### Boost production of freshwater and sea fish and prawn

Today, deep-sea fishing has become dominant in supply of food for world people. Now, the world is not able to boost production of marine products, so it pays more attention to breeding of freshwater and sea fish and prawn on an extensive scale.

In Asia, herbivorous fish species such as carp and Hamilton's carp; carnivorous fish species such as sea perch, river catfish and catfish, omnivorous fish species such as Tilapia, yellow Hamilton's carp and Ngakhounma (*Barbus spp*), and freshwater and sea prawn, crab and mussels are widely bred.

With an area of over 200,000 acres of fish farms, Myanmar is trying to boost production of fish through advanced methods and export the surplus. In farming fish, emphasis is to be put on keeping fish ponds clean, quality control of feedstuff, and production of pedigree fish species.

In raising prawns, shrimps should be fast-growing species ones without diseases from the sea and freshwater lakes.

Myanmar has bred freshwater prawns for ages. Now, it also breeds tiger prawn and Vannamei. Freshwater prawns are in high demand at home and abroad. Last year, the nation exported over 20,000 tons of freshwater and sea prawns, and over 10,000 tons of crabs.

Freshwater prawns have ready markets and are in demand. So, national entrepreneurs should choose pedigree species of fish and prawns, use and relay advanced livestock methods, and participate in projects for extensive breeding of prawns for greater progress of the nation's fish and prawn breeding industry.

# Iraqi prime minister expects faster US pullout

BAGHDAD, 27 Jan—Iraq's prime minister said Monday he believes the US will withdraw its troops more quickly than the three-year timeline set down in a US-Iraq security agreement. The US, meanwhile, suffered its biggest single loss of life in months when two helicopters crashed, killing four service members.

An agreement negotiated under former President George W Bush's administration called for US combat troops to withdraw from Baghdad and other cities by the end of June, with all American forces out of the country by the end of 2011.

President Barack Obama cam-

paigned on a promise to remove all combat troops within 16 months and has asked the Pentagon to plan for "a responsible military drawdown from Iraq."

With planning under way, Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki told a political rally south of Baghdad that he believes the end of the US mission "will be brought forward" and that Iraq must bolster its own forces to meet the challenge after the Americans leave.

The Shiite-led government pushed for a faster US pullout during last year's negotiations on the security agreement, overcoming longtime Bush administration opposition to a fixed withdrawal schedule.—Internet

## Gunshots fired near US Embassy

SAN'A, 27 Jan—Gunmen in a car exchanged fire Monday with police at a checkpoint near the US Embassy in Yemen's capital, hours after the embassy received threats of a possible attack, Yemeni and American officials said.

No one was injured and the two gunmen fled the scene, said a Yemen Interior Ministry official, who spoke on condition of anonymity because he is not permitted to have his name made public. He said three suspects in the area were detained.

It was not clear who was behind the shooting, but al-Qaeda has for years maintained a strong presence in the country, the ancestral homeland terror network founder Osama bin Laden.

In recent years, Yemen has cooperated with the US in fighting terrorism, but its government has struggled to confront Islamic extremists in parts of the impoverished country in the southwestern corner of the Arabian Peninsula.

Yemen has also been the site of numerous high-profile, al-Qaeda-linked attacks, including the 2000 bombing of the USS Cole in the Gulf of Aden, which killed 17 American sailors.—Internet

## Four US soldiers killed in two aircraft crash in Iraq

BAGHDAD, 27 Jan—Two US aircraft crashed in northern Iraq early on Monday, killing four soldiers, the US military said.

"Four coalition forces members were killed when two aircraft went down in northern Iraq at approximately 2:15 am (2315 GMT Sunday)," a military statement said. The cause of the incident is unknown and is under investigation, the statement said, adding that the incident "does not appear to be by enemy action."

The names of the deceased are being withheld pending notification of next of kin, it said.—Internet

## Israeli soldier killed along Gaza border

JERUSALEM, 27 Jan—An Israeli soldier was killed and another seriously wounded in an attack at the border with the Gaza Strip, an Israeli source said Tuesday morning.

The source said the incident happened when anti-tank missiles were fired at Israel Defence Forces (IDF) soldiers near the Kissufim border cross-

ing into the middle part of the Hamas-ruled enclave.

An IDF spokesman told *Xinhua* that he could not confirm the report, but an investigation is underway.

If confirmed, it would be the first death on the Israeli side since the Jewish state and the Islamist group staged their ceasefire on 18 Jan following Israel's three-week massive offensive on Gaza that killed over 1,400 Palestinians.—Internet

## Senior Iraqi official escapes roadside bomb attack

BAGHDAD, 27 Jan—Police and hospital officials say a senior Iraqi official has escaped a roadside bomb attack but three of his guards were wounded.

The officials say Tuesday's blast struck the convoy carrying the director-general of the customs agency in central Baghdad. They say police Maj Gen Ahmed al-Attiyah was on his way to work and wasn't harmed. The officials spoke on condition of anonymity because they weren't authorized to release the information.

Nobody has claimed responsibility for the attack, but it comes as tensions are high ahead of Saturday's provincial elections.—Internet

## US military deaths in Iraq war at 4,236

WASHINGTON, 27 Jan—As of Monday, 26 Jan, 2009, at least 4,236 members of the US military had died in the Iraq war since it began in March 2003.

The figure includes eight military civilians killed in action. At least 3,406 military personnel died as a result of hostile action, according to the military's numbers. The British military has reported 178 deaths; Italy, 33; Ukraine, 18; Poland, 21; Bulgaria, 13; Spain, 11; Denmark, seven; El Salvador, five; Slovakia, four; Latvia and Georgia, three each; Estonia, Netherlands, Thailand and Romania, two each; and Australia, Hungary, Kazakhstan and South Korea, one death each.—Internet

## If no Palestine, Israel sees 'catastrophe'

NEW YORK, 27 Jan—Former President Jimmy Carter said Monday that Israel will face a "catastrophe" unless it revives the Mideast peace process and establishes an independent Palestinian state.

In an interview with *The Associated Press*, he said Arabs will outnumber Jews in the Holy Land in the foreseeable future.

"If we look toward a one-state solution, which seems to be the trend — I hope not inexorable — it would be a catastrophe for Israel, because there would be only three options in that case," Carter said.

One would be to expel large numbers of Palestinians, which he said would amount to "ethnic cleansing." The second would be to deprive the Palestinians of equal voting rights, which he said would amount to "apartheid."—Internet

**ECLA urges effective fiscal policy to stabilize Latin American economy**

SANTIAGO, 27 Jan — The Economic Commission for Latin America (ECLA) of the United Nations on Monday called for more effective fiscal policies to stabilize the economic situation in the region.

The on-going global economic crisis “will decelerate economic growth of the region and possibly develop into a fiscal crisis in Latin American and the Caribbean,” ECLA executive secretary Alicia Barcena said.

Dropping prices for raw material could lead to the loss of 7 to 8 percentage points of the gross domestic product (GDP) between 2007 and 2009 for some countries in this region, Barcena said in a seminar in Santiago on regional fiscal policy.

Barcena said that international financial institutions must work out better mechanisms to support the emerging countries amid the crisis.

She suggested a series of measures to boost development, including efforts to cut consumption taxes, promote private investment and to ensure incomes for the most vulnerable groups.

**Raul Castro to visit Russia**

MOSCOW, 27 Jan— Cuban leader Raul Castro will pay a visit to Moscow from 28 Jan to 4 Feb, the Kremlin said on Monday.

Russian Deputy Prime Minister Igor Sechin said Castro's visit was a “historical” one as both Russia and Cuba had changed a lot over the years.

Russian President Dmitry Medvedev visited Cuba last November where he met with Raul Castro and his brother Fidel Castro and pledged to further political and economic ties with the traditional partner in the Caribbean Sea.—Xinhua

**Powerful bombs rock Rajbiraj in eastern Nepal**

KATHMANDU, 27 Jan— Three powerful bombs went off in a series at Rajbiraj, the headquarters of Saptari district in eastern Nepal on Monday evening, local media reported on Tuesday. According to eKantipur.com, a bomb, the first one in the series, went off at around 6:25 pm (1240 GMT). After three minutes of the first blast, another explosion occurred at an elec-

trical shop and subsequently the third blast rocked at the backyard of the district, some 190 km east of Kathmandu.

One girl, 12, who was injured after being hit by splinters of the blast at the electrical shop, has been undergoing treatment at a local hospital, the Siraha District Police Office informed.

Police estimated that property worth 400,000

**World's environment ministers to meet in Kenya**

NAIROBI, 27 Jan — More than 1,000 environment ministers from across the world are set to meet in Kenya next month for the UN Environment Programme (UNEP)'s Governing Council meeting.

A statement from the Nairobi-based UN environment agency said the 16-20 Feb meeting will also discuss climate change and the ongoing

talks towards a new international agreement in Copenhagen in December 2009.

Issues on the table include the green economy and green growth and mercury, among other. The ministers will discuss policy options for an international response to

global mercury pollution and the food crisis.

The ministers will also discuss Olympic Games and the environment, and an overview of the key environmental issues of the day including ecosystem management, resource efficiency and environmental governance.—Xinhua

**Chinese Premier's Europe tour underscores China's confidence**

BEIJING, 27 Jan— Chinese Premier Wen Jiabao's Europe tour will showcase the country's confidence in maintaining stable but relatively fast economic growth and in its efforts to overcome the global financial crisis together with the international community.

Wen's visit, which begins later in the day, will

also demonstrate China's confidence in developing its comprehensive strategic partnership with European countries.

The Chinese Premier's visit, which is hailed as a “tour of confidence” that comes at the beginning of 2009, will take him to Switzerland, Germany, the European Union (EU) headquarters, Spain and

Britain. He will also attend an annual meeting of the World Economic Forum in Davos, Switzerland.

The forum will focus on the world's future development in the aftermath of the global financial crisis, as the economic turmoil has started to bite the emerging markets and affect real economy.

**Home Depot to lay off**

**7,000 jobs**

LOS ANGELES, 27 Jan — The Home Depot, the world's largest home improvement retailer, on Monday announced its plans to lay off about 7,000 employees, or about 2 percent of its workforce.

The retailer said it will also shutter 34 Expo centers, five YardBirds stores, two Design Center stores and its bath remodeling business known as HD Bath over the next two months.

The Home Depot's business has not performed well financially as the demand for big-ticket design and decor projects has declined amid the downturn in the economy, the announcement said.

The Atlanta-based company also announced that it is initiating a salary freeze for all of its executives.

## Gitmo prisoner releases not fail safe

SAN JUAN, 27 Jan — The re-emergence of two former Guantanamo Bay prisoners as al-Qaeda terrorists in the past week won't likely change US policy on transfers to Saudi Arabia, the Pentagon said on Monday.

More than 100 Saudis have been repatriated from the US military's prison at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, to Saudi Arabia, where the government puts them through a rehabilitation program designed to encourage them to abandon Islamic extremism and reintegrate into civilian life.

The online boasts by two of these men that they have joined al-Qaeda in Yemen underscore that the Saudi system isn't fail safe, the Pentagon said. A US counterterrorism official in Washington confirmed the men had been Guantanamo detainees. The official spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to disclose that fact on the record.

Another two or three Saudis who had been transferred from Guantanamo cannot be located by the Saudi government, said Christopher

Boucek, a researcher at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. Navy Cmdr Jeffrey Gordon, a Pentagon spokesman, said the US sees the Saudi programme as admirable.

"The best you can do is work with partner nations in the international community to ensure that they take the steps to mitigate the threat ex-detainees pose," he said. "There are never any absolute guarantees. There's an inherent risk in all detainee transfers and releases from Guantanamo."

## Texas Instruments profit falls, to cut 12 pct jobs

NEW YORK, 27 Jan — Texas Instruments (TXN.N) posted a smaller-than-expected drop in quarterly profit, but said it may post a loss in the current quarter and announced a 12 percent cut in jobs, as demand for cell phone chips fell.

But shares of the maker of wireless and analog chips rose 5 percent in after-hours trading on Monday as analysts said the better-than-expected fourth quarter and the cost-cutting measures meant TI could be positioned for growth when demand recovers.

"The hope is that we'll start to find the bottom at these levels. That, along with expense reductions, will create a greater flow through to the bottom line when revenue starts to recover," said Collins Stewart analyst Ashok Kumar.

TI said it was cutting its workforce by 3,400 to reduce costs, which American Technology Research analyst Doug Freeman said would "signal a recovery in earnings even if demand levels don't improve." The company warned that it still had tough times ahead, forecasting a possible loss for the first quarter, when utilization of its factories was expected to fall below 35 percent from 48 percent in the fourth quarter. It said it expected to idle many factories for several weeks in March.

Chief Financial Officer Kevin March told Reuters in an interview that the company had no sense of how soon demand would recover as virtually all its customers in all regions and product segments were cutting orders.—*Internet*



## Oil hovers above \$46 as OPEC cuts, demand weighed

BANGKOK, 27 Jan — Oil prices hovered just above \$46 a barrel Tuesday in Asia as traders weighed waning demand and OPEC's compliance with production cuts.

Light, sweet crude for March delivery was up 48 cents at \$46.21 a barrel in electronic trading on the New York Merchantile Exchange by late morning in Bangkok. The contract fell 74 cents overnight to settle at \$45.73.

"Traders are hoarding oil now in the hope of a recovery in the price in perhaps one month's time if OPEC has complied with production cuts," said Mark Pervan, senior commodity strategist with ANZ Bank in Melbourne.

The Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries has announced 4.2 million barrels a day in production cuts since September in an attempt to stabilize oil prices,

which have fallen almost 70 percent since peaking at nearly \$150 a barrel in July.

There has been skepticism OPEC member nations will comply with the promised cuts and doubts that the cuts, even if fully implemented, are big enough to offset the collapse in demand for crude. OPEC controls about 40 percent of world crude supplies.

## China's oil product use up 12% in 2008

BEIJING, 27 Jan — China's oil product consumption rose 11.9 percent last year to 215 million tonnes, the China Petroleum and Chemical Association said on Tuesday.

The growth rate was 5 percentage points higher than in 2007.

China used 365 million tonnes of crude oil last year, up 5.8 percent. The growth rate was 1.5 percentage points below the 2007 level.

According to Zhu Fang, deputy head of the association's information and market department, refined oil product consumption grew faster than that of crude oil because imports rose in the second and third quarters. Data from the association show that last year, China imported 14.71 million tonnes of oil products, including gasoline, diesel oil and kerosene, up 107.4 percent.

Zhu said during the first half of 2008, global oil prices soared while domestic prices were capped at a low level. In response, local refineries cut or halted production to minimize losses.

That decision led to tight supplies of refined products in China and increased imports, Zhu said.—*Internet*

## Honda cuts output further in North America, Japan

TOKYO, 27 Jan — Honda Motor Co (7267.T), Japan's second-biggest carmaker, announced further production cuts in North America and Japan, as the industry struggles with weak demand in a brutal economic downturn.

The company said it will slash production by an extra 29,000 units in North America and by a further 21,000 units in Japan. Automakers globally are reeling from a sharp downturn in demand due to a global recession and tight credit, and are under pressure to put off big investments and expansion plans to weather the storm.

Honda's North American output will total 1.26 million units in the year to March, down 14 percent from its original plan made in April, and Japan output will be 1.15 million units, down 12 percent from its initial target, Honda said in a statement.

Honda's North America and Japan production volume this fiscal year will be 12 percent below the year-ago level.

However, the Nikkei business daily said Honda will boost production capacity in China, where it expected strong demand for its fuel-efficient vehicles.

WELLINGTON, 27 Jan—A New Zealand man who bought an MP3 player from a thrift shop in Oklahoma found it held 60 US military files, including names and telephone numbers for American soldiers, a media report said on Tuesday.

TV One News said the 60 files contained personal details of US soldiers, including some who had served in Afghanistan and Iraq. A New Zealand security expert said the information should not be in the public domain, but that it did not appear likely to affect US national security.

The US Embassy declined to comment on the incident. Similar breaches occurred in Afghanistan in 2006, when US investigators reportedly bought back stolen flash drives

that contained sensitive military data from shops outside a main US base in the Afghan city of Bagram.

Chris Ogle, 29, from the northern New Zealand city of Whangarei, said he bought the music player at a thrift shop in Oklahoma, and that he found the files when he linked the \$18 device to his computer, TV One News reported.

## Five killed in S Philippines flash floods

COTABATO, 27 Jan — Continuous torrential rain starting from Monday night has left five people dead in southern Philippines, an official said on Tuesday.

The bodies of three of the five people were recovered Tuesday morning by local rescuers in the township of President Roxas in

North Cotabato province, said Jesus Sacdalan, governor of the province.

“A family of four was sleeping inside their house along riverside when they were swept away by the strong flash floods,” Sacdalan told *Xinhua*.

The official said a search and rescue opera-

tion is on for the two other missing victims.

Early this month, as many as 20 people have been killed and over 300,000 others affected by heavy rains that have caused flooding in some Philippine regions. Most of the fatalities died of drowning and landslides.

## 65 hospitalized for toxic fumes at French church

PHALEMPIN, 27 Jan— Sixty-five people were hospitalized for carbon monoxide poisoning after breathing toxic fumes at a church concert near the northern French city of Lille, officials said.

Among those hospitalized were 16 children including choir singers, a regional administration official said. No one was in serious condition. Most of those hospitalized suffered from headaches and vomiting.

Emergency services were called to the scene when a couple members of the audience became ill, and after determining there were very elevated carbon monoxide levels in the air, evacuated the 250 people from the church in the town of Phalempin.

“People were immediately directed towards a reception room where they underwent medical exams on a case-by-case basis,” said the chief of staff for the regional prefecture, Gisele Rossat-Mignod.—*Internet*

## Argentine president declares farm emergency

BUENOS AIRES, 27 Jan—Argentina's president declared an agricultural emergency Monday in the nation's breadbasket provinces, responding to a key demand by powerful farm organizations amid the worst drought in decades.

Cristina Fernandez told political and business leaders in a televised press conference that the decree will exempt thousands of farmers from paying various taxes for one year to help them confront what analysts estimate will be \$5 billion in losses this year.

Argentina's farming provinces, including Buenos Aires, Santa Fe, Entre Rios, Cordoba, La Pampa, Chaco and Santiago del Estero, have been hit by the worst drought since at least 1971, according to the National Weather Service.—*Internet*

The mistake came to light when an official of the club, which held a solemn minute of silence before a match last week, called Farrer's wife to offer

condolences. A surprised Gladys Farrer said her husband had indeed departed — but only for a few minutes to buy a newspaper and would be back soon if the official wanted to talk to him.

Farrer, a former England amateur who played in three Wembley finals, said in Friday editions of the Northern Echo: “We are not upset, but we did think it was a bit of a joke at first.”

Farrer said he wants to play down the mistake, saying it was time to “let it die.”

### Neb woman claims she found Needle in pork roast

A York woman is suing a grocer alleging she was injured after biting into a pork roast that she said contained part of a hypodermic needle. Birdie Farr said she bought the roast from a Bag 'N Save store in York in April 2007. She sued the grocer in York County District Court, filing in October. She seeks \$11,500 for medical expenses plus legal costs. Bag 'N Save denies responsibility, saying it never altered the meat, short of dividing it into individual packages.

The grocer said that if what Farr alleges occurred, the originator of the meat, Farmland Foods, is responsible.

Bag 'N Save wants the case dismissed. A phone message left with Farmland Foods representatives was not immediately returned on Friday.

The Kyetshar River was calm without waves. After a two-hour run, I saw Kyetshar Model Village. Most of the buildings were seen with the roofs of new corrugated iron sheets. On arrival at the village, I witnessed the development of the village built possessing characteristics of a model village. I noticed that the present improvements of the village were greater than that of the past.

In the past when I visited, Kyetshar Village was facilitated with single road and a few number of large houses. Most of houses were built with the walls of bamboo mat and thatch roofs. At present, all the houses were constructed with post shoes, CI sheets and sawn timber.

The local people use fly-proof latrines at every house. The road of the village was decorated

with shady and windbreak trees and in all the compounds of the houses there were vegetable patches. The houses on the village plan were constructed by TZTM Company. In addition, many food stalls and consumer goods shops were opened in the village. Most of personal goods were available at the village, and the prices of fish and prawn were much cheap.

When I strolled along the village road, I saw the self-reliant village library. Under the supervision of a librarian, the local people read various kinds of publications and books with keen interest. Some villagers borrowed the books.

On 9 January morning, I left for Pyinsalu from Kyonmange by boat. After a five-hour drive, we arrived at Pyinsalu. The town was beautiful with the scenic beauty of sea in the background.

My memory for the last visit to the town was not clear. However, the scenes of the town changed totally. There were new buildings in the town.

Pyinsalu was formed with three wards and 16 village-tracts. Road directions were put up at the corners of the roads. The houses of the people were built by Max Myanmar Company. We saw departmental buildings in Pyinsalu. On arrival at Pyinsalu People's Hospital, we witnessed the patients receiving medical treatments. While in the town, we saw Alin-ein self-reliant library.

Pyinsalu is adjacent to the sea. Roads in the town are straight. All the houses have vegetable patches for family consumption and for earning extra income.

Located in a seaside area, the local people are engaged in fishery business. Before our arrival at

the town, we saw fishing boats in the river. At present, Pyinsalu is under construction to possess the town characteristics. Development of the region is gaining momentum.

At 1 p.m., we proceeded to Polaung from Pyinsalu by boat. On the way, we saw Thitpok Model Village. After spending about two hours, we arrived at Polaung Model Village. The village is close to the sea. The scenes of the village had changed. There was no house built with the walls of bamboo mat and thatch roofs in the village. The narrow village roads had been broadened. The village is being decorated with shady trees, flowery plants and windbreak trees.

The whole area of Polaung Village was neat and tidy. The scenic beauty of the village was like a painting. All the houses in

the village were built by Wah Wah Win Company. The houses with fences and the straight roads were built after proper planning.

Moreover, road directions were up up on all roads. Vegetable patches and flowery plants were being nurtured at all the houses for earning surplus income of the families.

The local people thanked the government for reestablishment of their living standard had been uplifted.

In my mind, I compared the situations of the village in the pre-Nargis period and that of the storm-hit village. After the storm, the rehabilitation and reconstruction tasks were undertaken in the village with might and main under the leadership of the government. The village gained the greater development. As part of efforts to possess the model vil-

lage characteristics, Polaung Village was established organizing the houses that had scattered in the region. New roads and residences were rebuilt. Water supply tasks were undertaken. The new location for the residents was chosen and fly-proof latrines were constructed. Moreover, hillocks and cyclone shelters were built as preparedness measures in the event of the natural disasters. The village has developed with various kinds of food stalls. Ten kinds of vegetable patches at the houses earn surplus income for the families.

On 10 January, I left Polaung Model Village. By recounting my experiences, I present the progress of model villages to the esteemed readers.

## New Zealand reptile becomes new father at 111

WELLINGTON (New Zealand), 27 Jan—A captive reptile in New Zealand has unexpectedly become a father at the ripe old age of 111 after receiving treatment for a cancer that made him hostile toward prospective mates.

The centenarian tuatara, named Henry, was thought well past the mating game until he was caught canoodling with a female named Mildred last March—a consummation that resulted in 11 babies being hatched on Monday.

Tuatara are indigenous New Zealand creatures that resemble lizards but descend from a distinct lineage of reptile that walked the earth with the dinosaurs 225 million years ago, zoologists say.

An endangered species, the hatchlings born at the Southland Museum and Art Gallery will provide a

badly needed boost to the tuatara's genetic diversity, said the gallery's tuatara curator, Lindsay Hazley.

Henry was at least 70 years old when he arrived at the museum, "a grumpy old man" who attacked other reptiles, including females, until a cancerous tumor was removed from his genitals in 2002, said Hazley.

"I went off the idea he was good for breeding," Hazley told The Associated Press, but once the tumor was removed, "he was no longer aggressive."

Tuatara are estimated to number about 50,000, most of them living in predator-free sanctuaries, including offshore islands.

A male tuatara takes 70 years to fully mature but reaches sexual maturity about age 20.

## Obama begins reversing Bush climate policies

WASHINGTON, 27 Jan—US President Barack Obama began reversing the climate policies of the Bush administration on Monday, clearing the way for new rules to force auto makers to produce more fuel-efficient and less polluting cars.

The President told the US Environmental Protection Agency to reconsider immediately a request by California to impose its own strict limits on vehicle carbon dioxide emissions, blamed for contributing to global

warming.

Obama, a Democrat, took over from former president George W Bush last Tuesday. Bush's Republican administration had denied the request, prompting California and other states to sue.

"The federal government must work with, not against, states to reduce greenhouse gas emissions," Obama said at the White House, taking a stab at his predecessor's policies. "The days of Washington dragging its

heels are over. My administration will not deny facts, we will be guided by them. We cannot afford to pass the buck ... onto the states."

Obama's directive, which is likely to result in a formal change in the coming months, could prompt as many as 18 states to follow California's lead by putting into effect tailpipe emissions standards that are tougher than federal requirements.

The president also directed the Department of Transportation to move forward with setting tighter fuel efficiency standards for automobiles starting with model year 2011, giving manufacturers 18 months to prepare.—MNA/Reuters

## UN chief calls for end to hostilities in Darfur

UNITED NATIONS, 27 Jan—UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon Monday strongly condemned the hostilities between the Sudanese Armed Forces and rebels in north Darfur, and called on all parties to immediately stop the ongoing fighting.

"The Secretary-General strongly condemns the hostilities, which have taken place today between a rebel movement and the Sudanese Armed Forces on the outskirts of El Fasher, in north Darfur,"

the UN spokesperson, Michele Montas, said in a statement issued here Monday.

"The Secretary-General deplores these continued military action which continues to put civilian lives at risk and to jeopardize the political process," the statement said. "The Secretary-General calls on all parties to immediately cease ongoing hostilities to abide by their obligations under international law," the statement said.

## Eight babies born to stunned California parents

BELLFLOWER (Calif), 27 Jan—Eight babies born to a mother in Southern California — only the second live-born set of octuplets in the world — were in stable condition and breathing on their own, doctors said Tuesday.

Dr. Mandhir Gupta, a neonatologist at Kaiser Permanente Bellflower Medical Center, told ABC television that the babies "are doing actually very, very well."

Two of the newborns were initially put on ventilators, but their breathing tubes have been removed.

"Only three babies need some sort of oxygen through the nose right now but they are breathing on

their own," Gupta said on "Good Morning America."

The six boys and two girls were born Monday, weighing between 1 pound, 8 ounces (0.67 kilograms) and 3 pounds, 4 ounces (1.47 kilograms).

The mother's identity has not been released.

The world's first live octuplets were born in March 1967 in Mexico City, but all died within 14 hours, according to Encyclopedia Britannica.

### Yamaha says it is to recall 53,814 bikes

TOKYO, 27 Jan— Japan's Yamaha Motor Co said on Tuesday it will recall 53,814 motorcycles to replace a defect in rear-wheel shock absorbers that caused slight injuries to one rider.

The TW200E models were manufactured between 1987 and 2001 and all sold in Japan, the motorcycle firm said in a statement.

## Life is tweet: first bird had hearing like an emu's



PARIS, 27 Jan— Archaeopteryx, the first known bird, had a hearing range similar to the modern-day emu's, according to a new study that boosts the avian claims of this descendant of the dinosaurs.

About the size and shape of a European magpie, Archaeopteryx lithographica appeared on the scene around 150 million years ago, in the Jurassic era.

The first fossil was unearthed in Bavaria, southern Germany, in 1861, and

so far eight specimens have come to light.

Scientists at the Natural History Museum in London used a computed tomography (CT) scanner to make a 3-D picture of the inner ear of Archaeopteryx, modern birds and reptiles.

Their area of interest was the cochlear duct — the bony part of the inner ear that houses the sensory tissue. The size of this duct is a good indicator of an animal's hearing range.

According to their calculations, Archaeopteryx had an average hearing range of approximately 2,000 hertz.

"This means it had similar hearing to modern emus, which have some of the most limited hearing ranges of modern birds," said palaeontologist Paul Barrett.

By comparison, the human voice is general in the range of 80 to 1,100 Hz, and good human hearing runs from around 20 to 20,000 Hz.

## Twin to Milky Way's black hole found

MADRID, 27 Jan—A sharp-eyed instrument on the Very Large Telescope has given astronomers a peek at the heart of a nearby galaxy, revealing a host of young, massive and dusty stellar nurseries and a possible twin of our own Milky Way's supermassive black hole.

The galaxy, dubbed NGC 253, is one of the brightest and dustiest spiral galaxies in the sky. It is also known as the Sculptor Galaxy, because it is located in the Sculptor constellation.

The Sculptor Galaxy is a starburst galaxy, so-called because of very intense star formation there.


Astronomers from the Instituto de Astrofísica de Canarias in Spain used

NACO, an adaptive optics instrument on the European Southern Observatory's *Very Large Telescope* (located in Atacama desert in northern Chile), to study NGC 253 in finer detail in the near-infrared.

Adaptive optics corrects for the blurring ef-

fect that Earth's atmosphere can have on images taken by ground-based telescopes. Sensors and deformable mirrors correct distortions of incoming light, producing images as clear as if the telescope were in space.

## Health info technology saves lives, costs

CHICAGO, 27 Jan—Hospitals in Texas that used computers to keep track of patient records and manage care had lower rates of deaths, complications and costs, US researchers said on Monday, offering a strong argument for hos-

pitals to go "paperless."

They said patients treated in hospitals that ranked highest in use of health information technology to manage patient records and physician notes were 15 percent less likely to die compared

with patients in hospitals that ranked lower.

"If these results were to hold for all hospitals in the United States, computerizing notes and records might have the potential to save 100,000 lives annually," Dr Neil Poe of Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine in Baltimore, who worked on the study, said in a statement.

The study, published in the Archives of Internal Medicine, lends fresh evidence that information technology can improve health quality and cut costs by reducing errors.

## UK's Thames Water fined for river pollution

LONDON, 27 Jan— Thames Water was fined 125,000 pounds on Monday after it admitted it had killed thousands of fish after carelessly releasing harmful pollutants into a river, the Environment Agency said.

Britain's largest water company had pleaded guilty at an earlier hearing to allowing a large amount of industrial strength chlorine to spill into the River Wandle from its sewerage treatment works near Mitcham in south London in 2007.

In all, a 5-kilometre stretch of the river was polluted killing the majority of fish that were present. The Environment Agency said it took its officials, helped by local anglers, three days to remove two tonnes of dead fish from the river which had turned a milky colour and bleached much of the green vegetation that grows along the channel bed.—*MNA/Reuters*

## Pirates kill Greek sailor, rob crew off Cameroon

YAOUNDE, 27 Jan—A Greek sailor was shot dead by pirates off the coast of Cameroon at the weekend, the state radio broadcaster said on Monday, the latest in a series of attacks on shipping in African waters.

Around 30 armed pirates travelling in three boats seized one Greek vessel on Saturday in the Atlantic off Kribi, south of the main port city Douala, and were taking it towards international waters when a sister ship gave chase.

"The pirates then opened fire on the second vessel, climbed into the cabin and shot the captain ... three times in the neck," the radio report said.

Shipping lanes off both the east and west coasts of Africa have become increasingly dangerous in recent months. The Greek Merchant Marine Ministry identified the victim as Theodoros Mastaloudis.

"A Greek sailor was killed on Saturday evening, when two fishing ships were attacked by pirates off Douala, in Cameroon. No one else was injured," said a ministry official who declined to be named.—*MNA/Xinhua*

## Obama faces tough choice on Cape Cod wind farm

WASHINGTON, 27 Jan— President Barack Obama's enthusiasm for alternative energy is being buffeted by two political forces on opposite sides of plans to build the nation's first offshore wind farm off Cape Cod.

A leading foe of the \$1 billion project is Sen Edward Kennedy, D-Mass, an early and influential backer of Obama's presidential bid. A strong proponent is Massachusetts Gov Deval Patrick, a close friend of Obama and a source for some of his best campaign speech lines.

The plan to erect 130 giant turbines across 25 miles of federal waters in Nantucket Sound poses an early test of the president's energy policy, on stark display Monday with Obama's order to re-examine whether California and other states should be allowed to have tougher auto emission standards to combat a build up of greenhouse gases and his directive for the government to get moving on new fuel-efficiency guidelines for the auto industry.

In the final days of George W Bush's tenure,

the Minerals Management Service issued a report saying the wind farm project poses no major environmental problems, clearing the way for the Obama administration to make a final decision on whether to issue a lease for the project. Reviews by the Federal Aviation Administration and the Interior Department's inspector general are still pending.—Internet

## TB, substance abuse closely linked in US

WASHINGTON, 27 Jan—About a fifth of people with tuberculosis in the United States report abusing drugs or alcohol, and the figure is even higher when only US-born patients are included, government researchers said on Monday.

The substance abusers were more contagious than others with the disease and remained contagious longer, the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention researchers wrote in the journal Archives of Internal Medicine.

About a third of people worldwide are infected with the bacterium that causes TB. Only a small percentage of people ever develop the disease.

But the effect of substance abuse on the body may raise the chances that the latent infection turns into active disease, and substance abusers may be less likely to be screened for TB, the researchers said.


The researchers tracked 153,268 people with TB in the United States from 1997 to 2006, accounting for nearly everyone age 15 and older with the disease during that span.

Overall, 19 percent of them reported that they abused drugs and/or alcohol, according to the study. Among the 76,816 US-born people with TB, 29 percent reported substance abuse.

## Astronauts lose alarming amounts of hipbone strength

WASHINGTON, 27 Jan— Astronauts spending months in space lose significant bone strength, putting them increasingly at risk of fractures later in life, according to a study by the University of California (UC) in Irvine.

UC Irvine and UC San Francisco led the study evaluating one female and 12 male astronauts who spent four to six months in the International Space Station and found that, on average, astronauts' hipbone strength decreased 14 percent.

Three astronauts experienced losses of 20 percent to 30 percent, rates comparable to those seen in older women with osteoporosis.

The results have alarmed researchers because they reveal a greater rate of bone deterioration than previously measured using less powerful technolo-

gies.

"If preventive measures are not taken, some of our astronauts may be at increased risk for age-related fractures decades after their missions," said study leader Joyce Keyak, UC Irvine orthopedic surgery and biomedical engineering professor.

For as long as there have been astronauts, researchers have studied why the microgravitational environment of space makes bones more fragile. While previous studies looked at bone mineral density, this study is the first to specifically evaluate bone strength.

Keyak and her colleagues used a novel computer program she developed over the past 20 years to identify hipbone fracture risk in people with osteoporosis.

## New "test tube" technique offers pregnancy hopes

LONDON, 27 Jan—A British team has for the first time successfully used a new "test tube" fertilization technique that better predicts which of a woman's eggs will most likely result in pregnancy, a top fertility expert said on Monday.

The treatment combines currently used prenatal screening with a new computer programme that can scan the eggs for flaws in chromosomes that may lead to miscarriage. The first patient, a 41-year-old British woman who failed 13 rounds of fertility treatment, is now pregnant, the researchers said.

The ultimate goal is

more pregnancies and fewer multiple births and miscarriages, added Simon Fishel, managing director of CAREfertility, the clinic that developed the technique.

"We are going to go slowly with the technology because we don't want to raise hopes," Fishel told a news conference. "The Holy Grail is to achieve one pregnancy with one embryo."

More than 3.5 million babies have been born worldwide using assisted reproductive technology since 25 July, 1978, when two British doctors delivered the world's first testtube baby, Louise Brown.—Internet

## Aspirin may prevent liver damage

WASHINGTON, 27 Jan—Simple aspirin may prevent liver dam-

age to millions of people suffering from the side effects of common drugs, alcohol abuse, and obesity-related liver disease, a new Yale University study suggests.

The study published on Monday in the Journal of Clinical Investigation found aspirin reduced mortality caused by an overdose of acetaminophen, best known by the brand name Tylenol.

It further showed that a class of molecules known as TLR antagonists, which block receptors known to activate inflammation, have a similar effect as aspirin, the paper said.

## Roddick into tennis semis as ill Djokovic withdraws

MELBOURNE, 27 Jan—American Andy Roddick powered into the Australian Open semi-finals on Tuesday when defending champion Novak Djokovic pulled out ill trailing 7-6 (7/3), 4-6, 2-6, 1-2.

The Serbian world number three broke through for his first Grand Slam win on this day last

year, but he looked a forlorn figure as he conceded to Roddick after becoming more and more distressed on a scorching hot day.

Roddick, who has now reached the semi-finals in Melbourne four times, was playing high class tennis when Djokovic withdrew and may well have progressed regardless.

But he said he still had a hollow feeling.

"I feel for Novak because he worked so hard to win the title and for him not to get a fair chance to defend it, it's too bad," Roddick said.

There was no indication that Djokovic had any problems over the early stages and he looked firmly in control as he took a tight first set.

He continued to show no signs of illness as he and Roddick slugged out the second set, however, he appeared to begin to try and shorten the points as the set wore on.—Internet

### US wants direct talks with Iran on atom work

UNITED NATIONS, 27 Jan—The US Ambassador to the United Nations said on Monday the new US Administration would make Iran's nuclear programme a top diplomatic priority and would pursue direct talks with Teheran. "We remain deeply concerned about the threat that Iran's nuclear programme poses to the region, indeed to the United States and to the entire international community," Ambassador Susan Rice told reporters after 45 minutes of closed-door discussions with UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon.

"We look forward to engaging in vigorous diplomacy that includes direct diplomacy with Iran," she said, in comments that were among the clearest indications that President Barack Obama wants to try a new approach in dealing with Iran. The administration of former US president George W Bush was pushing for a fourth round of UN sanctions against Iran for refusing to suspend its uranium enrichment programme. But the five permanent members of the UN Security Council and Germany—known as the "P5+1"—had put discussions on next steps with Iran on hold until the administration of Barack Obama was in office, council diplomats have said.—MNA/Reuters



## Makeover shows correspond with increased body anxiety

These are a few of the TV shows that have examined, and promoted, the benefits of plastic surgery in recent years. University of Southern California professor Julie Albright believes the shows are driving women to go under the knife to conform to a heightened definition of beauty, one that is increasingly difficult to attain. According to the American Society for Aesthetic Plastic Surgery.

The number of 18-year-olds who underwent breast-implant surgery nearly tripled from 2002 to 2003, there has been a 444% increase in plastic surgery since 1997, over 90% of all plastic surgery is performed on women, americans spent approximately \$12.4 billion on cosmetic procedures in 2006.

“The practice now has incredible visibility, which has led to incredible acceptance, which has led to incredible pressure for women to improve their appearance,” Albright believes.—Internet
