### Rivaldo: Messi is best



BARCELONA, 15 Jan— Cristiano Ronaldo may have walked off with all the main individual awards for 2008, but former world player of the year Rivaldo believes Barcelona ace Lionel Messi is the game's leading star.

Ronaldo this week

added the FIFA World Player of the Year title to his FIFPro and Ballon d'Or awards after last season scoring 42 goals to help Manchester United win the Champions League and the Premier League.

The Portugal international finished well clear of second-placed Messi in

the voting for the FIFA World Player of the Year, but in the eyes of 1999 winner Rivaldo, it is the Argentinian ace who is top dog.

“Between Cristiano Ronaldo and Messi, I go with Messi. For me he is the best in the world,” said the former Brazil international. Cristiano is very good and you cannot argue about him getting all those awards because he has won a lot of titles and scored 42 goals, but I’m with Leo. For me, Messi is more aggressive than Cristiano, he reminds me of myself. Leo has a good attitude, can decide games and he is always trying to go forward no matter how many kicks he gets. And all this at only 21 years old.”—Internet

### Great Lakes water levels sensitive to climate change

OTTAWA, 15 Jan — The water level in the Great Lakes has varied by only about two meters during the last century, helping them to play a vital role in the region's shipping, fishing, recreation and power generation industries.

But new evidence by scientists from the University of Rhode Island and colleagues in the U.S. and Canada, published recently in the journal *Eos*, indicates that the water level in the lake system is highly sensitive to climate changes.

“In the distant past, there were great fluctua-

tions in the water level of the Great Lakes, but it was thought to have been related entirely to the advance and retreat of the glaciers,” said URI geological oceanographer John King, who led the study with URI visiting scientist Michael Lewis, emeritus scientist with the Geological Survey of

Canada. “But the last time lake levels fell dramatically—down to 20 meters below the basin overflow outlets—it was due to dry climate conditions.”

That event, which occurred between 7900 and 7500 years ago in the early Holocene period, caused the lakes to become disconnected as their overflow rivers, including the Niagara River, ran dry.—Internet from

### For sustainable progress of self-reliant libraries

“Education for all” is necessary for boosting the economy and social standard of a nation.

Now, plans for formal education, non-formal education and informal education are being implemented in combination, and every school-age child has easy access to primary education, and every youth enjoys better opportunities to pursue education, as a result.

In addition, literacy campaigns are gathering momentum across the nation including rural and border areas. So, the literacy rate of the nation is on the increase. Continuing education programmes are well under way for sustainable progress in that regard.

So far, over 50,000 self-reliant village libraries have been established to help rural folks broaden their horizons. The donations of the buildings plus cash were worth over 165.2 million kyats.

A growing number of self-reliant libraries helps rural residents cultivate a good habit of reading and acquire knowledge. In addition, that encourages book lovers and literate adults to carry out a constant study. Sustainable progress of self-reliant libraries calls for collaborative cooperation of well-wishers and service personnel.

### Minister facilitates arrangements to build new schools in Ingapu Tsp

NAY PYI TAW, 15 Jan—Minister for Forestry Brig-Gen Thein Aung inspected Tititu village Basic Education Primary School in Ingapu township of Ayeyawady Division on 10 January, met with the local people and arranged to construct the 90 feet long and 30 feet wide school.

## Four Afghan districts out of govt control

KABUL, 15 Jan—Afghan Defence Ministry admitted Wednesday that government troops failed to maintain military presence in four districts of the insurgency-rampant country's southern region.

"There are four districts that the government does not exist and Taliban militants are there but in mobile groups," spokesman of Defence Ministry General Zahir Azimi told newsmen at a press conference.

Three of these districts, he added, are in the respective Helmand Province while one is in the southern central Daikundi.

"Baghran, Dicho and Washir in Helmand Province and Gizab in Daikundi are the districts where the government does not exist," the spokesman said.

Moreover, the spokesman foresaw more violence in 2009, saying "we predict 2009 would be a tough year in term of con-

flict. We do not expect to have less violence in 2009 than 2008."

However, he was optimistic that the security forces would have more achievements and more successes against Taliban-led insurgents in the current year.

Over 5,000 people, with some 2,000 civilians and 194 foreign soldiers, had been killed in conflicts and Taliban-related violence in 2008.

## NATO troops ordered to do more to avoid civilian casualties

BRUSSELS, 15 Jan—NATO troops in Afghanistan have been ordered to behave in a way that would win the support of the Afghan people by avoiding civilian casualties and minimizing damage to property, said the alliance on Wednesday. In a "tactical directive" issued by International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) Commander Gen David McKiernan, the NATO troops were told not to take Afghan popular support for granted. They were also told to show respect for the Afghan people, their culture, religion and customs.

The directive was dated on 30 Dec, 2008, but was only made public on Wednesday.

In the directive, Gen McKiernan asked commanders to ensure troops are properly trained to minimize the need to resort to deadly force. Signals, signs and warnings must be unambiguous and repeated to ensure the safety of innocent civilians.—Internet

## Bush disappointed that CIA gave him incorrect info on Iraq

WASHINGTON, 15 Jan—At the fag end of his Presidency, George W Bush has acknowledged his disappointment at the CIA giving him wrong information about the presence of weapons of mass destruction in Iraq, on the premise of which America invaded that country.

"Are you angry at them (CIA)," Larry King asked the US President on CNN last night. "No. I'm disappointed, you know?" Bush said. Bush had decided to attack Iraq based on American intelligence that the country had weapons of mass destruction. "Were you angry at the people who told you there were? I mean, you didn't go inspect. You didn't..." Larry King asked on his popular show. "I didn't—I was unhappy... But rather than sitting around being unhappy, I decided to do something about it and to — had a full inves-

tigation of why things went wrong. And then we reformed our intelligence services," Bush said. But then, the US President said, everyone else across the world also said the same. "It just wasn't the US," he said.—Internet

## Three killed in northern Iraq attacks

BAGHDAD, 15 Jan— Three people were killed, including an Iraqi soldier, and three others were wounded in a suicide attack and a roadside bombing on Wednesday in northern Iraq, police said.

"Two people, one of whom an Iraqi army soldier, were killed and two others were wounded when a suicide bomber driving a vehicle exploded," in Mosul, the local police spokesman in the northern city, Colonel Safa al-Zaidi, told AFP.

He added that the suicide bomber targeted a military check point in the city centre. Attacks in Mosul occur on a nearly daily basis in what the US military says is the last urban stronghold of Al-Qaeda in Iraq.

In the second incident one person was killed and another one wounded in a roadside bombing in the town of Jalawla, north of Baghdad, in Diyala Province, a police source said.—Internet

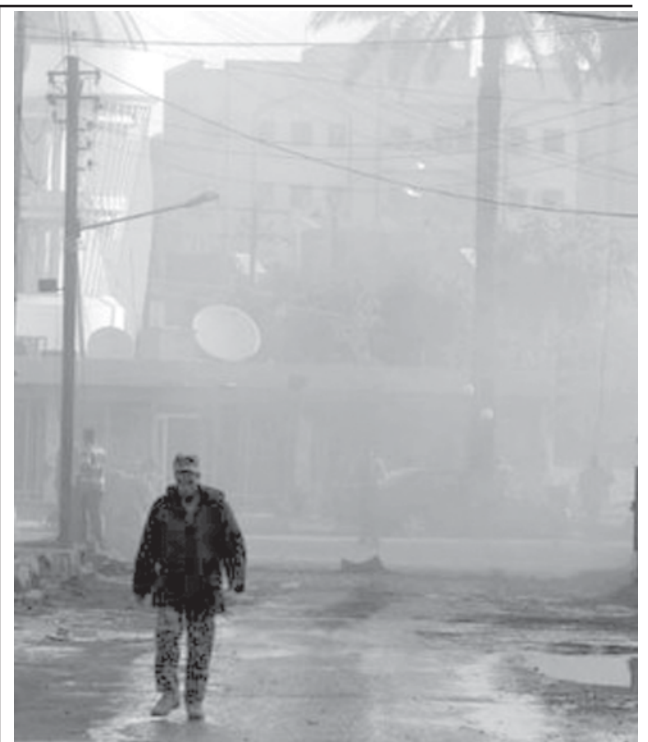
## Soldier suicides in Afghanistan rose sharply last year

WASHINGTON, 15 Jan—Soldiers in Afghanistan committed suicide in record numbers in 2008, in step with a dramatic spike in combat deaths in the country, new military figures show.

Seven Army soldiers committed suicide in Afghanistan last year, compared with 15 suicides in total during the previous 75 months of Operation Enduring Freedom, according to figures from the Defence Manpower Data Centre. Col Elspeth Ritchie, a top Army psy-

chiatrist, said military officials during the past several years have tracked an increase in mental health problems among soldiers serving in Afghanistan. In 2004, she said, anxiety and depression were far less common among soldiers in Afghanistan, compared with those in Iraq. But by 2007 and early 2008, soldiers in Afghanistan were suffering depression and anxiety at the same rates as their counterparts in Iraq, she said. "In Afghanistan, there are considerable barriers for providers get-

ting to the troops due to the difficulties in travel and weather, compared to Iraq," Ritchie said. After a spike in suicides in Iraq in the early months of the war, Army officials sent special mental health teams to the war zone in an effort to understand and prevent soldier deaths. Ritchie said the military is always looking for ways to improve suicide-prevention programmes, but said she was not aware of any plans to specifically address the recent spike in Afghanistan.—Internet

## Russia to complete Iran's Bushehr nuclear power plant in 2009

TEHERAN, 15 Jan— Iran's ambassador to Russia Mahmoud Reza Sajjadi said that Russia would complete Iran's Bushehr nuclear power plant this year, the semi-official Fars news agency reported on Wednesday.

"Delays in completion of Iran's first nuclear plant in southern city Bushehr are not only Russia's fault," but Russia was committed and determined to complete the project, Sajjadi was

quoted as saying.

He noted that there were some other countries which had not fulfilled their commitments to provide equipment on time required for the plant.

"Russia has a greater chance compared to other countries" to participate in Iran's other projects of nuclear power plants, he maintained.

Earlier in Dec, Iranian lawmaker Alaeddin

Boroujerdi said that Iran's Bushehr nuclear plant would start operation by 2010.

Boroujerdi, who is also head of Iran's Parliament (Majlis) National Security and Foreign Policy Commission, said that "Bushehr nuclear power plant has made good progress, hoping that it will become operational by March 2010."

## Audit finds fault with KBR, others in Iraq rebuilding

WASHINGTON, 15 Jan — A project costing \$722 million to restore Iraq's oil production facilities was undermined by weak management, contractor mistakes and Iraqi neglect, US auditors say in a new report similar to many others examining the country's reconstruction.

The report from the office of the special inspector general for Iraq reconstruction points to security concerns, postwar looting and the shoddy shape of the oil network as primary contributors to the cost of the contract awarded to Houston-based KBR in January 2004.

As if this were not a challenging enough climate, the effort, administered by the US Army Corps of Engineers, was hampered by a lack of direction, the report says. Cost overruns and frequent contract changes led to work being delayed or canceled.—*Internet*

## Motorola to cut 4,000 more jobs in 2009

LOS ANGELES, 15 Jan—Mobile handset maker Motorola Inc said on Wednesday it will cut 4,000 more jobs in 2009, in addition to 3,000 it announced in October.

The company said the move will save about \$700 million a year starting in 2009, and total \$1.5 billion in annual savings when combined with the previous cut.

Most of the new layoffs will hit the mobile devices business, while about 1,000 jobs are tied to corporate functions and other business units.

The move is the latest in cost-cutting measures by Motorola, which has been struggling to revive its business in recent years.

## Lebanese minister denounces firing rockets from S Lebanon

BEIRUT, 15 Jan— Lebanese Information Minister Tareq Mitri denounced on Wednesday the firing of rockets from southern Lebanon into northern Israel, local Naharnet website reported.

"Firing rockets targeting Lebanon's national interest and the interest of the Palestinian," Mitri told reporters after meeting with Lebanese Prime Minister Fouad Seniora.

□□□□Mitri said last week that all Lebanese factions inside the government reached a unanimous consensus on avoiding dragging Lebanon into a confrontation with Israel.—*Internet*

## Israeli troops under fire from Jordan

JERUSALEM, 15 Jan — An Israeli security patrol was attacked on Tuesday by fire from the Jordanian side of the Israel-Jordan border, said the Israel Defence Forces (IDF).

The Border Guard unit returned fire in the incident near the Rabin Border Crossing with Jordan, some three kilometres north of Israel's southernmost city of Eilat, said the IDF, adding that no casualty or damage was reported.

It is still unknown who launched the attack, and an IDF investigation is underway with Jordanian cooperation. On Sunday, a group of IDF soldiers conducting engineering work near the Israel-Syria border fence came under cross-border fire from the Syrian side, causing no casualty.—*Internet*

## Basra is focus of Shiite rivalry in southern Iraq

BASRA, 15 Jan—Freed last year from the grip of militias, Basra has emerged as the main battleground for rival Shiites in elections for control of the oil-rich south - a race that will test the power of religious parties and the influence of neighbouring Iran.

The 31 Jan ballot, in which voters across the country will choose ruling provincial councils, will be the first since US-backed Iraqi forces wrested control of Basra from Shiite militias and criminal gangs.

American officials will be watching the outcome for any sign that the militias might return in Iraq's second largest city of about 2 million people, located only a few miles from the Iranian border.

More than 1,000 candidates have entered the race for Basra's 35 council seats, filling the city's dusty and traffic-choked streets with campaign posters and flyers that give the city a festive look. The outcome will help shape the political future of the southern

Shiite heartland ahead of national elections expected by year's end.

Basra has been relatively quiet since last year's military crackdown, which ended three years of Shiite militia rule, rampant crime and turmoil. Today, thousands of national police and army soldiers patrol its streets.

At the commercial heart of the city, the soldiers and policemen rub shoulders with the thousands of residents who throng stores until late into the night.—*Internet*



## China's five standpoints on Mideast "welcomed in principle" by Israel

TELAVIV, 15 Jan— China's five standpoints on the current Middle East situation "are welcomed and accepted in principle" by the Israeli side, a Chinese envoy said on Wednesday.

Sun Bigan, China's special envoy on the Middle East issue, made the remarks in an exclusive briefing with *Xinhua*, hours after he held talks with Israeli officials on the latest developments of the embattled Gaza

Strip.

Sun, who arrived in Israel on Tuesday, said he put forward the five standpoints on the current Middle East situation during the talks.

"The five standpoints are welcomed and accepted in principle by the Israeli side," the Chinese envoy told *Xinhua*.

In the five standpoints, China calls on all parties concerned to abide by the UN Security Council Resolution 1860 and

cease all military actions immediately to avert more casualties, Sun said.

Measures should be taken to ease the humanitarian crisis in Gaza, Sun said.

He added that a stable channel for humanitarian supplies, including food, medicine and fuel, should be opened as soon as possible, and that the concerned parties should provide the necessary guarantee in this regard.

## Fire in Karaoke bar kills eight in S Korea's Busan

SEOUL, 15 Jan— A fire at a karaoke bar in South Korea's southeastern port city of Busan killed at least eight people and injured another on Wednesday night, South Korea's *Yonhap* News Agency reported on Thursday.

According to *Yonhap*, the fire broke out around 8:45 pm (1145 GMT on Wednesday) in Namhangdong, Youngdo ward in Busan. Tens of customers escaped from the site.

Local police said they are investigating into the exact cause of the fire and confirming the number of casualties.—*Xinhua*

## Iran, China sign oilfield development deal

TEHERAN, 15 Jan— Iran and China signed a 1.76 billion US dollars deal here on Wednesday for the initial development of Iran's North Azadegan oil field, the official *IRNA* news agency reported.

The deal was signed between China National Petroleum Corporation (CNPC) and the National Iranian Oil Company (NIOC) in the presence of Iranian oil minister Gholam Hossein

Nozari and Chinese ambassador Xie Xiaoyan, *IRNA* said.

The North Azadegan oil field which located in Iran's western province of Khuzestan has an estimated reserve of six billion barrels of oil and can produce 75,000 barrels per day for 25 years, Nozari was quoted as saying.

Under the deal, CNPC is committed to developing the oil field in two phases, *IRNA* said.

Oil output of the North Azadegan oil field will reach 150,000 barrels per day when both the two phases of the project are finished, Nozari added.

According to *IRNA*, the deal is in the form of buy-back terms, based on which CNPC hands over the operation of the field to NIOC after development and receives payment from oil production for a few years to cover its investment.

## Vietnam seeks \$12 bln for infrastructure projects

HANOI, 15 Jan — The Vietnamese Ministry of Planning and Investment has announced a list of more than 60 urban infrastructure projects, calling on an estimated 12 billion US dollars of investment in the period of 2009 and 2016, the local newspaper *The Youth* reported on Thursday.

The projects involve the construction and upgrade of traffic system, infrastructure, sewage plants and water supply and drainage systems in 15 provinces and cities nationwide, said Truong Van Doan, Deputy Minister of Planning and Investment.

Thirty percent of the projects are expected to be funded by official development assistance from French and Spanish governments, the German Reconstruction and Development Bank, the Japan International Cooperation Agency and the Asian Development Bank, said the newspaper.—*Xinhua*

## Five dead in landslide in northeastern Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO, 15 Jan — Five people, including an eight-year-old child, died on Wednesday morning in a landslide in northeastern Brazil.

Two houses were damaged by the landslide in Recife, Pernambuco state, which was probably caused by water infiltration in a clay scarp after a burst in water pipes, the local Fire Department said.

The rescue team took three hours to remove the bodies from the debris. The other residents were evacuated as three gas pipes also ruptured after the landslide.

## Death toll in Gaza rises to 1,017

GAZA, 15 Jan— In spite of the good news that Hamas welcomed in Cairo an Egyptian-brokered initiative on a ceasefire, the Israeli offensive on Gaza continued on Wednesday, leaving so far 1,017 people killed.

Gaza emergency chief Mo'aweya Hassanein said on Wednesday night that the Israeli army killed

on Wednesday 28 Palestinians and wounded about 80 others, adding that the death toll since 27 Dec has hit 1,017 with more than 4,600 wounded.

Earlier on Wednesday, the Gaza-based news agency of "Ramattan" said that Hamas has accepted the Egyptian initiative of a ceasefire between the

group and Israel, but Israeli warplanes continued striking several targets in the blockaded enclave.

Hassanein said that in an Israeli airstrike on a building north of Gaza City, two people were killed and 17 wounded, three of the members of the Palestinian firefighting department.

### Sri Lankan troops capture last strip of rebel land in Jaffna

COLOMBO, 15 Jan — Sri Lankan government troops have captured the last landmass held by the Tamil Tiger rebels in the northern Jaffna peninsula, defence officials said on Wednesday.

Chundikulam area was taken control with 100 boats belonging to the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE) rebels, officials said. A large haul of anti-personnel mines was also captured.

The entire Jaffna peninsula is now under Army control after last week's capture of Elephant Pass, the isthmus between Jaffna and the northern Wanni district.

Jaffna was taken under Army's control in December 1995 after it was controlled by the LTTE since 1990. But parts of the peninsula remained under LTTE hands until last week. —Internet

### Six civilians killed in insurgent attack in Somali capital

MOGADISHU, 15 Jan— At least six civilians were killed and nearly 18 others wounded as Somali government forces responded with heavy artillery fire following insurgents' mortar attack against the Presidential Palace and withdrawing Ethiopian troops in the capital of Mogadishu.

The insurgent fighters launched several rounds of mortar shells against the Presidential Palace compound where Somali Prime Minister Nur Hassan Hussein and a number of government officials were staying but there was no reports of anyone harmed at the

compound.

Rebel fighters also attacked Ethiopian army units as they left the Mogadishu Football Stadium, a major Ethiopian base in the north of the Somali capital Mogadishu, prompting heavy artillery fire from the units.

Artillery shells fired by Somali government forces at the palace compound and tank shells fired by withdrawing Ethiopian troops attacked by insurgent fighters landed in residential areas around the city, killing at six civilians, local media reports said.

Officials at the

Mogadishu's main hospitals said that 18 civilians were injured by stray bullets and shrapnel from the artillery shells. —Internet

### Russian navy saves Dutch ship from Somali pirates

KUALA LUMPUR, 15 Jan—The Russian navy helped foil an attack by Somali pirates on a Dutch container ship in the dangerous Gulf of Aden, a maritime watchdog said on Wednesday.

Six pirates fired rocket-propelled grenades at the ship, which took evasive maneuvers while calling for help, said Noel Choong, head of the International Maritime Bureau's piracy reporting centre in Malaysia.

The pirates chased the vessel for about 30 minutes but aborted their attempt to board the ship after a Russian warship and helicopter arrived at the scene, Choong said.

Pirates last year attacked 111 ships and seized 42 off the Horn of Africa, many in the Gulf of Aden. An international flotilla including US warships has stopped many attacks, but the area is too vast to keep all ships safe in the vital sea lane that links Asia to Europe. —Internet

### Al-Qaeda recruits children as suicide bombers in Iraq

BAGHDAD, 15 Jan—A boy masquerading as a flower seller blew himself up last September before the house of Sheikh Imad Jassem, the joint-leader of the Sons of Iraq in Tarmiya, 25 km north of Baghdad.

The boy, as young as 10 years old, had been stalking Jassem for three days before tripping on his flip-flops several meters away from his target.

The bomb exploded prematurely, seriously wounding the leader.

The innocent and immature young have been recruited and trained to be suicide bombers of the al-Qaeda network in Iraq to attack Iraqi high-profile officials as well as civilians.

Since the beginning of US-led war in Iraq in 2003, the war-torn country is plagued by countless

explosions and attacks, among which the suicide bombing are the most fatal, killing 600,000 Iraqi civilians and over 4,200 US soldiers.

The notorious terror group started its first recruiting programme of women and children as early as 2005, when dozens were brought to a training camp in Doura district in southern Baghdad. —Internet

In a couple of years Wii users won't be the only ones waving their hands in front of their TVs. Gestures may soon replace remote controls suggest leading producers.

The Japanese companies Hitachi and Toshiba have presented their versions of motion reading television in Las Vegas at the Consumer Electronics Show, one of the biggest events featuring new consumer products and technology. Both companies' TVs are prototypes that use infra-red sensors to track the movements of user's hands, reports PC World magazine.

### 140-year-old lobster to regain freedom

A lobster thought to be about 140 years old will be returned to the ocean after becoming the mascot for a restaurant in New York City, Media reported Saturday.

The 9-kg (about 20 pounds) lobster was captured off the coast of Newfoundland in Canada a week-and-a-half ago and shipped to New York.

It was bought for 100 US dollars by City Crab and Seafood to become its mascot.

"We bought a big lobster, started taking pictures with kids and it worked out real well," said the restaurant manager Keith Valenti.

We never intended to sell the giant lobster, just draw attention to the restaurant, said the manager.

The lobster will be driven to Maine from the New York restaurant by animal rights activists and allowed to reacquaint himself in the waters around Kennebunk port, where lobster trapping is banned.

A lobster's age can be worked out from how much it weighs, with each pound counting for 7 to 10 years, according to Valenti.

# Khamti Airport Runway Project

Khamti Township is located in the north-west hilly region of the northern part of Myanmar. It has many mountain ranges and ravines such as Naga Mountain Range that stretches from Mt. Khakaborazi and Patkoi Mountain Range. The mountain ranges are higher in the west and north parts and go downhill in the south. It hardly has plains, and the Chindwin River flows through the heart of the township. Many strong creeks and steep ravines are natural barriers to transport.

In the past, the geographical features consigned the township a

secluded region upstream the Chindwin River. The township is surrounded by mountain ranges and heights standing at an altitude of 400 to 2000 feet and covered with evergreen forests. Previously, the Chindwin River is the only means for transport for it.

Now, the township's transport has been reinforced by Khamti-Phalamone, Khamti-Pinma (Maha Myaing), and Hsinthe-Lahe roads.

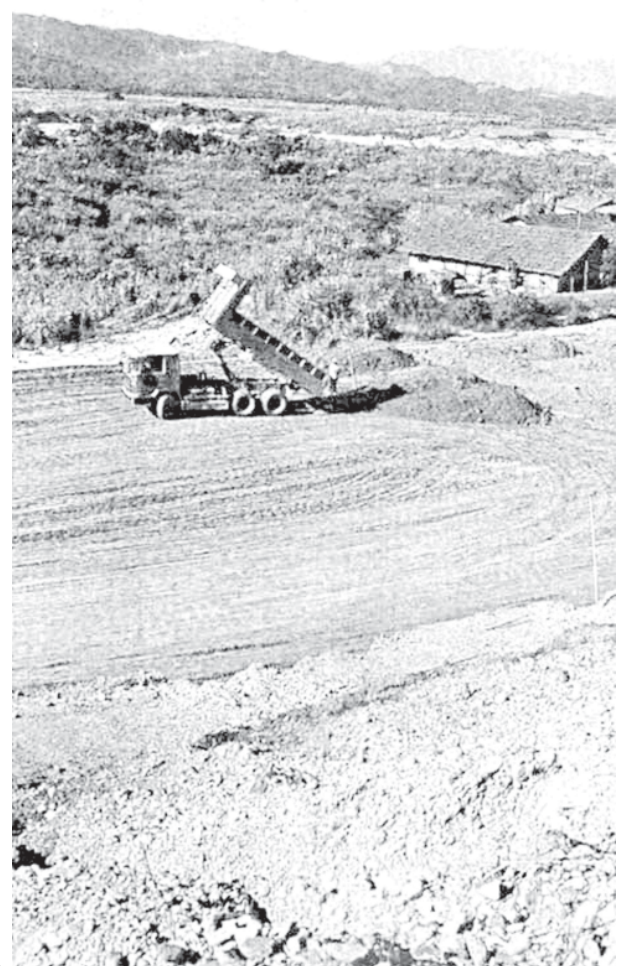
When asked about the Khamti Airport Runway Extension Project, Junior Engineer (1) U Soe Aung of Airport Project Special Group (3) of Public Works said that Khamti has only few large plains and Khamti Airport

was about 600 feet above sea level; that it was constructed in 1952 with a 4200 feet long and 100 feet wide runway, and was put into service in May 1963; that the runway was just a small one and could withstand 45,000 lbs of loads, so it was serviceable just for F 27 Fokker; and flight schedules were cancelled whenever the weather was bad.

He added that the project was launched on 8 August 2002 and it consisted of two phases; that the first phase was to upgrade the runway to a 4,800 feet long and 100 feet wide facility serviceable all weather for F 27 aircraft, and the second phase was to upgrade it to a 6000 feet long one for F 28

aircraft that weighs 71,000 lbs; that upon completion, the facility would have a 200 feet long over run, two 25 feet wide shoulders, a 200' x 200' apron, a 225' x 50' turning area; that then the facility had been extended to a 6000' x 100' one with a 200' x 200' apron, and a 75' x 100' over run; that and two 175' x 50' turning areas and two conduits, each on either top of the runway were under construction.

Therefore, in the near future, Khamti in Sagaing Division will be accessible by air from Yangon, Mandalay and Monywa all-year round with rapid development in the economic, social, education and health sectors.

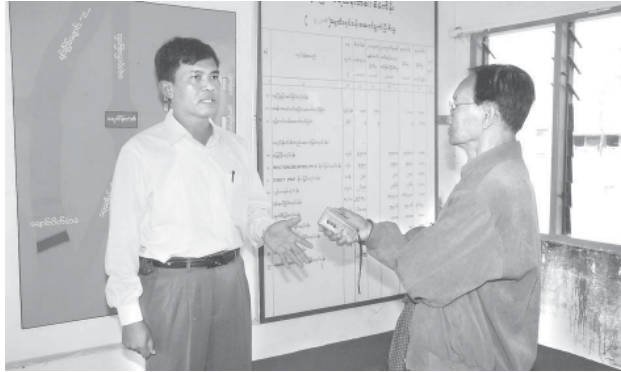

## Somali pirates sack Ukraine tank ship mediators

SOMALIA, 15 Jan—Pirates holding a Ukrainian cargo ship loaded with tanks have sacked Somali middlemen trying to secure its release and are ne-

gotiating directly with the owners, an associate of the gang said on Thursday.

Gunmen from Somalia caused havoc in one of the world's busiest shipping lanes last year, hijacking dozens of ships and demanding tens of millions of dollars in ransom payments to free them. The MV Faina was carrying 33 Soviet-era T-72 tanks and other weapons when it was seized in September. The pirates initially demanded a \$20

million ransom, lowered to \$5 million.

Osman Farah, an on-shore associate of the gang on the Faina, said his colleagues now expected more than \$5 million after they sacked the middlemen negotiating on their behalf.

"Somali brokers had been delaying the process by reporting only half, or less, of the ransom being offered," Farah told *Reuters* by telephone from the coastal town of Harardheere.—Internet

## Poland unearths 1,800 bodies in WW2 mass grave

WARSAW, 15 Jan—Polish authorities have unearthed the remains of 1,800 bodies and expect to find even more in a mass grave first discovered three months ago and believed to date back to the final days of World War Two.

The site is in a corner of northern Poland that was part of Germany until 1945 and the authorities suspect the remains are of ethnic German civilians, at least some of whom were probably killed by advancing Soviet forces.

"We are dealing with a mass grave of civilians, probably of German origin. The presence of children... suggests they were civilians," Zbigniew Sawicki, a Polish archae-

ologist supervising the exhumation, told *Reuters* on Wednesday.

"It is very puzzling that no personal belongings have been found among the remains... We have few clues as to how these people died, though there is a high probability they were war victims," Sawicki added.

Some 30 bodies were found with gunshot wounds, though the probable cause of death for many was hunger and cold, he said.

The first few skeletons were unearthed last October by construction workers laying the foundations of a new hotel in the town of Malbork, whose imposing castle—built by Teutonic Knights in the 13th century—is a

major draw for tourists.

When the grave was discovered, authorities initially found the remains of just 60 people but the figure mounted rapidly.

"We are looking for witnesses, or sources of

information. We hope to find some leads because we still know virtually nothing about the mass grave and the victims," said Piotr Wojciechowski of the district public prosecutor's office in Malbork.—Internet

## Aid workers taken in Philippines

MANILA, 15 Jan—Gunmen have abducted three aid workers from Italy, Switzerland and the Philippines on southern Jolo island, the Philippine National Red Cross says.

The Red Cross chairman, Senator Richard Gordon, said the three were in a car on their way to Jolo airport. They had been visiting a local jail when they were intercepted by armed men on motorbikes, he said.

The island is a stronghold of the Abu Sayyaf group, which is notorious for kidnappings and terror attacks.

A regional military spokeswoman has identified the three aid workers from the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) as Swiss Andreas Notter, Italian Eugenio Vagni and Filipino Jean Lacaba.

## UN fund allocates \$7 mln for Gaza relief

UNITED NATIONS, 15 Jan—The United Nations said on Wednesday it was allocating \$7 million from an emergency fund to help provide food and clean water in Gaza, where the Palestinian death toll has risen above 1,000.

The funding will also be used to repair damaged shelters, provide fuel for powering water pumping stations and hospitals, provide clean drinking water in shelters and finance ready-made meals, UN humanitarian affairs chief John Holmes said.

Holmes said in a statement that 500,000 Gazans had no access to running water.

The U.N. children's agency, UNICEF, said over 300 children had been killed and more than 1,500 wounded in Gaza.

"Beyond the immediate needs of the children who have lost their homes, have no access to water,

electricity and medicine, beyond the horrific physical scars and injuries however, are the deeper psychological wounds of these children," UNICEF Executive Director Ann Veneman said in a statement.—Internet

## Check woman's heart before contraceptives

LOS ANGELES, 15 Jan—Healthcare providers should evaluate each woman's risk factors prior to starting any contraceptive therapy, US researchers suggest.

Study co-author Dr Chrisandra L Shufelt of Cedars-Sinai Heart Institute, said although pre-menopausal women have a much lower risk of cardiovascular disease, routine screening for potential problems and follow-up is important. Earlier contraceptives used higher levels of estrogen than the newer formulations. The newer formulations use lower doses of estrogen, which is safer in terms of lowering the risk of blood clots, and they tend to use a progestin, a synthetic version of progesterone that is not likely to raise blood pressure and may even slightly reduce it, said Bairey Merz, also of Cedars-Sinai.

Since 2000, death rates have increased in women between the ages of 35 and 44, while all other age groups have seen a decline. Among factors that may be contributing to the rise are increases in obesity and smoking, a decline in physical activity and a significant increase in the use of oral contraceptives.

## Cell phones not linked to eye melanoma

WITTENBERG, 15 Jan—Cell phone use is not associated with the risk of melanoma of the eye, researchers in Germany said.

Dr Andreas Stang of the Martin-Luther-University of Halle-Wittenberg in Germany and colleagues examined the association between cell phone use and risk of uveal melanoma — melanoma of the eye — in 459 patients and 1,194 control subjects.

Control subjects were drawn from the general population, from ophthalmology clinics and from siblings of the patients. The investigators grouped study participants according to amount of time spent on the phone, as never users, sporadic users and regular users. The study, published in the Journal of the National Cancer Institute, said there was no statistically significant association between cell phone use of up to about 10 years and uveal melanoma risk.

"In conclusion, we observed no overall increased risk of uveal melanoma among regular cell phone users or users of radio sets in Germany, where digital cell phone technology was introduced in the early 1990s," the study authors said in a statement.—*Internet*

## Athletes can have metabolic syndrome

COLUMBUS, 15 Jan—College-age football players who gain weight to add power to their blocks and tackles may increase their diabetes and heart risk, US researchers said.

Metabolic syndrome involves a cluster of clinical symptoms that include excess fat in the abdominal area, borderline or high blood pressure, cholesterol problems that foster plaque buildup in arteries, insulin resistance or glucose intolerance indicating the body can't properly use insulin or blood sugar and

the presence of a blood protein indicating inflammation. Lead author Jackie Buell, director of sports nutrition at Ohio State University, said based on the study results, standard health screening for these risk factors might be a good idea for all collegiate football players.

The study, published in the Journal of Athletic Training, found nearly half of a sample of 70 collegiate offensive and defensive linemen had metabolic syndrome — meaning the players had at least three of

five risk factors that indicate a person has higher chances of developing heart disease and diabetes than those without the risk factors. If a male athlete's waist measurements and blood pressure exceed a 40-inch waist and a blood pressure reading higher than 130 over 85—he ideally should undergo a blood test to see if high cholesterol, glucose and triglyceride levels, too, indicate that he might benefit from health guidance to prevent chronic disease down the road, Buell said.—*Internet*

## Cold temps put people at hypothermia risk

ATLANTA, 15 Jan—Sub-zero US temperatures can put people at risk for hypothermia, or abnormally low body temperature, federal health officials said.

Health officials at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention said that when exposed to cold temperatures, the body begins to lose heat faster than it can be produced, which can result in hypothermia. Body temperature that is too low affects the brain, making the victim unable to think clearly or move well.

Hypothermia occurs most commonly at very cold environmental temperatures, but can occur even at cool temperatures — above 40 degrees F if a person becomes chilled from rain, sweat, or submersion in cold water.

Those most at risk of hypothermia are:

— Elderly people with inadequate food, clothing or heating.

— Babies sleeping in cold bedrooms.

— Children left unattended.

— Adults under the influence of alcohol.

— Mentally ill individuals.

— People who remain outdoors for long periods such as the homeless, hikers, hunters and outdoor workers. The signs of hypothermia include shivering/exhaustion, confusion/fumbling hands, memory loss/slurred speech and drowsiness.

However, signs of hypothermia in infants are bright red, cold skin and very low energy.

If hypothermia is suspected, take the person's temperature and if it is below 95 degrees F get medical attention immediately.—*Internet*

## Diabetes links to different brain injuries

SEATTLE, 15 Jan—Patients with dementia and diabetes display a different pattern of injuries in their brains than patients with dementia but no diabetes, US researchers say.

Dr Joshua A Sonnen of the University of Washington in Seattle and colleagues studied 196 individuals who were part of the Adult Changes in Thought Study, a community-based investigation of dementia.

After the participants died, autopsies were conducted on their brains and their cases were divided into four groups based on clinical information: those with diabetes and dementia, those with diabetes but no dementia, those with dementia but no diabetes and those without either disease.—*Internet*



## Regular walking can relieve blocked leg arteries

LOS ANGELES, 15 Jan— Regular six-minute walks on a treadmill improve the endurance and quality of life for people with the leg blood-vessel blockage called peripheral arterial disease (PAD), a new study has found. ■■■

Researchers at the Northwestern University's Feinberg School of Medicine in Chicago came to the conclusion after studying 156 people with PAD, many of whom didn't have the pain that is the classic symptom of artery blockage.

Over the six months of the study, the participants who did their regular six-minute treadmill walks increased their walking distance by about 69 feet, while those who did not walk regularly saw a decrease of 49 feet, according to the study published in the Jan. 14 issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association.

While walking is a standard recommendation for people with PAD, the study was different in two ways, said study lead author Dr Mary McDermott,

an associate professor of medicine at the school. "All prior studies have focused on patients with intermittent claudicating—the symptom of PAD," McDermott said. "Some of the patients in this study were asymptomatic. Also, we included testing of leg strength. This is the largest trial to do so."

McDermott recommended a 40-minute walk three times a week for at least six months.

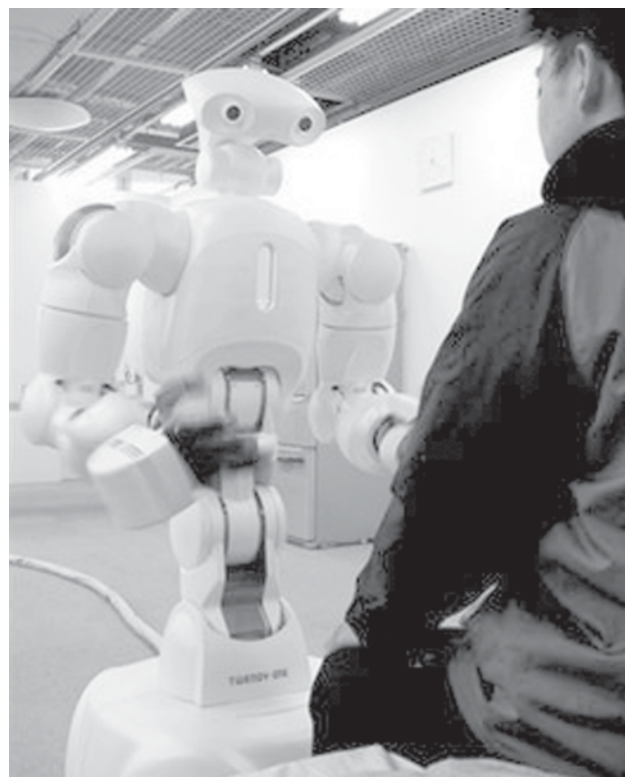
Seven astronauts are scheduled to blast off around sunrise 12 Feb. Lee Archambault will command the mission and Tony Antonelli will be the pilot.

## Asian economies expected to grow at 5.5% in 2009

SINGAPORE, 15 Jan — Asian economies are expected to grow at 5.5 percent this year, down from the 7 percent growth seen in 2008, local media reported on Tuesday.

According to Channel news Asia's report, Robert Prior-Wandersforde, senior Asian economist of HSBC, said both falling demand from developed economies and domestic factors will contribute to the slowdown in Asia.

He said Tuesday at a media conference on the bank's outlook for Asia that the slide of growth will lead in economies

such as China's Hong Kong and Taiwan, South Korea and Singapore, while China and India will be the main supports of growth.

The media's report said the HSBC is taking comfort in the massively synchronized and powerful fiscal and monetary policies Asian economies are adopting, and also in falling commodity prices which are seeing the largest declines in 50 years.

The bank also expects Singapore's economy to bottom out in the first quarter and round up the year with a 2.8 percent contraction.

## Eye study shows how deadly form of malaria kills

LIVERPOOL, 15 Jan—The human eye can help doctors understand how an acute form of malaria attacks the brain, researchers said on Wednesday, opening the way to new and better treatments for one of Africa's biggest killers.

By examining the eyes of people with cerebral malaria, researchers detected tiny blood vessel blockages in the brain which they believe starve brain cells and cause the disease, which mainly affects children.

The finding means that drugs such as statins which help improve circulation could be used

in new treatments to fight cerebral malaria, the researchers said.

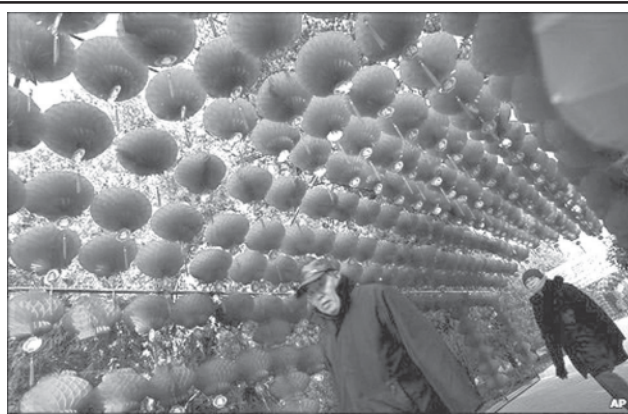
"What we are talking about is multiple small areas of blockages in the brain where the brain isn't getting enough blood and oxygen," Nick Beare of the Royal Liverpool University Hospital, who led the research, said in a telephone interview.

"We think this is critical in causing coma and death in cerebral malaria," he said. Malaria killed 881,000 people and infected 247 million worldwide in 2006, mainly in Africa, according to the World Health Organization's latest statistics. Some

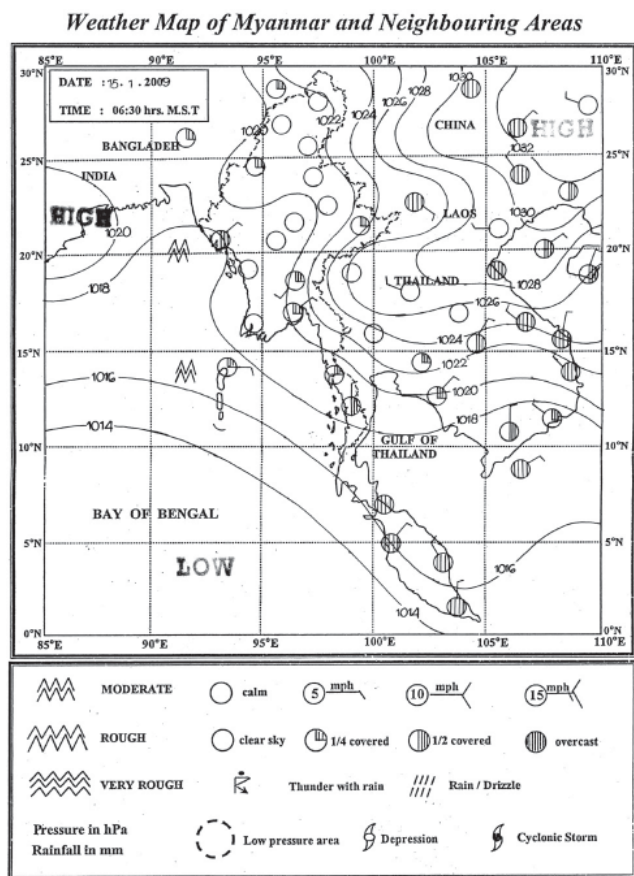
malaria experts say those numbers underestimate the problem. The disease, which is caused by a parasite transmitted by mosquitoes, has become resistant to some drugs, and work on a vaccine has been slow. One

effective treatment is Novartis AG's Coartem. The problem with these treatments is they only target the parasite and do not address problems which can lead to coma and death, Beare said.

## Too much caffeine linked to hallucinations

WASHINGTON, 15 Jan—Hearing voices when nobody is around or seeing things that aren't there? Too much caffeine could be to blame, British researchers reported on Wednesday.

Their study found that students who consumed more than the equivalent of seven cups of instant coffee a day were three times more likely to have had these kinds of hallucinations compared to people on a single daily cup.

"This is the first step toward looking at the wider factors associated with hallucinations," said Simon Jones, a psychologist at Durham University in Britain who led the study.

The findings are also the latest in mounting evidence indicating the amount of caffeine a person consumes may directly affect a person's health.

Recent studies have suggested caffeine may lower a woman's risk of


ovarian cancer while others have found too much doubles the risk of miscarriage.

Currently, people treated for hallucinations receive drugs or counselling but Jones said his research aims to explore whether changing a person's diet could help.

"This is the first time to my knowledge caffeine and hallucinations have been looked at," Jones said in a telephone interview. For the study published in

the journal Personality and Individual Differences, Jones and colleagues asked 200 students about their typical intake of coffee, tea, energy drinks and other products containing caffeine. They also measured stress. Students who consumed the most caffeine were more likely to report hallucinatory experiences such as hearing voices and seeing things that are not there, the researchers said.

## Kataik Dam and Sluice Gate contribute to prevention of floods, cultivation of monsoon and summer paddy, double crops in Thaton District

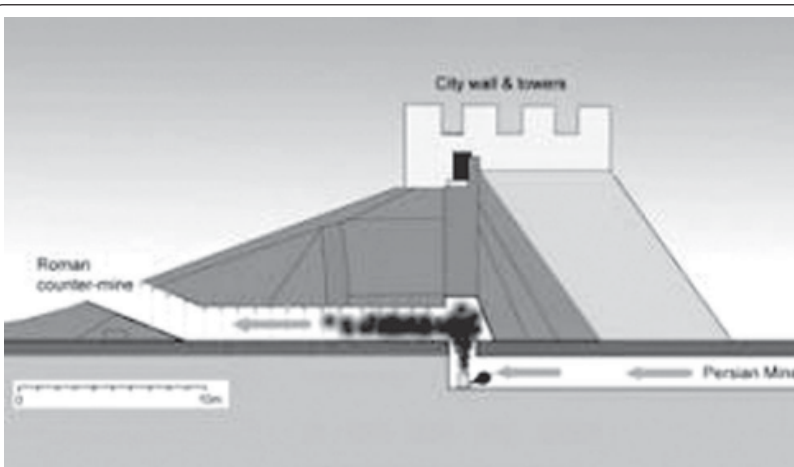

## Archaeologist uncovers evidence of ancient chemical warfare

LEICESTER, 15 Jan — A researcher from the University of Leicester has identified what looks to be the oldest archaeological evidence for chemical warfare — from Roman times.

At the meeting of the Archaeological Institute of America, University of Leicester archaeologist Simon James presented CSI-style arguments that about twenty Roman soldiers, found in a siege-mine at the city of Dura-Europos, Syria, met their deaths not as a result of sword or

spear, but through asphyxiation.

Dura-Europos on the Euphrates was conquered by the Romans who installed a large garrison. Around AD 256, the city was subjected to a ferocious siege by an army from the powerful new Sasanian Persian empire. The dramatic story is told entirely from archaeological remains; no ancient text describes it. Excavations during the 1920s-30s, renewed in recent years, have resulted in spectacular and gruesome discoveries.—Internet
