## 16 die in attack on US Embassy in Yemen

BEIRUT (Lebanon), 17 Sept—Heavily armed militants opened fire on the United States Embassy in Sana, Yemen, on Wednesday and detonated a car bomb at its gates, in an attack that left at least 16 people dead including six of the attackers, Yemeni officials said.

Yemeni security

officials and witnesses said the death toll was at least 16, including four bystanders, one of them an Indian woman. The other dead were six attackers and six security guards, the Yemeni officials said, speaking in return for anonymity because they were not authorized to brief reporters.

a poor south Arabian country of 22 million where militants aligned with Al Qaeda have carried out a number of recent strikes.

The attack began when a car raced up to the heavily fortified embassy compound. Several attackers got out and began firing rocket-propelled grenades and automatic rifles at the guards who returned the fire, the Yemeni official said.

A second car then drove into the compound's gate and exploded in what appeared to be a suicide bombing, the official said.

Ryan Gliha, an embassy spokesman, said via e-mail that the attack took place at 9:15 am. The embassy would remain closed for now, he said, but gave no further details.

## New General Assembly President calls for democratization of United Nations

NEW YORK, 17 Sept—The new President of the General Assembly today kicked off the 63rd session of the 192-member forum with a call to democratize the United Nations so that it can deal more effectively with the world's most pressing problems and ensure that the voices of a few do not overwhelm the views of the majority of others.

Miguel D'Escoto Brockmann, a former

foreign minister of Nicaragua, pledged in his opening address to the session to dedicate his year as President to representing the interests of "the dispossessed of the world" and fostering solidarity between peoples and Member States.

"The central and overarching objective of this... [session] will be to democratize our United Nations. In so doing we will ensure that the United

Nations maintains its place as the world's most important and indispensable Organization for achieving the levels of peace and security that our peoples are so rightly demanding of us."

Mr D'Escoto noted he would try to transform what he labelled "the prevailing exclusionary logic of selfishness" in the world, saying it had crippled the ability of the General Assembly to fulfil

Reform of the 15-member Council was among the most urgent challenges facing the UN, he noted.

## Three dead from tainted milk

BEIJING, 17 Sept — More than 6,200 babies have been sickened by tainted milk formula and dozens of infants are suffering from acute kidney failure, China's health minister said Wednesday as the death toll rose to three children.

Health Minister Chen Zhu said he expected the numbers of affected babies to increase as "more and more parents take kids to the hospital."

Also Wednesday, the country's two largest dairy companies, Mengniu Dairy Co and Yili Industrial Group Co, were among the companies forced to recall baby formula. In addition, Guangdong-based Yashili and Qingdao-based Suncare recalled their tainted milk powder, which is exported to five countries in Africa and Asia: Bangladesh, Yemen, Gabon, Burundi and Myanmar.

So far, all the sick infants in China were found to have consumed milk powder produced by the company at the heart of the crisis, Sanlu Group Co, Chen said. Most babies developed urinary problems, including kidney stones, after consuming Sanlu milk powder for three to six months, he said.

Sanlu's general manager Tian Wenhua, who was fired a day earlier, was detained by police Wednesday, the Xinhua news agency said. Four milk suppliers have been arrested.

Suppliers to the dairy companies are believed to have added the banned chemical, normally used in plastics, to watered-down milk to make it appear higher in protein. Inspectors will now start testing for melamine in all dairy products, Li said.

In a sign of the government's concern, Premier Wen



Jiabao presided over a meeting Wednesday of China's Cabinet to back plans for a national inspection of milk products, according to a notice on the government's Web site.

China's health minister said that 6,244 babies fell ill after being fed tainted milk formula, and that 158 were suffering from acute kidney failure. Chen reported the death of a third baby in eastern Zhejiang province but gave no details. The two earlier deaths had been reported in Gansu province. Currently, 1,327 children, mostly newborns, remain hospitalized.

Sanlu company officials as well as government officials share the blame for delays in reporting the contamination, said Hebei Deputy Governor Yang Chongyong, who spoke on the sidelines of the Press conference.—Internet

KABUL, 17 Sept— Four service members of the US-led Coalition forces and one Afghan national were killed in a bomb blast Wednesday morning in eastern Afghanistan, the US-led military said.—Internet

## 'US raid' kills four in Pakistan

ISLAMABAD, 17 Sept—At least four people have been killed after a US drone fired missiles at a village in the north-west of Pakistan, local intelligence officials said.

The officials said missiles hit the village of Baghar in South Waziristan region, close to the Afghan border. The missiles are reported to have struck a militant training camp.

The attack comes as the top US military commander met Pakistani officials to discuss increasing tensions over US attacks along the border.

At least three people were injured in the attack, a security official said.—Internet

## Iraq: 15 killed in attacks

BAGHDAD, 17 Sept— Bombs and shootings have killed at least 15 people in Iraq, police said Wednesday, as an Iraqi spokesman pointed to progress in limiting violence in one restive province northeast of the capital.

Two car bombs exploded in quick succession near each other in western Baghdad on Wednesday morning, killing eight people and wounding 20, a police officer said. He spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to speak to the media.

In downtown Baghdad, a roadside bomb at an intersection killed three people and wounded six, police said. Two traffic policemen were among the dead.

In an attack on Tuesday night, gunmen in the northern city of Kirkuk opened fire on a car, killing three civilians and injuring another, said Brig Sarhad Qadir, the head of Kirkuk police.

Also Tuesday night, a car bomb killed Muhanned Abdul-Jabbar, a senior official with a US-backed group of Sunni fighters in Ramadi, west of Baghdad. It detonated when he left his house after dinner, police said.—Internet

## Explosive attacks kill seven, injure 80 in Mexico

MEXICO CITY, 17 Sept—At least seven people died and 80 were injured during two explosions at the celebration of the Independence Day in a square of the city of Morelia in the Mexican state of Michoacan, authorities said on Tuesday.

The attacks occurred Monday night and these are the first attacks addressed against civilians inside the violence wave in the country.

Morelia is capital of Michoacan and is located 242 kilometres from Mexico City, Michoacan is one of the states most devastated by the drug trafficking and kidnapping.

The Justice Prosecutor Office of Michoacan said on Tuesday that nobody has adjudged the attacks.

The explosions occurred when Michoacan's governor Leonel Godoy was heading the local celebration of Mexican Independence Day.

Meanwhile, Mexican President Felipe Calderon expressed his repudiation to the attacks on Morelia.

## Russia slams NATO for "Cold War" visit to Georgia

MOSCOW, 17 Sept—A visit to Georgia by senior NATO officials this week was anti-Russian and showed the alliance is driven by Cold War-style thinking, Russia's Foreign Ministry said on Wednesday.

"Decisions taken... confirmed that in NATO, the Cold War-era reflexes of 'them and us' are at work once again," a statement said.

"We cannot view steps to intensify relations between the alliance and Georgia any other way than as encouragement for new adventures... We believe the alliance's session in Tbilisi in the current conditions was not timely and does not help stabilization in the region."

The statement said the visit showed an anti-Russian tendency because NATO officials only

viewed war damage inside Georgia, and not in the breakaway region of South Ossetia, which Georgian troops had tried to retake.

NATO Secretary-General Jaap de Hoop Scheffer this week led a session in Tbilisi of the North Atlantic Council, the alliance's highest political decision-making body, and an inaugural session of a Georgia-NATO commission.

## Nigerian oil rebels hit new Shell facility

LAGOS, 17 Sept—A Nigerian militant group said Wednesday it acted with a new ally to stage an attack which destroyed a Royal Dutch Shell oil flow station in the African nation's main producing region.

As with other attacks since the Movement for the Emancipation of the Niger Delta (MEND) de-

clared an "oil war" on Sunday, the rebels moved in with speed boats, dynamite and hand grenades, the Army said.

MEND also released two South African hostages on Tuesday night, the Army said.

The attack on the Orubiri flow station was the third on a Shell target in 48 hours. US major

Chevron has also been targeted this week.

MEND said in a statement sent to media that this time that it had attacked with another armed group, the Niger Delta Volunteer Force (NDVF).

"About 2200 (2100 GMT) on Tuesday, 16 September, 2008, fighters from MEND and the NDVF in a new alliance attacked and destroyed the Orubiri flow station," MEND said.

The Army confirmed the attack.

## China renews call to tackle young people's health problems

BEIJING, 17 Sept—China has renewed call to step up efforts in tackling the young people's health problems including short sight and obesity here on Tuesday.

Both education and school authorities should ramp up efforts to help students develop a healthy way of life, said Education Minister Zhou Ji, adding special efforts should be made on the prevention of short sight.

Health Minister Chen Zhu urged health authorities at all levels to beef up measures to help monitor and provide scientific nutrition formula for the young people.

Both ministers made their remarks when attending a national teleconference on schools' health work held here Tuesday.

Short sight and obesity are the most common health problems for the Chinese young people.

A survey conducted in 2006 shows that more than three quarters of senior high students in the country are short sighted and the figure for college students hit 83 percent.

## Officials say two killed in north Lebanon violence

BEIRUT (Lebanon), 17 Sept—Security officials say a gunfight between two rival Christian groups has left two people dead and three wounded in northern Lebanon. They say the clash between the anti-Syrian Lebanese Forces and pro-Syrian Marada group took place

early Wednesday in the village of Bsarma in the northern district of Koura. The officials say a member of each group was killed.

The clashes were triggered by a disagreement over hanging rival posters. They say the three wounded are a policeman and two members of the

Lebanese Forces.

The officials spoke on condition of anonymity because they are not authorized to speak to the media.

The clash comes a day after Lebanon's rival politicians began a national dialogue in which they agreed on easing tension.

## Chinese tourists can head for Israel

BEIJING, 17 Sept—Good news for adventurous Chinese travellers, they can now sign up for tours of Israel, after the China-Israel Memorandum of Understanding on tourism came into effect on Monday.

The first Israel-bound Chinese tour group will depart in two batches from Beijing on 25 and 28 September. The 80-person group will visit Jerusalem and the Dead Sea during their 10-day trip. The price for the journey is 28,000 yuan, higher than the price of most trips to the United States. Israel is preparing for the Chinese tourists by providing Chinese-language brochures and the local tourism industry has also recruited people who can speak Chinese. —Internet

## Russian Gov't puts in \$18 bl to support liquidity

Moscow, 17 Sept—The Russian Finance Ministry and the Central Bank have thrown into the financial market a total of 475 billion rubles (18.62 billion US dollars) to support liquidity and are considering further steps, Prime Minister Putin said on Tuesday.

The Finance Ministry has put in 150 billion rubles (5.88 billion US dol-

lars) and the Central Bank 325 billion rubles (12.74 billion US dollars), *Interfax* news agency cited Putin during a meeting with visiting Azeri President Ilham Aliyev in Moscow.

“The Finance Ministry plans to more than double this sum and offer 350 billion rubles tomorrow,” Putin was quoted as saying, noting that the Rus-

sian economy is under the influence of the global financial crisis.

The Russian stock market plunged on Tuesday with the benchmark Russian Trading System (RTS) index down 146.48 points, or 11.47 percent, to 1131.12 and the Moscow Interbank Currency Exchange (MICEX) index fell 17.45 percent to 881.17 points.

## T-Mobile's Google phone to be unveiled 23 Sept

BEIJING, 17 Sept—T-Mobile Wednesday announced that its first wireless phone powered by Google Inc's Android software system will be unveiled at a news conference in New York on 23 Sept.

In an invitation, T-Mobile said that attendees will “witness the official unveiling of the first Android-powered phone from T-Mobile.”

The Google phone, which is manufactured by HTC and called “Dream,” won't go on sale until October, according to US media report.

Though T-Mobile has not divulged any key details about the shipping date and pricing, some Web-based reports already put the tag around 400 US dollars for the “Dream,” saying more than 600,000 units will be under preparation for shipping.

The Android phone is positioned to compete with Apple's iPhone and Research In Motion's BlackBerry.

The “Dream” will combine an iPhone-style touchscreen with a swivel-out QWERTY-style keypad.

It will also boast what's being called a “jog ball,” believed to be BlackBerry-like trackball navigation tool, and an accelerometer similar to the one found in the iPhone. —Xinhua

## Thai parlt elects Somchai Wongsawat as premier

Bangkok, 17 Sept—Somchai Wongsawat was elected as Thailand's 26th Prime Minister with 298 votes in a voting in the House of Representatives Wednesday.

Somchai, deputy leader of People Power Party, was supported by the PPP and the other five coalition parties in the caretaker government. His nomination, agreed by PPP party executives on Monday, was earlier boycotted by a fraction of 73 PPP MPs, called “Friends of Newin” who were loyal to Newin Chidchob, former executive of the now defunct Thai Rak Thai Party (TRT).

On Tuesday, the PPP reached reconciliation as the Newin fraction agreed

to accept Somchai to become the next premier.

Sixty-one-year-old Somchai has long-time experience in judicial field, serving as judge for more than 20 years. He was permanent secretary

of the Justice Ministry from 1999 to 2006, during the Chuan Leekpai and then the Thaksin Shinwatra administrations, then became permanent secretary for the Labour Ministry.—Xinhua

## Cambodian PM hopes Prince Ranariddh to return home from Malaysia

PHNOM PENH, 17 Sept—Cambodian Prime Minister Hun Sen said Wednesday that he wanted self-exiled Prince Norodom Ranariddh to return home from Malaysia in the traditional Pchum Ben festival falling on 29 Sept.

“My intention needs the Prince to come back to have reconciliation for our nation and myself also want to do a good charity in the festival,” Hun Sen said at a graduation ceremony at the National Institute of Education.

“The Prince and I used to have verbal attack but now it is over,” he said, adding that Ranariddh needs pardon from the King. Ranariddh, who left Cambodia last year under a cloud of legal problems, is living in Malaysia. —Xinhua

## Two French hostages freed by French army in Somalia

PARIS, 17 Sept—Two French nationals who had been held hostage by Somali pirates for two weeks were freed by French Army on Monday, French President Nicolas Sarkozy announced Tuesday at a Press conference in the Presidential palace l'Elysee. A 30-man French military commando carried out the operation on Monday where they overpowered the Somali pirates, leading to the death of one pirate and the capture of six others, according to him.

Sarkozy thanked Germany and Malaysia, among other countries, for their support to the operation.—Xinhua

## Expert: Rebalancing global economy means more energy to developing economies

LONDON, 17 Sept—A profound rebalancing of the global economy requires increasing levels of energy and amounts of raw materials for developing countries, Pierre Gadonneix, head of World Energy Council said here on Tuesday.

Speaking at the opening ceremony of the two-day FT-WEC Energy Leaders Summit, the WEC chairman said: “The IMF estimates that by 2012, developing countries will be producing more than 50 percent of global growth, which

requires increasing levels of energy and amounts of raw materials for developing countries to support their growth.”

This shift is so rapid that it has created lasting tensions on energy prices because capacity has not kept up with demand, the WEC chief said.

Each day there are 200,000 more people on the earth, and these people want to live a better life than their parents, which helps make energy demands to increase by up to 50 percent between now and 2030, Gadnon-

neix said.

Higher prices have placed the least developed countries and people with the lowest income in a strange hold, he said, adding that rising energy prices are increasing inequality globally and locally, drawing sharp lines between those who do have access to energy and those who do not.

Though quantities are not limitless, Gadonneix said, we can push back the limits through appropriate use of technological advances.

## Medvedev says Russia will not change economic course

Moscow, 17 Sept—Russian President Dmitry Medvedev said on Monday there would be no change to Kremlin economic policy after the conflict in Georgia and called for more Russian money to be invested in domestic financial markets.

Medvedev, speaking to the country's most influential businessmen, said Russia still wanted to join the World Trade Organization but would only do so on acceptable terms.

"All the priorities of the development of our country are being preserved. No one should count on a change in direction," Medvedev said.

"Despite what happened in August... despite the military solution, nothing in the principles of economic policy will be changed."—MNA/Reuters

## Trial of German warcrimes suspect, 90, begins

MUNICH (Germany), 17 Sept—A 90-year-old German World War II officer, accused of ordering the killing 13 Italians in 1944, went on trial on Monday in what could prove one of the last cases of its kind. Infantry commander Josef Scheungraber is accused of ordering the killing of 13 Italian civilians while serving in Tuscany in June 1944. The killing is believed to have been in

retaliation for an attack by Italian partisans in which two German soldiers were killed. "The trial concerns the murder of innocent civilians who were not directly involved in the war," Anton Winkler, senior public prosecutor of the Munich District court, said. In September 2006, Scheungraber was sentenced in absentia to life imprisonment by an Italian military tribunal in La Spezia. —MNA/Reuters

## Cambodia's drinking water solution project wins IWA award

JAKARTA, 17 Sept—A study that offers ceramic waterfilters as a sustainable solution for rural drinking water treatment in Cambodia, has won the International Water Association (IWA) 2008 Project Innovation Award Grand Prize for Small Projects in Vienna recently, a release by the World Bank Indonesia said.

According to the release received by Xinhua on Monday, the study is funded by UNICEF and the Water and Sanitation Programme and implemented by the University Of North Carolina School of Public Health. Results from the study suggested that the filters could significantly improve household water quality, offering up to 99.99 per cent less E coli in treated versus untreated water, said WSP Cambodia Senior Water and Sanitation Specialist Jan-Willem Rosenboom. —MNA/Xinhua



## Iraq says does not need US financial aid

NAJAF (Iraq), 17 Sept—Iraq does not need any financial aid from the United States, the government spokesman said, in the wake of criticism from some US politicians that Washington is paying too much towards Iraq's reconstruction.

Since the US-led invasion in 2003, US taxpayers have paid 48 billion US dollars for stabilization and reconstruction in Iraq, a congressional report said last month, adding Baghdad had spent little of its growing oil revenues on rebuilding infrastructure.

"I think we are in a position now not to ask for financial aid from anybody, even the United States," government spokesman Ali al-Dabbagh told Reuters at

the weekend in the holy Shiite city of Najaf.

"I think we have enough money to spend and we are not in need of any money in the future."

Dabbagh said what Iraq needed from the United States and other countries was help in building technical expertise and training, especially since the country's legal and technological framework needed updating after decades of neglect.—MNA/Reuters

## Fish flies out of lake, breaks Arkansas teen's jaw

It's a fishing tale that packs a wallop so strong it broke the jaw of a southeastern Arkansas teen and covered him in fish blood and guts.

Seth Russell, 15, of Crossett, was cruising Lake Chicot on a large inner tube towed

by a boat when a Silver Asian carp leaped from the water and smacked him in the face. Seth was knocked unconscious.

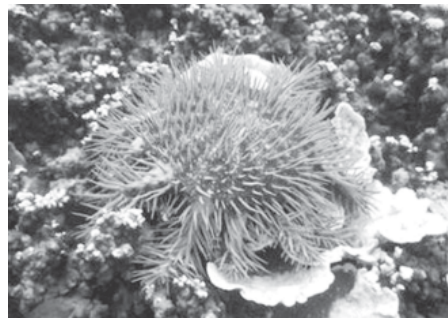
"He doesn't remember anything at all," the boy's mother, Linda Russell, said last week. "He was

laughing, and the next thing he remembers, he is waking in a hospital."

The teen has had oral surgery to wire several teeth together and still experiences back pain that doctors attribute to whiplash from the high-speed collision, his mother said.

He's not the only one who's had a run-in with the "flying" Silver Asian carp.

"They do not fly, but they are quite good jumpers," said Carole Engle, director of aquaculture and the fisheries centre at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff.

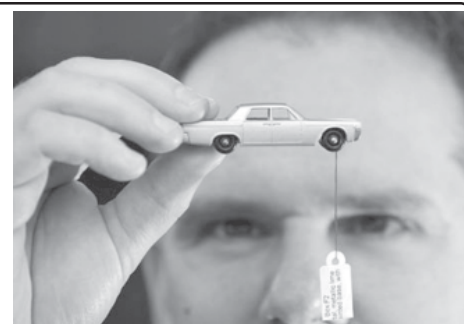
Howell can't

# Only with prudent work will there be fruitful results

Now, the process for smooth transition to multiparty democracy system is well under way, as aspired by the entire people, and progress has been made to a certain degree. The ruling government is not an elected one, but the one that unavoidably took up State duties according to the nation's situations so as to save the motherland from collapse and disintegration of national solidarity and falling under alien subjugation again. It is undeniable that throughout the rule, the government has dedicated itself to demanding tasks for national unity, stability of the State, community peace, national development, the three basic needs of the people, and democratic transition process.

Is it possible that a nation can be transformed from the old system to a new one in no time? And is it reasonable that some said, "Leave it to us, hand over power to us, and we can transform our country into a democratic one in a short time?" I don't think Myanmar can be transformed into a democratic one overnight by just doing so. However, a tiny minority of the people opposed the constitution due to various reasons. I do not want to make any comments on that point because they have the rights to disagree. The referendum for approval of the constitution was held in line with the Referendum Law and Regulations, not in a prearranged way. I mean the constitution was adopted through the referendum in which the entire people cast their votes in accordance with the Law. A handful

of people are in protest against the constitution, but I understand them. Nevertheless, I do not want them to say that they do not recognize and approve it. The entire people holding citizenship scrutiny cards have to accept the constitution because the constitution has been approved in accordance with the desire of the great majority of the people and legal procedures. Every citizen has to honour the desire of the majority of the people. If a person or organization at home does not recognize the constitution that has been approved by the great majority of the people, what is such a person and organization and what is their future?

The constitution is particularly designed to meet the prevailing conditions, historical background and possible future conditions of the nation. And it bestows the people with all the democratic rights and prevents the State from getting into crises and collapse. It enumerates democratic rights at the unprecedented level. Making a thorough study of the constitution and assessing it with nationalistic fervour, one can notice that it hardly carries unacceptable facts. **Here, it is required to give priority to the interest of the nation and the people, rather than that of a particular person or organization.**

Whatever it is, every citizen has to respect the constitution as it has been approved by the entire people. Today, the people have enjoyed the taste of national development along with peace and stability on an unprecedented scale. They have enjoyed the freedom of doing business. They are now anxious to achieve the goal of building up a democratic country, taking advantages of the political stability. Thus, the government has been working hard to fulfil the wishes of the people, and has taken responsibilities for seeing to the State's seven-step Road Map for democracy. The people will no longer show their patience with further disturbances and hindrances in the trend, because the goal of democracy will be far away if riots and disruptions persist. Only through harmonious cooperation will it be possible to achieve the goal sooner. That is the desire of the majority of the people. It is noticed that the government is trying its best to meet the people's aspiration to a democratic nation.

Therefore, it is time to decide what should be done next according to the desire of the people, the adopted constitution, and the present conditions of the nation. Will they persist in opposing whatever the government does? What is the use of doing so? Now is an opportune time to make an appropriate decision, and the nation

will see an important change in the political arena in the near future. One will be discarded or sidelined if one makes the wrong decision.

Some persons from the political parties and organizations are versed in politics to considerable extent, whereas some were opportunist politicians. If the vast experience on political affairs is exerted effectively in the democratic process, that will help gain the momentum of national development. The people have to remain united in working in the interest of the nation. The people know about the motherland best. So, I wish certain persons would participate in the follow-up programmes for democracy.

**Those who fail to take part in the process will be left behind and will miss unique opportunities. Not only the government but also the people will not remain indifferent if they try to disrupt the process.** They should create better circumstances, while doing their bit in the process. They should expand their horizons by applying the experiences they have gained. Any newly-born babies cannot walk on their own. First, they will be able to crawl, then move on all fours. When they have grown enough, they will be able to toddle. Democratic process is similar to that example.

There will be no progress if they fail to do what should be done, but think of things that will never work. They should have stopped dreaming of impossible things. We people want to enjoy democracy as soon as possible, and the government is taking all possible measures in that case. What should we do? **We should do nothing except working in concert in the correct political trend. Those who fail to do so will be in the wrong and they will be left behind and will face undesirable consequences.**

As for me, I am opposed to any acts that prevent the democratic process from going smoothly. And I do not support anyone who does so. I do not trust or rely on those who are making unreasonable demands. I abhor all the attempts to confront with the government and stir up problems. Bluntly, I am not in favour of those who misbehave regarding the internal affairs, placing too much reliance on alien elements. It is so foolish to call for economic sanctions with the intention of getting the mother country into economic crisis, and making the nation another Afghanistan or Iraq.

I am in favour of all the work done to serve the national interests. I believe our country will soon achieve the goal of democracy if the people work in harness in accordance with the seven-step Road Map. I am in support of the State constitution. I know well the constitution guarantees all democratic rights and security. So, I am determined to join hands with the people in implementing the State's seven-step Road Map. I would say there should not be any imprudent deeds. I wish certain elements would mend their ways, doing what should be done. Is it wise to create better opportunities, while participating in the democratic process?

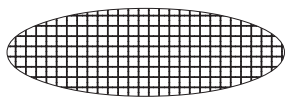

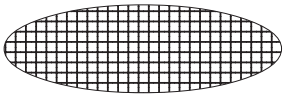

## Common plastics chemical linked to heart problems

ROCKVILLE (Maryland), 17 Sept — A major study links a chemical widely used in plastic products, including baby bottles, to health problems in humans like heart disease and diabetes, but US regulators said on Tuesday they still believe it is safe.

The chemical bisphenol A, or BPA, is commonly used in plastic food and beverage containers and in the coating of food cans.

Until now, environmental and consumer activists who have questioned the safety of BPA have relied on animal studies.

But the study by British

researchers in the Journal of the American Medical Association found that among 1,455 US adults, those with the highest levels of BPA were more likely to have heart disease, diabetes and liver-enzyme abnormalities than those with the lowest levels.

US Food and Drug Administration officials said they would review the new findings, which were not yet published when the agency issued a draft conclusion in August that BPA is safe at current exposure levels.

“We have confidence in the data that we’ve

looked at and the data that we’re relying on to say that the margin of safety is adequate,” FDA official Laura Tarantino said at a meeting of experts advising the agency on whether it made the right call. “There are things you can do if you choose to reduce your level of bisphenol A,” Tarantino said. “But we have not recommended that anyone change their habits or change their use of any of these products because right now we don’t have the evidence in front of us to suggest that people need to.”

## Healthy living cuts premature death risk in half

CHICAGO, 17 Sept — Women who heed common sense health messages about smoking, diet and exercise can cut their risk of premature death in half, US researchers said on Tuesday.

Many studies look at the impact of just one lifestyle change on overall health, but researchers at Harvard University wanted to see the total impact of a healthy diet, regular exercise, a healthy weight and a lifetime without smoking.

Dr Rob van Dam and a team from the Harvard School of Public Health and Brigham and Women’s Hospital followed 80,000 nurses for more than two decades.

The women kept

detailed records of their diet, physical activity, alcohol consumption, weight, smoking and disease history. Over the study period, 8,882 of the women died, including 1,790 from heart disease and 4,527 from cancer.

Some 28 percent of these deaths could have been avoided if the women had

never smoked, the researchers said.

And 55 percent of the deaths could have been avoided if the women had never smoked and exercised regularly, eaten a healthy diet low in red meat and trans-fats and maintained a healthy weight, they said.

## 11 dead in police ambush in Russian Caucasus: official

Moscow, 17 Sept — Russian special forces killed 10 suspected rebels Wednesday in a shoot-out in the restive province of Dagestan, a law-enforcement official said.

One policeman died in a gun battle after officers from Russia’s FSB special

services surrounded the rebels, the official told AFP on condition of anonymity.

“At 1:00 am Wednesday (2100 GMT Tuesday) a counter-terror operation was launched. By morning 10 militants had been killed,” the official said.

“One FSB special forces officer was seriously injured and died in hospital.”

The gun battle erupted after the rebels were discovered near the village of Smurt, a law-enforcement official was quoted as saying by ITAR-TASS news agency.

Interfax reported that the rebels commander, Zakir Novruzov, was killed in the battle.

## Nigeria militants threaten broader “oil war” in delta

PROTH ARCOURT (Nigeria), 17 Sept — Nigerian militants threatened on Wednesday to broaden their “oil war” to offshore oilfields, after attacking another Shell-operated oil flow station in the Niger Delta. The Movement for the Emancipation of the Niger Delta (MEND), responsible for attacks that have cut a fifth of OPEC member Nigeria’s oil output, said it would launch attacks outside Rivers state for the first

time since clashes began on Saturday.

The heaviest fighting between militants and security forces in more than two years has spread to about 10 villages, but have remained in Rivers state, home to oil city Port Harcourt.

“After Rivers, the hurricane will be heading to the neighbouring states in the Niger Delta,” the group said in an e-mailed statement. Some security forces in the oil industry

estimate more than 100 people may have been killed in recent clashes.

Militants have bombed pipelines, platforms, gas plants and oilfields, halting up to 115,000 barrels per day of oil production in the last five days, government officials said. Nigeria’s oil is popular in the United States and Europe because it is easily refined into gasoline, diesel and other crude products.

## Jordan, South Korea in negotiations over power plant deal

AMMAN, 17 Sept — Jordan and a South Korean firm are in negotiations over the construction of a power plant, local daily *The Jordan Times* reported on Wednesday.

Negotiations are under way over the plan between the Ministry of Energy and Mineral Resources and the state-run Korea Electric Power Corp (KEPCO), the ministry’s spokesperson, Mahmoud Eis, said on Tuesday.

“KEPCO was one of four companies interested in the construction of the 400-megawatt, 500 million US dollars plant which will be established in Qatraneh on a build-operate-own basis,” said Eis, adding that KEPCO’s

offer was the best among the four bids submitted to win the deal.

The project, to be operational by 2011, is expected to be Jordan’s largest private sector natural gas-powered plant, according to Eis.

It is the second to be implemented by the private sector after the Amman East Power Plant, which was constructed in Al Manakher area with a total generation capacity of 370 megawatts, officials said.

Jordan’s demand for electricity is expected to reach approximately 4,000 MW by 2020, according to official figures.

## Scolari plays down Chelsea's stunning start

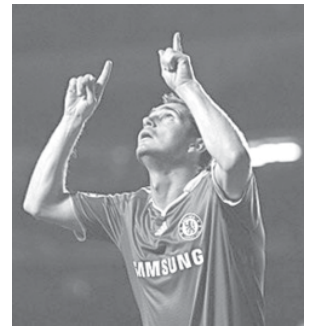
LONDON 17 Sept — Luiz Felipe Scolari has warned his Chelsea stars not to get carried away after their Champions League demolition of Bordeaux.

## Ukrainian Parliament speaker announces end of ruling coalition

KIEV, 17 Sept—Ukrainian Parliament Speaker Arseniy Yatseniuk officially announced the collapse of the ruling coalition on Tuesday after the pro-presidential Our Ukraine-People's Self-Defence Bloc walked out two weeks ago.

"I officially announced the collapse of the coalition of democratic forces," said Yatseniuk.

"I am obliged to fulfil my constitutional duty. This has been long expected, but for me it is extremely sad...the coalition was all but dead after no compromise was found in 10 days of talks," he added, urging politicians to quickly find a combination liable to work.

The pro-presidential Our Ukraine-People's Self-Defence Bloc left the ruling coalition earlier this month. Parliament now has 30 days to try and form a new ruling coalition.

If those efforts fail, President Viktor Yushchenko can dissolve Parliament and call a snap election.

## Russia defence spending to grow 27% in '09

Moscow, 17 Sept—Russia's defence spending will grow by 27 per cent in 2009, *Interfax* news agency quoted Prime Minister Vladimir Putin as saying on Tuesday.

"Nearly 2.4 trillion roubles (94.12 billion US dollars) will be allocated for the needs of national defence and security (in 2009)," *Interfax* quoted Putin as saying. "This is an increase of 27 per cent."

In a brief war last month, Russia crushed an attempt by pro-Western neighbour Georgia to retake South Ossetia, a breakaway region closely tied to Moscow.

President Dmitry Medvedev and Putin have said the military operation, condemned by the West as disproportionate, has shown the Armed Forces needed a major modernization of their weapons and hardware.

Putin made his announcement on the day when Russian stocks plunged more than 10 per cent to two-year lows, driven by turmoil on international markets and domestic concerns including the war in Georgia.

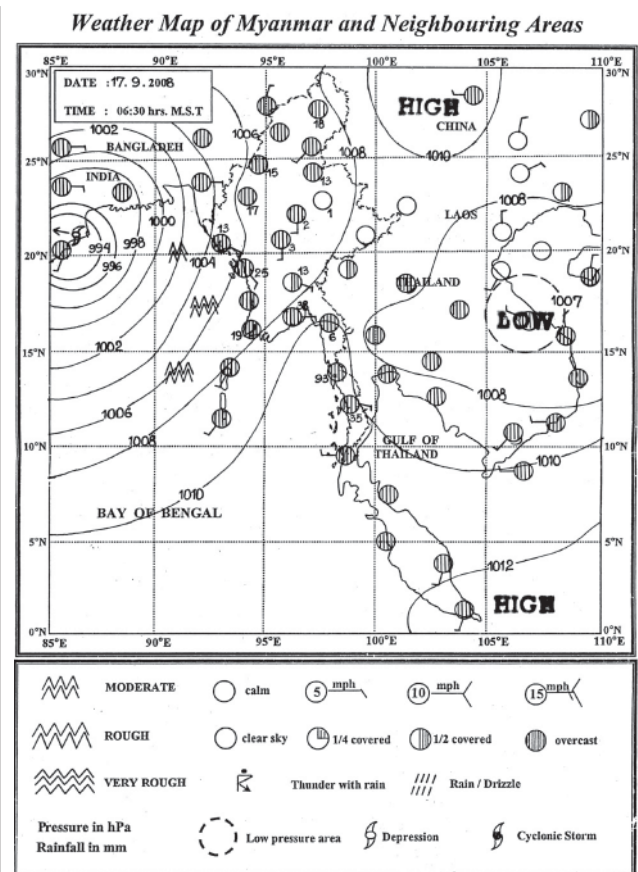

The noteworthy amounts of rainfall recorded were Dawei (4.09) inches, Maungtau (2.52) inches, Kyauktaw (2.24) inches, Kalay (1.93) inches and Ann (1.61) inches.

Maximum temperature on 16-9-2008 was 84°F. Minimum temperature on 17-9-2008 was 68°F. Relative humidity at (09:30) hours MST on 17-9-2008 was 100%. Total sunshine hours on 16-9-2008 was (0.9) hour approx.

Rainfall on 17-9-2008 was (1.58) inches at Mingaladon, (1.02) inches at Kaba-Aye and (1.10) inches at Central Yangon. Total rainfall since 1-1-2008 was (91.22) inches at Mingaladon, (101.61) inches at Kaba-Aye and (118.78) inches at Central Yangon. Maximum wind speed at Yangon (Kaba-Aye) was (6) mph from Southeast at (18:30) hours MST on 15-9-2008.

**Bay inference:** According to the observations at (09:30) hrs MST today, the depression over Northwest Bay of Bengal has crossed Orissa Coast, India and remains as a land depression. Weather is cloudy in the North Bay and monsoon is moderate in the Andaman Sea and strong elsewhere in the Bay of Bengal.

**Forecast valid until evening of 18-9-2008:** Rain or thundershowers will be widespread in Rakhine, Mon and Kayin States, Yangon, Ayeyawady and Taninthayi Divisions, fairly widespread in Kachin and Chin States, Bago Division and scattered in the remaining States and Divisions with likelihood of isolated heavyfalls in Mon State and Taninthayi Division. Degree of certainty is (80%).

**State of the sea:** Squalls with rough sea are likely at times Deltaic, off and along Rakhine Coast. Surface wind speed in squalls may reach (40-45) mph. Seas will be moderate elsewhere in Myanmar waters.

**Outlook for subsequent two days:** General decrease of rain in Rakhine Coast.

**Forecast for Nay Pyi Taw and neighbouring area for 18-9-2008:** Isolated rain or thundershowers. Degree of certainty is (80%).

**Forecast for Yangon and neighbouring area for 18-9-2008:** Some rain or thundershowers. Degree of certainty is (80%).

**Forecast for Mandalay and neighbouring area for 18-9-2008:** Likelihood of isolated rain or thundershowers. Degree of certainty is (60%).

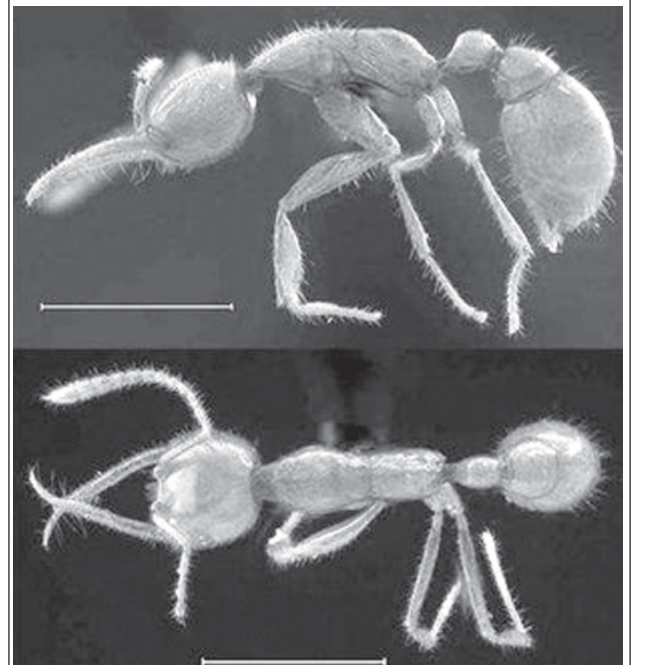
## Scientists discover oldest ant

KARLSRUHE (Germany), 17 Sept— German biologists have discovered a new species of ant they believe is the oldest on the planet, dating back around 120 million years.

Researchers from Karlsruhe's Natural History Museum found the 3-millimetre-long (0.118 inch) insect in the Amazon rainforest in 2007, and hope it will shed light on the early evolution of ants.

"It's by far the most spectacular find of my 26-year career," said museum biologist Manfred Verhaagh on Tuesday.

Scientists from Karlsruhe originally found an unidentified species of ant of a similar type in the Brazilian rainforest in 2003. However, due to an accident in the laboratory, the insect dried up, making further research impossible, Verhaagh said.—Internet
