Strive for development of rural areas

The government has been implementing the tasks for development of rural areas in which most of the population reside. Urban and rural areas as a result have developed in tandem.

Transport and communications for the rural people have become easier as new roads linking village to village and rural and urban areas and a large number of bridges crossing rivers and creeks are being built. Moreover, new basic education schools, affiliated schools, basic education high schools and self-reliant rural libraries have been built and electric power for rural areas has also been supplied.

Station hospitals and rural dispensaries that provide health care services have also been opened. Thuyethamein station hospital, paediatric ward, new village basic education middle school (branch school) were opened on 4 October in Waw township, Bago Division, with the contribution of wellwishers and the ministry concerned.

Similarly, two new 16-bed station hospitals in Paunglaung region and Kyinichaung Village in Kayan Township were opened in September. With the opening of such hospitals public health care services can be provided to the local people.

Safe drinking water is now available in 78 townships in Sagaing, Magway and Mandalay Divisions as the government has carried out drinking water supply tasks on a wide scale in those areas.

Education, health and social standards of the rural people have gradually improved with the active participation of the local people, wellwishers and other social organizations in the implementation of the government's rural development tasks.

Bombs hit near Baghdad Green Zone as US official visits

BAGHDAD, 8 Oct — Two powerful bombs exploded just outside Baghdad's tightly-guarded Green Zone on Tuesday as US Deputy Secretary of State John Negroponte was due to address reporters inside, an *AFP* correspondent said.

An Iraqi military officer said at least one soldier was wounded in the explosions which went off in quick succession.

The first blast targeted an Iraqi armoured vehicle, and a car bomb went off minutes later at a nearby car park opposite the foreign ministry, on the edge of the Green Zone where Iraq's government and the US embassy are located.

Witnesses said a limpet-type magnetic mine had been used in the first attack against the armoured vehicle which was parked at a security checkpoint leading to the Green Zone. Several cars were damaged and firefighters put out the flames before they could spread to other cars.

Outside the Green Zone, soldiers fired in the air to keep motorists and pedestrians away from the bombed area.

The attacks in the central Salhiyah neighbourhood of Baghdad came despite a tight security cordon and stepped-up checks on vehicles and followed a spate of bombings in the Iraqi capital last week.—*Internet*

Afghans refugees flee Pakistan war zone

ISLAMABAD, 8 Oct— Afghan refugees ordered out of a Pakistani war zone begged Tuesday for bus fares and flowed over the border into their homeland, worsening a humanitarian crisis resulting from an Army offensive against Taliban militants, officials said.

Pakistan has told 50,000 Afghans to leave the Bajur tribal region, accusing them of links to militants that used the remote and impoverished area as a base for attacks on both sides of the frontier.

US officials concerned about the escalating insurgency in Afghanistan have praised the military operation in a region that has been touted as a possible hiding place for al-Qaida chief Osama bin Laden.

Female suicide bomber kills nine in northeast of Baghdad

BAGHDAD, 8 Oct — A woman suicide bomber blew herself up on Wednesday outside a court in Baquba, the capital city of the volatile province of Diyala, killing nine people and wounding 21 others, a provincial police source said. The attack occurred around midday when a woman wearing an explosive-belt blew herself up among a crowd of people at the entrance of the city court, the source told *Xinhua* on condition of anonymity.

The powerful blast also destroyed several nearby civilian cars and buildings in the city, some 65 km northeast of Baghdad, the source said.

Diyala Province, which stretches from the eastern edges of Baghdad to the Iranian border, has long been stronghold for al-Qaida in Iraq network.

US and Iraqi security forces have been conducting major offensives against extremist Sunni and Shiite militiamen in the province and some other provinces.

US soldier, Iraqi policeman killed in northern Iraq

BAGHDAD, 8 Oct—One US soldier and one Iraqi policeman were killed in overnight shootout in the city of Mosul, the US military said on Tuesday.

The incident took place after midnight when a local family reported to the Iraqi police that a suicide bomber entered their house and the family fled, a military statement said.

US and Iraqi forces approached the house where they received small-arms fire from the suspected al-Qaida militant, the statement said.

The troops then called in air support and an aircraft dropped an ordnance on the house destroying it, the statement added.

In separate incident, a suicide bomber drove an explosive-laden vehicle into a US military patrol in the al-Borsa neighbourhood in western Mosul, killing two Iraqis and wounding ten others, a local security source said.—*Internet*

US budget deficit hits new record

WASHINGTON, 8 Oct — The US federal budget deficit hit a new record of 483 billion dollars in the 2008 fiscal year which ended on 30 Sept, the Congressional Budget Office (CBO) estimated Tuesday.

The new record of budget deficit followed last year's 162-billion-dollar red ink and exceeded the previous all-time high of 413 billion dollars set in 2004.

With the economy in a slump, the CBO said Tuesday, revenues dropped by almost 2 percent in the just-completed fiscal year.

Corporate income receipts posted a big decrease of nearly 18 percent, while individual income tax revenues declined by 1.6 percent, according to the nonpartisan CBO.

The latest figures for 2008 are more than 30 billion dollars higher than

the CBO's estimates issued last month and almost 50 billion dollars more than what the Bush administration predicted in July.

In the last fiscal year, the federal deficit dropped by 34.4 percent to 162 billion dollars, a five-year low since an imbalance of 159 billion dollars in 2002, reflecting faster growth in government revenues than spending.

Presidential election begins in Maldives

MALE, 8 Oct — The first-ever multi party presidential election began Wednesday in the Indian Ocean archipelago of Maldives with six candidates contesting the presidency.

The incumbent President Maumoon Abdul Gayoom, who has been the president since November 1978, will run for the presidency representing the Dhivehi Rayyithunge Party (Maldivian People's Party).

Other candidates are Maldivian Democratic Party's Mohamed Nasheed, Islamic Democratic Party's Umar Naseer, Social Liberal Party's Ibrahim Ismail, Jumhooree Party's Qasim Ibrahim and independent candidate Hassan Saeed.

18 feared dead as Nepali plane catches fire

KATHMANDU, 8 Oct — A Nepal Yeti Airlines domestic plane on Wednesday morning caught fire while landing at Lukla airport in the east of Nepali capital Kathmandu, and 18 might have been dead, said the Lukla airport authority.

"Altogether there were 19 people on board, pilot and stewardess included, most of them were foreign tourists," an official in the Lukla airport told Xinhua reporter, "and 18 might have died while the other is in serious condition but still breathing." —Internet

Brazilian President criticizes IMF for lack of action amid financial crisis

RIO DE JANEIRO, 8 Oct — Brazil's President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva criticized on Tuesday the International Monetary Fund (IMF) for lack of action in the midst of the international financial crisis.

"When Brazil or Argentina faced a crisis, IMF always came to give tips and tell what to do or not to do. Where is the IMF now?" the president asked.

In a speech to 3,000 metallurgical workers in the city of Angra dos Reis, southwest of Rio de Janeiro state, President Lula denied vehemently the existence of a package of anti-crisis measures in the country, affirming that the financial crisis will not reach Brazil. —Internet

Moderate quake shakes Japan's Kanto region

TOKYO, 8 Oct — A moderate quake with a preliminary magnitude of 4.6 jolted Japan's Kanto region, said the Japan Meteorological Agency Wednesday.

The epicentre of quake, which occurred at 3:07 pm local time (0607 GMT), was some 80 km underground in northwest Chiba Prefecture, the agency said.

Obvious shocks were felt in most buildings in Tokyo and its vicinity.

There were no immediate reports of casualties or damage to property. And no Tsunami warning was issued.

Turkish jets bomb Kurdish targets in Iraq, Turkey

ANKARA, 8 Oct — Turkish warplanes bombed suspected Kurdish rebel positions in northern Iraq and southeast Turkey early Tuesday in retaliation for an attack that killed 17 soldiers, the Turkish military said.

Turkey's Prime Minister indicated that the country could be preparing to launch new cross-border ground operations.

The military said fighter jets attacked 21 rebel positions in Iraq's Avasin Baysan region and

Turkish mountains bordering Iraq in the fourth round of airstrikes since Friday's attack.

In February, Turkish ground troops crossed into Iraqi territory for a weeklong operation against the rebels.

"If there is a need, necessary measures will be taken at the right time and place in the most effective way, as in the past year," Prime Minister Recep Tayyip Erdogan said in a speech to his party's lawmakers in parliament.

"Iraq is our neighbour and the people there are our brothers, our relatives. If there is the need, an operation will not target the civilians or Iraq's integrity."

Rebels of the Kurdistan Workers' Party, or PKK, fired mortar rounds and artillery from Iraq at a military outpost in a Turkish valley Friday, sparking the deadliest battle between Turkish troops and Kurdish rebels in eight months.

Chinese leaders visit May quake exhibition

BEIJING, 8 Oct—President Hu Jintao and other Chinese leaders including top legislator Wu Bangguo and Premier Wen Jiabao on Tuesday visited an exhibition which pays tribute to victims of the May earthquake in Sichuan Province and the nation's concerted efforts to assist the disaster-stricken areas.

Photos and videos showing the aftermath of the catastrophic earth-

quake, as well as items that were used to rescue victims drew attentions of the leaders.

They were also briefed on how the people from all walks of life had made donations and contributions to help the earthquake-stricken areas recover from the country's worst disaster in the past 30 years. Carrying on the great spirit displayed in the quake rescue and relief efforts, the na-

tion would be able to overcome all difficulties on its way of development, Hu said during his visit.

State and Communist Party leaders Jia Qinglin, Li Changchun, Xi Jinping, Li Keqiang, He Guoqiang and Zhou Yongkang also visited the exhibition at the Military Museum of the Chinese People's Revolution in Beijing.

US consumer credit declines for first time in over decade

WASHINGTON, 8 Oct—US consumer credit dropped at an annual rate of 3.7 percent in August, the first decline since January 1998, the Federal Reserve reported Tuesday.

The 3.7 percent decline, or 7.88 billion dollars, followed a revised 2.4 percent growth rate in July and surprised analysts who had been expecting an increase of 5.25 billion dollars for August.

Consumer borrowing, which the Federal Reserve defines as all loans not secured by real estate, totalled 2.58 trillion dollars at an annual rate in August.

For August, consumer borrowing in revolving loans, a category that includes primarily credit card debt, fell by 0.8 percent at an annual rate, in contrast to an increase of 5.0 percent in the previous month.

Demand for nonrevolving credit used to finance cars, vacations, education and other things, meanwhile, plunged by 5.4 percent, compared with a 0.9 percent gain in July.

The central bank's report also showed that US consumer credit in the April-to-June period had been revised to an increase of 4.1 percent at an annual rate, down from the first quarter's 5.2 percent growth pace.

French old China hand: All Chinese will live a better life

PARIS, 8 Oct—"China's reform and opening-up is marvelous. It improved the living standard of the Chinese people. I believe all the Chinese will live a better life if the policy remains unchanged," said female French teacher Delphine Signe, a old China hand, in a recent interview with Xinhua.

Ms Delphine Signe, 34, used to live in China for six years. In her words, she is an authentic French who can speak Chinese and has a Chinese name Dai Fengyi. Now, she works as a Chinese-language teacher in several middle schools of the Rennes city in east Brittany region, northwest France.

Dai started to learn Chinese at the age of 13. She got her bachelor's degree of Chinese at London University. Between 1997 and 2006, Dai lived off and on in China for six years.

Talking about China's reform and opening-up, Dai said of her biggest impression: "It does not come easy."

It is not easy for China, a most populous country in the world, to make such tremendous achievements through reform and opening-up, she said.

This certainly united the efforts of tens of thousands of unsung heroes, she added.

AirAsia bids good-bye to Boeing

KUALA LUMPUR, 8 Oct—Malaysia's low cost carrier AirAsia bid good-bye to Boeing aircraft in Malaysia as its remaining Boeing 737 made its last flight on Tuesday. The aircraft carrying passengers from Kota Kinabalu, capital of Malaysia's eastern state of Sabah, to the Low Cost Carrier Terminal, some 70 kilometres south of here, was greeted by AirAsia Group chief executive officer Tony Fernandes.

AirAsia said that the retirement of the B737 marked "the dawn of a new millennium" for the company as it now fully operated on an all Airbus 320 fleet for its Malaysian operation. AirAsia started its services since December in 2001 with mere two B737s. As of December 2007, AirAsia became the largest airline customer of Airbus 320 with a total order placement of 225 A320s. The company said that the A320 was reputed for its high reliability and low operating costs and it had gradually phased out its original fleet of Boeing 737s recently to make the way for the new and more fuel efficient A320s.—Xinhua

FAO calls for review of biofuel policies, subsidies

ROME, 8 Oct—Biofuel policies and subsidies should be urgently reviewed to preserve the goal of world food security, protect poor farmers, promote broad-based rural development and ensure environmental sustainability, said a UN Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) report on Tuesday.

"Biofuels present both opportunities and risks. The outcome would depend on the specific context of the country and the policies adopted," said FAO Director-General Jacques Diouf Tuesday when presenting the

FAO's new edition of annual publication, the State of Food and Agriculture (SOFA) 2008. "Current policies tend to favour producers in some developed countries over pro-

ducers in most developing countries. The challenge is to reduce or manage the risks while sharing the opportunities more widely," said the director-general.—Xinhua

ABBOUDIYEH (Lebanon), 8 Oct—A few tents and trucks dotting a green hill across the river are about all that is visible of a Syrian troop deployment on Lebanon's northern border — a buildup

that has raised concerns of a possible Syrian incursion.

There was no sign Wednesday that the Syrian troops were preparing to cross the border. Syria says the deployment —

first made public several weeks ago — is aimed at preventing smuggling from Lebanon.

But the United States and some anti-Syrian politicians in Beirut have warned that Syria could attempt an incursion, a concern raised especially after a 27 Sept car bombing in Damascus killed 17 people.

In Washington, Deputy State Department spokesman Robert Wood on Monday said, "Any intervention by Syrian troops into Lebanon would be unacceptable."

UAE to build unified health database

ABU DHABI, 8 Oct — The health authorities of the United Arab Emirates (UAE) will build a unified health database in the coming years that will provide physicians and patients with equal access in the Gulf country, local newspaper *Khaleej Times* reported on

Wednesday.

The UAE Ministry of Health (MoH) will build the database named Hospital Information System (HIS) in phases, according to the report.

HIS will link all 14 MoH hospitals and 68 affiliated clinics across Dubai and the northern Emirates by October

2011 in the first phase, and will include private hospitals at a later stage.

"This is a pioneering project ... and is in line with the world's most advanced public healthcare regimes," health minister Humaid Al Quttami was quoted as saying.

China has more newspapers and magazines

BEIJING, 8 Oct— There are ten times as many Chinese newspapers and magazines than there were 30 years ago. That's when the country adopted the reform and opening-up policy.

Figures from the General Administration of Press and Publication (GAPP) show there were 186 newspapers and 930 magazines in China in

1978. Today, the country has 2,081 newspapers and 9,363 different magazines.

In the meantime, official figures show China has some 600 publishing houses producing nearly 300,000 kinds of books. That's a dramatic increase from the 105 publishers of the past that produced only 10,000 different books.

Rapid economic development and universal education since China adopted the reform has helped fuel the need for more information sources.

Under the market economy, hundreds of publishing houses and newspapers have taken steps to restructure management systems into corporations listed on the stock market.—Internet

Mexican gunmen steal five small planes from airfield

Around 20 gunmen on Tuesday stormed an airfield in the northwestern state of Sinaloa and stole five small planes, the federal Attorney General's office said in a statement.

The gunmen broke into the airfield at dawn, tied up a police officer on guard, filled the planes with fuel and flew away, the statement said. The five Cessna planes were grounded earlier this year by the Air Force for the former's alleged violation of civil aviation and airport laws.

continue there, though the real question might be whether the once-popular sport dies a quick death or a slow one.

Across the country, the legions of blue-collar fans the industry relied on have been lured away by casinos, lotteries, online gambling and other forms of betting.

Track owners fighting the proposed ban fiercely oppose claims that the dogs are mistreated. But animal-welfare issues aside, others involved in greyhound racing glumly concede a cultural shift away from the sport.

Saboteurs in disguise of democracy activists

In his essay "Politics and the English Language" well-known writer George Orwell of the early 20th Century states many terms that have become meaningless after being often misused by politicians. It says such terms as "freedom", "democracy" and "justice" are used so often in a dishonest way that they have lost their original meaning.

Some unscrupulous people have come to exploit several terms considered to be noble by many people. In my opinion, nothing is more abhorrent than saboteurs' attempt to conceal their inhumanity by using such noble words in all dishonesty.

Many anti-government groups in Myanmar often and variously use those words. Some of those groups are subversive elements to the core. Those destructive elements are talking big, but stooping very lowly in practice, thus mangling many terms carrying noble meaning.

I learnt from last press conference that the leader of Human Rights Defenders and Promoters (HRDP) was behind the recent bomb attacks in Shwepyitha. The most fundamental human right is to continue to survive and to be guarded against violent murders. They claimed themselves to be members of HRDP, then why did the leader attempt to kill innocent people?

The group under the name of Karen National Union blasted a public video lounge in Kyaukkyi recently, leaving many people dead and injured, and some of them were Kayin nationals and children. They claimed their acts to be movements for liberation of Kayin nationals, but they are killing people of their own national race, which has baffled me.

Again I learnt that a time bomb went off in the corner of Maha Bandoola Park on 25 September and injured some innocent people. It has not been clear yet that who is responsible for that bomb explosion. The September-16 issues of the newspapers stated that such terrorist groups as KNU, ABSDF and VBSW had sent some bombers into Myanmar since 10 September to commit terrorist acts. The press conference held on 7 September disclosed that in the early September 2008, authorities managed to expose a lot of explosives meant for launching bomb attacks

in the nation carried by the New Generation for Democracy under the arrangements of those terrorist groups in border areas. Therefore, it can be guessed who was responsible for the bomb explosion.

Why do the groups in disguise of democracy activists target innocent people?

Can they enjoy democracy through bomb attacks? No way! Terrorism and democracy are totally different from each other. Democracy is a system in which the supreme power is held completely by the people. If asked, every citizen will reply that they protest against terrorist attacks and bomb blasts, and they want to lead a peaceful life with security and stability.

If bomb attacks had been designed to oust and at least tarnish the image of a government, the Bush Administration would have brought down since September 2001, following the terrorist attacks on the World Trade Centre in the US that killed thousands of people. Due to the September 11 attacks, the Bush regime won the public support at the unprecedented level and the tragic event touched the hearts of the whole global community. Similarly, Pakistan has come under several large-scale bomb attacks recently, but that does not lead to the downfall of PPP government. So, the reason is illogical.

Then, why do those claiming themselves to be democracy activists target ordinary people?

The first reason is to get funds through terrorist attacks they launch, inspired by their selfishness. Among the bomb blasts, the bomb attacks on Shwepyitha followed the agreement reached on 1.5 million kyats; and that on the public video lounge in Kyaukkyi, on 100,000 kyats. Surely, there must be a certain amount of money fixed for the bomb attacks that took place in Maha Bandoola Park. So, the people know well whether they are democracy activists or mercenaries out to kill people.

The second reason is that they are not brave enough, but merely coward ones, so they are troubling the people. It is a very coward act of the saboteurs to attack the people on the buses, at bus-stops, and public recreation centres such as entertainment places, and video lounges.

However, bombers are, indeed, just pawns on the

political chessboard. They can make only one move and capture one piece at one time, but they will be sacrificed first, if necessary. They killed many lives for meagre sum of money. But, when the cases were exposed, the ones who were arrested were none but they themselves.

In a chess game, pawns have to make sacrifices for powers: bishops, knights, rooks, and queens to be in better position. After the bomb blasts, bombers are always in a state of panic until they are under arrest. After they are arrested, they will have to face death penalties, or life sentences.

The groups behind the terrorist plots are provided substantially with hundreds of thousands of kyats after having a terrorist plot carried out. And they can be promoted in the anti-government groups under the names of democracy movements. They are ready to seize opportunities to plunder if there is a political unrest, stemming from terrorist acts, in the nation.

These men too are just powers taking positions under the command of their Western masters. All of them are the pieces that are exchanged if there is power advantage, and sometimes they are sacrificed for the masters to escape from crises. Many lackeys of alien powers have met their tragic ends. They are under the protection of alien powers so long as they are useful, but are sidelined when they are no longer useful.

In the jakata "Hsaddan Elephant King", the queen, the king and hunter Sonuttho pursued the common goal of gaining the tusks of king of elephants Hsaddan. Of the three, the hunter disguised himself as a hermit, wearing a robe, to kill the elephant. Certain big powers who are desperate to put their targeted nations under their domination on the pretext of impressive terms of "democracy", "human rights", and "freedom", groups of axe-handles dancing to the tune of their masters, and the saboteurs who are never reluctant to kill the people of their own race in response to the cash offers made by the groups are shouting "democracy" and "human rights" but in practice, they are trying to devastate the mother country, and committing terrorist acts. They are using beautiful words to conceal their misconduct and deceive the people. So, I would say I abhor them even more than hunter Sonuttho who disguised himself as a saint.

However much an ogre disguised himself as a human prince wearing a head-dress of a prince, he can no longer conceal the character of an ogre just as he gets smell of blood. Similarly, however much Western bloc's media are playing the tune of a duet dance, the performers will perform ogre dance just after they get out of the curtain. So, the people will be disgusted with such an awkward play. Likewise, the drama of neo-Sonuttho and his lackeys in which different tune and different dances are presented at the same time will face protests of the audience applause.

infectious diseases presented by Deputy Director-General Dr Aung Gyi of Livestock Breeding and Veterinary Department and breeding of milch cows in Yangon Division and manufacturing of dairy products, artificial insemination, quality control of milk and conducting of training courses by Secretary Dr Khin Hlaing of Myanmar Milk and Dairy Products Dealers Association.

Lt-Gen Myint Swe stressed the need to produce import-substitute dairy products and inspected sample materials for artificial insemination, 19 vaccines for animal infectious diseases, papers of the training

courses, breeding of milch cows and manufacturing of dairy products for the market.

Ngwesin Pale Milch Cow Breeding and Dairy Product Industry commenced its tasks with 16 milch cows in 1999. At present, the industry sends 1,400 viss of milk daily produced from 105 milch cows and 500 cows in advance payment to the market.

At WALCO Dairy Product Industry of Worldwide Agro-Livestock Co Ltd in Myathida Ward of Mingaladon Township, they looked into production of milk, yoghurt, cream, cheese and margarine.

Above dairy product industry has been purchasing 600 viss of milk

from Shwepyitha, Mingaladon, North Okkalapa and Taikkyi townships since 1995 and supplying the demands of dairy products to sale centres, department stores and hotels.

Lt-Gen Myint Swe proceeded to Super Cow Milch Cow Breeding and Dairy Product Industry in Ward 3 of Shwepyitha Township. He inspected production process of the milk products.

The industry commenced its functions in 2003 and won the Milch Cow Breeding Award at the ceremony to mark the 2004 World Food Day.

At present, a total of 600 milch cows are being bred at the industry and manufactures the distilled milk, strawberry milk, orange milk and grape milk and supplies them to shops and department stores.—MNA

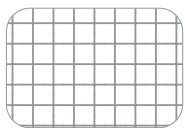

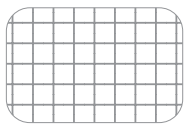

In that regard, reforestation, conservation of forests, protection of forests through the forest law, establishment of forest plantations in catchment areas of dams and reservoirs that have been built for agricultural purpose are being launched on a wider scale.

In accord with the guidance of the Head of State as to the forest sector that the basic resources of the nation are land, water and forest plus favourable weather; that deforestation leads to land degeneration and climatic changes; that conservation of forests is

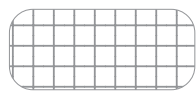
In an interview with Director of Pyosithu Trading Co Ltd U Yan Naing Lwin at Plot No. 50 of South

**Israel arrests nine

RAMALLAH, 8 Oct—Israeli forces arrested nine Palestinians in the West Bank Sunday night and on Monday morning, Palestinian security sources said. **North Korea fires
missiles into sea**

SEOUL, 8 Oct—North Korea has fired two short-range missiles into the Yellow Sea, a news report said on Wednesday, in a move likely aimed at dialing up tension as global powers try to have it abide by a nuclear disarmament deal. The North fired the missiles into the Yellow Sea on Tuesday as a part of routine military training, South Korea's Yonhap news agency cited an unidentified government official as saying. The North, however, has a history of timing its missile launches to periods of increased tension in the region in saber-rattling bids aimed to show that it is ready to take a hard and defiant line, analysts have said.

"We understand North Korea fired two short-range missiles in the afternoon of (October) 7th into the (Yellow) Sea," Yonhap quoted an unidentified South Korean official as saying. "North Korea declared a no-sail order in the (Yellow) Sea before the missile launch," the official said. South Korean defence officials would not confirm the report.—MNA/Reuters

**Toyota to downgrade
profit estimate**

TOKYO, 8 Oct—Japanese auto giant Toyota Motor Corp is planning to downgrade its earnings forecasts for the year to March 2009 amid the global financial turmoil, according to reports.

Toyota's operating profit for the year to March is expected to tumble around 40 percent from the previous year to about 1.3 trillion yen (12.8 billion dollars), falling short of a 1.6 trillion yen projection as the worldwide financial crisis dampens auto demand, the Japanese business daily Nikkei reported on Wednesday.

Toyota may fall short of its global sales target of 9.5 million units this financial year and could see sales fail to reach its current 25 trillion yen projection, it said, without citing sources.

The mass circulation Yomiuri Shimbun reported that Toyota will downgrade its full-year profit forecast, largely due to dwindling sales in the United States.

Officials were not immediately available for a comment on the reports.

In August, Toyota was forced to put off its goal of becoming the world's first automaker to sell more than 10 million vehicles in a year due to slowing demand. It slashed its 2009 calendar year sales forecast to 9.7 million vehicles, down from a previous target of 10.4 million.—Internet

**Don't use cold drugs
in kids under four**

WASHINGTON, 8 Oct—Oral cough and cold medicines sold over the counter should not be used in children younger than 4 years old because of the risk of rare complications linked to inappropriate use, manufacturers said on Tuesday. Most problems occurred in children who were given the wrong dose or who took the medicine accidentally, the Consumer Healthcare Prod-

ucts Association (CHPA), which represents Procter & Gamble Co, Novartis AG and other big drugmakers, said.

"We're doing this out of an abundance of caution," the group's president, Linda Suydam, said.

"Research shows that dosing errors and accidental ingestions — not the safety of the ingredients themselves when properly dosed — are the leading causes of rare adverse events in young children," the group said in a statement. The association said it made the decision in consultation with the US Food and Drug Administration, which last week held a public meeting to weigh the controversial use of such products in children. Manufacturers have maintained that non-prescription cough and cold products are safe when used as directed.

But doctors and consumer advocates have called on the agency to reject use of the medicines in children as old as 12. They argued the products have never been proven safe and effective, making any risk too great to give them to children.—Internet

Red wine may lower lung cancer risk

WASHINGTON, 8 Oct — Moderate consumption of red wine may decrease the risk of lung cancer in men, according to a report in the October issue of *Cancer Epidemiology, Biomarkers & Prevention*, a journal of the American Association for Cancer Research.

“An antioxidant component in red wine may be protective of lung cancer, particularly among smokers,” said Chun Chao, a research scientist

at Kaiser Permanente, a health care organization based in California, in the United States. Chao analyzed data collected through the California Men’s Health Study, which linked clinical data from California’s health system with self-reported data from 84,170 men aged 45 to 69 years. Researchers obtained demographics and lifestyle data from surveys computed between 2000 and 2003, and identified 210 cases of lung

cancer. Researchers measured the effect of beer, red wine, white wine and liquor consumption on the risk of lung cancer. Adjustments were made for age, race, education, body mass index and some other factors. Among the study participants, there was on average a 2-percent lower lung cancer risk associated with each glass of red wine consumed per month.—*Internet*

Hurricanes kill about 1,000, injure 500 in Haiti in last two months

HAVANA, 8 Oct — Hurricanes Hanna and Ike have brought heavy casualties to Haiti in the last two months, leaving around 1,000 people dead and 500 injured, the Haitian Civil Defence (DC) said Tuesday.

Nearly 800 corpses were found, while the authorities said 310 people remained missing, possibly buried by collapsed buildings or mud-rock

flows, according to reports reaching here from Port au Prince,

The hurricanes injured a further 500 people, who have not received proper medical treatment due to a lack of hospital resources, the DC added.

The DC also said hundreds of thousands of Haitians have been made homeless and they desperately need food, drinking water and places

to sleep.

Gonaives, 152 kilometres north of Port au Prince, is one of the most affected areas. Almost one third of local residents lost everything, according to authorities.

Earlier official reports said that Hanna and Ike had devastated more than 100,000 houses in Haiti, and among them 22,000 were completely destroyed.—*Internet*

Occasional smoking might also impair arteries

WASHINGTON, 8 Oct — Even occasional cigarette smoking might impair the functioning of human’s arteries, according to a recent study by the University of Georgia.

Previous studies have shown damages of the arterial function among people who smoke regularly, said Kevin McCully, the co-author of the study, published in the

early online edition of the journal *Ultrasound in Medicine and Biology*.

However, what’s surprising about his finding is that even occasional smoking (less than a pack a week) could impair people’s arteries, McCully said in a statement on Tuesday.

The study used ultrasound to measure how the arteries of young,

healthy adults respond to changes in blood flow and it showed that the arteries of occasional smokers were 36 percent less responsive to changes in blood flow than the non-smokers.

After the occasional smokers underwent their initial test, they smoked two cigarettes and had their arteries re-examined.—*Internet*

Some 121 people under observation for unknown illness in S Africa

JOHANNESBURG, 8 Oct — Some 121 people who came into contact with three people who died of an unknown kind of viral hemorrhagic fever remain under observation although all appear fine, South African doctors said on Tuesday.

Doctor Lucille Blumberg of the National Institute of Communicable Diseases said while the illness was

currently “controlled”, doctors would have to wait for 21 days before they could possibly declare it contained.

Twenty one days is the period doctors believe the illness could still move from exposure to incubation to manifestation.—*Internet*

Tropical Storm Marco hits Mexican coast, 2,000 evacuated

MEXICO CITY, 8 Oct — Tropical Storm Marco Tuesday hit Mexico’s Gulf coast with high winds and heavy rains, forcing the evacuation of some 2,000 people from high-risk areas.

The storm flooded coastal highways and brought heavy rains to the city of Veracruz, where authorities closed schools and set up 22 shelters with accommodation for 150 people each.

Some 2,000 people living along riversides, lagoons or near the coasts of Mexican Gulf were evacuated.

Authorities said that some 400,000 people had been affected by the flooding and that 800 towns were inundated.

Total debts in England more than 3bn pounds: FA

LONDON, 8 Oct — FA chairman Lord Triesman on Tuesday said English football had total debts of more than three billion pounds (3.9 billion euros) and warned of its danger to the well-being of the sport.

The four big clubs — Manchester United, Chelsea, Arsenal and Liverpool — are believed to account for about a third of that amount, he added.

Speaking at the Leaders in Football conference at Stamford Bridge, Triesman and Premier League chief executive Richard Scudamore voiced opposing views on the dangers of foreign ownership - one of the sport's most contentious issues - and whether the rules needed tightening up.

Triesman said: "Transparency lies in an un-

marked grave. We now have a position where it is very hard to track things. It is not transparent enough and we don't know if we are able to track it, if the debt is held by people who are financially secure or not.

"More and more clubs are in trouble, with a number of owners leaving abruptly."

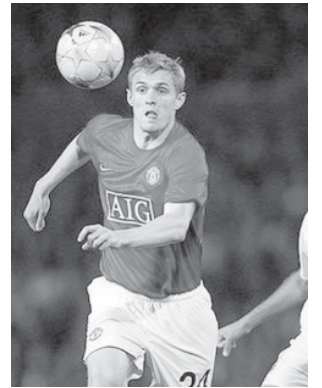
Scots go for Fletcher as skipper

Iran says six powers "unreasonable" in nuclear row

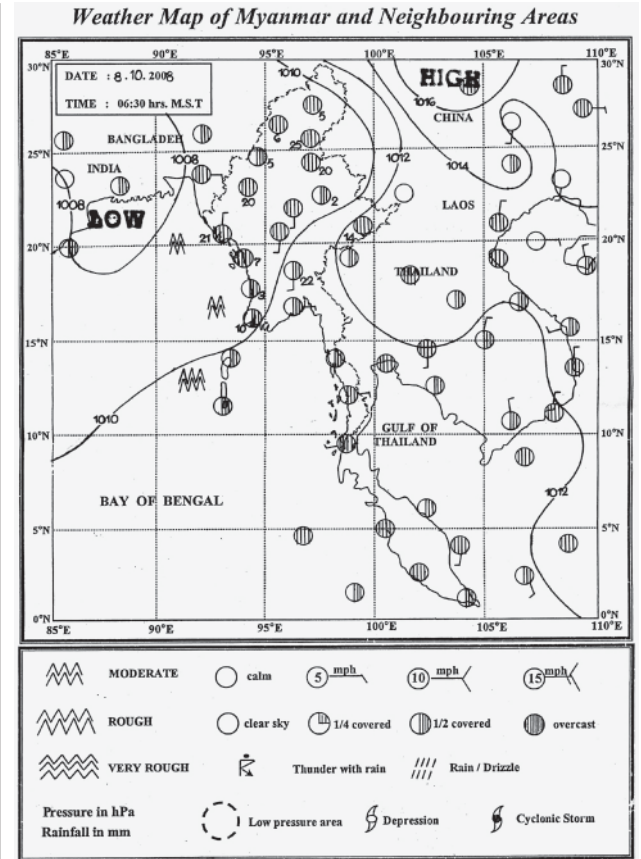
TEHERAN/BERLIN, 8 Oct— Iran has accused six major powers of "unreasonable behaviour" over its disputed nuclear programme, but the European Union said on Tuesday it would stick to a dual approach combining diplomacy with the threat of sanctions.

Teheran's accusation was contained in a letter from its top nuclear negotiator, Saeed Jalili, that was delivered to European Union foreign policy chief Javier Solana on Monday.

"It's a letter that in a way complains about our policy but our policy is clear. It's a double-track approach," Solana told *Reuters* in Berlin on Tuesday.

Asked whether the letter would make negotiations with Iran more difficult, Solana replied: "It's just a letter."

The United States and other Western powers suspect Teheran is seeking a nuclear bomb under cover of its civilian nuclear programme. Iran, the world's fourth-largest oil producer, denies it has any such intentions, saying it only wants to generate electricity. MNA/Reuters



Financial crisis had killed six in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, 8 Oct—The financial crisis in the US has claimed a whole Indian family of six when an unemployed man killed his wife, three sons and his mother-in-law before fatally shooting himself after suffering serious losses in the stock market collapse.

Karthik Rajaram (45), who once made more than 1.2 million US dollars in a London-based venture fund, was found dead in his Porter Ranch home here along with his wife Subasri (39), mother-in-law (70) and three sons Krishna (19), Ganesha (12) and Arjuna (7). Authorities believe Rajaram, killed his family and himself after seeing his finances wiped out by the stock market collapse, *Los-Angeles Times* reported Tuesday. "To us it appears to be a financial stake, a crisis situation that this man became embroiled in over the past few weeks," police said.—MNA/PTI

MILAN, 8 Oct—Inter Milan coach Jose Mourinho believes Italy's Champions League contingent are ready to challenge the English dominance of recent years.

Deepest-living fishes caught on camera for first time

ABERDEEN, 8 Oct—Scientists filming in one of the world's deepest ocean trenches have found groups



of highly sociable snailfish swarming over their bait, nearly five miles (7,700 metres) beneath the surface of the Pacific Ocean. This is the first time cameras have been sent to this depth.

"We got some absolutely amazing footage from 7,700 metres. More fish than we or anyone in the world would ever have thought possible at these depths," says project leader Dr Alan Jamieson of the University of Aberdeen's Oceanlab, on board the Japanese research ship the Hakuho-Maru.

"It's incredible. These videos vastly exceed all our expectations from this research. We thought the deepest fishes would be motionless, solitary, fragile individuals eking out an existence in a food-sparse environment," says Professor Monty Priede, director of Oceanlab.—Internet
