Strive for exceeding target of crop output

The government is building dams and reservoirs throughout the nation. Meanwhile, it is building more lakes and embankments while implementing river water pumping and underground water tapping projects. As a result, the entire nation is now enjoying an adequate supply of irrigation and drinking water.

Khabaung Diversion Weir was constructed with the aim of irrigating farmlands nearby. Situated near Shwelaung Village, Ottwin Township, Bago Division, the diversion wire was opened on 28 June.

The diversion weir, which is the 46th of its kind in Bago Division, will be able to benefit 100,000 acres of farmland in Toungoo and Ottwin Townships. Nowadays, three million acres have been put under monsoon paddy, thereby contributing to meeting the target of cultivating 400,000 acres of summer paddy.

With the emergence of 212 dams and reservoirs including Khabaung Diversion Weir, farmers are now able to engage in extended cultivation of monsoon and summer paddy as well as in double and mixed cropping.

The increase in the irrigated areas has resulted in the boost in the yield of crops. Of the net sown acreage of over 28 million in the nation, the irrigated acreage is over 5 million.

The agriculture sector has been able to produce over 1,500 million baskets of paddy making better use of irrigation water.

Recently, some farmlands in Ayeyawady and Yangon Divisions were damaged in the storm. Farmers in the storm-hit regions are to strive for boosting production and ensuring food security making the most of land and water resources.

At a time when more irrigation projects are being implemented across the nation farmers are to try their utmost for boosting production of monsoon and summer paddy as well as edible oil crops. Only then, will they be able to exceed the target of crop production.

Permanent houses for storm victims being built

YANGON, 30 June —Under the arrangement of the government, permanent houses measuring 16 feet x 20 feet are being built for homeless storm-victims in Yangon and Ayeyawady Divisions.

The houses with CI sheet-roofing will be built of wood. The government is also making arrangements for the victims to resume their business.

Htoo Trading Co will build 116 houses in Kyeinchaunggyi Village in Bogale Township, Ngwe Hsin Co 108 houses in Sethsan Village in the same township, CB Bank 124 houses in Kadonkani Village in Pyapon Township, Eden Group Co 130 houses in Kyonda and Toe Villages in Dedaye Township, Royal Family Co 80 houses in Zinye Village in Labutta Township. The companies have already started building houses. Kanbawza Group Co will also build 1,000 houses in Labutta Township.

Moreover, the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry (UMFCCI) will build 200 houses, Myanmar Bank Association 200 houses, FMI, Shwethanlwin and AryonOo Co 616 houses, Yuzana Co 385 houses, Asia World Co 356 houses, Zay Kaba Co and Max Myanmar 200 houses each, Tet Lan Construction 130 houses, Golden Flower 100 houses, Original Group 90 houses, Royal Family Co 320 houses and Aung Chantha Co 50 houses. Other companies are also joining in the project.—MNA

Blast destroys militant compound in Pakistan

KARACHI, 30 June—A resident says a powerful explosion has destroyed a militant compound in northwestern Pakistan’s tribal region, killing eight people.

The cause of the explosion early Monday in Bar Qambarkhel village is unclear. A militant spokesman claims it was a missile strike launched from neighboring Afghanistan.

It comes three days after Pakistani paramilitary forces launched a major offensive against pro-Taliban militants in Khyber.

Resident Nawaz Khan Afridi says he was woken by a loud explosion and joined dozens of villagers in rescuing survivors. He says he saw eight bodies.

Militant spokesman Munsif Khan claims it was a missile strike which had killed at least six supporters of the Vice and Virtue Movement and wounded 20.

Six killed as two helicopters crash in Arizona

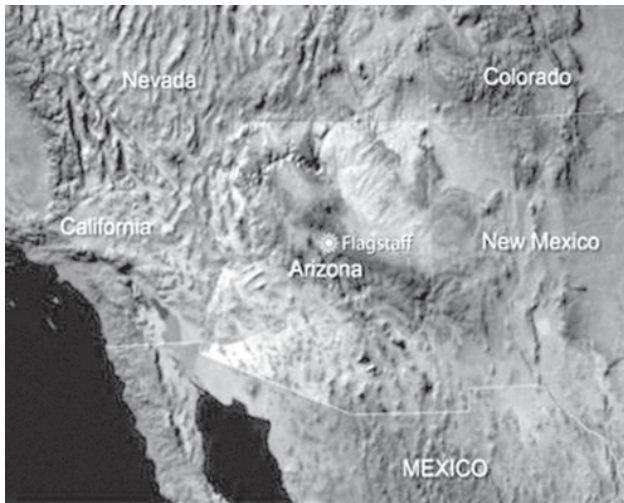
WASHINGTON, 30 June—Six people were killed and one was seriously injured on Sunday when two medical helicopters collided on their way to a hospital in Flagstaff, Arizona, air officials said.

The helicopters crashed near Flagstaff at about 3.45 pm PDT (6:45 pm EDT), said Ian Gregor, a spokesman with the Federal Aviation Administration in Los Angeles.

Preliminary reports indicated at least one patient was among the three people killed in a helicopter operated by Air Methods Corp, Gregor said. The other four fatalities, as well as the injury, occurred aboard a helicopter operated by Classic Helicopter of Utah, he added.

Nobody on the ground was killed, Gregor said.

A spokesman with the Flagstaff Police Dept said the crash caused a brushfire of about 10 to 15 acres, which was quickly contained.—*Internet*

Philippine landslide kills four, injures 26

MANILA, 30 June—Officials say heavy rains have triggered a landslide that killed at least four people and injured 26 others in the central Philippines.

Estrellita Escanan, the Office of Civil Defense’s provincial coordinator, says a woman and her 1-year-old daughter were among those killed when the houses of six families were buried late Sunday in mountainous Samboan township, in Cebu province. Two young boys died in a nearby house. Many of the people were sleeping when the earth crashed down.

Escanan said Monday it had been raining heavily and villagers reported a squall that whipped up winds in the area before the landslide.—*Internet*

West Nile virus hits Colorado, first cases confirmed

BOSTON, 30 June —The West Nile Virus has hit the state of Colorado. This comes as the first West Nile Virus cases of the season have been confirmed in the state.

The Colorado State Department of Public Health has confirmed that there have been 2 cases reported thus far.

One of the cases is from Boulder county, while the other is from Logan county.

The two patients who have been hit by the West Nile Virus are said to be recovering.

This is the first time this summer that there have been any reported human cases within the state.

They continue to try to gauge to see how severe it will be throughout the summer months.—*Internet*

Daewoo shipbuilding wins \$2.3 bln in orders in June

SEOUL, 30 June—Daewoo Shipbuilding and Marine Engineering Co, the world’s third-largest shipyard, said Sunday that it won orders to build 12 ships worth of 2.3 billion US dollars this month, Yonhap reported..

The company said in the statement that nine very large oil tankers, one drill ship and two bulk carriers are to be built. However, the shipbuilder did not provide comparable figures from previous years.

In the first six months of this year, Daewoo Shipbuilding and Marine Engineering has won orders valued at 7.56 billion dollars to build 43 ships, which accounts for 43.2 percent of its yearly target of 17.5 billion dollars worth of orders.—*Internet*

Afghan civilian deaths rise sharply in 2008

KABUL, 30 June — Civilian deaths in Afghanistan have risen sharply in the past year, largely due to more Taliban attacks and roadside bombings, UN officials said Sunday.

Afghan civilian deaths jumped from 430 in the first six months of 2007

to 698 so far this year, an increase of 60 percent, said John Holmes, the United Nations under-secretary-general for humanitarian affairs.

Taliban insurgents forces have shifted from direct attacks on international troops toward the use of “civilianblind” measures such as road-side bombings and suicide attacks, said Aleem Siddique, a spokesman for the UN Assistance Mission in Afghanistan.

About 60 percent of civilian deaths in 2008 are blamed on antigovernment forces, up from less than half in 2007.

A total of 565 aid convoys came under attack in 2007, with hundreds of tons of food hijacked.

As recently as Sunday, a convoy of 100 tons of food aid came under attack outside Kandahar, with several trucks burned and looted, he said.

Fish fade away, crabs take over

NARRAGANSETT BAY, 30 June—Global warming has caused dramatic shifts in some aquatic communities in which fish populations die off and lobsters, crabs and squid move in.

The finding comes from a new analysis of 50 years worth of fish-trawling data collected in Narragansett Bay and adjacent Rhode

Island Sound but may apply elsewhere, researchers said.

Resident fish communities have progressively shifted from vertebrate species (fish) to the invertebrates (lobsters and crabs); from bottom-feeders to species that find their food higher up in the water column; and from larger, cool-water species

to smaller, warm-water dwellers.

“This is a pretty dramatic change, and it’s a pattern that is being seen in other ecosystems ... but we’re in the relatively unique position of being able to document it,” said Jeremy Collie of the University of Rhode Island, leader of the new study.—*Internet*

Palestinian factions argue about ceasefire

GAZA, 30 June — Palestinian factions on Saturday argued that they have the right to respond to Israeli violations of an Egyptian-brokered ceasefire which took hold in the Gaza Strip since 19 June. The argument intensified after Hamas, which controls the Gaza Strip, criticized two other groups for firing rockets into Israel despite the

calmness.

A small armed group the Islamic Jihad and al-Aqsa Martyrs Brigades, the armed wing of Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas' Fatah movement, fired the rockets in three occasions over the past days to retaliate for an Israeli military action in the West Bank though the latter territory is out of the ceasefire deal.

Khaled al-Batsh, a senior Islamic Jihad leader, said "the Israeli occupation violates the

lull on daily basis" and so his movement "preserves the right to retaliate for all Israeli crimes regardless where they take place".

Moreover, al-Batsh said his movement "calls on everyone to fight against the occupation." Referring to Hamas demands that the factions should consult before responding to the violation, al-Batsh said there were Israeli violations "require immediate retaliation without coordinating the responses with Hamas". — *Xinhua*

Abducted foreign aid workers released

MOGADISHU, 30 June — Two foreign aid workers and a Somali national abducted by Islamist insurgents were released hours after their abduction following the intervention of local elders, senior official confirmed to *Xinhua* on Saturday.

Maollin Isaq Nur Isaq, mayor of Wajid town in Bakool region where the aid workers were released, told *Xinhua* that the three men kidnapped early Saturday by insurgents who seized control of the provincial capital of Bakool, were released.

"Elders contacted the leaders of the Islamic Courts Union and secured their release," Isaq told *Xinhua* by phone from Wajid, 90 kilometres northwest of Baidoa, the seat of the Somali transitional Parliament.

Cargo ship capsizes off E China coast killing five, five missing

SHANGHAI, 30 June — A Chinese cargo ship capsized off the country's east coast on Saturday morning, killing five and leaving five others missing, the local authority said.

The ship *Haoping*, with 14 sailors and 4,000 tons of refined iron ore on

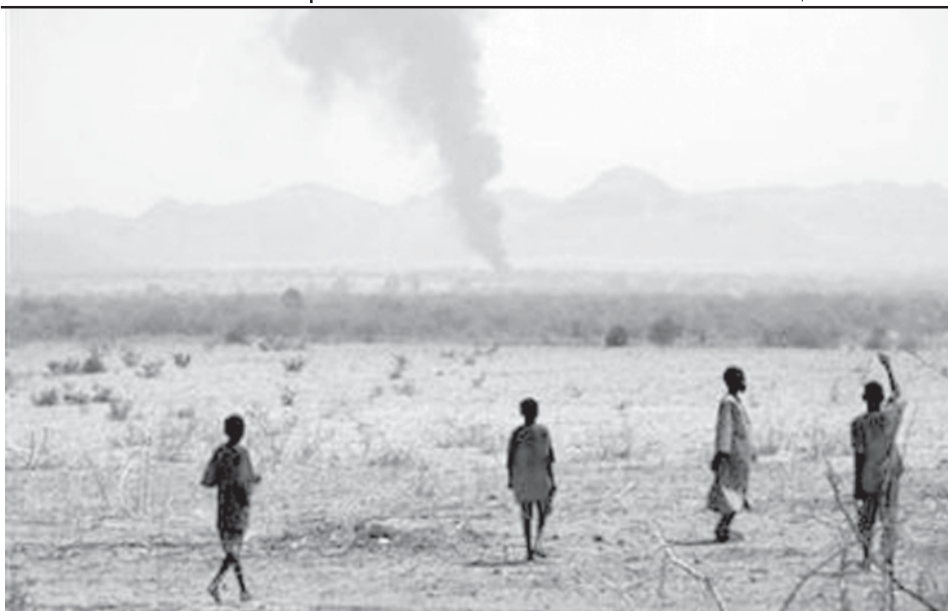
board, overturned at 3:27 am in the southern Yellow Sea.

Ships and a helicopter were sent to the area where rescuers saved four and found five bodies of crew members. The search for others continued.

Greek passenger ship runs aground in Aegean Sea

ATHENS, 30 June — A Greek Passenger ship *Theofilos*, en route from Mytilene to Chios in east Aegean sea, ran aground off the island of Oinousses Saturday.

According to Greek TV, the ship was carrying 475 passengers and has suffered a crack on its left side, after hitting an unmapped reef.

The Ministries of Mercantile Marine said the ship was slightly damaged but was able to continue to Oinousses, which is around two kilometres away

Promptly responding to the emergency, the rescue teams consisting of two *Super Puma* helicopters and three warships to rush to the site, and a *C-130* aircraft is on standby. — *Xinhua*

British airports "vulnerable" to attack

LONDON, 30 June — British airports are vulnerable one year after the attack on Glasgow Airport, warned a terrorism expert.

Security consultant Chris Yates said many of the changes put in place at Glasgow, northern Britain, after a jeep was driven into Glasgow's main terminal building and set on fire on 30 June, had been copied at other airports around the world, the British Broadcasting Corporation (BBC) reported on Friday.

Although some "weak points" in airport security have been addressed, others have remained.

Coalition chopper makes hard landing in E Afghanistan

KABUL, 30 June — A helicopter belonging to the US-led Coalition forces made a hard landing in the eastern Afghan province of Paktya on Saturday, said a Coalition statement.

The helicopter made hard landing due to mechanical issues leading to no casualties, said the statement.

There were no reports of enemy fire and the helicopter has been secured, it added.

A total of 70,000 multi-national troops are deployed across Afghanistan under the flags of the NATO-led ISAF and the US-led Coalition forces respectively for maintaining stability and helping in reconstruction of the country.

Obama criticizes McCain on immigration

WASHINGTON, 30 June—Democrat Barack Obama and Republican John McCain courted Hispanic support on Saturday, and Obama accused his White House rival of backing away from comprehensive US immigration reform under pressure from his party. In separate appearances before a group of Latino public officials, the two presidential contenders portrayed themselves as dedicated champions for Hispanics—a fast-growing and critical swing voting

bloc in November's election.

Obama took aim at McCain's approach to comprehensive immigration reform and his change of emphasis on legislation to offer a pathway to citizenship for the country's 12 million illegal immigrants.

McCain, an Arizona senator, broke with his party and worked for the plan, which ultimately failed in Congress amid heavy Republican opposition.

But he shifted his approach during the fight

for the party's presidential nomination to emphasize the need to secure US borders before addressing the status of illegal immigrants.

"One place where Senator McCain used to offer change was on immigration. He was a champion of comprehensive reform, and I admired him for it," Obama, an Illinois senator who supported the proposal, told the National Association of Latino Elected and Appointed Officials.—MNA/Reuters

NZ migrants concern about growing safety fears

WELLINGTON, 30 June—The head of the New Zealand Federation of Ethnic Councils said here on Saturday that fears about personal safety were growing among members of ethnic and migrant communities in New Zealand, Radio New Zealand reported.

Federation president

Pancha Narayanan said new multicultural legislation could have prevented members of ethnic communities being the targets of recent violent crime and would have prompted better handling of the incidents.

He was referring to the killings of a liquor store owner, a pensioner and a

woman in South Auckland earlier this month. All were Asian, including two Chinese origin women.

He told the federation's annual general meeting in Wellington on Saturday that he knew there was racism when he came to New Zealand in 1986, but he felt safe then.

UN urges for common solutions to guide AU development

SHARMEL-SHEIKH, (Egypt), 30 June — African countries should make use of common solutions and regional and international cooperation to guide and drive national actions for development, a top UN official said here on Friday.

Abdulie Janneh, UN Under-Secretary General and Executive Secretary of the UN Economic Commission for Africa, made the remarks when addressing the opening ceremony of the foreign ministerial meeting of the African Union (AU) Executive Council in the Egyptian Red Sea resort Sharm el-Sheikh.

He said the best way to spur Africa's wide-ranging and complex development is unity of purpose, policy coherence

and effective use of limited resources to build more stable, integrated, competitive and diversified economies.

Tripoli is dominated by Lebanon's anti-Syrian, Sunni-led majority coalition. The Allawites, whose faith is an offshoot of Shiite Islam, have close ties to Syria and the Lebanese opposition, which is led by

the Shiite Hizbollah group.

A Qatari-mediated accord in May ended 18 months of political conflict between the governing coalition and the opposition.

The standoff led to a violent showdown that threatened a new civil war. Since then there have been frequent minor security incidents.—MNA/Reuters

32 militants killed in S Afghanistan

KABUL, 30 June—Afghan National Security Forces (ANSF) and the US-led Coalition forces in two separate operations have killed 32 insurgents in southern Afghan province of Uruzgan, said a Coalition statement released here on Saturday.

The first engagement occurred when the combined forces was on a security patrol in the Khas Uruzagan district and received fire from insurgents in a heavily vegetated area, the statement said. The ANSF and Coalition soldiers returned

fire and moved to an area from which they could direct air strikes, killing three militants, it added.

However, the militants came again soon later attacking the patrol using small arms and ANSF and Coalition forces defeated the attack, killing 29 insurgents, the statement said. During this engagement, insurgents attempted to disguise themselves in women's clothing in order to escape, it noted.

“Well, my dear, we are a couple who had been married since we were young. When we started to lead a married life, we had no paddy fields or cattle. Ko Aye Pe earned his living as a farm labourer his whole life. When the storm started to take place, I did not think it was a storm. I thought it were just a strong wind and a low tide. Our hut was situated in a lower ground. Then, the storm got stronger and stronger. The sound of the storm was like a long siren to my ear.

“Daughter, my husband was paralyzed from the waist down the year before last year because he had been under excessive load of poverty since his youth. He had poor eyesight, too. The midwife in our village said that he had cataracts in both of his eyes. Our hut was washed away in the very first strong blow. He was thrown off the bamboo bedstead, and said, ‘What happened to us, Ma Mya May?’, and tried to sit up. Both of us got completely wet. At that time, the tidal wave was as high as my thigh. I was over 70. I thought I got stronger than. I held him on my back and carried him to the public rest-house on a higher ground.

“Daughter, I got very frightened, depressed and tired. My husband was too weak to talk. The hill was the site of our village’s

cemetery. When we got on the public rest-house, his whole body was icy cold. So, I gave him a massage on his whole body, especially on the centre of the soles of his feet the whole night. He was shivering, so I tried to keep him warm. The sole of the foot is the centre of nerves, isn’t it? I had been reciting the verses of the Supreme Attributes of the Three Gems and saying prayers for his recovering from the illness the whole night. The following morning, I plucked the sprouts of nearby watercress and *kanaphawt* and chewed them, and then I put the paste into his mouth to put him right.

“I even didn’t take a wink. If I fell asleep, or if I wasn’t resilient enough, that would cost my husband’s life. We had earned our living together since our marriage. We had a son, but he died of snakebite. Our family had only two members—he and me. So, I had to take care of him. You know, there is a saying that goes ‘Treat son as master, and husband as God’. My concept was that if we could not survive, I wanted to be the one who would die first. I wanted to see him survive as a result of my treatment to him. I was desperate to continue to treat and take care of him. I tended cattle. I also plucked fruit and vegetables and sold them. The medical team put him on a drip, and now, as you see he is able to speak well.

“I’m very encouraged to see him recover from his illness. I don’t think I would be that happy even if I won the highest lottery prize.”

“You mean my husband? He went out to sea to catch fish at that time. But, the fishing net was not ours, we hired it. What happened to us when the storm started? We lived by the sea. Our business was catching fish. At first, I thought it was just a heavy rain and high tide. My daughter was at the age of more than one year at that time. We caught fish as our business throughout the whole life. I know how to swim and set fishing nets. I did not accompany my husband because our child was still young. I don’t know whether he was dead or not. We haven’t got informed about him up to now. That night, the tide was in roughly. When our little house shook, I picked up my daughter from the cradle. My daughter and I were carried by the tidal waves. I waded, holding up my daughter over my head in case my daughter would drown. When I found a mangrove, I made a great effort to get to that tree. My daughter and I were close to drowning. When we reached the tree, I held the tree tight with one of my hands and climbed it up. I got many scrapes on my body. When we got in the fork of the tree, I noticed that my daughter’s face had turned dull blue because she got some water in her lungs.

So, I put her on my shoulder prostrate and pressed her back gently several times. By good fortune, the blouse I wore at that time was a flannel one. I took it off and wrapped my daughter with it. The wind and the rain were striking my back as though I were beaten with a whip. I had to show resilience the whole night and the whole morning. In the meantime, I was breastfeeding her. I took great care in case I didn’t drop her.

“I had to try my best for my daughter’s survival. I might die, but it didn’t matter. What was the most important was that my daughter was not injured and she continued to survive. My daughter is my whole life. The injuries in my back were not serious at all if compared with the case for her survival. I dared to make sacrifice my life if necessary.”

“Hi, friend, come on and take a seat. I’m getting better. The doctor said that my leg will turn to normal. I can translate your look at me. Now, my mind is still in normal conditions, Khin Lay. I have a word with you when we are alone. When I witnessed my husband’s tragic end, I felt as though I were deranged. I wished to sacrifice my life if that would save the lives of my family members. As you know, I am a teacher and my husband and I lived in different townships. During summer vacation, I was helping him with his work at the factory. We did not go back home. At the night the storm took place, there was no one but our family members in the factory. I heard a lot of noise because the storm was blowing the corrugated iron sheets off the roof and downing the trees outside the factory. I suggested Ko Kyaw Maung that we go back home. He was worried about the factory, and said that there was no difference between staying at home and staying in the factory. I heard the snap of the factory’s roof,

but I did not think the roof would collapse to the ground. As soon as I heard the sound of the roof dropping to the ground, I rushed to my two daughters and covered them. Then, one of my legs was under the cross beams. Ko Kyaw Maung and my younger brother faced grave danger. I had to harden my heart and hug my elder daughter. She was shivering out of fear. My younger daughter was brave. I explained the situations to her. I asked her to run to the village and ask whoever she would meet first for help. I said that the cross beams on her father could be removed to rescue him only when she got help. Khin Lay, my daughter, ran as fast as she could to the village. But, I realized that it was late to rescue my husband. When my daughter arrived back together with some people, she was too tired to speak. I have not received any treatment for my injured legs. But, I am pleased because I carried out funeral services for my husband and younger brother. Do you think I have no feelings about their deaths? No, my heart is completely filled with sorrows for their deaths. I have to show resilience because I have to take care of the future of my two daughters. What I will do all must be for them, not for me. (This article is written in honour of Myanmar Women’s Day.)

WB, Togo launch infrastructure rehabilitation project

LOME, 30 June—The Togolese Government and the World Bank have launched a long delayed project with the aim of rehabilitating and promoting the maintenance of basic infrastructure in the Togolese capital Lome, according to official sources.

Dubbed as Project for

the Rehabilitation and Maintenance of Infrastructure in Lome, the main objective of the World Bank-funded project is to help the Togolese Government improve in the areas such as roads and other dilapidated amenities in the capital, the government announced in a statement on Thursday.

Funded through World Bank's specialized Low Income Countries Under Stress mechanism, the project is estimated to cost up to over 600 million FCFA (1.6 million US dollars), according to government sources.

"The project is intended to assist the Togolese Government to improve access to critical urban infrastructure and services through the rapid rehabilitation of roads and enhancement of access to urban transportation," said the World Bank in a statement.

Japan, US, Australia pledge close strategic partnership

KYOTO (Japan), 30 June—Top diplomats of Japan, the United States and Australia undertook Friday to work in close strategic partnership to boost stability and security in the Asia-Pacific Region as well as the world at large.

The decision was unveiled in a joint statement released after Masahiko Komura, Stephen Smith, foreign ministers of Japan, Australia respectively, and US Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice held talks at the third ministerial meeting of the Trilateral Strategic Dialogue Friday, following the conclusion of the G-8 foreign ministers meeting.

During the talks, the three ministers underscored the importance of

promoting trilateral cooperation to ensure peace and prosperity in the Asia-Pacific Region as it is faced with a wide range of challenges, including the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction, terrorism, and natural disasters.

Noting that their cooperation should be forward-looking and responsive to emerging security issues, the three nations vowed to further strengthen trilateral initiatives in various areas, including humanitarian assistance and disaster relief as well as counter-terrorism, security and defense cooperation.

With distinguished performance in response to natural disasters and other humanitarian emer-

gencies, Japan, the United States and Australia highlighted strengthened cooperation on disaster management and emergency response.

Britons face higher bills for Queen Elizabeth

LONDON, 30 June—Another item to add to the list of rising expenses faced by Britons: the royal family.

Queen Elizabeth and her family cost Britain 40 million pounds (nearly 80 million US dollars) in the past fiscal year, about 66 pence per person and a rise of two million pounds, or 5.3 per cent.

Palace officials said a drive to conserve energy at palaces had helped to keep cost rises in check.

The Queen used 7.3 per cent less electricity in 2007-08, helped by the introduction of low-energy light bulbs. Water from a borehole in Buckingham Palace was used to cool the wine cellars and water the gardens. But maintenance, utility bills and travel costs went up in a year in which she made state visits to the United States, Uganda, Belgium, France and the Netherlands, had 440 engagements across Britain and entertained 38,000 guests at garden parties.

British soldier killed in Afghanistan

LONDON, 30 June—A British soldier was killed and two others injured when a vehicle they were travelling in rolled over while on patrol in southern Afghanistan, Britain's Ministry of Defence said on Saturday.

"The vehicle had been part of a patrol, conducting force protection when the incident occurred. The incident was not combat-related," said the MOD in

statement.

The three soldiers, who were from the 13 Air Assault Support Regiment Royal Logistic Corps, were evacuated to NATO's International Security Assistance Force's medical facilities at Camp Bastion.

"Sadly, despite the best efforts of the medical team, one soldier died of his wounds," the MOD statement added. "The

remaining two casualties are receiving treatment for their injuries which are not life threatening."

The death in Helmand Province brings to 109 the number of British troops killed since US-led forces invaded Afghanistan to drive out the Taleban government and al-Qaeda militants after the 11 September, 2001, attacks on the United States.

Japanese Navy warship leaves southern China port

ZHANJIANG (Guangdong), 30 June—After a five-day visit to China, Japan's Maritime Self-Defence Force destroyer *Sazanami* left the southern Guangdong Province port city of Zhanjiang on Saturday morning.

Sazanami, with its 240-member crew, is the first Japanese warship to visit China since World War II.

A farewell ceremony

was held at the port before its departure. "Please send the love and friendship of the Chinese navy and people back to Japan," Lieutenant-General Su Shiliang, commander of the South Sea Fleet, said to Major-General Shinichi Tokumaru of the Japanese Maritime Self-Defence Force.

Su added the reciprocal visits symbolized an important step in the

communication between the China and Japan defence forces. Before heading back to Japan, the destroyer will have a drill with the Chinese Navy in the sea area near Zhanjiang. It will focus on communication and formation.— MNA/Xinhua

Drive with care

Tokyo forum calls for measures, against global warming

TOKYO, 30 June — A forum participated by Parliament members from the Group of Eight (G-8) and other rising countries on Saturday called for tangible measures and prompt steps to check the global warming.

At the opening session, British former Prime Minister Tony Blair said the global warming is a problem challenging the entire humankind, and the phase for realizing the problem has concluded.

He called on leaders around the world to work out countermeasures against it as soon as possible.

While acknowledging the hardness of the problem, Blair said it's time for developing nations to care about prosperity and environment protection at the same time. He emphasized the necessity of developing nuclear energy, energy saving and carbon dioxide solidification technologies, and

the importance of protecting forests.

Japanese Prime Minister Yasuo Fukuda said at the opening the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions could only be achieved with participation of all nations, instead of some of them. He expressed Japan's expectation to propose discussions over a new international framework at the upcoming G-8 summit.

Jordan, Canada sign MoU on nuclear cooperation

AMMAN, 30 June — Jordan and Canada signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) here on Saturday, creating a framework for nuclear collaboration between the two countries, officials said. The MoU was signed by Jordan Nuclear Energy Commission and visiting officials with Atomic Energy of Canada Limited (AECL) and SNC-Lavalin International, one of the world's largest engineering and construction firms.

According to Chairman of Jordan Nuclear Energy Commission Khalid Touqan, the MoU aims to help Jordan assess the feasibility of the intro-

duction of a Canada Deuterium Uranium (CANDU) nuclear power programme in Jordan. It will pave the way for setting up joint ventures and signing a nuclear cooperation agreement between the two countries by the end of 2008.

The MoU includes engineering and economic studies on a possible Enhanced CANDU 6 reactor, along with assessment on infrastructure development, site selection, fuel fabrication facilities, technology transfer, manpower training and the potential use of Jordan's uranium resources in the programme.

Hu urges enhanced efforts to cope with climate change

BEIJING, 30 June — Chinese President Hu Jintao is urging the country to contribute further efforts to the global fight against climate change.

Hu, also general secretary of the Communist Party of China (CPC) Central Committee, made the remarks here on Friday at a group study for the Political Bureau of the CPC Central Committee. The study focused on global climate change and the country's ability to tackle the issue.

"How we cope with climate change is related to the country's economic development and people's practical benefits. It's in line with the country's basic interests," he said.

He stressed, as a developing country, China should stick to the responsibilities and principles listed in the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change and its Kyoto Protocol. He hoped developed countries could step up efforts on emission reduction and provide financial and technical support for developing countries.

Two students carrying dynamite arrested in Bolivia

LIMA, 30 June — Bolivian police on Sunday arrested two students for carrying dynamite in a state where voters were lining up in a key election to choose a governor.

The two students, arrested in Chuquisaca's capital of Sucre, were carrying 27 cartridges of dynamite in their backpacks.

Local authorities have not said if they were involved in the attack on local TV stations Saturday, which left the TV tower without electricity.

The Chuquisaca election has been marked by tension as the state holds great significance in the struggle between Bolivian President Evo Morales and the autonomist opposition. — MNA/Xinhua

Damaged Royal Navy sub returns to Britain

LONDON, 30 June — A Royal Navy nuclear-powered submarine that hit a rock last month in the Red Sea, damaging its sonar equipment, has returned to Britain, the Ministry of Defence said on Saturday.

After hitting a submerged pinnacle after passing through the Suez Canal, HMS Superb underwent repairs at the NATO facility in Souda Bay, Crete, before returning to Devonport naval base in Plymouth, southwest England, under

its own power.

An assessment will now be made before a decision is made on the future of the 272ft long Swiftsure-class attack submarine that was about 80 miles south of Suez when it struck the rock.

No other vessel was involved and an investigation is now being carried out into the incident by the Royal Navy.

It is not the first time a Royal Navy vessel has run aground.

A recent report

described how the nuclear-powered submarine HMS Trafalgar struck the bottom of the sea at more than 14 knots off the Isle of Skye in 2002 after basic navigational errors during a training exercise.

The destroyer HMS Nottingham hit rocks off the Australian coast, also in 2002, smashing open its hull, while two years earlier, the frigate HMS Grafton ran aground after striking rocks off the coast of Norway.

Emergency declared in California as wildfires rage

LOS ANGELES, 30 June — US President George W Bush declared a state of emergency Saturday in California, as the coastal state was grappling with more than 1,000 wildfires.

According to Cheri Patterson, a spokeswoman for the state's fire department, more than 12,000 firefighters have been battling the fires in northern California for more than a week now and the firefighting force has been stretched too thin by

the sheer number of blazes.

She said the situation would become even grimmer as more dry thunderstorms, lightning from which sparked many of the wildfires in California, are expected this weekend. California Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger said Friday in a letter to President Bush that the fires have already burned 265,000 acres (107,325 hectares) of land since they erupted on 20 June. — MNA/Xinhua

Torres ends the pain as Spain win 1-0

VIENNA, 30 June — Spain finally ended their 44-year wait for a trophy when Fernando Torres's exquisite first-half goal gave them a deserved 1-0 victory over Germany in a fast and furious Euro 2008 final on Sunday.

Spain, appearing in their first final since 1984 and seeking only their second trophy following their 1964 Euro success on home soil, were worthy winners as their crisp passing, wonderful technique and defensive discipline left Germany flailing.

Torres's goal after 33 minutes was also fit for a final as he showed all the speed, determination and quality of finish that summed up his team's whole campaign.

"It's a dream come true," he said. "It's our first title (together) and we hope it will be the first of many. We've still got the World Cup to come, we have to be ambitious.

"At last justice has been done because the team that played the best football won the tournament."

Germany, as always, never gave up but their willing running could not bridge the gulf in class and they will have to wait for another shot at a fourth European title.

Final triumph just the start for Spain says Aragonés

VIENNA, 30 June — Spain coach Luis Aragonés said their 1-0 victory over Germany in Sunday's Euro 2008 final was just the beginning for a talented young side which he believed could win the World Cup.

Aragonés, speaking after his last match in charge of the national team, told a news conference: "Lots of people have looked at this Spain as a model of how football should be played." I have often thought that if I could manage this team relatively well then we would be champions, because we have got so many quality players.

"I think this team can continue along this path and win more titles.

Aragonés, who will turn 70 in July and was the oldest coach at Euro 2008, has made it clear he will step down after the tournament.

He is expected to take up a lucrative offer from Turkish club Fenerbahçe to coach the team for the next two seasons.

Success will take time to sink in, say Spain players

VIENNA, 30 June — The enormity of Spain's achievement in breaking a 44-year trophy drought with their stylish 1-0 victory over Germany in Sunday's Euro 2008 final will take some time to sink in according to the players.

"At last we've done it," captain Iker Casillas told reporters. "I'm not sure we're yet conscious of what we've achieved. I've fulfilled one of my dreams and one of the goals I wanted to achieve before I retired from the national team.

"I was overwhelmed when the referee blew the final whistle but now I feel a little calmer. It's a huge feeling of happiness for all Spanish fans. They deserve it because we were all sick and tired of failing at the quarterfinals."

Spain won their only previous title when they beat the Soviet Union 2-1 on home soil in the final of the European Championship in 1964. They reached the final again 20 years later, but lost 2-0 to a far more talented France side.

They went out at the quarterfinal stage at five major tournaments before breaking the jinx with a penalty shootout victory over world champions Italy at Euro 2008. "Winning this tournament is an incredible achievement, there aren't words to describe it," said midfielder Andrés Iniesta.

"We have fought really hard for this but this team has always played well and given a good impression. "We the players, and the fans as well, were so keen to win a title one day and now we've done it. Now we need to try and win more." Fellow midfielder Cesc Fabregas, who was in the team for the final in place of injured striker David Villa, agreed. —MNA/Reuters

Summing up the achievement, Torres said: "This is the most important title after the World Cup." I am going to enjoy this...this victory is good for football.

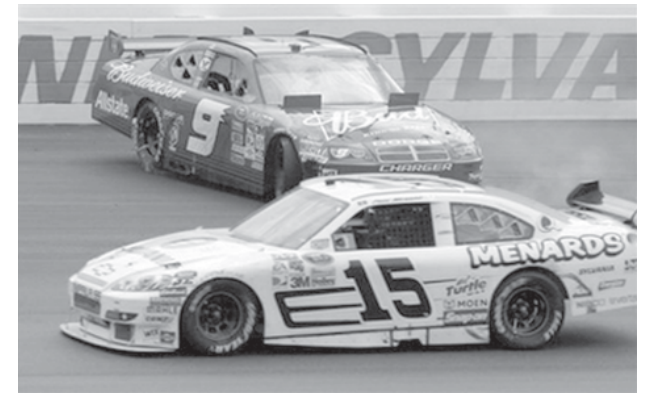
"It is a dream come true. It is our first title and we hope it is the first of many. We have to be am-

Loew satisfied with Germany's tournament

VIENNA, 30 June — Coach Joachim Loew said he was satisfied with Germany's showing at Euro 2008 after they lost the final 1-0 to Spain on Sunday.

Fernando Torres netted in the first half after taking advantage of a mistake by defender Philipp Lahm, who had scored the last-minute winner in their fortunate 3-2 win over Turkey in the semifinals.

"I think we can be satisfied with the tournament as a whole. The team performed very well over the 45 days we've spent together. We had a lot of fun and enjoyed everything, but we were very ambitious," Loew told a news conference.

"We have to acknowledge our defeat and for us it is going to be an incentive to work hard in the next two years. For us, it is a great performance to reach the final, it has been something extraordinary and we are proud of that."

The Germany coach, who will stay in charge for the qualifying campaign for the 2010 World Cup, said Spain fully deserved their first major title in 44 years.

"I think we have to recognize the high quality of the Spanish players," he said.—MNA/Reuters

China hails Ouyang ban as beacon for clean Olympics

BEIJING, 30 June — Chinese officials say a life-time ban on top swimmer Ouyang Kunpeng for a doping offence demonstrates the country's determination to present a clean Beijing Olympics in August.

China's top backstroker tested positive for the anabolic agent clenbuterol last month, dealing the country an embarrassing setback before the August 8-24 Games.

"Ouyang's ban proves nothing but our determination to weed out dope cheats among Chinese athletes," Yuan Hong, head of the Chinese Olympic Committee's anti-doping commission, told the Xinhua news agency.

"No matter how excellent an athlete is, he or she will be severely punished if they test positive. We will continue our zero-tolerance policy in the fight against doping in order to send a clean team to the Olympic Games."

Chinese officials announced Ouyang's ban on Friday. First-time offenders usually receive a two-year ban but Ouyang's tough sentence sent a clear warning to other would-be Chinese offenders.

Chinese swimmers were embroiled in a series of doping scandals in the 1990s and the country's sporting authorities have pledged to crack down on drug cheats before the Beijing Games.

Ouyang is the biggest-name Chinese swimmer to fail a dope test for several years. —MNA/Reuters

Accidental fungus leads to promising cancer drug

WASHINGTON, 30 June—A drug developed using nanotechnology and a fungus that contaminated a lab experiment may be broadly effective against a range of cancers, US researchers reported on Sunday.

The drug, called lodamin, was improved in one of the last experiments overseen by Dr. Judah Folkman, a cancer researcher who died in January. Folkman pioneered the idea of angiogenesis therapy —

starving tumors by preventing them from growing blood supplies.

Lodamin is an angiogenesis inhibitor that Folkman's team has been working to perfect for 20 years. Writing in the journal *Nature Biotechnology*, his colleagues say they developed a formulation that works as a pill, without side-effects.

They have licensed it to SynDevRx, Inc, a privately held Cambridge, Massachusetts biotechnology company that

has recruited several prominent cancer experts to its board.

Tests in mice showed it worked against a range of tumors, including breast cancer, neuroblastoma, ovarian cancer, prostate cancer, brain tumors known as glioblastomas and uterine tumors.

It helped stop so-called primary tumors and also prevented their spread, Ofra Benny of Children's Hospital Boston and Harvard Medical School and colleagues reported.

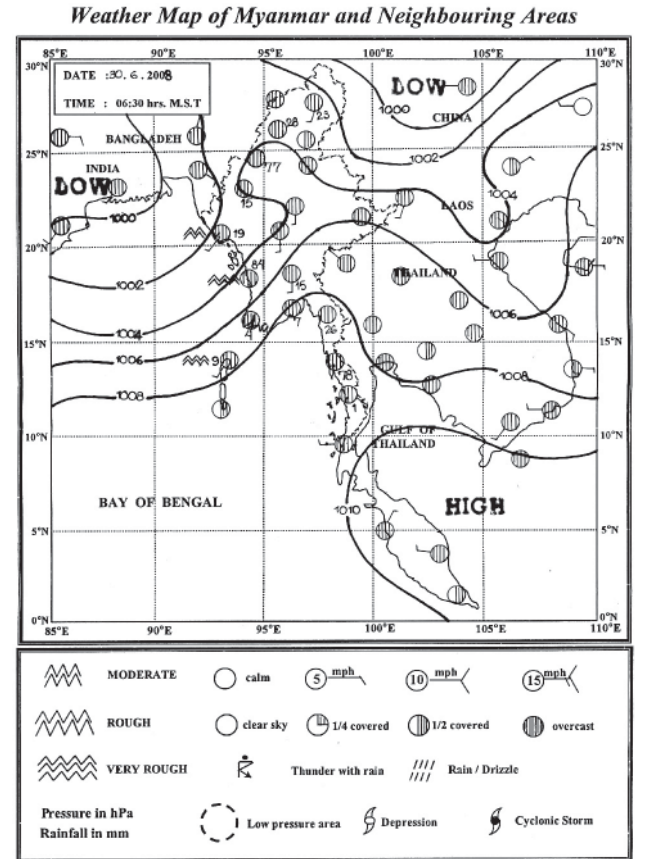

TIKRIT, 30 June—A suicide car bomber killed seven policemen and wounded three in an attack on a patrol in northern Iraq's Salahuddin Province on Sunday, police said.

The explosion in the town of Dhuluiya, 70 kilometres (45 miles) north of Baghdad, was the latest in a series of attacks by militants on Iraqi forces trying gradually to take over responsibility for Iraq's security from the US military.

Nine killed, 16 wounded in traffic accident in Russia

A truck and a passenger bus crashed early Sunday on the Moscow- Petersburg Pskov highway, some 60 kilometres from St Petersburg, said the Interior Ministry's road traffic department.

Local official has started investigation on the accident, *ITAR-TASS* said.

US teen killed by roller coaster at Six Flags park

NEW YORK, 30 June—A 17-year-old boy was killed by a roller coaster at a Six Flags Inc amusement park in Georgia on Saturday after entering a restricted area, park officials said.

The teen, visiting from Springfield, South Carolina, with his church group, was struck and

killed instantly by the Batman roller coaster after scaling 6-foot fences marked by danger signs with another boy, Six Flags spokeswoman Hela Sheth said in a statement.

"The areas where the individuals entered were clearly marked with signs that stated 'Restricted area/ Authorized personnel only'

and a sign on a locked gate that read 'Danger zone. Do not enter,'" Sheth said in the statement.

The teen's family was at the park, and Six Flags has been working with local police officials to investigate the death.

Cargo plane crashes near Khartoum airport

KHARTOUM, 30 June—A cargo plane crashed near the airport in Sudan's capital Khartoum on Monday, witnesses said. It was not immediately known how many people were on board the aircraft and whether they had survived or been killed.
