The Law Amending the Myanmar Historical Commission Law
 (The State Peace and Development Council Law No. 7/2008)
 The 10th Waning of Tawthalin 1370 ME
 (24 September, 2008)

The State Peace and Development Council hereby enacts the following Law:

1. This Law shall be called the **Law Amending the Myanmar Historical Commission Law**.
2. The expression “**Ministry of Education**” contained in sub-section (b) of section 2 of the Myanmar Historical Commission Law shall be substituted by the expression “**Ministry of Culture**.”
3. The expression “**the Universities Historical Research Department**” contained in sub-sections (c) and (d) of section 5 of the Myanmar Historical Commission Law shall be substituted by the expression “**the Department of Historical Research**” respectively.
4. Section 9 of the Myanmar Historical Commission Law shall be substituted as follows:
 - “9. (a) The Ministry shall form the Department of Historical Research, with the approval of Government, to enable carrying out of functions of the Commission.
 - (b) The functions, rights and liabilities of the Universities Historical Research Department shall devolve on the Department of Historical Research.”

China’s latest space mission finishes rehearsal

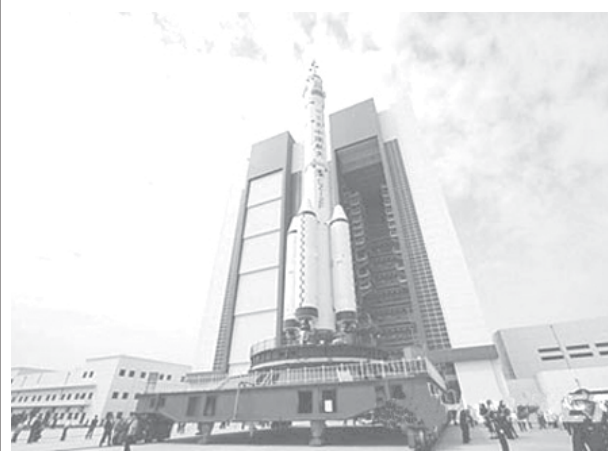
JIUQUAN, 24 Sept — China’s third manned space mission Shenzhou-7 finished its last rehearsal before blast-off.

Now the crew, who will conduct the first Chinese space walk, is waiting for a launch window at a remote rocket base.

Monday’s rehearsal involved scientists from all branches of the space project including the carrier rocket and landing venue.

After three hours of tests and safety examinations in the rehearsal, the mission has been given the green light.

Depending on weather, the launch is scheduled between Sept. 25 and 30 at Jiuquan Satellite Launch Center in northwestern Gansu Province.—*Xinhua*

Maj-Gen Ohn Myint and party released 500,000 fingerlings into Ayeyawady River at Myitkyina Jetty.



At the city hall, Maj-Gen Ohn Myint met

NAY PYI TAW, 24 Sept — Myitmakha Panlaung Bridge in Myittha Township was inaugurated on 21 September in the presence of Secretariat Member of Union Solidarity and Development Association Minister for Industry-1 U Aung Thaung.

The reinforced concrete bridge is 125 ft long and it can withstand 35 tons of load. It was constructed at the cost of over K 51.6 million. The bridge will benefit the residents in 15 villages in Myittha Township and four villages in Wundwin Township.

Chairman of Kyaukse District Peace and Development Council U Soe Win, donor U San Win and Secretary of Myittha Township USDA U Aung Kyi formally opened the bridge and Minister U Aung

Thaung unveiled the stone inscription of the bridge.

After the opening ceremony, the minister met with local people from 19 villages in Myittha Township and gave instructions on regional development.

Afterwards, he visited Myittha Textile Factory project and urged responsible personnel to complete the project timely.

Chinese official says milk scandal ‘under control’

BEIJING, 24 Sept—China said on Wednesday a tainted milk scandal had been brought under control and recently tested liquid milk samples showed no traces of a toxic chemical.

“There is no problem,” Xiang Yuzhang, the national quality watchdog’s chief inspection official, told reporters in Beijing.

“It has been brought under control, more or less. There are no more problems

in the market. As far as I know, there will be no more bad news.” China’s quality control agency said on its website (www.aqsiq.gov.cn) that 235 samples of carton

milk and drinking yoghurt produced since September 14 and sold across the country had shown no signs of the toxic chemical melamine.—*Internet*

US soldiers accidentally kill Sunni leader in Iraq

BAGHDAD, 24 Sept—American soldiers accidentally shot and killed the leader of a local US-allied Sunni group Tuesday after coming under attack in a volatile area north of Baghdad, the military said.

The shooting comes a week before the Shiite-led Iraqi government begins to assume authority over the Sunni groups known as the Sons of Iraq, or

Awakening Councils. The military has credited the Sunni revolt against al-Qaida in Iraq as a key factor in the sharp decline in violence over the past year. The head of the group in Siniyah, Jassim al-Garrout, was killed after he rushed to the site of an ambush against US forces in the area, which lies between the northern oil-hub of Beiji and Saddam Hussein’s home-

town of Tikrit, according to witnesses and police.

One of al-Garrout’s comrades said the group would demand an apology from the Americans.

“The Awakening Councils have become targets of al-Qaida, the government and sometimes even the US forces. We do not know our fate and we are feeling lost,” Farooq Sami said.—*Internet*

Attacks kill five police in Afghan capital Kabul

KABUL (Afghanistan), 24 Sept—A police official says a bomb blast in the capital has wounded Kabul’s chief criminal investigator.

Zemerai Bashary says Wednesday’s bomb blast appears to have targeted Gen. Ali Shah Paktiawal, the head of criminal investigations for the Kabul police.

Bashary says Paktiawal was investigating the overnight killing of three officers at the checkpoint in Kabul’s western outskirts when a blast struck his team.

Paktiawal was lightly wounded and two of his guards were killed.

Paktiawal is a high profile police official in the capital, rushing to the scenes of the bombings, busting drug smugglers and personally leading the raids on the city’s numerous criminal gangs. He was protected at all time by a large security detail.—*Internet*



Pakistanis say suspected US drone shot down

ISLAMABAD (Pakistan), 24 Sept—Pakistani soldiers and tribesmen shot down a suspected US military drone close to the Afghan border Tuesday night, three intelligence officials said.

If verified, it apparently would be the first time a pilotless aircraft was brought down over Pakistan and likely would add to tensions between Washington and Islamabad over recent American cross-border

incursions into the country’s lawless tribal regions.

The three officials said the aircraft was hit at the village of Jalal Khel in South Waziristan after circling the area for several hours. Wreckage was strewn on the ground, they said, speaking on condition of anonymity because they were not authorized to brief the media.

Pakistan’s army said later that troops recovered the wreckage of an unmanned spy plane near the Afghan border.

Iran’s leader says ‘American empire’ near collapse

UNITED NATIONS, 24 Sept—Iran’s president addressed the UN General Assembly Tuesday declaring that “the American empire” is nearing collapse and should end its military involvement in other countries.

Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad said terrorism is spreading quickly in Afghanistan and that “the occupiers” are still in Iraq nearly six years after Saddam Hussein was

ousted from power in Iraq.

“American empire in the world is reaching the end of its road, and its next rulers must limit their interference to their own borders,” Ahmadinejad said. He accused the US of starting wars in Iraq and Afghanistan to win votes in elections and blamed a “few bullying powers” for trying to undermine Iraq’s nuclear program.

Ahmadinejad’s hardline

rhetoric came as no surprise and offered little in the way of compromise at the UN, where he faces a new round of sanctions if no agreement is reached on limiting Iran’s nuclear capabilities.

While he reiterated that the country’s nuclear program is purely peaceful, the US and others fear it is aimed at producing enriched uranium to make nuclear weapons.

US military deaths in Iraq war at 4,170

WASHINGTON, 24 Sept—As of Tuesday, 23 Sept, 2008, at least 4,170 members of the US military have died in the Iraq war since it began in March 2003.

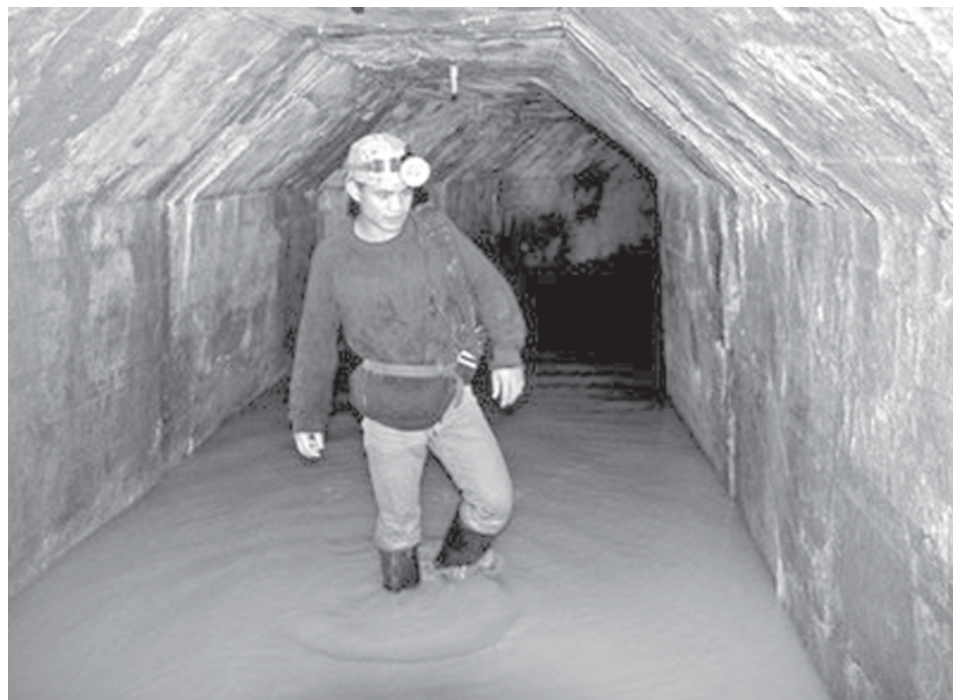
The figure includes eight military civilians killed in action. At least 3,377 military personnel died as a result of hostile action, according to the military’s numbers. The British military has reported 176 deaths; Italy, 33; Ukraine, 18; Poland, 21; Bulgaria, 13; Spain, 11; Denmark, seven; El Salvador, five; Slovakia, four; Latvia and Georgia, three each; Estonia, Netherlands, Thailand and Romania, two each; and Australia, Hungary, Kazakhstan and South Korea, one death each.—*Internet*

US soldier killed southeast of Baghdad

BAGHDAD, 24 Sept—An American soldier was killed by a small-arms fire attack southeast of Baghdad on Tuesday, the US military said.

The incident took place in a village west of Salman Pak area, some 30 km southeast of Baghdad, a military statement said without providing further details. The Iraqi area is also known as Madain, which is a stronghold for powerful Sunni Arab tribes of Dulaim and Jubour.

The latest death brings the number of US troops killed in Iraq since the March 2003 invasion to more than 4,170, according to media count based on Pentagon figures.—*Internet*

Japan parliament votes for Aso as prime minister

TOKYO, 24 Sept—Japan's parliament on Wednesday voted for Taro Aso to be the next prime minister, the speaker announced.

Aso, a conservative former foreign minister, bowed four times and shook hands with fellow lawmakers after lower house speaker Yohei Kono announced the results of the vote.

In a largely party-line vote, 337 lawmakers voted for Aso, the head of

the ruling Liberal Democratic Party, and 117 picked chief opposition leader Ichiro Ozawa, Kono said.

Taro Aso has lined up his cabinet with like-minded conservatives to

help his mission to revive the economy and win upcoming elections.

The new premier is set to fly to New York on Thursday for the UN General Assembly.

"When I look at the financial situation and other things, I feel like we're in a turbulent period — not in peacetime," he told reporters as he headed to parliament, referring to the crisis over bad debts hitting global markets.

One Philadelphia officer killed, one wounded on duty

PHILADELPHIA, 24 Sept—A city police officer pursuing an armed suspect Tuesday afternoon was fatally shot, the fourth Philadelphia officer to die in the line of duty in the last year, authorities said. Another officer was wounded and the suspect was killed.

The officer who died, Patrick McDonald, 30, was shot in the chest, Mayor Michael Nutter said. The other officer, 35-year-old Richard Bowes, was shot in the leg. He was in stable condition and expected to be OK, Nutter said.

"We are in pain, and we are very angry about what's going on here in our city," Nutter said.

Police said McDonald called for backup around 1:45 pm, and Bowes was one of several officers to respond. At some point, an officer exchanged fire with the suspect. An automatic weapon was recovered at the scene. Police Commissioner Charles Ramsey said witnesses told authorities that the suspect stood over the officer and shot him.

"According to witnesses, he did stand over the officer and fired several shots, and he was hit multiple times," Ramsey told WXTF-TV. Police did not immediately identify the suspect or release other details. The suspect's body was found about a half block from where McDonald was shot.—Internet

Chrysler '08 loss \$400 million through Aug

NEW YORK, 24 Sept—US automaker Chrysler LLC on Tuesday told dealers it had lost \$400 million so far this year, the *Wall Street Journal* said.

Chief Executive Robert Nardelli told dealers that despite cutting costs, Chrysler was still

losing money, according to two people at a session for dealers where the figures were released, the paper said.

The company added that sales fell 24 percent through August and it had \$11 billion in cash, the paper said, citing the people at the session.

A Chrysler spokesman declined to comment on the remarks, saying the meeting was "confiden-

tial." He said Chrysler was meeting or exceeding its financial targets but acknowledged the company was "not in the black on a net basis," the paper said.

A company spokesperson could not be immediately reached for comment by Reuters.

Chrysler, run by private equity house Cerberus (CBS.UL), lost \$1.6 billion in 2007.—Internet

5.2 degree earthquake hits Mexico

MEXICO CITY, 24 Sept—An earthquake of 5.2 degree on the Richter scale hit Mexico City and some areas in the central and southern parts of the country on Tuesday, Mexico's official news agency *Notimex* quoted the country's seismologist authority as saying.

According to preliminary information, the earthquake occurred at 17:46 pm local time (2346 GMT).

Its epicenter was at the coast of the southwest state of Guerrero.

The quake shocked tourists at the beach of the city of Acapulco, activated the seismic alarm and forced some buildings to be evacuated.

Man charged after gun found in car near Obama home

CHICAGO, 24 Sept—A member of a prominent Chicago family faces a felony gun charge after being arrested Tuesday when he approached security barriers outside Barack Obama's home. The U.S. Secret Service insisted he never posed a threat to the Democratic presidential candidate.

Omhari Sengstacke, 31, of Chicago, was apparently intoxicated but not armed when he was arrested about 6:30 am as he neared the barriers posted with no-access

signs a block from the South Side home, said police spokesman Daniel O'Brien.

Police found a gun and

a bulletproof vest in his car nearby.

Sengstacke did not utter any threats against Obama or make any threatening gestures before his arrest, and he never breached the outermost perimeter of multiple security layers, US Secret Service spokesman Malcolm Wiley said.

Asked if Sengstacke may have wanted to hurt Obama, his brother, Robert Sengstacke, told *The Associated Press*, "I seriously doubt that."

Former US astronauts wish China's Shenzhou-7 mission good luck

WASHINGTON, 24 Sept—Several former US astronauts told Xinhua that they wish China's upcoming Shenzhou-7 mission a success and the crew members the best of luck. Depending on weather, the Shenzhou-7 spacecraft launch is scheduled between 25 Sept and 30 Sept. This will be the third Chinese manned space mission, but the first time Chinese astronauts perform a spacewalk.

"I would like to wish

the crew of Shenzhou-7 a safe and successful flight," said Edward Lu, a famous Chinese-American NASA astronaut, servicing in NASA from 1994 to 2007.

As a veteran of three space missions, Lu has logged over 206 days in space, and a spacewalk totaling six hours and 14 minutes. "Spacewalking is an important capability, and it will mark a big milestone in China's space experience," Lu

told Xinhua.

Jeffrey Hoffman, a senior NASA astronaut from 1978 to 2001, told Xinhua that he wished China's next astronauts good luck for a successful mission and look forward to hearing about their spacewalk.

Hoffman made five space flights in his space career. He has logged more than 1,211 hours in space, and he is also the first US astronaut to log 1,000 hours aboard the US space shuttle.—Xinhua

Iranian president says its country's nuclear program is peaceful

UNITED NATIONS, 24 Sept—Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad, in his speech to the UN General Assembly's general debate on Tuesday, asserted that his country's nuclear program is peaceful and slammed "a few bullying powers" for putting hurdles in the way of Iran's nuclear activities.

"Despite the inalienable right of all nations, including the Iranian nation, in producing nuclear fuel for peaceful purposes, and despite such facts as the transparency of all Iranian activities and our country's full cooperation with the inspectors of the IAEA ... a few bullying powers have sought to put hurdles in the way of the peaceful nuclear activities of the Iranian nation by exerting political and economic pressure against Iran," Ahmadinejad said.—Xinhua

Russia cuts oil export tax, changes calculation formula

MOSCOW, 23 Sept—Russia has changed its calculation formula for oil export duty, and announced a plan to cut tax from 485.8 U.S. dollars per ton to 372.2 dollars starting from October, Russia's major media said Monday.

According to the *Interfax News Agency*, export duty on refined oil will fall from 346.4 dollars per ton to 263.1 dollars, while tax on preliminary refined oil products will dip from 186.6 dollars per ton to 141.7 dollars.

The Russian government also changed its usual formula for calculating the export duty due to the wild price fluctuations on the global oil market.

Tunnel collapses under Gaza-Egypt borders, six missing

GAZA, 24 Sept—A tunnel under the borders between southern Gaza Strip and Egypt collapsed on Tuesday night, leaving six Palestinians missing under the tunnel's rubbles, witnesses and Hamas security sources said.

Witnesses in the southern Gaza Strip town of Rafah said a mysterious huge explosion was heard in the area, adding that six people went into the tunnel under the borders with Egypt, and apparently went missing after the collapse.

The Egyptian security forces and rescue teams have started to look for the missing people in the tunnel, according to security sources.

Tunnels became a profitable business for Gaza Strip residents after Israel imposed a tight blockade on the enclave after Islamic Hamas movement took control of it in mid June last year.—Xinhua

World's largest particle collider not to restart till spring

GENEVA, 24 Sept—The world's most powerful particle collider will not restart until spring 2009 due to the delay caused by a helium leak problem and related repair work, the European Organization for Nuclear Research (CERN) said on Tuesday. "The time necessary for the investigation and repairs precludes a restart before CERN's obligatory winter maintenance period, bringing the date for restart of the accelerator complex to early spring 2009," CERN said in a statement. The Large Hadron Collider (LHC), housed in a 27-km circular tunnel under the

French-Swiss border, was built to recreate conditions just after the Big Bang 13 billion years ago so that many secrets of the universe could be unlocked. It started operation with great fanfare on 10 Sept, but a helium leak into the tunnel 10 days later forced scientists to shut down the huge machine.—Xinhua

Gunman arrested after making threats in Canada high school

OTTAWA, 24 Sept—Canadian police arrested a male Tuesday after he waved a gun and made threats at a high school in the western city of Regina, but there were no fire shots nor injuries.

The incident happened at the Catholic Luther College in the capital city of Saskatchewan province. Police received a call around 10:20 am local time reporting a male youth with a firearm at the school, Lara Guzik Rostad with the Regina Police Service told reporters.

The male was arrested and the firearm recovered about 40 minutes later.—Xinhua

Heavy Mogadishu fighting kills at least seven

MOGADISHU, 24 Sept — Heavy fighting between Somali insurgents and African Union forces erupted late Tuesday in southern Mogadishu, leaving at least seven civilians dead, witnesses said.

“Heavy artillery shells hit a house and killed four civilians. Several others were wounded here in Taleh (district),” said Abdullahi Mohamed, a resident.

Another resident Ahmed Abdiweli said a stray mortar killed at least three people in another southern neighbourhood that is one of the most volatile areas in the seaside capital.

“Mortar shells fired by the African Union forces landed in Tokyo area and killed three civilians,” Abdiweli told.

“This is the heaviest fighting ever since the AU deployed. I have seen the African Union forces using tanks,” added Farah Hassan, a resident.

“I have seen many civilians crowded

in minibuses (leaving the battle zone) and there was no access to hospital for the wounded in the whole neighbourhood,” he added.—Internet

14 people missing in landslides in China’s quake-hit area

BEICHUAN (Sichuan), 24 Sept — Fourteen people have gone missing in the wake of landslides triggered by heavy rain in the quake-hit Beichuan County of Sichuan Province in southwest China, a local official said on Wednesday.

Some villagers in

Leigu town have also been injured, said Zuo Daifu, a county official in charge the reconstruction of Beichuan. The town received 104 mm of rain between 8 am Tuesday and 7 am Wednesday.

Heavy rain totaling 194 mm during the period also hit the Tangjiashan

area, blocking the sluice of the dangerous Tangjiashan quake lake and raising its water level by five metres.

Beichuan is one of the worst hit area in the devastating earthquake on 12 May. The county seat was almost flattened in the quake.—Internet

Canadian scientists discover North America’s oldest, tiniest dinosaur

OTTAWA, 24 Sept — Canadian scientists have discovered the oldest and smallest dinosaur known to exist in North America, the *Canwest News Service* reported Tuesday.

Paleontologists at the University of Calgary found the creature during an excavation in Alberta province in 2002, but they only confirmed it to be a new species until lately.

Called *Albertonykus borealis*, the unusual breed

of anteater dinosaur was skinny, birdlike and had the size only of a chicken. It ran on two legs and scoured the ancient forest floor for termites.

It was found during an excavation of an ancient bone bed near Red Deer, Alberta.

“These are bizarre animals. They have long and slender legs, stumpy arms with huge claws and tweezer-like jaws. They look like an animal created

by Dr. Seuss,” said Nick Longrich, a paleontology research associate at the University of Calgary.

“This appears to be the smallest dinosaur yet discovered in North America.”

Longrich studied 70-million-year-old bones that were collected on a dig in 2002 where the remains of more than 20 *Albertosaurus* were found. *Albertosaurus* are a type of tyrannosaur.

Oyster lunch yields 26 pearls for Lebanese couple

Lebanese restaurant owner Raymond Salha and his wife were having oysters for lunch when she made a stunning discovery — a cluster of 26 pearls inside an oyster on her plate.

The find 10 days ago at his Al-Fanar Restaurant in the southern port city of Tyre was a “total surprise,” Salha said. It was one of about 200 oysters they had cooked that day at the restaurant.

As his wife opened the shell, she let out a gasp and said, “Look at this oyster, there are lots of pearls in it,” Salha recounted. The couple immediately believed the pearls were valuable, so Salha called the city’s maritime museum which sent a team that took the oyster — and the pearls still inside it — away for testing.



Ind city looks for time capsule that time forgot

Call it the time capsule that time forgot. A city committee voted recently to open a time capsule buried in 1958, when the city was celebrating its centennial.

The plan was to display the items, then add modern ones and rebury it until 2058.

Trouble is, no one seems to know exactly where the capsule is.

Several committee members thought the capsule was buried in a park — but the capsule there was buried in the 1970s to commemorate the US bicentennial celebration.

Committee member Paul Thomas doubts the 1958 capsule exists since it wasn’t mentioned in detailed committee meeting minutes from that year or an extensive centennial brochure.

Mary Jo Weyrick, the city council’s administrative assistant, tracked down one resident who remembers the celebration 50 years ago and said the capsule may be buried on the corner of Main and High streets. If it’s there, it may not be dug up any time soon because that stretch of sidewalk was recently replaced as part of a streetscaping project.

Meanwhile, the city is still planning to create a 2008 time capsule.

Nothing better than mother's milk

Dr Aye Aye Thaw

Nutrient for a newly-born baby is mother's milk. Breast milk is perfect nutrient for a baby. Breast milk is endowed with carbohydrate, protein and vitamins. A mother gets those nourishments from the foods she has daily. So, a mother should consume foods of various types. Only then will her breast milk contain various kinds of nutrients.

Human milk contains nutrients that are enough for a baby till it is six months. Fat makes up about four per cent in human breast milk and it contributes 50 per cent of the calories needed for a baby.

The enzyme "lipase" contained in breast milk helps digest the fat easily.

Brain is the organ that absorbs glucose more than any other organ. Among the creatures, man is of highest intellectual power. So, human breast milk is the most suitable nutrient for a baby because human breast milk contains glucose most.

The content of Vitamin B1, B2 and C in the breast milk is based on the amount of food a mother consumes.

Human breast milk also contains minerals such as iron, calcium and copper. The iodine content in the human breast milk is high if a mother consumes sufficient food consisting of iodine. So, pregnant women and breastfeeding mothers should consume iodized salt daily in order that the babies will be bright with fast development of brains.

Mothers with nutritional deficiency to some extent cannot produce milk as much as normal mothers. However, the contents of principal nutrients such as glucose and proteins in the milk are equal. There may be a gap of such nutrients as vitamin A, B1 and B2 between two mothers based on types and amount of food they consume.

There is a gap of nutrients between the milk of a woman who gives abnormal birth to a baby and that of a woman who gives a normal birth. The milk of the first mother is rich in protein, sodium, magnesium, iron and chloride, and that helps the baby given abnormal birth grow rapidly. Therefore, such a baby is to be breastfed

without fail.

The mother milk of a mammal is the best for its baby. For instance, cow milk is the best for a cow's calf; goat milk, the best for a billy goat; tiger milk, the best for a tiger cub; and human milk, the best for a human baby.

The milk of a female animal is not the best for and maybe it is harmful to the baby of an animal of different species.

In a research, babies of a dead kangaroo were fed cow milk. Later, all the kangaroo babies suffered cataract in both eyes, and lost their eyesight.

When some baby seals were fed cow milk, they suffered diarrhoea seriously because the content of glucose in cow milk is much higher than that in seal milk.

So, pregnant women should be aware of the fact that human milk is the best for their babies. Pregnant women should follow the following points.

- (1) breastfeed the baby as soon as possible after giving birth,
- (2) feed the baby the initial milk instead of pumping it out in waste,
- (3) feed the baby nothing except breast milk,
- (4) breastfeed the baby regularly and frequently in order that the breasts produce more milk,
- (5) keep the breasts clean,
- (6) take time to breastfeed the baby,
- (7) breastfeed the baby day and night,
- (8) for a mother working outside, pump the breasts with clean hands and produce milk into a clean cup, and leave the milk at home (It can be kept at room temperature.)
- (9) do not feed the baby any dairy products including milk powder and sweetened condensed milk.

Typhoon "Hagupit" lands in south China

GUANGZHOU, 24 Sept — Typhoon Hagupit landed in south China's Guangdong Province at 6:45 am on Wednesday, packing hurricane force winds at 172 kilometres per hour in its eye.

The 14th strong typhoon of the year made landfall in the coastal areas of Chencun Town, Dianbai County in the city of Maoming, the provincial meteorological bureau said.

In high alarm of the typhoon, the province recalled more than 50,000 ships and nearly 200,000 fishermen or crew members on Tuesday.

The coastal city of Yangjiang evacuated 17,324 people and

checked reservoirs and dams for potential danger.

In Xuwen County, more than 11,000 people were evacuated and more than 110 reservoirs were scrutinized.

The Shenzhen Airport cancelled most domestic flights scheduled after 7 pm on Tuesday, and encouraged passengers to postpone or cancel their trips.

Educational bureau of Haikou, capital city of the island province of Hainan,

issued a notice late on Tuesday, ordering all schools and kindergartens to close on Wednesday. In the adjacent Guangxi Zhuang Autonomous Region, local governments were keeping close watch for secondary disasters.

Hagupit is the second typhoon in a week to affect Taiwan, Fujian and Guangdong, after typhoon Sinlaku lashed the region last Tuesday.

Laos sees gold production fall, copper output rise

HANOI, 24 Sept— Laos saw gold production drop while copper output on the rise in the past few years, the *Vientiane Times* reported Tuesday, citing a report from the Lao Ministry of Energy and Mines.

Gold production from the two major mining projects of Phu Bia and Sepon was 11 tons in 2006 and nine tons in 2007. The figure is

expected to drop to six tons this year, said the report. The falling production has resulted in a decline in export.

Deputy Director General of the ministry's Mines Department Simone Phichit said the lower production was due to the gold mines being exhausted. Sepon mine, the largest such project in Laos, is currently excavating gold ore in an area of only 28 square kilometres.

Meanwhile, the production of copper increased from 31 tons in 2005 and 60 tons in 2006 to 62 tons in 2007. In the first eight months of this year, 54 tons of copper have been mined, according to the report.

DPRK newspaper accuses US of spreading WMDs

PYONGYANG, 24 Sept — The Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK)'s official daily *Minju Sojon* has accused the United States of spreading weapons of mass destruction (WMDs) and sparking off an arms race.

The abrupt and broad change was widely seen as aimed at saving the approval rating which had been lingering at dangerous levels for several months.

Fukuda announced his abrupt resignation on the evening of September 1 amid ever declining approval ratings for his Cabinet, sending shockwaves across the nation and incurring criticisms. — MNA/Xinhua

Three dead, 4 injured in south China wall collapse

NANNING, 24 Sept — Three workers died and another four were injured when a retaining wall collapsed at a construction site in southern China's Guangxi Zhuang Autonomous Region on Tuesday morning, a local official said.

The accident occurred at about 9:45 a.m. after the wall collapsed at the Labour Building, which was under construction in downtown Laibin City, a municipal work safety department official said.

The injured were still being treated in hospitals, he said.

All construction projects in the city were ordered to suspend work to examine safety risk.

Cambodia to target Middle East for tourism

PHNOMPENH, 24 Sept — Cambodian Tourism Minister Thong Khon said that a new government strategy hopes to make the Kingdom a target destination for more Middle East travellers, national media reported Tuesday.

"We want to attract as many tourists from the Middle East as possible," Thong Khon was quoted by the *Phnom Penh Post* as saying.

The move comes amid efforts by Prime Minister Hun Sen to strengthen ties between Cambodia and the Middle East.

The Cambodian Government last month signed a direct-flight agreement with Qatar, Thong Khon said, adding that a similar agreement with Kuwait is expected soon.

In April, Qatar Prime Minister Sheikh Hamad Bin Jasim Bin Jabir al-Thani announced a 200-million-US-dollar investment in Cambodia's agriculture sector, while Kuwait last month pledged 546 million US dollars in soft loans to

upgrade irrigation systems and roads throughout the Kingdom.

Hun Sen is expected to pay a state visit to the Middle East in January next year, with stops in Qatar, Kuwait and the United Arab Emirates.

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Somali gunmen abduct two foreign aid workers

MOGADISHU, 24 Sept—Somali gunmen have abducted two foreigners working for the aid agency Medecins du Monde along the border with Ethiopia, the organization and witnesses said Tuesday.

Kidnapping of foreigners and aid workers has become common in Somalia, where a transitional government is fighting Islamist insurgents and clan militia rule large areas. Most hostages are freed unharmed after ransom payments or negotiations.

“All we are confirming at this point is that indeed two of our people have been taken, that they were expatriates and that we are in contact with authorities,” Susan Wright, the director of MDM UK, told Reuters from London.

In France, the organization issued a statement saying that the two employees, who were on a mission in Ogaden region, were abducted Monday and that it was in constant contact with the authorities.—Internet

Afghan ambassador-designate kidnapped in N-W Pakistan

ISLAMABAD, 24 Sept—The Afghan ambassador-designate to Pakistan Abdul Khaliq Farahi was kidnapped in the northeastern Pakistani city of Peshawar on Monday. The vehicle carrying Abdul Khaliq Farahi was attacked by unidentified gunmen in Peshawar, capital city of North West Frontier Province and the driver was killed, according to News Network International (NNI) news agency.

The gunmen kidnapped Abdul Khaliq Farahi from the Hayatabad area in Peshawar. No group claimed responsibility for the attack.

Farahi has been serving as Consul General in Peshawar since 2001 and was recently designated ambassador to Pakistan, according to NNI.

MANCHESTER (Britain), 24 Sept—British Defence Secretary Des Brown said on Monday that British involvement in Iraq has reached a turning point.

“British troops have made a substantial contribution to the fact that next year there can be a fundamental change of mission in Iraq,” he said

at the five-day on-going Labour Party Conference.

The Iraqi Armed Forces supported by British and US forces have taken on and defeated the militia in Basra, bringing about a transformation in the quality of life for ordinary Iraqis, he said without mentioning the fact that tens of thousands of

innocent Iraqis have lost their lives in the course of allied invasion since 2003.

He cited the start of the economic reconstruction as “legacy” of British armed involvement in Iraq.

Despite mounting pressure from people calling troops to come back home after about 180 soldiers were killed in Iraq alone, the Defence Secretary reiterated that “a 21st Century progressive foreign policy requires Britain to have Armed Forces who can intervene if necessary far from home”.

Britain now has 12,000 troops operating in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Merkel urges int'l framework to regulate financial market

BERLIN, 24 Sept—German Chancellor Angela Merkel Monday renewed her calls for an “international framework” to regulate financial market and promote transparency.

“These measures aren't new, they have been elaborated at the G-8 summit at Heiligendamm” during Germany's presidency last year of the Group of Eight leading

industrial nations,”Merkel said at a meeting of her Christian Democratic Union (CDU) party.

“We must follow them. Germany has always emphasized how important they are,” she said.

Merkel had called on the leading industrial nations to adopt a common position on hedge fund transparency in 2007 when Germany held the rotating

G-8 presidency. The G-8 includes the United States, Japan, Germany, Britain, France, Italy, Canada and Russia. If the G-8 member states had adopted the international framework and raised the transparency of the financial market, some of the worst financial market failures might have been avoided, Merkel said at the CDU meeting.

Chocolate helps heart stay healthy

SAN FRANCISCO, 24 Sept—A small square of dark chocolate daily protects the heart from inflammation and subsequent heart disease, a new study of Italians

suggests. Milk chocolate might not do the job. However, this guilty pleasure has a limit.

Specifically, only 6.7 grams of chocolate per day (or 0.23 ounces) represents the ideal amount, according to results from the Moli-sani Project, one of the largest health studies ever conducted in Europe. For comparison, a standardized Hershey's kiss is about 4.5 grams (though they are not made of dark chocolate) and one Hershey's dark chocolate bar is about 41 grams (so a recommendation might be one of those weekly).

Chronic inflammation of tissues in the circulatory system is a risk factor for cardiovascular disease, such as myocardial infarction or stroke. So doctors strive to keep patients' inflammation under control. One marker for inflammation in the blood is called C-reactive protein. The researchers found a relationship between dark chocolate intake and levels of this protein in the blood of 4,849 subjects in good health and free of risk factors (such as high cholesterol or blood pressure, and other parameters).—Internet

US scientists find evidence of first planetary collision

LOS ANGELES, 24 Sept — A group of U.S. scientists reported on Tuesday that two planets orbiting a sun-like star about 300 light years from Earth recently collided.

It is believed to be the first evidence of such a catastrophic event in a planetary system, said astronomers from University of California in Los Angeles (UCLA), California Institute of Technology (Caltech) and the Tennessee State University (TSU).

"It's as if Earth and Venus collided with each other," said Benjamin Zuckerman, UCLA professor of physics and astronomy. "Astronomers have never seen anything like this before. Apparently, major catastrophic collisions can take place in a fully mature planetary system."

The collision was an "ultimate extinction event" that would have wiped out any life on either planet in minutes, the researchers said in a report to be published in the December issue of *Astrophysical Journal*.

The planets were in orbit around a star — BD+20 307 — in the constellation Aries, and astronomers discovered evidence of the collision while trying to measure the star's age.

Researchers discovered an unusually large amount of dust orbiting the star at about the same distance of Venus and Earth from the sun.

TSU astronomer Gregory Henry said scientists in the United States and France have long been studying the stability of planetary orbits.

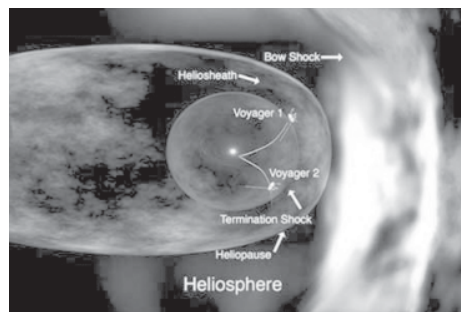
JPL scientists: sun produces less solar wind

LOS ANGELES, 24 Sept— The sun has reduced its output of solar wind to the lowest level since readings became available, Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL) scientists announced Tuesday.

"With the solar wind at an all-time low, there is an excellent chance the heliosphere will diminish in size and strength," said JPL researcher Dave McComas, citing data from the Ulysses spacecraft, a joint NASA-European space agency mission.

"If that occurs, more galactic cosmic rays will make it into the inner part of our solar system," said McComas, principal investigator of Ulysses solar wind instrument.

"The sun's million mile-per-hour solar wind inflates a protective bubble

around the solar system. It influences how things work here on earth and even out at the boundary of our solar system," McComas said.—Internet

LA health officials blame turtles for spreading salmonella

LOS ANGELES, 24 Sept — Los Angeles health officials warned on Tuesday that a salmonella outbreak affecting several states might be linked with turtles.

Evidence showed that people handling turtles were among those being infected with salmonella, the Los Angeles Department of Public Health (DPH) said in a statement.

The statement warned parents to be

wary of buying turtles for their children. "Turtles are natural carriers of salmonella bacteria," said DPH spokeswoman Sarah Kissell. "So we strongly urge parents not to buy those small turtles you might find in a dime store as pets for their children." Kissell said if people do have pet turtles, they should take extra precautions to practice good hygiene.

"We found that children were getting sick because they were kissing their pet turtles. So we want parents to guard against such facial contact," she said. "Also, it's very important to wash your hands after handling turtles and other reptiles. So parents need to educate their children on how to safely handle these animals."

The salmonella outbreak, which was reported earlier this year, affected more than 100 people, included eight cases in the Los Angeles area. Symptoms of salmonella infection include bloody diarrhea, abdominal cramps, fever and vomiting.—Internet

Typhoon hits China coast, 100,000 evacuated

HONG KONG, 24 Sept — A powerful typhoon plowed into a densely populated area of southern China on Wednesday, prompting the state Meteorological Administration to issue an "urgent red alert," its highest-level warning.

Authorities evacuated more than 100,000 people before typhoon Hagupit made landfall around dawn. The storm killed at least eight people in the Philippines earlier in the week. Tropical Storm Risk downgraded the storm from category 4 to 3 on a scale of 5 once it made land-fall. Streets were deserted and shops and businesses shuttered as the storm uprooted trees and brought down billboards in cities across the booming southern Chinese province of Guangdong, including Maoming where the center of the storm made landfall.

The state news agency *Xinhua* said a fishing boat sank but no casualties were reported.

It described typhoon Hagupit as "the worst to hit Guangdong in more than a decade," but it was not clear by what gauge it was measuring the storm when typhoons in the past have triggered heavy death tolls.—Internet

ROK president to reduce private education expense

SEOUL, 24 Sept— South Korean President Lee Myung-bak on Tuesday ordered his Cabinet to come up with fundamental measures to reduce the nation's soaring private tutoring expenses, which has become a huge financial burden on households.

"I've heard domestic households are increasingly burdened by rising private tutoring expenses. Private educational institutions

are accused of excessively raising their fees, though their business is irrelevant to global oil prices," said Lee.

He added that new policy measures are now needed to immediately help ordinary households lessen their private tutoring expenses and instructed Cabinet ministers to investigate current situation in the private education market.

Despite government's repeated efforts to cut private education, the majority of South Korea's elementary and secondary school students are known for flocking to expensive private tutoring institutions.

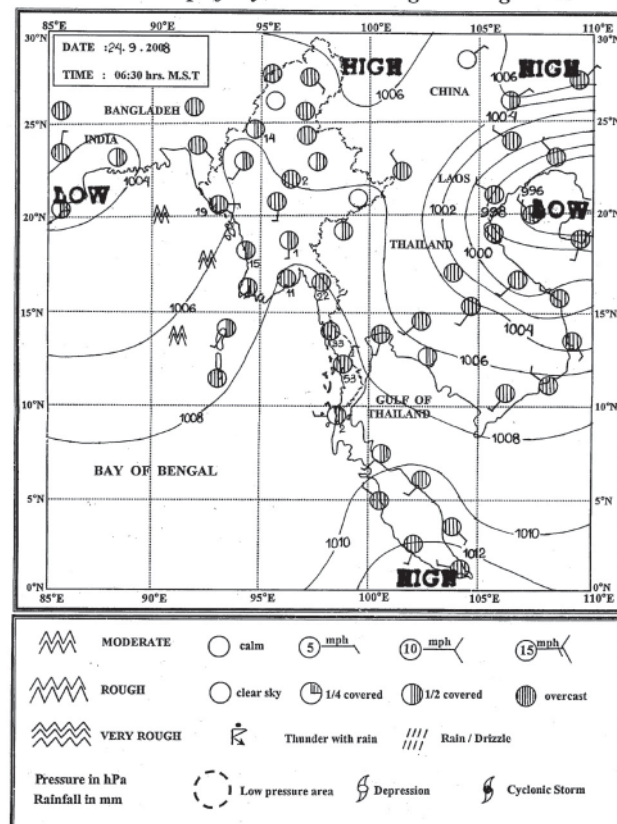
The survey by the National Statistics Office showed that 77 per cent of primary and secondary students were attending various out-of-school classes.

HK reports two more kidney stone cases of tainted milk

HONGKONG, 24 Sept— Health authorities in the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region (HKSAR) on Tuesday reported two more confirmed cases of kidney stones involving children who had consumed melamine-tainted milk products.

It brought the total number of kidney stone cases affecting children born in Hong Kong to four, said the Centre for Health Protection of the Department of Health.

The HKSAR Government said in a Press release that one of the newly confirmed cases involved a 29-month-old boy who was born in Hong Kong but lives in the Mainland. He used to consume milk products contaminated with melamine. The boy was taken to a Hong Kong hospital for examination on Monday and was diagnosed of renal stone. He was now under treatment and in stable

condition.

The fourth case involved a nine-year-old boy who was born in Hong Kong but has been living in the Mainland since he was two. He consumed melamine tainted milk products in the past four years and has no symptoms of renal problems. He was taken to a private hospital in Hong Kong for examination on Saturday and was found to have a kidney stone. He was admitted for treatment thereafter and, having been discharged, was stable now.

Hong Kong reported the first confirmed case of child kidney stone on Saturday, followed by a second case on Monday. Chief Executive Donald Tsang announced on Tuesday that a task force involving different departments will be established to tackle the long-term issues.
