### Information Minister discusses renovation of Shwephonepwint Pagoda

YANGON, 23 Jan—Minister for Information Brig-Gen Kyaw Hsan this afternoon attended the coordination meeting for renovation of Shwephonepwint Pagoda, at the new Dhammayon of the pagoda in Pazundaung Township.

Chairman of the Pagoda Board of Trustees U Tint Lwin, technicians U Aung Myat, U San Kyi, U Moe and U Maung Gyi and party reported on inspection on condition of Seinbudaw (diamond orb), Hngetmyatnadaw (pennant-shaped vane) and Htidaw (umbrella) and arrangements for renovation, marble slabs to be substituted in the place of old ones on the platform, painting of the archway, the walls and plenary posts and construction of new shops.

The minister gave necessary instructions.

After inspecting the slabs, the minister paid homage to Buddha images at the prayer hall and left instructions on offering of gold foils to the pagoda.

Also present at the meeting were Managing Director U Soe Win of News and Periodicals Enterprise, Managing Director U Aung Myo Myint of Myanma Motion Picture Enterprise and officials.

The pagoda is being renovated for better grandeur. The pagoda, the diamond orb, the pennant-shaped vane and the umbrella are also being maintained. Moreover, the offering of gold foils at the umbrella, cleansing the gold plates at the pennant-shaped vane, offering of gold foils to Buddha images and some encircling zedis, painting of religious buildings, the archways, the walls and sanitation at drains for proper flow of water, substitution of marble slabs in the place of old ones and reconstruction of 30 new shops.

### UMFCCI, Indo-Myanmar CCI to boost bilateral trade

Hlaing, Joint-Secretary (2) U Tun Aung, CEC members and executives of the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry met a 12-member Indian delegation led by President of Indo-Myanmar Chamber of Commerce and Industries Mr GL Goenka at the head office here on 15 January.

The meeting focused on boosting bilateral trade, plan to form joint committee to deal with possible disputes between the two federations, and export of goods through CIF instead of FOB by Myanmar to India.

## Russia not agree to NATO military transit to Afghanistan

Moscow, 23 Jan—Moscow did not permit NATO and the United States to carry military supplies to Afghanistan across its territory, the *Itar-Tass news agency* reported Thursday, citing Russia's military representative to NATO.

"No official documents were submitted to Russia's permanent mission in NATO certifying that Russia had authorized the United States and NATO to transport military supplies across the country," Alexei Maslov was quoted commenting on some media reports, which cited Commander of the US Central Command Gen David Petraeus assaying that an agreement on alternative transit routes had been reached with Russia.

NATO suspended high-level contacts with Russia following the Caucasus crisis in August. In response, Russia halted cooperation with NATO's Moscow office and called off the NATO chief's visit to Moscow.

High-level political contacts between the alliance and Moscow only resumed when NATO chief Jaap de Hoop Scheffer met Russian envoy Dmitry Rogozin in Brussels on 19 Dec. —*Internet*

## US envoy in Iraq warns against hasty withdrawal

BAGHDAD, 23 Jan—A hasty departure of US troops from Iraq would carry severe risks, including bolstering al-Qaeda and threatening Iraqi progress toward a functioning society, the outgoing US ambassador said Thursday. Ambassador Ryan Crocker spoke to reporters a day after he and the top US commander in Iraq briefed President Barack Obama on the situation here.

Obama, who campaigned on a promise to end the war, asked the Pentagon to do whatever additional planning was necessary to "execute a responsible military drawdown from Iraq," the White House said Wednesday.

Crocker, who is retiring after a 30-year diplomatic career, declined to say what he and Gen Ray Odierno told the president during the video hookup. But he noted that the president was committed to a responsible pullout of the more than 140,000-strong US force.

"A precipitous withdrawal runs some very severe risks," Crocker said, including a possible revival of al-Qaeda and encouraging "neighbours with less than benign intentions" to influence events in Iraq.—*Internet*

## Aid needed for Afghan war

ISLAMABAD, 23 Jan—President Barack Obama's plan to nearly double American troop numbers in Afghanistan needs to be matched by a similar surge in development workers and aid funding, NATO's top official said Thursday.

In a sign of the tough fight there, NATO and Afghan troops earlier in the day killed up to 22 militants in airstrikes and ground battles near the Afghan border with Pakistan, officials said.

The US has some 33,000 soldiers in Afghanistan battling a resurgent Taliban, and Obama is expected to send up to 30,000 more this year as his administration shifts its focus from the war in Iraq to the Afghan conflict.

Speaking in Pakistan, NATO Secretary General Jaap de Hoop Scheffer said the new troops will take the fight to "places where it was not, or insufficiently, possible up till now."

Scheffer said other NATO allies should also boost troop levels in Afghanistan if possible, but also increase the number of civilian experts to help with reconstruction and development in a country brought to its knees by decades of war.

## A welcome decision, but late

RIYADH, 23 Jan— For Jomaa al-Dosari, Barack Obama's decision to close the prison at Guantanamo Bay is seven years too late. The Saudi national spent six years in the detention facility, never knowing the charges against him, never facing a trial and always asserting that he was not a terrorist.

"When I heard the news I said to myself, 'I wish Obama was elected years ago. Guantanamo would not have happened,'" said al-Dosari, speaking by telephone from the eastern city of Dammam where he now lives, studying computers. To many around the world, the decision Thursday by Obama to close the reviled prison within a year is welcome news. But it is especially so in countries such as Saudi Arabia, where the detention facility has become a symbol of US injustice toward Muslims and Arabs around the world. At one time, Saudis made up the second largest group of detainees there, and, according to a Saudi human rights lawyer, at least 13 Saudi families were still awaiting freedom for relatives detained at Guantanamo.—*Internet*

## NATO forces kill 22 militants in E Afghanistan

KABUL, 23 Jan—The NATO-led International Security Assistance Forces (ISAF) in an overnight fighting killed 22 militants with air support in Afghan eastern province of Khost, said an ISAF statement released here on Thursday.

ISAF forces were attacked by a large number of militants while on patrol Babrak Tana district on Wednesday night, the statement said. "The ISAF patrol fired back in response and called in attack helicopters and close-air support."

It said "upon positive identification of militants forces, the close-air support engaged the enemy. Helicopters fired multiple munitions killing the remaining insurgents from the initial attack."

After the battle, ISAF assessed the scene "confirming a total of 22 militants killed in the remote area" as it claimed that "there were no civilians in the area and no damage to structures in the vicinity."

### Gaza tunnels back in business

RAFAH, 23 Jan—After shoveling sand from their tunnel on Thursday, the smugglers hoisted the prized cargo out of the narrow shaft: bags of potato chips — a minor luxury for Gazans tired of bland UN humanitarian rations.

All around them, other smuggling crews were getting merchandise flowing again through dozens of similar tunnels only days after a cease-fire in Israel's devastating offensive in the Gaza Strip.

The tunnels linking Gaza and Egypt are back in business, despite the hundreds of tons of bombs and missiles that Israeli troops rained down on them.

The air reeked from spills of newly smuggled fuel being poured into plastic barrels as winches powered by noisy generators hauled more goods out of the wood-lined openings in the ground.

At other shafts, workers were still raising only dirt as their colleagues laboured underground to dig out cave-ins caused by the Israeli bombardment. Egyptian border guards manned watchtowers barely 100 yards away.

### Shipyard accident kills two, injures 20 in Japan

TOKYO, 23 Jan — Two people died and about 20 others sustained injuries after a 27-metre-long gangway at a shipyard in Oita, Kyushu Prefecture of Japan, collapsed Friday, local media reported.

The gangway to a ship that is under construction collapsed at around 9:30 am at the Ozai shipyard of Minaminippon Shipbuilding Co, sending workers falling to the ground or into the sea, local fire department and police officials said.

The gangway collapsed shortly after it was installed using a crane, Kyodo News quoted the officials as saying.

Some of the injured were taken to nearby hospitals, while those who sustained slight injuries were treated at a tent set up near the accident site.

According to Minaminippon Shipbuilding, the shipyard was completed in May last year as the company's third plant for manufacturing large vessels.—Internet

### Hamas dismisses reconciliation talks with Fatah

DAMASCUS, 23 Jan — A senior Hamas official has dismissed any reconciliation talks with the rival Fatah group.

His remarks on Thursday followed claims by the militants that they emerged victorious after the group survived a relentless three-week offensive by Israel on the Gaza Strip.

Sami Khater, a member of the militant group's Damascus-based branch, says Arab and international donations to reconstruct the war-devastated Gaza should go directly to Hamas and not to rival Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas, whose faction rules the West Bank.

Khater says Abbas and his Palestinian Authority cannot be trusted.

Khater says a Hamas delegation will travel to Cairo this weekend for talks with Egyptian mediators on ways to consolidate a Gaza cease-fire in place since last Sunday.—Internet

## World markets mixed as US data worse than expected

LONDON, 23 Jan—World stocks were mixed Thursday after worse-than-expected US unemployment and housing data cut off an earlier rebound that saw investors buying up beaten-down bank stocks.

An announcement by Microsoft Corp that it is cutting 5,000 jobs over the next 18 months — a sign of how badly even the biggest and richest companies are being stung by the recession — also sent US stocks down in early trading.

The Dow Jones indus-

tries fell more than 150 points. Other indexes also declined, with the technology-heavy Nasdaq composite taking the biggest hit due to Microsoft's news. The software giant also posted an 11 percent drop in profits.

In Europe, Britain's FTSE 100 benchmark index was 0.60 percent higher at 4,084.23 in European mid-afternoon trade. But Germany's DAX was down 0.67 percent at 4,232.52, and France's CAC 40 fell 0.42 percent to 2,893.51. In the morning, all three had

risen at least 2.0 percent higher.

European markets had followed Asian stocks higher as bank shares — battered this week on fears of deep losses and possible collapses — rebounded with the help of investors looking for bargains.

The earlier rally in Europe and Asia — where Japan's Nikkei 225 gained 1.9 percent to 8,051.74 and Hong Kong's Hang Seng closed up 0.6 percent at 12,657.99 — was largely due to a bounce in financial stocks.

### Russians, Cubans seek to boost ties in Moscow

MOSCOW, 23 Jan—Russian and Cuban officials met Thursday in Moscow ahead of Cuban President Raul Castro's visit later this month — part of the Kremlin's efforts to project global power and renew Cold War alliances.

Deputy Prime Minister Igor Sechin told a Russian-Cuban intergovernmental panel that relations between the two countries should "reach a new level." The panel included officials and businessmen who deal with oil, gas, nuclear energy and metals.

The Kremlin has moved to rebuild old ties with Cuba and Nicaragua — and cultivate new friends like Venezuela — to flex its muscles close to the United States.

Russia and Cuba enjoy "wonderful relations" again after a pause in the 1990s, the *ITAR-Tass* news agency quoted Raul Castro as saying in an interview. He cited then-President Vladimir Putin's visit in 2000, as well as President Dmitry Medvedev's last year, as big boosts.

Medvedev visited Brazil, Cuba, Peru and Venezuela in November, and Russia also sent a navy squadron to the Caribbean.

Russian navy ships held joint maneuvers with the Venezuelan navy and made port calls in several countries of the region, including Cuba.

## Indonesia, Malaysia, Thailand to cut rubber exports by 700,000 tons in 2009 to boost prices

JAKARTA, 23 Jan—Indonesia, Malaysia and Thailand, the world's biggest natural rubber exporters, have decided to slash rubber exports by 700,000 tons this year to raise slumping price of the commodity, a director executive of Indonesia's rubber producers association, Gapkindo Suharto Honggokusumo, said here Friday.

The director said that for the first quarter the three

countries have decided to trim the overseas sales by 270,000 tons and Indonesia got 116,000 tons reduction out of the figure.

"The reduction has started since January first," he told *Xinhua*.

Honggokusumo said that the countries under the group of the "Three Partied Rubber Council" expected there would be new balance of prices amid the decline of the global demand of rubber due to the downturn of the world

economy.

"We hope that there would be a new balance of prices that is beneficial for growers," he said.

The slowing of world industrial activity, such as automotive industry, has sapped demand of rubber which then slumped prices.

However, the director said that it has not determined yet how much the top prices were targeted by the three countries.

### Robberies in Britain up 18% in third quarter 2008

LONDON, 23 Jan — New figures released on Thursday showed that robberies in Britain involving knives or sharp instruments have increased by 18 percent in the third quarter of 2008.

According to a Home Office news release, in the same period, drug offenses grew by nine percent, and fraud and forgery reports was up 16 percent.

The statistics, based on British Crime Survey (BCS) interviews and police records, show that the number of crimes recorded by police fell by three percent during the third quarter of 2008, compared with the same period in 2007.—*Xinhua*

### Four European tourists kidnapped near Niger-Mali border

LOME, 23 Jan — Four European tourists, including two Swiss, one German and one Briton, were abducted on Thursday near Niger's border with Mali, news agencies reported.

A Mali official said the tourists were abducted at Menaka, near the Mali-Niger border, but didn't specify the abductees' nationalities, news monitored here in Togo's capital Lome said.

Initial reports said the tourists include two Swiss, one German and one Briton, but haven't been confirmed yet.—*Xinhua*

### Malaria illnesses decline in Cambodia in 2008

PHNOM PENH, 23 Jan — The number of reported malaria cases and deaths in Cambodia respectively dropped by 8.5 percent and 25 percent in 2008 over the previous year, national media on Friday quoted the National Malaria Center as saying.

The number of confirmed malaria cases decreased to 59,840 in 2008 from 54,784 in 2007, and deaths to 184 from 241, according to the center.

"The trend is downward but it is not sharp," Rashid Abdur, malaria scientist for the World Health Organization (WHO) in Cambodia, told English-Khmer language newspaper the Cambodia Daily.—*Xinhua*

### Microsoft to cut 5.5% of work force

LOS ANGELES, 23 Jan — Software giant Microsoft announced on Thursday that it would slash 5.5 percent of its jobs "in light of the further deterioration of global economic conditions."

The cut would affect 5,000 of its nearly 90,000 employees, and 1,400 layoffs would take effect on Thursday, according to the announcement.

This would be the first mass layoff in the 33-year-old tech giant's history.

Meanwhile, Microsoft said it posted revenue growth of only 2 percent, to 16.63 billion dollars, and an 11-percent drop in net income, to 4.17 billion dollars in its fiscal second quarter.

This fell short of Microsoft's previous forecasts and Wall Street's expectations.—*Xinhua*

### Nokia's profit falls 69% in Q4

STOCKHOLM, 23 Jan— The world's largest mobile phonemaker Nokia said on Thursday its profit dropped 69 percent in the fourth quarter of last year due to falling sales and lower prices for its mobile phones.

Nokia's Q4 net sales fell 19.5 percent to 12.7 billion euros (about 16.4 billion US dollars) from 15.8 billion euros (about 20.3 billion US dollars) in the same period in 2007, while the net profit was 576 million euros (about 744 million US dollars), 69 percent less than the corresponding season in 2007, the company said in the quarter report posted on its website.

The Finnish company attributed the drop in sales and profit to less demand for its mobile phone worldwide. In October-December Nokia sold 113 million mobile phones and its market share shrank to 37 percent from 40 percent in the last quarter of 2007.—*Xinhua*

## Zimbabwe gets \$4.7m cholera drugs

HARARE, 23 Jan — A consignment of cholera drugs and equipment worth nearly 4.7 million US dollars from World Vision-Canada has arrived in Zimbabwe, as the outside world intensified efforts to help stem the outbreak, *New Ziana* reported on Thursday. The consignment consists of oral re-hydration salts, aqua tablets, pediatric intravenous fluids, body bags and generators, among others. United Nations agencies said cholera has killed over 2,200 people and infected more than 40,000 in the Southern African country, where the health and sanitation systems have collapsed due to an economic crisis.

Speaking soon after delivery of the goods at Harare International Airport on Wednesday, World Vision cholera manager Wilfred Sikukula said the drugs and equip-

ment would benefit at least two million people over a period of three months in 29 districts across the country.

He said the target population were children who are the most vulnerable. "It could not have been done this quickly without the help of the Canadian International Development Agency in partnership with World Vision—Canada. We really want to appreciate the work being done by our partners in assisting to combat the outbreak in Zimbabwe," Sikukula said.

Meanwhile, a fresh cholera outbreak has hit the mining town of Mashava in Masvingo Province amid reports that the disease had claimed nine more lives in the province over the past seven days, bringing the provincial death toll to 110 since the outbreak began in August.—*Internet*

## Libya oil nationalization unlikely

CAIRO, 23 Jan — Call it, if you will, classic Moammar Gadhafi.

The Libyan leader's mention of the possibility of nationalizing the oil sector in response to current low oil prices is merely his unique way of calling attention to the difficulties producers face because of the global economic meltdown, some analysts say.

The comments — during a televised address he

gave on Wednesday to students at Georgetown University in Washington — are also unlikely to deter oil companies from pursuing new opportunities in Libya, which is rapidly beginning to flex its muscles after decades long US sanctions were lifted in 2004.

"Gadhafi never expresses his thoughts in a conventional manner," Saad Djebbar, a Libya

expert and deputy director of the North African Institute at Britain's Cambridge University, said Thursday. "I believe that what he meant was ... to warn of the effect of low oil prices on countries which depend almost entirely on oil revenues."

Companies are unlikely to seriously step back from investing in the country, despite his comments.—*Internet*

## Toyota mulls cutting 1,000 full-time jobs

TOKYO, 23 Jan — Toyota Motor Corp is considering cutting more than 1,000 full-time jobs in North America and the United Kingdom to cope with faltering global demand, a news report said on Friday.

The details of the job cuts will likely be finalized by the end of the month, said the *Nikkei*, Japan's top business daily, citing an unnamed senior

company official. Japan's top automaker could slash more jobs in other regions if global auto sales continue to slump, the daily said.

Toyota spokesman Yuta Kaga declined to confirm the report, saying nothing had been decided.

Hit by the collapse in demand for cars, Toyota is expecting to incur its first operating loss in 70

years. The company on Tuesday tapped Akio Toyoda, grandson of the Japanese automaker's founder, as president, paying homage to its roots amid a deepening global downturn.

The US-educated Toyoda, 52, is the first founding family member to take the helm at the Japanese auto giant in 14 years.

The blonde dog, which is 1.2 m long and 1 m tall, has become a "police dog" and works with traffic officer Chen Guangyan.

The dog arrived at the office when Chen starts his workday and leaves when the officer clocks out. The dog also seems to understand traffic as it always stops when the light turns red and continues to walk when it's green.

## Lottery numbers drawn twice in row

The winning numbers of Pick 3 were the same as the ones from the night before in Omaha, said a Nebraska Lottery official in US.

According to the official, one of two lottery computers that randomly generate combinations picked the numbers 1, 9 and 6 for Monday night's drawing. He said the other computer picked the same three numbers in the same order Tuesday in the same sequence.

The odd of such an occurrence could be the oddest of all, probably, one in a million times, hardened lottery players said.

# Cold season crops thriving on bank of Laymyo River in MraukU Township

Our media team recently observed the cold season crops plantations on the bank of the Laymyo River in Myetyeikyun Village-tract in MraukU Township.

When we passed by Phayaoak Village

pleased to view thriving groundnut plants that were as high as two to three feet because on average, a groundnut is not higher than one and a half feet. Moreover, corn plants were as high as about 10 feet. And the plantations of such crops as chilly,

over 100 baskets. Last year, Daw Win Sein of Nankya Village-tract gained 217 baskets of groundnut an acre. So, Chairman of Rakhine State Peace and Development Council Commander Maj-Gen Thaung Aye awarded her at the Rakhine State level ceremony to mark successful completion of the ploughing of all targeted monsoon paddy fields and transplant paddy at Kandawgyi farm in Sittway.”

In an interview, farmer Ko Aung said, “I have five mouths to feed including my parents. I grow several cold season crops on a land of six acres. I sell 1000 ears of corn for 65,000 kyats, and 120 baskets of chillies for 24,000 kyats. I harvest chilli once a month. And I harvest corn whenever I receive an order. Customers come here to buy crops. On average, I earn about 600,000 kyats from the farm a month.”

He said that when

beyond MraukU, we saw thriving patches of black gram, cabbage and oil mustard in the harvested paddy fields. After the paddy harvest, black gram plants among the paddy plants grew faster, which was heartening.

The alluvial land on the bank of the Laymyo River on the other bank of Myetyeik Island is five miles long and about one mile wide. About 500 acres of the land were put under cold season crops, so the whole alluvial land is now colonized by crop plantations.

Just as we got to the bank, we were very

cucumber, musk melon, pumpkin, red water cress, white water cress, bitter gourd, carrot, summer bean, gourd, long bean egg plant and tomato were found thriving.

Manager U Naing Min Hlaing of MraukU Township Myanma Agriculture Service told the Myanma Alin Daily, “In our township, the Laymyo River flows through Hnitshei, Myaungbwe and Pyilongyi village-tracts. It is a freshwater river; therefore, many people grow crops and live along the bank. All the crops we grow are thriving. On average, an acre of groundnut yields

the river raged in the rainy season, his family moved to Myetyeik Island and grew monsoon paddy; that he earned net income of about four million kyats a year from monsoon paddy and cold season crops.

On schooldays, local children went to school by boat. He served us musk melon, which was cool and delicious. So, it is sure that the soil of the region is fertile.

In MraukU Township this year, 15,183 acres are put under

cold season crops; 2900 acres, under groundnut; 11,361 acres, under oil mustard; 599 acres, under sunflower; 225 acres, under summer sesame; and 90 acres, under niger.

In the township, 136,800 acres of monsoon paddy yielded 10,405,008 baskets or 76.06 baskets an acre. Now, it grows 1600 acres of summer paddy plus cold season crops, edible oil crops and beans and pulses in other fields.

On the alluvial land of Myetyeik Island, 90 farmers of 11 villages grow 500 acres of cold season crops and edible oil crops.

Some sections of 3.5-mile road linking Myetyeik and Po Phyu islands with MraukU are not serviceable. Secretary U Kyaw Hlaing of Township PDC said that the road would be repaired soon under the programme for regional development.

In Phayaoak Village farmers grow various crops, and they use leg pumps to get irrigation water. They sell a cauliflower for 150 kyats, and a cabbage, for 100 kyats. We learnt a salient point that in Rakhine State, underground freshwater can be obtained at any site from a depth of 70 feet at maximum.

M r a u k U Township has an area of 490.97 square miles and is constituted with six wards and 251 villages of 222,040 people. In the township, rice supply exceeds the demand by 264.54 per cent. Local people are now planning to take part in the fruit and flower contest to be held to mark the 62nd Union Day by Rakhine State PDC.

National companies have been running oil palm farms to help achieve the goal "Taninthayi Division must become another edible oil bowl of the nation" for ensuring edible oil supply of the nation. As a result of the prudent drive, Kawthoung District has seen a good number of oil palm farms.

The government has launched oil palm farming in Taninthayi Division since 1999. Now, oil palms are well in fruit there. Being convinced of the lucrative business, national companies are now growing oil palms on a wider scale year by year. In addition, they are building oil mills.

Benefits of farming oil palm are many. Nothing of the whole oil

grown over 720 acres of oil palm. We started oil palm farming in 2005-2006, so the palms are not

Myay Yadana have run oil palm farming in Kawthoung, Khamaukkyi, Karathuri, Bokpyin and Pyigy Mandaing townships in Kawthoung District since March 1999. The total acreage of oil palm farms is 117,866. Of them, about 10,000 acres have started to yield fruit, and they were grown in 1999-2000. Oil palms yield fruit well when they are at the age of

is at the age of 15 years. Trunks of 30-year-old oil palms can be used to make furniture. From April 2005 to October 2008, the mill produced 55,839 tons of crude palm oil, and 5284 tons of palm kernel oil.

Project Manager U Win Myint of Dagon Oil Palm Project of Dagon Timber Ltd, 52 miles from Kawthoung, said, "Our company has run oil palm farming in the area between mile post No. 50 and 59 on Kawthoung-Bokpyin Road since 1999. So far, we have put 11,378 acres under oil palm. Now, the farms yield 15 to 20 tons of fruit a day. In the rainy season, they yielded about 30 tons of fruits a day. We sold all the fruit to Yuzana Co. We have a plan to grow 1000 more acres of oil palm this year. We have a target of 20,000 acres of oil palm here.

"We import oil palm seeds from Costa Rica. Chana, Ekona and Lame are high-yield oil palm strains. We also

have a plan to establish a 50-ton crude palm oil mill at the 52nd mile camp on Kawthoung-Bokpyin Road, and we hope to complete construction of the mill by 2009-2010.

Now, 17 companies have put 185,025 acres under oil palm in Kawthoung District, which is helping Taninthayi Division to achieve the target of 500,000 acres of oil palm laid down by the government.

local market. We expect to distribute more palm oil when our farms have a high yield."

We observed the production line in the modern mill operating with just a small workforce. It produces both crude and finished palm oil. Stalks of oil palm fruit bundles can be used as fuel. Byproduct is used to produce potassium fertilizer. Fruit seeds are used to produce palm kernel oil. Byproduct of fruit seeds can be used as feedstuff.

The yield of oil palm starts to fall when it

palm is useless. Palm oil, palm kernel oil, fertilizer, fuel and feedstuff are some palm oil products.

Manager U Nu of Golden Oil Palm Co, 18 miles from Kawthoung, told the Myanma Alin Daily, "We run oil palm farms, and we have got a palm oil mill in Kawthoung. It can mill five tons of oil palm fruit an hour. We are growing oil palm extensively year by year. Up to 2007-2008, our company had

in fruit yet. We have to buy oil palm fruits from other companies to produce palm oil. We have a target of milling own oil palm fruits in the near future, so we are planning to grow oil palm on a wider scale."

In an interview, Project Manager U An Ban of Yuzana Oil Palm Co on Kawthoung-Bokpyin Road said, "Our company's three branches: Yuzana, Annawah Tun, and Shwe

## Samsung suffers first-ever quarterly loss amid global recession

SEOUL, 23 Jan—Samsung Electronics Co, the world's largest maker of computer memory chips, announced Friday it lost 20 billion won (14.7 million US dollars) in the fourth quarter of 2008, posting its first-ever quarterly loss.

During the same period in 2007 the company earned a profit of 2.21 trillion won (1.63 billion US dollars), according to Samsung Electronics.

The company said its fourth-quarter operating loss was at 94 billion won (69.1 million US dollars), compared with a profit of 2.8 trillion won (2.06 billion US dollars) in the previous year.

Sales also dropped to 18.45 trillion won (13.6 billion US dollars) from 20 trillion won (14.7 million US dollars) a year ago, it added. Samsung has been hurt by sinking demand for semiconductors, mobile phones and other consumer electronics as worldwide demand for these products plunged amid the ongoing global economic recession.—*Internet*

## Macao logs over 30 mln visitor arrivals in 2008

MACAO, 23 Jan—Macao saw its visitor arrivals for the whole of 2008 rose 11.8 percent year-on-year to over 30 million, according to the statistics released on Friday by the city's Statistics and Census Service (DSEC).

The figures showed that among the total visitor arrivals in 2008, visitors from the Chinese mainland (17.5 million) and Southeast

Asia increased by 17.7 percent and 33.3 percent respectively over the previous year, and those from Hong Kong went up slightly by 0.7 percent. Same-day visitors shared 52.8 percent of the total arrivals, at 15.9 million.

Analyzed by mode of transport, visitor arrivals by land took up the majority of the total, rising by 13.7 to 18.8 million. Meanwhile, visitors by sea and air increased by 7.9 percent and 15.2 percent respectively over 2007 to 9.69 million and 1.7 million.

## Australian passenger plane makes emergency landing in Queensland

CANBERRA, 23 Jan—A plane carrying 21 passengers made an emergency landing in north-west Queensland, a Queensland Police Service spokeswoman said on Friday.

She said in Brisbane that emergency services had rushed to Cloncurry airport in the afternoon when a MacAir plane experienced engine problems minutes before landing.

The flight from Townsville to Mount Isa was scheduled to stop at Cloncurry when police received an emergency call at about 5.15 pm AEST (Australian Eastern Standard Time), according to a report by Australian Associated Press.

It said the 42 seat plane landed a few minutes later. A Queensland Ambulance spokesman said no one was injured during the incident.—*Internet*

## Two killed, over 100 injured in train collision in Indonesia

JAKARTA, 23 Jan—Two people were killed and over 100 others wounded after a passenger train and a cargo train collided in East Java province on Friday, Metro television reported.

Dozens of people were still trapped under the damaged passenger train, the report said. The collision occurred in Bonjonegoro station.—*Internet*

## Five stabbed to death at Belgian day care centre

BRUSSELS, 23 Jan—Five people, including three children, were reportedly stabbed to death on Friday at a day care center in Dendermonde in northwest Belgium, Flemish broadcaster VRT reported.

The assailant has been arrested by police, the report said. There are no official information available on deaths or injuries in the incident.

The municipality of Dendermonde has put into effect its disaster plan. Ambulances are speeding to and from the creche, and police are carrying out a massive operation.—*Internet*

## Moderate earthquake rocks Bashi Channel

HONGKONG, 23 Jan—A moderate earthquake measuring 5.6 on the Richter scale rocked the Bashi Channel at 1240 GMT Friday, the Hong Kong Observatory said in a news bulletin here Friday night.

The epicenter was initially determined by the Hong Kong Observatory to be at 21.2 degrees north latitude and 121.4 degrees east longitude, about 180 kilometers south of Taitung, China's Taiwan.—*Internet*

## Singapore private home prices drop 6.1% in Q4, 2008

SINGAPORE, 23 Jan—Singapore's private residential prices decreased by 6.1 percent in the fourth quarter of 2008, after a decline of 2.4 percent in the previous quarter, the country's Urban Redevelopment Authority (URA) said on Friday.

For the whole year of 2008, overall prices of private residential properties fell by 4.7 percent, compared with an increase of 31.2 percent in 2007.

The latest figure for the fourth quarter showed

that private residential prices fell further than the previous estimate of a 5.7 percent drop announced by the URA on 2 Jan.

In the fourth quarter of 2008, there were 64,982 private residential units in the pipeline, comprising supply from projects that were already under construction and those that had been granted planning approval but were not under construction yet.

Prices of office, shop and industrial properties decreased by 4.9 percent,

4.8 percent and 6.5 percent respectively in the fourth quarter.—*Internet*

**Liberia signs

MONROVIA, 23 Jan—Liberia signed Thursday a 2.6 billion dollar agreement with Chinese conglomerate China Union to develop its main iron ore mine, the biggest ever investment in the West African nation.

A government statement said President Ellen Johnson Sirleaf signed a mineral development agreement with officials from the Chinese mining company to develop the Bong Mines.

Sirleaf invited other Chinese companies to come and invest in the country, which emerged from a crippling 14-year civil war in 2003.

"The Liberian leader expressed the hope that the signing of the agreement will serve as a motivation to other Chinese companies to invest in Liberia," the statement said.

The deal has been sent to the parliament for ratification.

**Men employ maths for subway riding record**

NEW YORK, 23 Jan—A pair of New Yorkers said maths is on their side in their attempt to break the Guinness World Record for visiting the city's subway stations. Chris Solarz, 28, and Matt Ferrisi, 30, began their trek on Thursday at the Far Rockaway-Mott Avenue station in the city's Queens borough, WABC-TV, New York, reported on Thursday.

The two men said their calculations indicate that they can break the record by visiting all of New York's 468 subway stations in less than 24 hours, 45 minutes, and 3 seconds.—Internet

**Smoking linked to most male cancer deaths**

DAVIS, 23 Jan—Smoking was linked to more than 70 percent of the cancer death burden among Massachusetts men in 2003, researchers said.

Lead author Bruce Leistikow, an associate adjunct professor of public health sciences at the University of California at Davis, used National Center for Health Statistics data to compare death rates from lung cancer to

death rates from all other cancers among Massachusetts males.

The assessment, published in BMC Cancer, revealed that the two rates changed in tandem year-by-year from 1979 to 2003, with the strongest association among males ages 30 to 74 years. "This study provides support for the growing understanding among researchers that smoking is

a cause of many more cancer deaths besides lung cancer," Leistikow said in a statement. "The full impacts of tobacco smoke, including secondhand smoke, have been overlooked in the rush to examine such potential cancer factors as diet and environmental contaminants. As it turns out, much of the answer was probably smoking all along."—Internet

**Dollar falls against most major currencies**

NEW YORK, 23 Jan—The dollar fell against most major currencies on Thursday as Wall Street tumbled amid weak economic data. US privately owned housing starts in December were at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 550,000, 15.5 percent below the revised November estimate, the US Commerce Department reported on Thursday.

For all 2008, housing starts plunged by 33.3 percent to 904,300 units. It was the biggest decline since 1974. An estimated 1,116,600 housing units

were completed in 2008, 25.7 percent below the 2007 figure.

First time applications for state unemployment insurance benefits rose by 62,000 to a seasonally adjusted 589,000 last week, the Labour Department said. It was the highest level of initial claims in 26 years. The weak economic reports sent Wall Street down. Stocks were also hurt by software giant Microsoft, which said it would cut 5,000 jobs in 18 months. The dollar fell against the euro and the yen in New York trading.

It rose against the pound as the British currency was under heavy pressure from worries over UK banking system.

The euro bought 1.3021 dollars in late New York trading compared with 1.2954 dollars it bought late Wednesday. The pound fell to 1.3876 dollars from 1.3922 dollars. The dollar fell to 1.2532 Canadian dollars from 1.2613 Canadian dollars, and fell to 1.1541 Swiss francs from 1.1574 Swiss francs. It fell to 89.09 Japanese yen from 89.43 Japanese yen.—Internet

**Missing girl found safe in France**

LILLE, 23 Jan—Missing 15-year-old schoolgirl Laura Stainforth has been found safe and well in France a week after disappearing. The teenager, from Cleethorpes, Lincolnshire, was found with 49-year-old Robert Williams in Lille.

Mr Williams was ar-

rested by French police officers after the pair attended the British consulate in Lille. He has been taken into custody. He is expected to appear before a court in Douai on Thursday which could determine his extradition.

Laura's mother Debra read a tearful statement to the media, thanking them and the police for their support. Mrs Stainforth said: "I am pleased to inform everybody that my daughter, Laura Stainforth, is safe and well.

"I am grateful for all the support from the papers and all the publicity that has brought Laura back home to us. "We are

grateful for all the support my family and myself have been given from the police. Thank you."

Laura went missing last on 14 January after telling her parents she was going shopping. She is believed to have met Mr Williams on an Internet chat room. Officers from Humber-side Police are currently en-route to France to bring her back to the UK.

Durham Police said earlier that Mr Williams was currently on bail after being questioned over the alleged rape of a 16-year-old from West Sussex. He was arrested over the matter in Darlington in December.

## Apple juice may delay Alzheimer's disease

LOWELL, 23 Jan — Drinking apple juice helped mice perform better in maze trials and prevented the decline in performance otherwise seen in aging, US researchers said.

The research team of Thomas B Shea of the University of Massachusetts, Lowell, carried out a number of laboratory studies demonstrating that drinking apple juice helped mice perform better than normal in maze trials and prevented the decline in performance that was otherwise observed as the mice aged.

The study, published in the *Journal of Alzheimer's Disease*, demonstrated that mice receiving the human equivalent of two glasses of apple juice per day for one month produced less of a small protein fragment called beta-amyloid that is responsible for forming the "senile plaques" commonly found in brains of people suffering from Alzheimer's disease.

The whales beached themselves on Perkins Island in northwestern Tasmania, in a place reachable only by boat. Parks and Wildlife arranged helicopter flyovers to look for signs of life.

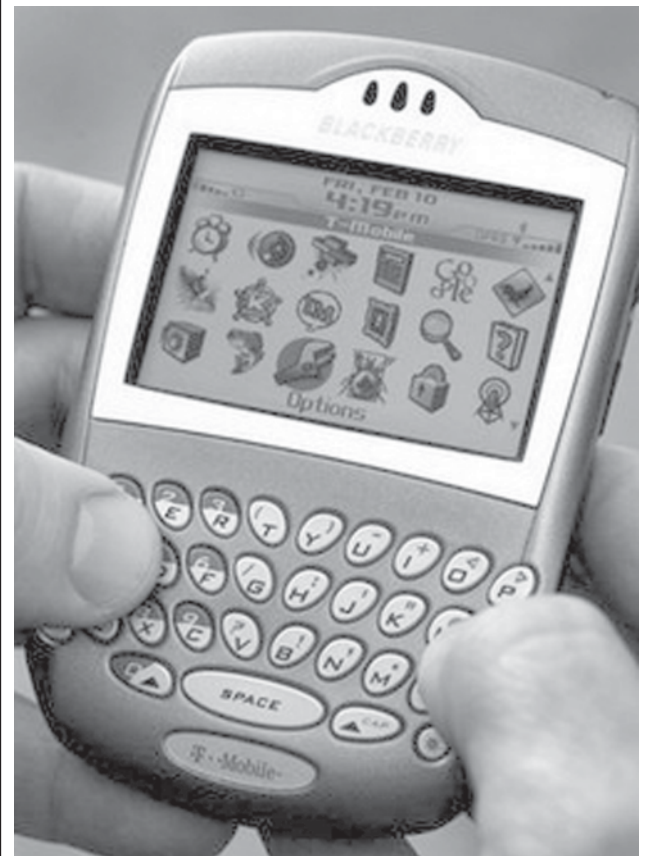
"What the crews can do is try and give the animals the best chance we can," Arthur said. "We've got gale force

winds forecast and the weather doesn't look as if it's going to be kind. It could hamper operations in that it could make navigating in the sand flats where these animals are very difficult."

A boat and rescue equipment was being sent from Hobart, the Tasmanian capital.

There were two large whale strandings in Tasmania in November — one of 55 pilot whales in Stanley near Perkins Island, and another of 155 whales on Sandy Cape on the west coast.

## Zambia doctors to cut feet of unformed twin from baby's buttocks

LUSAKA, 23 Jan — The amazing story of a little girl in Zambia with the feet of an unformed twin protruding from her buttocks has gained worldwide attention. Eight-month-old Faith Mwampe is set to undergo a potentially lifesaving operation to have the horrific deformity removed while her 18-year-old mother, Mercy Lenganji, waits anxiously, the UK's *Daily Telegraph* reports.

But this picture of Faith's bizarre condition, provided by Barcroft Media, reveal the true horror that became apparent when Faith was delivered.

Zambian doctors allegedly labelled her condition as so shocking they hid her from her mother for two hours after birth for fear she would go into shock.

"They put Faith in an incubator as is the procedure with all babies born with deformities in Zambia, and only then was I allowed to see my child," Mercy said, adding that she loved her baby unconditionally.—Internet

## US company develops plastic solar cells

CHICAGO, 23 Jan — A US company is developing plastic solar cells for portable electronic devices that will incorporate technology invented at the University of Chicago, the university said on Thursday.

The company is on track to complete a commercial-grade prototype later this year, said Dina Lozofsky, vice president of IP development and strategic alliances at Solarmer.

The prototype, a cell measuring eight square inches (50 square

centimeters), is expected to achieve 8 percent efficiency and to have a lifetime of at least three years, according to a press release issued by the University of Chicago.

New materials with higher efficiencies are the key in the industry, it said. Plastic solar cells are behind traditional solar-cell technology in terms of the efficiency that it can produce right now.

The invention, a new semiconductor material called PTB1, converts sunlight into electricity. The active layer of PTB1

is a mere 100 nanometers thick, the width of approximately 1,000 atoms. Synthesizing even small amounts of the material is a time-consuming, multi-step process.

The university licensed the patent rights to the technology to Solarmer last September.

An advantage of the Chicago technology is its simplicity. Solarmer has entered into a sponsored research agreement with the university to provide additional support for further research.

Cilic will now meet dangerous Argentine eighth seed Juan Martin del Potro who came from a set down to beat Luxembourg's Gilles Muller 6-7 (5/7), 7-5, 6-3, 7-5.—INTERNET

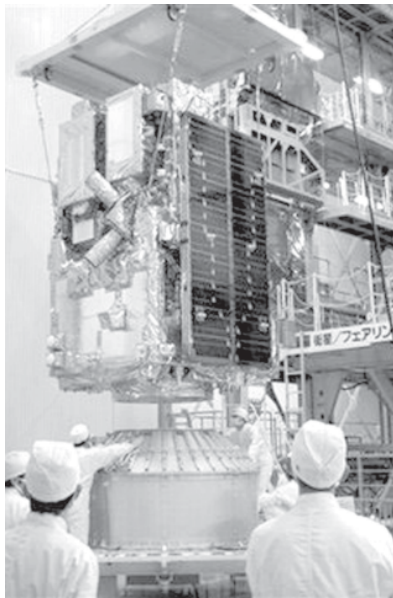

### Bird flu patient out of danger in N China

TAIYUAN, 23 Jan—Health chiefs in north China said Friday a 2-year-old girl who was critically ill with bird flu was out of danger after her vital signs remained stable for six consecutive days. The health department of Shanxi Province said the girl surnamed Peng was still receiving treatment at the No 4 People's Hospital in the provincial capital of Taiyuan. The 67 people who had close contact with her had shown no signs of being affected, including 51 who had been discharged from medical observation, the department added. Peng fell ill on 7 Jan in central Hunan Province. She was taken to Shanxi by her grandparents on 11 Jan and was confirmed to be infected with avian influenza on 17 Jan. Three people have died of bird flu and another has been infected in China so far this year. The first death was a 19-year-old woman in Beijing on 5 Jan, followed by a 27-year-old woman in Shandong on 17 Jan and a 16-year-old boy in Hunan on 20 Jan. The death rate for bird flu patients is above 60 percent.—Internet

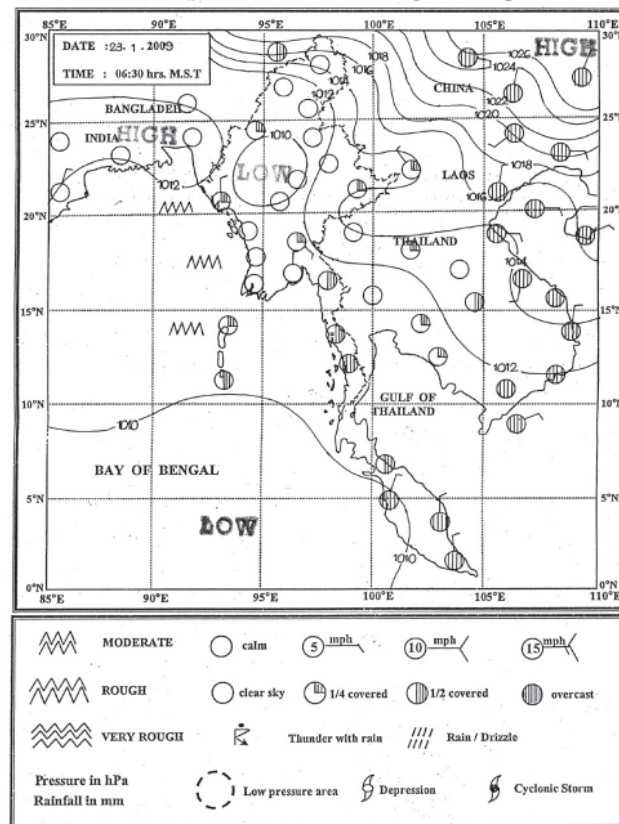

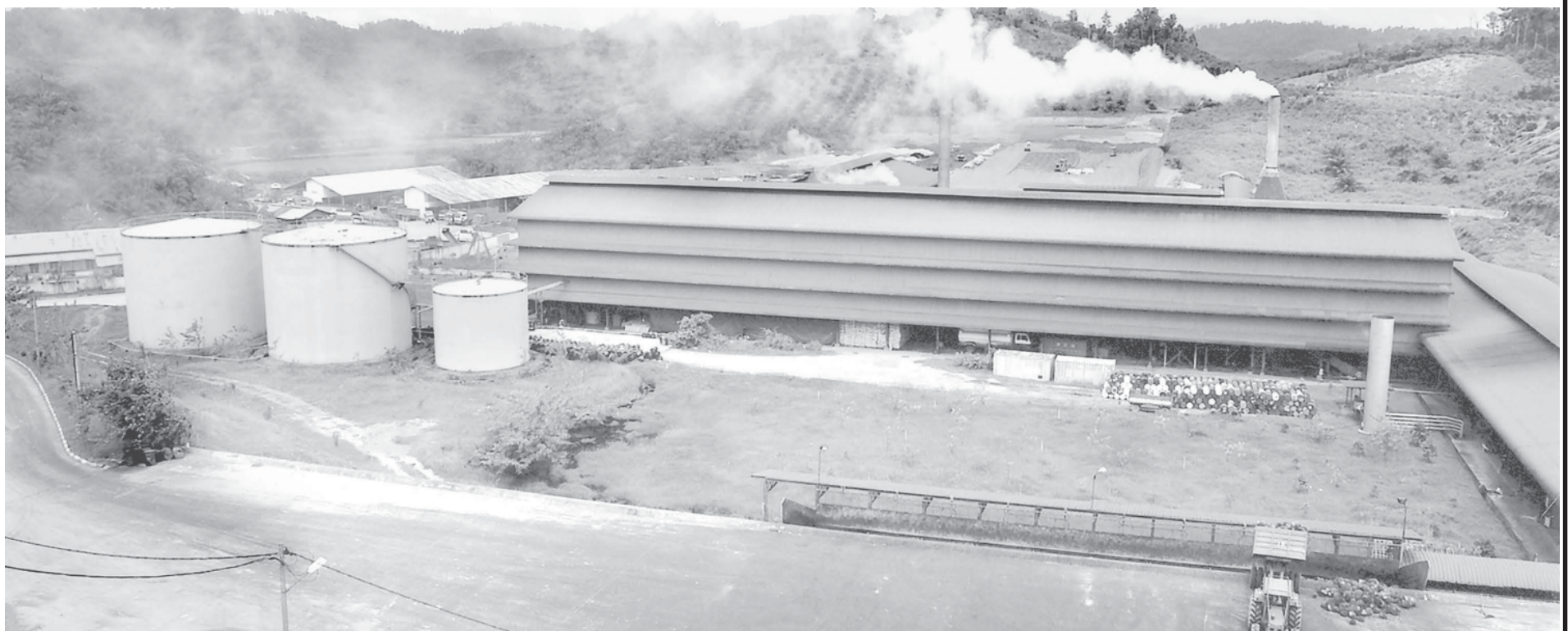

Barry was part of the Villa side which suf-

fered a shock 3-0 defeat just over three years ago at Doncaster Rovers' former Belle Vue headquarters in a Carling Cup encounter.

But he has vowed to avoid a repeat of what he describes as one of the
