Next, the Secretary-1 viewed the pictures.

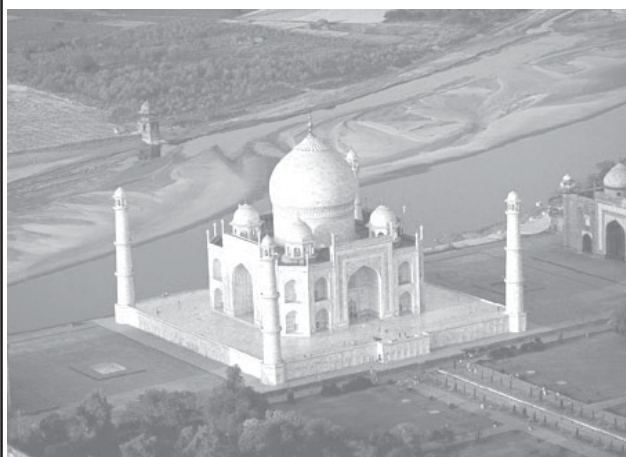

Rising Yamuna good for Taj Mahal



AGRA, 28 Sept—Heritage conservationists here disagree with the district administration's concern over the rising waters of the Yamuna river posing a threat to the Taj Mahal and other Mughal era monuments. In fact, they say, the rising waters could be good for the monuments.

Surendra Sharma, Braj Mandal Heritage Conservation Society president, said the historical buildings along the river bank in Agra had seen many floods in the past over 400 years.

"This time too the water level is not likely to rise alarmingly. In fact, the rising water level is good for the monuments.

"The original design and landscaping of the Taj Mahal shows that the river Yamuna was in full flow, touching the rear wall of the Taj built on the foundation of deep wells which should be in close contact with water.

"In the past years, so many historians and conservationists have demanded that the river be filled with water for the security of the Taj Mahal," Sharma said. R. Nath, a Mughal historian, has been maintaining that the river should always be full of water as per the original design of the Taj which included the Yamuna as its integral part.

The rising water level could pose a threat to the Taj Mahal and other Mughal monuments, Agra's District Magistrate Anil Kumar had told mediapersons Wednesday. —Internet

Extend rubber cultivation

Rubber, a perennial plant that should be grown on commercial scale, is one of the most useful and important raw materials as it is in high demand in international market. With the increase in the number of personal goods made of rubber its market is expanding in the world.

China, Japan, Korea and India are the countries in Asia region that use rubber most. The price of rubber is on the increase now as the climate affects the rubber plantations in Southeast Asia.

Cultivation of rubber has been practised in Mon State for years. It is the largest rubber growing region in the country due to the favourable conditions of land and a lot of rain in Mon State. Moreover, rubber is being grown on commercial scale in Taninthayi, Kachin, Kayin and Shan States which have suitable soil for cultivation of rubber. In Lashio, Shan State (North) rubber cultivation special zone is being established and cultivation acreage of rubber is being extended annually.

Over 900,000 acres of rubber were grown in the respective states and regions in 2007-2008 and output was over 80,000 tons of rubber and over 60,000 tons were exported. This year efforts are being made for cultivation of 200,000 more acres of rubber.

Extended cultivation of rubber in cultivable regions prevents deforestation and climate change. Nowadays neighbouring countries purchase Myanma rubber offering good price. Annual extended cultivation of rubber, an industrial raw material, by the farmers and national entrepreneurs contributes towards both the increased income for the growers and higher earning in foreign exchange for the country.

Russia blasts US role in world affairs

UNITED NATIONS, 28 Sept — Russia called Saturday for a revival of the global anti-terrorism coalition that formed after 11 Sept, 2001 but started to unravel with what it called the subsequent domination by a single power — a veiled reference to the United States.

“The solidarity of the international community fostered on the wave of struggle against terrorism turned out to be somehow ‘privatized’,” Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov told the UN General Assembly’s annual ministerial meeting.

Lavrov cited the US invasion of Iraq “under the false pretext of fight on terror and nuclear arms proliferation” and questions of excessive use of force against civilians in counterterrorism operations in Afghanistan. And he said the recent crisis over Georgia’s breakaway provinces of Abkhazia and South Ossetia proved again that

“it is impossible or even disastrous to try to resolve the existing problems in the blindfolds of the unipolar world.”

“Today, it is necessary to analyze the crisis in the Caucasus from the viewpoint of its impact on the region and the international community on the whole,” Lavrov said.

“It has become crystal clear that the solidarity expressed by all of us after 9/11 should be revived (without double standards) when we fight against any infringements upon the international law,” he said.

Lavrov called for a new “solidarity” of the international community and a strengthened United Nations, saying only in the post-Cold War world can the organization “fully realize its potential” as a global centre “for open and frank debate and coordination of the world policies on a just and equitable basis free from double standards.”—*Internet*

China astronauts return to Earth triumphant

BEIJING, 28 Sept — Three Chinese astronauts returned to Earth Sunday, completing a three-day mission that included China’s first-ever spacewalk.

The Shenzhou-7 re-entry capsule parachuted to a landing on the Inner Mongolia steppe at about 5:40 pm on Sunday.

China’s official news agency, *Xinhua*, quoted Chinese space officials saying the three astronauts were all in good health.

Premier Wen Jiabao applauded at mission control in Beijing.

The three-man crew launched from the

Jiuquan Satellite Launch Centre in northern China’s Inner Mongolia Thursday for a three-day mission, the highlight of which was Saturday’s spacewalk.

The spacewalk paves the way for assembling a space station from two Shenzhou orbital modules, the next major goal of China’s manned spaceflight programme.

China became the third country to send people into space in 2003, when military pilot Yang Liwei circled the earth for 21 hours.

Its second mission — in 2005 — had two crew members and lasted five days.—*Internet*

Israeli officials say US sends radar to Israel

JERUSALEM, 28 Sept — Israeli officials say the US has provided Israel with an advanced radar system that will give early warning in case of an Iranian missile attack. The officials say the new radar was flown into Israel last week along with some 120 American crewmen and has been set up at the Negev desert.

The system can pick up a ballistic missile shortly after launch. That will cut the response time of Israel’s Arrow system, designed to intercept incoming missiles.

The officials spoke on

condition of anonymity because the radar’s arrival has not been officially made public. It was first reported in Defence News.

The Israeli military said

Sunday it has “various forms” of cooperation with the US military but that “as a rule we do not detail the content” of the ties.

Afghan police: three civilians die in coalition strike

KABUL, 28 Sept — An Afghan police official said Sunday that a US-led coalition operation apparently targeting a suicide bomb cell in eastern Afghanistan killed three civilians.

Gen Abdul Jalal Jalal, the provincial police chief in the eastern province of Kunar, said airstrikes hit a compound in the province’s Asmar district, killing three civilians.

Civilian deaths is a highly sensitive topic in Afghanistan. President Hamid Karzai has long pleaded with international troops to avoid civilian deaths in its operations.

The Afghan government and United Nations say an 22 Aug US operation killed some 90 civilians in the western province of Herat, a strike that strained US-Afghan relations.—*Internet*

Top Afghan policewoman shot dead

KANDAHAR (Afghanistan), 28 Sept — Gunmen in the southern Afghan city of Kandahar have killed the country’s most prominent policewoman, officials say.

Lt-Col Malalai Kakar, head of Kandahar’s department of crimes against women, was shot in her car as she was about to

leave for work.

Her son was also wounded in the attack, and is said to be seriously injured.

Taliban rebels, who banned women from joining the police when they were in power, said they had carried out the shooting.

“We killed Malalai Kakar,” a Taliban spokesman said. “She was our target, and we successfully eliminated our target.” he said.

Pakistan troops kill 16 militants in Bajaur

KHAR (Pakistan), 28 Sept — Pakistani troops killed at least 16 Taliban militants after coming under attack in a tribal region near the Afghan border, a security official said Sunday.

Militants attacked three military posts near Khar, the main town in the restive Bajaur tribal district, late Saturday, but soldiers repulsed them with artillery and mortar fire, the official told *AFP*.

Early Sunday, helicopter gunships and fighter jets bombed militant positions in three villages in the district, he said.

Pakistan’s forces have launched a number of major military offensives in recent weeks against militants in Bajaur, which is thought to be an Al-Qaeda stronghold. The Pakistani military says more than 1,000 extremists have been killed in the six-week operation, including Al-Qaeda’s operational commander in Bajaur, Egyptian Abu Saeed Al-Masri. At least 27 troops have also died.

Militants attack Pakistan forces near Afghanistan

ISLAMABAD, 28 Sept — A Pakistani official says militants mounted multiple overnight strikes on security forces near the Afghan border.

Iqbal Khattak, a government official in Bajaur, said Sunday that troops repulsed three overnight attacks on their positions.

He claimed that 11 militants were killed but wouldn’t give any details of casualties among the troops.

Bajaur is a tribal region where troops have been battling Islamic militants for the past two months.

China posts nearly 24% growth in telecom business in 1st 8 months

BEIJING, 28 Sept — China's telecommunications sector realized a business volume of 1.468 trillion yuan (215.87 billion US dollars) in the first eight months of this year, a growth of 23.9 percent on the same period of last year.

The Ministry of Industry and Information Technology said on Sunday that the sector garnered 538.45 billion yuan in sales income in the eight-month period, up 8.5 percent.

Of the total revenue,

mobile telecom business accounted for 54.38 percent, up 3.48 percentage points over a year earlier, and fixed-line phone services made up 35.98 percent, 5.76 percentage points lower than the year-earlier level.

Between January

and August, the number of cell phone users increased by 68.71 million to 616.02 million nationwide, while that of fixed-line phone users decreased by 11.57 million to 354.07 million.

CAAC, Airbus sign MoU on safety cooperation

BEIJING, 28 Sept — The Europe-based aircraft mogul Airbus signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on safety cooperation with

the Civil Aviation Administration of China (CAAC) on Sunday.

The MoU covers a five-year cooperation programme in the areas of

rules and regulations training for Chinese aviation authorities, aviation research institutes and colleges and maintenance support for airlines.

The programme also includes a "train the trainer" scheme for Chinese teachers on aviation technology and industry.

This MoU follows an earlier Safety Cooperation Agreement that was signed in 2002.

The MoU was signed by Airbus President and CEO Tom Enders and Li Jiaxiang, head of CAAC.

Ten dead, over 60 hospitalized by poisoned liquor in Sri Lanka

COLOMBO, 28 Sept — At least 10 people died while 67 others received treatment after consuming an illicit local brew of alcohol in the Western Province, the Sri Lankan police said on Saturday.

The people who had consumed this contaminated local brew of alcohol have been admitted to the hospital at Gampaha, 39 km north of the capital Colombo since Wednesday, police at the Weliveriya town said.

Janaka Mayadunne,

the medical superintendent of the hospital said 10 deaths had occurred while a few of those undergoing treatment are also not in stable condition.

A 60-year-old woman was among those who died.

Police believed that the local brew of alcohol may have been stored in containers carrying a poisonous substance.

The woman brew owner was arrested, the police said.

One killed, 9 injured in explosion in N Sri Lanka

COLOMBO, 28 Sept — One person was killed and nine others were injured in a suicide attack launched by a Tamil Tiger rebel in northern Sri Lanka, the military said on Sunday.

Military spokesman Udaya Nanayakkara said that the suicide bomber on a push cycle rammed into a three-wheeler carrying police in the Vavuniya town at around 03:15 p.m. local time (0945 GMT).

The driver of the three-wheeler was killed and nine others including four police, three soldiers and two civilians were injured in the blast.

The suicide bomber was also killed in the explosion.

Vavuniya is the gateway to the north where government troops are currently engaged in a battle to evict Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam rebels from their last strongholds.

Kenya says won't negotiate with ransom demanding pirates

NAIROBI, 28 Sept — The Kenyan government said Saturday it would not negotiate with ransom demanding Somali pirates that hijacked Ukrainian ship off the coast of the war-torn nation late Thursday carrying military equipment destined for the East

African nation.

A statement from the Government Spokesman, Alfred Mutua said that the government "does not and will not negotiate with international criminals, pirates and terrorists and will endeavour to recover the hijacked ship and military cargo."

The Belize-flagged Faina vessel was carrying an authorized Ukrainian government arms shipment for the Kenyan government including T-72 tanks, an extra number of armoured personnel carriers to be used by the military in the country.

Spokesman: China to build space station in 2020

BEIJING, 28 Sept — China aims to set up a space station in 2020 and before that it will launch a "simple" space lab in 2011, said a spokesman of the country's manned space programme Sunday evening.

The station will be attended to by human beings, said Wang Zhaoyao at a Press conference following the successful landing of the country's third manned mission Shenzhou-7.

The orbiter docking technology will be tested after the Shenzhou-7 mission, he said. —Xinhua

Three samples of biscuit found melamine in Hong Kong

HONG KONG, 28 Sept— The Centre for Food Safety of Hong Kong (CFS) released on Saturday the latest batch of results of melamine tests on dairy products and baby food. Three samples of biscuit and a sample of milk biscuit were found unsatisfactory.

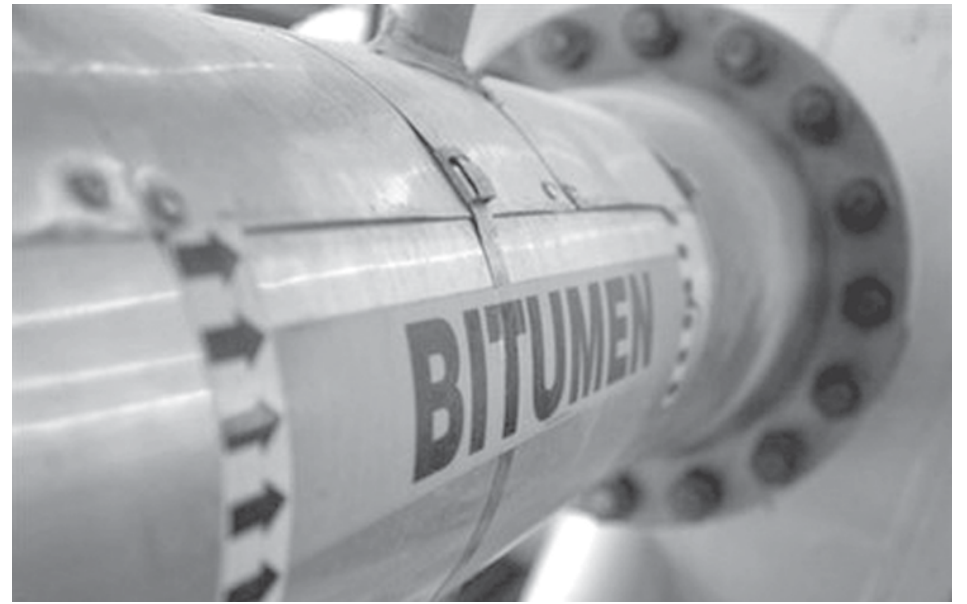
Among 145 samples tested, including cakes,

bread, milk and milk beverages produced locally; Chinese mainland frozen confections, raw milk, milk and milk beverages; coffee creamer produced on the mainland and overseas; and milk powder and baby food from overseas, 141 were satisfactory.

But Lotte Koala Strawberry Biscuit, Lotte

Koala's March Chocolate Biscuit and Lotte Koala Biscuit were found with a melamine level of 3ppm detected.

In addition, a sample of milk biscuit was found unsatisfactory with a melamine level of 3ppm. The sample was collected by the CFS following up with public's food complaint. —Internet

Kidnapped tourists back in Sudan

KHARTOUM, 28 Sept — Bandits who kidnapped 19 tourists and Egyptians in the desert have taken their hostages back to Sudan but are now heading towards Egypt, Sudanese officials said on Sunday.

"Security organs on Saturday detected the return of the kidnapers... with their hostages into the Sudanese borders," said Ali Yousuf, director of protocol at the foreign ministry, the official news agency *SUNA* reported.

However, he added that the group now appears to be moving from Sudan towards "the Egyptian borders."

"It seems that all the hostages are well," he added.

The group, seized by gunmen in southern Egypt nine days ago, was moved across the border to Sudan to the remote mountain region of Jebel Uweinat, a 1,900-metre-high (6,200-foot-high) plateau roughly 30 kilometres (20 miles) in diameter that straddles the borders of Egypt, Libya and Sudan. —Internet

80 people killed in tourism accidents this year

BEIJING, 28 Sept — China National Tourism Administration (CNTA) said on Saturday that although the tourism safety situation had remained stable nationwide up to date, 80 people had died in tourism accidents since the beginning of this year.

Altogether 391 people got hurt and 4 were missing in 33 tourism accidents, of which 27 were tourism transportation accidents, according to CNTA's latest statistics.

The tourism watchdog called on relevant local authorities to be alert to the safety work, formulate emergency management plans and prevent tourism accidents during the coming one-week National Day holiday which starts from 29 Sept. —Internet

Gunmen kidnap Polish engineer in northern Pakistan

ATTOCK, (Pakistan), 28 Sept — Gunmen on Sunday kidnapped a Polish engineer in northern Pakistan, and shot dead his two drivers and a security guard during the abduction, police said.

The kidnapping took place near the village of Pind Sultani in Attock district, police said.

"Three Pakistanis, a security guard and two drivers, were shot dead by unknown gunmen as they kidnapped Peter Stanczak, a Polish engineer working with an oil company in the area," police official Kazim Ali told *AFP*. —Internet

Toilet-paper researchers create 3-ply tissue

If two-ply toilet paper is good, then three-ply tissue must be better. At least that's what toilet-paper researchers in northeastern Wisconsin hope.

Yes, there is such a thing as a toilet-paper researcher. And a team of them at Georgia Pacific's Innovation Institute in Neenah has come up with a three-ply version of its Quilted Northern product.

The new product will be launched Monday. The company touts the toilet tissue as "ultra-soft" and says it plans to market the product to women 45 and older who view their bathroom as a "sanctuary for quality time."

Industry analyst Bill Schmitz is skeptical. He said extra layers make toilet paper stronger, not softer, although he said Georgia Pacific may have added extra fibres for softness.

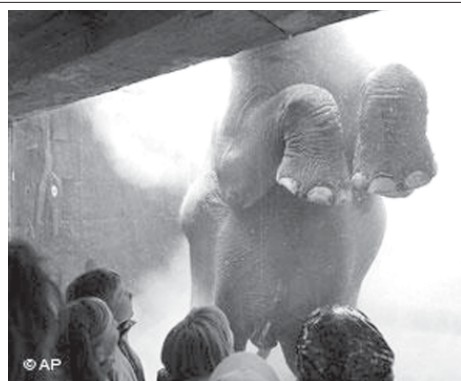
Man acquitted in Aug accused of robbing same bank

A man acquitted a month ago of robbing a bank has been arrested in another robbery at the same bank.

The man, 35, was accused of robbing Liberty Bank on Tuesday, police say.

The man was acquitted Aug 21 of robbing the bank last October after employees could not positively identify him during his trial.

In another case, the man faces charges of aggravated assault and aggravated robbery in the beating of an elderly woman inside the downtown post office last fall. Police said he stole the woman's purse and her car.

It is sponsored by the Association of Zoos and Aquariums.

Association spokesman Steve Feldman says zoo keepers have long used painting as a way to mentally stimulate animals. Animal artwork also has been sold for some time and for surprising amounts of money, but Feldman says Tuesday marks the first collaborative effort by zoos.

Case of the \$5K designer umbrella ruled frivolity

It's a rainy day for the Manhattan restaurateur who sued a supermodel claiming she intentionally damaged his designer umbrella, said to be worth \$5,000.

State Supreme Court Justice Joan A Madden threw out Nello Balan's lawsuit Friday. She also fined Balan's attorney \$500 for filing a frivolous claim and said motions the attorney filed were a "waste of judicial resources."

Balan claimed he lent supermodel Le Call his limited-edition leather umbrella designed by Jean-Paul (ZHON'-Pawl) Gaultier (GOL'-tee-yay) and she belatedly returned it to him in two pieces.

Balan, owner of the celeb magnet Nello's, sought \$1 million in the lawsuit and claimed emotional distress over the damaged umbrella. Attorneys for both sides have declined to comment.

Chavez stops in Cuba, meets with Fidel Castro

HAVANA, 28 Sept — Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez made his second whirlwind visit to Cuba in less than a week and met behind closed doors for two and a half hours with ailing former leader Fidel Castro, state media reported Sunday.

Chavez's stopover had not been previously announced, but the Communist Youth newspaper *Juventud Rebelde* said he landed in Havana Saturday evening

and left hours later. He was greeted at the airport by 77-year-old Raul Castro, who succeeded his brother as president in February.

The newspaper published a photo of Chavez shaking hands with a serious-faced Raul Castro. There were no images of the ailing, 82-year-old Fidel, who has not been seen in public since undergoing emergency intestinal surgery in July 2006.—*Internet*

Apple selling unlocked iPhone 3G in Hong Kong

HONG KONG, 28 Sept — Apple has made an unlocked version of the iPhone 3G available in Hong Kong, letting consumers pick whichever carrier they so choose.

This is in sharp contrast to Apple's policy for the almost everywhere else on the planet. Unlocked iPhones are rampant worldwide, but that isn't something that Apple has sanctioned.

Hamas frees 30 Fatah members from Gaza jail

GAZA, 28 Sept — The security forces of Gaza-ruler Hamas on Sunday released around 30 rival Fatah movement members behind the bars in the Gaza Strip, including former Gaza governor and the Fatah Gaza spokesman.

Spokesman for Hamas Ministry of Interior Ihab al-Ghusein told reporters that the release of senior Fatah leaders was "a goodwill gesture to mark the Muslim holiday of Eid al-Fitr," which falls on Wednesday marking the end of the Muslim fasting month of Ramadan.

Their release was also in response to calls made by Deputy Speaker of the parliament Ahmad Bahar "to strengthen the Egyptian efforts of reconciliation," he added.—*Internet*

Texas homeowner acquitted of killing teen intruder

LAREDO (Texas), 28 Sept — A Texas jury acquitted a man accused of killing a boy who broke into his home looking for a snack — a case that sparked outrage in this border city, where many thought the man should not have even been charged.

It took the jury of eight men and four women three hours Friday to find Jose Luis Gonzalez, 63, not guilty of murdering Francisco Anguiano, who was 13 when he and three friends broke into Gonzalez's trailer to rummage for snacks and soda one night in July 2007.

"I thank God and my attorney, the jury and the judge," Gonzalez said in Spanish after the verdict. "It was a case where it was my life or theirs, and it's a very good thing that they (the jurors) decided in my favour."

Gonzalez said he was sorry for Anguiano's death, but "it was a situation in which I feared for my life."

UCLA group discovers humongous prime number

LOS ANGELES, 28 Sept — Mathematicians at UCLA have discovered a 13 million-digit prime number, a long-sought milestone that makes them eligible for a \$100,000 prize.

The group found the 46th known Mersenne prime last month on a network of 75 computers running Windows XP. The number was verified by a different computer system running a different algorithm.

It's the eighth Mersenne prime discovered at UCLA.

Primes are numbers like three, seven and 11 that are divisible by only two whole positive numbers: themselves and one.

Mersenne primes — named for their discoverer, 17th century French mathematician Marin Mersenne — are expressed as 2P-1, or two to the power of "P" minus one. P is itself a prime number. For the new prime, P is 43,112,609.

Thousands of people around the world have been participating in the Great Internet Mersenne Prime Search, or GIMPS, a cooperative system in which underused computing power is harnessed to perform the calculations needed to find and verify Mersenne primes.

Finland mourns 10 victims of school shooting

HELSINKI (Finland),28 Sept — Finns nationwide are mourning the victims of a school massacre in which a lone gunman killed 9 fellow students and a teacher before shooting himself.

President Tarja Halonen and other government members are attending a special memorial service broadcast live on radio and television from the western town of Kauhajoki, where the 22-year-old gunman shot and set fire to his victims at a vocational college.

The Sunday church services follow Finland's second school shooting in less than a year. In No-

vember, an 18-year-old student fatally shot eight people and himself at a high school in southern Finland.

Politicians and other leaders have called for tighter gun laws in response to the massacres.

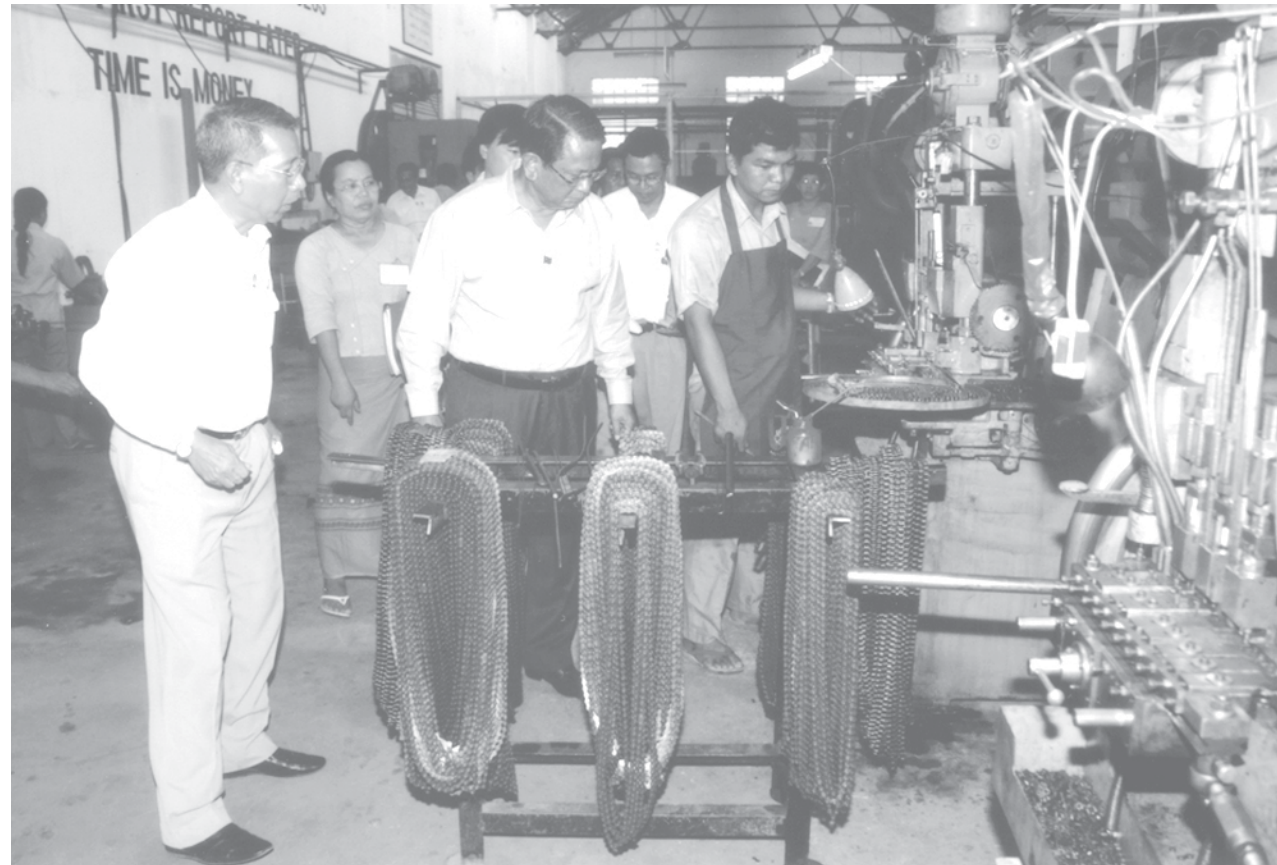

Acidifying oceans are brewing up an underwater din

CALIFORNIA, 28 Sept—The big blue ocean is getting noisier. Sound can now travel further than it did a century ago, thanks to carbon emissions that have made the oceans more acidic.

Researchers have known for some time that acidity can influence how far sound travels in seawater. In the 1970s, acoustic measurements showed that the reach of low-frequency sounds varies between oceans. A whale's call, for example, travels further in the north Pacific than in the north Atlantic, due to differences in pH.

Exactly how the process works is unclear, especially at frequencies below 1 kilohertz, which include whale calls, crashing waves and whirring ship engines.

"At these frequencies the exact molecular mechanism is still a bit fuzzy," says Peter Brewer of the Monterey Bay Aquarium Research Institute in California.

Some parts were imported for manufacturing the transformers. Nowadays, the factory has the capability to totally produce all parts for the transformers.

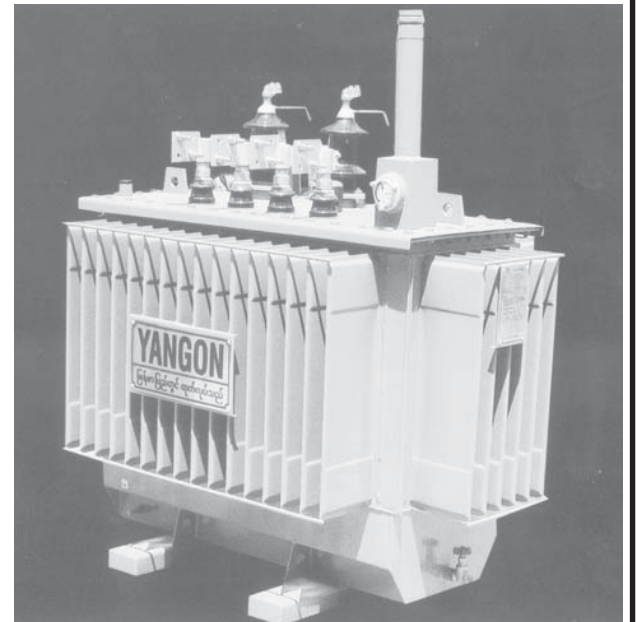

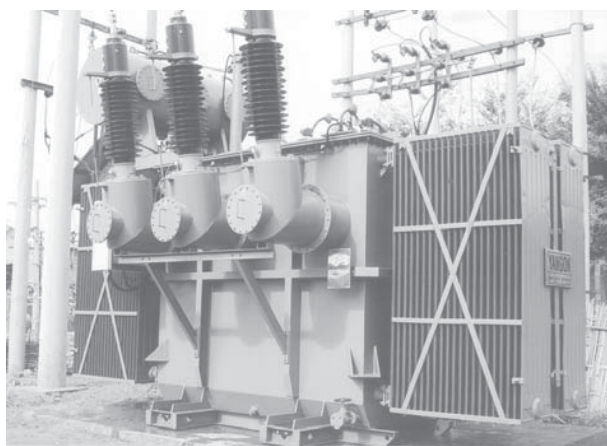

Chinese students encouraged to run in winter

BEIJING, 28 Sept — China's Ministry of Education is launching a campaign to promote student health in the coming winter.

The campaign, dubbed "sunny sports" involves nearly all students across the country, including those from primary schools (the fifth and sixth grades only), middle schools and colleges.

As outlined by the ministry and the General Administration of Sport, students would be required to run every work day from 26 Oct of this year until the end of next April.

The notice provided distance guidelines for students to follow. Kids at primary schools have to run one km per day. It's 1.5 km for students at junior high schools and 2

km for senior high school and college/university students.

Chen Zhiyong, an official from the ministry, said schools will arrange when and where students can run, although, busy roads are not allowed.

Three dead, 15 injured in Ethiopia blast

ADDIS ABABA, 28 Sept — At least three people were killed and 15 injured Sunday in an explosion in eastern Ethiopia, as

investigators scrambled to determine if it was an act of terrorism or an accident, police said.

"An explosion this morning downtown Jijiga, near a hotel, has killed three people and there are above 15 wounded," he said.

"I suspect it is a terrorist action because we have some problems in this area. But there is an investigation opened. We'll look into the matter to confirm if it is a terrorist action or an accidental explosion," Hailu said.

At least six injured in Egyptian National Theatre fire

CAIRO, 28 Sept — At least six people have been injured in the fire that broke out Saturday evening in the Egyptian National Theatre in downtown Cairo, the state MENA news agency reported.

Four of the injured, including two policeman, a firefighter and a theatre worker, were rushed to nearby hospitals for medical treatment and the other two firemen were receiving treatment at the scene, head of the emergency services at the Health Ministry Mohamed Sultan said.

The huge fire, which was under control, occurred at about 5:45 pm local time (1545 GMT) in the main hall of the theatre, reported the Egyptian Nile

TV news channel.

Egyptian Culture Minister Farouq Hosni arrived at the scene after hearing about the incident, said the report, adding the fire was probably caused by a short circuit.

The stage curtain caught fire first just ten minutes before the Iftar (fasting breaking meal in

the holy fasting month of Ramadan), Deputy Interior Minister Major General Sherif Gomaa told MENA.

On 19 August, a fire broke out in the building of the Egyptian Shura Council (upper house of the parliament), also in downtown Cairo.

Teen survives, 4 killed in medevac crash

WASHINGTON, 28 Sept — Police on Sunday said three Maryland State Police personnel and a teenage girl were killed when a medical evacuation helicopter crashed in suburban Maryland.

The Maryland State Police helicopter crashed late Saturday night, leaving four of the five people on board dead, said Col Terrence Sheridan, superintendent of the Maryland State Police.

Federal and state authorities were trying to determine what caused the crash, Sheridan said.

The helicopter was on its way to Prince George's Hospital with two patients who had been critically injured in a Charles County, Maryland, car crash. The helicopter went down in a wooded area on a park trail in the Capitol Heights/Ritchie communities, Sheridan said.

A state police pilot, a paramedic, an emergency medical services technician and one of the patients were killed, he said.

The other patient — an 18-year-old girl —

survived the crash and was being treated at a hospital, he said. She was in critical condition, Sheridan said.

Sheridan characterized the crash as the worst in the history of the police department.

"This is a devastating tragedy," said Sheridan. "We have had crashes before but never with four

dead. This is the worst."

The pilot radioed that he was going back to Andrews Air Force Base to avoid bad weather just before midnight, Brady said. Two ambulances were sent to Andrews to meet the helicopter and carry the patients to the trauma centre.

KHARTOUM, Sudan 28 Sept — The Sudanese Army says that it killed six alleged kidnappers in a high speed chase across the northern Sudanese desert, but the missing Europeans are still being held.

A desert safari tour of 11 Europeans and eight Egyptians were kidnapped by gunmen deep in the southern Egyptian deserts on 22 Sept.

Sudanese military spokesman,

Sawarmy Khaled, has told The Associated Press that the Army came upon a vehicle filled with eight armed men near the Egyptian border and gave chase when they refused to stop.

In the ensuing gunbattle, he said, six were killed. The remaining two said the kidnapped Europeans were being held in Chad.

Khaled described the leader of the group as being Chadian.—Internet

Lebanese Army should be equipped without foreign permission

BEIRUT, 28 Sept — Hizbollah chief Hassan Nasrallah said the Lebanese Army's strength can not be built by waiting for permission from Israel and the United States, local *Daily Star* reported Saturday.

"We should not wait for permission from Israel and the United States to upgrade the capabilities of the Lebanese Army," Nasrallah told a crowd of supporters on the occasion of "Jerusalem day" in the southern suburbs of Beirut on Friday.

"We should form a team of ministers to secure the necessary funds to build the military capabilities of the Army, and search even in the black market to buy weapons," Nasrallah said.

His remarks were in response to reports saying that Israel is blocking any US military assistance, including night goggles, to the Lebanese Army.

On the reconciliation efforts with Sunni majority leader MP Saad Hariri, Nasrallah said "reconciliation aims at reducing tension and facilitates next parliamentary elections," noting that it does not necessarily mean the formation of a new political alliance. — MNA/Xinhua

Chinese FM attends "developing-five" gathering

NEW YORK, 28 Sept — Chinese Foreign Minister Yang Jiechi on Saturday attended a foreign ministers' meeting of China, India, Brazil, South Africa, and Mexico, and held separate talks with his Russian and British counterparts.

At the foreign ministers meeting of the five developing nations, Yang said strengthening cooperation and coordination among China, India, Brazil, South Africa and Mexico in international affairs is conducive to maintaining the common interests of the five countries and those of other developing countries, and to advancing South-South cooperation and South-North dialogues.

At the meeting, held on the sidelines of the 63rd session of the United Nations General Assembly, the five foreign

ministers had in-depth exchange of ideas on such issues as food security, climate change, and financial stability, and discussed furthering cooperation among the five nations.

During his meeting with Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov, Yang said China and Russia have had frequent high-level exchanges this year, with substantial progress in their pragmatic cooperation in various fields, further enriching the content and consolidating the foundation of the Sino-Russian strategic partnership of cooperation, bringing in to play the potentials of bilateral cooperation. Yang said the two sides should have further closer exchanges and strengthen coordination to constantly advance bilateral cooperation for new achievements.

Hamas says not to soften demands in prisoner swap

GAZA, 28 Sept — Hamas on Saturday vowed it will not soften its demands to free a captive Israeli soldier for a number

of Palestinian prisoners.

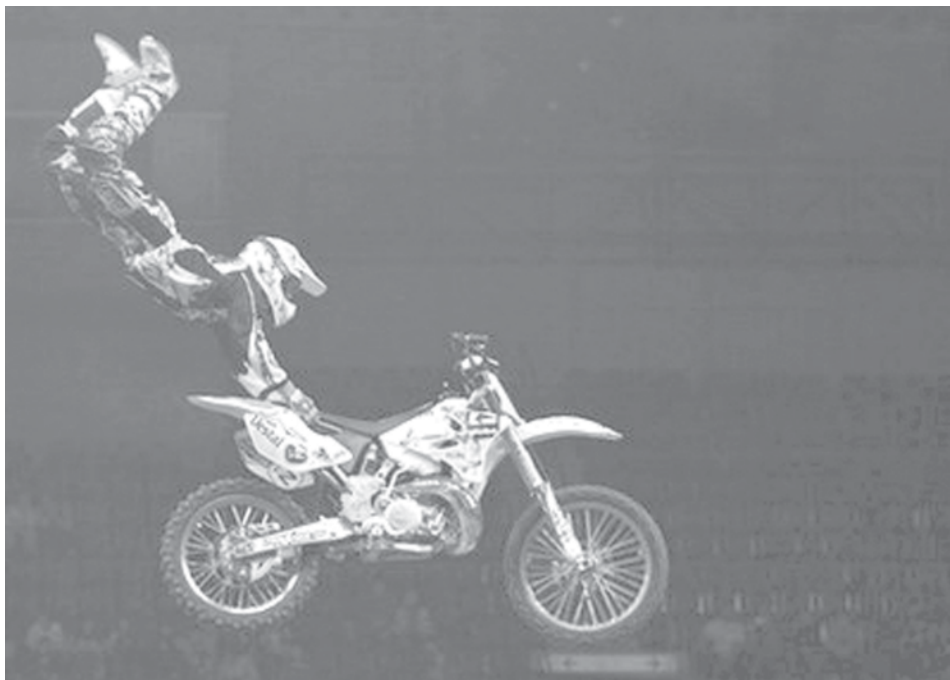

Responding to the new Israeli offer, less than half

of Hamas demands, Al-Muzini said the new list "represents an Israeli flexible stance and a recognition of Hamas demands' fairness, a humanitarian demand that can not be given away".

However, al-Muzini said the new Israeli offer was "inadequate because what Hamas demands is the minimum thing that can not undergo concessions".

81 rebels killed as fighter jets target LTTE stronghold

COLOMBO, 28 Sept — At least 81 LTTE cadres were killed as Sri Lankan armed forces using fighters and artilleries pounded Tigers' stronghold, with troops reported to be on the outskirts of the key Kilinochchi town.

The fighter jets targeted female 'Black Tigers' training facility at Rathnapuram, Kilinochchi, as well as LTTE logistic centres and vehicles storage areas in a major escalation of the country's ongoing civil strife.

The Defence Ministry said that at least 81 Tamil Tigers were killed as jets pounded 'Black Tiger' training facility in the embattled northern Lanka.

The rise in the heat of

the battle comes amidst reports that Sri Lankan forces are within sights of the town, considered to be administrative and military headquarters of the LTTE. "Sri Lankan Air Force fighter jets have launched a precision air strike at the LTTE's main female 'Black Tiger' training facility located at Rathnapuram, Kilinochchi this afternoon," an official said.

"The target was located 1.5 kilometres East of the A-9 trunk road and North of the Iranamadu Tank," Air Force spokesperson Wing Commander Janaka Nanayakkara said, adding the target was acquired on real-time ground information. — MNA/PTI

Hurricane Kyle bolts Carolina, races toward Maine

MIAMI, 28 Sept — Hurricane Kyle is continuing its northward trek, staying well off the coast of North Carolina as it races toward Maine.

At 2 am EDT Sunday, Kyle was centred about 275 miles south of Nantucket, according to the National Hurricane Centre in Miami.

Kyle had top sustained winds near 75 mph. The Category 1 hurricane was moving north over the open Atlantic at 23 mph. The storm is expected to strengthen slightly before weakening closer to Maine.

Kyle's centre is forecast to be near eastern New England or the Canadian Maritime provinces late Sunday or early Monday, the Hurricane Centre said. —Internet

Iraq signs billion-dollar power deals with GE, Siemens

DUBAI, 28 Sept — Iraq has signed preliminary deals worth billions of dollars with General Electric Co and Siemens for equipment to almost double electricity generation capacity, an energy official said on Saturday.

The deals with GE, Siemens and a third company would be worth a total of \$7 billion to \$8 billion,

Iraq's Electricity Minister Karim Waheed told *Reuters*. Years of war, sanctions and neglect have battered Iraq's power grid and the country suffers chronic power shortages. The capital Baghdad receives only a few hours of electricity a day. The deals would mark a big step in the country's reconstruction, Waheed said. —Internet

PARIS 28 Sept — From household solar panels to thermal generators big enough to power a town, sun power has enjoyed explosive growth around the world.

Everywhere, that is, except on the sun-drenched continent of Africa.

With an average daily dose of five-to-seven kilowatts per hour (kWh) for every square metre (10 square feet), Africa has more potential for producing energy from the sun than almost anywhere on Earth, with the possible exception of northern Australia or the Arabian peninsula.

Yet the continent accounts for only a minuscule percentage of the world's solar energy output.

DPRK accuses US of breaking six-party N-agreement

UNITED NATIONS, 28 Sept— The DPRK Vice Foreign Minister Pak Kil Yon, in a speech to the UN General Assembly's general debate on Saturday, accused the United States of breaking a six-party nuclear agreement and vowed to take counter-measures.

"The US has laid an artificial obstacle to implementing the 3 October agreement by refusing to implement her obligations

and put forward such an unjust demand as verification of the 'international standard' never agreed on among the six parties or between the DPRK and the US," the DPRK high official said, referring to the nuclear agreement reached by the six parties in Beijing on 3 October, 2007.

"The 'international standard' asserted by the US is nothing but 'special inspection' which the

IAEA called for in the 1990s to infringe upon the sovereignty of the DPRK and caused it to pull out of the NPT (Nonproliferation Treaty) in the end," he said.

"Now that the US has broken the agreement, the DPRK is inevitably taking relevant counter-measures on the basis of the principle of 'action for action,'" the DPRK official said.

Official says Indian tourism soaring high

LONDON, 28 Sept — Despite adverse world economic conditions, India has registered a robust growth in Foreign Travel Arrivals, a top Indian Government official said here.

"Despite prevalent adverse world economic conditions and record high oil prices, Foreign Tourist Arrivals in India

recorded a robust growth of 10.4 per cent during January to August this year," Secretary, Tourism, Government of India SBanerjee said in his address at the 57th Indian Travel Congress/Travel Agents Association of India (TAAI) Convention here last night.

"There was a 26 per

cent growth from Eastern Europe, 22 per cent growth from Australia, 24 per cent from East Asia and 37 per cent from the Scandinavian countries," he said.

Banerjee informed the convention that in 2007, India was the second largest investor in London with FDI of 52 billion pounds. — MNA/PTI

China continues health check on kids fed

SHIJIAZHUANG, 28 Sept — Health authority of Shijiazhuang City in Hebei Province said it would continue health checkup on babies fed with baby milk powder to ensure that sick kids could be treated timely.

The city had checked 232,988 children who were born during or after 2006 and were fed baby

formula from 15 September to 26 September. Out of those checked, 113,767 kids were fed baby formula made by Sanlu dairy group, the company at the heart of the contamination scandal.

A total of 3,650 children were diagnosed as being sick after drinking baby formula

tainted with the chemical melamine, said Wen Honghai, chief of the health department of Shijiazhuang, capital of Hebei Province. Daily checkups decreased from the peak of more than 42,000 babies to 8,750 babies, said Wen.

"We will not loosen checkup so that every sick kid can be treated timely and effectively," Wen said.

The government offered free health checkup to babies.

The State Administration of Quality Supervision, Inspection and Quarantine (AQSIQ) announced last Tuesday it had found the chemical melamine in 69 batches of baby milk powder produced by 22 companies nationwide.

The agency issued a watch-list of the 22 companies and their tainted products on the same day.

Defoe refused to celebrate his 12th goal in 18 matches since leaving White Hart Lane but that will do little to ease the pressure mounting on the manager, Juande Ramos. Crouch, meanwhile, never had the opportunity to make an impact at the club where he began his career as a trainee, but his close-range header, scored just as Spurs were threatening an equaliser, will have certainly made its mark on Tottenham fans.

Portsmouth made a confident start to the match, full-back Nadir Belhadj showing both strong running and an excellent touch on the left flank and the livewire Defoe eager to prove a point against the side that sold him in January despite a return of 64 goals in 110 starts for the London club. Defoe had the ball in the net as early as the third minute when he raced on to Crouch's flick-on but the offside flag muted his celebrations, while Richard Hughes did well to unleash a shot from the edge of the area at full stretch, which required a diving save from Heurelho Gomes.

Wenger laments complacency after Hull loss

LONDON, 28 Sept — Arsene Wenger angrily accused Arsenal of complacency after they slid to an embarrassing 2-1 home defeat to Hull City on Saturday.

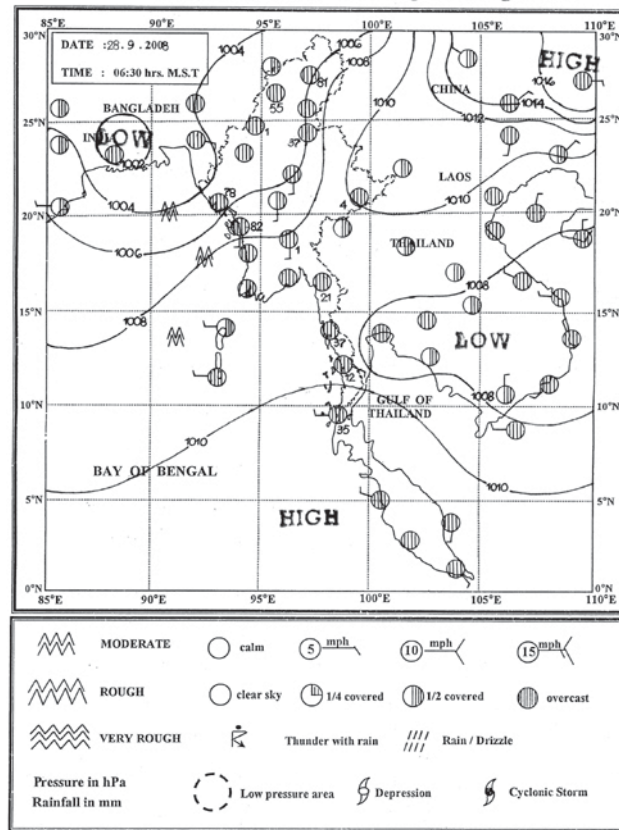
US destroyer watching hijacked ship off Somalia

MOGADISHU, 28 Sept — A US destroyer off the coast of Somalia closed in Saturday on a hijacked Ukrainian ship loaded with tanks and ammunition, watching it to ensure the pirates who seized it do not try to remove any cargo or crew. As Russian and American ships pursued the hijackers of the Ukrainian-operated vessel, pirates seized another ship off Somalia's coast, an international anti-piracy group said.

The Greek tanker with a crew of 19 is carrying refined petroleum from Europe to the Middle East. It was ambushed Friday in the Gulf of Aden, said Noel Choong, who heads the International Maritime Bureau's piracy reporting centre based in Malaysia. He said pirates chased and fired at the ship before boarding it.

FALBYGDEN, 28 Sept—Archaeologists have been captivated by a Bronze Age knife which was uncovered along with other artifacts from an excavation site near Falbygden in central Sweden.

The knife was discovered at the Firse Sten tomb

Rare knife uncovered from ancient Swedish tomb

in Falköping and is in remarkably good condition, despite having been buried for thousands of years.

"It's a knife blade which ends in a handle that looks like the throat and head of a horse," said antiques expert Peter Jankav from Falbygdens museum to Sveriges Radio.

The knife was found near the entrance to a 5,000-year-old tomb, although the knife itself is thought to be about 3,000-years-old, since the Stone Age burial site was later re-used by people from the Bronze Age.
