Inuit trails represent complex social network spanning Canadian Arctic

OTTAWA, 15 Feb — Inuit trails are more than merely means to get from A to B. In reality, they represent a complex social network spanning the Canadian Arctic and are a distinctive aspect of the Inuit cultural identity.

And what is remarkable is that the Inuit's vast geographic knowledge has been passed through many generations by oral means, without the use of maps or any other written documentation. These findings are by Dr. Claudio Aporta from Carleton University in Ottawa, Canada.

Using a combination of historical documents, ethnographic research, geographic tools including GPS, GIS and Google Earth, as well as a recent journey following Inuit along a traditional trail, Dr. Aporta shows the geographic extent of the Inuit's sophisticated

Iran official to US: Chess better game than boxing

TEHERAN, 15 Feb—When it comes to dealing with Iran, the country's parliamentary speaker said the United States would be better served taking up chess than continuing to box, the country's official news agency reported on Saturday.

His comments come at a time when the new administration of President Barack Obama has signaled a new willingness to engage Iran, whose relations with the previous administration were long strained.

Obama last week pledged to rethink Washington's relationship with Teheran.

"The United States needs to play on a chess set (with Iran) instead of playing in a boxing ring," IRNA quoted Ali Larijani as telling a group of visiting reporters in Teheran on Saturday.

And at his inauguration last month, Obama said his administration would reach out to rival states, saying "we will extend a hand if you are willing to unclench your fist."

Iranian President

Mahmoud Ahmadinejad has responded by saying Iran would welcome talks with the United States — but only if there was mutual respect.

Iranian officials have said that would mean that the United States needs to stop making "baseless" accusations against the Islamic Republic in order to pave the way for talks between the two longtime adversaries. The US accuses Iran of supporting terrorism and secretly seeking to build nuclear weapons — charges Iran denies.

One British soldier killed in Afghanistan

LONDON, 15 Feb—Britain's Defence Ministry announced on Saturday that a Royal Marine was killed in southern Afghanistan.

The marine, from 45 Commando, died of a gun shot wound after coming under fire in Helmand Province, a spokesman for the ministry said.

He was in a patrol supporting a bomb disposal team, the spokesman said, and died while being flown to hospital.

He is the seventh British serviceman to die in Afghanistan so far this year and the 144th British casualty since the 2001 invasion.

There are more than 8,000 British troops stationed in Afghanistan.

US supplies via Russia to start soon

MOSCOW, 15 Feb—The shipment of US military supplies for Afghanistan through Russia will begin soon, news agencies quoted Russia's foreign minister as saying on Saturday.

"The transit will take place literally within days," Sergey Lavrov told TV Tsentr, according to the *Interfax*, *ITAR-Tass* and *RIA-Novosti* agencies.

Israel rules out Gaza truce unless soldier freed

JERUSALEM, 15 Feb—Israel said on Saturday it would not agree to a ceasefire with the Hamas rulers of the Gaza Strip unless an Israeli soldier held by the Islamists was freed. Prime Minister Ehud Olmert's office said in a statement: "The Prime Minister's position is that Israel will not reach understandings on a truce before the release of Gilad Shalit."

Israel wants to tie any

ceasefire deal with Hamas in Gaza to the release of soldier Shalit, held captive in the Palestinian enclave since 2006 when he was kidnapped in a cross-border raid.

Egypt is mediating a long-term ceasefire between Israel and Hamas. Israeli media reported significant headway had been achieved in the indirect talks.

Hamas spokesman in Gaza Fawzi Barhoum told *Reuters* that the Egyptian-mediated talks were stalled by disagreement on the duration of the ceasefire. Israel wants a permanent ceasefire while Hamas favours an 18-month truce that could be extended. "Once this obstacle is overcome an announcement would be made," Barhoum said.

Roadside bomb kills four Afghan police

KABUL, 15 Feb—Four Afghan police were killed as their van hit a mine in Afghanistan's southern Kandahar Province, the former stronghold of Taliban, provincial police chief Matiullah Qati said on Saturday.

"The police were on routine patrol in Dand district on Friday night when a mine planted by militants was exploded by remote control killing the four policemen on the spot," Qati told *Xinhua*.

Roadside bomb kills district chief in E Afghanistan

KABUL, 15 Feb—A roadside bomb struck the vehicle of a district chief in Khost Province, east Afghanistan on Saturday, killing the district chief and his two bodyguards, an official said.

"The mine planted by enemies struck the car of Badi Zaman Sabari, the district chief of Nadir Khahkot, killing him on the spot and wounding two of his body guards," a local official Gul Qasim Jihadyar told *Xinhua*.

He said that the incident occurred at 8:30 am local time (0400GMT) when Zamab Sabari was on his way to office.

Mobile phone industry gears up for Barca gathering

BARCELONA, 15 Feb—The mobile phone industry recently reached the milestone of its four billionth connection worldwide, but the cold winds of economic crisis will chill celebrations at the sector's biggest annual gathering this week.

The majority of the planet is now texting, calling or surfing on mobile handsets and the potential for growth in developing countries is undiminished — 2.7 billion are still without a connection. Yet despite this and the relatively recession-proof business of providing tel-

ephone connections, the industry as a whole is bracing for a downturn and anticipating a fall in investment.

As well as the launch of new products and industry initiatives, the crisis is set to dominate the four-day Mobile World Congress, the world's biggest industry event, which kicks off on Monday in Barcelona.

"For a long time people believed that telecoms would be spared, but as it is a global crisis everyone is going to be affected," said Thomas Husson, an analyst for research group Forrester.—*Internet*

Glaxo to cut prices for poor countries

NEW YORK, 15 Feb—Drug maker GlaxoSmithKline PLC says it will cut drug prices to the 50 poorest countries in the world and use 20 percent of its profits from those countries to build health clinics and other infrastructure, according to published reports.

The company's chief executive, Andrew Witty, also is proposing that drug companies, nonprofit groups and others donate their patents related to neglected tropical diseases to a common pool that could be used to speed development of new drugs, the *Wall Street Journal* said.

Witty said prices will be cut for the poorest countries so that they are no higher than 25 percent of the price in developed countries, according to the report.

Glaxo, the second biggest drug maker by sales, generates about \$43 million annually in revenue from those countries. About \$1.5 million to \$2.5 million would be generated for the clinics, Witty told the *Journal*.

HIV drugs are already sold at not-for-profit prices in those countries, but the prices will be cut if the drugs aren't already sold at prices below the threshold of 25 percent, reports said.

India pre-poll budget 'to have populist streak'

NEW DELHI, 15 Feb—India's ruling Congress party will present on Monday a pre-election mini-budget that will seek to shield the economy from the global slump and provide relief for the poor, analysts say.

The interim budget, which will form the economic bedrock of the party's campaign for general elections that must be held by mid-May, will aim to be a please-all document with a populist streak, economists say. "Their aim is to get re-elected," Deepak Lalwani, India Director of

London-based brokerage Astaire and Partners, told *AFP*. The Congress-led government owed its unexpected election win in 2004 to India's impoverished masses who turfed out the Hindu nationalist Bharatiya Janata Party after they felt bypassed by an economic boom. "There's a need to sustain our foreign trade, revive foreign investment and generate domestic demand in order to maintain our growth rates," said acting finance minister Pranab Mukherjee, spelling out the government's goals.—*Internet*

Drilling in the dust changes lives in south Sudan

MIRINDANYI, (Sudan) 15 Feb—It seems such a simple task: pumping the handle of a water borehole up and down until the clear and cool liquid splashes into the plastic container.

And in the dry and dusty southern Sudanese village of Mirindanyi, they have been celebrating doing just that since their pump was installed last year.

But it was not always this way. Beforehand, "it took two hours to the river to collect the water, then two hours back," said Floris Fazir, pausing to heave a 20-litre container on her head.

"In the dry season, we got the water from a scraped well on the river bed, and that was dirty. We would get sick often. But water from the borehole is sweet to drink."

Southern Sudan, an oil-rich but grossly underdeveloped region about the size of Spain and Portugal, is slowly recovering after years of bloody north-south civil war.

Obama to sign stimulus bill Tuesday in Denver

WASHINGTON, 15 Feb—President Barack Obama will sign the \$787 billion economic stimulus bill on Tuesday in Denver, a White House official said on Saturday.

Obama on Saturday hailed congressional approval of the stimulus bill as a "major milestone on our road to recovery" and vowed to move swiftly to set the plan in motion.

"I will sign this legislation into law shortly, and we'll begin making the immediate investments necessary to put

people back to work," Obama said in his weekly radio address from Chicago after his biggest legislative victory since taking office on 20 January.

The Senate cast the final vote, 60-38, late Fri-

day, hours after the House of Representatives passed an identical bill, 246-183, capping weeks of arguing over how to best jolt the economy out of deep recession.

Two Florida banks temporarily halting foreclosures

MIAMI, 15 Feb—Two Florida banks are joining some of the country's largest lenders in temporarily halting foreclosures as the federal government tackles the housing crisis.

On Friday, Fannie Mae, Freddie Mac and major banks JPMorgan Chase & Co, Morgan Stanley, Citigroup Inc and Bank of America Corp said they were halting foreclosures for at least a month. Coral Gables-based BankUnited and Fort

Lauderdale-based Bank Atlantic followed suit, all saying they hoped to learn more soon about President Barack Obama's \$50 billion plan to keep more people from losing their homes. Obama is expected to provide more details in an Arizona speech on Wednesday.

"We want to help people remain in their homes," said Ramiro Ortiz, BankUnited's president and chief executive officer.

Groups question Hamas on 'extra-judicial' killings

GAZA CITY, 15 Feb—The day after Israeli tanks entered Gaza last month, masked Palestinians opened fire on the al-Najar family outside their home, killing the father and wounding 10 others, including two teenage girls and a 78-year-old grandmother.

Ammar al-Najar, 25, a son of the victim, didn't know who the gunmen were but he said the family supports the Fatah movement and had trouble previously with Gaza's ruling Hamas group.

"My father ... tried to talk to them, but they didn't talk. They just started shooting," he said. The men wore no identifying symbols, he said. International and Palestinian human rights organizations say there was a rash of shootings and beatings across Gaza during Israel's offensive, voicing suspicions the Islamic militants of Hamas used wartime chaos to target enemies, including activists from the rival Fatah.—*Internet*

Housing affordability reaches five-year high in New Zealand

WELLINGTON, 15 Feb — Housing affordability in New Zealand reached a five-year high, according to a survey released on Sunday.

Housing affordability improved to its best level in five years in January due to a fall in house prices and sharp reductions in mortgage interest costs, according to a monthly survey by interest.co.nz website.

The website's editor Bernard Hickey said it was predicting housing

would be affordable again for most New Zealanders by the end of 2009.

Meanwhile, the Sunday *Star-Times* reported that mortgage sales listings had increased in the past year on two top real estate websites — TradeMe and realestate.co.nz.

Mortgagee sales listing on TradeMe had increased from 32 to 106 between January 2008 and January 2009, and realestate.co.nz said listings on its site had increased from 95 to 285.

One in every 200 homes listed for sale on realestate.co.nz was on the hock after being forced into foreclosure by the mortgage holder.

Around 8 percent of mortgage listings on realestate.co.nz were for houses worth more than 1 million NZ dollars (\$20,000 US dollars).

One pilot killed in helicopter crash in England

LONDON, 15 Feb — A pilot was thought to be killed on Saturday afternoon in a helicopter crash in South Yorkshire, England, according to a report of SKY Television.

The aircraft came down close to Sandtoft airfield near the M180 junction with the A18 outside Doncaster, the report said.

It was thought to have been traveling either to or from Leeds Bradford airport. Both South Yorkshire and Humberside fire and rescue services are attending the scene, it said.

SKY quoted sources as saying that it was the pilot's solo flight.

China's insurance agents report 250 mln yuan profit in 2008

BEIJING, 15 Feb — China Insurance Regulatory Commission (CIRC) said on Saturday the country's insurance agents have gained 255 million yuan (36.76 million US dollars) of profit in 2008, up 30.81 year-on-year. According to a market report issued by CIRC, China has 2,445 insurance agents, 136,634 proxies and 2.6 million sales people by the end of 2008.

About 82 percent, or 804.35 billion yuan, of the insurance premiums received by Chinese insurers were acquired with the help from these intermediaries, the report said. By 2008, the registered capital of insurance agents reached 6.8 billion yuan, and their aggregate assets hit 9.5 billion yuan, the report said.—Xinhua

Six killed in train, bus collision in western Ukraine

KIEV, 15 Feb — Six people were killed and 11 others injured on Saturday when a train crashed into a passenger bus in western Ukraine, officials said.

"The accident took place near the village of Proshovo, about 25 kilometers from the Ternopil region in western Ukraine around noon," Igor Krol, the Ukrainian Emergencies Ministry's spokesman, told reporters.

"When a passenger bus with about 23 people on board attempted to cross an unguarded railway crossing and was struck by the train," he said.

"Five people died at the scene, and the sixth person died later at a hospital, another eleven people were hospitalized," he added.—Xinhua

Kidnapped Sri Lankan held by Abu Sayyaf rebels

COTABATO (Philippines), 15 Feb — A Sri Lankan peace worker abducted in the troubled southern Philippines is now in the hands of Abu Sayyaf rebels, police said on Sunday.

Umar Jaleel, a 34-year-old and member of the Non-violent Peaceforce, has been turned over by his captors to Abu Sayyaf bandits under a Furiigi Indama in Basilan, said Benzali Jabarani, a local police commander.

"There's no ransom demand yet from the kidnapers. Our policemen are coordinating with the soldiers on the ground," Jabarani said.

Nine gunmen seized the Sri Lankan early Friday morning from his residence in Lamitan, Basilan Province. The Filipino caretaker of the house, Gil Tura, managed to escape the abduction.

Umar Jaleel's colleagues in the Nonviolent Peaceforce said they will not pay any ransom in exchange for his freedom.

Nonviolent Peaceforce is a nonpartisan unarmed peacekeeping force composed of trained civilians from around the world, according to the organization's profile. The group has been monitoring the peace process in the restive region of Mindanao.—Xinhua

Anti-terror police seize three vans headed for Gaza

LONDON, 15 Feb — British police said on Saturday they had seized three vans that were to form part of a 100 vehicle aid convoy headed for Gaza as a result of an anti-terror raid in the north-west of England.

Lancashire police said they were searching five houses in the town of Burnley on Saturday after arresting nine men under anti-terrorism laws

on a motorway near Preston on Friday. Six of the men have been released and the remaining three are still in custody. Police can hold them without charge until Sunday night.

The convoy had been organised by the pro-Palestinian organisation Viva Palestina and left central London on Saturday, the group's website said. It said volunteers

planned to drive 5,000 miles (8,000 km) through France, Spain, Morocco, Algeria, Tunisia, Libya and Egypt where they had hoped to cross the border at Rafah into Gaza on 2 March.

It said the vehicles, which include a fire engine and ambulances, were carrying clothes, blankets and children's toys.

Inventor of Taser stun gun dies

LOS ANGELES, 15 Feb — Jack Cover, an aerospace scientist who invented the controversial Taser stun gun now widely used by police, has died in southern California at the age of 88.

Mr Cover was suffering from Alzheimer's disease and died of pneumonia at a retirement home in Mission Viejo yesterday. Taser guns use

electrical shocks to subdue unruly offenders, which supporters say helps reduce violence. Critics, however, have linked the device to a number of deaths.

"Jack was one of the most influential inventors of modern times who affected the lives of hundreds of thousands of law enforcement officers, citizens and even criminal

suspects," CEO and founder of Taser International, Rick Smith, said.

"Jack's dream of reducing violence through the Taser technology was realised since his earliest invention of the original Taser ECD," Mr Smith said. "Jack served as our chief scientist in our founding days at Taser International and he will be greatly missed."—Internet

US Marine kills himself at mom's farm

BRIDGEWATER, 15 Feb — A US Marine who had served twice in Iraq went AWOL and headed to Canada, where he shot himself at his parent's llama farm in Nova Scotia, police said. Lance Cpl. Timothy Scott is believed to have crossed the border carrying a gun he stole from his father's home in Norfolk, Va. Canwest News Service reported. He killed himself on Thursday after his mother called the Royal Canadian Mounted Police to report that her son had come to the house with a gun.

Scott had been posted AWOL at Camp Lejeune, NC, after he disappeared on Tuesday. In a statement confirming Scott's identity, officers at Camp Lejeune said he enlisted in 2005 and had done two tours of duty in Iraq, the Jacksonville, NC, Daily News said.—Internet

Taleban release Chinese engineer

ISLAMABAD, 15 Feb — Taleban militants in north-western Pakistan have released a Chinese engineer held hostage for more than five months. A Taleban spokesman was quoted as saying the engineer was freed as a "goodwill gesture" to the Chinese.

The engineer, Long Xiaowei, arrived at China's embassy in Islamabad on Sunday and was in good health, a Chinese official said. Mr Long was captured in August in the Dir region with a Chinese colleague.

The colleague escaped in October, a Taleban spokesman said at the time. A Pakistani guard and driver who had been captured with the two engineers were recovered at the same time.—Internet

Man survives being run over by train

A man has survived being run over by a train after drunkenly falling asleep between the tracks.

Jens Mauer passed out on the train line after reportedly stumbling as he attempted to cross the tracks in Brand, eastern Germany.

The 41-year-old remained comatose as an express train passed just inches from his head, reports Ananova.

Station staff managed to pull the man to safety and he was later found to be

five times over the legal drink drive limit.

Mauer was treated at the scene by paramedics for minor cuts and bruises.



Woman jailed over 24,000-euro parking fine

An Austrian woman has begun a 500-day jail sentence for ignoring parking tickets and failing to pay a cumulative fine of around 24,000 euros (21,440 pound), police said.

They said the 38-year-old civil servant from the southern city of Graz was jailed after ignoring 700 attempts by local authorities to notify her of the fines over a 2-year period. "Of course we have had people ignore three, four, five or even 10 reminders, but 700... that is unheard of," said police official Herbert Mattersdorfer.

A police spokesman said that under Austrian law, the woman could only spend 42 days at a time in jail for this offence, so her term would be split into several stints behind bars.

Granny, 68, fails 771 times of driving test

A South Korean grandma who had failed her driving test 771 times was reportedly to try again next time.

The 68-year-old, identified only as Cha, has taken the test almost every working day since 2005 in the southwestern city of Jeonju. She failed again Monday for the 771st time.

A police sergeant supervising the test in the city's Deokjingu district called it a record-breaking number there.

Local media said that Cha carried a handcart to sell food and household items door to door at apartment complexes, but she wants to get a car for her business.

Pythons found after brief escape from Calif home

It's pretty difficult for a 23-foot, 130-pound python to hide.

The orange reticulated python, the world's longest snake species, and a second python, measuring 13 feet, escaped from a terrarium in their owner's home in San Luis Obispo.

Police warned residents that the snakes were large enough to make meals of young children or pets.

But both had been captured.

More than 20 mummies found in ancient Egyptian tomb



An Egyptian archaeological mission has found about two dozen mummies in an ancient tomb of the Pharaonic era in the Saqqara area south of Cairo.

The mummies were unearthed in the tomb, which lies to the west of Zoser's step pyramid and dates back to the 6th dynasty in ancient Egypt, or about 4,300 BC, said the official MENA news agency.

According to MENA, the archaeological team, led by Secretary General of the Egyptian Supreme Council for Antiquities Zahi Hawas, found five holes with each containing four mummies, one of which of a dog. They also found some skeletons and a 180-cm-long casket contained the mummy of a man named Badi Harri who lived in 640 BC, Hawas was quoted as saying.

Kyemon: 14-2-2009

Humans and chimpanzees genetically more similar than one yeast variety is to another

Gothenburg, 15 Feb — There may be greater genetic variation between different yeasts of the same species than between humans and chimpanzees. This is one of the findings of a study from the University of

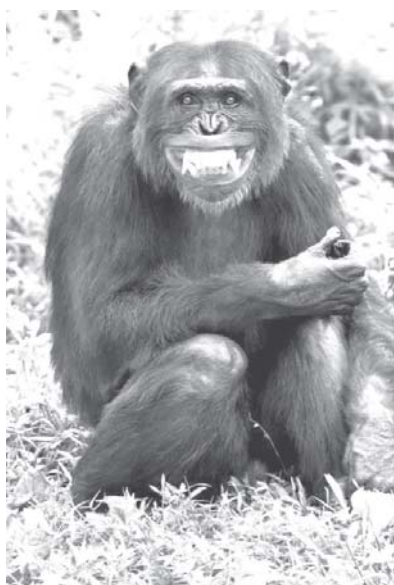
Gothenburg that is being published in the scientific journal Nature. This study heralds a new era in evolutionary genetics research--the mapping of an individual's DNA.

The mapping of the entire yeast genome in 1996 marked the beginning of a revolution in biological and medical research. The human genome was mapped in 2001, and by now the number of characterised species is approaching 1000, most of which are bacteria. The next advance is only a few years away — mapping the

genetic evolution of individual multicellular animals, including humans.

"We shall then be able to identify the genetic causes of human disease and to understand how the process of evolution works when species are being formed," says Anders Blomberg, professor at the Department of Cell and Molecular Biology, University of Gothenburg.

Anders Blomberg and his colleague Jonas Warringer are publishing a paper in the journal Nature, that to some extent leads to a new era in evolutionary and functional genetics research. The lowly yeast is, once again, leading the way.—Internet



Climate change likely to be more devastating than experts predicted

Carnegie Institution, 15 Feb — Without decisive action, global warming in the 21st century is likely to accelerate at a much faster pace and cause more environmental damage than predicted, according to a leading member of the Nobel Prize-winning Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change.

IPCC scientist Chris Field of Stanford University and the Carnegie Institution for Science points to recent studies showing that, in a business-as-usual world, higher temperatures could ignite tropical forests and melt the Arctic tundra, releasing billions of tons of greenhouse gas that could raise global

temperatures even more—a vicious cycle that could spiral out of control by the end of the century.

"There is a real risk that human-caused climate change will accelerate the release of carbon dioxide from forest and tundra ecosystems, which have

been storing a lot of carbon for thousands of years," said Field, a professor of biology and of environmental Earth system science at Stanford, and a senior fellow at Stanford's Woods Institute for the Environment.—Internet

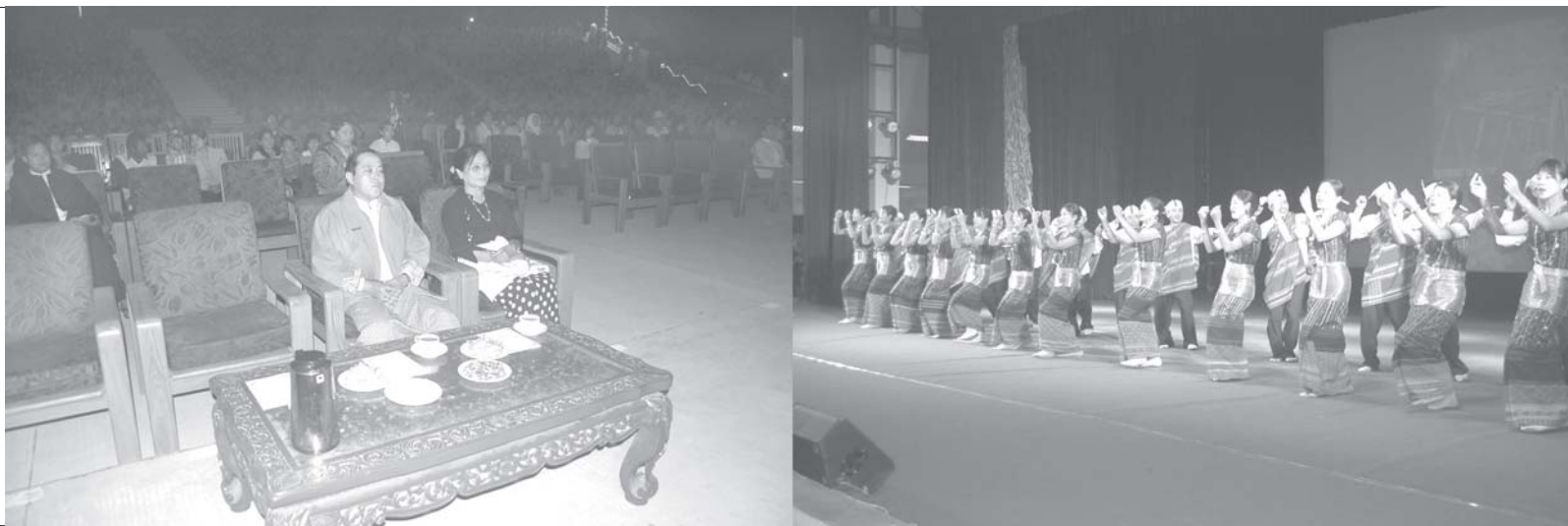

West risks repeating Soviet mistakes in Afghanistan

ALI MARDAN (Afghanistan), 15 Feb —The foreign warplanes swooped in just as the Afghan village of Ali Mardan was celebrating a wedding.

Bombs slammed into the crowded village square, killing 30 men, women and children. After the smoke cleared and the dead were buried, all the able-bodied men left alive took up arms against the invaders. That was 1982 and the warplanes belonged to the Soviet Union, but 20 years after the last Soviet soldier left Afghanistan on Sunday, US and NATO troops are all too often making the same mistakes and could run the same risk of being driven out.

Brazil launches "AIDS" campaign on middle-aged women

RIO DE JANEIRO, 15 Feb—The Brazillian Ministry of Health launched on Friday a new campaign against AIDS, which focuses on middle-aged women.

The decision to target at this particular group was due to sharp increase of the AIDS cases among middle-aged women in the country, said the ministry.

The number of Brazillian women aged 50 and up infected with HIV increased threefold in the last 10 years, from 3.7 cases in 1996 to 11.6 cases for every 100,000 women in 2006, according to the ministry. Most of the infected women in this group are married or in stable relationships, it said.—MNA/Xinhua

Japan's Iraqi reconstruction aid mission formally ends with ceremony

NAGOYA, 15 Feb—Japan formally ended its five-year reconstruction aid operations in Iraq with a ceremony on Sunday at an Air Self-Defense Force base in Aichi Prefecture commemorating the return of ASDF personnel from Kuwait.

The ASDF members had carried out withdrawal-related tasks at a Kuwaiti base from early December after Defence Minister Yasukazu Hamada issued an order in late November for the return to Japan of a contingent of airmen who had airlifted goods and personnel for multinational forces and the United Nations to and from Iraq.

The personnel in charge of the pullout work, totaling about 130 members, started returning to the ASDF's Komaki base in January in groups using commercial flights and all of them had come back to the base by Saturday after conducting tasks such as clearing tents and disposing of equipment.

About 450 people, including family members of the withdrawal unit personnel, attended the ceremony to welcome the ASDF members home.—Internet

US officers probed on Iraq rebuilding—"NY Times"

NEW YORK, 15 Feb—US officials looking into irregularities in the early portion of the 125 billion US dollars US-led effort to rebuild Iraq have expanded the inquiry to include senior US military officers who oversaw the programme, *The New York Times* reported on its website. Citing senior

government officials with whom it conducted interviews, as well as court documents, the *Times* reported that investigators had subpoenaed the personal bank records of a colonel, now retired, in charge of reconstruction contracting in Iraq in 2003 and 2004, when the operation expanded greatly in scope to repair Iraq's infrastructure.

Investigators were also examining the activities of an Air Force lieutenant colonel who was a senior contracting officer in Baghdad in 2004, the *Times* said citing two federal officials involved in the inquiry.

"Buy American" provisions to hurt US economy

WASHINGTON, 15 Feb—The US Consumer Electronics Association (CEA) warned on Friday the "Buy American" provisions in the economic stimulus package would hurt the US economy and lead to a trade war.

"The 'Buy American' provisions in the stimulus bill will signal to our trading partners around the world that the United States is returning to the bad old days of protectionism and economic nationalism," CEA President and CEO Gary Shapiro said in a statement.

The US Congress has passed the 787-billion-US-dollar stimulus package. Some provisions in the bill prohibit the use of foreign iron, steel, and manufactured goods in public works projects funded by the stimulus plan.

"Rather than stimulate the American economy, these provisions will lead to retaliation from abroad and cost precious jobs in the United States," warned Shapiro.

He said the promise that the "Buy American" provisions keep with the letter of World Trade Organization commitments "is a meaningless gesture." "It contradicts recent statements by both President Obama and G-20 leaders to avoid protectionism, which exacerbate the global economic crisis," said Shapiro. "The lessons of Smoot-Hawley and the Great Depression are clear — if we close our borders to international trade and artificially prop up our own industries, we deepen the global recession and further make ourselves vulnerable to a trade war," he added.

100 kilos of heroin seized in Turkey

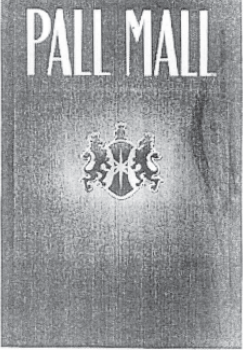
ANKARA, 15 Feb—Turkish security forces confiscated 100 kilos of heroin in an operation conducted in eastern Turkey on Saturday, the semi-official *Anatolia* news agency reported.

Acting on a tip-off, the security forces stopped a truck in Ercis town of eastern province of Van on way to Istanbul, according to the report.

Upon a search conducted in the truck, the security forces found a total of 100 kilos of heroin hidden in separate components of the truck, said the report, adding that the driver of the truck was taken into custody. Turkey is a key transit route for smuggling drugs from Asia and the Middle East to markets in western Europe.—MNA/Xinhua

Italy police warn of Skype threat

ROME, 15 Feb—Criminals in Italy are increasingly making phone calls over the Internet in order to avoid getting caught through mobile phone intercepts, police say.

Officers in Milan say organized crime, arms and drugs traffickers, and prostitution rings are turning to Skype in order to frustrate investigators. The police say Skype’s encryption system is a secret which the company refuses to share with the authorities. Investigators have become increasingly reliant on wiretaps in recent years. Customs and tax police in Milan have sounded the alarm.

They overheard a suspected cocaine trafficker telling an accomplice to switch to Skype in order to get details of a 2kg (4.4lb) drug consignment. Use of wiretaps by prosecutors in Italy has grown exponentially in recent years. Investigators say intercepts of telephone calls have become an essential tool of the police, who spend millions of dollars each year tracking down crime through wiretaps of landlines and mobile phones.

First new gout drug in 40 years approved

DEERFIELD, 15 Feb—The US Food and Drug Administration has approved a new drug for gout, the first new prescription for the painful condition in 40 years, its maker says.

Takeda Pharmaceuticals North America Inc of Deerfield, Ill, said on Friday its Uloric drug has been approved by the FDA for the more than 5 million US victims of gout, a malady characterized by intense pain, inflammation and warmth in affected joints, the *Chicago Tribune* reported.

The newspaper said most doctors use well-established generic treatments such as allopurinol for gout, in which high levels of uric acid in the body are responsible for an inflammatory form of arthritis most common in men older than 40.

Takeda said Uloric reduces patients’ uric acid levels to low enough levels to reduce the number of painful flare-ups.—Internet

Four shot dead in alleged killing spree

ROCHESTER, 15 Feb—A former hospital employee in New York went on a killing spree on Saturday that claimed four lives, two of them former colleagues of the suspect, police said.

Frank Garcia was arrested in Ontario County after he allegedly gunned down Christopher and Kim Glatz, 45 and 38, in their home outside Rochester, *CNN* reported. Neighbours said Garcia had been going door to door asking for the couple.

Investigators said Garcia knew all four of his alleged victims, although they did not reveal how close he was to them. Police in Monroe County said the first two victims, Mary Sillman, 23, and Randall Norman, 41, were killed at Lakeside Hospital in Bridgeport, while a third person was shot and wounded. Those shootings occurred before 5 am. The killings in Ontario County were in the afternoon. Sheriff Philip Povero said the shootings were “execution-style.”—Internet

Pregnancy shouldn’t delay cancer diagnosis

HOUSTON, 15 Feb—Young women should not let pregnancy delay diagnosis and treatment of breast cancer, US researchers say. The study findings, published in the journal *Cancer*, indicated pregnancy had no impact on breast cancer survival

after 10 years, but found women who were pregnant had been more likely to be diagnosed with advanced stages of the disease and less likely to get early treatment.

“Breast cancer in young women is a highly aggressive disease, and

it’s important that we study it in hopes of making a difference in terms of treatment,” study first author Dr Beth Beadle of the University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center in Houston said in a statement.

COLOMBO, 15 Feb—A suspected Tamil Tiger rebel hurled a hand grenade at a bus full of war-displaced refugees Saturday, killing a woman and wounding 13 others, the military said.

The bus was attacked in Puliyanakulam village in the north while transporting people who had fled the embattled region for

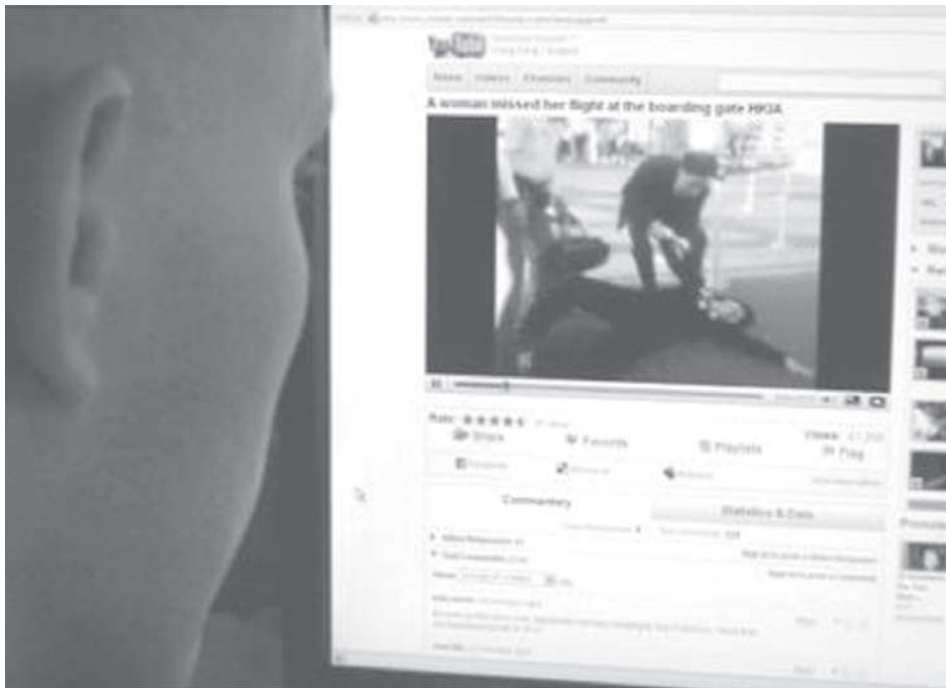
government territory, military spokesman Brig Udaya Nanayakkara said.

Rebel officials could not be contacted for comment. The military’s claim could not be independently verified because independent journalists are barred from the war zone. A 59-year-old woman was killed and the wounded included four children,

Nanayakkara said. The government has accused the Tigers — who have recently lost their main strongholds to government forces and are cornered in a small sliver of coastal land — of holding scores of people as human shields and killing civilians who want to escape. The rebels have denied the allegations.—Internet

Global warming seen worse than predicted

CHICAGO, 15 Feb—The climate is heating up far faster than scientists had predicted, spurred by sharp increases in greenhouse gas emissions from developing countries like China and India, a top climate scientist said on Saturday. “The consequence of that is we are basically looking now at a future climate that is beyond anything that we’ve considered seriously,” Chris Field, a member of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, or IPCC, told the American Association for the Advancement of Science meeting

in Chicago.

Field said “the actual trajectory of climate change is more serious” than any of the climate predictions in the IPCC’s fourth assessment report called “Climate Change 2007.”

He said recent climate studies suggested the continued warming of the planet from greenhouse gas emissions could touch off large, destructive wildfires in tropical rain forests and melt permafrost in the

Arctic tundra, releasing billions of tons of greenhouse gases that could raise global temperatures even more.

“There is a real risk that human-caused climate change will accelerate the release of carbon dioxide from forest and tundra ecosystems, which have been storing a lot of carbon for thousands of years,” Field, of Stanford University and the Carnegie Institution for Science, said in a statement.—INTERNET

Pollution link to asthma in womb

LONDON, 15 Feb — Traffic pollution causes genetic changes in the womb which increase a child’s risk of developing asthma, research suggests.

A study of umbilical cord blood from 56 children found “reprogramming” of a gene associated with exposure to compounds in traffic fumes. The gene was associated with asthma symptoms at age five, the researchers reported in the *PLoS ONE* journal. It is the first time pollution has been shown to influence genes, experts said.

In the study, researchers looked at a gene called *ACSL3*, which is expressed in the lung. They also recorded the mothers’ exposure to polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons (*PAHs*) — a by-product of combustion present in high levels in heavy-traffic areas — during their pregnancy with backpack air

monitors. The researchers found a significant association between chemical changes which control activation of the gene and high levels of maternal *PAH* exposure. Although the finding needs to be confirmed in larger studies, researchers say changes in the *ACSL3* gene may help early diagnosis of pollution-related asthma.—INTERNET

Neanderthal genetic code revealed

WASHINGTON, 15 Feb—International researchers say they have completed a draft of the genetic blueprint of Neanderthals, humans’ primitive cousin.

The scientists say their discovery shows Neanderthals made “very little, if any” contribution to human genes, *USA Today* reported on Saturday. Neanderthals occupied Europe from about 800,000 to 30,000 years ago, the newspaper noted.

Team chief Svante Paabo of Germany’s Max Planck Institute for Evolutionary Anthropology in Leipzig said their findings provide a “good overview” of the Neanderthal genome. “We see this as a tool for future biologists (looking for) what’s really unique to modern humans,” Paabo was quoted by the newspaper as saying.—INTERNET

Study uncovers pre-pregnancy concerns

SOUTHAMPTON, 15 Feb—British researchers say a study they conducted found most women trying to get pregnant are not following dietary recommendations.

The research team

from Britain’s University of Southampton found in a study of 12,500 British women that those attempting to become pregnant were only slightly more likely to follow pre-conception diet tips, the *BBC* reported on Friday.

The study of women ages 20 to 34, focused on their dietary supplement use, physical activity, alcohol consumption, smoking habits and overall diet. A total of 309 participants ultimately became pregnant within three months of the study and, of those, only 5.5 percent had been taking the recommended daily dose of folic acid supplements.—INTERNET

Special light may detect Parkinson’s disease

LONDON, 15 Feb—A light as bright as a million-watt bulb may be able to help identify early signs of Parkinson’s disease, British researchers say.

A Keele University team says the special light of a “super-microscope” could help spot changes in brain cells before Parkinson’s destroyed them, *BBC* reported on Saturday. Researcher Joanna Collingwood told the American Association for the Advancement of Science the technique could mean early treatment for Parkinson’s patients. The researchers used a synchrotron, or Diamond Light Source, which fires particles at just below the speed of light, focusing them into a beam less than a single cell in diameter.—INTERNET

Eto'o pulled a goal back close to half-time and then equalised six

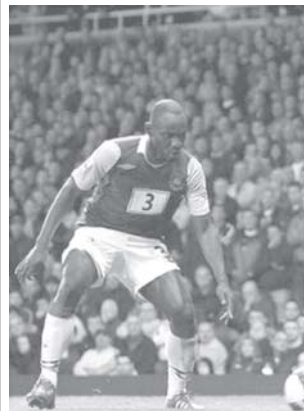
minutes from the end for his 23rd goal of the season but Barcelona's run of ten straight league wins still came to an end.

Global warming 'underestimated'

CHICAGO, 15 Feb—The severity of global warming over the next century will be much worse than previously believed, a leading climate scientist has warned.

Professor Chris Field, an author of a 2007 landmark report on climate change, said future temperatures "will be beyond anything" predicted. Prof Field said the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) report had underestimated the rate of change. He said warming is likely to cause more environmental damage than forecast.

Speaking at the American Science conference in Chicago, Prof Field said fresh data showed greenhouse gas emissions between 2000 and 2007 increased far more rapidly than expected. "We are basically looking now at a future climate that is beyond anything that we've considered seriously in climate policy," he said.

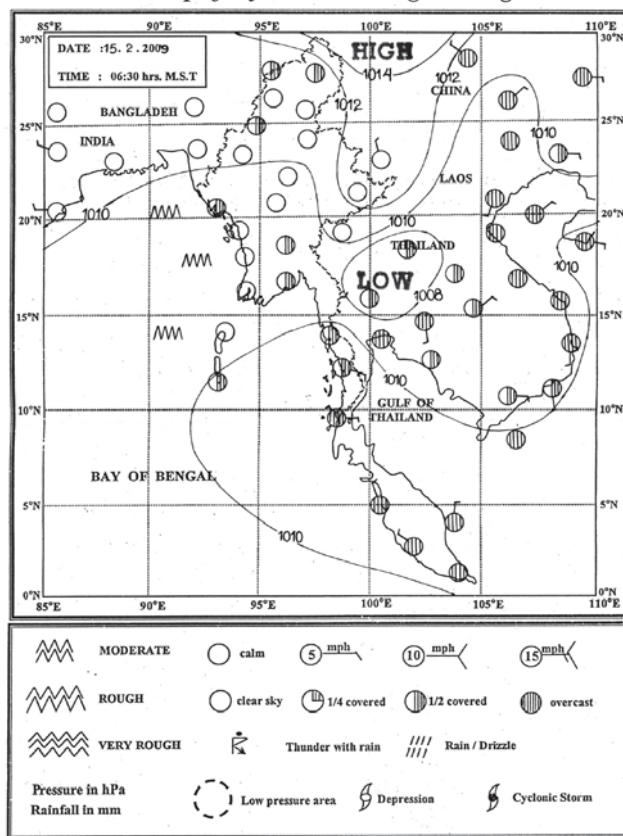

Kawa Township making progress in agricultural farming

Kawa is about nine miles from Inndagaw. On our trip to Kawa Township, we passed through 560 feet long Bago River Bridge (Kawa) that links Bago Township with Kawa Township. Local people are very pleased with the bridge that cost 392 million kyats as they can travel and transport goods to other regions across the nation through the bridge all-year round.

Chairman of Kawa Township Peace and Development Council U Hla Win Aung said, "Our township is 28 miles long and 20 miles wide and has an area of 647.68 square miles or 414,515 acres. It is constituted with six wards, 90 village-tracts and 154

villages with a population of 207,271. It has an area of 206,050 acres of farmlands: 201,856 acres of paddy, 4050 acres of crops, and 144 acres of thatch."

We then visited the 133-acre farmland of U Thaik Soe (a) U Aung Thaik of Zwebar village-tract. In an interview, he said, "I am 36, a graduate. I run 133 acres of farmlands. I have over 30 cattle, two Leya Brand power-tillers, an NC 131 tractor and a Zwe (50) tractor. On average, I make a profit of over three million kyats a year."

Farmer U Po Cho, who has 58 acres of monsoon paddy, 40 acres of green gram and 2.5 acres of ground-

nut, said, "Agricultural farming is our family business. I have a Gaungdong tractor and a Zwe tractor. On average, our family makes an annual profit of about two million kyats. I get agricultural methods from Myanma Agriculture Service and fertilizer from the Township Peace and Development Council. I have a plan to grow summer paddy and cold season crops when there is supply of irrigation water."

Then, we visited the 104-acre summer paddy field of U Myint Soe of Ale Village, Ale Village-tract on Bago-Thongwa Road. He said that he had four

Atlanta flight test evaluates technique for saving fuel and reducing noise in airliners

ATLANTA, 15 Feb — Airline passengers arriving in Atlanta on early morning "red-eye" flights during the past few months may have noticed something different during their descent to the



Atlanta International Airport was chosen to evaluate the continuous descent arrival technique in about 600 flights.

runway. Instead of the typical sound of engine power rising and falling as the aircraft descended in a series of level flight steps, they may have noticed a quieter arrival — without the steps.

The changes were part of Georgia Tech's flight-testing of "continuous descent arrivals," a procedure designed to save fuel and time while producing environmental benefits by reducing both noise and emissions. Involving more than 600 flights, the Atlanta study was done in collaboration with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), FedEx and Atlanta's two dominant air carriers: Delta Air Lines and AirTran Airways.

Volcanic spreading and lateral variations in structure of Olympus Mons, Mars

SCIENCE DAILY, 15 Feb — The immense Olympus Mons volcano on Mars (about 23 km tall and 600 km wide) exhibits a somewhat lopsided structure: elongated to the northwest, shortened to the southeast, with corresponding types of faulting (extensional and compressional, respectively) prevalent in each sector.

However, the overall shape of the edifice is characterized by a decrease in slope with increasing distance from the center, somewhat like the surface of a tent that is supported by a single central pole.

In order to uncover the mechanism that generates the distinctive features of the shape of Ol-

ympus Mons, Patrick J. McGovern and Julia K. Morgan, Lunar and Planetary Institute, Universities Space Research Association, constructed models of Olympus Mons

as collections of particles that slip and slide past each other, controlled by the weight of other particles and the friction value assigned to each.
