## Venezuelan President proposes food fund in Mercosur Summit

BUENOS AIRES, 2 July—Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez on Tuesday proposed to create an emergency regional food fund to promote agricultural development in the 35th summit of the Common Market of the South (Mercosur).

Chavez said that he is willing to give one US

dollar for each oil barrel that Venezuela exports if its price is over 100 dollars.

“Venezuela exports some 2,850,000 oil barrels daily at a price of 123 dollars,” Chavez said.

If this level is kept in the external sales of oil, Venezuela would have the condition to

contribute to the proposed fund some “920 million dollars every year to produce emergency food,” Chavez said.

Mercosur summit is being held on Tuesday in San Miguel de Tucuman, 1,200 kilometers north west from Buenos Aires, Argentina.

## Three killed in Jerusalem bulldozer attack

Jerusalem, 2 July—A Palestinian construction worker killed three people when he drove a large bulldozer down a busy one of Jerusalem’s busiest streets yesterday, crushing cars and toppling a bus in what Israeli police said was a terrorist attack.

At least 45 others were injured: drivers in cars, pedestrians and passengers in the bus that was driving up Jaffa Road, in west Jerusalem, at the time of the incident.

Police said the man, aged 30 and a resident of East Jerusalem, seized control of the Caterpillar bulldozer shortly after midday and drove several hundred metres down the street into the oncoming traffic before he was overpowered by policemen and private security guards and eventually shot dead.

As many as three different Palestinian militant groups claimed responsibility for the

killings, but there was no confirmation that the attack was organised in advance or that the attacker, identified as Hussam Dwikat, had any links to militant groups. At least one of the dead was a woman driver who was crushed inside her car.

The incident was the first major attack in Jerusalem since March, when a gunman walked into a Jewish seminary and shot eight students dead.

## Malaysia to send protest note to US

KUALA LUMPUR, 2 July—Malaysia will send a protest note to the United States for suggesting a political motive in the investigation of sodomy allegations against its former deputy Prime Minister Anwar Ibrahim, local media reported on Wednesday. Malaysian Prime Minister Abdullah Ahmad Badawi described a US State Department statement on the allegations as an attempt at interference in the country’s affairs.

The State Department said on Monday that it would oppose any politically motivated investigation or prosecution against Anwar and hoped the accusations would not be a repeat of his 1998 trial. “The main point for us is that the rule of law needs to stand above politics,” said State Department spokesman Tom Casey.

“We know what we need to do to ensure the investigation is done professionally and fairly,”

the New Straits Times quoted Badawi as saying.

“I will ask the foreign minister to send a note because such a statement reflects a prejudice towards us, towards our law and towards our authority,” he said. Malaysian deputy Prime Minister Najib Razak also assailed the American government for implying that the investigation could be biased.

“It is not politically motivated. The thought never even crossed our minds,” he said. —*Internet*

## Suicide truck bomb kills civilian, wounds 22 in N Iraq

MOSUL (Iraq), 2 July—A suicide truck bomb struck the house of an Iraqi tribal leader in a town near the city of Mosul, the capital of Nineveh province, on Tuesday, killing a civilian and wounding 22 others, a provincial police source said.

Abdul Razzaq al-Wagga’, head of the Jubour tribe, one of Iraq’s largest tribe, and his wife escaped

with injuries when a suicide bomber drove a truck loaded with explosives into their house in the town of Qaiyarah, some 50 km south of Mosul, the source told *Xinhua* on condition of anonymity.

A civilian was killed and 22 people were wounded, along with destroying Wagga’ house and several nearby houses, the source said.

Iraqi security forces

sealed off the scene as ambulances and rescue teams rushed to evacuate the casualties, he said.

According to the source, Wagga’ was a Staff Maj. Gen. in the Iraqi Army under Saddam Hussein regime and now he is retired, but maintains great respect among officials and other tribal leaders in the town as well as the whole Nineveh province.

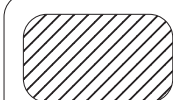
## Coalition helicopter shot down near Afghan capital

KABUL, 2 July—One helicopter belonging to the US-led Coalition forces on Wednesday morning was shot down by small-arms fire in Logar province, neighboring the Afghan capital Kabul, said a Coalition statement.

It occurred in the early morning in the Kherwar district of Logar province where the pilots safely landed the aircraft and evacuate all personnel before the aircraft caught on fire, the statement said.

There were no serious injuries to the crew or passengers and the incident is still under investigation, according to the statement.

# Bolivia accuses US of freezing aid

LIMA, 2 July — Bolivia on Monday accused the US Government of preventing it from receiving hundreds of millions of dollars in aid merely because of political differences between the two nations.

Bolivia has applied for around 756 million US dollars from the US-run development fund the Millennium Challenge Account (MCA).

But the bid presented by Bolivia has been put on hold as a result of increasing political tension between the two sides, Bolivian

Planning for Development Minister Graciela Toro Ibanez told the local radio station Red Erbol.

“The political condition should not have anything to do with the technical criteria,” Toro said.

“We have presented the proposal, and it is a very good proposal and they (the US side) recognized it. It is well elaborated, but for political reasons they preferred to temporarily suspend the fund,” he claimed.

The MCA was launched in January 2004 to

improve economic growth in developing countries.

While it was founded to take politics out of aid allocation, some critics, however, say the US Government has used the fund to increase political influence in the recipient countries.

US-Bolivia tension escalated recently after coca growers in Bolivia’s Chapare Region expelled staff from the US Agency of International Development (USAID) amid charges they were backing the Bolivian Government’s opponents.

## French journalists escape abduction in N-E Somalia

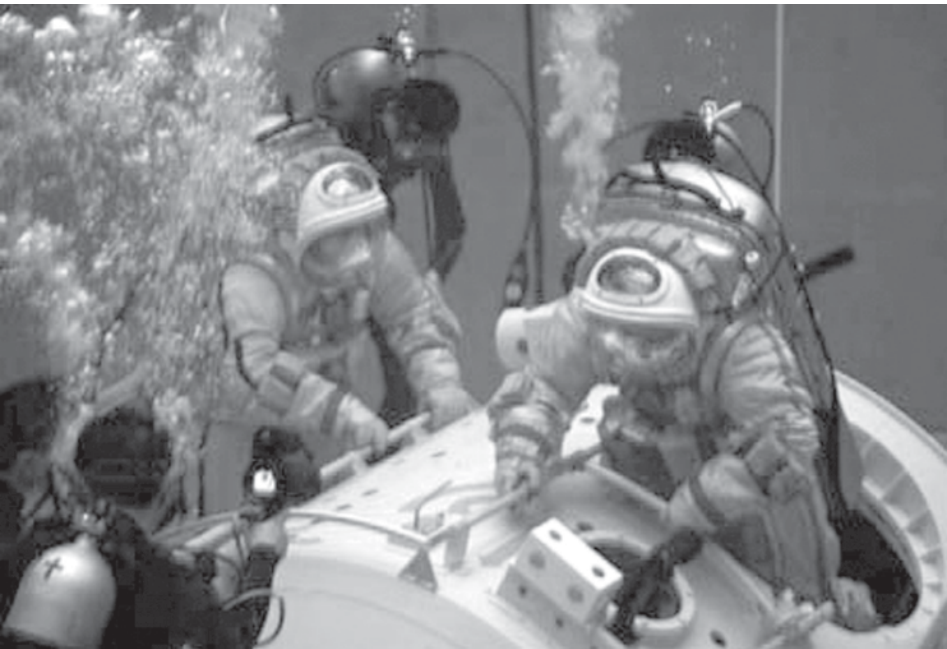
MOGADISHU, 2 July — Two French Journalists escaped an abduction attempt in the northeastern semiautonomous region of Puntland, after local forces repulsed the gunmen, local media reports said Monday.

The two French journalists, whose identity were not immediately clear, were in Bossaso, the commercial capital of the region, to make a documentary film about the region, Radio Shabelle in Mogadishu reported.

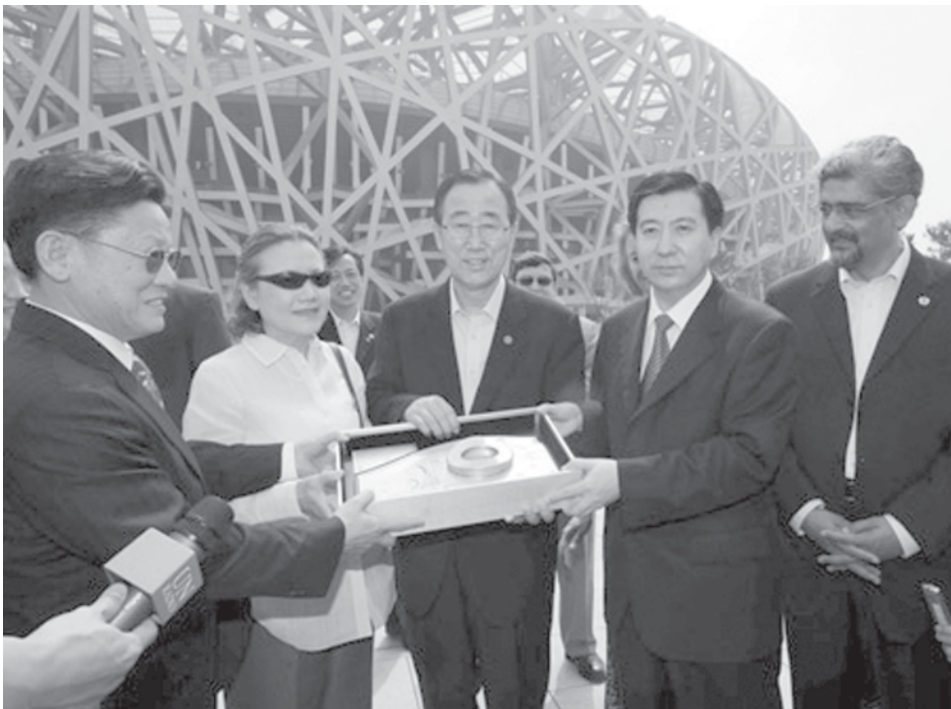
Gunmen attacked the hotel where the journalists stayed in Bossaso after they returned from filming in the city. Local police forces that were guarding them repulsed the assailants and rescued the foreign journalists.

The kidnapping attempt comes a day after two foreign aid workers, a Dane and a Swede, along with a Somali staffer, were briefly taken from their place of work in Hudur town in the southern Bakool Region by insurgents who briefly seized the town.

## Turkey determined to contribute to global peace

ANKARA, 2 July — Turkish Prime Minister Recep Tayyip Erdogan on Monday reaffirmed his government’s determination to contribute to regional and global peace in a televised address to the nation.

“We are determined to maintain our efforts to restore peace in our region and the world... International public opinion knows and appreciates Turkey’s role in the preparation of the ground for a dialogue to end clashes in the Middle East and to assure sustainable peace,” he said, citing Turkey’s recent mediation initiatives between Syria and Israel as an example.

## Hungarian musicians set “Guinness World Record”

BUDAPEST, 2 July — Hungarian musicians performed non-stop for 216 hours at a summer resort on Lake Balaton to set a Guinness World Record for the longest concert, Hungarian news agency MTI reported Monday.

The concert was part of the Balatonfured Guitar Festival.

The attempt to set the new world record started on 21 June. More than 1,000 musicians of all ages in 350 groups lined up to take the stage by turns for days and nights. The youngest among them was just seven years old. — MNA/Xinhua

## Chinese road worker kidnapped in Afghanistan

KABUL, 2 July — Suspected Taliban insurgents kidnapped a Chinese road construction worker southwest of the capital Kabul on Tuesday, the deputy provincial governor said.

Taliban insurgents have kidnapped dozens of foreigners in Afghanistan in the last two years, killing

some, but freeing most, sometimes in return for ransom payments.

Gunmen seized the Chinese man and his Afghan driver in the Jalrez District of Maidan Wardak Province, just southwest of Kabul, while he was returning from the construction site, Deputy Provincial Governor Ali

Ahmad Asheh told Reuters.

The driver was later released.

Two German engineers were kidnapped in the same province a year ago. One was shot dead after suffering a heart attack, the other was freed after more than a month in captivity.—MNA/Reuters

## Afghan governor says civilians killed in US raid

KABUL, 2 July— US-led coalition troops, backed by air strikes, killed 28 Taliban insurgents in southwestern Afghanistan, but six to eight civilians were also killed in the operation, the provincial governor said on Monday.

Sunday's raid was aimed at a Taliban meeting in the Khash Rud District of Nimroz Province on Sunday, provincial Governor Ghulam Dastagir Azad told

reporters.

"The operation was carried out on the basis of a tip off. Twenty-eight Taliban and between six to eight civilians were killed in it," he said, without giving further details.

The US military confirmed the mission, but said nothing of civilian casualties. It said the operation was aimed at disrupting militant activities in Nimroz.

The issue of civilian

casualties by foreign troops is a sensitive one in Afghanistan as it further undermines support for the presence of around 71,000 international troops in the country.

In the first six months of this year, 698 civilians were killed, compared to 430 in the same period last year. —MNA/Reuters

## Iran's daily oil output hits record of 4.23 mln barrels

TEHERAN, 2 July — Iran's daily oil production has hit a record of 4.23 million barrels per day (bpd), Iran's English-language satellite channel Press TV reported on Sunday.

"Iran produced 4.23 million barrels of oil on 27 June," Managing Director of the National Iranian Oil Company Seifollah Jashnsaz was quoted as saying on Sunday. He said Iran aims to raise its daily oil production to 4.28 million bpd by the end of the year, adding that Iran's average daily output stood at 4.1 million bpd last year.

Such a rise of oil production owes to some major projects implemented by the Oil Ministry this year, said Jashnsaz. Iran's current oil output is 4.207 million bpd, and the increased output will be supplied from Darkhovein, Shademargan and Hengam oil fields in southwestern Khuzestan Province, Jashnsaz said. —MNA/Xinhua

## Oil hits record on Israel-Iran tensions

LONDON, 2 July — Oil rose more than three US dollars a barrel on Monday to a new record above 143 US dollars, propelled by heightened market fears of conflict between Israel and Iran over Teheran's nuclear programme.

Prices later retreated from session highs, partly reflecting a rebound in the US dollar versus the euro.

US light crude was up 1.76 US dollars at 141.97 US dollars a barrel by 1357 GMT, after a record high of 143.67 US dollars a barrel. London Brent crude was up 1.91 US dollars at 142.22 US dollars.

"There are many high-level geopolitical news items, particularly in the Middle East, that are pushing prices up," said Mark Pervan, a senior commodities analyst at the Australian & New Zealand (ANZ) Bank in Melbourne.

Iran's Revolutionary Guards have said Iran would impose controls on shipping in the Persian Gulf and Strait of Hormuz if it were attacked. The Strait of Hormuz, a narrow waterway separating Iran from the Arabian Peninsula, accounts for roughly 40 per cent of the world's traded oil flows. — MNA/Reuters

## Quake caused \$6b damage to Sichuan's agriculture

MILAN, 2 July— The devastating earthquake in China's Sichuan Province in May caused damage worth 6 billion US dollars to the region's agriculture, the United Nations' Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) said on Monday.

More than 30 million people in rural communities lost most of their assets, thousands of hectares of farmland were destroyed and millions of farm animals died after the quake, the FAO said in a

statement after a recent assessment mission to Sichuan.

"In addition to the human tragedy caused by the disaster ... many rural communities in Sichuan province have lost their means to produce food and create income,"

Rajendra Aryal, FAO Senior Regional Emergency Coordinator said in the statement.

"It will probably take three to five years to rebuild the agricultural sector in Sichuan," Aryal said.

## Sex diseases among Britons over 45s rocket

LONDON, 2 July — Sexually transmitted infections (STIs) in Britons aged over 45 has more than doubled in less than a decade with Internet dating and drugs that counter erectile dysfunction partly to blame, a report said on Monday.

Researchers from the government's Health Protection Agency looked at the number of patients visiting 19 sexual health clinics in central England between 1996 and 2003.

Although the vast majority of the patients were young, they found that in 1996, 344 people

over 45 were diagnosed with an STI. By 2003, that number had risen to 780.

Men in the 55-59 age bracket were more likely to have an STI than anyone else, while rates were highest in women aged 45-54, said the study published in the *Sexually Transmitted Infections* magazine.

The most commonly diagnosed infections were genital warts, which accounted for almost half of cases, and herpes while the number infected with chlamydia, gonorrhoea and syphilis also rose sharply. — MNA/Reuters

Dear daughter, 3<sup>rd</sup> July is Myanmar Women's Day. So, I am writing to tell you some points you should note. I want you to be convinced and understand that what I will tell you are based on my deep concerns, worries and loving-kindness to you.

Today, young women know well how to beautify themselves and what kinds of dresses suit them most, so the girls I have come across are all pretty to my eyes. There have been a lot of changes in costumes between today and when we went to university. So, I hardly see ugly girls. You know, today's younger generation girls constitute a reliable force of the nation. More than half the population of the nation are women. Therefore, it is required of you younger generation girls to have correct outlooks and views for your all-rounded development.

Due to the traditions, culture and customs, Myanmar women are gentle and have gained a good reputation for their well preserving and promoting own culture. Cherishing and safeguarding own race is

interrelated with women's dignity, might and values. Young Myanmar women should notice and keep in mind that point so as to enhance their image.

I would like to remind you that you should not try decadent costumes that can defame the Myanmar tradition of having shame and fear to do unwholesome deeds. You are my only daughter. You should not think that you will be attractive only if you wear such decadent dresses. There are a lot of Myanmar women who are attractive in traditional costumes. Young women with long hair attract the attention of others and the beholders have peace of mind, looking such graceful young women. I would like you to distinguish between 'fashionable' and 'forerunner'.

In the Knowledge Age, there are a lot you should know and study. Therefore, you should bear in mind that if you waste your valuable time and indulge yourself in amusements and funs, you will lag behind others in development. You have to work hard to be able to catch up with the Knowledge Age. I want to see you new generation

girls to be dynamic with sharp outlook and views.

If a girl is crazy about decadent costumes, which are against Myanmar culture, to lure others, without considering whether such costumes suit her or not, she will come to lack modern ideas and lag behind others in ideology.

There is another point I want to say to you. Maybe some young women are upset for what I will tell you. I am a Myanmar national, so, I think I am responsible for pointing out things that are against Myanmar traditions and culture. Living together is common among the Westerners. Young couples live together as long as they get along well with each other. We should not let that culture flourish in the Myanmar society. It is very dangerous. Like your dad and me, Myanmar people should preserve the fine tradition of monogamy. Myanmar women emulate and follow the norm of Amara Devi and Madi Devi "treating sons as masters and the husband as God".

Since olden days, Myanmar women have been preserving the traditions "Women value

modesty even more than gold" and "The nature of a woman is calm and modest".

I do not mean Myanmar women have to stay only at home forever. Myanmar women have showed their brilliant performances in various fields, keeping abreast of their fellow male colleagues. I am sure you notice that outstanding Myanmar women are awarded on 3 July every year that are featured in the newspapers. As the saying that goes "The hands that rock the cradle rule the world", today's women are no longer in a weak position in doing things. I want you to be one of the valuable women, on whom the nation can place reliance.

In accordance with one of the social objectives "Uplift of national prestige and integrity and preservation and safeguarding of cultural heritage and national character", it is very required of you young women to keep own lineage. If many young women give priority to wealth, without uplifting national prestige, and choose life partners indiscriminately, their children will be the persons of mixed parentage who do not love their motherland. If young Myanmar women always pursue fashionable things, there will soon be no Myanmar women who love and preserve own traditions and culture. So, I suggest that Myanmar women preserve own culture, customs and traditions and respect the Myanmar society.

## 43<sup>rd</sup> Meeting of ASEAN-COCI kicks off

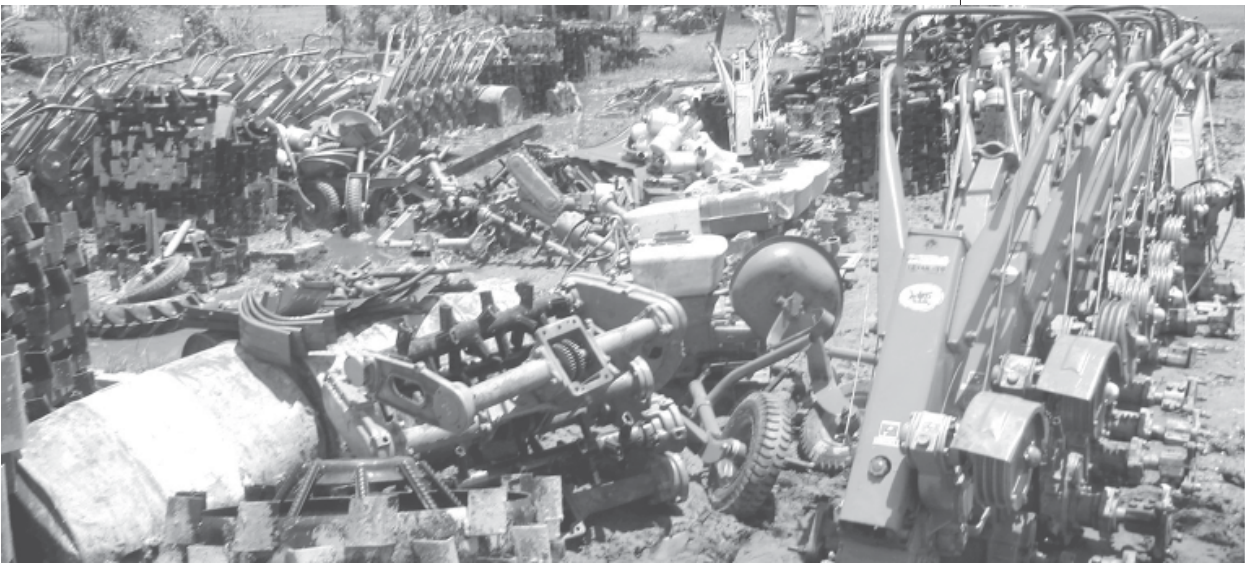

## Iraqi officials angered by US raid near Kerbala

BAGHDAD, 2 July — Iraqi officials have expressed outrage over a US raid near the holy Shiite city of Kerbala, which they said should have been approved by local authorities since security for the area is under Iraqi control.

One man was killed in the early morning raid on Friday, the officials told a news conference. They described him as a civilian.

The US military has not responded to questions about the incident.

The row comes at a sensitive time for Washington, which is negotiating a new security pact with Baghdad to provide a legal basis for American troops to stay in Iraq after a United Nations mandate expires on 31 December. —MNA/Reuters

## Cheshire road “Britain’s most dangerous”

LONDON, 2 July— An 8-mile stretch of road in Cheshire often used as a race track by motorcyclists is Britain’s most dangerous highway while many major routes are still unsafe, according to a survey.

The single carriageway section of road between Macclesfield and Buxton has seen 43 fatal or serious accidents since 2001, most of them bikers, according to the Road Safety Foundation.

The accidents have continued despite Cheshire County Council’s attempts to improve safety by bringing in new crash barriers.

However, if motorbikes were not included in the analysis, the road would in fact be one of the safest. Instead, the 6-mile

bendy stretch of the A61 between Barnsley and Wakefield in Yorkshire would take its place as the country’s worst road.

## Greenpeace protests over detention of fellows in Japan

JAKARTA, 2 July — Scores of Greenpeace activists staged rally outside the Japanese Embassy in Jakarta on Monday, demanding the release of their two fellows being detained by the Japanese Government.

Carrying banners containing words in Japanese and English languages asking for justice and stopping hunting whales, the activists stood in front of the embassy.

“Justice For Whales, Justice For Greenpeace,” said the banners.

Representatives of the protesters were received by a senior official of the embassy.

“We ask for the release of both Greenpeace activists who are now being detained by the Japanese Government without a clear reason,” said Bustar Maitar, Greenpeace Forest campaigner of Southeast Asia after meeting with the official.

TEHERAN, 2 July — A senior Iranian military official said on Sunday the Islamic republic is digging some 320,000 graves in its border provinces for future slain invaders, Iran’s English-language satellite channel Press TV reported.

Iran’s Armed Forces headquarters has approved the plan to dig graves for enemy forces in case of any attack on its territory, said Brigadier General Mir-Faisal Baqerzadeh, head of the Foundation for the Remembrance of the

Holy Defense.

“We do not wish the families of enemy soldiers to experience what Americans had to go through in the aftermath of the Vietnam War,” said Baqerzadeh, who is also head of Iran’s search committee for missing soldiers.

The preemptive measures would decrease the time during which slain soldiers would be buried, the Iranian military official said, adding “the burial of slain soldiers will be carried out decently and in little time”.

Baqerzadeh said the decision is in line with Iran’s commitment to the Geneva Convention and additional protocols regarding wartime cooperation between Iran and the Red Cross.

The United States and its allies have accused Iran of trying to develop nuclear weapons under the cover of a civilian nuclear programme. Iran has denied the US charges, insisting that its nuclear programme is for peaceful purposes only.

## More than 50 Indian policemen drowned to death

NEW DELHI, 2 July — More than 50 policemen were feared to have been drowned to death in a 40-metre deep reservoir in the Indian state of Orissa Sunday morning as the boat ferrying them came under gunfire by Naxalites from a hill, NDTV reported.

The incident took place in Alampetta Village in Malkangiri District of the state when some 64 police of the elite Greyhound Force were on their way to Chitrakonda in the state by a boat for a joint operation against the Naxalites.

Of the 64 on board, eight managed to swim ashore with bullet injuries on them after the boat capsized.

A search operation has been under way to trace the missing policemen. The search team recovered some police caps from the 40-metre deep reservoir named Balimela. —MNA/Xinhua

## Blast at Iran gas canister centre, 15 feared dead

TEHERAN, 2 July—An explosion at a gas distribution company in a town near the Iranian capital was thought to have killed 15 people, Iran's *Fars* news agency said on Monday.

The cause of the blast late on Sunday was not immediately clear, but *Fars* said a large number of gas canisters used in homes for cooking had exploded.

"It is not yet clear if (the blast) was intentional or not," *Fars* reported, adding that the explosion occurred at a gas company in a suburb of Karaj, west of Teheran.

"The number of probable deaths in the explosion has been put at 15," *Fars* reported without giving more details.—MNA/Reuters

## OPEC rejects call to set price band for oil

MADRID, 2 July—The President of the Organization of Petroleum-Exporting Countries (OPEC) rejected a call on Monday to set any price band control in face of relentless rise of world oil prices.

"Producing and consuming nations never agree on any price. You remember we talked about 15 (US) dollars and they were saying 13 dollars. We talked about 22 dollars and they were saying 18 dollars. Then we put a price band of 22-30 dollars, but they never agreed with the price band," OPEC President Chakib Khelil told reporters on the sidelines of the World Petroleum Congress here.

OPEC set a price band

between 22 and 28 US dollars in March 2000, which was abandoned in January 2005 due to market conditions. "Then we did away with the price band. Now they say we need to come back to the price band, but we are never going to agree. Let the oil market decide the price," Khelil said.

As oil prices kept rising, which hit a new record high close to 144 US dollars per barrel today, some countries, notably India, had suggested a return to the price band control. Khelil, once again, stressed that the price hike had nothing to do with supply, saying the market is fully supplied despite rising demand.

## Iraq sues companies over oil-for-food kickbacks

NEW YORK, 2 July—The Iraqi Government sued dozens of companies including oil giant Chevron Corp on Monday that it said paid kickbacks to former Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein's regime under the UN oil-for-food program.

The civil lawsuit seeks to recover damages from companies investigated by a UN-commissioned inquiry, claiming they cheated the Iraqi people out of the benefits of the 67 billion US dollars UN programme.

The UN oil-for-food program, which ran from 1996 to 2003, was created to help Iraqis cope with UN sanctions after Iraq invaded Kuwait in 1990. The programme allowed Baghdad to sell oil in order to buy humanitarian goods.

The lawsuit says billions of dollars were lost "all of which were directly translatable into food, medicine and other humanitarian goods that were supposed to reach the Iraqi people". —MNA/Reuters

## US urged to take steps to avoid unlawful killings

UNITED NATIONS, 2 July—UN human rights expert Philip Alston on Monday called on the United States to take immediate steps to improve its system of military justice and to ensure that the death penalty is applied fairly and justly in states such as Alabama and Texas.

Alston, the special rapporteur on extra-judicial, summary or arbitrary executions, had just concluded an official visit to the United States during which he met with federal and state officials, judges, and civil society groups in Washington DC, New York, Alabama, and Texas.

In a preliminary statement after the visit, Alston noted that it was now widely acknowledged that innocent people are likely to have been executed in the past, and he was critical of how authorities in Alabama and Texas have responded to this fact.

"When we are talking about a situation in which innocent people have probably been executed,

you would expect a greater sense of urgency about reforming the criminal justice system," Alston said.

Alston recommended that reconsideration be given to the system of electing judges in both states, that severe deficiencies in the right to counsel for capital defendants be addressed, and that each state undertake a systematic inquiry into the shortcomings of its existing criminal justice system.

He also called on the US Congress to enact legislation that would permit federal courts to review all issues in state and federal death penalty cases on the merits.

## US Army criticizes itself in review of Iraq war

WASHINGTON, 2 July—The US Army criticized itself in a newly released review of the Iraq war, pointing out the lack of post-invasion planning as a notable error, the National Public Radio, or NPR, reported Monday.

The 700-page review said the Army's senior leaders failed to properly plan for the aftermath of the 2003 invasion.

It is a conclusion that others have reached before but the Army is criticizing itself for the first time.

The review was based on interviews with 200 senior Army officers involved in the invasion and its aftermath.

It is aimed to expose the mistakes that were made and is in hope that they won't be repeated by future officers, said senior US officials.

## Strong sandstorms hit S-E Iran

TEHERAN, 2 July—Strong sandstorms hit Zahak city of Iran's southeastern province of Sistan-Bluchestan, Iran's Press TV satellite channel reported on Monday.

The storms packed with winds up to 100 kilometres per hour has caused state and private-run administrations to close on Sunday, Press TV said.

"The sandstorms have forced all the stores and offices to shut down, except for emergency centres," Mayor of Zahak city Gholamreza Rezadi was quoted as saying.

The storms which began five days ago has hit about 80 villages, Rezadi said, adding that the deluge of sand considerably damaged agriculture, water installations, and electricity power lines.

Over 3,000 people were admitted to clinical centres for treatment of respiratory diseases and allergies, as a result of the sandstorms.

Heavy dust and windstorms have also caused poor visibility that disrupted normal life in the region, Press TV said.—MNA/Xinhua

# Stubborn fire threatens California’s scenic coast

LOS ANGELES, 2 July — California firefighters struggled to gain the upper hand on Sunday against a nine-day-old wildfire that is threatening the scenic Big Sur area along the state’s rugged central coast.

The Big Sur fire has burned about 32,500 acres (13,150 hectares) and destroyed 16 homes since it was sparked by lightning on 21 June, the US Forest Service said.

Firefighters have contained only 3 per cent

of the flames and the Forest Service could not estimate when the fire would be brought under control.

A 10-mile (16-kilometre) stretch of the coastal Highway 1 was closed for a fourth day, and the community of Big Sur remained threatened. Evacuation advisories were issued throughout the area, but the local chamber of commerce said most businesses were still open.

Big Sur is heavily wooded, with steep slopes running down to the Pacific

Ocean. The terrain creates one of California’s most dramatic landscapes — and slow going for more than 1,000 firefighters on the scene. Its 90-mile (145-kilometre) stretch of coastline lies between the quaint town of Carmel in the north and San Simeon, home of Hearst Castle, to the south.

The area is a popular destination for campers, surfers and nature lovers. Novelist Henry Miller lived there for 18 years.

## Israel prepares for possible strong earthquake

JERUSALEM, 2 July — Israeli Health Ministry on Monday warned that a strong earthquake is imminent in the north and instructed medical institutions to step up preparations for the disaster.

An interministerial committee that studies seismographic data noted that exceptional seismic activities have been recorded since mid-February in southern Lebanon bordering north Israel, indicating a

possible major tremor, Director-General of the Health Ministry Avi Yisraeli said in a special notice distributed to medical authorities and organizations.

During the three months starting from mid-February, around 500 small tremors hit the area with a magnitude of less than two on the Richter Scale, while in the last 10 days of May and the beginning of June, the magnitude increased to the degree that they were

felt in north Israel, said the notice.

“Numerous studies presented by the Geophysical Institute have shown that a change in frequency raises the probability of a stronger earthquake. The assessment of the interministerial committee for earthquake preparation is that the likelihood of a quake at a Richter magnitude of 6.0 in southern Lebanon is growing,” added Yisraeli.— MNA/Xinhua

## Argentine police seize five Europe-bound Brazilian drug mules

BUENOS AIRES, 2 July — Five Brazilian drug mules who had stuffed their stomachs with a large amount of cocaine were arrested at Ezeiza international airport in Argentina, police said Monday.

The three men and two women were trying to travel to Italy and Spain.

The men were carrying the drug in capsules in their stomachs, while the women were carrying it in their stomachs and in condoms inside their vaginas, police said.

One of the detainees

underwent surgery to remove 71 capsules of the drug.

The arrests made on Sunday culminate a year-long investigation with help from Portuguese and Italian police.

## Curbing China investment would be a mistake

CANBERRA, 2 July — Australian newspaper *The Australian* said in an article on Monday that Australia will not realize its potential wealth from minerals without opening its doors to Chinese investment.

“The idea that allowing government-owned Chinese companies to gain a stake in our resource

industries is somehow contrary to the national interest is profoundly mistaken,” it said.

So far, Australian relationship with China has been completely lopsided. Trade with China has soared to 60 billion dollars, making it our largest trading partner, accounting for 23 per cent of the total.

Investment from China in 2006 was a paltry 3.7 billion dollars, or less than 0.5 per cent of total investment.

“There is a mistaken notion that we have a captive market in China. That may be so for iron ore at the moment, but it won’t be the case into the future,” the article said.

## BP CEO says oil supply not responding to demand

MADRID, 2 July — The Chief Executive of oil major BP Plc said on Monday oil supply was not responding to higher demand and that the argument speculators were to blame for record prices above 140/US dollars barrel was a “myth”. “Supply is not responding adequately to rising demand,” Tony Hayward told the World Petroleum Congress. He added that politics rather than geology was the reason. “The problems are above ground not below it,” he said. He dismissed the claim, frequently made by OPEC, many of whose members are reluctant to allow Western oil companies invest in their oil industries, that speculators were to blame for high prices. “This is not a speculative bubble,” he said. — MNA/Reuters

## Turkey extends Terim's contract to 2012

ISTANBUL, 2 July — Turkey coach Fatih Terim's contract has been extended by two years to 2012, the Turkish Football Federation chairman said on Tuesday.

After Turkey lost to Germany in their Euro 2008 semi-final, Terim said he would probably step down. Media reports linked him with a return to Italy but the federation subsequently said he would remain in his post until the 2010 World Cup finals. Federation chairman Hasan Dogan said on Tuesday he had proposed the two-year contract extension in a meeting with Terim ahead of a federation board meeting.

"He accepted our proposal, thanking us for the trust in him and saying he was happy to be coach of the national team and that work with the management was harmonious," the federation Web site reported Dogan as saying (<http://www.tff.org>).

Unfancied Turkey reached their first European Championship semi-final with thrilling performances marked by late goals in the group and knockout stages. Terim has also coached Italian teams AC Milan and Fiorentina as well as Turkey's Galatasaray. —MNA/Reuters

## Juventus and Torino in tug of war for Knezevic

TURIN, 2 July — Juventus are set for a tug of war over new signing Dario Knezevic after cross-town rivals Torino said the Croatia defender should be joining them instead.

Juventus announced on their website ([www.juventus.com](http://www.juventus.com)) on Monday that the 26-year-old had joined them from relegated Livorno.

The statement gave no financial details of the deal, although Italian media reported that Juve had taken Knezevic on loan with an option to make the transfer permanent at the end of the season.

However, later on Monday a Torino spokesman said they had deposited a contract for the player's transfer from Livorno with the Italian Soccer League.

## Woods unable to say when he will play again

NEW YORK, 2 July — World number one Tiger Woods does not know when he will be able to play again after doctors built a new knee ligament for him using tendon taken from his right hamstring.

The 32-year-old American won this month's US Open after a playoff against Rocco Mediate before announcing that he needed reconstructive surgery on his left knee and would take the rest of the year off.

He told a teleconference on Monday he was not sure when he would make his comeback.

"We have to see how this thing heals. Everyone heals at a differ-

ent rate," he said. "Some people are back to playing sports in six months, some are nine, some are 12." Woods is wearing a straight-leg brace and will use crutches for three weeks because he cannot put weight on the leg.

He is host of this week's AT&T National at Congressional Country Club outside Washington D.C. but will not be attending the tournament.

"I would love to be there," Woods said. "Unfortunately, I don't think I can make it. Flying, unfortunately, swells up my leg pretty good. When I flew home from the procedure, it ballooned up a little bit. —MNA/Reuters

## Dementieva into semis but makes hard work of it

LONDON, 2 July — Fifth seed Elena Dementieva recovered from a mid-match meltdown to beat fellow Russian Nadia Petrova 6-1 6-7 6-3 on Tuesday and reach the Wimbledon semi-finals.

Dementieva was a set and two breaks up before throwing the 21st seed a lifeline by double-faulting to hand Petrova her first break. Another break by Petrova followed and what should have been an easy win turned into a more intriguing encounter.

Dementieva, the highest remaining women's seed in the draw, held two match points in the second-set tiebreak but a resilient Petrova forced the match into a decider before reverting to making the type of unforced errors that riddled the first set. —MNA/Reuters

## Radwanska knocks out Kuznetsova

LONDON, 2 July — Polish teenager Agnieszka Radwanska completed the destruction of the top four seeds at Wimbledon when she beat Svetlana Kuznetsova 6-4, 1-6, 7-5 in the fourth round on Monday.

The Russian fourth seed led 4-1 in the decider but could not sustain the momentum and bowed out when she dumped the ball into the net on Radwanska's second match point.

"I did it!" grinned Radwanska moments after coming off court.

After the shock exits of top trio Ana Ivanovic, Jelena Jankovic and Maria Sharapova, Kuznetsova became the latest big name to join the Wimbledon scrapheap.

Radwanska, seeded 14, reached the quarterfinals of the grasscourt championships for the first time and will next face twice former champion Serena Williams.

Power tower blasted in S Philippines

MANILA, 2 July—A transmission tower of the National Transmission Corp. has been “bombed” in the southern Philippine province of North Cotabato, local media reported Wednesday.

Local police said that the explosion occurred about 10:45 pm Tuesday, destroying three steel posts of the tower about three kilometers from the national highway in Dalingaoen village.

An earlier report, said unidentified assailants used two improvised explosives to topple the tower. There is no report of casualties yet.

Police blamed rogue members of the Moro Islamic Liberation Front (MILF) for the blast and said they are under hot pursuit.

“After the attack, the rebels fled to the marshland,” a police official told GMA News. It was the third violent incident targeting power facilities in North Cotabato this year.

More than 35 migrants drown off Gabon

LIBREVILLE, 2 July—More than 35 migrants drowned when their boat was wrecked off Gabon's capital Libreville, police and morgue officials said on Tuesday after the bodies washed up on the city's seafont.

The victims carried identity papers from several West African countries, including Benin, Burkina Faso, Ghana and Togo, a Reuters reporter who saw the bodies said.

A rickety open wooden boat, of the kind often used by migrants trying to reach Europe from Africa, was found smashed on rocks not far from the bodies.

“It's the first time in 50 years that we've seen a human catastrophe like this,” one Gabonese police officer said, adding it was the worst disaster involving migrants he could remember in Libreville.

Thousands of poor African job-seekers risk their lives each year trying to get to Spain's Canary Islands to seek a better life in Europe. Hundreds die in the attempt.

Five aid workers kidnapped in Somalia

MOGADISHU, 2 July—Somali gunmen have kidnapped five local employees of an Italian charity and the United Nations in the latest attack on humanitarian staff in the country, the head of the Italian group said on Tuesday.

Elio Sommovilla, founder of the Water For Life charity, told Reuters four of those kidnapped worked for his charity, identifying the fifth as an agronomist with the UN Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO).

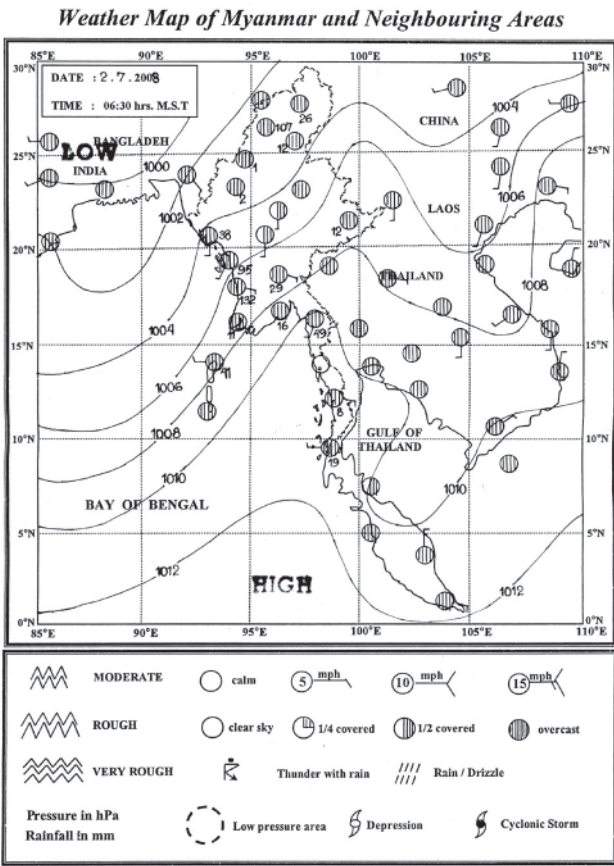
FAO in Rome could not confirm the kidnapping.

Witnesses had earlier said two Somalis, a man and a woman, were kidnapped when a dozen men with rifles stopped them on their way to Mogadishu on Monday and turned their two cars into bush near Afgooye, west of the capital.

“I could see the two cars marked ‘WFL’ being hijacked,” bus-driver Hassan Osman said.

Suspicion for kidnappings generally falls on clan militia and Islamist insurgents who are fighting the Somali Government and their Ethiopian military allies.
