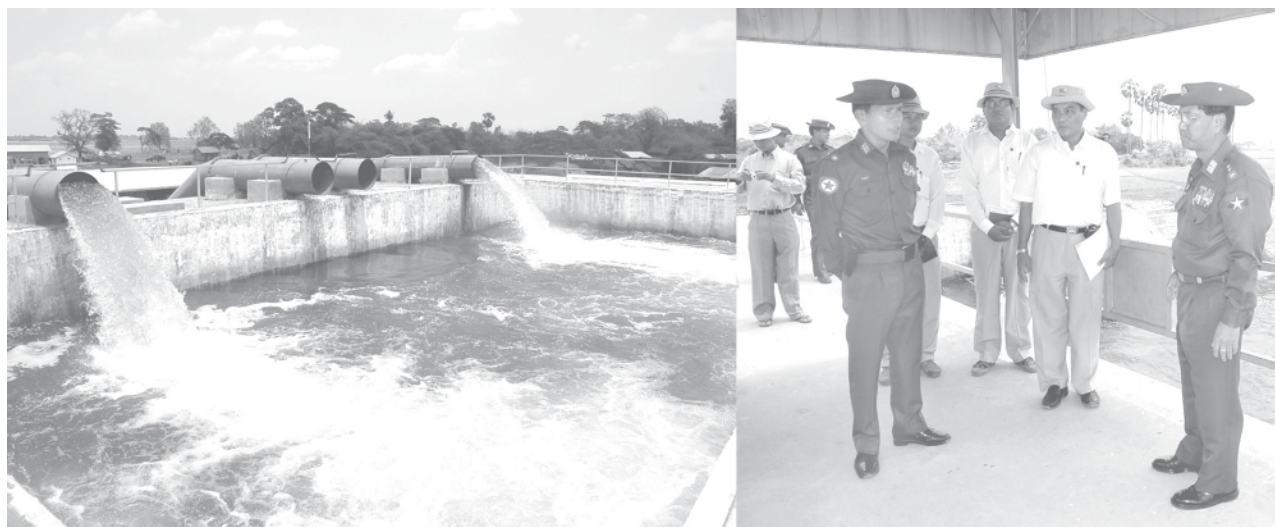

Bomber strikes US soldiers meeting Iraqi officials

BAQOUBA, 20 April—A suicide bomber disguised as an Iraqi policeman killed three officers and wounded eight US soldiers and a civilian on Monday, in the third such attack on security forces in just over a week.

The bomber targeted a joint Iraqi and American foot patrol in Baqouba northeast of Baghdad, military officials said, replicating two recent incidents in which suicide assassins also wore security forces uniform.

"The suicide bomber took advantage of police and he managed to reach them and blow himself up," Baqouba's deputy mayor Raadal-Dahalaki said. "He looked the same as them."

An Iraqi official from the city's military operations command said three policeman had been killed and one civilian wounded in the attack which happened near the mayor's office. Neither Dahalaki nor the mayor were wounded.

Baqouba is in the

ethnically and religiously mixed Diyala province, considered one of the most dangerous areas in the country, where Al-Qaeda in Iraq and other insurgent groups still launch regular attacks. An American military spokesman said initial reports indicated that "eight US coalition soldiers were wounded," but none had been killed. He did not confirm that three police had been killed and one civilian wounded.—Internet

Karzai asks NATO to explain civilian deaths

KABUL, 20 April—The top US general in Afghanistan said Sunday there wasn't enough money in the world to replace the loss of an Afghan civilian, in comments that followed repeated calls by President Hamid Karzai for explanations of civilian deaths.

Gen David McKiernan said international forces do make mistakes — "and for that I apologize" — but that US and NATO

forces are working hard to minimize civilian deaths during operations.

Karzai on Saturday asked McKiernan to explain allegations of six civilian deaths in two incidents. It was the second time in three days Karzai brought up the topic with McKiernan. On Thursday, the US general was summoned to the presidential palace to explain other allegations of civilian deaths.

McKiernan, during a news conference Sunday alongside the Afghan defense minister, was asked repeatedly about civilian casualties by Afghan media, underscoring how deeply the topic reverberates here. McKiernan noted that international forces investigate all allegations of civilian deaths and pay compensation for wrongful deaths.

Iraqi military investigates gangland-style heists

BAGHDAD, 20 April—Iraq created a military task force Sunday to battle gangland-style crime after the latest bloodshed: gunmen with silencer-fitted weapons killing at least seven people during a daylight heist of jewellery stores.

The swift government response to the robberies appeared to reflect worries by Iraqi officials about a rise in violence in recent weeks and their efforts to display a tough stance.

Although attacks remain well below levels of past years, Iraqi authorities are under pressure to show greater competence as US commanders gradually hand over security duties before their planned withdrawal from most urban bases by 30 June.—Internet

Defence Ministry: 2009 a challenging year for Afghans

KABUL, 20 April—Afghan Defence Minister General Abdul Rahim Wardak on Sunday described the current year 2009 as a challenging one and called for strengthening national forces.

"This year is decisive and full of challenges, but the outcome is victory," Wardak told reporters at a joint press conference with US commander of the NATO-led International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) General David McKiernan.

The Afghan Defence Minister made these remarks amid Taliban's threat to intensify activities in spring and summer known as fighting season in Afghanistan.

US asks for elite NZ troops for Afghanistan war

WELLINGTON, 20 April—The US has formally asked New Zealand to send its elite Special Air Service combat troops back to Afghanistan for a fourth tour of duty, the foreign minister said Sunday.

The US request was made following a meeting with US Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton in Washington earlier this month, Murray McCully told TV One. While Clinton asked for troops, she did not specifically request the commando unit, he said. The government is likely to agree to send the elite troops, which last served in the untamed southern portion of Afghanistan in 2006.

Policeman killed, eight people injured in N Iraq

MOSUL, 20 April—A policeman was killed and eight people were injured in two attacks in Iraq's northern city of Mosul on Sunday, a local police source said.

A policeman was killed and three others were injured when a group of seven gunmen attacked a police checkpoint in the al-Shifaa neighbourhood in western Mosul, the source told *Xinhua* on condition of anonymity.

The policemen traded fire with the attacker, but it was not known whether the gunmen sustained any casualty, the source said. In separate incident, a booby-trapped car detonated near passing US patrol in the Faisaliyah neighbourhood in central Mosul, the source added.—Internet

Clash leaves five Afghan police, several Taliban militants dead

KABUL, 20 April—Clash between Afghan police forces and Taliban militants left five policemen and several militants dead in Farah Province west of Afghanistan on Saturday, deputy provincial governor Mohammad Yunus Rasouli said on Sunday.

"Taliban militant attacked a police checkpoint, 20 km from Farah city, the capital of Farah province, Saturday night and police encountered them during which five police were killed," Rasouli told *Xinhua*.

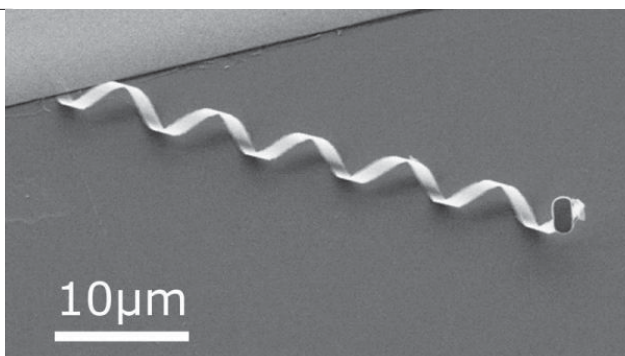

Medical micro-robots made as small as bacteria

ZURICH, 20 April — For the first time, ETH Zurich researchers have built micro-robots as small as bacteria. Their purpose is to help cure human beings.

They look like spirals

with tiny heads, and screw through the liquid like miniature corkscrews. When moving, they resemble rather ungainly bacteria with long whip-like tails. They can only be observed under a

microscope because, at a total length of 25 to 60 μm , they are almost as small as natural flagellated bacteria. Most are between 5 and 15 μm long, a few are more than 20 μm .

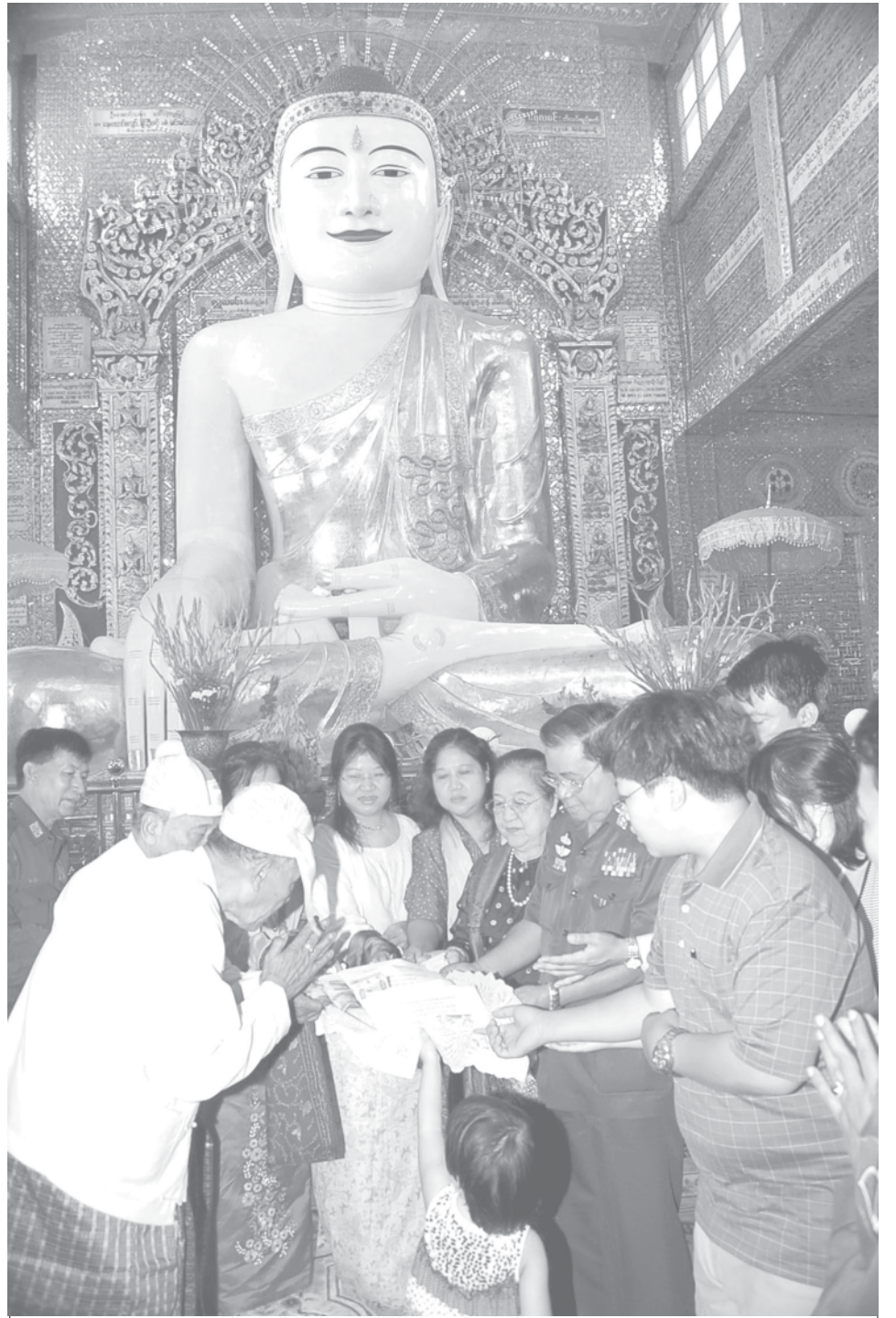

Absence of hostilities more tasteful when peace is restored

For me, there was an element of doubt as to whether the news was correct that Saw Nay Soe Mya and members would return to the legal fold. The villagers, like me, felt uncertain about the news and wished the news would come true. What we wanted to know very much at that time was that whether they were going to do really, when and with whom they would come.

Saw Nay Soe Mya, known as Ataylay in the village, attracts adoration and respect of the majority of his subordinates, like his father Saw Bo Mya. Since I was in Maesot, I had known that Ataylay was trying to materialize his father's wish of making peace for a prosperous future of the entire Kayin people. However, some top KNU leaders regarded as betrayers those members who wanted to make internal peace in KNU and those who wanted to return to their native places, and made trouble to them.

In particular, expatriates under the name of anti-government activists who are collaborating with KNU in border areas for political gains, and the internal and international organizations and persons receiving a wide range of foreign aid are out of fear that KNU will return to the legal fold. Apparently, they are using all possible ways and means for KNU to survive because they will no longer get the assistance if KNU has made peace with the government. So, they are worried that their campaigns to destabilize the nation and battles in border areas will come to an end for various reasons. They commit disruptive acts variously whenever KNU plans to make peace. That was why I was worried when I heard the news that there might be hindrances to the plan of Saw Nay Soe Mya to return to the legal fold.

All my worries and doubts subsided only when I learnt that Saw Nay Soe Mya and members had got to Htot-kawkoe Village on 30 March. And I believed that he was determined to put his father's wishes into reality despite a wide range of challenges.

The majority of the group members are from Brigade (6). I was very pleased to see some families from the refugee camp there. At that time I noticed that the returnees sounded very happy to be back to native regions safe and sound, and their joy touched my heart. Government officials extended warmer welcome to them than I expected.

Now, some KNU leaders, anti-government opportunist politicians and anti-government groups in disguise of those engaged in humanitarian work are claiming on pretext of democracy and racial affairs that their armed insurgency is just intended to generate a prosperous future of Kayin State and local people, but their high-flown words can no longer attract the trust of KNU other ranks and Kayin nationals in the refugee camp. In particular, after the family-domination practice was pushed to the forefront at the 14th congress of KNU,

the KNU brigades and battalions have done and acted as they wish. What all the present KNU leaders are doing is just for the comfort and convenience of their families, and they do nothing for the sake of Kayin people. Now, KNU is completely under the influence of a single family: the father is the chairman, the daughter is the secretary, the elder son is the chief of central operations and the younger son is the commander of a brigade. No way, such an unsystematic organization can never lay down a correct policy. The leaders stay mostly in foreign countries, and they cannot keep in touch with the prevailing conditions of the people of Kayin State. Kayin people are in favour of peace, whereas KNU leaders provoke instability for dollars.

In addition, according to my firsthand experiences, when the Thai government tightens the restrictions on travelling for KNU members and the refugees, KNU wages armed attacks on some Thai villages in the border areas as though Myanmar government's troops launched artillery attacks on the villages with the intention of inciting border incidents between the two countries. The battalions have to commit such acts so many times under the command of KNU (Central).

Every Kayin national has come to know why the Kayin revolution has proved unsuccessful for nearly 60 years. Due to the practice of wrong policies, KNU has never won the support of the people. In consequence, KNU is in no position to take a stronghold in the soil of the motherland, and has given up its major military bases one after another. It has to depend on the neighbouring country for its survival. Armed insurgents cannot be accepted officially, so the neighbouring country recognizes KNU troops as politicians, refugees or illegal immigrants through a political trick. Indeed, that makes Kayin people feel humiliated considerably. They have to try to win the favour of the country to continue to stay there and curry favour with alien countries for aid.

As a result of armed conflicts, Kayin people have not been able to enjoy a higher living standard, and lagged behind other national races in development. Only when I arrived at my home place could I understand well the great difference between the two conditions of a region before and after peace had been restored.

I learnt that Saw Nay Soe Mya made a field trip to Htot-kawkoe, Myainggying and Phayagon regions for his firsthand experiences, and then he explained the positive changes to KNU leaders. The real conditions of peace regions are in contrast with what KNU subordinates are informed. KNU leaders, who lead a luxury life in foreign countries and command to wage battles in the mother country, intimidated their troops saying that the latter would be captured and killed if they tried to return to the country. The leaders also tell the followers that peace groups are now starving, and that if they get to the country, they will get into troubles.

So, I let governmental authorities know the news about Saw Nay Soe Mya and members' plan to return to the legal fold and did all what should be done for our convenience. In that regard, I had plucked up enough encouragement to face the consequences if KNU leaders regarded us as traitors. Actually, betrayers are those who disrupt peace movements, not those who are seeking peace.

I must admit that when we drove down to the forest to fetch the members, many of them asked me if they would be arrested or welcomed with open arms, and if they would have their basic needs fulfilled enough. And I also worried about that till the vehicle left Myawady. When we arrived at Thingan Nyinaung, we were surprised by the scene. Tatmadaw members and their family members warmly welcomed us and hosted a lovely lunch to us. Along the route, local people accorded a rousing welcome to us as though we were their relatives.

Previously, whenever we collected extortion money in villages, the villagers could not hide their fears at all, but when we passed through the villages on our way, their eyes were glowing with satisfaction. When I was reunited with my friends and old colleagues at Htot-kawkoe, I had an emotional feeling beyond words. A major-general, the chairman of Kayin State Peace and Development Council, extended a warm welcome to us with a big smile, thus getting rid of all my doubts, and my eyes were in tears out of joy. I think local Kayin people welcomed Saw Nay Soe Mya, recognizing the role of a son of Kayin leader Saw Bo Mya, not that of an ordinary KNU member.

The returnees of us had our basic needs fulfilled and were provided with long-term assistance and jobs, far better than expected. Under the deception of KNU, we claimed the words of well-being of Kayin people and liberation of Kayin State, but now the words are replaced with the words of peace. That is a slogan for a prosperous future of the entire Kayin people.

The people are all national brethren. However, in the post-independence period, we resorted to the armed insurrection at the instigation of the colonialists. The people suffered all the evil consequences of the insurgency for nearly 60 years. It is disheartening to learn that some KNU leaders persist in the exercise of the wrong policy under the pretext of political and racial affairs and human rights under the influence of the neo-colonialism. Kayin people have realized that those who fall victim to the wrong policy are none other than KNU rank and file and they themselves. No one can deny that the regions of national race peace groups have developed a lot.

Only after our arrival at the motherland, would we witness the objective conditions of our regions and understand the value of peace all the more. It has come to the knowledge of us that the fruit of peace between national brethren is so tasteful. KNU members will understand the government's benevolent attitude towards them more than ever after they make peace and have close relations with the government.

The people have a strong desire to see the KNU remnants' returning to the legal fold in order that they come to realize how tasteful peace is.

China starts building 3rd-generation nuclear power reactors using Westinghouse technologies

SANMEN, 20 April—China on Sunday started the construction of its first third-generation pressurized water reactors using AP 1000 technologies developed by US-based Westinghouse.

The reactors, located in Sanmen of east China's Zhejiang Province, will also be the first in the world using such technologies.

The Sanmen Nuclear Power Plant will be built in three phases, with an investment of more than

40 billion yuan (5.88 billion US dollars) injected in the first phase.

The first phase project will include two units each with a generating capacity of 1.25 million kw.

The first generating unit will be put into operation in 2013, and the second, in 2014. The plant will eventually have six such units.

"It is the biggest energy cooperation project between China and the United States," said Zhang Guobao, vice mini-

ster in charge of the National Development and Reform Commission and also head of the National Energy Administration.

"It will contribute to the human kind's peaceful use of nuclear power," he said.

China launched bidding in 2003 for its nuclear power stations of the third generation. Foreign companies including Westinghouse, France's Areva and Russia's Atomstroy Export are major bidders. —Xinhua

Indonesia retains position as 3rd most optimistic market

JAKARTA, 20 April—Indonesian capital market retains its position as the third most optimistic market in Asia Pacific region in the first quarter this year, but investors still take cautious stance to invest in the country, a survey revealed here.

The result of a survey carried out by the Netherlands-based financial service giant ING places Indonesia in the third position after India and China, or equals to it was in the corresponding period last year.

Indonesia ranked No 3 after China and India in the first quarter last year.

"The ongoing optimism is likely because investors felt that Indonesia's economy was cushioned to an extent by high commodity prices and fuel prices correction," the Jakarta Post Monday quoted ING Securities Indonesia President Robert Scholten as saying.

However, despite the encouraging outlook, he said that ING survey also showed investors' sentiment index for Indonesia fell to 96 points in the first quarter this year from 109 points in the same period last year.

PORT OF SPAIN, 20 April—While US President Barack Obama and his 33 hemispheric neighbors wrapped up a summit here on Sunday, hopes are soaring high for a potential thaw of a half-century cold war between Washington and Havana.

At the opening ceremony of the Fifth Summit of the Americas held in Trinidad and Tobago, Obama vowed to seek a "new beginning" with Cuba, the only country in the continent that is excluded from the summit.

Mexico calls for region-wide response to drug trafficking, crime

PORT OF SPAIN, (Trinidad and Tobago), 20 April—Mexico's President Felipe Calderon on Sunday called for a response to drug trafficking and organized crime that spans the continent.

In his closing speech at the Fifth Summit of the Americas, Calderon also said that a document on the topic had been well received by the 34 heads of state attending the event.

This document called for the adoption of sales controls on high-caliber weapons, strengthening cross-border policies, and preventing drug consumption.

Speaking with Patrick Manning, prime minister of the three-day summit's host country Trinidad and Tobago, Calderon said "better days are coming for the Americas."

He added that after debating prosperity, energy security, governability and the economic crisis, nations in the region had reached a consensus on the final document, although not necessarily with unanimity.

Egyptian toddler hit by bird flu

CAIRO, 20 April—The Egyptian Health Ministry said Sunday that a baby girl aged one year and a half has contracted bird flu virus, bringing the human cases of the fatal avian influenza to 66 in the populous country.

The girl, Ibrahim al-Manar who comes from Kafr El-Sheikh governorate north of Cairo, is now in critical condition despite taking the drug Tamiflu, the press center of the ministry said in a telephone interview.

Earlier on Friday, Hadiye Salah Ragab, a 25-year-old woman, who comes from a northern neighbourhood of Cairo, was admitted to hospital after contracting the deadly virus.—Xinhua

Disney presents first black princess



WASHINGTON, 20 April — Disney's anointing of its first black princess, Tiana, is a milestone with an important message, say some US culture experts.

"If this figure takes off, you're looking at 30 or 40 years of repetition and resonance," said Tricia Rose, who teaches popular culture and African American studies at Brown University.

"The Princess and the Frog," set for release in November will star Tiana as a beautiful black princess from New Orleans. Tiana is the first Disney princess in more than a decade and the first ever to be black, *The Washington Post* reported on Saturday.

Tiana's appearance comes with Michelle Obama's emergence as the nation's first lady and the Obama girls — Sasha and Malia — living what for many girls seems to be a fairy tale life in the White House, the *Post* reported.

In the movie, Tiana conveys this message: balance is important in life and women need both love and a career — not just a prince — to find happiness, said Cori Murray, entertainment director for *Essence* magazine.

"She's the first modern American (Disney) princess, and that she's black sends a huge message," Murray said.

Antique putter found in garage

STOCKPORT, 20 April—The wooden putter used to make the final winning shot in the 1939 British Open was found stored away in a garage in England, sources say.

The Daily Telegraph reported on Saturday that the club was used by English golfer Dick Burton at the 1939 tournament on the Old Course at St Andrews in Scotland. Golfer Garry Bingham, 50, had gotten the club about 20 years ago, and stashed it away, not realizing its value, the newspaper reported.

The Telegraph said Burton gave the putter away to his aunt Ethel as an apology after he and her husband got drunk at her hotel.

Bingham reportedly inherited the club 20 years ago when Ethel died. The antique putter is believed to be worth more than \$22,000.

"I'm not after making money off it, that's not what it's about. I loved the golfing history and it's something I'm proud to have," Burton said. "It's like having a piece of history. It's a real family heirloom."

Redeployment sparks many suicides

LUBBOCK, 20 April—The number of soldier suicides this year is most likely due to the redeployment of soldiers with psychiatric illnesses, a US researcher says.

David Rudd, Texas Tech University professor and author "Interpersonal Theory of Suicide," said the more a person is exposed to violence or death, the more that person loses anxiety about death. This specifically applies to soldiers living in a war zone because the interaction with death makes it more probable that these people will kill themselves when they get depressed or anxious.

"It's a consequence of killing people," Rudd said in a statement. "War is about killing people and when you train young men and women to kill people, some of them are going to have a difficult time doing it. And then if they end up killing civilians as well as combatants, they're going to have an even more difficult time." Fear of death tends to be protective to someone who is at risk of suicide, Rudd said.

Plane hijacked at airport in Jamaica's Montego Bay

KINGSTON, 20 April—An airport spokeswoman says a plane has been hijacked while on the tarmac near Jamaica's resort city of Montego Bay.

Spokeswoman Elizabeth Scotton says there have been no injuries and no passengers are aboard the *Boeing 737* at Montego Bay's Sangster International airport. She says the situation is on-going. Scotton says she cannot confirm reports that a gunman is holding members of the crew hostage on the plane. CNN reported that seven people are being held hostage.

'Slumdog' child's father denies trying to sell her

MUMBAI, 20 April—The father of "Slumdog Millionaire" child actress Rubina Ali has denied trying to sell his daughter, after a British newspaper claimed he was willing to put her up for adoption at a price.

Indian media said Monday that Rafiq Qureshi described the *News of the World* report on Sunday as lies, although he accepted meeting a man claiming to be from the Middle East who approached them with an offer for the nine-year-old.

The man, posing as a wealthy Arab sheikh, was in fact a reporter at the weekly tabloid. The tactic has been employed successfully in the past in sting operations against the rich and famous in Britain.

"They kept saying we

will give you a lot of benefits and it will be good for your daughter, but I declined," Qureshi was quoted as telling reporters. "The reports that I wanted to sell Rubina are false."

Rubina, who played the young Latika in the hit film and still lives in Mumbai's teeming slums,

was also quoted as saying: "I want to remain with (my father)."

The *News of the World* claimed Qureshi demanded 20 million rupees (400,000 dollars, 310,000 euros) for Rubina during a meeting with the "sheikh" at a Mumbai hotel.

Antarctic ice is growing, not melting away

PERTH, 20 April — Ice is expanding in much of Antarctica, contrary to the widespread public belief that global warming is melting the continental ice cap. The results of ice-core drilling and sea ice monitoring indicate there is no large-scale melting of ice over most of Antarctica, although experts are concerned at ice losses on the continent's western coast.

Antarctica has 90 per cent of the Earth's ice and 80 per cent of its fresh water, *The Australian* reports. Extensive melting of Antarctic ice sheets would be required to raise sea levels substantially, and ice is melting in parts of west Antarctica. The destabilisation of the Wilkins ice shelf generated international headlines this month.

However, the picture is very different in east Antarctica, which includes the territory claimed by Australia. East Antarctica is four times the size of west Antarctica and parts of it are cooling. The Scientific Committee on Antarctic Research report prepared for last week's meeting of Antarctic Treaty nations in Washington noted the South Pole had shown "significant cooling in recent decades".

Nanoparticles boost cancer treatment

SEATTLE, 20 April—US researchers say combining nanoparticles with a scorpion venom compound can cut the spread of cancerous brain tumor cells by 98 percent. The University of Washington said the nanoparticles more than double the effectiveness of chlorotoxin, a small peptide isolated from scorpion venom.

"People talk about the treatment being more effective with nanoparticles but they don't know how much, maybe 5 percent or 10 percent," Miqin Zhang, professor of materials science and engineering, said on Friday in a release. "This was quite a surprise to us." The findings are published in the journal *Small*.

Researchers said adding nanoparticles can improve a therapy by increasing the length of time the combination lasts in the body. Nanoparticles also boost effectiveness of treatment compounds because therapeutic molecules tend to clump around each nanoparticle, the report said.—Internet

High stakes in Hurricane Katrina flooding trial

NEW ORLEANS, 20 April — More than three years after Katrina stirred up the waters and washed out levees along a 75-mile, man-made shipping channel dubbed “hurricane highway,” a judge could soon decide whether the Army Corps of Engineers owes residents and businesses damages because of the massive flooding.

Arguments are set to begin Monday in the trial, which will be heard and decided by a judge, not a jury.

And much is at stake: If the five residents and one business in this initial lawsuit are victorious, more than 120,000 other individuals, businesses and government entities

could have a better shot at claiming billions of dollars in damages.

The residents argue the corps’ poor maintenance of the Mississippi River-Gulf Outlet, a shipping channel dug in the 1960s as a short-cut between the Gulf of Mexico and New

Orleans, led to the wipe-out of St Bernard Parish and the city’s Lower Ninth Ward when Katrina struck in August 2005.

They are asking for damages between \$300,000 and \$400,000 for each individual.

Sudan bus crash kills 21

KHARTOUM, 20 April—Twenty-one Sudanese were killed on Sunday when a bus they were travelling in collided with a truck, police said.

Fifteen people were also injured in the accident, which took place on a road 40 kilometres (25 miles) south of the capital Khartoum, a police officer said.

Most passengers on public transport in Sudan, Africa’s largest country, are poorer people who cannot afford private vehicles.—Internet

US to boycott UN anti-racism meeting

NEW YORK, 20 April — The United States will not attend the United Nations meeting on racism in Geneva, Switzerland, the State Department announced on Saturday.

In a brief statement, Robert Wood, a spokesman for the Department, said the document produced for approval by the conference next week is a big improvement on earlier drafts. But he said it still contains a one-sided view of the conflict between Israelis and Palestinians and has added

statements on “incitement” that appear to call for restrictions on freedom of speech.

“Unfortunately, it now seems certain these remaining concerns will not be addressed in the document to be adopted by the conference next week,” Wood said. “Therefore, with regret, the United States will not join the review conference.”

The conference, officially known as the Durban Review Conference, is a followup to the World Conference Against Rac-

ism 2001 held in Durban, South Africa, in 2001. Australia, Canada, Israel and Italy also plan to stay away.

Human Rights Watch urged the United States to participate in the 2009 conference. In a statement, the group said US participation “is essential to put to rest the tainted history” of the 2001 Durban, South Africa, conference on racism, where US and Israeli representatives walked out when Arab states sought to define Zionism as racist.—Internet

Limits set on Antarctic tourism

BALTIMORE, 20 April — Nations with ties to Antarctica have agreed to limit tourism, say scientists and diplomats working together to protect the fragile ecosystem.

The restrictions would require member countries of the Antarctic Treaty to prevent ships with more than 500 passengers from landing in Antarctica and to allow a maximum of

100 passengers on shore at any given time, the BBC reported on Saturday.

The agreement was reached on Friday at the 32nd Antarctic Treaty Consultative Meeting in Baltimore, where nearly 400 people are to meet during the next two weeks to discuss environmental protection and scientific research on the continent,

The Sun newspaper in Baltimore reported.

The agreed tourism limit won’t become binding until ratified by each of the 28 nations that signed the initial Antarctic Treaty 50 years ago.

Visits to Antarctica, primarily from cruise ships, rose from 6,700 in 1992-93 to more than 45,000 last year, the BBC reported.—Internet

Saudi man divorces wife by text message

A Saudi man has divorced his wife by text message, a newspaper said on Thursday. The man was in Iraq when he sent the SMS informing her, she was no longer his spouse. He followed up with a telephone call to two of his relatives, the daily *Arab News* reported.

A court in the Red Sea city of Jeddah finalised the split—the first known divorce in Saudi Arabia by text message — after summoning the two relatives to check they had received word of the husband’s intention, the paper said.

Saudi Arabia practises a strict form of Islamic Sharia law, and clerics preside over Sharia courts as judges. Under the law a man can divorce his wife by saying “I divorce you” three times.

The Saudi man was in Iraq to participate in “what he described as ‘jihad,’” according to the *Arab News*. Many Saudis have gone to fight with al Qaeda militants against the Iraqi government and US forces.

Pa politician has drive-through window

A politician in northeastern Pennsylvania has been getting some ribbing from his colleagues for it, but he said having a drive-through window at his office is working great.

State Rep Kevin Murphy said his office in Scranton has the drive-through to make it easier for his constituents to see him. He said senior citizens, the disabled and those who have children in the car especially like the convenience of not having to walk into the office to drop off or pick up paperwork.

The first-term Democrat said he personally staffs the drive-through most on Thursdays and Fridays from 9 a.m to 5 p.m.

Kansas couple married for 67 years die hours apart

Residents of a northeast Kansas town are mourning the deaths just hours apart of an elderly couple who were married 67 years. Arnita Yingling died in her sleep early Saturday at the family’s home in Troy. She was 93. Six hours later her 95-year-old husband, Lyle, died at a nursing home in the nearby town of Wathena.

At their funeral on Wednesday, friends and relatives described the two as inseparable. Some found comfort knowing neither would have to live without the other.

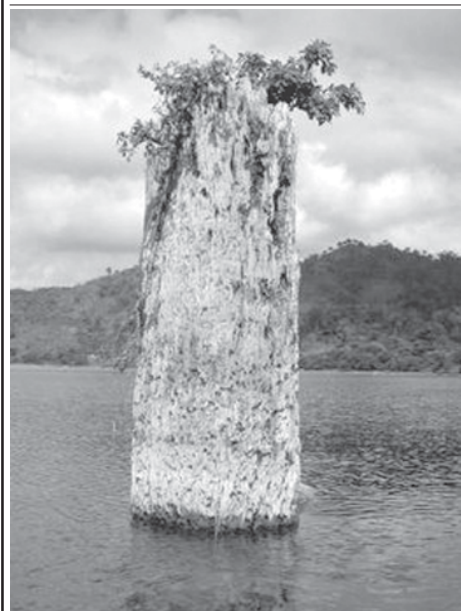

Court fines mother for phoning son too much

An Austrian woman who bombarded her son with phone calls over a two-and-a-half year period was fined by a court for stalking him, Austrian media reported on Thursday.

The 73-year-old woman, who phoned her son up to 49 times a day was fined 360 euros (324 pounds) by the court in the southern city of Klagenfurt.

“I just wanted to talk to him,” the woman told the court, according to Austrian newspaper *Kleine Zeitung*. “I can’t talk to my son, nor my daughter. I’ve never seen my grandchild—who is already 15-years-old,” she said.

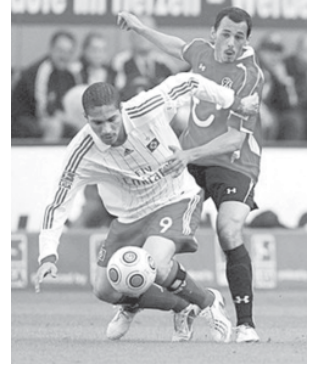
Petric double keeps Hamburg in title race

Seven cows rescued from muddy English river

BURNHAM-ON-SEA, ENGLAND, 20 April — Rescuing seven cows from a muddy English estuary turned out to be a complicated operation involving 20 firefighters and two hovercraft, officials said.

By the time the firefighters arrived Friday afternoon, some of the cows were buried up to their necks in mud, the BBC reported. Investigators said they believe the animals stampeded into the River Parrett in Somerset, possibly frightened by gunfire.

More than 20 firefighters were called to the scene. They used ropes and tractors to drag the animals to dry ground. A Burnham Area Rescue Boat spokesman said the hovercraft — Spirit of Lelaina and Light of Elizabeth — provided safety for the firefighters and helped herd the cows out of the river.

“The cattle were returned to their very grateful owner,” the spokesman said. “Throughout the rescue the RSPCA were in attendance, and, as far as we know, the cattle were none the worse for their ordeal. We used ropes, mud mats, tractors and other equipment to help free the trapped animals.” —Internet

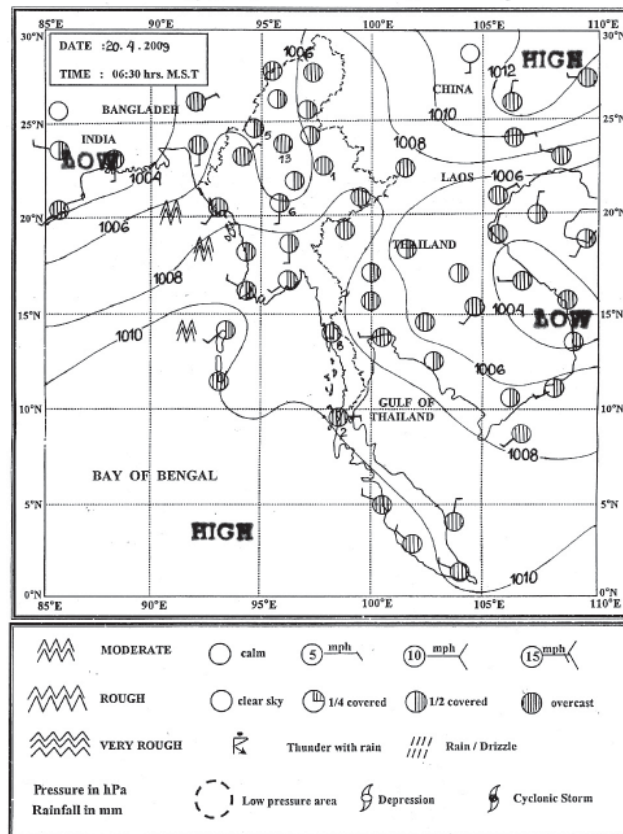

Rainfall on 20-4-2009 was (Nil) at Mingaladon, at Kaba-Aye and at Central Yangon. Total rainfall since 1-1-2009 was (1.06) inches at Mingaladon, (1.58) inches at Kaba-Aye and (2.84) inches at Central Yangon. Maximum wind speed at Yangon (Kaba-Aye) was (8) mph from Southwest at (21:30) hours MST on 19-4-2009.
