Give polio vaccine to every under-five child

The first National Immunization Days were held from 10 to 12 January throughout the nation. The second National Immunization Days will take place from 7 to 9 February.

The Ministry of Health is stepping up the campaigns to vaccinate children against polio across the country including rural areas. Since 1996, Myanmar has organized National Immunization Days for nine times, and regional immunization days, four times.

As a result, Myanmar was free from wild poliovirus from 2000 to 2007. However, in March, Maungtaw Township of Rakhine State was infected with wild poliovirus spread from the neighbouring country. Due to the preventive measures, the epidemic was under control in the nation before long.

Now, under-one-year babies are given polio vaccine in every alternative month for at least three times, National Immunization Days are held yearly to give polio vaccine to under-fives, and polio vaccine is given to children from door to door in the regions that are more likely to face polio epidemic than other regions.

Every under-five child is to be given polio vaccine. If a child is infected with poliovirus, it can suffer infantile paralysis since its youth. In recognition of the efforts the government is making to ensure every child is given polio vaccine, all mothers should have their underfive children fed polio vaccine.

To have their under-five children given polio vaccine is a must for all mothers to be able to lead a healthy and happy life. So, all mothers are exhorted to have their children given polio vaccine on the second National **Immunization Days.**



Somalian pirates release Ukrainian arms ship

Harardhere, 5 Feb -A Ukrainian ship carrying arms and tanks that has been held by Somali pirates for almost five months has been released, Ukrainian officials said today.

The MV Faina, which was seized off the coast of Somalia on 23 September, is understood to have been released after a ransom was paid.

A brief statement by the office of President Viktor Yushchenko made

no reference to any payment, saying the ship and its 20-man crew had been freed as the result of an operation involving special services agents from Ukraine.

However, a negotiator, who asked not to be named, said that the pirates had received a ransom payment of \$3.2m (£2.2m). "The last group of pirates has got down now and MV Faina is released," he said, speaking from the Somali port of Harardhere.

The MV Faina's cargo, which includes grenade launchers and 33 Russian-made tanks, had provoked international concern.

The pirates had initially demanded \$35m but the ransom was whittled back over months. During the standoff, six American warships surrounded the seized vessel to ensure the weapons were not taken elsewhere in the volatile region.—Internet

Baghdad, 5 Feb — A bomb struck the car of the leader of an Awakening Council group in western Baghdad on Wednesday, wounding him and killing his son, a well-informed police source said.

An explosive charge stuck to the car of Hikmat al-Tikriti, head of the Awakening Council group of Baghdad's western district of Yarmouk, detonated around 3:00 pm local time (1200 GMT), the source told Xinhua on condition of anonymity.—Internet

It comes days after Iraq held largely peaceful provincial elections, the first results of which are expected to be released on Thursday.

Kurdish and police officials say at least 15 other people were injured.

Sunni tribal leader says he can prove fraud

BAGHDAD, 5 Feb — A senior Sunni tribal leader claimed on Wednesday to have hundreds of documents proving fraud in weekend elections in Anbar Province, escalating a crisis that has threatened to reignite violence in the former militant stronghold.

Iraq's electoral commission, which is overseeing the process, promised it was taking the complaints seriously and warned the findings from an investigation could affect election results for the province.

Signaling the high stakes involved, a prominent national Sunni lawmaker traveled to Anbar Province to try to mediate the dispute, which has pitted the tribal leaders against a rival Sunni party that is part of the national government.

"We came to Anbar Province to ease the situation because there is a lot of tension," said Saleh al-Mutlaq. "There was a lot of fraud. Its effects will be great unless it is resolved." —Internet

Roadside bombing kills six guards of district chief in S Afghanistan

KANDAHAR, 5 Feb — A roadside bombing targeting a vehicle of district chief of Musa Qala district in southern Afghan province of Helmand killed at least six guards aboard Wednesday, said an official.

Abdul Salam, the district chief, told Xinhua it occurred at around 12:00 pm local time (0830GMT) when the vehicle of his guards running in the riot Musa Qala district hit remote-controlled mines planted by Taleban militants, leaving six dead on the spot.—Internet

Germany hears asylum case of deserted US soldier

Berlin, 5 Feb — A US soldier who went AWOL after serving in Iraq made his case to the German government Wednesday that he should be given asylum because of his opposition to that war.

US Army Spc Andre Shepherd walked off his unit's base Katterbach, Germany, in April 2007 after returning from a six-month tour maintaining Apache heli copters in Tikrit.

He said he deserted because he didn't want to return to an illegal conflict.

"We were completely lied to," he said of his fellow soldiers in the Army's 12th Combat Aviation Brigade.

Shepherd was among 71 Army soldiers to desert European bases in 2008, but he is the first known to have sought asylum in Germany.

His success could open a new door for soldiers looking to escape the military, his supporters say.

But rejection could find him handed over to military authorities, or

deported to the US.

"Since we're in uncharted waters and the opponent is the United States of America, anything can happen," said Shepherd, who is from Cleveland, Ohio.

Cyprus awaits UN decision on suspect Iran ship

Nicosia, 5 Feb — Cyprus says it will decide what to do with a ship suspected of carrying arms from Iran to Gaza once the UN rules on whether it broke a ban on Iranian arms exports.

Foreign Minister Markos Kyprianou said on Wednesday that Cyprus is awaiting United Nations guidance on whether the ship's cargo breached sanctions barring Iran from sending arms abroad.

Cyprus has given the UN Security Council Sanctions Committee a report on the cargo of the Cyprus-flagged Monchegorsk after conducting two inspections of the ship.

Fidel Castro criticizes Obama's economic plans

HAVANA, 5 Feb — President Barack Obama intends to print "enormous sums of money" to keep American society from grinding to a halt, Fidel Castro said in his second critical essay of the US leader, released on Wednesday.

The ailing former Cuban president had previously praised Obama, but last week he wrote an essav in which he demanded that the new US president return the Guantanamo military base to Cuba and criticized his response to the Israeli incursion into Gaza.

Bomb critically wounds head of Ark medical board

West Memphis, 5 Feb—A car bomb explosion critically wounded the head of the Arkansas panel that licenses and disciplines doctors, detonating in his driveway as he was leaving for work, authorities said.

Police said they had no idea why someone would target Dr Trent P Pierce, chairman of the Arkansas State Medical Board. The explosive device placed on or near the car shattered the front of his white Lexus hybrid in a blast the police chief said could be heard a mile away.

"We don't know if this was a random target or someone specifically targeted him," said West Memphis Police Chief Bob Paudert. He said it wasn't known if the doctor was in his car or outside it when the device exploded.

Pierce, a family physician, was taken to Regional Medical Center in Memphis, Tenn, where he was listed in critical condition, hospital spokeswoman Sandy Snell said.

Paudert said Pierce lost one eye in the explosion and remained in surgery late Wednesday afternoon, after suffering severe burns to his face and shrapnel wounds.

Paudert said Pierce remains sedated and investigators have yet to speak with him.

The FBI said a second person was injured outside Pierce's home, but Paudert said only Pierce was hurt. The discrepancy could not be resolved immediately.

Afghan official says 60% Taleban militants foreigners

KABUL, 5 Feb-Afghanistan Defence Minister General Abdul Rahim Wardak has claimed that 60 percent of the Taleban insurgents are consisted of foreigners. a local newspaper reported on Thursday.

"Over 60 percent of anti-government militants are foreign nationals," daily Arman-e-Millie quoted the Defence Minister as saying.

However, the defence minister did not specify the nationalities of the militants.

The newspaper also quoted the Defence Minister as saying that these militants are mostly active in the restive Helmand Province where three districts of Baghran, Washir and Mianashin despite around 8,000 British troops stationed there.

According to Afghan Defence Ministry, around 15,000 Taleban rebels are currently fighting in Afghanistan and the numbers were being swelled by foreign militants moving in from Iraq.

"Since last year, as the result of the success of the surge in Iraq, there has been a flow of foreign terrorists into Afghanistan," Wardak said, adding that foreign nationals mostly from the Arab countries, Uzbeks, Chechen and Pakistanis were seen siding Taleban militants in the past.

NATO on Wednesday expressed concern over the possible building of Russian military bases in Georgia's two breakaway regions, which Moscow has recognized as independent states. "This issue of the pos-

sibility of building Russian bases inside Georgian territory is one of real concern to the NATO allies because it does seem to be or would be in violation of Georgia's territorial integrity," said NATO spokesman James Appathurai.

NATO allies do not recognize the independence of the two breakaway regions of Georgia — Abkhazia and South Ossetia.

NATO Secretary-general Jaap de Hoop Scheffer would raise this issue with Russian Deputy Prime Minister Sergei Ivanov when they meet on the sidelines of the Munich security conference later this week, he said.

NATO ambassadors are meeting with highranking Georgian officials in the framework of the NATO-Georgia Commission. The possible Russian military bases in Abkhazia and South Ossetia would be on the agenda, said Appathurai.

NATO also expressed concern over possible Russian involvement in Kyrgyzstan's decision to close a key US airbase in the Central Asian country.

15 arrested in Los Angeles on suspicion of smuggling marijuana

Los Angeles, 5 Feb—Federal agents in Los Angeles have arrested 15 people on suspicions of smuggling 1.5 million US dollars worth of marijuana, officials said on Wednesday.

The 1,800-pound (about 817 kg) drugs cache was found inside about 200 concrete yard statues shaped like donkeys, each about 3 feet tall, packed into a cargo container, according to US Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE).

US Customs and Border Protection officers seized the 40-foot container on Tuesday night when they conducted an inspection after it arrived at the Los Angeles/ Long Beach port complex, the ICE said.

In an ensuing search, investigators with the Los Angeles Border Enforcement Security Task Force arrested 15 people.—Xinhua

UN head urges fewer civilian deaths in Afghanistan

KABUL, 5 Feb — The UN chief urged US and NATOled forces in Afghanistan on Wednesday to prevent civilian casualties in their operations, echoing concerns of President Hamid Karzai who has increasingly voiced his anger over the issue.

Hundreds of Afghan civilians have died in attacks by the Taliban — but also in operations by US and NATO forces fighting the militants.

Speaking alongside UN Secretary-General Ban Kimoon — whose trip to Kabul was unannounced — Karzai said he has publicly complained over civilian casualties in order to pressure US-led forces into changing their tactics.

Ban said he shared Karzai's concerns, calling for closer civilian-military cooperation and urging foreign troops to ensure that civilians are not killed. He said there have been "many tragic incidents."

Chilean police mission in Haiti to withdraw in 2011

Santiago, 5 Feb—Chilean policemen participating in the United Nations peace mission in Haiti could return to their home country in 2011, local press quoted National Police official Javiera Blanco as saying on Wednesday.

Praising the work of the Chilean policemen in Haiti, he said, "Even though today there is a need for the key presence of this mission, which is in mid term, the exit should be prepared for, considering that the country (Haiti) must take those responsibilities and build their capacities to do what is done by our mission."

"There has been an stabilization process in Haiti, which has allowed the internal situation to move ahead, but without doubt there is still work to do, mainly regarding issues like extreme poverty, low life expectation, electricity and sewerage problems," said Blanco.

Besides the police mission in Haiti, stationed there since 2004, Chile also sent a military contingent of more than 500 to fulfill the UN peace mission in the violence-torn Caribbean nation. —Xinhua

Time Warner swings to 4Q loss on hefty writedown

Los Angeles, 5 Feb— Media and entertainment giant Time Warner Inc reported a fourth-quarter loss, hurt by a previously expected \$24.2 billion writedown for its cable, publishing and AOL assets.

The company predicted flat earnings in the year ahead as it takes on major restructuring charges amid a declining advertising market.

"We're considering that the tough advertising environment continues,"

Chief Financial Officer John Martin told analysts on a conference call.

"While it doesn't assume any considerable improvement, it also doesn't assume that things are going to get much worse."

Its cable unit, meanwhile, also reported a loss and said it plans to cut 1,250 jobs, or about 2.6 percent of the unit's work force, as its business slows.

Time Warner owns 85 percent of Time Warner Cable and plans a spinoff

Time Warner shares ended Wednesday down 36 cents, or 3.7 percent, at \$9.42. The New Yorkbased company, which owns Time magazine, cable networks CNN and HBO and the Warner Bros. movie studio, posted a loss of \$16.03 billion, or \$4.47 per share, in the three months to 31 Dec. That compared with a profit of \$1.03 billion, or 28 cents per share, a year ago.

Death of boy, ten, at Ill school suicide

Evanston, 5 Feb A 10-year-old boy reportedly found hanging from a coat hook at his suburban Chicago school took his own life, according to a preliminary coroner's office ruling on Wednesday. The boy's distraught mother, Angel Lewis, left a school district building hours earlier, not speaking directly to reporters but saying over and over, "He should have been accounted for. He should have been accounted for."

Japanese man arrested over 1.4-bn-dlr investment scam

Токуо, 5 Feb—Japanese police said on Thursday they arrested an executive who built a cult-like status among thousands of investors whom he reportedly scammed out of at least 1.4 billion dollars.

Kazutsugi Nami, chairman of now bankrupt bedding supplier L&G KK of Tokyo, had promised a 36 percent annual return on investment and his company issued its own form of electronic money.

The 75-year-old swindled 37,000 investors out of a total of 126 billion yen, the Jiji Press news agency reported. Some other media estimated the alleged scam could have been worth as much as 226 billion yen (2.5 billion dollars).

Do not implicate Myanmar in irrelevant issue

These days, foreign media are loud in their broadcasts of the news stories that Thai navy seized some Rohinjas trying to immigrate illegally into Thailand and droved them out of its soil.

The broadcasts said that some of the Rohinjas were from Myanmar, and some radio stations fueled the situations, airing that the expatriates fled Myanmar out of desperation of human rights violation and discrimination against them committed by Myanmar authorities.

It is clearly apparent that the issue is nothing to do with Myanmar, nor is a human rights problem. It was just a matter that took place when illegal migration of people of developing countries was coupled with the global financial crisis in the age of globalization.

With a population of more than 150 million, Bangladesh is the most congested country in the world. It is a small country in size where water is scarce in summer and floods are common in the rainy season. So, it has to deal with constant battle against food supply. Many of the third class people with low incomes and less opportunity for jobs work abroad to earn money. The population of Bangladeshi people working in foreign countries is expected to be about 4.5 million, and the amount of money they remit to their country yearly is about eight billion US dollars, which is one of its main sources of earning foreign exchange. Of Bangladeshi workers in foreign countries, some are legal ones, whereas some are illegal ones. Some are working in the Middle East, and some in Southeast Asia. In Southeast Asian region, the country which is the most attractive to foreign workers is Malaysia. With a population of just over 25 million and per capita income of 15,700 US dollars, Malaysia is an economically strong country in the region. Oil palm farming is one of its lucrative businesses. Moreover, it has huge foreign investments from Japan and western countries, and enjoys industrial development. Therefore, cheap labour is in high demand in the country.

Under the adverse effects triggered by the global financial crisis, Malaysian industries have to reduce expenses on productivity. So, it has to decide whether it will bring down foreign labour or salaries. Some foreign workers have to quit their jobs because they are no longer needed; and some have no choice but to return home because they cannot earn their living with the reduced salaries. So, Malaysia has to search cheap labour to fill the vacancies. The situation is attractive to Bangladeshi workers who are desperate to get any types of jobs irrespective of salary rates.

The easiest way to illegally enter Malaysia that practises strict immigration laws is to go there via Ranong by sea, and then through the southern part of Thailand by land. Brokers for that sort of work are numerous.

As a result, the number of illegal Bangladeshi immigrants to Malaysia through the Andaman Sea and through Thailand is getting higher in the cold season in which the sea does not see huge tidal waves and strong winds. According to the 29-1-2009 issue of the Economist Journal, Thailand had to detain about 5000 Bengalis in the last two years. The number represented just the ones who were arrested. Surely, there must have been a large number of the illegal immigrants that escaped arrests.

The journal said that anarchic riots on Muslim liberation were running high in the southern part of Thailand, so Thai authorities feared that the illegal Bengali immigrants holding no document might merge with the terrorist groups of same faith in the southern

It said that the Thai government decided to take tough action against illegal immigrants in order that such illegal immigrants from Bangladesh daren't enter Thailand in future; that Thai navy seized the boats that had entered illegally in December and held nearly 1000 immigrants captive in an island off Ranong.

Some foreign media said that the outboard motors of the boats were removed and the boats carrying some bags of rice and drinking water tanks and the seized immigrants were set free in the sea. Of them, some floated to Arche island of Indonesia, and Indonesia gave them protective custody.

And some reached near Andaman island of India in the early January, and Indian navy rescued them. Some victims got off into the sea just as they were close to the coast and they were drowned while swimming to the coast. That news became a hot item when it received international media coverage.

The Thai Foreign Affairs Ministry announced that the illegal immigrants tried to enter the country due to financial basis. Thai Supreme Court judged that the illegal immigrants would have to leave Thailand because they illegally entered the country due to economic issues.

In that regard, the root cause is economic crisis. In such a situation, those who want to trouble Myanmar politically took advantage of Rohinja issue. In like manner some who wanted to take refuge claiming political grounds and enjoy the rights of refugees, pretending themselves as Rohinjas said as though they had fled Myanmar due to Myanmar

authorities' torture with the intention of attracting the sympathy of the international community.

Daily newspapers have already stated that Rohinja is never included in the national races of Myanmar. Any government will have to keep a watchful eye to possible dangers caused by population explosion in the Bangladeshi border. India, for instance, planned to set up barbed wire fence along the border with Bangladesh to prevent illegal immigration.

Myanmar governments of successive periods had to take preventive measures against illegal immigration from the other country. The census conducted in the 1960s showed unreasonable growth of population in the border areas if compared with that in the post-independence period. Accordingly, scrutinizing measures were taken, and many of the illegal immigrants fled to their native country. Under the agreements reached between Myanmar and international organizations and between Myanmar and Bangladesh, such people were received on certain conditions. Some failed to return here due to their desire, not because of Myanmar's failure to receive them. According to the figures, only about 6000 have yet to return here.

Here, it is very repugnant that some name all Bangalis Rohinjas and homeless refugees with the ill will of launching political attacks.

In like manner of the abbot in the tale, I would say do not implicate Myanmar which has nothing to do with the issue because of the economic, social and security problems of the nations concerned; it is not because of Myanmar.

Far from fruit snobbery, the plum is being ushered in after Cisneros and Dr. David Byrne, AgriLife Research plant breeder, judged more than 100 varieties of plums, peaches and nectarines and found them to match




or exceed the much-touted blueberries in antioxidants and phytonutrients associated with disease prevention.

Long-term cloud seeding in Tasmania shows promising increase in rainfall

HOBART, 5 Feb — A team of researchers at Monash University has released a new analysis of precipitation records from the long-term cloud seed-



ing operation in Tasmania that shows a promising increase in rainfall during periods of seeding.

The team worked with Hydro Tasmania analysing the cloud seeding activity over the hydroelectric catchment area in central Tasmania for more than four decades – from 1960 - 2005.

Associate Professor Steven Siems, Faculty of Science said the analysis used monthly rainfall figures in the catchment area where the seeding took place and compared it with data from nearby control areas.

"A number of independent statistical tests showed a consistent increase of at least 5% in monthly rainfall over the catchment area. This is the first time that an independent analysis of cloud seeding data over several decades has shown a statistically significant increase in rainfall," Associate Professor Siems

However, the team of Monash scientists have also cautioned against becoming too excited by the initial results.

'Longevity Gene' common among centenarians

Kiel, 5 Feb — A variation in the gene FOXO3A has a positive effect on the life expectancy of humans, and is found much more often in people living to 100 and beyond – moreover, this appears to be true worldwide.

A research group in the Faculty of Medicine at the Christian-Albrechts-University in Kiel (CAU) has now confirmed this assumption by comparing DNA samples taken from 388 German centenarians with those from 731 younger people. Zimbabwe cholera death toll **rises to 3,300**

HARARE, 5 Feb—The cholera death toll in Zimbabwe has reached 3,300, a WTO official said on Wednesday.

Health World Organization country representative Custodia Mandlhate was quoted by local media New Ziana as saying that a total of 65,700 cases had also been reported since the first outbreak in August last year.

She said fears were that about 32,000 new cases would be recorded in the near future if little was done to control the disease.

She said cholera was

more prone during the rainy season, and with the current rains, more cases could be recorded if little was done to avert the outbreak.

"Another worrying development is that the outbreaks have shifted from urban areas to rural areas," Mandlhate said.

She said the war against cholera had been compounded by the lack of water treatment chemicals, medicines, drugs and other resources. Brain drain in the health sector, she added, had also crippled the campaign.

The current cholera outbreak has been the worst ever pandemic to hit the country in recent years.

700 civilians in Tamil area flee Sri Lankan "safety zone"

Colombo, 5 Feb—At least 700 civilians fled Sri Lanka's northern war zone to a governmentcontrolled area the military said.

At least 700 civilians fled Sri Lanka's northern war zone to a governmentcontrolled area on Thursday, the military said, a day after the United Nations said 52 people had been killed by shelling.

Fighting continued as

the army has closed in on the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE) holding out in a 300-sq km (115-sq mile) slice of jungle in the northeast, aiming to end one of Asia's longest-running conflicts.

"About 700 civilians had come to a militarycontrolled area today morning and many more are coming," said military spokesman Brigadier Udaya Nanayakkara

Some 70,000 people have been killed in the fighting since the conflict began in 1983.

The United Nations said on Wednesday at least 52 people were killed and 80 wounded by shelling in the war zone.

Aid agencies have expressed concern about 250,000 people trapped in Tiger-held areas, but the government says the number is about half that. Internet

California, 5 Feb-A baby boy has been born in California with 24 perfectly formed fingers and toes - six on each hand and foot.

Being born with additional digits - or being a "polydactyl" - is not wholly uncommon, but it is unusual to see the condition on every extremity.

The Bay Area hospital

said staff did not notice the unique. extra digits on ultrasound scans - and did not even spot it when Kamani Hubbard was born.

It was his father, Kris, who realized his son had some unusual features.

Israel seizes Gaza-bound aid ship

GAZA, 5 Feb—A Lebanese ship carrying aid for Gaza was stopped by the Israeli navy and is being escorted into port, Israeli Defence Minister Ehud Barak says.

eight activists and journalists, as well as the former Greek-Catholic archbishop of Jerusalem, Monsignor Hilarion Capucci, who had served time in an Israeli jail in the 1970s for his membership of the Palestine Liberation Organisation (PLO).

The Israeli military denied troops had fired at the ship. "No gunshots were fired on board during the boarding and capture of the cargo boat," it said.—Internet

Study says chemicals in skin cream, floss may lower fertility

Los Angeles, 5 Feb—Chemicals presence of chemicals such as found in a wide range of household products, including nonstick pans and skin creams, may make it harder for some women to get pregnant, a new study shows.

Researchers led by Chunyuan Fei, Angeles, studied data on 1,240 women and found those with higher levels of fluorine-containing compounds in their blood took longer to conceive. The study is published in this month's issue of the medical journal Human Reproduction.

The compounds, known as perfluorinated chemicals or PFCs, may interfere with hormones that are involved in reproduction, Fei wrote in the study. The father's sperm quality may also be affected by the chemicals and contribute to the problem, he said.

The researchers are the first to study the link between infertility and the ing PFOs.—Internet

Japanese scientists find archaean genes

Токуо, 5 Feb — Јараnese scientists say they have made the world's first discovery of genes, in jigsaw-like pieces,

nations of split tRNA. taken from an archaean living in a hot spring.

The Keio University researchers led by Professor Akio Kanai said their findings are expected to lead to an explanation of the origin and evolution of genes since archaeans, unicellular organisms, are one of the earliest forms of life on Earth.

The researchers said they discovered combinations of 3 individual RNAs produced from separate genes can generate transfer RNA that are essential for decoding the genomic information during protein biosynthesis.

The scientists said they also discovered, through computational analysis and experimental verification, different tRNA genes are produced by various combi-

"It is hard to believe that long functional genes existed from the early time of ancient life. It may be possible that, as in the tRNA genes we've found, long genes may have evolved from the combination of short genes through trial and error," said graduate student Kosuke Fujishima, the first author of the research.

The scientists said their discovery represents a very rare phenomenon found in the deep-branching archaean and suggests that in ancient life, short genes could have been used in multiple combinations.

The study is reported in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Science.

Zen's slower breathing may lower pain

Montreal, 5 Feb -Canadian researchers found those trained in Zen meditation less sensitive to pain than nonmeditators.

The study, published in Psychosomatic Medicine, not only found 18 percent pain reduction in meditators but suggests people who meditate seem to lower pain sensitivity through slower breathing — 12 breaths per minute versus an average of 15 breaths for non-meditators.

"Slower breathing certainly coincided with reduced pain and may influence pain by keeping the body in a relaxed state," study co-author Joshua Grant of the University of Montreal said in a statement.

"While previous studies have found that the emotional aspects of pain are influenced by meditation, we found that the sensation itself, as well as the emotional response, is different in meditators."

Smoke, alcohol combo socks liver

BIRMINGHAM, 5 Feb — US researchers say comsecond-hand bining smoke along with alcohol raises the risk of liver dis-

The animal study, published in Free Radical Biology & Medicine, finds the combination of secondhand smoke and alcohol results in many more fibrosis proteins in the liver that either smoke alone or alcohol alone. Fibrosis proteins may cause fibrosis — scar tissue in the liver — that may lead to the development of the disease of the liver known as cirrhosis.

"This new data is a significant finding consider-*Internet* | ing the combined effect of

alcohol and cigarette smoke exposures, and the implications for public health," study co-author Shannon Bailey of the University of Alabama at Birmingham says in a statement.

Researchers at the University of Alabama at Birmingham and the University of California, Davis, researchers exposed some mice to smoky air in a laboratory enclosure and had controls breath filtered air. The mice exposed to alcohol were given a liquid diet containing ethanol — the intoxicating ingredient in alcohol drinks, the study says.

The mice exposed to

secondhand smoke and given alcohol had an 110 percent increase in liver fibrosis, the study found. Internet



Experts identify key area of bird flu virus

Paris, 5 Feb—Two teams of researchers say they have identified a key area of the H5N1 bird flu virus which appears to be involved in its replication and hope the discovery could speed up the design of new drugs.

In separate articles published in the journal Nature, the teams from France and China said the region of the virus could be an important target for the development of new drugs.

A member of the Chinese team said they had examined three proteins in the area and found they were involved in binding the virus to human cells and in virus replication.

It is feared the H5N1 virus could kill millions in a pandemic if it ever mutated to transmit efficiently among people. There are currently two drugs, Roche's Tamiflu and GlaxoSmithKline Plc's Relenza, which experts hope can be used to fight H5N1.

Since 2003, the virus has infected 404 people in 15 countries and killed 254 of them. It has killed or forced the destruction of more than 300 million birds as it spread to 61 countries in Asia, the Midde East, Europe and Africa.—*Internet*



Summary of observations recorded at 09:30 hr MST: During the past 24 hours, weather has been partly cloudy in Taninthayi Division and generally fair in the remaining States and Divisions. Night temperatures were (3°C) to (4°C) below February average temperatures in Rakhine State, upper Sagaing and Magway Divisions, (6°C) to (7°C) below February average temperatures in Chin State and Bago Divisions, (3°C) above February average temperatures in Mandalay Division and about February average temperatures in the remaining areas. The significant night temperatures were Hakha (-1°C), Loilem (0°C), Ann (2°C) Pinlaung (3°C) and Namhsan (4°C).

Maximum temperature on 4-2-2009 was 91°F. Minimum temperature on 5-2-2009 was 59°F. Relative humidity at (09:30) hours MST on 5-2-2009 was 66%. Total sunshine hours on 4-2-2009 was (9.4) hrs approx.

Rainfall on 5-2-2009 was (Nil) at Mingaladon, Kaba-Aye and Central Yangon. Total rainfall since 1-1-2009 was (Nil) at Mingaladon, Kaba-Aye and Central Yangon. Maximum wind speed at Yangon (Kaba-Aye) was (4) mph from Northwest at (21:30) hours MST on 4-2-2009.

Bay inference: Weather is partly cloudy in the Andaman Sea and South Bay and fair elsewhere in the Bay of Bengal.
