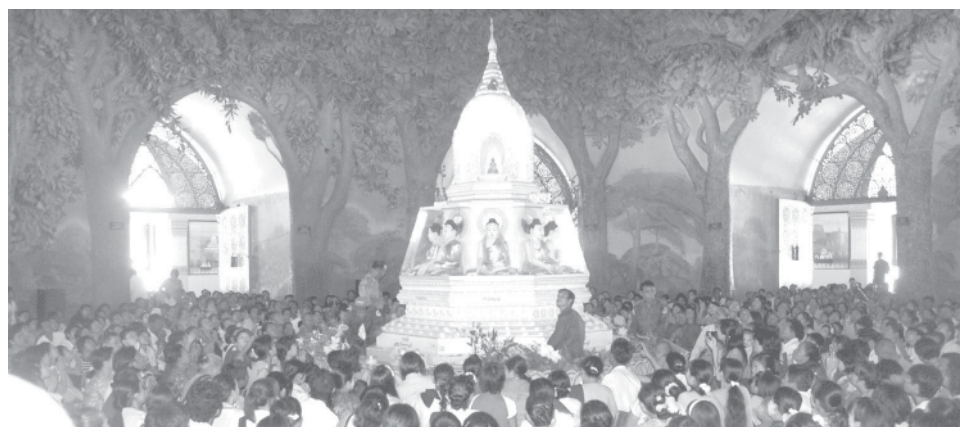

Afghan quakes kill 22

KABUL, 17 April — Two earthquakes killed at least 22 people and destroyed several hundred homes when they struck two hours apart in eastern Afghanistan, local authorities said on Friday.

The quakes hit overnight the district of Khogyani in Nangarhar Province near the Pakistan border and where police launched rescue efforts searching for more dead and injured under the rubble of pancaked homes.

“Four villages were seriously damaged by the two earthquakes. Twenty-two people have been killed and 30 injured. More than 200 homes have been destroyed,” Khogyani district chief Haji Said Rahman told *AFP*.

The interior ministry in Kabul confirmed an initial death toll of 19 and said police were in charge of the rescue effort.

“The police started work early this morning. All the 19 dead bodies were picked up by police,” interior ministry spokesman Zemarai Bashari told *AFP*. “The work is going on and the rubble is being removed to try to find more dead bodies or injured people,” he added.

The US Geological Survey said two moderate earthquakes rattled the Hindu Kush border area between Afghanistan and Pakistan in the early hours of Friday.

A 5.5-magnitude quake struck at 1:57 am Afghan time (2127 GMT Thursday) 85 kilometres (55 miles) southeast of Kabul and 140 kilometres west of the Pakistani city of Peshawar, according to the US agency.—*Internet*

Two suspected arrested over attack on female legislator in Afghanistan

KABUL, 17 April — Two suspected men have been arrested by Afghan police on the charge of having links in terrorist attack on female legislator in Taleban’s hotbed Kandahar Province, according to a press release of Interior Ministry issued here on Thursday.

“On Wednesday, two persons were arrested in the fourth district of Kandahar city by counter-terrorism police in Kandahar, suspicious on assassination of female legislator Setara Achiakzai,” the press release said.

Achiakzai, a Kandahar provincial council member and women’s right activate, was gunned down on her way home by two motorcyclists on last Sunday.

Achiakzai is the second well-known female figure assassinated in Taleban’s former stronghold Kandahar Province over the past one year.—*Internet*



18 killed in suicide bombing west of Baghdad

RAMADI, 17 April — The death toll from a suicide bomb explosion inside an Iraqi military base on Thursday rose to 18 with 53 other soldiers injured, a military source said.

“The latest reports said that 18 Iraqi soldiers were killed and 53 others were injured by the blast,” the source told *Xinhua* on condition of anonymity.

The attack took place after midday, when a suicide bomber disguised in a military uniform blew up his explosive belt inside a restaurant in the Habaniyah military base near the city of Fallujah, some 50 km west of Baghdad, the source said.

The bomber targeted dozens of Iraqi soldiers who are entering the restaurant during lunch time after their daily training, the source added.

Earlier, the source said 16 were killed and some 50 others injured in the bombing.

It was not immediately clear whether US troops were at the scene, as the US military has no comment on the incident yet.

The source could not give further details as the incident is under investigation, he said.

The latest deadly wave of car bombings shows that militants could still cause fatal attacks despite recent security gains.—*Internet*

Gunman commits suicide after killing two near Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, 17 April — A gunman shot dead two people at a hospital near Los Angeles before killing himself on Thursday, authorities said.

The gunman, a pharmacy worker at the Long Beach Memorial Medical Centre, shot two people at the centre in Long Beach, about 64 km south of Los Angeles. One victim died at the scene and the other died later in the hospital’s emergency room. The shooting sent patients and employees scrambling for cover in offices and bathrooms, according to witnesses at the scene. Witnesses told reporters at the scene that the gunman was an employee of the hospital pharmacy.

“It was one of the co-workers in the pharmacy that did it himself. He worked for the pharmacy,” Charity Perez, whose husband works at the hospital, told KCAL9, a local TV station.

“He was a great wonderful guy. I mean, I’ve been crying, my kids and I have been crying because we all know him. He’s a really nice guy. Always came to work. Al-

ways helped when you needed help with medicine so I don’t know what caused it.”—*Internet*

Roadside bomb kills two police, wounds four in S Afghanistan

KABUL, 17 April—Two police were killed and four others were wounded as their car struck a roadside bomb on Wednesday in southern Afghan province of Kandahar, Interior Ministry said on Thursday.

“A roadside bomb struck the police car in Al-Himara area of Painjwai district yesterday killing two police and injuring two others,” a statement of Interior Ministry issued here said.

It also added that two women, all residents of the area, were also wounded in the incident. The Taleban militants have vowed to intensify their activities mostly in the shape of roadside bombing and suicide attacks in the central Asian state.—*Internet*

Developing, emerging economies should unite in face of crisis

BOAO, 17 April — Fidel V Ramos, former president of the Philippines and now chairman of the Board of Directors of Boao Forum for Asia (BFA), has urged the developing and emerging economies to unite to cope with the financial crisis.

"I strongly agree with proposals that developing and emerging economies need to unite and come up with a coordinated approach to cushion the impact of a collapse of highly developed economies," he said in an interview with the official publication of the BFA Annual Conference 2009. The session starts Friday in south China's island province of Hainan.

The Asian ethic of "Prosper Thy Neighbour" is an imperative during hard times, he said, noting that the global community is a huge neighbourhood and teamwork is the answer to finding a

way out during these very trying times while a "safe net" is needed to provide cushion for economies against the financial crisis.

"These trying times also call for deeper cooperation and collaboration amongst Asian countries, meaning greater regional investment and a trans-border process for cooperation and common security," he said.

Asia to take lead in crisis recovery: BFA secretary-general

BOAO, 17 April — China and some Asian emerging economies will take the lead in rebounding from the economic crisis, said Long Yongtu, secretary-general of Boao Forum for Asia (BFA).

The financial crisis did little harm to the financial systems of Asian countries, different from the financial crisis in 1997 which had caused destructive impact on some Asian countries, he said in an interview with Xinhua on Friday.

"The emerging market stands for the future of world economy," he said, adding that the growth of emerging economies like China, Brazil, Russia and India, among others, are of critical importance to the growth of global economy. —Xinhua

US new home construction falls 10.8% in March

WASHINGTON, 17 April — New home construction in the United States fell by 10.8 percent in March to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 510,000 units, the second lowest level on record, the US Commerce Department reported on Thursday.

The March fall was worse than economists had expected and housing starts in February was revised lower as well. That

provided fresh evidence that the housing slump, which was a major factor triggering the current recession, has not ended.

The record low was a 488,000 unit pace set in January this year.

For March, single-family housing starts were flat at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 358,000 units after a 0.6 percent gain in February.

Multi-family housing starts, however, plunged

by 42.6 percent to an annual rate of 116,000 units, following a 69.7 percent surge in February.

By region, the biggest drop was a 26.3 percent decrease in activity in the West, followed by a 16.8 percent decline in the South.

Home construction posted a 15.9 percent rise in the Midwest and a 6.3 percent increase in the Northeast.

China, Kazakhstan vow to boost ties by signing new agreements

BEIJING, 17 April — Chinese President Hu Jintao and his Kazakh counterpart Nursultan Nazarbayev held talks in Beijing on Thursday afternoon.

The heads of states agreed to deepen bilateral cooperation in all fields and join hands to tackle the challenge of international financial crisis.

After the talks, Hu and Nazarbayev signed a joint declaration and witnessed the signing of 10 agreements on cooperation in the fields of transport, education, agriculture and telecommunications.

President Hu said the strategic partnership between China and Kazakhstan had maintained a fast growth in re-

cent years. The two countries have maintained frequent high-level contacts, political mutual trust, expansion of practical cooperation and good collaboration within the multilateral frameworks.

Nazarbayev said Kazakhstan values the development of friendly and cooperative relations with China. He said China has raised its status in the international community by successfully holding the Olympic Games and launching the Shenzhou-7 spacecraft. —Xinhua

Kuwait stops exports of oil due to sandstorm

KUWAIT CITY, 17 April — Kuwait on Thursday halted exports of oil as a result of a prevailing sandstorm. The official Kuwait news agency KUNA reported.

Mohammad Mansour Al-Ajmi, the spokesman of the state-owned Kuwait National Petroleum Company (KNPC), said in a statement that the halt of oil exports would remain in effect till prospected improvement of the weather conditions.

The Gulf state, a major exporter of oil, often resorts to this measure when weather conditions turn bad, said KUNA.

Toshiba expects bigger net loss than expected

TOKYO, 17 April — Japanese electronics and high-tech giant Toshiba Corp said Friday it expects a net loss of 350 billion yen (3.5 billion dollars) for the fiscal year 2008 that ended last month, even more than its previous forecast.

In January the company had expected a net loss of 280 billion yen, blaming weak demand due to the economic downturn and a stronger yen affected its exports. But the company expects a smaller operating loss of 250 billion yen, compared with the earlier projected loss of 280 billion yen. (1 US dollar is equivalent to 100 yen). —Xinhua

Shweli Hydropower plant to be open soon

NAY PYI TAW, 17 April—Minister for Electric Power No. 1 Col Zaw Min on 15 April arrived at Shweli Hydropower Project near Mantet village, about 17 miles southwest of Namhkam of Shan State (North), being implemented by the Hydropower Implementation Department and Yunnan United Power Developing Co Ltd of the People's Republic of China. The minister inspected running of turbines on the generator floor at the plant,

installation of No (6) machine, operating of machines through computer system at the central control room, progress of installation of machines at gas insulated switch gear room, supplying of electricity through GIS system and construction of protection room and switch yard.

Yesterday, the minister met with officials of the project and responsible persons of Yunnan United Power Developing Co Ltd (YUPD) and gave

necessary instructions.

The minister looked into construction of the regulating dam, spillways and afflux dam from the briefing hall.

At Shweli Hydropower Project, the regulating dam is under construction on Shweli river. Water will be supplied to the power plant of the project to be installed with six 100-megawatt generators for producing 4,022 million kwh yearly, and the power plant of the project will be open soon.

Together with the Philippine President were Minister of Foreign Affairs Mr Alberto Romulo and Economic Minister Mr Peta Fevila and high-ranking officials.

At 11.30 a.m. on 11 April, Prime Minister of Thailand Mr Abhisit Vejjajiva met Heads of State/Government of ASEAN countries at the Grand Ballroom of Royal Cliff Grand & Spa Hotel in Pattaya. At the meeting

the Thai Prime Minister said ASEAN summits have been postponed to a suitable time due to the internal situation occurring in Thailand. Arrangements will be made for Heads of State/Government of ASEAN countries to return home safe and sound.

Then, Heads of State/Government of ASEAN countries and Heads of State/Government of ASEAN partner countries such as the People's Republic of China, the Republic of Korea and Japan left Pattaya by special flight in the evening. They were seen off at U-Tapao Airport by the Thai Prime Minister.

Prime Minister General Thein Sein and party left the airport at 5.40 p.m. on 11 April by special flight and arrived back in Nay Pyi Taw on 12 April afternoon via Yangon.

Foreign Affairs Minister U Nyan Win, member of the Prime Minister's trip, attended

the first ASEAN Political-Security Community Council meeting held at Royal Cliff Beach Resort Hotel at 9 a.m. on 10 April.

In discussing the regional and international issues over the lunch, they discussed matters on North Korea's launching of missile and global financial crises and means to solve the issues.

Member of the delegation Minister for National Planning and Economic Development U Soe Tha signed ASEAN Sectoral Mutual Recognition Arrangement for Good Manufacturing Practice (GMP) for Inspection of Manufacturers of Medicinal Products together with ASEAN economic ministers at the conference room of the hotel at 6 p.m. on 10 April.

Plant gene mapping may lead to better biofuel production

WASHINGTON, 17 April — By creating a “family tree” of genes expressed in one form of woody plant and a less woody, herbaceous species, scientists at the US Department of Energy's Brookhaven National Laboratory have uncovered clues that may help them engineer plants more amenable to biofuel production.

The study, published in the April 2009 issue

of *Plant Molecular Biology*, also lays a foundation for understanding these genes' evolutionary and structural properties and for a broader exploration of their roles in plant life. “We are studying a very large family of genes that instruct cells to make a variety of enzymes important in a wide range of plant functions,” said Brookhaven biologist Chang-Jun Liu. By searching the genomes of woody poplar trees and leafy Arabidopsis, the scientists identified 94 and 61 genes they suspected belonged to this family in those two species, respectively.—Internet

Russia needs more political competition

MOSCOW, 17 April—Russia needs stronger political competition and a greater freedom to protest, President Dmitry Medvedev said in remarks released Thursday, sending the strongest signal yet that he may rethink the legacy of predecessor Vladimir Putin.

Medvedev, who has positioned himself as a cautious liberal during his first year in power, has until now followed the path blazed by Putin, who

methodically rolled back Russia's post-Soviet freedoms during his presidency.

Medvedev's statements at a meeting Wednesday with civil society activists contained some of his most explicit criticism of Putin's policies to date. The remarks were released on the Kremlin's Web site on Thursday.

Medvedev specifically criticized the 2006 law that toughened registration and accounting rules

for human rights groups and other non-governmental organizations, hampering their operations.

"A significant number of officials, which I think is quite dangerous, have got a sense that non-governmental organizations are enemies of the state which must be confronted to prevent some disease from seeping through and undermining the foundations of our order," Medvedev said.—*Internet*

Economist says worst of recession may be over

LONDON, 17 April—The worst of the recession may be over, a leading economist said in a newspaper interview.

David Miles, who joins the Bank of England's Monetary Policy Committee in June, told the Western Mail that government moves to cut interest rates, increase public spending and boost the money supply were having an effect.

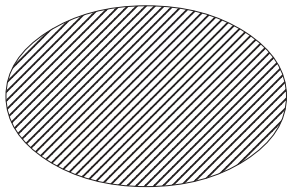
"Economic history teaches us that a combination of tax cuts, running

large fiscal deficits, substantial cuts in interest rates and more quantitative easing is likely, with a certain time lag, to have a substantial impact on demand in the economy," he told the regional news-

paper.

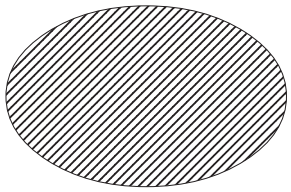
"And it may well be that the worst of the recession may well be behind us. That's not a confident prediction but a judgment about what may be the case."—*Internet*

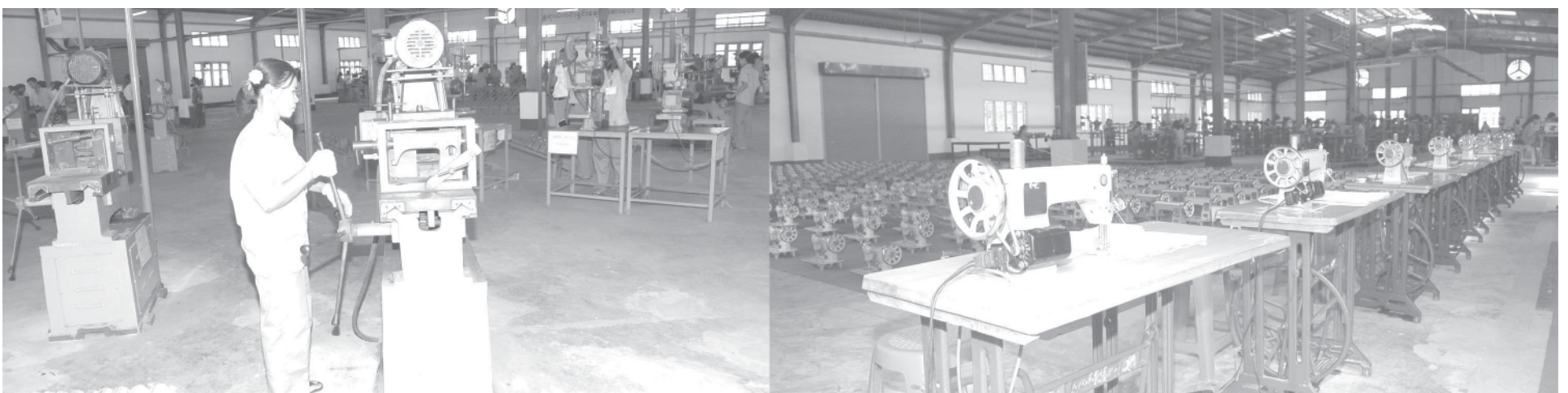


Photo shows production process of sewing machines and accessories at Sewing Machines Factory (Extension) in Kyaukse Industrial Region.—MNA

New moves for peace

The people are very pleased to hear good news stories since the run-up to the Myanmar New Year. One of them is that Saw Nay Soe Mya with the rank of captain, son of late chairman Saw Bo Mya of KNU/KNLA and members returned to the legal fold, that really added to a prosperous future of the nation.

Israeli army confirms air strike at Gazan house

JERUSALEM, 17 April — The Israel Defence Forces (IDF) has confirmed that its air force attacked a house allegedly rigged with explosives in the Gaza Strip on Thursday evening.

The air raid at the booby-trapped building was carried out "in response to recent hostilities" waged by Gazan militants, including the rocket fire against southern Israel on Wednesday night, said an IDF spokeswoman.

Palestinian sources said that no injury was reported as the house was empty at the time of the strike, which broke a weeks-long lull between the two sides.

Months ago, the IDF launched a cross-year 22-day punishing military offensive in the Palestinian enclave in response to continued rocket attacks at its southern land, leaving over 1,300 Gazans and 13 Israeli killed.

The two sides separately staged their ceasefire in mid-January, yet sporadic flare-ups of violence continued in the following months, and Egypt-brokered negotiations over a long-term truce has so far seen no progress.

HK, Canadian researchers find new H5N1 inhibitors

HONG KONG, 17 April — Researchers from Hong Kong and Canada found a new inhibitor against H5N1 avian flu virus by using a new technology platform, according to the University of Hong Kong which made the results public on Wednesday.

The university's faculty of medicine and the Genome Sciences Center of the British Columbia Cancer Agency, Canada, made use of computational molecular docking in a recent collaborative research and screened about 230,000 compounds. Twenty of them were found to be potential anti-H5N1 virus candidates.

Of the 20 compounds tested, "compound-1" demonstrated the ability to inhibit neuraminidase, thus the replication of the virus at a level comparable to oseltamivir, an effective drug currently used to combat influenza. Professor of

the university's Department of Pediatrics and Adolescent Medicine Allan Lau Sik-yin said, neuraminidase was an agent capable of enabling the virus to spread to normal host cells.

However, current drugs such as oseltamivir, which could inhibit neuraminidase, would become totally non-effective one day if the virus developed strong resistance towards the drugs. According to Lau, the study revealed that "compound-1" was able to bind to the neuraminidase of the virus and it may

overcome the drug resistance introduced by mutation of the virus.

"Researchers will enhance the binding to reduce the chance of the occurrence of drug resistance," Lau said, adding that it would take about five to eight years for the new drug to be resulted. Besides, Lau told that by using computational analysis, the cost of this study had largely gone down and about two years of time have been saved, when compared with traditional research methods involving real-life demonstrations.

Earthquake hits Southern Sumatra, Indonesia

HONG KONG, 17 April — An earthquake measuring 5.5 on the Richter scale occurred in Southern Sumatra, Indonesia 4:07 am Friday (2007GMT Thursday), according to a bulletin released by the Hong Kong Observatory on Friday.

The epicenter was initially determined to be 3.3 degrees South latitude and 100.2 degrees east longitude, about 260 kilometres south of Padang, Indonesia.

There have been no reports of casualties or damage so far.—*Internet*

Fire destroys partially Honduras' historical patrimony of Comayagua

TEGUCIGALPA, 17 April — A fire destroyed part of the Comayagua city, former capital of Honduras, said the authorities on Thursday.

The fire occurred on Wednesday night, and Comayagua Mayor Carlos Miranda said that "the loss is irreversible because we are talking of great part of the history."

Located in central Honduras, Comayagua was established in 1537. It was the first capital of Honduras till 1880 when it was replaced by Tegucigalpa. The city has been regarded as the country's religious, cultural and historical treasure.

The fire destroyed the Episcopal Palace built in 1775, the country's first university called the Tridentino College, the Del Carmen chapel, the Ecclesiastic Colonial Museum and the tool used by the bishop from Comayagua's bishopric.

Some valuable documents, such as the marriage certificate of Central American hero Francisco Morazan, were also lost in the disaster.

The cause of the fire was likely to be an electrical short-circuit, said fire-fighters.

MOMBASA, 17 April — The US and its allies battled Somalia's pirates on two fronts on Wednesday, with French forces seizing a bandit mother ship and Wash-

ington seeking to keep the marauders from their spoils. A US freighter that escaped a pirate bombardment of gunshots and grenades steamed into Kenya's Mombasa port Thursday with an armed Navy guard.

One pirate issued a new threat to "slaughter" Americans, and Tuesday's assault on a second US cargo ship, the *Liberty Sun*, underscored the outlaws' ability to act with impunity despite international naval operations against them and mounting concern worldwide over how to end the escalating attacks off the Horn of Africa.—*Internet*

NASA's Kepler telescope captures first views of planet-hunting sky

WASHINGTON, 17 April — NASA's Kepler mission has taken its first images of the star-rich sky where it will soon begin hunting for planets like Earth, NASA said on Thursday. The new "first light" images show the mission's target patch of sky, a vast starry field in the Cygnus-Lyra region of our Milky Way galaxy. One image shows

millions of stars in Kepler's full field of view, while two others zoom in on portions of the larger region.

"Kepler's first glimpse of the sky is awe-inspiring," said Lia LaPiana, Kepler's program executive at NASA Headquarters in Washington. "To be able to see millions of stars in a single snapshot is

simply breathtaking."

One new image from Kepler shows its entire field of view — a 100-square-degree portion of the sky, equivalent to two side-by-side dips of the Big Dipper. The regions contain an estimated 14 million stars, more than 100,000 of which were selected as ideal candidates for planet hunting.—*Internet*

Czech Republic earmarks \$145,000 for Afghan rebuilding

PRAGUE, 17 April — Czech Foreign Ministry has earmarked some 2.9 million crowns (145000 US dollars) for reconstructing projects in Afghanistan's Logar Province, the ministry said on Wednesday.

The funds will be allocated to farming cooperatives, for water management, for reconstruction of schools and police stations, among other projects.

The Czech aid group Provincial Reconstruction Team, which has operated in Afghanistan for more than a year, will be in charge of the reconstruction projects.

The aid group had completed 14 projects by March, with another 43 projects under way.

6.0 quake strikes off coast of Chile

SANTIAGO, 17 April — A strong earthquake struck off the coast of Chile late Thursday, but authorities reported there were no victims or damage. The temblor had a magnitude of 6.0 and hit a little after 10 p.m. local time (0200 GMT Friday), according to the U.S. Geological Survey.

It was centered about 50 miles (80 kilometers) northwest of the port city of Iquique, which lies some 1,000 miles (some 1,500 kilometers) from the capital, Santiago.

Chile's Emergency Bureau told The Associated Press the tremor was felt moderately in Iquique and

other towns in the region, but nobody was harmed and there was no damage.—*Internet*

Taleban behead gov't employee in NW Afghanistan

KABUL, 17 April — Taleban militants beheaded a government employee in Badghis Province northwest of Afghanistan, a local official said on Thursday.

"The militants abducted Wali Mohammad Akhundzada from Balamurghab district Wednesday and beheaded him on the charge of spying for foreign troops based in the province," Abdul Ghani Sabiri the deputy to provincial governor told Xinhua.

The late Akhundzada was on his way to the provincial capital Qalai Now when the insurgents took him away to unknown location and abandoned his beheaded body in the area, the official added.—*Internet*

Iran willing to build new relationship with US

TEHERAN, 17 April — Iran's president on Wednesday sent the clearest signal yet that the Islamic Republic wants warmer ties with the US, just one day after Washington spoke of new strategies to address the country's disputed nuclear programme. Taken together, the developments indicate that the longtime adversaries are seeking ways to return to the negotiating table and ease a nearly 30-year-old diplomatic stand-off. President Barack Obama's administration has sought to start a dialogue with Iran — a departure from the Bush administration's tough talk.

Iran had mostly dismissed the overtures, continuing to take hard-line steps like putting an American journalist on trial on espionage allegations.

But in his speech Wednesday, President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad changed his tone, saying that Iran was preparing new

proposals aimed at breaking an impasse with the West over its nuclear programme.

"The Iranian nation is a generous nation. It may forget the past and start a new era, but any country speaking on the basis of selfishness will get the same response the Iranian nation gave to Mr. Bush," Ahmadinejad told thousands in the south-eastern city of Kerman.

In Washington, Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton discussed Ahmadinejad's comments during a meeting Wednesday with EU foreign policy chief Javier Solana.

"With respect to the latest speeches and remarks out of Iran, we welcome dialogue," Clinton said. "We've been saying that we are looking to have an engagement with Iran, but we haven't seen anything that would amount to any kind of proposal at all." —*Internet*

At least 16 die in Mexican shootout

MEXICO, 17 April — At least 16 people have died in a gun fight between Mexican soldiers and a drug gang in the country's southern state of Guerrero, the regional prosecutor's office said on Thursday.

The clash took place Wednesday close to the town of San Nicolas de

Oro while US President Barack Obama is visiting Mexico City.

During a routine patrol, Mexican soldiers stopped a vehicle that belonged to drug trafficking suspects, who opened fire rather than allowed a search. Some 15 traffickers and one soldier died in the

shootout.

Troops later seized 20 automatic rifles, nine vans, some pistols and explosives on the spot.

Some 6,300 people died in drug-related killings in Mexico last year and the violence has begun to spill over into the United States.

Cultural ministry: 60% of Italian heritage sites at risk of earthquakes

ROME, 17 April — The Leaning Tower of Pisa, Uffizi Gallery in Florence and Hadrian's Villa near Rome are among some 60 percent of Italy's heritage sites at risk of earthquakes, the Italian culture ministry said on Thursday.

At a conference in the wake of the 6 April earthquake that damaged all churches and heritage

buildings in the Abruzzo region's capital, L'Aquila, the culture ministry called for enhancing of a 2007 program of controls and risk reduction for the 150,000 buildings thought to be vulnerable.

The ministry said a government directive to complete a vulnerability survey on buildings by December 2010 is behind schedule, since the state

owns only a small proportion of sites while others are run by the Church, local authorities or private bodies.

Ministry architect Laura Moro said the first phase of the programme is to verify vulnerability, while the second phase would focus on reducing the risk of buildings being damaged by quakes.

Ancient ecosystem found under Antarctic glacier

Researchers have found an ancient ecosystem below an Antarctic glacier and learned that it survived millions of years by transforming sulfur and iron compounds for growth.

The ecosystem lives without light or oxygen in a pool of brine trapped below Taylor Glacier, next to frozen Lake Bonney in eastern Antarctica, said John Prisco, co-author of the research.

Prisco is a longtime Antarctic researcher and professor in the Department of Land Resources and Environmental Sciences at Montana State University.

Egypt to search 3 sites for Cleopatra's tomb

Archaeologists will begin excavating sites in Egypt next week in an attempt to solve a mystery that has stymied historians for hundreds of years: Where is the final resting place of doomed lovers Cleopatra and Mark Antony?

Archaeologists looking for the tombs of the celebrated queen of Egypt and the Roman general will begin excavating three sites at a temple where tombs may be located, Egypt's Supreme Council of Antiquities said in a statement Wednesday.

Canadian man leaps to death from flying airplane

A young man aboard a small charter flight flying in northern Canada forced open the aircraft's door and leapt to his death, police said.

The accident happened as the plane was flying from Yellowknife, capital of Northwest Territories, to Cambridge Bay in Nunavut Territory, a spokesman of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police said.

The man was apparently distressed before he leapt from the aircraft that was flying at an altitude of about 23,000 feet.

The crew of the King Air 200 aircraft called in an emergency during the flight, reporting that one of the two passengers on board was being unruly.

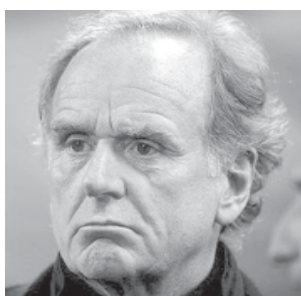

Summit of Americas to define US policy

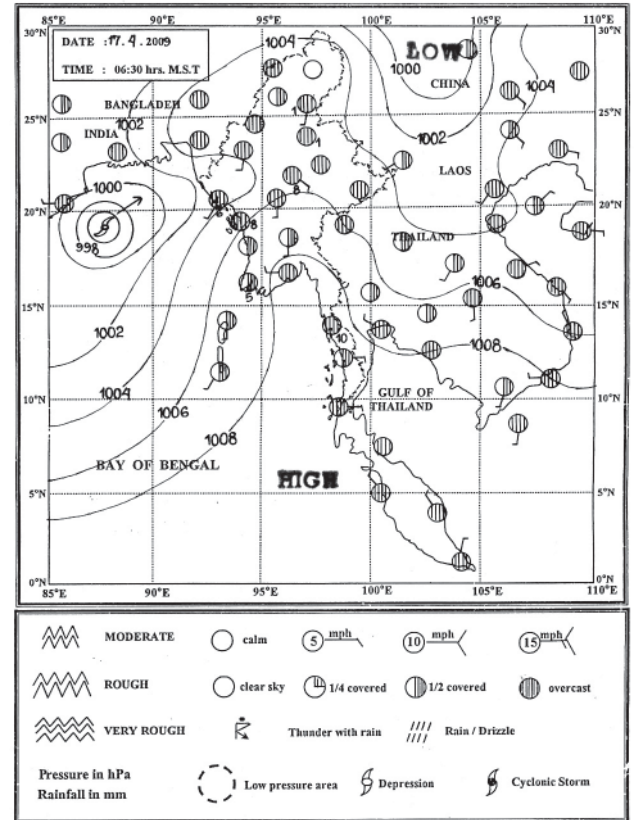

The significant day temperatures were Monywa, Myingyan and NyaungU (40°C) each. The noteworthy amounts of rainfall recorded were Nay Pyi Taw (0.11) inch, Nay Pyi Taw (Thapyaygone) (1.22) inches, Pyin Oo Lwin (2.08) inches, Maungdaw (1.65) inches, Tadaoo (1.46) inches, Mudon (1.26) inches and Kawkaireik (1.06) inches.

Maximum temperature on 16-4-2009 was 95°F. Minimum temperature on 17-4-2009 was 74°F. Relative humidity at (09:30) hours MST on 17-4-2009 was 79%. Total sunshine hours on 16-4-2009 was (7.7) hrs approx.

Rainfall on 17-4-2009 was (0.07) inch at Mingaladon, (Nil) at Kaba-Aye and (0.20) inch at Central Yangon. Total rainfall since 1-1-2009 was (1.06) inches at Mingaladon, (1.54) inches at Kaba-Aye and (2.09) inches at Central Yangon. Maximum wind speed at Yangon (Kaba-Aye) was (8) mph from South at (12:35) hours MST on 16-4-2009.

Bay inference: According to the observations at (09:30) hrs MST today, the cyclonic storm Bijli over the Northwest Bay has moved quickly in a Northeast wards and arrived over the Northeast Bay during last (3) hrs and centered at about (180) miles South of Kolkatta, India. It is forecast to cross the Bangladesh between Kox's Bazaar and Chittagaung next (24) hrs (On the early morning of 18-4-2009, Saturday). Weather is cloudy in the North Bay and partly cloudy in the Andaman Sea and elsewhere in the Bay of Bengal.

Forecast valid until evening of 18th April 2009: Rain or thundershowers are likely to be widespread in Kachin, Rakhine and Chin States, Sagaing, Magway and Mandalay Divisions, isolated scattered in the remaining States and Divisions with likelihood of isolated heavyfall in Rakhine and Chin States, Sagaing, Magway and Mandalay Divisions. 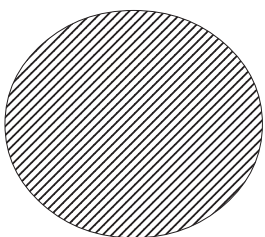

Cyclone Bijli not heading towards Myanmar coastal region

NAY PYI TAW, 17 April— According to the 3.30 p.m. MST observatory by the Meteorology and Hydrology Department, Cyclone Bijli, which centered at the northeast of the Bay of Bengal, has moved fast in a direction towards northeast, reaching the northeast of the Bay of Bengal where it re-centered at a point, 200 miles southwest of Cox's Bazar of Bangladesh. It is forecast to enter the inland area through the coastal region of Bangladesh near Cox's Bazar within 12 hours starting this evening, and it is forecast that the cyclone will also pass the northern regions of Myanmar.

The force of cyclone was degraded into the yellow level from the orange one, and it is forecast that the cyclone is not moving with a direction to Myanmar coastal region. During the

storm, the tidal surf will be at 3 feet to 5 feet high along northern Rakhine coastal region. Likelihood of surface wind speed will be 40 to 50 mph. Sometimes, the surface wind speed will be 60 mph with high tidal waves.

Impacted by the storm, there will be heavy rains in Kachin, Rakhine and Chin States and Sagaing, Magway and Mandalay Divisions and isolated rains in some regions within next 36 hours.

Therefore, trawlers, fishing boats and ferry boats in the territorial waters along Rakhine coastal region should go to the safer regions from the dangerous area of the cyclone, said the Department of Meteorology and Hydrology.
