placed the Israeli communications satellite *AMOS-3* in the terrestrial orbit, *Interfax*

quoted Lieutenant-General Alexei Zolotukhin, top spokesman for the Russian Space Forces, as saying. In several hours the Israeli satellite, which weighs 1,300 kilos and has a service life of about 18 years, will be placed on a geostationary orbit at an altitude of 36,000 kilometers, the spokesman said.

The rocket had been scheduled to orbit the Israeli satellite on 24 April, but was postponed as the

ground equipment was not ready for the launch.

The satellite, worth some 170 million US dollars, will join the *AMOS-2* satellite and replace *AMOS-1* to increase capacity, expand coverage and enhance direct cross-Atlantic links connecting the Middle East to Europe and the US East Coast, *RIA Novosti* reported, quoting the fleet's operator, the Space Communications Ltd.

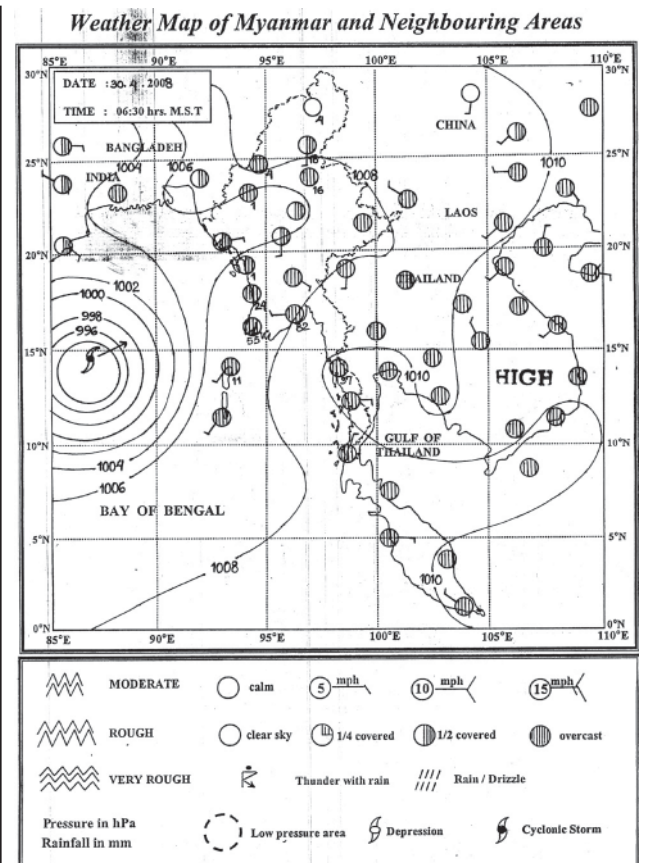

China donates \$600,000 for de-mining in E Cambodia
