Conserve and exploit marine resources systematically

World nations today have to address various issues such as food insecurity, climate changes, and soaring prices of crops.

As for Myanmar, agriculture, forestry, livestock breeding and fishery are major sectors for national economic growth. With the aim of exceeding the domestic food demand, the government is taking measures for boosting production in the agricultural sector.

In the meantime, it is trying to conserve forests, produce fish and meat of pedigree strains and crops of high-yield strains, and apply advanced livestock breeding methods. As a result, the nation is enjoying economic development with temperate climate.

Being blessed with a large number of rivers, creeks and tributaries and a vast area of waters, Myanmar has a potential for greater success in breeding fish and prawn, and operating freshwater and offshore and deep fisheries on a commercial scale.

About one million tons of fish and prawn can be harvested annually from the Myanmar's waters. The nation's fish and prawn outputs and foreign exchange income are on the increase year by year thanks to the government's technical and financial assistance, and cooperation with NGOs.

Fishery entrepreneurs are taking advantage of those favourable conditions in breeding fish and prawn and running fishery enterprises. Myanmar has prospects for fish sufficiency and export of fish surplus. Therefore, the nation can enjoy economic growth and produce fish surplus if it exports value-added marine products such as fish, prawn and crab, uses advanced fishing methods and exploits marine resources systematically.

Russian President calls halt to Georgian war

MOSCOW, 12 Aug—Russian President Dmitry Medvedev announced Tuesday that he has ordered an end to military operations against Georgia.

The announcement came minutes before French President Nicolas Sarkozy was to land in Moscow to meet with Medvedev to negotiate terms for a possible ceasefire.

“I have reached a decision to halt the operation to force the Georgian authorities to peace,” Medvedev said. “The aggressor has been punished and has incurred very significant losses. Its armed forces are disorganized.”

The decision ends five days of fighting that began in Georgia’s breakaway region of South Ossetia

and spread well into Georgia.

Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov said in an earlier news conference Tuesday that Russia wanted a demilitarized zone to be created in Georgian territory before a ceasefire took effect.

He said Russian troops already in the breakaway province on peacekeeping duty should remain, but that Georgian troops who were part of that force should not return.

Sarkozy heads to Russia on peace mission

TBILISI, 12 Aug—French President Nicolas Sarkozy will lead efforts on Tuesday to end hostilities between Russia and Georgia as the conflict appeared to widen with pro-Moscow rebel forces opening a fresh offensive against Georgian troops.

Sarkozy was due to arrive in Moscow at 9:10 am GMT (10:10 am British time) and meet President Dmitry Medvedev before flying to Georgia on a day of intense diplomacy aimed at ending violence in a region key to international oil transit.

Hostilities appeared to broaden as Abkhazia, another Russia-backed rebel region, launched an offensive at dawn on Tuesday to force Georgian troops out of the disputed Kodori gorge, Abkhaz Foreign Minister Sergei Shamba said.

Israel ‘proposes West Bank deal’

JERUSALEM, 12 Aug — Israel has offered a peace deal to the Palestinians which would annex 7.3% of the West Bank and keep the largest settlements, Israeli reports say.

In return the Palestinians would be given land equivalent to 5.4% of the West Bank in the Negev desert, the Israeli newspaper *Haaretz* reported.

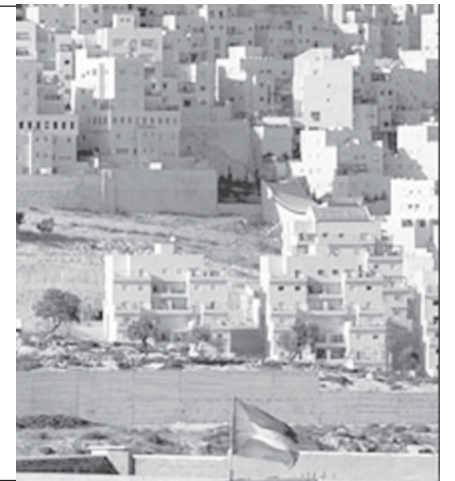
Palestinian officials confirmed that such a plan had been put forward, but called it totally unacceptable.

The two sides have been in peace talks sponsored by the US since November.

Israel wants the new border between it and the West Bank to be similar to the route of the barrier it is currently building in and around the territory, *Haaretz* reports.

Haaretz says the proposed deal also covers refugees and security arrangements, but not the contentious issue of East Jerusalem and the ring of settlements around it.—INTERNET

Kabul bomb kills three civilians, wounds NATO soldiers

KABUL (Afghanistan), 12 Aug—A suicide bomber rammed his car into a NATO convoy in Kabul on Monday, killing three civilians and wounding at least a dozen people, including some soldiers, officials said.

Another bomb attack against a NATO convoy in the country’s northwest killed one soldier and wounded several other people, including civilians. A Canadian soldier was reported killed and another seriously wounded in a skirmish with insurgents in southern Kandahar province.

The Kabul suicide bomber targeted a NATO convoy on the main road in the city’s eastern outskirts, killing three civilians and wounding 12, said Ayub Salangi, the provincial police chief.—INTERNET

Israel shuts down Gaza commercial crossings

GAZA, 12 Aug—Israeli Defence Minister Ehud Barak Monday ordered to shut down Gaza commercial crossings on the borders with Israel after Palestinian militants fired a makeshift rocket to the country, Israeli Radio reported.

The Arabic service reported that Barak ordered the Israeli Army to close three Gaza commercial and fuels crossings on the border

with Israel following a rocket attack on southern Israel. On Monday afternoon, unknown Palestinian militants fired a homemade rocket from northern Gaza at the southern Israeli town of Sderot. No injuries or damages were reported.

No one claimed responsibility for Monday’s rocket attack. On Saturday, three rockets were fired at southern Israel, causing severe damages to Israeli greenhouses.—INTERNET

US military deaths in Iraq war at 4,139

WASHINGTON, 12 Aug—As of Monday, 11 Aug, 2008, at least 4,139 members of the US military have died in the Iraq war since it began in March 2003.

The figure includes eight military civilians killed in action. At least 3,364 died as a result of hostile action, according to the military’s numbers.

The British military has reported 176 deaths; Italy, 33; Ukraine, 18; Poland, 21; Bulgaria, 13; Spain, 11; Denmark, seven; El Salvador, five; Slovakia, four; Latvia and Georgia, three each; Estonia, Netherlands, Thailand, Romania, two each; and Australia, Hungary, Kazakhstan, South Korea, one death each.—INTERNET

N Korea boat sinks, two missing: police

SEOUL, 12 Aug—Two North Korean crew members are missing after their fishing boat collided with a South Korean vessel in the North’s waters and sank early Tuesday, maritime police said.

Two other crew members were rescued by the South Korean sand dredger, a police spokesman told AFP.

The accident happened some eight kilometres

(five miles) northeast of the east coast port of Jangjun, which is about

20 kilometres north of the border.

Girl, 14, dies in Acapulco shooting

ACAPULCO (Mexico), 12 Aug— A 14-year-old girl has died in a shooting attack two blocks from the main coastal boulevard in Mexico's Pacific coast resort of Acapulco.

Prosecutors say a 35-year-old man also died in the attack, in which gunmen travelling in a sport utility vehicle fired at a hardware store. The girl does not appear to have been the target.

Two other men are being treated at local hospitals for wounds suffered in the attack.

The Monday attack was the latest in a wave of gang-style shootings which have claimed the lives of minors in Mexico.

In June, a 12-year-old girl was killed in the crossfire of a drug shootout in the border city of Ciudad Juarez. A 4-year-old boy and an 11-year-old girl were killed in Tijuana in January.—*Internet*

Bomb hits Pakistan Air Force bus

PESHAWAR (Pakistan), 12 Aug—At least six people were killed when a bomb hit a Pakistani Air Force vehicle near the north-western city of Peshawar, police said.

The attack near Badaber, an Air Force base on the outskirts of the city, has completely destroyed the bus.

It is not yet clear if the casualties are civilians or military personnel.

Pakistani military forces recently launched a major offensive against Taliban militants in the Khyber tribal area near Peshawar.

Death toll from storms, landslides rises to 28 in SW China

KUNMING, 12 Aug — Severe rainstorms have caused flash floods and landslides that killed at least 28 people and left eight missing in southwest China, the Yunnan provincial government said on Tuesday.

The civil affairs bureau estimated that disasters triggered by tropical storm

Kammuri from Thursday to Monday affected about 1 million people in Yunnan and forced 11,200 people to evacuate their homes. Kammuri, the third tropical storm to hit China this year, landed in the southern province of Guangdong on Wednesday, and swept across the Beibu Gulf to Guangxi

Zhuang Autonomous Region before moving west to Yunnan.

About 2,700 homes in Yunnan were destroyed and 13,000 were damaged, with officials estimating losses at 549 million yuan (80 million US dollars), mostly from damaged crops, the bureau said.

Fiji, China's Guangxi Zhuang Autonomous Region to boost agricultural cooperation

NANNING, 12 Aug— Fiji would like to promote agricultural cooperation with southwest China's Guangxi Zhuang Autonomous Region, said visiting Prime Minister Josaia Voreqe Bainimarama of Fiji's interim government.

Bainimarama arrived here on Monday after watching the opening ceremony of the Beijing Olympic Games, starting a two-day visit to Guangxi.

"The climate and other environmental conditions here have many similarities with that of Fiji," said Bainimarama at a meeting with Ma Biao, chairman of the regional government.

"We are very interested in the techniques of planting cassava, producing alcohol from cassava, and the exploitation and utilization of other agricultural products," he added.

Ma Biao said Guangxi has similar conditions with Fiji in the agricultural

development, which creates great potential for cooperation.

He also suggested the two sides discuss cooperation in processing and utilization of sugar and cassava, planting rice, fishing, sea product processing and port trade.

"Fiji established ties with Guangxi as early as in 1998. I hope my visit will further boost the relationship between the two sides," said Bainimarama.—*Internet*

Bird flu outbreak reported in southern Vietnamese province

HANOI, 12 Aug— Specimens from 570 ducks raised by two households in Vietnam's southern Ben Tre province have been recently tested positive to bird flu virus strain H5N1, according to local newspaper *Youth* on Tuesday.

The bird flu test has been conducted by Vietnam's 6th Regional

Animal Health Centre, the newspaper quoted the provincial Veterinary Bureau as reporting. The bureau has disinfected and isolated the affected areas in Ben Tre's Ba Tri district.

The Department of Animal Health under the Vietnamese Ministry of

Agriculture and Rural Development has yet to confirm the bird flu outbreak in Ben Tre. Now, only central Quang Ngai province and southern Dong Thap and Kien Giang provinces are being hit by the disease, the department said.

Credit, debit card usage on rise in Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO, 12 Aug — Payments made with credit and debit cards for retail purchases in Brazil grew 212 percent between 2002 and 2007, the country's Central Bank said Monday.

Credit card payments grew 322 percent while payments with debit cards grew 180 percent in the five-year period, the bank said.

Check payments decreased 35 percent during the same time, an indication that such a mode of payment has become outdated, and is preferred only for high-value transactions. The number of cards per capita also increased. By the end of 2007, there was an average of 0.6 credit card and one debit card for every Brazilian.—*Internet*

New breastfeeding study in US shows most moms quit early

WASHINGTON, 12 Aug—While the US government's health agency recently reported that more moms than ever give breastfeeding a try, a new national study in US released on Monday shows most moms do not stick with it as long as they should.

Although 77 percent of moms nationally start to breastfeed, the new study conducted by Brigham Young University found that only 36 percent of babies are breastfed

through six months, well short of the federal government's goal to hit 50 percent by 2010. The American Association of Pediatricians recommends continued breastfeeding through the first year.

"Breastfeeding promotion programmes encourage women to start but don't provide the support to continue," said Renata Forste, an author of the article published in the August issue of the *Journal of Human Lactation*.

Breast milk is considered healthiest for babies because it is easily digested and provides antibodies that prevent ear infections and other illnesses. Earlier work by Forste supports research highlighting the link between breastfeeding and infant survival.

Many personal characteristics, such as a mother's age and education level, influence whether a baby is breastfed. Surprisingly, the new study found that where babies live also plays a role.—*Internet*

Mercedes-Benz to boost truck, bus output in Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO, 12 Aug—Mercedes-Benz do Brazil said Monday that it will increase its output of buses, trucks and auto accessories in Brazil to meet rising demand.

The company said in a statement that it will invest 1.5 billion reais (928 million US dollars) over the next three years to expand its daily pro-

duction capacity by 25 percent.

Gero Herrmann, president of Mercedes-Benz do Brazil, said the company decided to boost its output to meet rising demand from both domestic and international markets.

About 50 percent of buses and up to 30 percent of trucks produced in

Brazil will be exported, said Herrmann.

Mercedes-Benz do Brazil, which holds the largest share of Brazil's truck and bus market, sold some 43,800 units last year. Sales of trucks and buses grew 28 percent in the first 7 months this year compared with the same period last year.

Vietnam flood toll hits 112, more rains forecast

HANOI, 12 Aug—Military helicopters delivered instant noodles and fresh water to residents in mud-covered villages in northern Vietnam after floods and landslides killed scores of people, with more rains forecast to hit on Tuesday.

At least 112 people have been killed after days of heavy rains triggered by the remnants of a tropical storm. Another 45 people were missing, the government said on Tuesday.

Television footage showed helicopters delivering supplies to residents in the northern mountainous provinces of Lao Cai and Yen Bai. Most roads in the hardest-hit areas have been washed away.

More than 1,100 military troops have been leading rescue work, turning over stones in streams to search for bodies, footage from state-run Vietnam Television station showed. Sniffer dogs have also been sent to the area to aid the search.

The toll from the floods, the worst natural disaster to hit the Southeast Asian country this year, is expected to rise but no major impact on main export crops was expected.

The region is about 1,500 km (930 miles) north of Vietnam's main rice and coffee production zones.

Invisibility cloak 'step closer'

Scientists in the US say they are a step closer to developing materials that could render people invisible.

Researchers at the University of California in Berkeley have developed a material that can bend light around 3D objects making them "disappear".

The materials do not occur naturally but have been created on a nano scale, measured in billionths of a metre.

The team says the principles could one day be scaled up to make invisibility cloaks large enough to hide people.



For now, the invisibility cloak remains a thing of science fiction.

The findings, by scientists led by Xiang Zhang, were published in the journals *Nature* and *Science*.

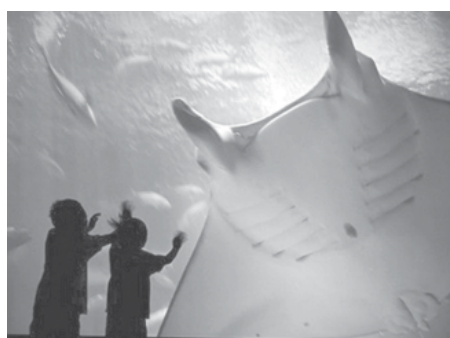
Alpine tourists attacked by Pyrenean dogs brought in to save the sheep

A man accused of beheading his girlfriend after stabbing her to death is in a critical condition after being shot by police, officials on the Greek island of Santorini said.

Witnesses said the 31-year-old had been walking around with the severed head when police tried to arrest him, sparking a car chase.

The government is now fulfilling the requirements for regeneration of the storm-hit areas. The entire people are actively participating with patriotic spirit in the tasks. So, the storm-affected areas are enjoying remarkable development in the economic, health and social affairs.

In contributing towards the rehabilitation of the storm-hit areas in Ayeyawady Division, companies of various states and divisions are building self-reliant libraries in the rural areas. Due to the assistance in various sectors, the victims have almost returned to normal in the physical conditions. Now, village self-reliant libraries are being reconstructed and new ones are being constructed for the storm victims to be able to remedy their painful memories, and that inspires me to say "well-done".

Brazil to strengthen marine forces to uphold sovereignty

BRASILIA, 12 Aug — Brazil decided to strengthen its marine forces in an effort to safeguard its sovereignty in response to the American presence in the region, local media reported on Monday.

The plan was recently revealed by the minister of the Secretary of Strategic Subjects of Brazil, Roberto Mangabeira Unger.

Not only will the marines receive reinforcement, but the armed forces of Brazil in general will be fortified, local media quoted the Brazilian minister as saying.

"The presence of the United States Marines in international water throughout the Southern Cone only reiterates the importance for Brazil to take better care of its own defence shield," Unger said.

"One of the main reasons to reform the concept of our national defence is to be able to count on our own defence shield," the minister said. —Xinhua

5.6-magnitude earthquake hits Venezuela

CARACAS, 12 Aug — An earthquake measuring 5.6 on Richter Scale struck eastern Venezuela on early Monday morning. No casualties have been reported.

The Venezuelan Foundation of Seismological Investigations said the quake took place at 2:49 local time (0749 GMT). The

epicentre was in the Caribbean sea, about 305 km east of Caracas.

According to Interior Minister Ramon Rodriguez, some 50 buildings were slightly damaged and a hospital was evacuated after the quake.

Houses, farmland under water, more floods warned in Thai north

BANGKOK, 12 Aug — Floodwater has inundated more than 500 houses in three villages in Thailand's northernmost province of Chiang Rai, and destroyed over 3,000 rai (480 hectares) of crops, Thai media quoted officials as saying on Tuesday.

The authorities have reported that houses in Chiang Rai's Chiang Saen

district are now under water of over two metres depth after the Mekong River overflowed its banks, and there is no sign that it would recede, the Thai News Agency reported.

A section of the road of over one kilometre linking Chiang Saen and Chiang Khong districts is also under water, making it impassable for any vehicles.

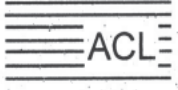
Relief workers have been sent to help flood victims as the water level in the river keeps rising.

Authorities have urged villagers living near the Mekong and two other rivers in the province to pack up their personal effects to get ready for immediate evacuation to higher ground.

Czech scientists test new way to kill cancer cells

PRAGUE, 12 Aug—Czech scientists are examining a new method of fighting against tumour cells, based on a vitamin E analog, which has given promising results when tested on mice, Veronika Kratochvilova from the Biotechnological Institute of the Czech Academy of Sciences (AV) said on Monday.

The vitamin E analog, effective via mitochondria, causes the death of cancer cells without damaging healthy ones, the Czech news agency CTK quoted Kratochvilova as saying.

Tests showed that in the mice, the substance suppresses the emergence of tumours of the large intestine, lungs, pleura, the mammary gland and cervix, she added.

As cancer cells tend to

vary and lose sensitivity to the present medicaments, the scientists seek new substances that cancer cells would not resist to and that would not damage healthy cells, according to Kratochvilova.

The scientists said that the effective target for killing tumour cells are mitochondria, small intracellular elements in which cells produce most of the energy they need for their life and growth. Any damaging of mitochondria may kill the respective cell.

The team of Jiri Neuzil, from Prague's Biotechnological Institute, in cooperation with an Australian laboratory, has found out that the vitamin E analog, known as VES, could help in this respect as it affects mitochondria in a way leading to the cell's death.—*Internet*

Georgia conflict stokes energy supply concerns

VIENNA (Austria), 12 Aug—Russia's conflict with Georgia could punish the European Union where it is perhaps most vulnerable: Oil and gas supplies from beyond its eastern frontier.

The EU has been trying to wean itself away from energy dependence on Moscow, which supplies a quarter of its oil and half of its natural gas, by developing routes for Central Asian resources that bypass Russia.

A key to this strategy is a network of energy routes that run through Georgia, notably the Baku Tbilisi-Ceyhan oil pipeline that was almost hit by a Russian bombing raid Monday.

No supply disruptions were reported and oil prices actually dipped. But the near-miss brought to stark relief how the conflict, which includes the prospect of a major Russian power grab in Georgia, could wreak havoc with the West's hopes of diversifying its supply sources.—*Internet*

One dead, 90 infected in Benin cholera outbreak

LOME, 12 Aug—A cholera outbreak in Benin since July has killed at least one person, with 90 others infected by the disease, said reports reaching here Monday.

The deadly infectious disease, often incurred by ingesting contaminated water or food, has resulted in a relatively small number of casualties largely due to free medication and other precautionary measures made available before the outbreak, according to the Beninese Health Ministry.

Cholera outbreaks are a regular occurrence in the Beninese economic capital Cotonou and its surrounding areas due to flooding during the rainy season, say experts.

Insufficient sanitation, shortage of drinking water and inadequate infrastructure such as public toilets could also be responsible for outbreaks of the disease.

Signs of Alzheimer's disease may be present decades before diagnosis

WASHINGTON, 12 Aug—A team of US scientists report on Monday that people who develop Alzheimer's disease may show signs of the neurodegenerative illness many decades earlier in life, including compromised educational achievement.

Scientists from University of South Florida and University of Kentucky published their study results on-line in the journal *Alzheimer's Disease and Associated Disorders*.

Among participants who became demented before death or had evidence of Alzheimer's disease at autopsy, those with small head sizes had significantly lower educational achievement in earlier adult life. In those dying without a dementia diagnosis or autopsy evidence of Alzheimer's disease, head size had no relationship with education.

Adult head size can be used to estimate the size of the fully-developed brain. Previous studies have found that clinical expression of Alzheimer's disease is related to head size, with people having smaller heads more likely to show the characteristic symptoms of this illness. Larger brains provide reserve against Alzheimer's, allowing people to function normally despite having considerable Alzheimer pathology in their brains.—*Internet*

Cuba backs Cold War ally Russia on Georgia actions

HAVANA, 12 Aug—Cuba sided with its old Cold War ally Russia on Sunday when President Raul Castro issued an official statement supporting Russia's military actions in Georgia's breakaway enclave of South Ossetia.

He backed a Russian demand that Georgia unconditionally withdraw its troops from the pro-Russian area that Georgia tried to reclaim militarily on Thursday.

"It's false that Georgia is defending its national sovereignty," Castro said in the statement that appeared to reflect recent steps toward renewing Cuba-Russia relations.

"The request for a previous withdrawal of the

invaders is just and our government supports it."

Castro said South Ossetia shared neither nationality nor culture with Georgia and had maintained its status as "an autonomous republic".

families, British Broadcasting Corporation reported on Sunday. Det Supt Steve Wade, of Northumbria Police, said: "I would urge anyone with any information to contact the police."

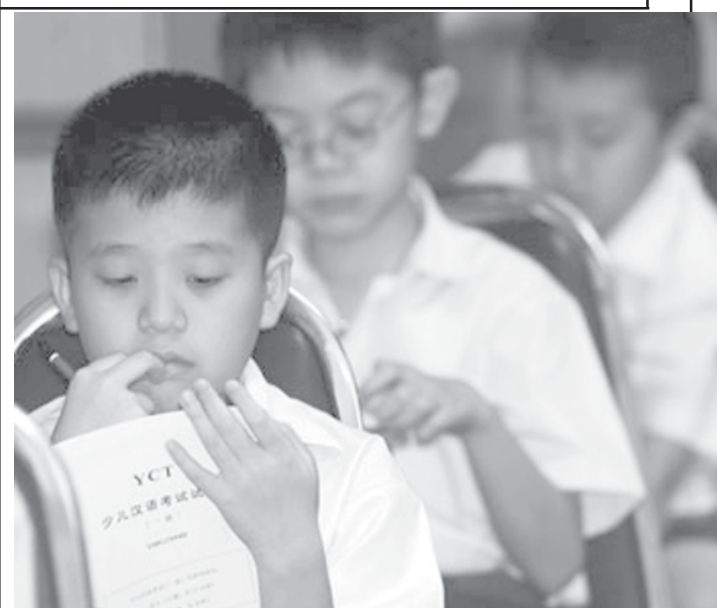

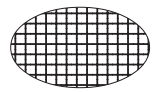
The President said he had the target that the government's rank and file would cut their energy and water consumption by 30 per cent.—*MNA/Xinhua*



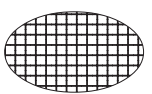

21 US cities to measure carbon footprints

BEIJING, 12 Aug— Some 13,000 companies in 21 US cities, including Denver, Las Vegas and New York, are measuring their carbon footprints using a system developed in the United Kingdom, media reports said Monday.

"If you don't measure these emissions, you cannot manage them," said Paul Dickinson, the chief executive of the UK-based Carbon Disclosure Project, which joined forces with the cities.

Urban traffic, buildings and manufacturers emit 70 percent of the world's greenhouse gases.

The CDP represents 385 global institutional investors that manage a total of more than 57 trillion US dollars in assets. It has gathered corporate emissions data through surveys since 2000 and claims to have the largest corporate greenhouse gas emissions database in the world.

Each of the 21 cities

will gather emissions data for their municipal functions, such as their fire and police departments, government buildings and waste services, which will help cities compare how they are doing. They will also assess emissions from the city as a whole.

"The process should really lead to the beginnings of a fundamental restructuring of how cities consume energy," Dickinson said.

Bus collision kills four, injures four in north China

HOHHOT, 12 Aug— Four people were killed and another four were injured when a truck crashed with a minibus in north China's Inner Mongolia Autonomous Region, local authority said on Monday.

The accident occurred at 2:43 pm on Sunday in a section of the NO 111 National Highway when the truck side-slipped and collided with the minibus nearby.

Four people in the minibus, including the

driver surnamed Guo, died and another four were slightly injured, said a Chifeng municipal traffic police department official.

The cause of the accident is under investigation. —Internet

100 militants killed in Pakistan tribal region

ISLAMABAD, 12 Aug— At least 100 militants have been killed in fighting started in a tribal region four days ago, the Army said Sunday.

Army spokesman Major Murad said that 13 soldiers were also killed in the fighting in the Bajaur tribal region.

He also denied the Taliban claim to have surrounded Khar, the centre of Bajaur.

The Taliban have claimed that their fighters are very close to Khar after taking control of Loi

Som, a town 15 kilometres from Khar.

Murad said that positions of suspected Taliban were shelled at Loi Som and adjoining areas to end Taliban control.

There have been conflicting reports about casualties after Sunday's bombing of Loi Som.

Taliban spokesman Maulvi Umar said that the militants Sunday killed 15 soldiers who had been hiding in suburbs of Khar. There was no confirmation of the claim by the Army.

Thousands of people, including children and women, are leaving Bajaur as fighting is spreading in the region, according to local Press reports. —Internet

Eight killed in traffic accidents in Romania

BUCHAREST, 12 Aug— Eight people were killed and at least nine others injured in a series of accidents over the weekend in Romania.

The Media Fax reported Sunday that five people were killed and four others severely injured Saturday night as two cars collided on the No 3 national road near

the Black Sea coastal city of Constanta.

Also on the day, a Citroen strayed into the incoming lane and smashed head-on into another car on the No 7 national road in the central county of Deva, killing three people on the spot, including the driver of the Citroen and a seven-year-old girl.

Local television also reported that at least two people were injured Sunday as a passenger bus carrying 47 people turned over near Arad in western Romania.

Two die in ultralight plane crash in Czech Republic

PRAGUE, 12 Aug— An ultralight plane crashed near Dolni Trebonin, south of the Czech Republic, killing the two-member crew, regional rescue service head Marek Slaby said on Sunday.

Harrington fills Tiger void with PGA win

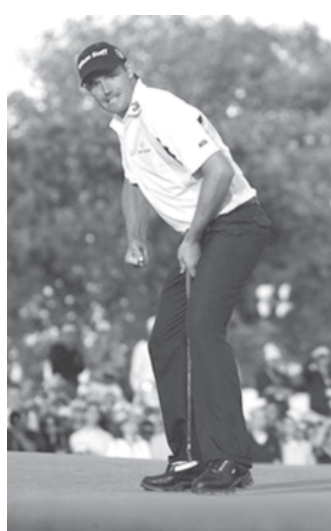
BLOOMFIELD TOWNSHIP, 12 Aug — Everyone wondered who would fill the void with Tiger Woods recuperating and out of the last two majors.

Putin criticizes US over South Ossetia

Moscow, 12 Aug— Russian Prime Minister Vladimir Putin sharply criticized the United States on Monday, saying its support for Georgia in the conflict over the separatist region South Ossetia displayed a cynical Cold War mentality.

Putin, shown speaking on state television, singled out the United States, saying Washington was helping to bring Georgian troops from Iraq to fight at home. In an emotional speech to senior government officials, Putin said some US politicians still had a Cold War mentality.

“It is a shame that some of our partners are not helping us but, essentially, are hindering

us,” Putin said. “I mean ... the transfer by the United States of a Georgian contingent in Iraq with military transport planes practically to the conflict zone.”

“The very scale of this cynicism is astonishing—the attempt to turn white into black,

black into white and to adeptly portray victims of aggression as aggressors and place the responsibility for the consequences of the aggression on the victims.”

A simmering conflict between Russia and its small, former Soviet neighbour erupted last

Thursday when Georgia suddenly sent forces to retake South Ossetia, a pro-Russian province that threw off Georgian rule in the 1990s.

“The major part of our contingent in Iraq has come back,” said Nika Rurua of the Georgian Parliament’s defence committee.

Ahmadinejad says Teheran never give up N-programme

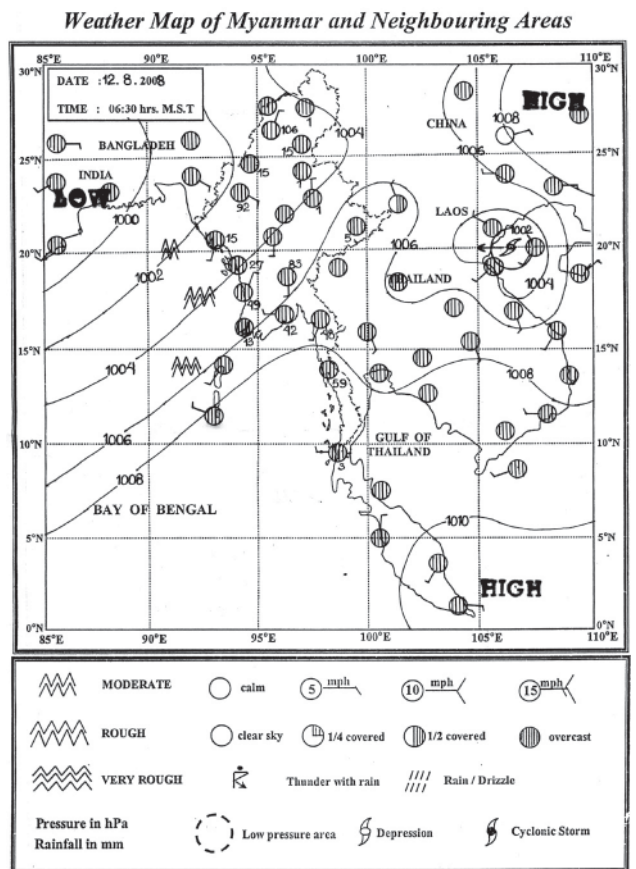

ANKARA, 12 Aug—Three workers were killed and 13 others wounded in an accident in Tuzla Shipyards Zone in Turkey’s largest city Istanbul on Monday, the semi-official Anatolia news agency reported.

Workers fell into the sea when a boat’s rope uncoiled from a ship in Gisan Shipyard, leaving three workers dead and 13 others injured, said the report.

A total of 61 workers have died due to various accidents at Tuzla shipyards since 2000, according to the report.
