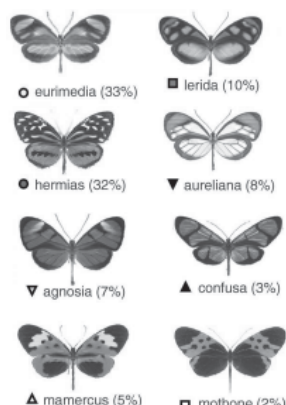


Basic Library Science Course concludes

Mutualism by natural selection: Imitation is not just flattery for Amazon butterfly species

BRASILIA, 8 Dec — Many studies of evolution focus on the benefits to the individual of competing successfully — those who survive produce the most offspring, in Darwin's classic 'survival of the fittest'. But how does this translate to the evolution of species?

A new article considers an aspect of the natural world that, like survival of the fittest individual, is

explained by natural selection: namely, mutualism — an interaction between species that has benefits for both. The work shows that some species of butterfly that live alongside one another have evolved in ways that, surprisingly, benefit both species.

Researchers from the University of Edinburgh, the University of Cambridge, the University of

Wyoming and the Florida Museum of Natural History studied the behaviour of several species of colourful butterfly in the Amazon jungle. It is often theorised that similar species living in the same environment would best succeed by evolving different preferences and behaviours — to minimise the amount that they have to share resources and compete for survival.—Internet

Cut number of malaria victims by half in year 2010

The government has laid down and is implementing the national health policy for successful realization of one of the social objectives— uplift of health, fitness and education standards of the entire nation.

Malaria is one of the six major diseases faced by the nation. It triggers not only a health related problem but also a social related problem.

Globally, the number of people who are infected with malaria yearly is from 300 to 500 million, thereby causing about 2 million deaths. About 700,000 people in Myanmar are infected with malaria yearly.

Malaria could affect not only the victims and their families but also national economy. Since 2000, the government has been taking steps to reduce the number of deaths caused by malaria by half in the year 2010.

Man is infected with malaria after being bitten by mosquitoes that carry protozoal parasites. Such malaria-borne mosquitoes usually bite people at night.

Everyone regardless of age could fall victim to malaria. Those who move from malaria-free regions to malaria-stricken regions are more susceptible, and once infected it could prove serious.

Preventive measures such as imparting knowledge to the people, using mosquito nets treated with insecticide, cultivating the habit of visiting hospitals and receiving proper treatment need to be widely carried out.

Preventive measures against the fatal disease are to be taken with the participation of the entire national people with a high level of health awareness. Only then, will the nation be able to reduce the number of malaria victims by half in the year 2010.

NATO supplies attacked in Pakistan

PESHAWAR, 8 Dec — A witness says suspected militants have attacked a terminal in northwest Pakistan for trucks ferrying supplies to NATO and US forces in Afghanistan.

The attack early Monday in Peshawar was the second in as many days in the city on a transit route for Afghanistan-bound trucks.

Terminal labourer Altaf Hussain says there was a loud explosion and several militants stormed the facility.

An *Associated Press* reporter at the scene saw several dozen torched military vehicles that were to be trucked to Afghanistan.

Up to 75 percent of the supplies for NATO and US troops in landlocked Afghanistan first pass through Pakistan.—INTERNET

Kurdish rebels in Iraq declare 9-day cease-fire

SULAIMANIYAH, 8 Dec— A Kurdish rebel group on Sunday declared a nine-day holiday cease-fire in their fight against Turkey, a spokesman said, calling it a “first step toward peace.” The unilateral cease-fire will begin Monday as the Muslim holiday of Eid al-Adha gets under way, according to Ahmed Deniz, a spokesman for the Kurdistan Workers’ Party, or PKK, which has bases in northern Iraq.

He said the group’s military and political leadership would like to

resolve its conflict with Turkey peacefully.

“The military and political leadership of the PKK announces a nine-day, unilateral cease-fire ... which is considered a first step toward peace,” Deniz told *The Associated Press*. Turkey has ignored a series of PKK cease-fire declarations in the past, vowing to fight until all militants are killed or surrender. The rebels are fighting for autonomy in the predominantly Kurdish-inhabited southeast Turkey. The fight has

claimed the lives of tens of thousands of people since 1984. This year, Turkey has launched several air strikes, including one on Friday, and one major ground operation against rebel bases across Iraq’s border. Eid al-Adha, an important Muslim holiday, lasts four days, but Deniz said the cease-fire would continue for nine days.

Two PKK rebels killed in southeastern Turkey

ANKARA, 8 Dec— Turkish security forces killed two militants of the outlawed Kurdish Workers’ Party (PKK) in southeastern Turkey, the Turkish General Staff said on Sunday. The General Staff said in a statement posted on its website that the Turkish security forces neutralized two PKK rebels in a clash in a mountainous area in the southeastern province of Sirnak on Saturday. The statement said that security forces seized weapons, ammunition and food in the operation.—INTERNET

McCain says Afghanistan situation will get harder

KABUL, 8 Dec — Sen John McCain said on Sunday that the situation in Afghanistan will get more difficult before it gets easier — “just like the surge in Iraq was” — as the US prepares to pour thousands more troops into the country, including on the doorsteps of Kabul.

The former Republican presidential candidate, who is to report back to President-elect Barack Obama, visited the southern province of

Helmand, where he said NATO forces are at a stalemate with insurgents. Though Helmand has for years been the responsibility of British forces, McCain said the US will focus more on the region — the heartland of the Taliban movement and a centre for opium poppy production.

“We’re going to have additional troops and additional help,” McCain said of the country’s south. The trip comes at a time

of increasing violence in Afghanistan, where a record 32,000 US troops are now stationed, with requests for 20,000 more from American commanders.

Violence has also spiked across the border in Pakistan, where gunmen blasted their way into two transport terminals on Sunday and torched more than 160 vehicles destined for US and Afghan National Army troops.

The US military said its losses in the raid near the northwestern city of Peshawar would have “minimal” impact on anti-Taliban operations, but the attack fueled concern that insurgents are trying to choke a vital American supply line.—INTERNET

Israel to release 230 Palestinian prisoners on Tuesday

JERUSALEM, 8 Dec — Israel has decided on Sunday to release 230 prisoners on Tuesday as a goodwill gesture to Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas to mark the upcoming Muslim festival of Eid al-Adha.

According to a statement issued by Israeli Prime Minister’s office, the ministerial committee overseeing the release of Palestinian prisoners made the decision following a cabinet approval of the release of 250 Palestinian prisoners last Sunday.

Some 20 names were removed from the original list following objections by several ministers, who were opposed to releasing prisoners into the Hamas-ruled Gaza Strip. The 230 prisoners to be released are all Fatah-affiliated and are “without blood on their hands,” according to the ministerial committee.

Blackwater-guard charges unveiled on Monday

WASHINGTON, 8 Dec— The Justice Department on Monday plans to unveil charges against five former Blackwater Worldwide security guards stemming from a 2007 shooting that killed 17 Iraqis in Baghdad, according to several sources with knowledge of the investigation.

The five former guards will turn themselves in to FBI authorities in Utah on Monday, according to two other sources close to the

case.

One of the guards is from Utah. One of the sources said defence attorneys decided to have all of them surrender in one location rather than in their various home states, or in Washington, where the federal grand jury handed up the charges last week.

Both sources said the guards' surrender in Utah is a matter of convenience, and is likely to be followed by an aggressive legal defence. One of the

sources said defence attorneys plan to fight "over venue first," then argue that US law does not pertain to the actions of these guards.

The Justice Department refused comment on the case because the charges are under seal. The Justice Department was considering manslaughter, assault and weapons charges, sources with knowledge of the case previously told CNN.—Internet

Obama names Eric Shinseki as next US Secretary of Veterans Affairs

WASHINGTON, 8 Dec — US President-elect Barack Obama nominated retired

Gen Eric Shinseki as the next Secretary of Veterans Affairs.

Obama made the official nomination at a press conference in his transition office headquarters in Chicago, Illinois, which made Shinseki, who has Japanese ancestry, the first Asian American to lead the second biggest department in the country.

"I think that Gen Shinseki is exactly the right person who is going to be able to make sure that we honour our troops when they come home," Obama said in an interview with NBC TV earlier the day.

"He has agreed that he

is willing to be part of this administration because both he and I share a reverence for those who serve" he said of the 66-year-old four-star general.

Born in Hawaii to a Japanese American family, Shinseki graduated from the West Point Military Academy in 1965 and has served in a variety of command and staff assignments both at home and abroad.

He served as the Army Chief of Staff from 1999 to 2003, which was featured by his constant tensions with the then defense secretary, Donald Rumsfeld.

Land mines kill two government workers in Colombia

BOGOTA, 8 Dec — Two Colombian government workers were killed Sunday when the car they were traveling in activated several land mines buried underneath the road, officials said.

Three other government employees traveling in the same car were also injured in the explosion.

Victims of the blast, which occurred in the southern city of San Vicente del Caguan, are all from the Colombian Institute of Family Welfare (ICBF), according to government secretary of the city Mauricio Orozco.

S African businessman dies of spotted fever in Brazil

BRASILIA, 8 Dec— The death of a South African businessman in Rio de Janeiro was caused by spotted fever, Brazil's Ministry of Health said on Sunday.

"The investigation carried out throughout the week by our teams concluded that it is a spotted fever infection," said Eduardo Hage, an official of the ministry.

The South African national named Williman Charles reported symptoms of spotted fever two days after arriving in Brazil on 23 Nov. The 53-year-old died on 2 Dec.

"That means his infection started in his country of origin" in South Africa, Hage said.

As spotted fever is transmitted only through the bite of ticks, "there is no risk of transmission from one person to another and therefore no risk of spreading to the population," the official added.

Spotted fever is not a specific disease in Brazil. It occurs worldwide. From 1997 to 2008, 641 cases were reported in Brazil. The fatality rate is about 30 per cent.—Internet

EU watches dioxin contamination in pork in Ireland

BRUSSELS, 8 Dec —The European Commission is watching closely dioxin contamination of pork meat in Ireland, said the commission on Sunday.

Dioxin contamination was confirmed on Saturday and the use of contaminated animal feed was identified to be the source of the contamination.

Analytical results revealed the presence of very high levels of dioxins in pork meat, about 100 times the European Union (EU) maximum level, said the commission. Preliminary evidence indicates that the contamination problem is

likely to have started in September 2008. All possibly contaminated feed has been blocked.

The contaminated feed was provided to 10 pig farms which are producing about 10 percent of the total supply of pigs in

Ireland. Pigs from these farms were, after slaughter, processed by meat processing plants which are responsible for about 80 percent of the total supply of pork meat and pork meat products from Ireland.—Internet

Nepal to start flights to more than 18 Indian cities soon

KATHMANDU, 8 Dec —The Nepali government will soon start regional flights linking to more than 18 destinations in Indian metros, The Himalayan Times reported on Monday.

Speaking on the occasion of International Civil Aviation Day, Minister for Tourism and Civil Aviation Hisila Yami said, "Nepal will soon launch regional flights from Biratnagar, Jhapa, Lumbini and extend to 18 more destinations of India like Gaya, Patna and other cities."

"We are also working with the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) to increase foreign investment in the aviation sector according to open sky policy," Yami said adding that the tourism ministry will get an expanded joint secretary-level office to look after the tourism sector.—Internet

More than 3,000 Caribbean students graduate from Cuban universities

HAVANA, 8 Dec — More than 3,000 Caribbean students have graduated from Cuban universities since 1961, Cuban Foreign Ministry said on Sunday.

A total of 3,276 students from Caribbean countries have finished their college studies in Cuba since 1961, with 1,043 of them graduating in medicine, the ministry said.

Currently, about 3,000 students from Caribbean countries are studying in Cuba, it said. The ministry also said that some 800 Cuban medical staff currently work in seven countries of the Caribbean Community, as part of the Integral Health Programme launched by Cuba.—Internet

Danish fugitive turns himself to LA police

LOS ANGELES, 8 Dec—A Danish fugitive, wanted for a multimillion-dollar international fraud, has turned himself to Los Angeles police, it was reported on Sunday.

Stein Bagger, who disappeared in Dubai, the United Arab Emirates last month, suddenly presented himself for surrender on Saturday morning, according to the *Los Angeles Times*.

Bagger, named 2008's "Entrepreneur of the Year" in Denmark by the Ernst and Young accounting firm, informed police officers he is wanted in Copenhagen for swindling as much as 170 million dollars from investors in Europe, the paper said.

The paper said police officers were at

first baffled. "We've had several people come in and tell us they were the king of Denmark," explained officer Jack Richter.

Officers, wondering whether the lean, 6-foot, 41-year-old man was delusional, checked computers and turned up an Interpol warrant for his arrest on charges of counterfeiting, forgery and fraud.

Bagger was turned over to federal authorities Saturday night and held at the Metropolitan Detention Center.

Before vanishing in Dubai, Bagger was chief executive of Copenhagen-based IT Factory and lead the previously crumbling computer company into what seemed to be an incredible turnaround.

China kicks off key economic conference

BEIJING, 8 Dec—China's decision makers gathered here on Monday to determine economic work for 2009 amid efforts to offset adverse impacts of global financial crisis and maintain stable and sound economic growth.

Analysts expected this year's meeting to work out specific strategies and resolutions for the problems China would confront next year, including the risk of economic slowdown, difficulties in small and medium-sized enterprises and the transformation of economic growth pattern. They said the country's economic growth would still be maintained at nine percent for the whole year, compared with an 11.4 percent expansion last year.

Earlier on 28 Nov, Chinese President Hu Jintao said the top priority of the country's 2009 agenda on economic development is to maintain a "stable and relatively fast growth". He said the country would pursue an "all-rounded and sustainable" growth that stresses both quality and efficiency next year, while going after a better combination of "maintaining growth, strengthening domestic demand and restructuring the economy".—Xinhua

Azerbaijan withdraws 150 soldiers from Iraq

MOSCOW, 8 Dec—Azerbaijan withdrew 150 peacekeepers from Iraq Sunday, according to news reaching here from Baku.

The peacekeepers, deployed in Iraq to protect a reservoir and a hydro power plant, were pulled out under a decision made by the Azerbaijani parliament on 11 Nov, Russia's Interfax news agency quoted a statement of the Azerbaijani Defense Ministry as saying. Azerbaijan called back all its soldiers from Kosovo in March. It now still has 90 peacekeepers in Afghanistan.—Xinhua

Shanghai opens first library for foreign residents

SHANGHAI, 8 Dec—China's most populous city opened its first library for foreign residents on Saturday, offering publications in foreign languages and information on living in Shanghai. The international library, called "China Window," is in a library compound in Changning District, home to more than 30,000 expatriates and 21 consulates.

The library also has staff who speak foreign languages to help expat readers. Besides foreign publications, the library offers specialized information on the Shanghai Expo 2010, tourism, Chinese culture, medical services and local transportation.—Xinhua

Drought affects 20,000 families in Bolivia

LAPAZ, 8 Dec—About 20,000 Bolivian families in LaPaz Department have been affected by drought for months, the Bolivian Agency of Information (BAI) reported on Sunday.

Drought has not only caused damage to local agricultural production but also endangered the lives of animals. If it is not raining in the next 30 days, there will be a massive loss of livestock, warned Victor Saravia, an expert from La Paz's Early Warning and Risk Prevention Bureau.

"We traveled to four regions: Camacho, Ingavi, Pacajes and Loayza, and found that there is a shortage of water for both human consumption and for animals," said Saravia. Another region in extreme water shortage is Ixiamas in the northern part of La Paz.—Xinhua

Iran takes steps to build trust in nuclear row

TEHRAN, 8 Dec — An Iranian lawmaker said here on Sunday that Iran had taken necessary steps to build trust in its nuclear row, the official IRNA news agency reported.

Kazem Jalali, an Iranian rapporteur of Iran's parliament (Majlis) Commission on National Security and Foreign Policy, said that "Iran has taken the necessary steps to build trust and it was not Iran to leave the nuclear talks."

Referring to the recent statements of the European Union foreign policy chief Javier Solana concerning Iran's failure to cooperate on its nuclear program, Jalali said that "If Solana was intending to solve Iran's nuclear issue, he should have adopted the logical strategies." Solana said in November that he was "worried" by International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA)'s report that Iran was not cooperating to halt its sensitive nuclear program.—Xinhua

EU to begin Somali pirate patrols

LONDON, 8 Dec — European Union warships and aircraft are due to start anti-piracy patrols off the Somali coast.

Six ships and three surveillance planes from at least eight EU countries, including the UK, France and Germany, will escort aid and merchant ships.

The area, including one of the world's busiest shipping lanes, the Gulf of

Aden, has seen almost 100 pirate attacks this year.

It is the first naval operation in the bloc's history.

It will take over from the existing NATO mission and last at least a year.

As it begins on Monday, EU foreign ministers meeting in Brussels are to approve what officials describe as robust rules of engagement.

But while EU foreign ministers will authorise the use of military force, the fate of any captured pirates will be unclear.

The operation is the first EU defence mission commanded by a Briton, Rear Admiral Phillip Jones, from the UK's RAF Northwood, which oversees military operations abroad.

XI'AN, 8 Dec — Chinese archaeologists have found the relics of an ancient Xinggong, imperial palace for short stays away from the capital, for Qin kings more than 2,000 years ago.

The cultural heritage administration in Shaanxi Province announced Sunday this latest find in Qianyang county.

The archaeologists said the residence ruins

are sized as 400 meters by 300 meters, with a lot of ancient tilts and bricks being discovered. Those relics were dated back to the Warring States period (475 BC - 221 BC).

The major discovery was triggered by a peasant who stumbled upon a big earthenware near the later found ruins in Qianyang County. The earthenware was ascertained as part of an ancient

water collecting and distributing system built in the imperial residence, the archaeologists said.

The experts analyzed that the residence might belong to the state of Qin, which subsequently conquered, under the leadership of Yingzheng, all other states and created the first unified nation on the land where China now stands.

Scientist sees end to AIDS spread soon

BEIJING, 8 Dec —A French scientist who shared this year's Nobel prize for medicine said on Saturday he believed the transmission of AIDS could be eliminated within years. Luc Montagnier, director of the World Foundation for AIDS Research and Prevention, told a news conference that halting the transmission of AIDS would make it a disease much like others.

"Our job, of course, is to find complementary treatment to eradicate the infection. I think it's not impossible to do it within a few years," Montagnier said.

"So I hope to see in my lifetime the eradication of, not the AIDS epidemic, but at least the infection," the 76-year-old said. "This could be achieved."

Montagnier and Francoise Barre-Sinoussi shared half of the 2008 prize for discovering the virus that has killed 25

million people since the early 1980s.

There is no cure for AIDS but cocktails of drugs can control the virus and keep patients healthy.

There is no vaccine either, although researchers are trying to find vaccines that either prevent infection or would control the virus so that patients are less likely to transmit it—a so-called therapeutic vaccine.

Montagnier said he hoped such a therapeutic vaccine could be developed within four to five years, noting he and colleagues had already been working on this for a decade. German scientist Harald zur Hausen won the other half of the 1.2-million-US-dollar award for finding the cause of cervical cancer. The three scientists said that since the announcement in early October, they had found themselves constantly giving interviews.—Xinhua

Kathleen Hewko of Delran Township, NJ, says she was in the bathroom at Starters Pub near Allentown when the handicapped toilet seat she was sitting on cracked and dumped her into the bowl.

Hewko says in her lawsuit filed in federal court in November that she had hip surgery prior to the 19 Nov, 2006, incident and was re-injured when the seat broke.

The lawsuit names Starters and Kohler Co, the company that made the toilet seat.

Representatives from both companies said they couldn't comment.

Teddy take-off: bears launched into space

Four teddy bears, fully decked out in custom-made spacesuits, were launched to the edge of space this week as part of a British university experiment.

Blasting off from Cambridge University's Churchill College, they were attached to a helium balloon and fitted with multiple cameras, a GPS receiver, flight computer and radio for the two-hour nine-minute flight, which saw them rise 30 kilometres (18.8 miles) above sea level.

The spacesuits were designed by local schoolchildren, as part of a project to engage youths in science and engineering, organized by the Cambridge University Spaceflight student club.

Do not disturb eggs: MP reveals Britain's oddest laws

Britons are forbidden from disturbing packs of eggs and from selling game killed on a Sunday, it was revealed Thursday by an opposition MP who condemned ministers for introducing ridiculous laws.

The day after Prime Minister Gordon Brown's government laid out its legislative agenda for the coming year, Liberal Democrat lawmaker Chris Huhne noted the stream of sometimes "completely bizarre" new offences it had created.

Since the Labour party took power in 1997 under then prime minister Tony Blair, it has created 3,600 new criminal offences, Huhne said — adding this was "massively complicating" the job of police and the criminal justice system.

"Some of these offences are completely bizarre — for example, the offence of causing a nuclear explosion," he told members of parliament (MPs).

"The idea that anyone might cause a nuclear explosion without killing any-

body, and therefore being subject to a possible charge of murder, is extremely far-fetched."

Other new offences include "wilfully pretending to be a barrister", "disturbing a pack of eggs when instructed not to by an authorised officer" and "offering for sale a game bird killed on a Sunday or Christmas day", he said.

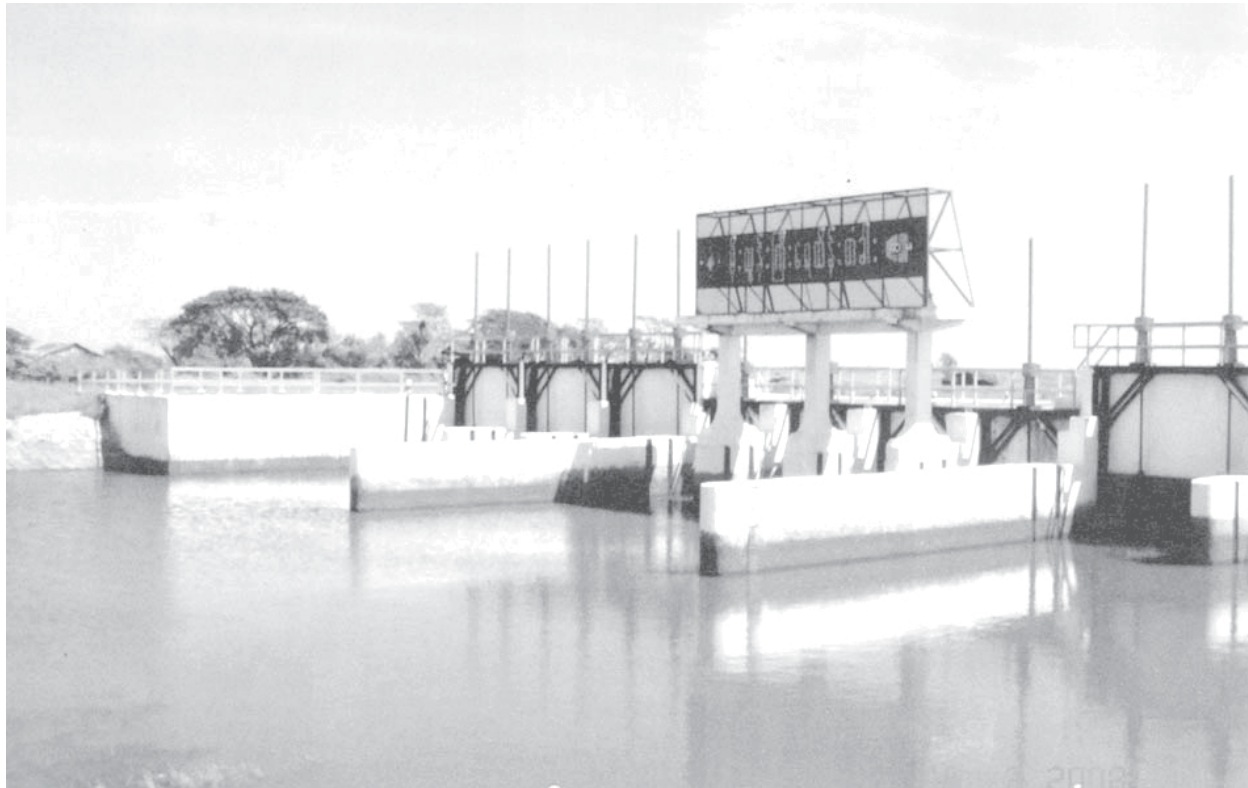

and Kayan sluice gates would be constructed to prevent inflow of seawater and store freshwater.

In constructing a ca-

nal to get water from Bago-Sittoung Canal, Bagan-Nyaungpin outlet, 36 structures, one road bridge and seven canal bridges (that are also intended for smooth transport of the villages) were constructed.

The canal will be a 28.41-mile-long 50-foot-wide and 7-to-14-foot-deep earthen facility. Its current flows at the rate of 1500 cubic feet a second.

It will benefit 65,000 acres of arable lands. The project was launched in 2003-2004 fiscal year and is due to be completed in 2009-2010 fiscal year.

The overall cost of the project is about 1,700 million kyats.

Through the supply of water from Bago-Sittoung Canal, the surplus water of the canal can be released; farmlands will be free from flood; double and triple-cropping patterns can be launched; and monsoon paddy can be grown in the areas with a radius of 30 miles of Yangon (eastern part) and will get water in summer.

Thanks to the efforts the staff of Construction (6) of the Irrigation Department under the Ministry of Construction, the areas with a radius of 30 miles of Yangon will be evergreen soon.

Climate activists break into London airport secure area, 50 arrested

American detained in Mexico for kidnapping 14-year-old girl

MEXICO CITY, 8 Dec—An American kidnapper wanted by the US Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) was captured by Mexican police on Sunday, while the 14-year-old girl hostage was rescued unharmed, Mexico City's General Procuratorate of Justice said in a statement.

The kidnapper, identified as 35-year-old Hector Guerrero Castillo, was accused of abduction and statutory rape against

his victim, whose identity was not revealed for her protection.

Guerrero lured the Idaho-born adolescent to run away with him to Mexico in October after he learned that she had problems with her family, the statement said.

Weeks later, her father reported the case to FBI after he received an e-mail from his daughter saying all is well, which helped track them down in Mexico.

Mexican police found Guerrero in his residence in Tlalneptla, near the capital of Mexico City, where the girl had been held captive for over a month.

Mexico's public security authorities ordered Guerrero to be detained in a local detention center. He would be extradited to the United States to face charges of abduction and statutory rape against minors.—*Internet*

5.6-magnitude quake hits Iranian island in Gulf

TEHERAN, 8 Dec—A strong 5.6-magnitude earthquake jolted part of Qeshm island in the Gulf off Iran's southern Hormozgan province at 17:06 pm (1336 GMT) on Sunday, state television

reported. According to the student *ISNA* news agency, the quake on the outskirts of Dargahan, a small town on the island, injured two people.

"Two people from Zinbi village were hurt but

their general condition is satisfactory," Qeshm governor Mehdi Irannejad was quoted as saying.

Houses in two villages were also reported damaged, he added.

Four die from gas poisoning in Shanghai

SHANGHAI, 8 Dec—Four people were found dead possibly from gas poisoning in Shanghai on Sunday morning. Police suggested a gas water heater could have caused the accident.

The victims are an old couple both in their 70s, their daughter-in-law and a 12-year-old granddaughter, a police spokesman said.

Thousands more job cuts to come at UBS, say reports

ZURICH, 8 Dec—Switzerland's biggest bank UBS, which has been hurt badly by the United States sub-prime crisis, will slash up to 4,500 more jobs, according to two Swiss Sunday newspapers.

Without citing sources, *SonntagZeitung* newspaper said the bank would "in the coming weeks announce further job cuts".

"It is possible that the bank will eliminate 4,500 jobs, including 750 in Switzerland," the newspaper reported. It also quoted the bank's spokeswoman saying that "cost management has a high priority".

Meanwhile, another newspaper *Sonntag* said without citing sources that UBS would axe another 3,000 to 4,000 positions. In all, the Swiss bank has trimmed 9,000 jobs, reducing its staff strength by 11 percent since June 2007.—*Internet*

Dow Chemical to slash 5,000 jobs, close 20 plants

NEW YORK, 8 Dec—Dow Chemical Co. said on Monday it will slash 5,000 full-time jobs—about 11 percent of its total work force—close 20 plants and sell several businesses to reign in costs amid the economic recession. The company, one of the largest chemical makers in the world, expects the moves to save about \$700 million per year by 2010. Dow also will temporarily idle 180 plants and prune 6,000 contractors from its payroll.

We are accelerating the implementation of these measures as the current world economy has deteriorated sharply, and we must adjust ourselves to the severity of this downturn," Chief Executive and Chairman Andrew N Liversid said in a statement.—*Internet*

Volvo Cars to cut 3,400 jobs

STOCKHOLM, 8 Dec—Volvo Cars will cut some 3,400 jobs in Sweden and abroad, the Swedish carmaker owned by US giant Ford announced here Monday after the negotiation with the trade union.

2,721 employees in Sweden and an additional 680 employees abroad will leave the company, the company said in a statement. The majority of the redundant employees will have been released from work at the end of the year, it added.

Volvo is also terminating 1,215 consultant contracts. Volvo Cars has a 25,000-strong workforce. Ford has said it was planning to sell the Swedish subsidiary.—*Internet*

**Sudan confirms troop
build-up in oil region**

KHARTOUM, 8 Dec—Sudan's government on Sunday confirmed it had moved troops to a volatile energy-rich central region, telling state media it wanted to halt "feverish attempts" to attack the area by Darfur rebels. Chilean glaciers retreating due to global warming

SANTIAGO, 8 Dec—Chile's glaciers are on the retreat, a sign of global warming but also a threat to fresh water reserves at the southern end of South America, a report has found.

In a November report, the Chilean water utility — Direccion General de Aguas de Chile (DGA) — said the Echaurren ice fields, which supply the capital with 70 percent of its water needs, are receding up to 12 metres (39.37

feet) per year.

Twenty of the glaciers studied receded between 1986 and 2007 in Campos de Hielo Sur, the third largest ice reserve in the world after Antarctica and Greenland. At the current rate of decline, Echaurren and other small glaciers close to Santiago could vanish over the next half century.

"The results indicate that the Campos de Hielo Sur glaciers generally tend to recede, which

MANILA, 8 Dec —Five soldiers were killed Sunday when pursuing Abu Sayyaf militants in the southern Philippine province of Basilan, the military said on Monday.

Major General Ben Dolorfino, Philippine Marines commandant, said that 24 others soldiers were wounded in the clash that erupted in the morning and lasted till the evening, Philippine TV network GMA News reported.

The enemy suffered an undetermined number of casualties, Dolorfino said. The 370-member Abu Sayyaf group, listed by the United States as a terror organization, was a major security threat in the Philippines for a string of bloody attacks it carried out in public, including the 2004 Manila Bay blast that killed more than 100 civilians.

"The glaciers have receded up to 580 meters (1,900 feet) due to reduced rainfall recorded by weather stations in Patagonia and temperatures rising by about one degree Celsius (1.8 degrees Fahrenheit) in the region over the last century."

The Chilean glaciers, located mostly in the remote flatlands of Patagonia, have receded by about 67 metres per year between 1986 and 2001 and by about 45 meters between 2001 and 2007, according to DGA. Loss of glaciers along Chile's Andes mountain range, home to 76 percent of South America's glaciers over a surface of 20,000 square kilometers (12,400 square miles), is threatening the water supply for people and agriculture.

Scientists back brain drugs for healthy people

NEW YORK, 8 Dec—Healthy people should have the right to boost their brains with pills, like those prescribed for hyperactive kids or memory-impaired older folks, several scientists contend in a provocative commentary.

College students are already illegally taking prescription stimulants like Ritalin to help them study, and demand for such drugs is likely to grow elsewhere, they say.

“We should welcome new methods of improving our brain function,” and doing it with pills is no more morally objectionable than eating right or getting a good night’s sleep, these experts wrote in an opinion piece published online Sunday by the journal *Nature*.

The commentary calls for more research and a variety of steps for managing the risks.

As more effective brain-

boosting pills are developed, demand for them is likely to grow among middle-aged people who want youthful memory powers and multitasking workers who need to keep track of multiple demands, said one commentary author, brain scientist Martha Farah of the University of Pennsylvania.

“Almost everybody is going to want to use it,” Farah said.—*Internet*

Obama pledges not to smoke in White House

WASHINGTON, 8 Dec—Barack Obama says you won’t catch him lighting up a cigarette in the smoke-free White House.

“There are times where I’ve fallen off the wagon,” the president-elect said when asked in a broadcast interview whether he has kicked the habit.

“I’ve done a terrific job, under the circumstances, of making myself much healthier,” he said. “And I think that you will not see any violations of these rules in the White House,” he said on Sunday’s “Meet the Press” on NBC.

Obama told the magazine *Men’s Health* in an interview for its November issue that he wished he had more time for staying fit and that he still occasionally smoked a cigarette.

Obama said in that interview that he had bummed a cigarette a couple of times during the campaign. “But I figure, seeing as I’m running for president, I need to cut myself a little slack,” he said.—*Internet*

Survey finds over half of adults play video games

NEW YORK, 8 Dec—After a day of dirty diapers and “Dora the Explorer,” of laundry and homework time, when her four kids are finally asleep, Sarah Ninesling begins roaming the ruins of a post-apocalyptic Washington, DC,

fighting mutants to help save the survivors of a nuclear war.

The 30-year-old stay-at-home mom from New York’s Long Island plays “Fallout 3” and other games like “World of Warcraft” and “The Lord

of the Rings Online.” She plays every day, sometimes past midnight, to escape and relax and feel a sense of accomplishment.

“You are never going to play a schlep,” she said. “You are always going to be a hero.” Ninesling is not alone. More than half of American adults play video games and one in five play just about every day, according to a survey released Sunday by the Pew Internet & American Life Project. The survey of 2,054 US adults was conducted late last year, with a margin of error of about 2 percent.

People from all walks of life play, though younger adults are far more likely to play than seniors, proof that video games are mainstream entertainment for the generations that grew up with them. In all, 81 percent of respondents between 18 and 29 said they play games, compared with 23 percent of people 65 and older.—*Internet*

Endeavour delays return trip to Fla until Tuesday

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, 8 Dec—Space shuttle Endeavour has to wait another day to make its cross-country return trip to Florida.

NASA officials said on Sunday that Endeavour’s piggyback ride atop a modified jumbo jet was postponed until Tuesday because of bad weather at its first scheduled stop in Texas.

The shuttle was diverted last week on its return from orbit to Edwards Air Force Base in California after stormy weather hit its main Florida landing site.

It was scheduled to leave Sunday but technicians had trouble installing the aerodynamic cone that fits over the back of the shuttle. Then NASA managers decided to delay it another day after reviewing the weather forecast.—*Internet*

From hybrids to SUVs, unsold cars pile up

LONG BEACH, 8 Dec—From pricey luxury sedans to popular hybrid cars, automobiles made overseas are stacking up at ports and parking lots around the United States as supplies far outstrip demand amid the nation’s worst auto market in more than 25 years.

At the Long Beach port near Los Angeles, Toyota Motor Corp vehicles

including Prius hybrids, FJ Cruiser sport utility vehicles and Lexus IS 250 luxury sedans are being stored on a vast construction site that will one day be a new container terminal.

The site became a gigantic parking lot when Toyota and Daimler AG’s Mercedes-Benz asked the port for space to store thousands of vehicles that

dealerships have not been able to take on due to sluggish sales.

“It’s unusual that they would be here longer than a few days, but that’s the situation now,” said Art Wong, a spokesman for the Port of Long Beach. “They can’t move it through their pipeline fast enough so they are asking for additional space while they keep their vehicles here more than a few days, and in some cases more than a few weeks.”

The port has not counted how many additional cars were being stored, but Wong said Toyota has leased an additional 23 acres of space while Mercedes-Benz has leased about 20 more acres.

Laid-off workers occupy Chicago factory, seek pay

CHICAGO, 8 Dec— Invoking Main Street resentment of Wall Street's federal bailout, some 200 workers entered their third day of occupying a shuttered Chicago window and door factory on Sunday, demanding that Bank of America agree to pay them severance plus vacation pay.

Workers belonging to the United Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers union began their peaceful occupation of the plant on Friday after family-owned Republic Windows & Doors said it was closing after Bank of America cancelled its line

of credit. The workers said Republic Windows & Doors gave them only three days notice of Friday's closing instead of the 60 days required by law, and owes them roughly 3,500 US dollars per worker including unused vacation pay.

A union spokeswoman said Bank of America is not letting the company pay the workers. "We're just shocked that Bank of America, after receiving 25 billion US dollars in bailout money, not only do they refuse to extend credit to companies but, to add insult to injury, they don't

allow these companies to fulfil their legal obligations to their workers," union spokeswoman Leah Fried said. The downturn in home construction doomed the plant, which has manufactured windows and doors for more than 30 years.

Bank of America was among several US banks to receive funding from a 700-US-billion-dollar federal bailout package designed to stabilize the financial system. The laid-off workers hoisted placards saying, "Bank of America: You got bailed out. We got sold out."

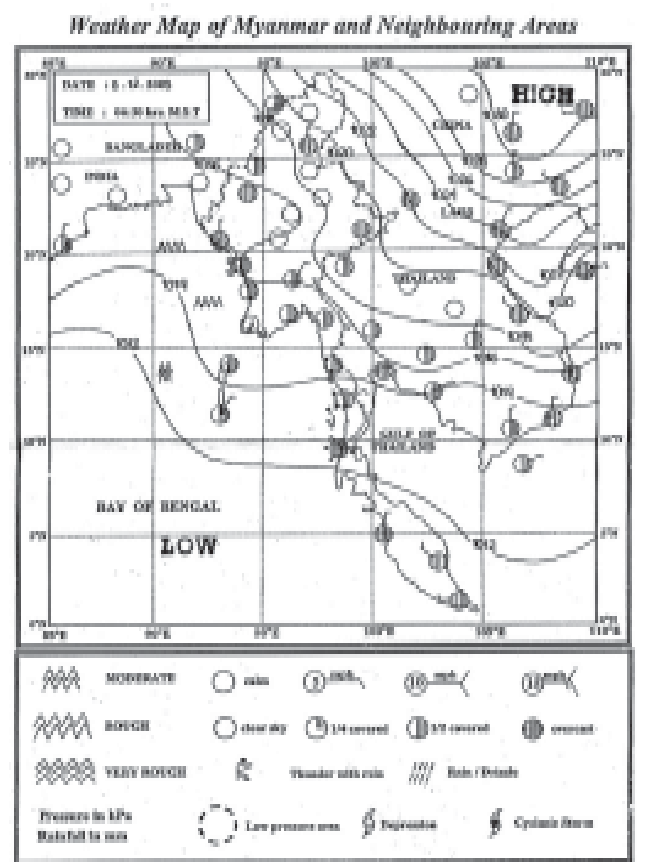

At least 13 killed in Egyptian bus accident

CAIRO, 8 Dec— At least 13 people were killed and 30 others injured in a bus accident in Egypt on Monday, a security source said.

The bus carrying Coptic students overturned on Monday morning about 30 km south of the Egyptian capital of Cairo, said the source, adding that the death toll is expected to rise because some of the injured were in serious conditions.

The accident occurred when the bus was heading for the Mediterranean coast city of Alexandria, some 220 km northwest of Cairo, from central Egyptian governorate of Minya, some 220 km south of the capital.

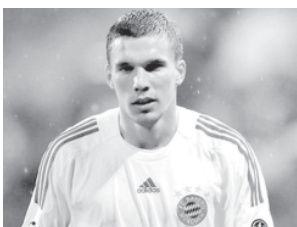

Cold sore virus linked to Alzheimer's disease: New treatment, or even vaccine possible

MANCHESTER, 8 Dec — The virus behind cold sores is a major cause of the insoluble protein plaques found in the brains of Alzheimer's disease sufferers, University of Manchester researchers have revealed.

They believe the herpes simplex virus is a significant factor in developing the debilitating disease and could be treated by antiviral agents such as acyclovir, which is already used to treat cold sores and other diseases caused by the herpes virus. Another future possibility is vaccination against the virus to prevent the development of the disease in the first place.

Climate change wiped out cave bears 13 millennia earlier than thought

WARSAW, 8 Dec—Enormous cave bears, Ursus spelaeus, that once inhabited a large swathe of Europe, from Spain to the Urals, died out 27,800 years ago, around 13 millennia earlier than was previously believed, scientists have reported.

The new date coincides with a period of significant climate change, known as the Last Glacial Maximum, when a marked cooling in temperature resulted in the reduction or loss of vegetation forming the main component of the cave bears' diet.
