NAY PYI TAW, 10 May – The Referendum for Approval of the Constitution of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar 2008 was held at polling stations across the nation beginning 6 am today.

Chairman of the State Peace and Development Council Commander-in-Chief of Defence Services Senior General Than Shwe and wife Daw Kyaing Kyaing cast votes at No 1 Polling Station in Anawrahta Ward of Nay Pyi Taw at

8.15 am.

Next, Vice-Chairman of the State Peace and Development Council Deputy Commander-in-Chief of Defence Services Commander-in-Chief (Army) Vice-Senior General Maung Aye and wife Daw Mya Mya San cast votes.

SPDC member General Thura Shwe Mann and wife Daw Khin Lay Thet also cast votes.

Afterwards, Prime Minister General Thein Sein and wife Daw

Khin Khin Win cast votes.

Secretary-1 of the SPDC Lt-Gen Thiha Thura Tin Aung Myint Oo and wife Daw Khin Saw Hnin cast votes.

SPDC members Lt-Gen Maung Bo and wife, Lt-Gen Ye Myint and wife, Lt-Gen Kyaw Win and wife, Lt-Gen Khin Maung Than and wife, Lt-Gen Aung Htwe and wife and Lt-Gen Tin Aye and wife cast votes.

Next, Commander-in-Chief (Navy) Vice-Admiral Soe Thein

and wife, Commander-in-Chief (Air) Lt-Gen Myat Hein and wife, Lt-Gen Myint Hlaing, Lt-Gen Ye Myint, Maj-Gen Tha Aye, Maj-Gen Khin Zaw and Adjutant-General Maj-Gen Thura Myint Aung and their wives cast votes.

Likewise, servicemen and their family members cast votes at the polling stations.

In Nay Pyi Taw, No 2 polling station was opened at Khayay Yeiktha in Anawrahta Ward, No 3 polling station at No 1 Basic Education Middle School, No 4 polling sta-

tion at Magyiyeik beauty salon, No 5 polling station at Magyiyeik welfare shop, No 6 polling station at Kyansittha Yeiktha and No 7 polling station at the Works Company.

Before opening the polling stations, the polling station officers and members of the station checked the polling station, voting rolls, ballot boxes and ballot papers.

At 6 am when the polling stations were opened, directors, senior military officers, servicemen and family members of the Ministry of Defence

systematically cast votes under the supervision of respective members of the Sub-commission for Holding Referendum, the polling station officers and members of the polling stations.

After the eligible persons have cast votes cent per cent, the polling station officers and members of the polling stations systematically and accurately counted votes-in-favour, votes-against and cancelled votes and registered the voting rolls at the record books.

Public health care notices to keep victims free from diseases

The government is now spending huge funds and manpower in the relief and resettlement undertaking in the areas hit hard by the natural disaster, while local and foreign well-wishers are contributing humanitarian assistance. The relief accepting teams are accepting the supplies systematically and transporting them to the affected areas promptly.

Members of the Tatmadaw and social organizations, and well-wishers from states and divisions are donating relief supplies with nationalistic spirit as well as contributing voluntary service towards the relief and rehabilitation tasks.

The buildings hit by the storm will be rebuilt phase by phase. In this regard, priority will be given to construction of schools, hospitals, monasteries, government offices and housings.

Yeku, Gyobyu, Hlawgar, and Ngamoeyeik (Ahtayu) Waterworks in Yangon that were temporarily closed due to the storm are now serviceable again following the resumption of power supply.

The Ministry of Health has released public notices on health care for the victims to be able to keep themselves free from diseases. Particularly, the people in the disaster affected areas have to stay in the shelters that are resistant enough to bad weather, wear warm clothes in order to avoid catching cold, and use clean fly-proof latrines.

Natural disasters such as strong winds and floods are followed by health problems including TB, diarrhoea, and snake bites. Therefore, the victims should take care in their day-to-day activities.

At a time when the government is energetically carrying out relief and resettlement works in the storm-hit areas, the people have to follow the public health notices in order that they may keep themselves free from the diseases that are common in the natural disaster-struck areas.

BBC admits holding on to charity money

LONDON, 10 May — The BBC admitted on Friday it had failed to pay 106,000 pounds which should have gone to charity from viewers' calls to premium rate phonedlines, the latest such scandal to hit broadcasters.

The BBC Trust, the body which oversees the broadcaster, ordered the corporation to apologize on air to viewers and to take disciplinary action against some staff.

An independent review found that Audiocall, a subsidiary company, had retained all money raised from telephone calls when voting lines were closed, including sums that should have gone to charity.

The practice, which took place from October

2005 until September 2007, involved small individual sums, but collectively the amount that should have gone to charity was 106,000 pounds.

That was the equivalent of 1.3 per cent of all money raised for charity by the BBC using

premium rate phonedlines in that period.

"The sums due to charity have now been repaid with interest. We would like to apologise to viewers and to the charities for this serious error," the BBC said in a statement.

OPEC crude oil price near \$117

VIENNA, 10 May — The price of crude oil produced by the Organization of the Petroleum-Exporting Countries (OPEC) set a new record of 116.93 US dollars per barrel (dpb), OPEC said Friday.

OPEC crude oil price has kept rising for five consecutive trading days since 1 May and stood at 116.93 dpb Thursday, up 90 cents from the previous day. OPEC General Secretary Abdullah Salem El-Badri said on Thursday that the rise of oil prices

should be attributed to volatility on financial markets and lots of speculations aroused by depreciation of the US dollar.

He insisted the oil market was well-supplied, saying some OPEC member countries even could not find buyers for part of their oil.

The 13-member OPEC currently produces about 32 million barrels per day, which is about 40 per cent of the global crude output.

MEXICO CITY, 10 May — Guatemalan police on Thursday arrested 50 cargo transport workers for going on strike in protest against the government's

restrictions on transit schedules, according to news reaching here from Guatemala City.

The arrests followed Guatemalan President

Alvaro Colom's announcement on Wednesday night that he will not tolerate such protests involving roadblocks.

A Guatemalan Inferior Ministry official said the workers, arrested under the state of prevention law, will be imprisoned for 30 days.

UK's ruling Labour suffers new low in poll ratings

LONDON, 10 May — A new opinion poll published on Friday puts Britain's Conservative

Party 26 per cent ahead of the ruling Labour.

The rating for Gordon Brown's Labour Party is

reportedly down to the lowest since records began in the 1930s, the Daily Telegraph reported.

A YouGov poll puts the Conservatives at 49 per cent with Labour trailing at 23 per cent and the Liberal Democratic Party at 17 per cent.

The Conservatives last got a bigger lead in 1968, said the report.

The poll results have added to Labour's poor performance during the local elections last week when it received only 24 per cent of the vote, ranking a poor third behind the Tories and the Liberal Democrats.

Drugs Office director Nestor Reverol said in a statement that the cocaine had been hidden in false bottoms of 49 aluminium pots.

The seizure took place

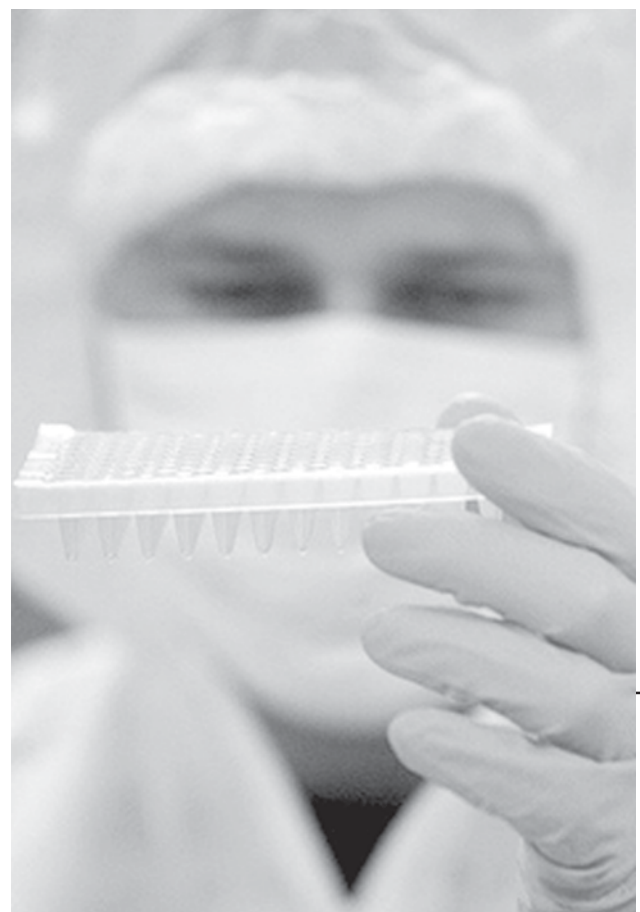
in Puerto Cabello on Thursday morning. The shipment was bound for Antwerp port in Belgium, Reverol said.

Myanmar holds referendum for emergence of modern developed discipline-flourishing democratic nation

NAY PYI TAW, 10 May—The State Peace and Development Council has been working hand in hand with the people for the emergence of a modern developed discipline-flourishing democratic nation.

In implementing this task in compliance with the seven-step Road Map, it has now reached the fourth step which is to seek the approval of the Constitution drafted in line with the basic principles and detailed basic principles adopted by the National Convention.

The referendum for ratification of the constitution of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar was held at the respective polling stations at 6 am today.

The referendum was held successfully in the whole country except 7 townships in Ayeyawady Division and 40 townships

in Yangon Division totalling 47 townships, with massive turnout of the citizens.

Prior to the opening of the polling stations, polling station officers and members inspected the polling booths, the lists of voters and ballots. Exactly at 6 am, the referendum began.

Diplomats from embassies in Yangon accompanied by personnel visited the referendum being held in Mandalay, Taunggyi and Hpa-an.

Chairman of the Commission for holding referendum for approval of the State Constitution U Aung Toe, members of the Commission and State, Division, District, and Township sub-commissions inspected casting of vote by the people at the respective polling booths.

Members of Red

Cross Society and responsible persons helped ailing persons and disabled persons to cast votes in convenience.

Although the polling booths were to close at 4 pm, polling station officers and members arranged eligible persons who had not cast vote to be able to cast vote in some places.

After the polling stations were closed at 4 pm, polling station officer and members counted votes in the presence of the responsible persons.

Reporters from Myanmar Foreign Correspondents club and editors and reporters from journals and magazines went around the polling stations and gathered news and took photos.

There were altogether 25837 polling stations in the referendum held today.

NAY PYI TAW, 10 May – The referendum for the approval of the Constitution of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar was held at the ward/village-tract polling stations in Nay Pyi Taw Pinyinman Township at 6 am today.

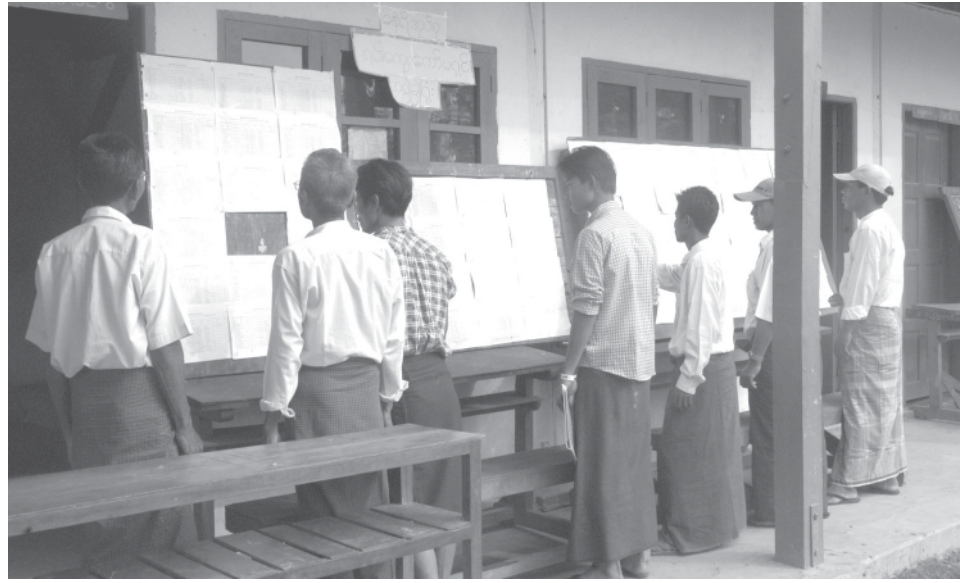
When the polling stations were opened, voters cast the votes.

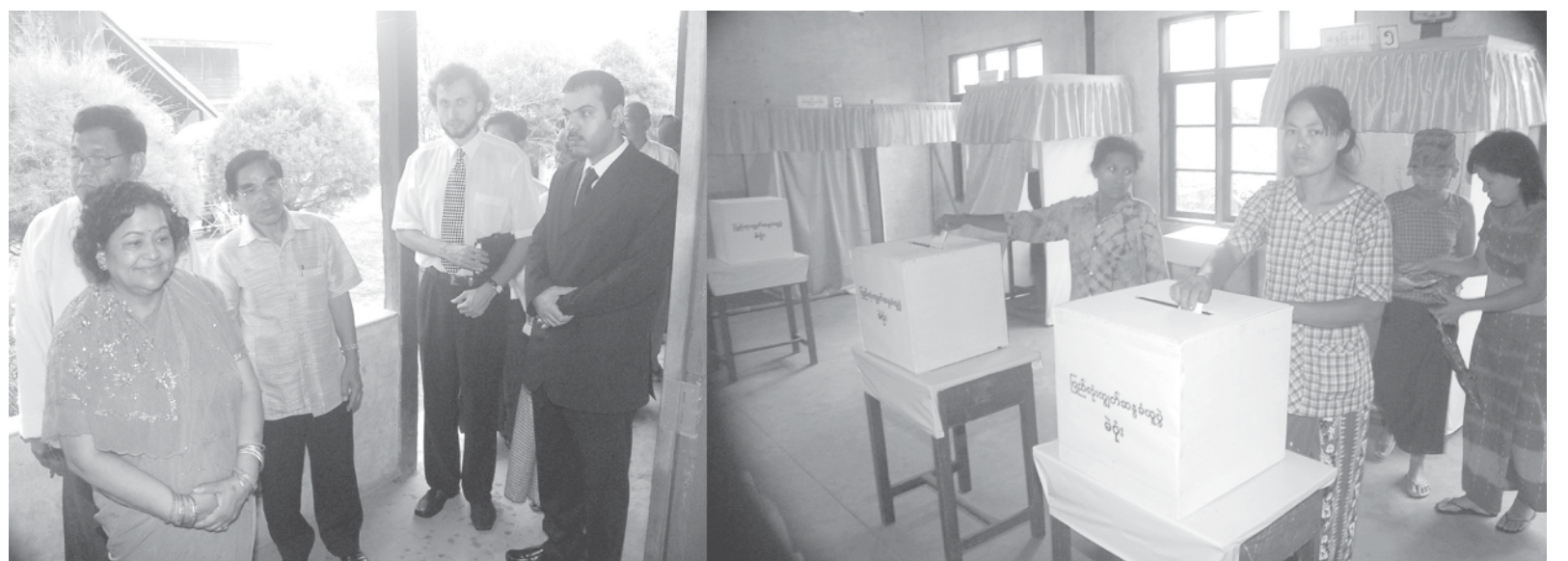

Berlusconi becomes Italian leader for third time

ROME, 9 May — Silvio Berlusconi was sworn in as Prime Minister of Italy on Thursday, returning to power after nearly two years in opposition faced with the arduous task of spurring an economy slowing towards stagnation.

The 71-year-old media tycoon, who won last month's general election, took his oath of allegiance at the presidential palace

along with government ministers, including members of the anti-immigration Northern League in key posts.

"There's a lot of work to do," Berlusconi told crowds of supporters outside the Prime Minister's office.

Berlusconi, already prime minister between 2001 and 2006 and briefly from 1994 to 1995, has promised to fight crime,

solve the trash crisis which has dogged the city of Naples and crack down on illegal immigration.

But within hours of taking office, he already faced a diplomatic problem when Libya, which is upset about his appointment of a minister who has insulted Muslims, said it would no longer cooperate in controlling illegal immigration.

At least 62 killed by heavy rainfall, floods in Ecuador

QUITO, 9 May — At least 62 people have been killed and nine have gone missing due to heavy rainfall and floods in Ecuador since early 2008, the Civil Defence said on Wednesday.

In its most recent report, the Civil Defence said over 20,000 houses, 185 highways and 41 roads have been damaged by rainfall and floods, while up to 90,310 families were affected. Ecuadorean officials said the rainfall and floods were the strongest in the past decade in the country. Coastal regions were the hardest hit, although serious damage was also reported in the Andean mountain region. —MNA/Xinhua

China announces e-savings bond issue

BEIJING, 10 May — The Ministry of Finance (MOF) announced here on Thursday that it will start issuing the first electronic savings bonds of the year starting on 16 May.

The three-year e-savings bond issue, which could be as large as 30 billion yuan (4.3 billion US dollars), has a fixed annual interest rate of 5.74 per cent. The issue will end on 31 May, with interest to be calculated from 16 May and paid annually, said the ministry in a statement on

its website.

The bond will be sold at branches of the Industrial and Commercial Bank of China, the country's biggest lender, and six other banks.

Only individual investors can buy these bonds, the MOF said. The first such bonds were issued in June 2006.

The bearer treasury bond, which China began to issue in 1994, is another variety of savings bond. It has since become a popular investment tool for the

public and an important channel for the government to raise funds for major construction projects.

Compared with bearer bonds, the MOF said the e-savings bond is more convenient for investors. For example, interest will be paid by direct deposit into the investor's account. For bearer bonds, investors must visit bank counters to be paid their interest.

The MOF has said that further e-savings products will be introduced.

Indonesia to hike oil price by less than 30%

JAKARTA, 9 May — Indonesian Vice-President Jusuf Kalla said on Wednesday that the government would hike the prices of subsidized oil by less than 30 per cent. "The hike will not exceed 30 per cent in a bid not to increase people's burdens," the Vice President told reporters on the side line of a seminar at the Four Season Hotel in the capital.

On Monday, a Cabinet meeting decided to raise the prices of subsidized-oil in a bid to secure the state budget from a pressure of mounting subsidies following the

soaring global oil prices.

To reduce the social impact, the government would provide incentives for the low income group, he said. Similarly, the Vice-President said that half of the funds resulted from the decrease of the subsidies would be allocated to the low income group. So far, government subsidies on oil were enjoyed by high income group rather than by that of low income group, said Kalla. "The price hikes are actually to transfer subsidies from the high income group to the low income group," he said.

Reuters called for the immediate release of Howard Burditt, a Zimbabwean national, who has been held by police in Harare since

Monday. He has not been charged. "As part of its pan-African news operations, Reuters has long had a legitimate and fully accredited bureau in Harare, and has always complied with Zimbabwean regulations with the aim of accurately reporting the news," a company statement said.

46 bodies recovered in Brazilian boat accident

BRASILIA, 10 May — Brazilian rescue workers have recovered 46 bodies after an

overloaded boat sank on Sunday in the Solimoes River in the country's northern state of Amazonas, official sources said on Thursday.

Forty-five of the retrieved bodies have been identified.

About 70 passengers survived the accident, officials said.

Packed beyond capacity with revellers returning from a party, the boat capsized in the face of strong winds and was dragged by currents for 20 kilometres.

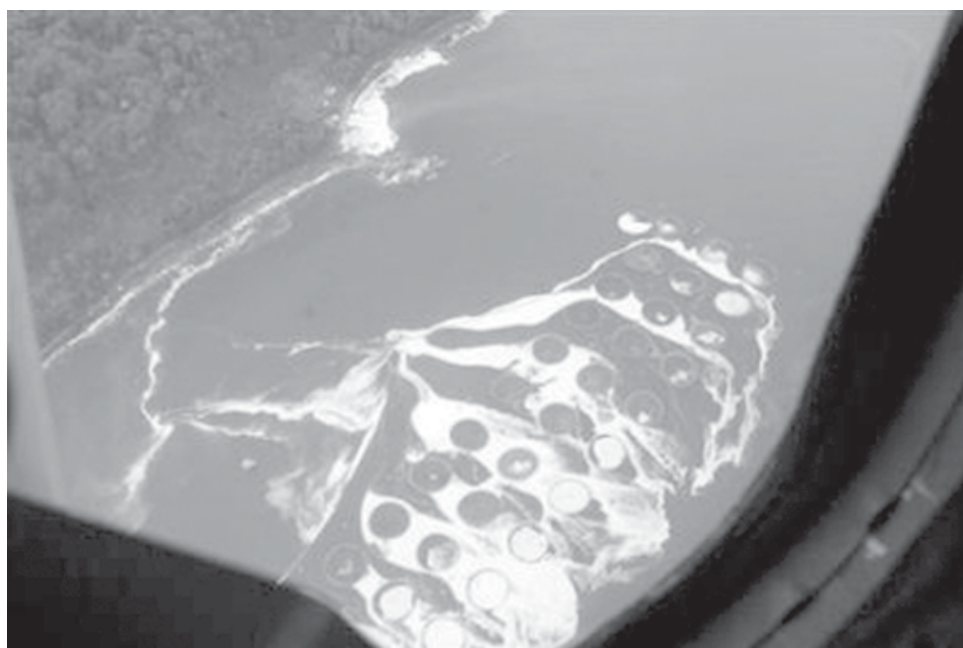
The clash occurred on the Cuernavaca-Acapulco federal highway in the municipality of Xoxocutla

Chinese students chalk up higher mean score in TOEFL

PRINCETON (New Jersey), 9 May — Chinese students are making “strong progress” in mastering the communicative English skills, as Educational Testing Service (ETS) reported that the TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language) scores for Chinese test takers increased to match the worldwide average in 2007, ETS officials said here on Wednesday.

Citing figures from

ETS’ TOEFL Test and Score Data Summary, which contains data on the performance of examinees who took the TOEFL Internet-based test in 2007, the officials said that the mean score for Chinese test takers was 78 in the year, a two-point increase over 2006, matching the worldwide average of 78.

“The results show that the (Chinese) students are making strong progress in

mastering the communicative English skills necessary to succeed at the world’s leading universities,” the officials said.

“These results show that the hard work of intensive study of English and practice by Chinese test takers has had positive results,” Paul Ramsey, Senior Vice President of ETS Global, noted at a Press conference especially arranged for foreign journalists.

Over one million people die of malaria per year

JAKARTA, 9 May — The World Health Organization said that more than one million people out of 500 million cases die of malaria per year, Subhash R Salunke, the organization representative to Indonesia, said here on Thursday.

The representative said that malaria had become a major health problem in the world, particularly in Africa and some Asian countries.

“So it is a serious public health problem

now,” he told *Xinhua* after a commemoration of the World Malaria Day conducted by the Indonesian Government here in the capital of Jakarta. “The death toll could be more than one million people per year in the world,” said Salunke.

The representative said that the infectious disease always attacked those in remote areas, in which the data of casualty and cases could not always be recorded.

Saudi Arabia, Kuwait evacuate nat’ls from Lebanon

BEIRUT, 10 May — Saudi Arabia and Kuwait on Friday began evacuating their nationals from Lebanon, where riots sweeping the country have left at least eight dead over the past three days, local New TV reported

Kuwaiti Embassy in Lebanon evacuated the first batch of Kuwaiti nationals residing or studying in troubled Lebanon by land to

neighbouring Syria on Friday, said the report.

Up to 150 Kuwaiti citizens including 30 students boarded large buses heading toward the Lebanese-Syria border, it added.

On Thursday, a total of 70 Saudis were evacuated by Saudi Embassy via Syria too, the report said, adding that more Saudi nationals were leaving Friday through the arrangement of the embassy.

California promotes researches on stem cells

LOS ANGELES, 9 May — The California Institute for Regenerative Medicine (CIRM) awarded 12 academic and non-profit institutions on Wednesday with funds worth 271 million dollars to promote researches on human embryonic stem cells. The institutions will use the grants to build research facilities throughout the state. “This will go a long way toward medical research that could save lives and improve them for people with chronic diseases,” Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger said. “But also, this kind of public-private investment in a growing jobs sector is exactly the kind of good news our economy needs right now.” The largest grant went to Stanford University, which received 43.6 million dollars. The San Diego Consortium for

Regenerative Medicine received 43 million. The other three major recipients are the University of California in Irvine (UCI), the University of Southern California (USC) and the University of California in Los Angeles (UCLA).

USC officials said the money would go toward a five-storey laboratory building. “The new centre at USC will be an important addition to our campus as we create new research space for discoveries that will eventually translate to patient care,” said Dr Carmen Puliafito, dean of the Keck School of Medicine at USC.

UCLA officials said the money will help fund research labs and career-development space for clinical faculty.

Creation of health insurance in poor nations urged

PARIS, 9 May — France has called for the creation of health insurance systems in poor countries, particularly in the African continent, where millions of people were still without access to essential healthcare services, the French media reported on Thursday.

However, the representatives of non-governmental organizations, who attended an international health care conference in Paris, vehemently defended their calls for the provision of free healthcare to the world’s poor.

The conference, bringing together representatives of 55 countries, international institutions, non-govern-

mental organizations and private companies, stressed the need to diversify sources of funding, in particular

through the private sector to establish health insurance systems in developing countries.

Chile gives volcano holdouts ultimatum to flee

PUERTO MONTT/FUTALEUFU, (Chile), 9 May — Chile on Thursday ordered holdout residents to flee from an erupting volcano in the remote region of Patagonia and vowed to force them out if they refuse to obey.

The military evacuated a small contingent of troops and journalists from near Chaiten Volcano in southern Chile before dawn on Thursday after it spat out fiery material.

But some civilians refused to leave two villages near the volcano that began erupting last week for the first time in thousands of years. It has spewed ash that has reached the Atlantic seaboard and the Argentine capital, Buenos Aires.

A strong smell of sulfur hung in the air around the village of Chaiten, just six miles (10 kilometres) from the volcano. —MNA/Reuters

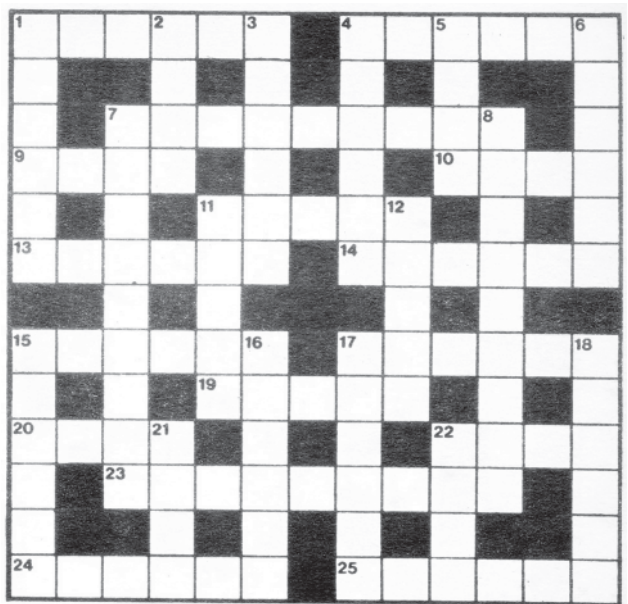
England earn extra place in UEFA Cup

RIO DE JANEIRO, 10 May — San Lorenzo, trailing 2-0 and down to nine men with half an hour left produced an extraordinary fightback to draw 2-2 with River Plate and reach the Libertadores Cup quarter-finals on Thursday.

Santos completed the line-up for the last eight by winning 2-0 away to Cucuta, Colombia's struck twice in four minutes to give San Lorenzo an improbable draw at fellow Argentines River and a 4-3 aggregate win on another night of drama in the South American equivalent of the Champions League.

Their performance followed an equally unlikely comeback by America on Wednesday when, needing a three-goal win away to Brazil's Flamengo at the Maracana, the Mexicams got the result they needed to qualify 5-4 on aggregate.

Matias Abelairas put River ahead after 12 min-

utes when his free kick eluded the San Lorenzo defence and bounced into the net.

San Lorenzo had Drego Rivero sent off for a second bookable offence after 43 minutes and their hopes appeared to have evaporated completely after an astonishing moment from defender Jonathan Bottnielli.

Having comfortably held off Radamel Falcao Garcia in his own penalty area and passed the ball back to goalkeeper Agustin Orion, Bottnielli then elbowed his opponent in the neck.

He was sent off and River were awarded a penalty, converted by Sebastian Abreu in the 62nd minute.

Eriksson gives no clubs to his future

MANCHESTER (England), 10 May — Sven-Goran Eriksson refused to comment on his future in football on Friday as he prepared for what looks likely to be his final game in charge of Manchester City.

Portuguese club Benfica confirmed on Thursday that they had held talks about a possible return to the Stadium of Light for the former England coach, who according to widespread media reports is expected to be sacked by City after their game at Middlesbrough on Sunday.

Eriksson told reporters: "I have no comment about that I don't deny it and I don't confirm it. I refuse to answer questions about my future.

"I know there has been a lot of speculation but that's speculation. The facts will be known, probably next week."

"It has no meaning talking about if. It's better to talk about 'today' when things are sorted."

Eriksson believes he has overseen a successful first season in charge of City, who are set to finish no lower than ninth in their premier league after battling against relegation last season.

However, the Swede does not believe that club owner Thaksin Shinawatra shares that view, which means Sunday's game looks set to be his last.

Storm "Rammasun" moves northward off Philippines

MANILA, 10 May —Tropical storm "Rammasun" locally called "Butchoy", continued to gain strength Friday as it was moving northward in the high seas east to the Philippines, the Philippines Atmospheric Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration (PAGASA) said.

As of 2:00 am local time (1800 GMT) PAGASA tracked the storm east of Samar Island in central Philippines and was moving north to Luzon at 11 kilometres per hour (kph).

Late Thursday night the centre of the storm was placed at 500 kilometres east of Hinatuan, Surigao del Sur in southern Philippines, packing maximum sustained winds of 85 kph near the centre

and gustiness f up to 100 kilometres per hour.

The weather bureau forecast the storm to be 620 kilometres northeast of Hinatuan Friday night and 700 kilometres east of Borongan. Eastern

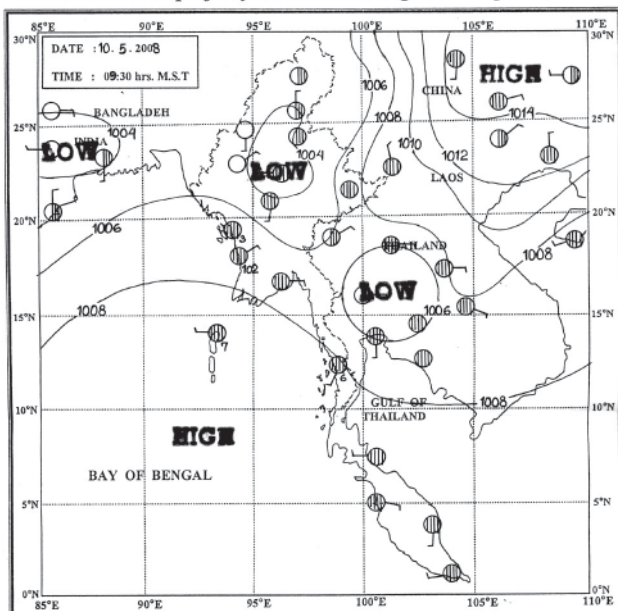
Samar Saturday evening.

PAGASA said that despite the weather disturbance's intensified activity, no storm warning signal has been raised.

Summary of observations recorded at 9:30 hours MST: During the past 24 hours, rain or thundershowers have been widespread in Taninthayi Division, scattered in Shan, Rakhine States and Mandalay Division, isolated in Sagaing and Yangon Divisions with isolated heavy fall in Rakhine State and weather has been partly cloudy in the remaining States and Divisions. Day temperatures were (3°C) above May average temperatures in Sagaing, Magway and Taninthayi Divisions, (3°C) below May average temperatures in Eastern Shan State and about May average temperatures in the remaining areas. NAY PYI TAW, 10 May —Chairman of National Disaster Preparedness Central Committee Prime Minister General Thein Sein, accompanied by Lt-Gen Myint Swe of the Ministry of Defence, Chairman of Yangon Division Peace and Development Council Commander of Yangon Command Maj-Gen Hla Htay Win and party visited relief camp in Hlinethaya this morning.

The Prime Minister cordially met storm victims and gave necessary instructions to officials concerned.
