Hygienic environment, key to infectious disease control

Good health and fitness call for a serious attention of everybody. In that regard, prevention is better than any other measure.

Now, pamphlets on health education are being distributed to the people and public notices about the ways the people should take in the season concerned are being mentioned in the public media for enabling the people to be free from disasters.

The rainy season has set in now, and dengue hemorrhagic fever, malaria, diarrhoea, the common cold and pneumonia might rear their ugly head. So, preventive measures are to be taken.

In Myanmar, mosquito grows most, and more cases about dengue hemorrhagic fever are found during the period. The spread of dengue hemorrhagic fever is due to the bite of aedes aegypti mosquito and the mosquito that hides in dark places during daytime and that grow in wells, lakes, water tanks and water pots. Preventive measures have to be taken to control the spread of the seasonal disease.

Diarrhoea may be common in the period between the hot season and the rainy season. Therefore, the people should avoid eating overripe fruit and flyblown foods, and drinking unclean water.

In order to control the growth of mosquito and fly that are vectors for infectious diseases, the people should keep their surrounding areas clean and pay a careful attention to personal hygiene. Moreover, preventive measures are to be taken with all seriousness.

Therefore, local organizations, social organizations and local people have to carry out sanitation tasks in concert to be able to control the spread of infectious diseases in the transitional period. If so, the people will be free from the diseases caused by mosquito and fly.

Storm survivors in villages in Pyapon Township receive treatment

YANGON, 11 June — A medical team comprising psychiatrics, eye specialists, paediatricians, dentists, general practitioners and nurses gave medical treatment to 395 storm survivors in villages in Pyapon Township on 8 June.

Under the arrangement of Ministry of Health and with the assistance of Inland Water Transport, the medical

team left for storm-hit areas by a floating hospital on 8 June.

The floating hospital went to Kyonta and Hmawwunsu villages in the township and provided medical treatment to 301 survivors, vaccinated children and carried out fumigation the next day. The medical team has carried out medical services in villages by motorized boats.

Stressed? Give the TV a miss and look out the window

NEW YORK, 12 June — If you're feeling stressed, rather than wallow in front of the television try looking out of the window, with a US study finding scenes of nature can alleviate minor stress levels.

Researchers at the Human Interaction with Nature and Technological Systems Lab at the University of Washington set out to look at whether nature, either the real thing or depicted technologically, can impact on minor stress levels.

The study involved

measuring people's heart recovery rate from minor stress when they were exposed to a natural scene through a window and when exposed to the same scene shown on a high-definition plasma screen, or a blank wall.

"The heart rate of people who looked at the scene through the window dropped more quickly than the others.

In fact, the high-definition plasma screen had no more effect than the blank wall," the researchers said in a statement.

They also found that when people spent more time looking at the natural scene their heart rates tended to decrease more. That was not the case with the plasma screen.

The study, involving 90 college students, is published in the *Journal of Environmental Psychology*.

"Technology is good and it can help our lives, but let's not be fooled into thinking we can live without nature," Peter Kahn, who led the research team, said in a statement.

Iranian leader calls Bush a 'wicked man'

SHAHR-E-KORD, (Iran), 12 June—Iranian leader Mahmoud Ahmadinejad called President Bush a "wicked man" on Wednesday. Addressing thousands of people in this central city, he said Bush had set out to damage Iran but failed to halt its nuclear programme and would not succeed in his goal of attacking the Islamic republic.

"This wicked man desires to harm the Iranian nation. (Bush) made plans, moved into Afghanistan and then Iraq, and announced that Iran was the third target," Ahmadinejad said.

"I tell him ... your era has come to an end. With the grace of God, you won't be able to harm even one centimetre of the sacred land of Iran."

Bush on Wednesday repeated his stance that no options were ruled out in trying to get Iran to drop its nuclear ambitions. At a joint news conference with German Chancellor Angela Merkel, he said: "My first choice is to solve this diplomatically, but all options are on the table."—Internet

Canada apologizes for abuse of native children

OTTAWA, 12 June—Canada, addressing one of the darkest chapters in its history, formally apologized on Wednesday for forcing 150,000 aboriginal children into grim residential schools, where many say they were sexually and physically abused.

Prime Minister Stephen Harper told a Parliamentary chamber packed with legislators and aboriginal representatives that there could be no excuses for what happened at the church-run schools, which mainly operated from the 1870s to the 1970s.

"The government of Canada sincerely apologizes and asks the forgiveness of the aboriginal peoples of this country for failing them so profoundly. We are sorry," Harper said in a 15-minute address, at one point fighting back tears.

Native leaders said they hoped the apology would lead to a new era of reconciliation between Canadians and the often marginalized aboriginal population, which routinely suffers from poor living conditions and high unemployment.—Internet

Tornado kills four at Iowa boy scout camp

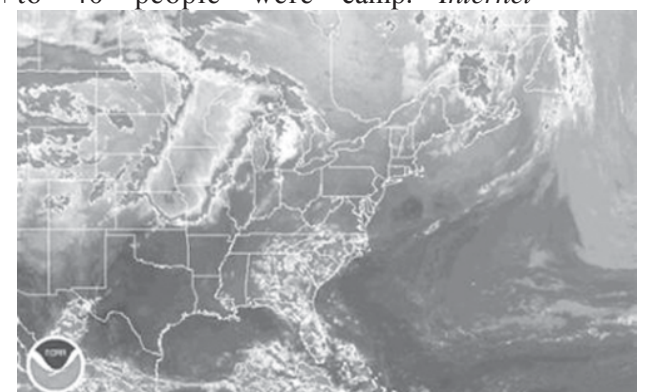
DES MOINES, (Iowa) 12 June— Four people were killed and at least 20 injured when a tornado tore through an Iowa boy scout camp on Wednesday, where dozens of scouts were gathered for a summer retreat, state officials said.

The deadly twister was one of more than 30 that roared through four US Midwestern states on Wednesday. It hit the Little Sioux Scout Ranch in western Iowa about 6:35 pm CDT (2135 GMT). More tornadoes were feared for the region Wednesday night.

Ninety-three campers and 25 adults were

attending the Little Sioux camp when the tornado struck, said Tina Potthoff, spokeswoman for the Iowa Emergency Operations Centre. Potthoff said in addition to the four dead, at least 20 and possibly up to 40 people were

injured. Injured campers were taken to five area hospitals as parents of campers gathered Wednesday night in a nearby church awaiting news and search and rescue teams continued to sift through debris at the camp.—Internet

Obama opens race with edge over McCain

WASHINGTON, 12 June— Presumptive Democratic presidential nominee Barack Obama has opened the general election campaign with a six-point lead over Republican John McCain, according to an NBC News/*Wall Street Journal* poll released on Wednesday.

Obama, an Illinois senator, leads McCain among registered voters, 47 to 41 percent. In the

previous NBC/*Journal* poll in late April, Obama was leading the Arizona senator by three points, 46 percent to 43 percent.

Among respondents who said they voted for Sen Hillary Clinton in the Democratic primaries, 61 percent favoured Obama and 19 percent said they preferred McCain.

The poll found Obama leading McCain among African Americans,

Hispanics, women and blue-collar workers.

Among white men, who made up 36 percent of the electorate in the 2004 presidential election, McCain has a 20-point lead over Obama, 55 percent to 35 percent, NBC reported.

Obama's lead over McCain expands when New York Sen Hillary Clinton is added as Obama's running mate, the poll found.—Internet

Pakistan unearths suicide bombers network

ISLAMABAD, 12 June — Pakistani security agencies have busted a local network of suicide bombers and foiled a big terrorist attack attempt, chief of Interior Ministry said on Tuesday.

Addressing a news conference here, Interior Ministry Adviser Rehman Malik said three would-be suicide bombers, who were about to explode, were among the nine terror suspects arrested in raids in the city of Rawalpindi.

Malik said six handlers of the suspected bombers

have also been rounded up with explosives-laden vehicles.

“They were about to explode. Their plans were fully mature,” he said, adding that the arrested suspects belong to an extremist organization. He did not name the organization.

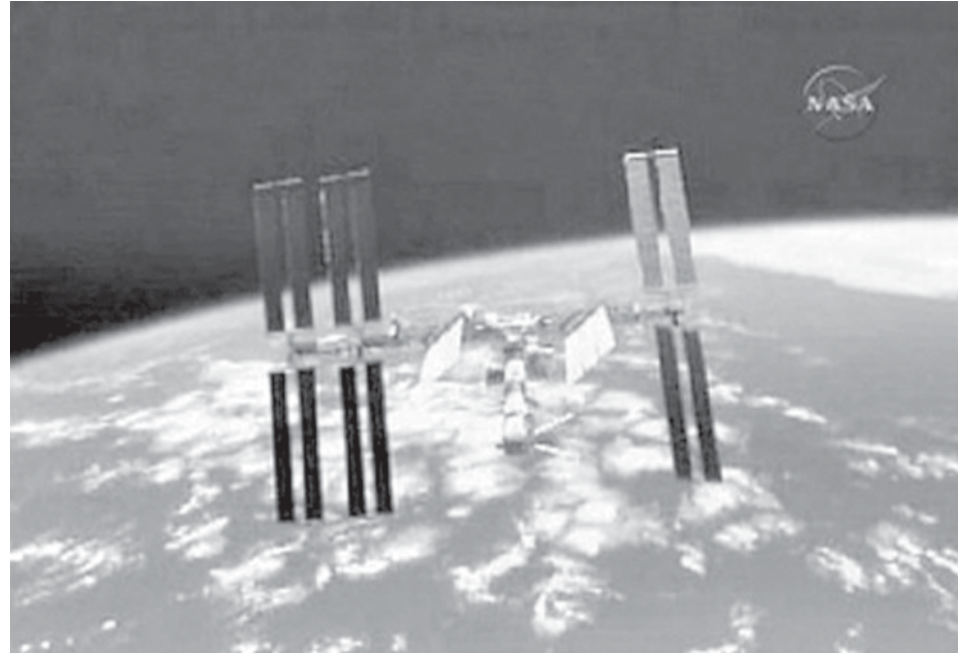
“The law enforcement agencies have achieved a major success. The major disaster was averted,” Malik said.

International news agency quoted Malik as saying that two Toyota-brand land cruiser cars with 400 kilos potassium chlorides of high intensity explosive in each were seized from one parking lot. Another car with 400 kilos was recovered from another parking area.

Another Corolla-brand car with 200 kilos was also seized on the same night, he said, adding that it was to be exploded.

China urges US to cut its farm subsidies

GENEVA, 12 June — The Chinese Ambassador to the World Trade Organization (WTO) Monday urged the United States to substantially cut farm subsidies so as to break the impasse of the Doha Round trade negotiations.

“Whether we can break the deadlock and reach a conclusion before the end of the year depends very much on the outcome of the agriculture negotiations, particularly on the reduction of agricultural subsidies,” said Sun Zhenyu.

“China urges the United States ... to play a leading role and make a new and meaningful offer to substantially reduce its domestic support in agriculture to break the ice,” Sun told a WTO meeting reviewing the US trade policies.

Sun said only through joint efforts of all WTO members can a successful conclusion of the Doha Round be achieved.

But he stressed that the United States and other major developed members of the WTO must exercise due leadership and give a strong push to the negotiations.

Vietnam wages all-out war against drugs

HANOI, 12 June — Vietnam has declared a nationwide campaign against drugs, mobilizing all forces including police, Customs, border guards and marine police, the local daily *Vietnam News* reported here Tuesday.

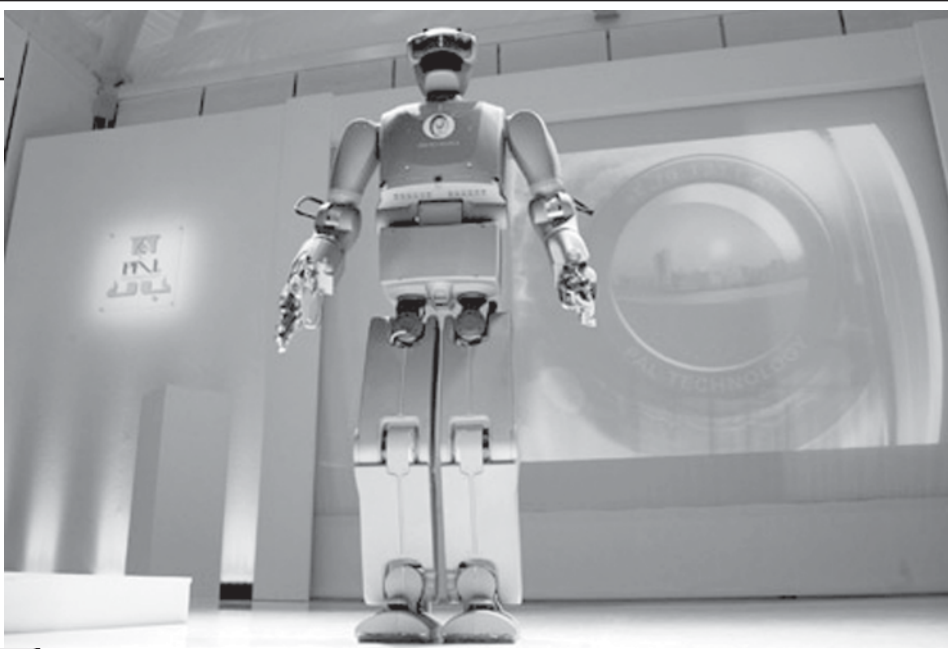
The campaign, lasting three months till the end of August, is aimed at bringing a great positive change in drug prevention and control, Vietnamese Prime Minister Nguyen Tan Dung was quoted as saying.

Forces will be tasked with eliminating all places selling drugs, arresting drug dealers and gaining complete control over the drug business.

In the first five months this year, 1,076 drug cases were handled in Vietnam, an increase of 161 cases over the same period last year. Police sent 1,120 drug addicts to rehabilitation centres, an increase of about 10 per cent.

Fire at Bangkok condo kills family of three

BANGKOK, 12 June — A fire broke out at a condominium building in downtown Bangkok early Tuesday morning, killing a family of three, local media reported.

The fire broke out at 4:45 am Tuesday (2145 GMT, Monday) on the 24th floors of the 31-storeyed Si Phraya River View Condominium building on Charoenkrung Road in Sampantawong District, Bangkok, according to *The Nation news* website.

Fire-fighters spent about 40 minutes to extinguish the blaze. Police found two bodies in the apartment where the fire started. —Xinhua

Most Israeli ministers support Gaza military operation

JERUSALEM, 12 June — A majority of Israeli ministers on Tuesday voiced their support for launching a military operation in the Gaza Strip, while some others expressed their readiness to accept a serious truce with Palestinian militant groups.

“Israel must launch a

large-scale operation in Gaza against Hamas and the rest of the terror organizations,” Housing and Construction Minister Zeev Boim was quoted by local daily *Yedioth Ahronoth* as saying at the weekly Cabinet meeting.

He added that “a truce would only serve Hamas’ interests” and Israel cannot risk letting the militant group rearm itself “before the next round”.

“We must act; The question is in what way,” Industry, Trade, and Labour Minister Eli Yishai told the Cabinet, stressing that the Jewish state cannot accept a “virtual” calm that does not include the release of kidnapped soldier Gilad Shalit.

“But if there will be a serious ceasefire, then there’s room to talk,” he added.

WB says developing world growth to slow

WASHINGTON, 12 June—Global credit turmoil, an economic slowdown in industrial countries and accelerating inflation are set to curb the rapid pace of growth in developing economies this year, the World Bank said on Tuesday.

The economic cooling may be welcome relief to countries where economic overheating had become a major concern, the bank said in its annual review of global financial conditions in the developing world.

Still, the World Bank said the outlook was uncertain and global economic conditions could worsen if the financial turmoil and slowdown, brought on by problems in the US housing market, becomes more severe and prolonged.

The Bank's Global Development Finance report said the deceleration in growth in developing countries would be across most regions, with the largest declines in East Asia and

the Pacific, and Latin America.

The slowdown in East Asia will mostly be in China where growth is expected to fall by 2.5 percentage points to 9.2 per cent in 2009, and 9.0 per cent in 2010.

In contrast, growth in Sub-Saharan Africa is likely to pick up in 2008, reaching 6.5 per cent — the highest rate in 38 years — then fall to 5.9 per cent by 2010, which is still above the average over the past five years.

Brazil's Petrobras to explore shale oil in US

RIO DE JANEIRO, 12 June—Brazil's state-owned oil and gas firm Petrobras announced Monday that it had signed an agreement with the US Oil Shale Exploration Company (Osec) and Japanese investment and trading company Mitsui to explore shale oil in the United States.

Petrobras will conduct technical, economical and environmental studies on the commercial feasibility of the exploration of the mineral resources controlled by Osec in the state of Utah. The area to be explored in the project will include a leased property and a total of 22,000 acres

in the Green River Basin in Utah recently purchased by Osec.

The studies will also serve to test Petrobras' oil shale technology, called Petrosix. The Petrosix oil shale processing technology developed by Petrobras has been tested successfully for more than

30 years in a project in the municipality of Sao Mateus do Sul, Parana State, said the Brazilian firm.

The Japanese Mitsui company will provide advice concerning project management and promotion.

Vietnam's private sector employment grows fastest

HANOI, 12 June — Vietnam has been ranked No. 1 in the world in private sector employment growth, with a 14-per-cent increase, *Vietnam News* cited a survey by accounting consultancy Grant Thornton International here Wednesday.

The group's international business report said global employment in the private sector was up 4 per cent this year, a slight improvement over 2007's rate of 3 per cent.

Ken Atkinson, managing partner of Grant Thornton Vietnam, said "since the Enterprise Law was introduced in 2000, there have been over 180,000 new private businesses established, employing more than five million people".

With an economy growing at more than 7 per cent annually and 1.3 million new entrants to the labour market each year, many of these staff are being employed by private businesses.— MNA/Xinhua



IEA trims world oil demand, cuts supply forecast

LONDON, 12 June—World oil demand will rise at its slowest pace in six years during 2008 as a recent raft of subsidy cuts in several Asian countries cuts into oil demand, the International Energy Agency said on Tuesday.

The adviser to 27 industrialized economies said in its monthly Oil Market Report that global oil consumption will now rise by 800,000 barrels per day (bpd) this year, 230,000 bpd less than its previous forecast.

The head of the IEA's oil industry and markets division, Lawrence Eagles, told *Reuters* this year's demand growth will be the slowest since 2002.

Rising oil prices have forced several developing economies in Asia to take the knife to subsidies in recent weeks. India, Indonesia, Malaysia, Sri

Lanka and Taiwan have all revised their administered prices of fuel, which the IEA said would tame oil demand growth in the region slightly.— MNA/Reuters

Ghana sees initial 2010 oil output of 120,000 bpd

ACCRA, 12 June—Ghana's initial oil output from its offshore discoveries, due to start up in the first quarter of 2010, will be 120,000 barrels per day (bpd), double a previous estimate, the state oil company said on Tuesday.

"The initial production will be from 6 producing wells, with each well producing an average of 20,000 barrels per day. This then gives us 120,000 bpd initially under what we are calling the first phase," Moses Oduro Boateng, managing director of the Ghana National Petroleum Corporation (GNPC) told *Reuters*.

In April, GNPC had estimated that the start-up commercial production from the deepwater Tano and West Cape Three Points offshore blocks would be 60,000 bpd.— MNA/Reuters

UNICEF, UNHCR, UNODC, WFP, ILO, UNDP, UNOPS, UNIC, IOM, IFRC, ICRC, WORLD BANK, ADB, UNAIDS, UNESCO, UN Habitat, UNHQ, OCHA, WMO, and MBC and Myanmar Business Coalition on AIDS.

That reflected the attempts the Myanmar government made to cooperate with the UN and international organizations, and to accept international assistance. So, the accusations that the Myanmar government did not accept international assistance were totally groundless.

It is a formidable task for cyclone-hit Myanmar to return to normal.

In the course of the world history, the wars and riots have adverse effects on the human society, shatter the cultural civilization, and destroy development infrastructures and education. Similarly, economic sanctions designed to get the people of the target countries into economic crises, and cuts in humanitarian assistance destroy the social life of the world people.

Throughout the history, the world has seen tens of thousands of wars, more than half of them took place in Europe. World War I and World War II both started in Europe due to the conflicts between the colonialist countries. World War I cost about 10 million people, and World War II, 60 million people. During the world wars, a great number of infrastructures including townships, villages, houses and factories were ravaged. Here, I would like to make a comment.

It is said that man is mortal. Then, why have the world people developed both in quantity and in quality unlimitedly since the beginning of the Earth? The world population has grown to more than 8000 million. When it comes to development, man has passed many stages from the Mud age and Stone age to Electronic age. Due to the ability to apply the intellectual power, man has overcome various natural disasters and wars. In the animate world, man is more intellectual than any other animals. Man has not been able to control the nature yet, but is overcoming the nature gradually. Today, the world has been like a global village. Man has been able to pay growing attention to peace, cooperation and development instead of wars and riots.

Once, about half a dozen of colonialist countries such as Britain, the Dutch, Belgium, Spain, Portugal and America with military superiority enslaved 77 percent of the earth and 75 percent of the global population. Nowadays, those enslaved nations have been free from the colonial rule and are in a position to shape their own future. One hundred and ninety two sovereign nations have been UN members and they can stand tall together with other nations. However, the world still has to see neo-colonialism and hegemonism. The people of the international community still have to face some great powers' interference, pressure, invasion of other nations by violating the UN Charter, addressing the global issues by using their military might and trying to strengthen their power by using the UN as a tool. So, the onus is upon the world's people to deal with natural disasters and ward off neo-colonialism and hegemonism.

While Myanmar, after being hit by cyclone Nargis, is receiving humanitarian aid and health and rehabilitation assistance from the UN, international governments and INGOs, she is also facing fabrications of some internal and external elements resorting to various ways to gain political profits. Now Myanmar and its people need a lot of international assistance. They are very grateful to the international community for their kind help. But it is necessary not to accept the assistance rendered with every intent to gain political benefits.

For example, about a couple of days before the referendum was held for the approval of the draft

constitution on 10 May, a western broadcasting station aired that another storm that was about two times stronger than cyclone Nargis was coming. Regarding this, Myanmar Meteorology and Hydrology Department announced in daily newspapers unauthenticity of the news. The reason they manufactured the fabricated news was that they made a political trick dissuading the people from attending the national referendum and attempting to disrupt the process.

The whole nation apart from the 40 affected townships in Yangon Division and the seven affected townships in Ayeyawady Division cast 'yes' vote for the approval of the draft constitution in the national referendum held on 10 May accounting for 92.4 percent. Nonetheless, regarding the second-session holding of the referendum on 24 May for the 47 storm-hit townships, some western broadcasting stations and their cohorts fabricated news that the Tatmadaw government was trying to prolong their rule rather than helping the troubled people in order to cause misunderstanding with the people. There are also some internal elements who are in complicity with such news agencies. Furthermore, western broadcasting stations broadcast make-up news that the warships of one western country were waiting to help the Myanmar's storm victims but they got no permission from the Tatmadaw government. It is obvious that although Myanmar welcomes help of any country, the goodwill of the big power wanting to help her with the warships was not genuine. It is necessary to be aware of the fact that the donations of western powers imposing economic sanctions on Myanmar, dissuading international monetary organizations from disbursing low-interest loans, cutting humanitarian aid exaggerating the Myanmar issue are indeed with strings attached.

Prime Minister General Thein Sein said in his opening speech in the ASEAN-UN international Pledging Conference held on 25 May that "Donation of relief supplies for the cyclone victims in Myanmar will be accepted through land route, by sea or by air. For the relief supplies coming by sea, I wish to inform that these supplies can be sent by civilian ships to the port of Yangon".

In compliance with this permission, ASEAN countries, neighbouring nations, the international community and UN rendering their assistance and making cooperation for the storm victims. There should be no attempt to break the rule of host country. This is the international code of ethics and mutual respect.

Recently, some western news agencies broadcast slanderous news that shortly after the cyclone, the Tatmadaw government announced the death toll of over 20,000 but after two weeks, it announced more than 70,000 deaths and that its relief and rescue work was so slow that there were more deaths of the victims.

In reality, the death toll collected shortly after the storm could not be complete as there were transport cuts due to the storm. The death toll increased later as transport links returned to normal. In China also, there was only low death toll soon after the quake but it increased later. It is clear that knowing the actual fact, western powers are playing a political game criticizing the Myanmar government alone without putting any blame on the Chinese government.

If we say about the west-influenced news broadcasting stations, it seems it is endless. Therefore, now is the time when Myanmar national people are to guard against any danger while serving their own interest. So, all the people are to strive for national development in the democracy transition and in the post-period of the storm (natural disaster).

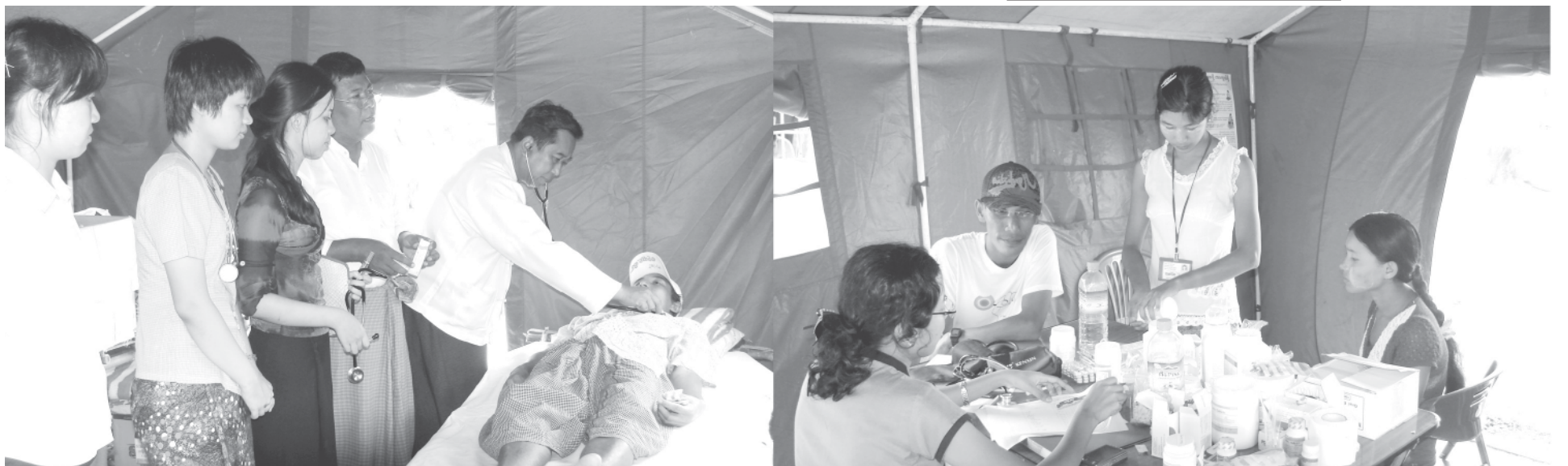

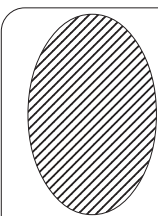

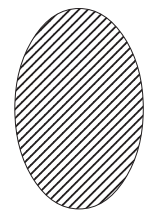

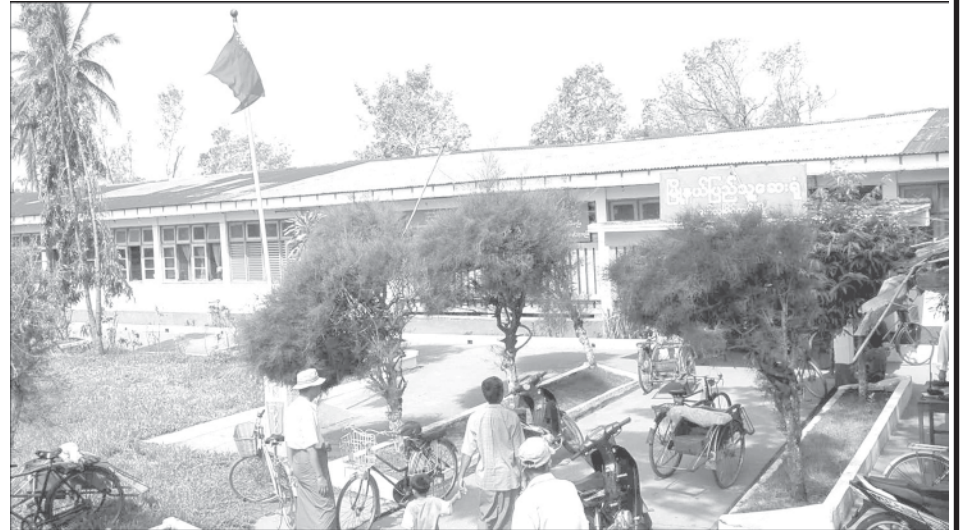

Syria plays down chances of direct talks with Israel

DAMASCUS, 12 June—A senior Syrian official said on Tuesday no direct negotiations will be held with Israel until it recognizes what Damascus regards as requirements for a deal.

Indirect peace talks between Syria and Israel are expected to resume soon in Turkey, which has been mediating between the two sides since last year.

The Damascus Government and Israel have kept secret the details of the talks. Syria seeks full

return of the occupied Golan Heights and Israel has linked a peace agreement to Syria distancing itself from Iran and severing ties with Lebanon's Hizbollah and the Palestinian group Hamas.

Israel occupied the Golan Heights, a water-rich plateau, in the Middle East war four decades ago. It annexed the territory in the 1980s in a move declared null and void by the United Nations Security Council.

"I think it is too early to resume direct talks. There are conditions," Deputy Foreign Minister Fayssal al-Mekdad told reporters.

"I hope Israel responds to the requirements of peace, which are the end of the occupation of Palestine and the establishment of a Palestinian state, restoration of the Syrian Golan and pull out of remaining occupied Lebanese territory," he added.

Guantanamo inmates suffering mental damage

BERLIN, 12 June—Over two-thirds of the detainees in the Guantanamo Bay prison are suffering from or at risk of mental problems because they are kept isolated in small cells with little light or fresh air, according to Human Rights Watch.

In a report entitled "Locked Up Alone: Detention Conditions and Mental Health at Guantanamo", the group says 185 of the 270 detainees at the US

military prison for terrorism suspects are housed in facilities similar to "supermax" prisons.

They spend 22 hours alone in cramped cells, have very limited contact with other human beings and are given little more than the Koran to occupy themselves, said the report, which is based on interviews with government officials and attorneys.

Detainees held in this manner include many that have not been charged

with crimes and have already been cleared for release or transfer, according to the report.

"Guantanamo detainees who have not even been charged with a crime are being warehoused in conditions that are in many ways harsher than those reserved for the most dangerous, convicted criminals in the United States," said Jennifer Daskal, senior counterterrorism counsel at Human Rights Watch.

OTTAWA, 12 June—Six people suffered injuries after being exposed to harmful fumes Tuesday at the airport in Canada's capital Ottawa, officials said.

Paramedics were called to the Ottawa Macdonald-Cartier International Airport early in the morning and found six airport employees suffering from mild to moderate respiratory problems as a result of harmful fumes, said an Ottawa paramedic service news release.

Two were treated on the scene and four were sent to hospital. Two of them had later been released from hospital and the other two that remain there are in stable condition.—MNA/Xinhua

About 20 listed as Obama's running mate candidates

WASHINGTON, 12 June — About 20 names have been listed as potential running mates of the Democratic presumptive presidential candidate, Barack Obama, a Senator said on Tuesday. Kent Conrad, a Senator from North Dakota, told reporters that some of those on the list are current senior officials, some others are former lawmakers and others are "former top military leaders".

Conrad made the remarks after he attended a meeting with Obama's three-person vice presidential vetting team in Congress, but he did not disclose any name on the list since the selective procedure is still kept as a secret.

During the "wide-ranging" discussion, Obama's team sought attendees' opinion and comment on every people on the list, including the respect they command and their "standing with their colleagues".

The vice presidential candidate is considered a key role to supplement Obama's lack of political experience, especially those in military and foreign affairs to offset Republican rival John McCain's advantages.

The three-person team was established last week to manage the vetting process, including former first daughter Caroline Kennedy, former deputy attorney general Eric Holder and Jim Johnson, the former CEO of mortgage lender Fannie Mae who has done the same thing for former Democratic presidential nominees John Kerry and Walter Mondale.

Spain faces shortages due to truck drivers strike

MADRID, 12 June—Spaniards are facing fuel and food shortages Tuesday as a result of a nationwide strike by the country's truck drivers to protest against high fuel prices.

Tens of thousands of truck drivers in Spain launched an indefinite strike on Monday, blocking highways that threaten to bring the

country to a standstill.

Wholesale markets in the country began to run out of fruit and vegetables and there was also concern over meat supplies if the strike continued, local media reported Tuesday.

Shelves at Madrid supermarkets were partly empty after consumers reportedly stockpiled food in fear of shortages.

Police were escorting

tanker trucks distributing fuel to petrol stations in the northeastern region of Catalonia, where 40 per cent of petrol stations had run out of fuel, news reports said.

In Madrid, the strike caused traffic chaos, and toll booths were opened to all drivers to ease traffic congestion around the capital.

At least 11 slain in Los Angeles County during weekend

LOS ANGELES, 12 June—At least 11 people were slain in the Los Angeles County during the weekend and many of the slayings were gang-related, police said on Monday. Of the slayings, nine took place in the city of Los Angeles, according to police.

The number of killings is not unprecedented, but it is greater than the county's homicide rate, which is between two and three a day, police said.

Many of the names of the dead were not available from the coroner's office. Only one person has been arrested. In the latest shooting which occurred about 1:40 pm Sunday in Panorama City near downtown Los Angeles, a man on a bicycle asked two men where they were from, then shot them. The victims were taken to a hospital, where one died and the other was in stable condition.— MNA/Xinhua

China HFMD outbreak peaks in May

BEIJING, 12 June—China reported more than 176,000 cases of hand-foot-mouth disease (HFMD) last month, but the outbreak peaked on 14 May, Ministry of Health spokesman Mao Qun'an told reporters here Tuesday.

Daily reported cases

declined from 11,501 at the peak to 3,922 on 5 June, Mao said.

Central Anhui Province, which first reported the outbreak of HFMD, had 10,700 cases in May including four deaths, according to Mao.

The worst-hit provinces and regions were

Guangdong, Zhejiang, Hebei, Shandong and Hunan, he said.

The disease was also found in regions hit by the devastating 12 May earthquake but, earlier this month, Mao told the Press that it had been brought under control.

China post-quake health response "quick, effective"

MANILA, 12 June— The World Health Organization (WHO) on Tuesday praised China's health emergency response as "quick, effective and well organized" in the wake of the fatal earthquake that has killed nearly 70,000 people in the southwestern province of Sichuan.

In a Press release, WHO said the conclusion was made after its representatives visited and inspected health measures in the quake-hit areas in Sichuan. Facilities visited included several hospitals and a temporary settlement in Mianzhu City, a county-level city in Deyang prefecture, as well as the Sichuan Provincial People's Hospital in Chengdu, the capital of the province.

"The effectiveness of the response was especially

commendable considering the number of people affected and the extent of the damage," said Dr Hans Troedsson, WHO's Representative in China.

"In particular, I would underline the high level of dedication and volunteerism evident in the medical professionals we met," Troedsson said.

A second team of WHO experts will visit China from 11 to 23 June to provide a set of recommendations on rebuilding healthcare services, the Press release said.

WHO experts have already provided training to nurses and volunteers who are working with the earthquake survivors in response to the assistance request raised by China's Ministry of Health.

Horses to have single passport in EU next year

BRUSSELS, 12 June— Horses, donkeys and other members of the "equine" family in the European Union (EU) will have a single passport next year.

Under new rules adopted by the European Commission on Monday, all equidae will now have to acquire their individual passports within six months after their birth.

At the same time, when the passport is issued, the animal will be tagged with an electronic chip that would be injected to its neck. The chip will match the passport. The EU's executive arm said the new identification system will help improve the health of horses, donkeys and other members of the "equine" family as the current one was outdated.

"The current system of identifying horses is outdated. It needs to be

adapted to the new identification technologies," EU Health Commissioner Androulla Vassiliou said in a statement.

UN hosts first-ever HIV/TB Global Leaders' Forum

UNITED NATIONS, 12 June — The United Nations hosted on Monday the first-ever HIV/TB Global Leaders' Forum at its New York headquarters with an aim to tackle the tuberculosis (TB) threat.

The forum, held on the eve of a high-level meeting on AIDS, brought together participants such as Peter Piot, executive director of the Joint UN Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS), and Margaret Chan,

director general of the World Health Organization (WHO), to discuss the impact of the TB and HIV epidemics.

"Today, tuberculosis is one of the top 10 leading causes of death globally, causing more than 4,000 deaths every day," UN chief Ban Ki-moon told the meeting. "This is shocking: no one should die of TB, a preventable and curable disease, in this prosperous and technology-rich 21st Century," he said.

TB accounts for an estimated quarter of a million deaths each year among those living with

HIV and is the number one cause of death among people living with HIV in Africa. Recently, WHO, UNAIDS and the UN Children's Fund announced that some three million people are now receiving life-saving anti-retroviral treatment. However, TB, especially drug-resistant forms of the disease, threatens to hinder this progress.

HIV and TB, according to UNAIDS, are so closely connected that they are often referred to as co-epidemics or dual epidemics that drive and reinforce one another.

US unveils world's fastest supercomputer

WASHINGTON, 12 June — The US Department of Energy (DoE) announced Monday that its new supercomputer "Roadrunner" had successfully performed 1,000 trillion calculations per second — the fastest in the world.

Roadrunner will be used by the DoE's National Nuclear Security Administration (NNSA) to perform calculations that vastly improve the ability to certify that the US nuclear weapons stockpile is reliable without conducting underground nuclear tests, according to a statement released by DoE.

Roadrunner will be housed at NNSA's Los Alamos National Laboratory in New Mexico.

The laboratory worked with manufacturer IBM for six years to develop the super machine, which can meet "the nation's evolving national security needs".

The 100-million-dollar machine has redefined the frontier of supercomputing by crossing the one petaflop threshold. A "flop" is an acronym meaning floating-point operations per second. One petaflop is 1,000 trillion operations per second.

Jordan unearths world's oldest Christian church

AMMAN, 12 June — Jordan has discovered a cave underneath the Saint Georgeous Church in Rihab, Mafraq, in northern Jordan, which is described as the oldest Christian church, local daily

Jordan Times reported on Monday.

"We have uncovered what we believe to be the first church in the world, dating from AD 33 to AD 70," said Archaeologist Abdul Qader Hussan, head of the Rihab Centre for Archaeological Studies.

The discovery was "amazing", said the scholar, adding that "We have evidence to believe this church sheltered the early Christians: the 70 disciples of Jesus Christ".

The early Christians, described in the mosaic inscription on St Georgeous floor as "the 70 beloved by God and Divine", are said to flee from Jerusalem during the persecution of Christians to the northern part of Jordan, particularly to Rihab, he added. — MNA/Xinhua

Scolari says 3-1 victory over Czechs to physical training

GENEVA, 12 June — Portugal coach Luiz Felipe Scolari said high praise of the team's physical form after the 3-1 victory over the Czech Republic here on Wednesday sending his side into the Euro 2008 quarterfinals with a match left in Group A.

"The team played with fantastic physical vigour," said the Brazilian, who led Brazil to win the World Cup in 2002 before taking charge of the Portugal side in 2003 and guiding them to the final of Euro 2004 and semifinals of the World Cup in 2006.

"When I have 15 to 18 days to work more like a club coach you can see the results," he continued. Manchester United striker Cristiano Ronaldo best carried out Scolari's tactics of extending the coverage of each player to a possible wide range.

The 23-year-old soccer icon was voted the Man of the Match after cracking in the 63-minute goal to put Portugal 2-1 in ahead and assisted the stoppage goal by substitute Ricardo Quaresma. —MNA/Xinhua

Czechs, Turkey could face shootout group decider

VIENNA, 12 June — Czech Republic and Turkey will have a penalty shootout to decide who advances to the Euro 2008 quarter-finals if they draw their final Group A game in Geneva on Sunday. It would be the first time a shootout will have been used to decide a group game in a major tournament.

The new system is making its debut at this tournament and the odds of it needing to be used in the opening group were extremely long beforehand.

Both teams played positively early in the match when the rain began poured down 10 minutes into the match and water quickly settled on the pitch.

At the 32nd minute, Switzerland scored and the rain could claim an assist. Derdiyok chased a long ball into the right channel, rounded Volkan Demirel and squared. Unexpectedly, the ball held up right in the goalmouth and the grateful Yakin reacted first to tap in.

A couple of minutes later he could have had another but this time he misjudged Valon Behrami's cross.

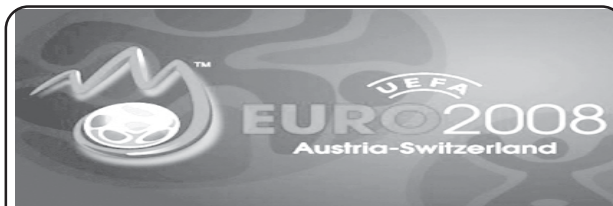

Croatia shocks Germany 2-1

KLAGENFURT (Austria), 12 June — Croatia stunned Germany 2-1 Thursday and took control of Group B at the European Championship by getting goals in each half from Darijo Srna and Ivica Olic.

Croatia took the lead in the 24th minute after Danijel Pranjić swapped passes with Ivan Rakitić and then sent a cross over for Srna, who slid alongside Germany defender Marcell Jansen and scored past goalkeeper Jens Lehmann.

Olic made it 2-0 in the 63rd after a shot from Rakitić on the right flank was deflected by Germany forward Lukas Podolski and bounced off the post right at Olic's feet. Podolski scored his third goal of the tournament in the 79th by sending a volley after a headed down ball from captain Michael Ballack hit a defender.

Germany was reduced to 10 men in injury time when Bastian Schweinsteiger was given a red card for pushing Croatia substitute Jerko Leko to the ground.

Croatia now has six points and could advance early, depending on the outcome of the later game between Austria and Poland. Germany still has three points.

Six minutes after Croatia's first goal, midfielder Niko Kranjčar could have made it 2-0 but he blasted his shot over the crossbar from inside the box.

Ballack hit a long-range free kick to force a save from goalkeeper Stipe Pletikosa in the 33rd — Germany's first shot at the goal — and central defender Christoph Metzelder headed over the net after a German corner from Torsten Frings.

Lehman made a 42nd-minute save from Kranjčar's left-footed volley on a cross from Luka Modrić. But Lehmann fumbled a long-range effort by Modrić early in the second half that nearly trickled inside the post.

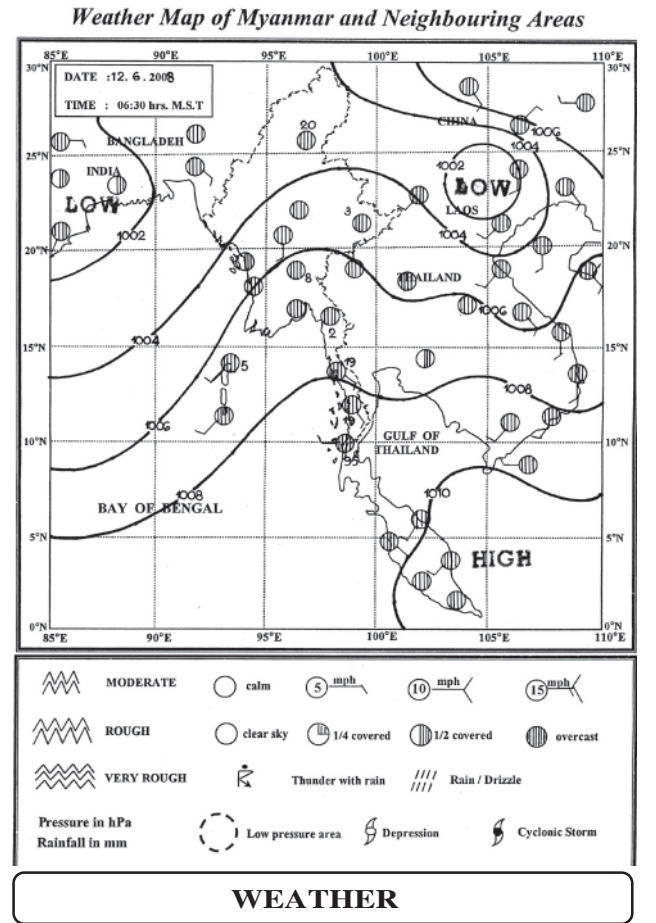
