Pocket projector gets early screening

It looks like 3M is trying to bring back the good old-fashioned vacation slideshow.

The company is reportedly close to rolling out a miniature, portable digital video projector, the likes of which could be used to project digital photos, PowerPoint presentations, or cat-on-a-treadmill videos wherever you see fit.

The lucky ducks over at *Popular Science* got an early look at the MPro110 and report that after plugging it into a DVD player, they were able to project a movie up to 11 inches wide on various pieces of furniture, walls, and co-workers' body parts. Apparently 3M had planned to officially announce the projector in a few weeks, but an overly enthusiastic German division of the company let the cat out of the bag a little early with a *press release*.

According to PopSci, the MPro will cost \$359. And a video on the 3M site indicates it will have

the ability to hook up to a laptop, digital camera, iPod, and other mobile devices (a little *Mario Kart* racing action, perhaps?). At that price and with that kind of hookup capability, the MPro would be a viable option for taking business presentations on the road or even filling in as a less-expensive home theater device (though speakers aren't included).

LONDON, 14 Sept—Britain's military says one of its soldiers has been killed in an explosion in southern Afghanistan. The death brings to 120 the number of British military personnel who have died while serving in Afghanistan since the US-led invasion.—Internet

Iraq: bomb kills 4 US-backed, Sunni fighters

BAGHDAD, 14 Sept—Iraqi officials say a bomb has killed the leader of a US-backed, Sunni armed group in a western district of Baghdad.

The officials say the bomb exploded Saturday night in the car of Fuad Ali Hussein, killing him as well as his deputy and two bodyguards.

Hussein was head of a neighborhood awakening council — a term describing Sunni fighters who have turned against al-Qaida in Iraq and formed alliances with the United States.

Hussein's death was confirmed by a police officer and the head of another awakening council. Both requested anonymity for security reasons.—Internet

Iraqi officials say Baghdad-area bombs kill nine

BAGHDAD, 14 Sept—Roadside bombs killed five Iraqi policemen and injured eight others north of Baghdad on Sunday, an Iraqi official said.

Three bombs planted along a main thoroughfare targeted a police convoy in Jalawla, 60 miles north of Baghdad, said Ibrahim Bajilan, head of the provincial council of Diyala.

On Saturday night, a bomb killed the leader of a US-backed, Sunni armed group in a western

district of Baghdad.

Also on Sunday, Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki formed a committee to investigate the killing of four employees of an Iraqi television station as they were filming an episode on the Islamic holy month of Ramadan.

The four with the Al-Sharqiya station were abducted and killed Saturday in the northern city of Mosul. The dead included Mussab Mahmoud al-Azawi, head of the sta-

tion's office in Mosul, two cameramen and a driver. Police said they were questioning two suspects.

Before Saturday's attack, the New York-based Committee to Protect Journalists had reported that 132 journalists and 50 other media employees had been killed since the start of the 2003 US-led invasion of Iraq.—Internet

Bomber kills two Afghan doctors

SPIN BOLDAK, 14 Sept—A suicide bomber in a vehicle attacked a convoy carrying Afghan doctors working for the United Nations in southern Afghanistan Sunday, killing two doctors and wounding 15 other people, a spolice chief said.

The attack happened in Spin Boldak district of Kandahar province as the convoy was on its way to vaccinate people against polio, said provincial police chief Matiullah Khan. The bomber also died in the blast.—Internet

Suspected bomb near Papua airport



TIMIKA (Indonesia), 14 Sept—A suspected bomb has gone off near an international airport in Timika, in Indonesia's easternmost province of Papua, police say.

It was not immediately clear if anyone has been killed or injured in the blast, which reportedly could be heard up to 5km (three miles) away.

The blast occurred on Sunday night near Moses Kilangan International Airport. On Thursday, unidentified militants set off two small bombs on a road to a nearby gold and copper concession.

The concession is run by PT Freeport Indonesia, a subsidiary of US mining giant Freeport McMoRan.

The same company runs the airport.

Seven police killed in Afghan

KABUL, 14 Sept — Taliban militants ambushed a police patrol in central Afghanistan, killing seven officers, officials said Sunday.

The police officers died after the militant's ambush in the central Ghazni province on Saturday, said Mohammad Sharif Kohistani, a provincial police official.

Authorities recovered the bodies of seven dead officers and that another officer is missing, Kohistani said.

Lightly armed police officers bear the brunt of Taliban attacks in Afghanistan.

Over 900 officers were killed by insurgents in 2007.

Pakistan: Fresh clashes kill 10 alleged militants

ISLAMABAD, 14 Sept—Pakistani security forces taking part in fresh clashes near the Afghan border killed 10 suspected militants and wounded 25 others Sunday, a government official said.

More than 100 people, most of them militants, have been reported

killed in the fighting in Bajur tribal region in the last five days. The region is a suspected hideout of al-Qaida leader Osama bin Laden and his No. 2, Ayman al-Zawahri, and it has been the focus of a major Pakistani military operation as well as ongoing US concern.

Security forces used helicopter gunships, fighter jets and heavy artillery to attack suspected militant positions Sunday in the Loi Sam, Rashakai, Tang Khata and Gollokass areas of Bajur, said Iqbal Khattak, a senior government official.

Abbas: We'll ask new US Administration to support peace

RAMALLAH, 14 Sept—Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas said on Saturday evening that the Palestinian Authority would ask the newly elected American administration to support the Middle East peace process.

Abbas told a joint news conference with Spanish Foreign Minister Miguel Angel Moratinos in Ramallah "We hope that the current US administration won't blame any part in case no agreement is reached by the end of this year."

"We are doing our best in order to reach a peace agreement with Israel before the end of this year, because since Annapolis, we have been talking about reaching an agreement and we really want to reach an agreement," said Abbas.

Israeli and Palestinian leaders pledged at the US-sponsored Annapolis conference to reach a comprehensive peace deal by the end of 2008, before US President George W Bush leaves the White House in January. —Internet

Police detain several suspects in New Delhi blasts

NEW DELHI, 14 Sept—Police in India say they have detained several people a day after a series of blasts ripped through the Indian capital, killing at least 20 people. Indian media reported Sunday that 10 people have been detained in raids carried out across New Delhi. New Delhi police spokesman Rajan Bhagat confirmed only that "several" people are being held.

Baghat said police "have collected vital clues and ... hope to crack the case soon."

A Muslim militant group claimed responsibility for Saturday's bombings in an e-mail sent to a number of Indian media outlets.—Internet

Russian troops withdraw in western Georgia

POTI (Georgia), 14 Sept— Russian troops pulled out of encampments in western Georgia on Saturday as the shooting of a Georgian policeman highlighted tensions over a European disengagement plan.

Russian columns could be seen leaving camps near the port of Poti and around the western town of Senaki, abandoning positions they had dug and heading towards the Abkhazia rebel region.

Britain's Brown facing growing revolt

LONDON, 14 Sept—The calls for British Prime Minister Gordon Brown to face a leadership contest grew Sunday as former ministers attacked his performance and more party members backed a showdown.

The mutiny against Brown gathered pace less than 48 hours after a member of his government for the first time broke ranks and called for a challenge to his stewardship of the ruling Labour Party.

Those who have spoken out so far are hoping their numbers will snow-

ball before the party's annual conference kicks off on Saturday. All eyes are on whether a big-name Cabinet figure will join

their bandwagon.

Anyone wishing to challenge for the leadership has to gain the support of 20 percent of Labour lawmakers — currently 71 — and seek nomination before the party conference, giving rebels a tight timeframe for maximising the pressure on Brown.

Fiona Mactaggart joined the former ministers openly calling for a change of leadership, telling BBC television: "I think we should give a chance to someone else to take over, I really do."

Death toll in Bolivia unrest reaches 18

LAPAZ (Bolivia), 14 Sept—President Evo Morales on Saturday accused an opposition governor of using foreign thugs against government supporters in violence that has claimed at least 18 lives and prompted him to declare martial law in a breakaway province.

In a bid to defuse the bitter dispute over a new constitution and land reform that threatens to tear apart the poor Andean nation, Chile called for an emergency meeting of South American leaders on Monday.

"A larger tragedy has to be avoided," said Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez, a strong ally of Bolivia's leftist president, confirming he would attend the meeting.

Morales described as an ambush a gunbattle in the eastern province of Pando on Thursday that led him to impose martial law the next day. "These people were massacred," he told a news conference on Saturday.

Interior Minister Alfredo Rada said 16 people were killed in the clash — the majority of them peasants who back Morales — and authorities said another two people died Friday at Pando's main airfield as government troops took control, opening fire to disperse protesters.

Sutanovac spoke

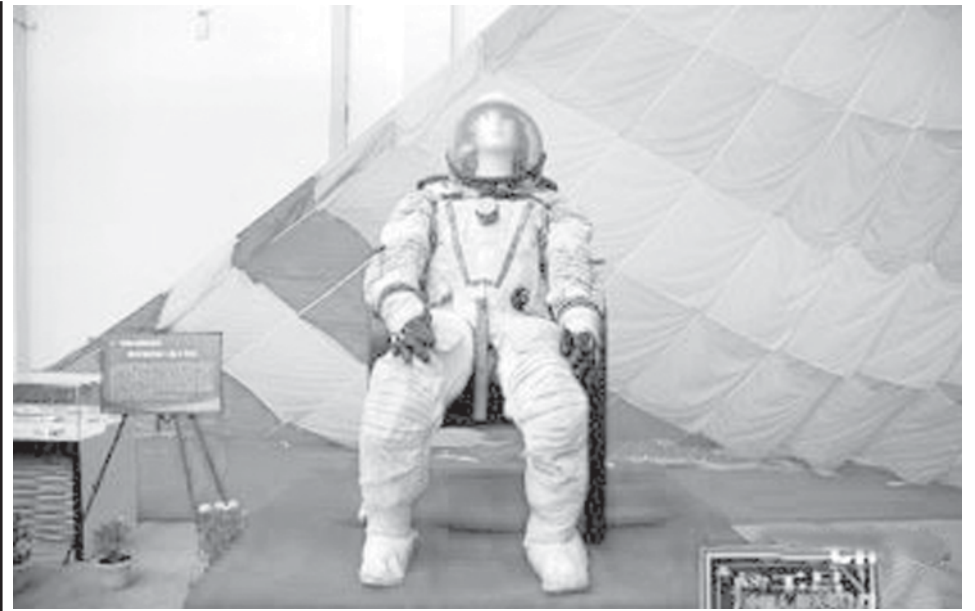
highly of the relationship between the armies of Serbia and China, which, he said, is witnessing a good momentum of development.

Powerful quake hits Timor-Leste, no casualties

JAKARTA, 14 Sept — An earthquake with the magnitude of 6.5 rocked Timor-Leste on Sunday, but with no report of damage or casualties, the Indonesian meteorology agency said here.

The intensity of the quake was so low that its shake was not felt on land, an official of the agency named only Nurpujianto told Xinhua.

The quake struck at 07:00 Jakarta time (0004GMT) with the epicenter at 159 kilometers southeast of Dili, the capital of the province and at 10 kilometers in depth, an official of the agency said.

Death toll in Los Angeles train collision rises to 26, human error blamed

LOS ANGELES, 14 Sept — The death toll in the Los Angeles train collision rose to 26 late Saturday after US rescuers completed their search for victims in the wreckage of the deadly crash accident that happened Friday.

Officials said it was the worst train crash in Los Angeles since 1956 when about 30 people were killed in an accident.

The crash took place Friday afternoon when a Metrolink commuter train collided head-on with a freight train in the Chatsworth area about 50 km northeast of downtown Los Angeles.

A contracted engineer who was driving the Metrolink train was responsible for the crash, said a spokeswoman of Metrolink, the railway

commuter transportation system that covers the Los Angeles metropolitan area.

The engineer was supposed to pull off in response to a red light and wait for the other train to go by, but he failed to do that, according to spokeswoman Denise Tyrell, who broke down into tears when making the announcement.

Japanese airlines cancels 14 flights due to computer malfunction

TOKYO, 14 Sept—A computer failure has so far caused the cancellation of 14 domestic flights of All Nippon Airways Co (ANA), local media reported Sunday.

The glitch, which hit the major Japanese airliner's computer system early Sunday, affected the operations of flight reservations, check-in, and baggage control.

The suspended flights are those scheduled to take off from Tokyo's Haneda Airport to Osaka, Okayama, Takamatsu, Fukuoka and Nagasaki.

Weakened Ike heads north, leaving behind huge financial loss

WASHINGTON, 14 Sept — For Americans, the good news is Ike, now weakened from a hurricane to a storm, left behind no huge loss of human lives after its landing on Texas coast early Saturday morning.

But the bad news is that it has caused a huge financial loss between 8 billion and 18 billion US dollars as it battered coastal areas of Texas and

Louisiana states and left some 4.5 million residents without power, the insurers said.

The National Weather Service, or NWS, said Ike was 70 km west-southwest of Texarkana on the Texas-Arkansas border at 5 pm EST (2100 GMT).

The storm is moving north-northeast near 35 kph, expected to increase in forward speed Satur-

day night. Rainfall of five to 13 cm is expected in eastern Texas and parts of Louisiana, with possible isolated amounts of 28 cm.

President George W Bush has declared 29 Texas counties and parts of Louisiana major disaster areas, making federal funds available for recovery from the storm.

Staying in touch with news on rescue and reconstruction tasks in the seaside regions, home to my relatives, I came to be aware of the fact that following the strike of the storm "Nargis", our country became livelier than ever, and loving-kindness, goodwill and cohesion of the people came to be further consolidated. So, I am in support of the saying that goes "**Blood is thicker than water**". I would say the collaborative efforts the entire people have made with patriotic spirit, nationalist fervour and Union Spirit have remedied a variety of dire straits triggered by the catastrophe.

I also would say that was a reward of all the hard work the entire people have reaped. The natural disaster brought wholesale death and destruction to some regions of our country, in other words, a great loss. However, we people have gained an invaluable benefit from the loss: the concerted efforts, indeed, are a testimony to resilience, cohesion and brilliant performances of all national people.

Mentally, it is very hard for a person to remain resilient in the face of untold miseries in which the entire home region has been devastated; all the property, washed away; and parents, spouses, children and relatives have met tragic end in no time. I have great sympathy for my relatives in the coastal regions. Now, I believe that my relatives have recovered from the hardships in a short time.

Their quick recovery is largely due to the comfort and assistance given by the three forces, namely the State, the government and the people. It is public knowledge that the State took responsibilities to the best of its ability in that regard. The Prime Minister and ministers made a trip to the storm-hit immediately, supervised the rescue tasks, and provided manpower and cash and kind for rehabilitation, reconstruction and preparedness tasks. The Head of State and the Deputy Head of State in their tours of the storm-affected areas comforted the survivors and gave guidance, thus expediting the tasks and helping the victims make mental recovery from the absolute nightmare.

Members of the Sangha, the people, companies, social organizations and departments concerned made generous donations to the people of the storm-stricken areas. In the meantime, servicemen contributed labour plus equipment, vehicles, warships, airplanes and helicopters in the tasks for clearing the debris, rescuing the survivors, transporting relief supplies and providing medicines, treatments and rehabilitation. The WHO and international community recognized the contribution and services the people had provided to address the issues including rescue and rehabilitation challenges caused by the storm. The benefits the people have made from the natural disaster are of great value.

Now, rehabilitation tasks are ongoing. So, I will present some points about rehabilitation and long-term preparedness measures. I presented some facts about achievement of restoring the victims' livelihoods in the article (part-II). I would like to present the size of achievement in implementing the objective "To improve the living conditions of local people better than that before the storm".

Local people in the seaside regions enjoy favourable conditions to do lucrative businesses such as agricultural farming, fish farming, salt farming, and breeding sea prawn. So, there are a large number of rich persons owning large enterprises, agricultural farms, and rice mills in the townships and large villages in the region.

Those who have capital and make prudent investments in the region do well in their businesses, whereas some lead a hand-to-mouth life. **As the Prime Minister has said, in the regions, some are complacent about the present living conditions and fail to try to improve their social and economic standards. I often thought of seeking ways and means to improve their social and economic conditions.**

With this concept, wherever I visited my relatives in the hamlets, and group-wise huts of fishermen and agricultural farmers, I persuaded and inspired them to earn higher incomes, save more and spread their wings, but in vain, because they are in the habit of being complacent about present living conditions. It is encouraging to note that the government and well-wishers throughout the nation are now working together to improve their living standard.

I have learnt that in regenerating the storm-hit areas in compliance with the guidance given by the Head of State, priority has been given in serial order to seaside regions, then to inland, and then to rear parts. I notice that tasks to improve the education and health affairs of local people, constructing roads and bridges, fulfilling the basic needs, and restoring businesses in each township are being carried out systematically at the same time. All the projects are designed to reconstruct the affected buildings and improve local residents' living conditions to higher than previous ones in tandem. And the projects have proved successful.

When I saw the victims staying in tents and shelter boxes in row, I thought necessary measures had a long way to go in order to make the local people fully recover from their stresses and strains. The government urgently provided 8341 tents, 1689 shelter boxes, 7082 tarpaulin 3959 plastic and 132,000 corrugated iron sheets. Therefore, soon after the occurrence of the storm, the victims were able to restore their livelihoods, staying in temporary shelters and houses built of relief equipment and regional products in combination. Now, the government is building durable houses for the survivors.

In that case, the government is focusing on achieving better conditions in reconstructing towns and villages. And combined offices, schools, monasteries and government offices are designed to be resistant to possible future natural disasters all with raised foundations. Each homeless family is provided with a 16' x 20' durable house roofed with CI sheets, along with concrete post shoes, timber floor and walls of timber-plus-bamboo matting. I was delighted to see durable houses roofed with CI sheets in row.

In the past, the majority of the houses of hamlets of fishermen were roofed with thatches, covered with bamboo matting walls. And I used to stay in many houses in those hamlets. Locals by nature were happy with those living conditions, but they were in fear whenever it rained heavily with strong winds. Now, those hamlets have been upgraded to better ones, and that is a giant step to improve social and economic standards of the whole region.

For instance, Pyinsalu, Kadon Kani, Kyeinchaunggyi, Theikpangon, Setsan, Kyondah, Zinywe and Toe villages I had frequented have now been upgraded with new houses in row. I do not think I would recognize the villages on my next visit there. So

far, well-wishers have made donations to build 7270 out of the targeted 8923 durable houses in the storm-ravaged areas. It is expected that other well-wishers will render assistance to build 2236 more houses. Now, 2381 houses are in use. In general, a durable house is priced at K 600,000. However, in practice, the costs exceed the actual price, because it is required to spend a lot on groundwork and transport of construction materials. Accordingly, entrepreneurs and the government have to contribute necessary cash and kind to complete the project successfully. Anyhow, the victims no longer need to worry about shelter, on which people have to spend money more than any other need. Here, I would like to express my heartfelt thanks to the State, well-wishers, members of the Sangha and construction companies.

Besides, plans are under way to upgrade Pyapon People's Hospital to a 200-bed one, and Bogale, Mawlamyine and Labutta people's hospitals, to 100-bed ones. I have learnt that many more rural health care centres will be opened in the regions. Raised at the plinth level with six operation theatres, the one-storey hospital (200-bed) of Pyapon District will meet the standard of the hospital in Nay Pyi Taw. Basic education schools are under repair and well furnished with the contributions of some large companies. In the storm-devastated villages,

primary schools have been upgraded to middle schools, and middle schools, to high schools, and all the self-reliant affiliated schools to government-run primary, middle and high schools. That is a tangible progress.

The government launched a programme that CI sheets can be imported with six-month tax exemption and distributed at reasonable prices to the victims. State-owned sawmills and entrepreneurs of wood-based products have provided sawn timber and hundreds of thousands of logs of hardwood and other wood to the storm-ravaged areas. The government has fulfilled requirements for reconstruction tasks as far as it can, and reconstruction work is gaining momentum.

Furthermore, to my knowledge, Setsan Town will be re-established soon, and Labutta will be moved to a new site with schools, government offices and hospitals. And an orphanage will be built near the high school of the new town. Those who prefer to live in their home places are allowed to do so. Lands will be allocated to those who the government will provide with shelters, and those who want to move to the new town at own expenses. In my opinion, Pyinsalu will be re-established in the original place.

NAY PYI TAW, 14 Sept—A Myanmar delegation led by Minister for Health Dr Kyaw Myint arrived back here this morning after attending the 26th Health Ministers' meeting of Southeast Asian Regional WHO and the 61st Regional Committee's meeting held in New Delhi, the Republic of India from 8 to 11 September.

The 26th Health Ministers' meeting was held at Ashoka Hotel in New Delhi on 8 September, attended by ministers of health, deputy ministers, health secretaries and officials of Myanmar, Bangladesh, India, Indonesia, Maldives, Nepal, Bhutan, North Korea, Sri Lanka, Thailand and Timor Leste, the Director-General of WHO in Geneva, Switzerland and officials, the Director of the Office of WHO those from UN agencies and social organizations.

In his address, Minister Dr Kyaw Myint said that Myanmar is carrying out work programmes to be implemented under the International Health Programmes (2005), and it has drawn plans to address health problems. Myanmar has formed a group of O & G specialists and paediatricians and efforts are being made for reducing the child mortality while striving for success of anti-tobacco cam-

paign as a national duty, he added. In that regard, the government laid down the anti-tobacco law on 4 May 2006 and steps are being taken for the people to abide by the law.

In the afternoon of 8 September, Minister Dr Kyaw Myint met with Director-General of WHO Dr Margaret Chan at Ashoka Hotel. At the meeting, Dr Margaret Chan said that she was pleased to hear that Myanmar was able to cope with relief and rehabilitation of storm-hit regions as quickly as possible and WHO wishes to continue to provide assistance to the nation.

Minister Dr Kyaw Myint said that Myanmar thanked WHO for its medical equipment and technological assistance in relief and rehabilitation of storm-ravaged regions, and that in reconstruction of health establishments, durable buildings were built in accord with the guidance of the Head of State.

In his speech, Minister Dr Kyaw Myint said that hospitals, dispensaries and health care centres were destroyed in the storm on 3 May 2008, and the storm also left health staff homeless. And Myanmar thanked ministries of health of ASEAN nations and neighbouring countries for their participation in the relief and rehabilitation tasks.

On 11 September, the 61st Regional Committee's meeting continued and those present approved Nepal as a host nation to hold the 27th Health Ministers' meeting and the 62nd Regional Committee's meeting, and Thailand as a host nation to hold the 28th Health Ministers' meeting and the 63rd Regional Committee's meeting.

Natchaung Villagers in Kalay Township enjoy fruits of development

Natchaung Village, the largest village in Kalay Township of Sagaing Division, is home to 5,250 people of 1,225 houses. In 2008, it was upgraded as a model village.

In the past, Natchaung Village lagged behind in development. The village can now be proud of the library, the youth centre, the park and playground, the fire brigade and tower, paddy husk fired power generator and rural market in addition to Basic Education High School Branch, station hospital, railway station, post office and telephone booth. Now, development momentum of the village is in high tempo.

The village and its surrounding areas are provided with better transport. As part of daily transport services, trains are on the Kalay-Gangaw, the Kalay-Natchaung, the Kalay-

Hanthawady and the Kalay-Mwele runs. In addition to the transport service of three-wheeler taxis, buses are running along Kalay-Natchaung road. The Kalay-Natchaung-Gangaw road can be used all the year round. In the rainy season, the local people of Natchaung Village can make trips with the use of express buses along Kalay-Mandalay-Monywa road.

Natchaung Village is located at the foot of Chin Hill, 15 miles from Kalay. The distance between Natchaung Village and Falam of Chin State is 54 miles and four furlongs. The village is 82 miles and four furlongs far from Gangaw. Natchaung Village links with Ngapha Village along a two-mile village tarred road, and a 15-mile-long tarred road lies between Natchaung Village and Kalay.

Apart from transport services of vehicles, three-wheeler motorbikes and trains, the people can

travel to Gangaw and Kalay from Natchaung Village by motorized boat along the waterway in Myittha River. Natchaung Village was first established with 21 houses in 1258 Myanmar Era by village head U Yan Naing. After 100 years in 1358 ME the number of houses at the village reached 1,110. In 2008, there are 1,225 houses at the village.

The residents of the village have joined the social organizations. There are 3,505 members of the Union Solidarity and Development Association, 300 members of Women's Affairs Organization, 65 members of Maternal and Child Welfare Association, 35 members of Red Cross Society, 35 members of local Auxiliary Fire Brigade and 35 members of the people's militia group. Those members of social organizations are actively taking part in the development works of the village.

In Natchaung Village, fly-proof latrines were built. For ensuring availability of potable water, there are 344 wells including tube-wells and artesian wells. Out of 1,683 acres of farmlands, 428 acres of farmlands in the south of the village were supplied with water from Panmun Creek, 68 acres of farmlands also supplied with water from Chaungchawk Creek and 1,195 acres in the irrigated area of private dams.

The residents are engaged in cultivation of lentil, groundnut, sunflower, sesame, maize, pumpkin and cucumber plantations on both banks of Myittha River, east of the village. Every day, seasonal crops are available at Natchaung rural market that was constructed with four buildings accommodating 140 shops. Even shopkeepers and customers from Kalay can be seen at the

said market. At present, local people get electricity generated by one government-owned 12 KVA generator, three private-owned hydro-power turbines, nine private-run diesel generators and one 200 KVA paddy husk fired power generator. At night, all the houses and streets in the village are illuminated.

So far, one BEHS Branch and three boarding schools have produced many students who passed the matriculation examinations and degree-holders yearly.

In the health sector, six health staff from the station hospital (16-bed) are providing health care services to the villagers. Over K 2 million have been donated to the medical trust fund of the hospital.

The communication centre of the village was set up with one post office and a self-reliant telephone

station. The village telephone station was installed with three auto-telephones and over 200 hand-carrier telephones not only for the local calls but also for the overseas calls daily.

With regard to the agriculture sector, a total of 3,832 acres of farmlands are put under monsoon paddy, monsoon sesame, pigeon pea, lentil, groundnut, sunflower, corn and maize.

In addition, over 50 acres of physic nut plantations are being nurtured for producing bio-fuel.

In the time of the State Peace and Development Council, remarkable progress can be seen day after day in Natchaung Model Village in southern part of Kalay Township that is home to local farmers.

Afghanistan: US killed civilians after false tip

KABUL, 14 Sept—An American bombing that killed up to 90 Afghan civilians last month was based on false information provided by a rival tribe and did not kill a single Taliban fighter, the president's spokesman said Sunday.

The claim contradicted a US contention that the 22 Aug raid on the western village of Azizabad killed up to 35 Taliban fighters.

"There was total misinformation fed to the coalition forces," Humayun Hamidzada, the spokesman for President Hamid Karzai, told *The Associated Press*.

Afghan police arrested three suspects accused of giving the US military false intelligence that led to the

bombardment, the Interior Ministry has said.

An Afghan government commission found that up to 90 civilians were killed, including 60 children, a finding backed by a preliminary UN report.

The bombing strained the US-Afghan relationship but the countries remain committed allies, Hamidzada said.

The operation, conducted by US Special Forces and Afghan soldiers, targeted Afghan employees of a British security firm and their family members — the reason the US military recovered weapons after the battle, Hamidzada said.

US military reports death of soldier in Iraq

BAGHDAD, 14 Sept—The US military says an American soldier in Iraq has died of causes unrelated to combat.

The military says the cause of the death Sunday is under investigation.

The name of the soldier is being withheld, pending notification of his family and an announcement by the US Department of Defense.—*Internet*

Alleged US spy killed in Pakistan's tribal region

ISLAMABAD, 14 Sept—An Afghan man accused of spying for the United States was killed by militants in Pakistan's tribal region of North Waziristan, according to local press reports Sunday.

The private *NNI* news agency quoted witnesses as saying that the bullet-ridden body of Gul Rahim Shah was found in North Waziristan, and it was believed to be a hideout for al Qaeda and the Taliban.

A note in the native Pashto language was found near the body of the slain man, said that he was spying for the United States and Afghanistan.

The note warned that anyone spying for the US or Afghanistan would face the same situation.

Obama raises \$66 mln in August for White House race

WASHINGTON, 14 Sept—US Democratic presidential nominee Barack Obama has raised a total of 66 million US dollars in August, when he was officially nominated at the party's national convention, his campaign said on Sunday.

The figure made last month another record fundraising month for the Illinois Senator after he raised 55 million dollars in February during the

primary season.

According to his campaign, his new record was made thanks to more than a half million new donors in the month, leaving him with more than 77 million dollars in cash on hand.

On the other hand, his Republican presidential rival, John McCain raised about 47 million dollars in August.

With no more than two months left before the

November election day, the two presidential candidates are chasing each other in the numbers of voters and campaign fund.

Obama has earlier given up public financing for the general election, and chosen to finance his campaign with donation from his supporters, while McCain accepted public financing with a limit of his direct spending at 84 million dollars.—*Internet*

Chemical plant blasts in N-E China

SHENYANG, 14 Sept—An explosion occurred in a petrochemical plant in northeast China's Liaoning Province at 5:46 am on Sunday, the provincial general fire brigade confirmed, but there was no immediate report on casualties.

The blast in Jianshanzi Village, Luodatai Town of Dengta City could even be heard in a county 40 kilometres away. Dengta City is under the administration of Liaoyang City. The blaze was basically brought under control at around 7:30 after more than 30 fire engines rushed to the scene, the fire brigade said.—*Internet*

Death toll from Cairo rock slide rises to 82

CAIRO, 14 Sept—The death toll from a rock fall that buried dozens of homes in a Cairo shanty town last week rose to at least 82 people, with 54 injured, security officials said on Saturday. The officials said rescue workers pulled out

the corpses of Halima Mohamed, and her three-year-old daughter Habiba on Saturday.

Rescue workers backed by bulldozers and jack hammers prepared to work on a huge boulder that crushed four homes in the

shanty town on the eastern edge of Cairo. One official put the death toll at 84 and said rescue workers have a lot more rubble to shift. Rescue services have not pulled out any survivors since the face of a cliff fell on the houses.—*Internet*

MANILA, 14 Sept—An explosion rocked a public market in a southern Philippine town in Sarangani province on Sunday noon, local media reported. No casualties have been reported so far as market vendors in Kiamba town were off around noon time, local news network

GMA News said.

The report quoted the town mayor as saying that the blast was likely caused by an improvised explosive device.

Another explosion occurred at another public market in Isulan town of neighboring Sultan Kudarat at predawn

Tuesday. Another explosive was discovered by government troops planted near a bakery in another southern Philippine city this week.

Military officials said local rebels had a motive of sowing terror by planting the explosives in the public.—*Internet*

Germany rejects EU economy stimulus proposals

NICE(France), 14 Sept — German Finance Minister Peer Steinbrueck warned here Friday that a proposed European Union stimulus plan to reactivate the EU economy would mean waste of money.

Steinbrueck told reporters before attending a two-day informal meeting of European Union finance ministers in Nice, France, that he would prefer economic reforms rather than a major spending pro-

gramme to reactivate Germany's economy, the largest in Europe.

The German minister has repeatedly rejected easing fiscal discipline despite that the EU commission says his country's economy falls into recession.

Other EU states are ready to spend billions to spur economic growth in the face of falling tax revenues.

US Air Force nuclear mission needs overhaul

WASHINGTON, 14 Sept —The US Air Force has taken adequate steps to prevent new security lapses in its nuclear arsenal but damage to US credibility from earlier blunders has not been repaired, officials said on Friday.

I have confidence that the short-term problems ... have been addressed," Defence Secretary Robert Gates told reporters after receiving an initial report on nuclear security by a

special Pentagon task force set up to examine the handling of the nuclear arsenal.

Gates was speaking at a briefing three months after he fired the Air Force leadership in an unprecedented move over a string of blunders including the mistaken shipment of nuclear fuses to Taiwan and the flight of nuclear weapons across the continental United States. "I won't be completely assured until all of the corrective measures have been taken," Gates said. "We are still on the path to remediation when it comes to the other longer-term issues."

The task force he established at the same time under former Defence Secretary James Schlesinger issued a report on Friday recommending the Air Force consolidate its disparate nuclear missions into a single command.

Large fire hits Mexico gas pipeline in accident

CUAUTITLAN IZCALLI, 14 Sept — A Mexican gas pipeline caught fire on Friday in an accident near the capital, sending flames more than 100 feet into the air and closing a main highway into the city.

Two men were injured at the fire in the industrial town of Cuautitlan Izcalli, a civil protection official told Reuters.

Authorities believe construction workers accidentally pierced the pipeline while they laid foundations for a bridge nearby. "Two valves (feeding the pipeline) have been closed and flames are dying out," the official said.

State energy company Pemex said a private company operated the line. —MNA/Reuters

Chile, Russia agree to promote bilateral trade

SANTIAGO, 14 Sept — Chile and Russia have agreed to create a special work group to promote bilateral trade and economic cooperation, Chilean authorities said Friday.

One of the focuses of the group is to identify development potentials of the production sectors of both countries, said Carlos Furche, international economic affairs director of the Foreign Ministry.

The group will begin functioning in January 2009, Furche said after the closing ceremony of the Third Inter-governmental Meeting of the Chilean-Russian Commission of Commerce and Cooperation in Moscow.

It will seek alternatives to facilitate bilateral trade and "remove, if necessary, the duty obstacles to development and growth of the commercial links" between the two countries, Furche said.

The group will also work to promote phytosanitary cooperation between both countries and better understanding of the juridical and institutional norms in Chile and Russia regarding commercial issues.

Gunshot victim sues to get prosthetic leg back

After being shot five times last weekend, a western Nebraska man had to go to court to get his prosthetic leg back from prosecutors. The Box Butte County Attorney's office gave Val McCabe's leg back Wednesday after a judge ordered it returned. McCabe, 58, shot during a roadside incident on Friday, was listed in good condition at a hospital in Scottsbluff. Prosecutors wanted to run tests on the leg and the bullet lodged inside.

McCabe, who lost his leg below the knee in a railroad accident roughly 30 years ago, filed his lawsuit Tuesday. McCabe lawyer argued it wasn't practical for him to replace the specially built, \$28,000.

Man accused of making license plate 'disappear'

New York authorities didn't see this one coming. The Port Authority of New York and New Jersey says the driver of a tractor-trailer rigged the front license plate of his vehicle so that it would "disappear" as he drove through a toll plaza, allowing him to avoid paying the \$40 fee.

The Port Authority said driver Orlando Payano ran a cable from the license plate to the dashboard cigarette lighter inside the cab of the vehicle.

Pulling on the lighter flipped the plate under the truck. Cameras are used to capture images of license plates to identify fare beaters.

Mountain jumper survives crash after chute problem

A Norwegian BASE jumper said he learned a hard lesson about tempting fate after surviving a spine-chilling crash from a mile-high mountain.

Video captured by a camera attached to Hans Lange's specially designed jump suit showed him struggling to straighten out his parachute before slamming into a rock wall and crashing into a tree top. He survived with a broken leg.

"I was too nonchalant and there is no room for mistakes in this sport," Lange, 44, told The Associated Press on Thursday.

The accident happened 23 Aug, as the

experienced BASE jumper leapt off the 1,600-meter- (5,250-foot-) high Bjoerketind peak.

Lange said he was flying down the mountainside at nearly 180 kph (110 mph) when he realized he was too close to the wall.

He deployed his chute and tried to steer away from the wall, but it was too late. The video showed Lange crying out in pain as he bumped into the rock repeatedly while trying to untangle the chords.

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China vows better food safety after baby milk scandal

BEIJING, 14 Sept — China vowed Sunday to improve its food safety supervision after confirming 432 babies suffered from kidney stones and at least one died after drinking contaminated milk powder.

An efficient system should be set up to combine efforts of various ministries and bring food safety supervision "to a new level", Xinhua news agency reported, citing Health Minister Gao Qiang.

Gao said Saturday that kidney stones had been found in 432 babies nationwide since China was rattled by its most recent product quality scandal.

The number was sharply up from figures reported earlier which put the number of affected babies at about 150, with one dead. Kidney stones are rare in babies and can block their urinary tracts.

The State Administration of Industry and Commerce, an agency in charge of enforcing discipline in the marketplace, issued a strongly worded statement calling for thorough inspections of sales outlets for baby milk powder.—Internet

Tourist boat sinks in Paris killing man and child

PARIS, 14 Sept — A 6-year-old child and a man have died in hospital after they were trapped in a tourist boat that sank on the River Seine in the heart of Paris, police said on Sunday.

The accident took place on Saturday night at the Pont de l'Archeveche, a bridge that connects the tip of the Ile de la Cite, where Notre Dame cathedral is located, to the Left Bank of the river.

Ten other passengers on the small boat jumped into the river before it sank and were quickly fished out.

Divers pulled the child and man from inside the sunken boat minutes after the sinking and rescuers tried to resuscitate them, but police said the attempts failed. The nationalities of the victims were not known.

The boat was raised from the riverbed during the night, police said. It will be used in investigations into the cause of the accident, which was unclear.

Authorities first said the boat had hit a pillar of the bridge, but later said it was possible though not certain it had hit a "bateau-mouche," one of the long flat-bottomed barge-like boats that carry hundreds of tourists up and down the river.—Internet

More than 5,000 first-aid volunteers trained for natural disaster in Nepal

KATHMANDU, 14 Sept — The Nepal Red Cross Society (NRCS) said that it had trained adequate manpower to provide first-aid services whenever the need arose, The Rising Nepal reported on Sunday.

According to the state-run daily, the NRCS has groomed 4,702 first-aid volunteers and 330 trainers in 48 districts of the country so far to carry out relief work at the time of disaster.

These trained volunteers are capable, skillful and equipped with all means if any kind of natural disaster and incident takes place in the country, Basanta Shrestha, senior officer of the First Aid Section at the NRCS said at a press meeting organized on the occasion of the World First Aid Day-2008 program here on Saturday.

Shrestha said currently the district chapter volunteers of the Red Cross Society in Nepal were also providing humanitarian aid as well as distributing food packages to the displaced people affected by floods in some areas in the country. He said that nearly 350 volunteers have been deployed to assist and provide medical as well as first aid services to the sick people of Saptari and Sunsari districts affected by the Koshi floods in eastern Nepal.

The society is marking the World First Aid Day by organizing various programs such as national level first aid competition, rally, mock demonstration of first aid service, and first aid training within 15 minutes.

Study shows compound could reduce heart attack damage

WASHINGTON, 14 Sept — US researchers said they have identified a protein that reduces the extent of heart damage in rats undergoing a heart attack, according to a report in the September 12 issue of *Journal Science*.

If the compound works the same way in humans, this research may suggest a way to help protect patients during coronary bypass surgery or other events in which the heart does not receive enough blood, said *Science*.

Many forms of heart disease begin with so-called “ischemic events”, which result in the accumulation of toxic

metabolites that cause irreversible tissue damage. Studying rodent models, the research team at Stanford University found that an enzyme called ALDH2 was consistently activated in hearts that were the most resistant to ischemia-induced damage.

In a rat heart attack model, administering a compound that activated ALDH2 before the ischemic insult led to a reduction in the extent of heart damage, an effect most likely due to decreased formation of cell-damaging aldehydes, said the researchers.

Spicy food may have killed British bride in India, says doctor

NEW DELHI, 14 Sept — A British bride who died ten days after marrying a local man in India may have been killed by asthma provoked by eating spicy food, her doctor was quoted as saying Sunday.

Charlotte Bending, a 24-year-old mother of two, wed Jitender Singh in the northern Indian state of Haryana after they had met while working together in Plymouth, England, the Times of India reported.

She died on September 8 after she complained of a sore throat and collapsed, her doctor Bharat Bhushan was quoted as saying.

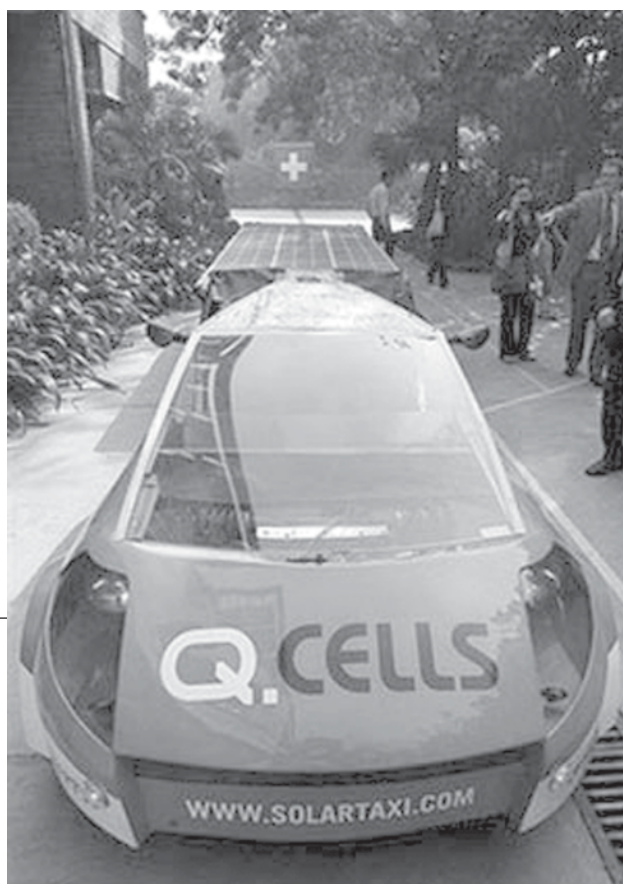
“Charlotte was an asthmatic and had visited my place three times

before this incident. Three days before she fell ill, she had lots of spicy food which she couldn’t digest,” he told the newspaper.

TB drug shows promise against latent bacteria

WASHINGTON, 14 Sept — A new study has shown that an investigational drug R207910, currently in clinical trials against multi-drug resistant tuberculosis strains, is quite effective at killing latent bacteria, a report said on Friday.

This revelation suggests that R207910 may lead to improved and shortened treatments for this globally prevalent disease, researchers from Johnson & Johnson reported in the September 12 issue of *Journal of Biological Chemistry*.

Despite numerous treatment advances, tuberculosis (TB) remains a serious disease—fuelled by co-infection of HIV patients, the rise of drug-resistant strains, and the ability of Mycobacterium

tuberculosis to become dormant and linger in the lungs. People can be infected, asymptotically, with latent TB and is at risk of developing active TB disease during their life time.

The research team tested R207910 on dormant M. tuberculosis in three different laboratory models of latency. R207910 targets a protein essential for making cellular energy (ATP) in actively replicating TB.

They reasoned that even dormant bacteria, which are essentially physiologically “turned off”, still need to produce small quantities of ATP to survive. As such, a block in ATP synthesis might be vital for killing dormant bacteria.— *MNA/Xinhua*

Nigeria militants order oil workers to leave delta

ABUJA, 14 Sept— Nigeria’s most prominent militant group on Saturday warned oil companies in the restive Niger Delta to

withdraw their workers in the next 24 hours after a gunbattle with security forces.

The Movement for the Emancipation of the Niger Delta (MEND), responsible for attacks that have cut more than a fifth of the OPEC member’s oil output, threatened to retaliate against oil workers after at least three people were killed in fighting between security forces and militants in Tombia in Rivers state.

“Oil companies are warned to move out their workers within the next 24 hours because a hurricane is about to sweep through oil installations in the entire Niger Delta region,” MEND said in an emailed statement.

Royal Dutch Shell,

ExxonMobil, Total, Eni and Chevron are among the numerous oil companies that operate in the Niger Delta, the main source of Nigeria’s two million barrels per day output.— *MNA/Reuters*

About 10,000 Filipino kids die of diarrhoea every year

MANILA, 14 Sept — Around 10,000 Filipino children die of diarrhoea every year, according to local media on Saturday.

Over the past seven years, some 70,000 children were killed by diarrhoea, the fourth-leading cause of death among Filipino children younger than five years old, the *Manila Times* reported, citing data from the World Health Organization (WHO) and the Philippines’ Department of Health. With incidence nearly double those of other Southeast Asian and East Asian countries, the health department said that the Philippines is now one of the most seriously-affected among 13 countries included in the study in terms of the number of reported diarrhoea cases.

The study said that some 1.5 million children younger than the age of five suffer from diarrhoea because of lack of access to clean water and basic sanitation facilities and poor hygienic practices.— *MNA/Xinhua*

While the focus has been on the Middle East, sales extend to northern Africa, Asia, Latin America, Europe and Canada, the *Times* said.

“This is not about being

gunrunners,” the *Times* quoted Bruce Lemkin, the Air Force deputy undersecretary who has coordinated many of the largest sales, as saying. “This is about building a more secure world.”

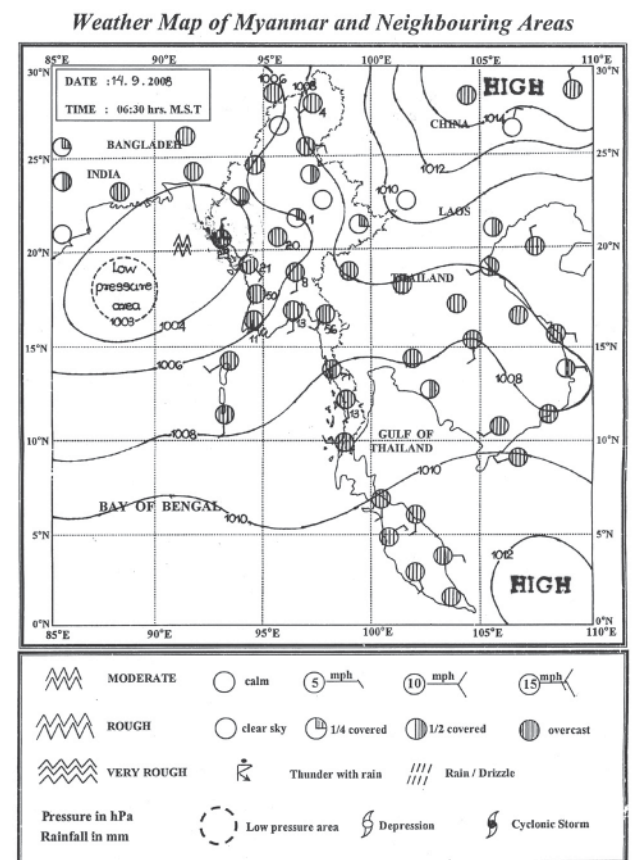
In the past two years, Iraq has signed agreements worth more than three billion US dollars, and also said it planned to buy as much as seven billion US dollars more in US equipment, the *Times* said. Over the past three years, Washington, the world’s top arms supplier, had agreed to buy more than 10 billion US dollars in military equipment and weapons on behalf of Afghanistan, according to Defence Department records, the newspaper said.

Passenger plane crashes in Russia’s Urals, 88 killed

Moscow, 14 Sept— A passenger plane with 88 people on board crashed in Russia’s Ural region and all people aboard were believed to have been killed, Russian news agencies reported Sunday, quoting emergency authorities.

The Boeing-737 jet

went down at about 3 am (2300 GMT Saturday) Sunday in a patch of wasteland on the outskirts of the Russian city of Perm in the central Ural mountains, the Itar-Tass news agency said.

“The plane flew from Moscow to Perm at 01:10 Moscow time on Sunday

(2110 GMT, Saturday), and in two hours, as it was approaching to land, the communication with it was lost at an altitude of 1,800 meters,” Itar-Tass quoted a spokeswoman of the country’s emergency ministry.

The plane, operated by Russia’s leading Aeroflot airline, was believed to have caught fire and exploded before falling, said the spokeswoman Irina Andrianova.

“The airplane was found within the city’s limits in a deserted area” and all passengers as well as crew members were killed, she said. —Internet

But Spanish international Torres remained on

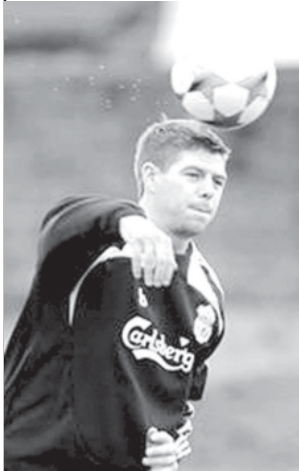
