Photos to detail US abuse in Iraq, Afghanistan

WASHINGTON, 25 April — The White House vowed Friday it will not be distracted by an upcoming disclosure sure to gain attention at home and abroad: hundreds of photos showing US personnel allegedly abusing prisoners in Iraq and Afghanistan in the post-Sept. 11 environment.

The images will show mistreatment at locations beyond the infamous US-run Abu Ghraib prison in Iraq, where pictures emerged in 2004 of grinning US soldiers posing with detainees,

some naked, being held on leashes or in painful positions. That revelation caused a huge international backlash against the US.

The Pentagon plans to release the latest photos by 28 May in response to a Freedom of Information Act lawsuit filed by the American Civil Liberties Union. The move comes after the Justice Department lost its latest round in federal court and concluded that any further appeal would probably be fruitless.

United Nations condemns suicide bombings in Baghdad

UNITED NATIONS, 25 April — UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon on Friday condemned the horrific back-to-back bombings that struck Baghdad on Friday and Thursday, reiterating the UN commitment to supporting Iraq in the efforts to achieve lasting peace and national reconciliation.

A statement, issued here by Ban's spokesperson, said "the secretary-general condemns the appalling suicide bombings since yesterday in Baghdad and Diyala, which reportedly killed at least 140 people including a large number of visiting Iranian pilgrims."

Ban "expresses his deepest condolences to the families of the victims," the statement said. "The Secretary-General is particularly dismayed by reports that one of the bombers was a woman accompanied by a five year old child. No cause or grievance can justify such reprehensible acts."

"The secretary-general joins the people of Iraq in rejecting these attempts to incite further violence in the country," the statement said. "He reiterates the United Nations' commitment to supporting Iraq in the efforts to achieve lasting peace and national reconciliation."

Roadside bomb kills Afghan couple

KABUL, 25 April — A couple was killed as roadside bomb struck a motorbike in Helmand Province south of Afghanistan on Friday, provincial administration spokesman Daud Ahmadi said.

"A man along with his wife was riding a motorcycle outside provincial capital Lashkar Gah this morning when a roadside bomb struck the motorbike killing the couple on the spot," Ahmadi told *Xinhua*.

He blamed Taliban militants for planting the bomb, adding that the rebels by carrying out such attacks want to destabilize the province. This is the second bomb blast in Afghanistan on a single day Friday. The previous bomb blast left at least one police dead in the capital city Kabul.—Internet

- 26 March — Car bomb tears through market in Shiite area in east Baghdad, killing 20.
- 23 March — Suicide bomber strikes Kurdish funeral north of Baghdad in Jalula, killing 27.
- 10 March — Suicide bomber targets tribal leaders at market in Abu Ghraib, killing 33.
- 8 March — Suicide bomber strikes police academy in Baghdad, killing at least 30.
- 5 March — Car bomb tears through livestock market in Hillah, killing 13.
- 13 Feb — Female suicide bomber targets Shiite pilgrims in Musayyib, killing 40.
- 11 Feb — Twin car bombs explode at a bus terminal and market area in Baghdad, killing 16.
- 4 Jan — Female suicide bomber strikes Shiite pilgrims in Baghdad, killing 38.
- 2 Jan — Suicide bomber hits luncheon at a tribal leader's home in Youssifiyah, killing 23.—Internet

Three people killed in Iraq's Diyala violence

DIYALA (Iraq), 25 April — An Iraqi soldier and two civilians were killed and seven others wounded in two separate attacks in the volatile province of Diyala on Friday, a provincial police source said.

The soldier was killed when he and other soldiers were trying to defuse a roadside bomb in the provincial capital Baquba, some 65 km northeast of Baghdad, the source told *Xinhua* on condition of anonymity.

Three more soldiers were wounded by the blast, the source said.

Separately, another roadside bomb detonated in the northern al-Sa'adiyah town, some 70 km north of Baquba, killing two civilians and injuring four others, the source said.

Iraqi security forces rushed to the scene and immediately launched an investigation into the incident, he added.

Diyala was also the scene of violence on Thursday when a suicide bomber struck people inside a restaurant near the town of Maqdadiah, some 100 km northeast of Baghdad, killing 48 people, among which 43 are Iranian Shiite pilgrims, and wounding 70 others, 50 of them Iranians, while they were taking a rest during lunch time in the restaurant after they crossed the border through the Mundhriyah border point in Diyala to visit the holy Shiite shrines in Iraq.

US must prosecute Bush lawyers

VIENNA, 25 April—The US is obligated by a United Nations convention to prosecute Bush administration lawyers who allegedly drafted policies that approved the use of harsh interrogation tactics against terrorism suspects, the UN's top anti-torture envoy said on Friday.

Earlier this week, President Barack Obama left the door open to prosecuting Bush administration

officials who devised the legal authority for gruesome terror-suspect interrogations. He had previously absolved CIA officers from prosecution.

Manfred Nowak, who serves as a UN special rapporteur in Geneva, said Washington is obligated under the UN Convention against Torture to prosecute US Justice Department officials who wrote memos that defined torture in the narrowest way in

order to justify and legitimize it, and who assured CIA officials that their use of questionable tactics was legal.

"That's exactly what I call complicity or participation" to torture as defined by the convention, Nowak said at a news conference. "At that time, every reasonable person would know that waterboarding, for instance, is torture."

Italy to send envoy to Somalia for talks on hostage release

ROME, 25 April—Italy will send a political envoy to Somalia in an effort to speed up the release of the crew of an Italian tugboat seized off the African country's northern coast, the Italian foreign ministry said on Friday.

Italy's former foreign undersecretary Margherita Boniver will travel to the east African country as a special envoy of Italian Foreign Minister Franco Frattini.

Boniver is known for her humanitarian work, as she founded the Italian branch of Amnesty International in 1973. Earlier this year, she was sent to Kenya to help negotiate the release of two Roman Catholic nuns kidnapped on the border with Somalia.

Iran tells Washington to stop the language of threats

TEHERAN, 25 April—An influential Iranian cleric urged the United States Friday to stop threatening Iran with more sanctions if it wanted to hold talks with the Islamic state over its disputed nuclear work.

"It is better if they do not repeat the threats so the atmosphere which is becoming ready in Iran more or less (for talks) is not destroyed," former president Ali Akbar Rafsanjani told worshippers at Friday prayers.

US Secretary of State Hillary Clinton Wednesday threatened Iran with crippling sanctions if it did not suspend its disputed nuclear programme.

Iran's President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad reiterated this week that Teheran had no intention to halt its nuclear work, which the West fears is a cover to build bombs.—Internet

US-Russia talks on nuclear reduction begin

ROME, 25 April—US and Russian negotiators emerged optimistic Friday after talks aimed at creating a new treaty to reduce their nuclear weapon stockpiles.

The goal is to replace the 1991 Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty, or START, before it expires in December. The deal capped the number of warheads and reduced

ways of delivering them. Both sides have said they are ready for further cuts.

Friday's one-day meeting focused on procedural issues, setting the agenda for further discussions. More meetings will take place in Washington and Moscow in the next two

months ahead of President Barack Obama's first visit to Russia in July.

The new treaty is considered the first step in the no-nuclear agenda embraced by Obama and Russian President Dmitry Medvedev in a joint 1 April declaration.

World War Two bomber recovered from Lake Michigan

CHICAGO, 25 April—A World War Two naval dive bomber was recovered from the bottom of Lake Michigan Friday, 65 years after it crashed on a training mission off Waukegan, about 60 kilometres north of Chicago.

It's known that the pilot survived, but it's not clear which aircraft this is, because definitive identification numbers can't be found on the plane.

Nevertheless a marine salvage company in Illinois working with a naval aviation museum, found the aircraft using sidescan sonar in 315 feet of water, 27 miles out from Waukegan.—Internet

Unexploded WWII bomb found at German museum site

BERLIN, 25 April—German police say a World War II bomb uncovered during construction at the Neues Museum in central Berlin has caused evacuations and traffic jams.

Police would not confirm reports that the apartment of Chancellor Angela Merkel, who lives nearby, needed to be evacuated.

A Berlin police statement says the 220-pound (100-kilogram) unexploded bomb appears to be a type used by the Russians during the war. Officers evacuated a 985-foot (300-meter) area around the bomb Friday afternoon, disrupting nearby train and streetcar service.

The statement said experts were working to dispose of the bomb Friday evening.

Unexploded bombs from World War II are still found frequently in Germany. Disposing of them sometimes involves precautionary evacuations like Friday's.

Dutch firms to build network of charging stations for electric cars

BRUSSELS, 25 April—Dutch electricity grid companies have agreed to build a national network of charging stations for electric cars to encourage the purchase of this type of clean vehicles, Dutch media reported on Friday.

Eleven companies which manage the regional electricity grids decided to build at least 10,000 such charging stations by 2012. The whole country will be covered by

the scheme with the exception of the region of Rotterdam. The cost of the project is estimated at some 15 million euros (20 million US dollars) and will be paid by the grid companies themselves.

The grid companies want to end “the chicken and the egg” dilemma in which consumers do not buy electric cars because there are no recharging points, and power companies don't want to build

recharging points because no one has electric cars.

At the moment, hardly any electric cars are being sold in the Netherlands and it is hoped the new initiative will help stimulate the market.

An important reason is their price. Electric Cars Europe converts Volkswagen Golfs to run on batteries and a revamped vehicle costs about 100,000 euros (132,500 dollars).—Xinhua

Global crisis pushing 35 million back into poverty in Europe, C Asia

WASHINGTON, 25 April—The global crisis is pushing some 35 million people back into poverty and vulnerability in Europe and Central Asia, the World Bank said Friday.

“After enjoying a decade of strong growth and poverty reduction, the countries of Eastern Europe and Central Asia (ECA) are now seeing the global economic and financial crisis push almost 35 million people back into poverty and vulnerability, or about one-third of the people that had es-

caped from it over the last ten years,” the World Bank said at its regular regional economic briefing at the World Bank/IMF Spring Meetings.

Nearly 90 million of the region's 480 million people — about 18 percent of the population — have moved out of poverty and vulnerability since 1999. But these gains are at risk as a result of the financial crisis, according to a press release obtained by Xinhua.

Today, almost 40 percent of the 480 million are

still considered poor or vulnerable. But the number of poor and vulnerable people is now expected to rise throughout the region, increasing by about 5 million people for every 1 percent decline in GDP, says the press release. By the end of 2009, poverty and vulnerability is expected to rise by 5 percent, which means almost 25 million more poor or vulnerable. And this will further increase by an additional 10 million to a total of 35 million people by the end of 2010.—Xinhua

Toyota recalls about 259,000 Camry sedans in China over brake flaw

BEIJING, 25 April—Guangzhou Toyota began Friday to recall 259,119 Camry sedans in China to fix faulty brake systems, according to the General Administration of Quality Supervision, Inspection and Quarantine.

The cars were produced between 15 May, 2006 and March 3, 2008, the agency said. Guangzhou Toyota started selling the cars in China in 2006, priced at about 200,000 yuan (29,294 U.S. dollars) to 250,000 yuan.

The agency's statement said brakes on these cars could fail, due to a design flaw in the vacuum pump. Under normal use, the defect could impede brake-pad function and the stopping distance might exceed limits, said the statement.—Xinhua

US new home sales decrease by 0.6% in March

WASHINGTON, 25 April—New home sales in the United States fell by 0.6 percent in March to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 356,000 units, the Commerce Department reported Friday.

The new home sales was better than the 340,000 units that analysts had expected. However, March sales pace was down 31 percent compared with March 2008.

The median price of a new home, a typical market price where half of new homes are sold for more and half sold for less, dropped to 201,400 dollars, down a record 12 percent compared with March 2008. In a separate report issued Friday, the Commerce Department reported that orders for US manufactured durable goods dropped by 0.8 percent in March.—Xinhua

British economy suffers deepest recession in 30 years

LONDON, 25 April—The British economy shrank 1.9 percent in the first quarter of 2009, which was much worse than expected and was the biggest quarterly decline in GDP since the third quarter of 1979.

The economy was even worse than that seen in the fourth quarter of 2008. GDP in Britain in the first quarter of this year plummeted 4.1 percent year-on-

year, which was the largest annual decline since 1980, according to the Office for National Statistics (ONS). Figures from the ONS showed that GDP has now contracted for consecutive three quarters and confirmed that the British economy has been in steep recession. Britain has been viewed as the last advanced country to step out of recession. “Any recovery looks some distance away,” said Howard Archer, chief British and European economist from IHS Global Insight. “But we expect the economy to contract at a slowing rate through the rest of 2009 and the first quarter of 2010 before stabilizing. So GDP contraction of 4 percent or more looks very much on the cards for 2009.”—Xinhua

FAA says bird strikes pose threat to planes

LOS ANGELES, 25 April — Birds struck planes at Los Angeles International Airport (LAX) for 940 times between 1990 and 2008, posing a serious threat to planes, the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) said on Friday.

Of the 940 bird strikes, 36 resulted in substantial damage, ranging from a cracked windshield to emergency landings, according to the FAA.

This was the first time that the FAA has made a complete database on bird strikes available to the

public. Birds caused January's US Airways emergency landing in the Hudson River, New York City, which prompted more focus on the issue.

Planes taking off at LAX have hit pigeons, gulls, hawks, ducks and doves, said the FAA.

The FAA also reported bird strikes at nearby airports, including 218 at Bob Hope Airport in Burbank, 148 at Long Beach Airport and 214 at John Wayne Airport in Orange County.

"I strongly caution anyone against comparing

one airport's bird strike numbers to another airport's bird strike numbers because our database is based on a voluntary reporting system," said FAA spokesman Ian Gregor. "Thus, an airport that is extremely diligent in reporting bird strikes will appear to have more incidents than an airport that is less diligent in its reporting of these events."

Over the next four months, the FAA will streamline the bird strike database to make it more user-friendly.

SMFG wins priority in talks to buy Nikko

TOKYO, 25 April—Sumitomo Mitsui Financial Group (SMFG) has been granted preferential negotiating rights to buy Nikko Cordial Securities from US financial giant Citigroup, according to news reports.

SMFG offered the highest bid of 500 billion yen (5.2 billion dollars) among three major Japanese commercial banks in a tender set by Citigroup, the *Nikkei* business daily and *Kyodo News* said.

SMFG is expected to hold negotiations with Citigroup on a more detailed assessment of Nikko Cordial's assets, with an eye to striking a deal as early as next month, *Kyodo* said.

Fifteen injured after Air Canada flight hits turbulence above Pacific

OTTAWA, 25 April—Eleven passengers and four crew on an Air Canada flight suffered injuries after the aircraft hit turbulence and was forced to make an unscheduled landing in Hawaii, Canadian media reported on Friday.

The flight, en route from Sydney, Australia to Vancouver, was carrying 256 passengers and 17 crew members, the Canadian Television (CTV) reported.

"The aircraft was about an hour northeast of Honolulu when it encountered turbulence related to a thunderstorm in the area and that resulted in injuries to some people on board," Air Canada spokesperson Peter Fitzpatrick told CTV Newsnet on Friday.

Tainted water sickens 12 students in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, 25 April — Contaminated water sickened a dozen of students at a Los Angeles junior high school, but the incident did not appear to have been deliberately tampered with, the FBI reported on Friday.

The students became sick after drinking bottled water sold through a vending machine at La Mesa Junior High School early Thursday afternoon, according to authorities.

Twelve students were taken to four hospitals with complaints of headaches, nausea and dizziness. A doctor from Henry Mayo Newhall Memorial Hospital told ABC7 that all four students treated there were released after evaluation.—Internet

When the snake coiled itself round his upper body, Nyaumbe resorted to desperate measures: "I had to bite it."

Honda unveils dog-friendly car

Dog-crazy Americans will soon be able to buy a pet-friendly car with a cushioned dog bed in the trunk, fitted with a built-in water bowl and fan and a ramp to help less agile dogs climb in.

With the help of a rescue dog named Sammy, Japanese car maker Honda Motor Co unveiled the pet friendly version of its Element utility vehicle at the New York Auto Show.

It features easy-wash seat covers, a fitted dog bed with restraints to keep Sammy safe in the event of a crash, and a paw logo on the side. Honda said the car would go on sale across the United States from the fall of this year.

Honda spokesman Sage Marie said it was designed with both safety and comfort in mind. "(It's) a car we think is of interest to many of today's dog-crazy consumers," he said.

Sewing machine frenzy in red mercury hoax

Saudi police are investigating the origins of a hoax that had hundreds of people believing that old sewing machines may bring fortune because they contained an elusive, and probably mythical, substance known as red mercury.

Saudi newspapers on Tuesday published pictures of Saudis proudly posing next to old sewing machines awaiting prospective buyers at traditional markets.

The English-language Saudi Gazette newspaper said some buyers were willing to pay up to 200,000 riyals (\$50,000) for an old Singer sewing machine proven to contain red mercury.

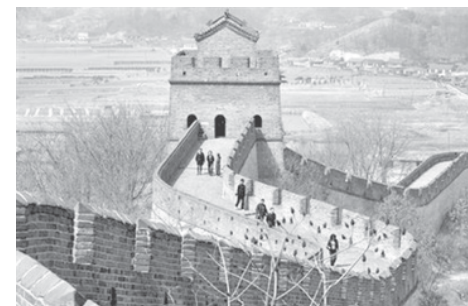
Study says China's Great Wall is longer than thought

The Great Wall of China is even greater than once thought.

A two-year government mapping study has uncovered new sections of the ancient Chinese monument that total about 180 miles (290 kilometres), according to a report posted on the State Bureau of Surveying and Mapping Web site.

Using mapping technologies such as infrared range finders and GPS devices, experts discovered portions of the wall — concealed by hills, trenches and rivers — that stretch from Hu Mountain in northern Liaoning Province to Jiayu Pass in western Gansu Province, the official *China Daily* reported Monday.

The newly mapped parts of the wall were built during the Ming Dynasty (1368-1644) to protect against northern invaders and were submerged over time by sandstorms that moved across the arid region, the study said.

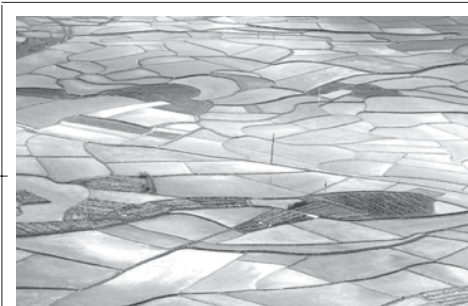

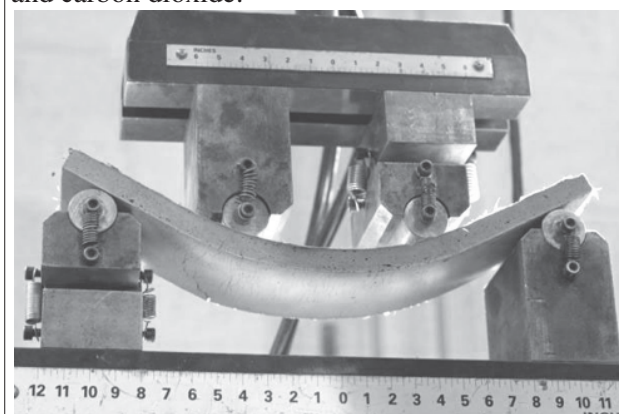
Self-healing concrete for safer, more durable infrastructure

LANSING, 25 April —A concrete material developed at the University of Michigan can heal itself when it cracks. No human intervention is necessary—just water and carbon dioxide.

A handful of drizzly days would be enough to mend a damaged bridge made of the new substance. Self-healing is possible because the material is designed to bend and crack in narrow hairlines rather than break

and split in wide gaps, as traditional concrete behaves.

“It’s like if you get a small cut on your hand, your body can heal itself. But if you have a large wound, your body needs help. You might need stitches. We’ve created a material with such tiny crack widths that it takes care of the healing by itself. Even if you overload it, the cracks stay small,” said Victor Li, the E. Benjamin Wylie Collegiate Professor of Civil Engineering and a professor of Materials Science and Engineering.—Internet

HRT may protect against colon cancer

DENVER, 25 April—Hormone replacement therapy protected postmenopausal women against colon cancer, researchers at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn, said. The study was designed to look at possible links between estrogen exposure and colon cancer molecular subtypes, to determine how these hormones might function as anti-cancer agents, the researchers said.

The study is part of the Iowa Women's Health Study, which enrolled 41,836 women from Iowa, ages 55-69, in 1986. After exclusions, the study group consisted of 37,285 women. The investigators examined tumor tissue from 553 colorectal cancer patients, specifically looking for associations between self-reported hormone use and a specific DNA methylation pattern, called the CpG island methylator phenotype, or BRAF gene mutations.—*Internet*

Plants absorb more carbon under hazy skies

LONDON, 25 April—British scientists say they've found plants absorb carbon dioxide more efficiently under Earth's polluted skies than they would in cleaner settings.

"Surprisingly, the effects of atmospheric pollution seem to have enhanced global plant productivity by as much as a quarter from 1960 to 1999," said lead author Lina Mercado of the Centre for Ecology & Hydrology. "This resulted in a net 10 percent increase in the amount of carbon stored by the land once other effects were taken into account."

The scientists said an increase in microscopic particles released by human activities, and subsequent changes in cloud cover, caused a decline in the amount of sunlight reaching Earth's surface from the 1950s up to the 1980s.

Study finds worm is actually two species

GOTHENBURG, 25 April—Swedish scientists say animals that seem identical may belong to utterly different species, meaning there may be more species on Earth than thought. University of Gothenburg researchers led by Professor Christer Erseus and doctoral student

Daniel Gustavsson used DNA analysis to discover one of the Earth's most common segmented worms is actually two types of worm.

"We could be talking about a large number of species that have existed undiscovered because they resemble other known

species," said Erseus. Both species differ in one of the examined genes by 17 percent — twice as much as the equivalent difference between humans and chimpanzees. And, said Erseus, as the advanced DNA technology is tested increasingly within various animal groups, it might mean our perception of the Earth's biodiversity needs to be revised.

Genetic impulsivity predicts alcoholism

INDIANAPOLIS, 25 April—Genetic predisposition to impulsivity is a trait predictive of alcoholism, US researchers report. Nicholas Grahame of the Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis School of Science used selective breeding for 30 generations to produce mice that were high-volume alcohol drinkers and others that avoided consuming alcohol.

The genetically different mice were presented with a choice between a small, immediate reward and a large, delayed reward. By adjusting the quantity of

the immediate reward up and down based on choice behavior, the task allowed the researchers to test the impulsivity of the rodents.

The study, published online ahead of print of the July issue of the journal *Alcoholism: Clinical and Experimental Research*, found the mice with high alcohol preferring genes were more impulsive than their low drinking counterparts — demonstrating that predisposition to impulsivity is predictive of alcoholism.—*Internet*

Floods, mudslides leave 16,000 homeless, three dead in Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO, 25 April—Floods and mudslides from heavy rain have led to three deaths and left more than 16,000 people homeless in Brazil, local media said on Friday.

In the northeastern Maranhao state, the persistent rain which began in early April has already affected 40,000 people, 13,000 of whom were left homeless. Two people died in mudslides in the state capital Sao Luis, and 13 municipalities declared state of emergency.

According to the local Civil Defence department, about half of those who were left homeless are now living in public shelters, while the other half are in the houses of their friends or relatives.

Fossil may offer 'missing link' proof

PITTSBURGH, 25 April—A 24-million-year-old fossil thought to be a "missing link" in evolution has been discovered in northern Canada, researchers said. Carnegie Museum of Natural History paleontologist Mary Dawson was a member of an international team that found the fossil, the *Pittsburgh Tribune-Review* said on Thursday.

The find — reported in Thursday's issue of the journal *Nature* — may be the "missing link" between land carnivores and seals, sea lions and walruses, the newspaper said. San Diego State University biologist Annalisa Berta — who was not a part of the team that discovered the fossil — told the newspaper it is a "fabulous discovery."

China UnionPay's ATM business expands in Middle East, Africa

BEIJING, 25 April—China UnionPay's automatic teller machine (ATM) network has expanded to 61 countries and regions after it recently started service in nine Middle East and African countries, sources with the company said on Friday.

The nine countries are the United Arab Emirates, Lebanon, Syria, Afghanistan, Iraq, Yemen, Jordan, Djibouti and the Republic of Congo.

The economic and trade relations

between China and the nine countries have become closer in recent years, with a total bilateral trade volume of 22 billion US dollars in 2008. Some 250,000 Chinese visited those countries for work and travel.

"It not only marks an important step in expanding our business in the Middle East, West Asia and Africa, but also a crucial move for our global reach," said Xu Luode, president of the company.

Scientists identify 39 bacterial pathogens

BERLIN, 25 April—German scientists say they have identified 39 bacterial pathogens that use toxins to manipulate human host cells to create infections.

The researchers from the Max Planck Institute for Biochemistry and the Max Delbrück Center for Molecular Medicine said several bacterial pathogens use toxins to manipulate human host cells, but until now scientists have been able to identify only a few of the proteins that interact with bacterial toxins. In the new study, researchers succeeded for the first time in systematically investigating the cellular target sites

of the bacterial toxins.

“Surprisingly, the toxins are not optimally adapted to the structures of human proteins,” said Matthias Selbach of MDC. While binding relatively weakly to individual human proteins, they are able to influence several different proteins simultaneously, he said. “A single bacterial toxin seems to function like a master key that can access different host cell proteins in parallel,” Selbach said. “Perhaps it is due to this strategy that bacteria are able to attack very different cells and, thus, to increase their survival chances in the host.”—INTERNET

Anti-malaria parasite chemical developed

LEEDS, 25 April—British scientists say they have created chemical compounds that kill the most deadly malaria parasites, including those resistant to existing drugs. The University of Leeds researchers said the compounds work by preventing the enzyme dihydroorotate dehydrogenase, which is essential to the growth of the parasite *Plasmodium falciparum*, from working.

“Without this enzyme, *Plasmodium falciparum* is unable to grow and therefore it dies,” said lead researcher Glenn McConkey. “The inhibitors developed at Leeds bind to the ... en-

zyme in the parasite and stop it functioning, preventing the proliferation of the parasites, which live in red blood cells. In addition, our chemicals are equally effective against parasites that have developed resistance to drugs.” INTERNET

German doctors: 40-pound tumor removed from woman

BERLIN, 25 April—A German doctor said Friday that surgeons have successfully removed a 40-pound (18 kilogram) malignant bone tumor from a Saudi Arabian woman.

Dr Heinz Zurbrugg, a surgeon at the private Capital Health clinic in Berlin, said the 35-year-old had only a few weeks to live when she arrived in Germany for care in September.

But he said that after five operations by the surgeons, no traces remain of the bone tumor that once ballooned from her

pelvis and represented a third of her body weight.

He said she is now well enough to return home and that if follow-up exams continue to show no sign of any tumor, the next steps will be to reconstruct the partially removed pelvis and give her

an artificial hip.

The woman, who spoke on the condition that her identity not be disclosed, said she traveled to Germany after doctors in Riyadh said they would have to amputate her leg to remove the bone tumor.—INTERNET

Astronomers study galaxy's gamma rays

WEST LAFAYETTE, 25 April—An international team of astronomers has used a US radio telescope to study the brightest galaxies that the Fermi Gamma-ray Space Telescope can see. Yuri Kovalev at the Max Planck Institute for Radio Astronomy in Germany said the study solidifies the link between an active galaxy's gamma-ray emissions and its powerful radio-emitting jets.

Kovalev and colleagues used the world's largest radio telescope —

the National Science Foundation's Very Long Baseline Array — a set of 10 radio telescopes located from Hawaii to St. Croix in the US Virgin Islands and operated by the National Radio Astronomy Observatory. When the signals from these telescopes are combined, the array acts as a single enormous radio dish more than 5,300 miles across, resolving details about a million times smaller than Fermi can and 50 times smaller than any optical telescope.—INTERNET

Vietnamese woman dies of bird flu

HANOI, 25 April—Vietnamese Ministry of Health confirmed on Friday that a 23-year-old Vietnamese woman from northern Thanh Hoa Province died of bird flu.

The woman developed symptoms similar to bird flu patients on 16 April and was taken to local hospital for treatment.

She died on 22 April. Test by the National Institute of Infectious and Tropical Disease showed that she has contracted the deadly H5N1 bird flu virus.

The neighbourhood that the woman hailed from has recently reported death of a large number of fowls for unknown reasons.

This is the fourth person who died of bird flu in Vietnam so far this year.

Third bird flu death in Egypt this week

CAIRO, 25 April—A 33-year-old woman died on Friday from the H5N1 strain of bird flu, the third death from the disease in Egypt this week, the health ministry announced.

The woman, from Kafr el-Sheikh province, was the 26th person to die in Egypt from the strain since it was first identified in the Arab world's most heavily populated country in 2006. The woman was hospitalised on 15 April with a high fever and respiratory problems, the ministry said in a statement reported by the offi-

cial news agency MENA.

It reported on Wednesday that a 25-year-old Cairo woman died from bird flu, the second victim felled by the disease this year after the death of six-year-old boy announced the previous day.

The ministry said on Thursday that a 34-year-old woman, Wafaa Abdel Hamid Abdel Jawwad from Tanta north of Cairo, has contracted the illness.

The woman, who had been in close contact with infected poultry, was treated with antiviral drug Tamiflu and is in stable condition, it said.

Her case is the 68th recorded since the outbreak of the disease in Egypt in 2006. Most of the victims in Egypt have been young girls or women, who are generally in charge of looking after poultry in rural areas. Health ministry spokesman Abdurrahman Shatin told AFP on Friday the situation was “worrying.” Egypt has seen an increase in bird flu cases over the past two months. The World Health Organisation (WHO) called in March for an investigation into why many of the victims have been young children.

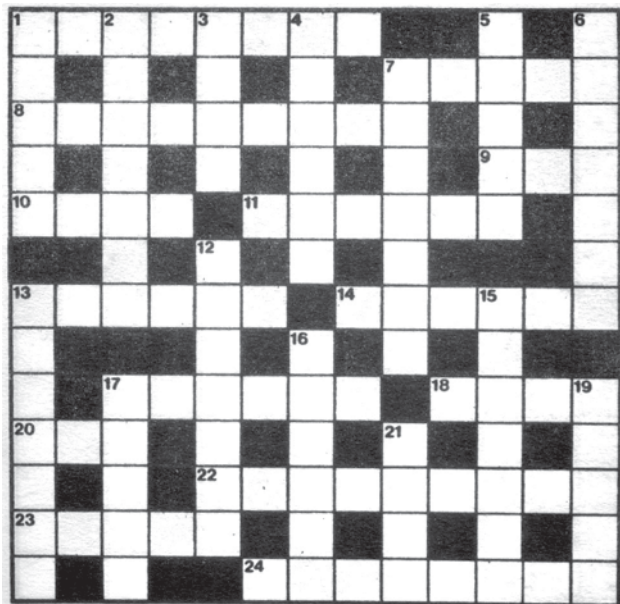
Ferguson confident Tevez will stay

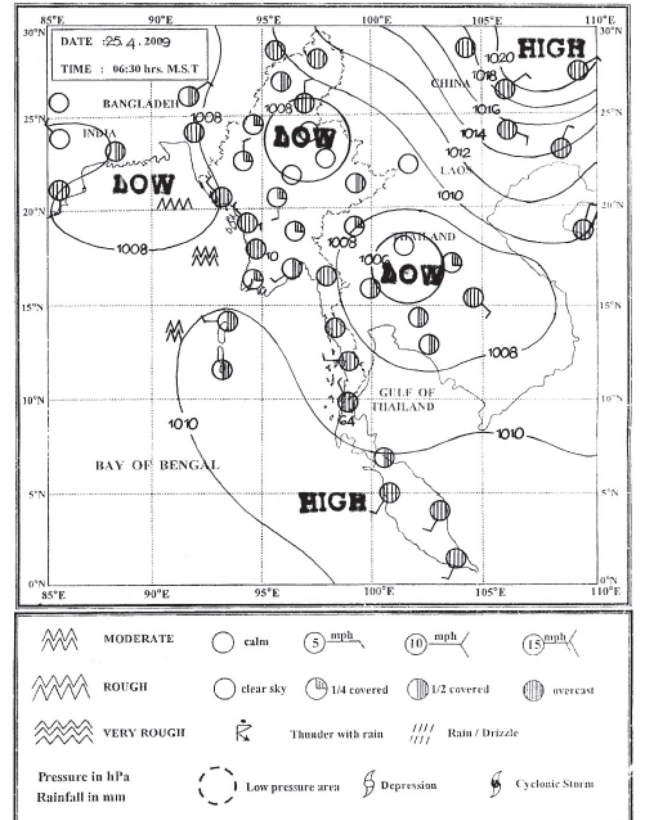

Soe Mya, son of late chairman of KNU/KNLA Saw Bo Mya, and 71 members and 88 dependants totaling 159 bringing 24 assorted arms and ammunition together with them joined Htot-kawkoe Village where KNU/KNLA Peace Council is based, on 30 March. Their returning to the legal fold can be regarded as a good

omen of greater peace of the whole Kayin State.

On our way through Nabu feeder road, we noticed lush and green plantations of rubber and teak on both sides along the road to the village.

Upon arrival at Htot-kawkoe Village, we were informed that the government had built houses, a hospital, a health

care centre, a school, a Win Thuzar Shop, constructed roads, and Nabu and Pata dams by damming the Pata Creek.

Moreover, the government provided them with 102 pigs, 18,200 chickens, 100 goats and 100 acres of paddy fields, grown 1500 acres of rubber, dug fishing ponds and bred 60,000

fishes.

This year, they have put 125 acres under paddy and are running 453 acres of rubber at the rate of three acres a household.

They have had their basic needs fulfilled including clean water, electricity, 50 houses with CI sheet roofs and
